Editor's Note


Hello, Corsicana!






Physicians Desk Reference

There is a long-standing tradition in Corsicana of neighbors looking out for one another. What began with individual generosity continues today with those who work with organizations such as

the Family Service Association. Back in 1905, Augusta Helms graduated from college in Sherman and returned to her home in Corsicana intending to do something to help children who could

not afford to buy shoes to attend school. She and her colleague, Adeline Watts, began to gather clothes and food for families in need. In 1914, they formed an organization known as United Charities.

Today, the Family Service Association

(FSA) continues the work begun by these pioneering women. Mark Luera, minister of the First Christian Church, assumed the post of on-site coordinator two years ago. "Their vision of doing the 'hands-on work of helping' is what we still do today," Mark said. As the bookkeeper, administrator and selfselected historian, he is researching and writing down the 100-year history of the association. "He [Mark] is a blessing to this organization and to the community," Jane Biltz said. "With his long experience in ministry, his counseling skills are an added benefit to the Family Services program."

In times of personal or medical crisis, the greatest need may be an understanding and encouraging listener. The FSA does not believe in turning someone away because they do not provide a particular service. As an officer of the

Ministerial Alliance, Mark will refer clients to other organizations that can help. "When Augusta needed more money, she just went to the bank trust officer and got it," Mark explained. "The Family Service Association still operates entirely on private funding





from generous individuals and businesses in Navarro County and the United Way." It is also about 60 percent supported with funds available through various trusts and from the Navarro Community Foundation.

Mrs. Billie Love McFerran is a longtime board member who worked with Augusta in those early years. Billie Love and Augusta made house calls to get to know the people in the community and to discover their needs. Of course, in those early days, if you had such "nonessential luxuries" as beer in the refrigerator, or if they could detect signs that someone in the house smoked, food and other supplies might be denied. Today, however, the door is wide open to anyone who comes looking for assistance. Two relatively new board members are President Ed Monk, an Episcopal priest, and Jane, who works with the hospital and with local doctors to assure that the Patient Assistance program operates efficiently.

In 1946, the United Charities



organization changed its name to Family Service Association and became committed to "... the support of any benevolences and charities that are worthy and needy in and about Corsicana, Texas." The board of directors was set at 24 members. Miss Helm served as the executive secretary of FSA for 46 years. "She knew everyone who



was needy in Corsicana," Mark said.
"She conducted many home visits to
determine the actual situation of her
clients. She personally provided
transportation for people who needed
to go to a doctor or hospital that would
serve the poor and indigent. With the









help of the board, she provided groceries and medicines for people in need. To provide services, she established credit accounts with small grocery stores and pharmacies all over Corsicana that would often deliver purchases to the families who needed them. She helped with medical bills, dental bills, utilities and rent."

The two principal programs offered by the FSA are the Patient Assistance program and the free clothing and household items store. Through the Patient Assistance program, applicants who cannot pay for prescriptions can obtain the medicine they need through a voucher system. This service is designed for people with chronic illness and for children who do not have other coverage. The family service staff also helps clients learn how to meet ongoing needs by enrolling in the free prescription plans available through some pharmaceutical companies. A computer-based program helps the staff sort through a collection of companies with free medication programs with their varying eligibility rules. Counseling is also available to individuals who need refills and find the re-enrollment requirements confusing.

The free store program is probably better known in the community. Clothing and household goods are offered without cost to individuals and families who need them. "We think of it as redistributing the wealth," Mark said. "There are many in the community who have a need to give and many who need what is offered. Both of them benefit." Speaking about the donated goods, Mark said, "People are often surprised to learn that in June, for example, we had \$140,000 worth of goods donated. Even though we tend to undervalue each item when we calculate this, we still average around \$70,000 worth of merchandise and cash donations each month."

Some of this monthly income comes in memorial donations. "Finding space to house the donations was a constant problem," Mark said. "The FSA moved to its present location on Commerce Street at 1st Avenue in June of 2007. The purchase of the building was made possible thanks to grants from the Trust Departments of the Bank of America and Community National Bank, and the many donations received in memory of longtime board member, John Taylor."

The FSA has expanded the original focus of the association to include assistance to individuals who need help when utility companies threaten to turn off services. "It's our goal to enable a client to pay their bills the next month after our intervention," Mark said. In the summer, the store sets

aside children's clothing that meets the requirements for school uniforms. FSA also buys school supplies, which are sent to each of the elementary schools in Navarro County so that teachers can give their students what they need.

