



Laura came to the Quarterback Club first, with Tina following closely behind her. Theirs has been a partnership that first began as a way to volunteer some hours with the school district. This partnership quickly grew into a relationship of mutual respect, and the two soon became best friends. "We refer to ourselves as Frick and Frack," Laura said. "The Quarterback Club is the 'booster club' for football, track and powerlifting, but we fill in wherever and whenever we are needed."

It's this attitude of freely giving that has made them so successful within the Quarterback Club. They hit the ground running the first year, and they've made one touchdown after another, as they work year-round with many other volunteers to make the club and its offerings bigger *and* better with each passing year. Laura, her friend and sidekick. "She gave me the confidence I needed to conquer my fears."

"And now, look how far she's come," Laura said, with an all-knowing smile.

"Laura, the boys and the program have been a huge blessing in my life," Tina added, "and I wouldn't change a thing."

Nowadays, Tina has her specific spots on and off the field where she finds the strength she needs to be in crowds of people. The boys she's come to love throughout her years in the Quarterback Club have given her way more than she's given them. "As much as they needed me to be here," she confessed, "I needed them more. I've come such a long way, and I credit the boys for helping me overcome my fear."

During their tenure on the board, Tina served as president for three consecutive years, and this year marked Laura's first year as the club's fearless leader. 
In Stitches



Equipped with their round looms, yarn and a desire to minister to others, Glenna LeGrand and her partners in stitching, Lewayne Curry and Dora Forde, are a force to be reckoned with in the sewing room. The handiwork-savvy trio is making an impact in both the Waxahachie and cancer communities with every knitted hat they craft. Motivated by a calling they credit to the Lord above, the ladies networked, organized and brought to fruition a program at Farley Street Baptist Church that provides handmade hats, quilts and other items to those in need.

Originally, the Friendship