Some idea of the impact this service has on the community can be seen in the record of prescriptions and other services that FSA has provided. Each month, they average between \$300-\$400 worth of medications and approximately \$800 worth of other food and household items. The records also show that more than 50 percent of the people who benefit from these services are children and youth under the age of 21. All of this is possible because of the staff and the many volunteers who give generously of their time and effort to do the "hands-on work of helping" that Augusta began more than 100 years ago. At Home With Angie and Eric Meyers

The first things you notice as you pull into the driveway are the shrubs in the back garden that have bright red blossoms as big as your hand. These are the hibiscus plants, grown from seeds brought from Hawaii. Angie and Eric Meyers were married on the island of Maui and their house and garden reflect the warmth and charm of the Hawaiian Islands.

Five years ago, they bought a house near Eric's parents' home and did extensive remodeling guided by Angie's experience in interior design. Later they added a large deck bordered with plumeria bushes that also came from the islands. "We entertain out here most of the time," Angie said. Two years ago, this lush garden setting was completed with a waterfall, a spa and a pool that features Eric's company logo. On one side of the garden is an elaborate wooden jungle gym structure for the children, Elaine, who is 3, and Grant, who is 2 years old. The three dogs have their place at the rear of the yard. One



of the dogs, a terrier and Chihuahua mix, acts as guard dog and as the butler whose job is to announce visitors in a voice twice his size.

Angie grew up in Wylie, Texas, with two younger sisters and a brother. Always interested in design, she studied interior design until she took a class in computer-aided design and she switched to an AB degree in drafting. Angie attended Texas Women's College in Denton, Southwest Texas State University (now known as Texas State University-San Marcos), and finally Navarro College to have what her father referred to as a "well rounded education." One transfer put her in the same university Eric was attending while they were dating and he was studying for a degree in industrial engineering.


After graduation, Angie and Eric both worked for his father's company, Oil City Iron Works. Eric explained, "I grew up being around the foundry business with my father and grandfather before him. It was always expected that I would follow them in the business." Eric is now president of the company with 175 employees. They pour castings for oil and gas drilling and mine equipment to be sent all over the U.S. and, through companies like Halliburton, overseas.

Angie used her talent for design to remodel and decorate their home in a comfortable blend of contemporary and antique elements. Most of the furniture in the living room, dining room and master bedroom and a collection of western paintings were













inherited from Eric's grandparents. The furnishings look at home with the tile floors, crown molding and muted contemporary colors. Alongside the paintings on the wall are trophy heads of white-tailed deer and African black bucks. Most impressive of all is an elk head with a massive rack that looks down from the stair landing. Eric is clearly a hunter, but Angie can also point with pride to a deer she got on her one hunting trip.

The kitchen, spectacular with its two-story-high ceiling, houses an island with a statue of dolphins carved of Hawaiian monkeypod wood. A lucky bamboo plant creates an underwater scene that reminds the Meyers' of their stay in Hawaii. Next to the kitchen, a separate laundry room comfortably houses the tall appliances that are popular today. "I like having the window in











the room," Angie said, and with two small children she must spend quite a bit of time in the room.

The dining room furniture, like that in the living room, was brought from Eric's grandparents' home. The room is home to a set of delicate, white antique china displayed in one of the two corner cabinets. On one wall is a painting of a Maui sunset by marine artist Christian Lassen.

A circular walk-in shower in the master bedroom is fashioned of glass brick. Twin sinks and a walk-in closet, divided into his and her sides, reflect contemporary interest in making the morning rituals convenient and peaceful. The stairwell from the entry hall has a small, wooden addition attached to the balusters.

**Oh, and by the way, if you expect a refund from your income tax, the IRS will be happy to send it as a U.S. Savings Bond for the upcoming 2010 filing season. It's a way to help you save while keeping the money invested in the U.S.

by Eric. "I never considered a career in music," he said. "I just love music and especially live concerts." Many of the guitars are signed by famous musicians like Merle Haggard, Chris LeDoux, and even one signed by Willie Nelson's whole band. There is also a small fiddle that was signed by Charlie Daniels. In a corner is a trumpet that Eric played in junior high and high

school. "He still plays it sometimes," Angie added.

The pink bedroom of "the princess" Elaine has its own bath which is also decorated in pink things little girls like. The "blue for boys" room has the cars and stuffed animals Grant plays with. There are childproof handles on closet doors, but "they figured out the one on the hot water heater closet," Angie said.

Eric's office, lined on two walls with built-in cabinets and shelves, has just enough room to display his many interests. There are ship and airplane models and a collection of beer mugs. He began collecting fire engines when he and some high school friends





volunteered with the fire department. "I guess that was where I first got interested in emergency management," he shared. In the fall of 1999, Eric became the emergency management coordinator for this area. "I feel lucky that I can be involved in the two things

that I have a passion for," Eric said, "the family business and emergency management." He works with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to provide emergency shelter and storm warnings. "And yes," Eric said, "I was the one who called you at 6:30 that morning in July to tell you to get into a closet. We launched 18,000 simultaneous phone calls that morning on an automatic system." "At the time, we had a two-story home," Nancy explained. "If something were to happen to Patrick, I knew I would be unable to care for the house." They decided to find a smaller house that Nancy would be able to manage, while also moving closer to one of their three sons. "We came to Corsicana thinking Patrick would be living his final days here," Nancy added.

Doctors had told Patrick he was suffering from low sugar, thus the loss of energy and strength. After settling

into their new home, Patrick spent one entire day "trying to pass out," something that thankfully did not come to pass. "Nancy was gone to town," he said. "I sure didn't want her walking in the house and finding me passed out on the floor." When Patrick told his son about the day, his son matter-of-factly told him he was dehydrated. Once Patrick stopped his intake of caffeinated beverages and began drinking 64 ounces of water per day, his strength and vim for life also returned. "The water rejuvenated me," he said. "I went from a three to an eight on a scale from one to ten."

During this same time, Frank Canfield, one of their new neighbors, came over for a visit. "We started talking about the Word and God," he said.



"The conversation went to the topic of music." Patrick got his guitar out that day, the same one he had not taken out of its case for years, and watched as Frank strummed the strings. "After Frank was done," Patrick recalled, "I took it back and was once again able to play." It was not long after this visit that Patrick and Nancy began singing and playing for an audience at the local senior citizens' center during the regular country and western band's break time. They started, and continue, to play



the gospel music they grew up with and have come to love over the years.

Over their two years in Navarro County, the break-time performance grew into two mini concerts per week at the Heritage Oaks Retirement Center with Ray Awalt. They play for a once-a-month gathering at the Heritage Oaks West Nursing Facility and the weekly Bible study at the senior citizens' center every Thursday at 10:00 a.m. They also get special requests that they are honored to fulfill. The amazing thing about the duo is the fact that neither Patrick nor Nancy took a single guitar lesson before they started playing. "He has always played











by ear," Nancy said. "I tell her what key to start with and she goes from there," Patrick added with a smile toward his wife. "Our songs are mostly gospel in the key of D." As Patrick continued to speak of his wife's Godgiven talent, the pride was evident in his voice. "She can hear someone humming a tune," he beamed, "and then she can take her guitar and put the hum to music."

When performing in front of a live audience, Patrick is the lead singer. He plays rhythm while Nancy plays backup




SOFT

The eagerly anticipated time when passionate Texans focus on the ups and downs of their favorite football teams has finally arrived, but there are other fall and winter competitive sports. However, Sidney's abilities have developed over eight years and came from a combination of natural athletic ability and the hard work of persevering through years of training that included investing her spare time to excel in her sport.

Sidney began playing soccer and tee ball (Bumble Bees) when she was 5 years old. She continued to play soccer and tee ball together for a few years, but then, at 10, she began to focus on softball. When the pitching spot came open on the Texas Dynamites Team, she asked for the position, but needed help. Her parents began taking her to Hubbard on Sunday afternoons for private lessons with Coach Reggie Graves. "At first, I felt like I couldn't pitch," Sidney explained. "I played soccer and I was used to kicking with my left foot. Pitching is leading off the opposite foot so it confused me. It took me a little while to work it out." She recalled Coach Graves' words as he encouraged her. "If it was easy," she remembered him saying, "everyone could pitch."

Almost immediately, Sidney noted that the pitcher is always under stress. "There is no break for the pitcher," she said, "because the game can turn on a good or bad pitch." Asked about her most difficult moment, she replied, "The hardest thing about pitching is the pressure on the mound."





Just Like a Bumblebee

Innovative Therapies, co-owned by Betsy Stroder, certified occupational therapy assistant (COTA) and Cindy Liska, registered occupational therapist (OTR), is the only out-patient rehabilitation facility in the immediate area and has a client roster made up almost entirely of children from age 0-18. A small number of adults come in for the occupational therapy needed to return to life as normal. "It's the only facility of this type within a 50-mile radius," Betsy said. "Cindy and I saw a need. We opened the facility because of that need and because we were, and still are, passionate about the job at hand."

Betsy worked for home health agencies for many years prior to opening her own business. She listened as parents told her how far they had to drive to get the therapy their children needed. The miles driven three times each week soon exhausted the entire family, especially the children. "We offer occupational, physical and speech therapies. We have a motor-planning gym, a sensory room, several smaller rooms for individualized therapy sessions and a visiting therapy dog named Cain."

The facility also offers a full-size kitchen where basic life skills are taught, learned and mastered. The goal is for the child to grow up to be functional and productive in life. "We take the holistic approach," Betsy explained. "We look at the whole child. For example, we ask questions like, 'Why can't they write their name?' 'Why can't they repeat a simple sentence?' or 'Why do they move differently than their peers?'" The professional staff looks into the core of the child, using a variety of techniques, before deciding on which therapies will help the child. "We address all of the senses of the body, how they work together, the child's physical and mental abilities as well as other concerns parents might have."

The staff to which Betsy and Cindy give such high praise includes: Physical Therapist Robin Harkins; Speech Language Pathologist Jada Rose and part-time Speech Therapy Assistant Angela Beasley; COTAs: Martha Phillips,



Vicky Moore, Natalie Torres and Rhonda Tidwell; part-time OTR Jeanette Krajca; Business Manager Anna Collier; two office receptionists, Heather Wilcoxen and Michelle Stroder; part-time technicians who are instrumental in getting things set up; and a Spanish interpreter. "The staff comes with years of valuable experience," Betsy said. "God is the CEO of the company, and He has richly blessed

the business with staff, as well as committed parents, who all want the same thing for the children — a successful, meaningful life."

Cindy has almost completed training in sensory integration and praxis testing. "This training will allow more extensive testing for integration of all of the senses and motor planning," Betsy said. "Cindy will be able to delve in and see exactly where these children are. It will help us understand and treat sensory, motor and behavioral issues. As the underlying issues are discovered, we are then able to treat the whole child, not just the hyperactivity and/or low attention span." What Innovative Therapies is doing is working, as evidenced by the success Betsy and Cindy have seen since the company's inception in March 2008. Children are showing success in school, at home and in the community. They are much like the bumblebee that serves as the company logo. "Bumblebees are not aerodynamically designed to fly, but they do," Cindy said. "The perception is that these children are at a disadvantage for success, but they truly are not. One


day, they will all fly."















It is like discovering treasure to walk around the beautiful Sanchez Library on the Navarro College campus. As you enter, there is space and light above you and the solid, marble floors and stairway under your feet. There are comfortable chairs to curl up in to read by the long windows and broad, wooden tables with chairs where you can gather with friends. The wooden bookcases invite you to explore the world in print books, magazines and videos. There are CDs with music you have not yet heard and movies that have become classics. There are also paintings on the walls in great, gold frames like you might see in an art museum.

When you have looked through beautifully printed art books or located a history book about the Romans or World War II, you may settle with your fellow artists or history buffs in one of the enclosed rooms where you can read and write and discuss together. If you have a special interest you want to research, you should look for Tim Kevil, head librarian,

who will guide you into your project. You can borrow a wireless laptop from the library so you can sit in your favorite spot and write your notes with your research materials around you. The library is truly a treasure house that welcomes you, tells you to take a comfortable chair and stay as long as you like.

The campus library has occupied several locations since the founding of the college. The Richard M. Sanchez Library is the first building on campus to be dedicated to library use. President Sanchez led the effort to create a state-of-the-art facility to serve his rapidly growing student body and the community. The library houses a collection of 50,000 print books, and the collection of 40,000 electronic books continues to grow. Tim Kevil, a librarian since 1998, was part of the design team that requested a warm, welcoming space with lots of natural light. They wanted a place that felt comfortable to students who wanted to be with others in open spaces and some cozy spots for those who wanted quiet to work alone. The designers asked for conference rooms for student clubs and faculty meetings, carrels with plug-ins for laptop computers and a classroom that is used to show students how to use library resources.


Tim earned his bachelor's degree in English literature at the University of Texas at Arlington. "Since I was a child, I dreamed of going to London and Paris," he recalled. Not content to visit tourist sites on a recent trip, Tim sought out places he had read about in English novels and poetry. "You notice more and enjoy more what you find when you travel if you know something about the place you are in," he advised. At University of North Texas he earned a master's degree in English, and then taught in South Carolina for a year. Later, an opportunity to work in library science seemed to be a good fit. "I use my background in literature to help students find the materials they need to do research projects," Tim said.




Because the campus enjoys the fastest-growing enrollment in the country, state funding is increasing so that the library can continue its usual book acquisition and increase its investment in electronic books, magazine subscriptions and media. Thanks to the Navarro College Foundation, laptops are available for use while in the library; a convenience found on very few campuses in the country. The college connection to major research databases and to electronic books and periodicals is important to the growing number of students who enroll in online classes. This technology also serves the other Navarro College campuses in Waxahachie, Midlothian and Mexia. Tim said, "People worry that electronic books will make print books obsolete, and they do not want to give up the pleasure of sitting with a book they can hold in their hands. I believe that electronics do not replace print books, they simply offer more choices."

Tim is eager for people in Corsicana to feel welcome to use the library facilities. Anyone who has a library card from the Corsicana Public Library can borrow books, CDs or videos from the Sanchez Library just as students with college ID cards can borrow books from the public library. This is the kind of community connection Tim and the college want to promote.

Tim hopes students will learn to think of the library as a place to hang out — a place where there is a quiet space to study, where there are places to work with other students on a project and where there is help available from the librarians. He hopes students and Corsicana neighbors will explore the library treasures in history, art, music, books of fiction and children's books. He plans a story hour for children and families so they can learn to travel to new worlds in books. There are CD recordings of Mozart and Miles Davis and dozens of others. There are books about Greek mythology and about Hobbits and Harry Potter. The Sanchez Library holds adventures of all kinds for everyone. WOW







PRALINES

1 1/2 cups sugar 3/4 cup brown sugar, firmly packed 1/2 cup half-and-half 1/4 cup plus 2 Tbsp. butter 2 cups pecan halves

It is important to cook candy in a heavy saucepan. Also, if it is a humid day, candy may have a more sugary texture. Combine all ingredients in a 2-quart, heavy saucepan. Cook over low heat, stirring gently, until sugar dissolves. Cover and cook over medium heat 2-3 minutes. Uncover and cook to soft-ball stage (235 F), stirring constantly. Remove saucepan from heat; beat mixture with wooden spoon just until mixture begins to thicken. Working rapidly, drop candy mixture by tablespoonfuls onto greased wax paper. Let stand until candy is firm. Yield: 1 1/2 dozen.

CORN AND CRAB SOUP

1/4 cup butter

1 1/2 cups onion, finely chopped

2 Tbsp. all-purpose flour

8 cups fresh corn kernels (1 ear of corn yields 1 cup of kernels)

1 1/2 quarts heavy cream (or substitute half-and-half)

salt and white pepper, to taste

1 lb. lump crabmeat, picked over to remove cartilage

2 Tbsp. fresh parsley, chopped

Melt butter in large, heavy saucepan and sauté onion until clear. Whisk in flour; add corn kernels, cooking for 5 minutes. Stir in cream; season with salt and pepper. Cook over medium heat until corn is tender, about 20 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add crabmeat and parsley. Cook an additional 5 minutes. Serves 8.

BACON-WRAPPED SCALLOPS

1/3 cup olive oil

4 lbs. sea scallops, rinsed and drained (about 48 small-medium or 24 mediumlarge)

1 lb. bacon wooden picks

1/4 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp. pepper vegetable spray for grill

MARINADE:

3 Tbsp. fresh lime juice

2 Tbsp. fresh cilantro, chopped

2 garlic cloves, minced

1/2 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp. pepper

dash hot sauce

In small mixing bowl, combine marinade ingredients. Whisk in olive oil in a slow, steady stream. Place scallops in a zip-top

plastic freezer bag; add marinade mixture. Cover, seal and chill for 30 minutes, turning once. Drain scallops; discard marinade. Cut bacon in half. (I have found that I have to adjust the length to fit the scallops.) Microwave bacon, covered with paper towels, in 4 batches on high 3-4 minutes or until slightly brown, being careful not to shrink bacon too much. Wrap one piece around scallop across the flat side, not around the edges. Secure with wooden pick. Sprinkle with remaining salt and pepper. Thread scallops on shish kabob skewers. Coat cold cooking grate with vegetable spray and heat to medium (350-400 F). Place scallops on grate and grill covered 3-4 minutes on each side. Cook until scallops are done (depends on their size). Makes 12 appetizer servings or 6 entree servings.



Sauté okra in 2 Tbsp. butter in large skillet until okra is lightly browned; set aside. In iron skillet, combine 1/4 cup butter and flour, cook over medium heat, stirring constantly until roux is the color of chocolate (20-25 minutes). Stir in green onions, celery and garlic; cook until vegetables are tender. Combine roux, sautéed okra, tomatoes, bay leaf, parsley, thyme, salt, red pepper and water in large Dutch oven. Bring to a boil; reduce heat and simmer uncovered 2 hours, stirring occasionally. Add shrimp, crabmeat and sausage; cook an additional 10 minutes. Remove bay leaf and serve over rice. Add gumbo file powder if desired. Yield: 2 1/2 quarts.







Disability Income Insurance: Key Policy Features - Provided by Gary Hayden

Prospective insurance buyers are often confused about disability income insurance because the features and benefits vary widely from one policy to another. Essentially, there are a few key elements that could make a big difference when you make your choice. If you are in the market for disability income insurance, here are some of the things you should consider:

Definition of "Total Disability." Does the policy define total disability as a condition during which you cannot perform the duties of your "own occupation" or "any occupation"? A policy that refers to your "own occupation" generally pays benefits if you cannot return to work in your own field, or if you return to work in a lower paying job or a job in another occupation. A policy that refers to "any occupation" generally would pay benefits only if you were unable to perform any job: your own job, a lower paying job, or a job in a new occupation.

Duration of Benefits. Even if you have to choose a smaller benefit amount to keep the premiums affordable, look for coverage that protects you until age 65. Note: There are policies available that offer benefits only for a limited period, such as a maximum of two or five years, and the nature of your occupation may affect the duration of coverage.

Amount of Coverage. Most plans set a limit on the percentage of income you can insure — usually 50 percent to 60 percent of your total gross earnings. If you have an employer-provided plan that offers only

limited group coverage, you may consider buying supplemental disability income coverage from an outside source.


Elimination Period. The waiting or "elimination" period is the amount of time you must wait before disability benefits can start. Remember, shorter waiting periods involve higher premiums and vice versa. In addition, the waiting period is determined when a policy is issued, not when disability commences.

Taxation of Benefits. Benefits may be tax free if you pay the premiums using after-tax dollars. Benefits under most employer-provided plans are taxable because they are usually paid with pre-tax dollars. (Please note that it may be wise to verify this with your tax professional.)

Partial or "Residual" Coverage. After a serious disability, many people are able to return to work only on a part-time basis. Partial or "residual" benefits allow you to receive partial disability benefits, as well as your part-time income, until you fully recover. Without this feature, your benefits may stop as soon as you return to work.

Portable Coverage. Policies that allow you to carry your coverage from one job to another have an obvious advantage. Coverage from a professional association could be one such example of portable coverage that is not tied to your place of employment, not to mention any individual disability income policy that you might buy on your own.

Of course, prior to shopping for a policy




that best suits you, it is important to determine the right amount of coverage you need in light of what coverage you may or may not already have. Therefore, make it a point to review your insurance coverage and needs on a regular basis in order to ensure you are adequately protected.

Five Steps to Colon Health: Part 2

An easy formula to promote prevention, awareness of common cancer

This article is the second part of a two part series pinpointing the five simple steps you can follow to help protect yourself from colon cancer. Here are the last three steps:

3. Know the symptoms.

Be vigilant about scheduled screenings, and if you have certain symptoms, see your doctor sooner. Symptoms may include: persistent stomach discomfort; a change in bowel habits (diarrhea, constipation, or a change in stool consistency); abdominal pain accompanying a bowel movement; dark stools; weakness or fatigue; unexplained weight loss; anemia or blood in the stool.

Symptoms vary, and certain foods or medications can also mimic these symptoms. It's best to err on the safe side and check with your doctor about changes.

4. Practice prevention.

A balanced diet, regular exercise and smart lifestyle choices will keep your risk level in check. A diet rich in fruits, vegetables and whole grains provides the nutrients and antioxidants that fight disease. Low-fat dairy products and limited consumption of red meat keep your saturated fat intake low.

Getting your vitamins and minerals through a daily supplement helps, but food-based vitamins are more effective and more easily absorbed by the body. Regular exercise — at least 30 minutes most days of the week — helps build your body's defenses. Finally, quitting smoking and limiting alcohol consumption help, too.

5. Know your options.

Talk with your doctor about the best way to manage your risk. If you have an above-average risk for colon cancer or an initial test reveals polyps, you and your doctor can decide the course of action that works best for you.






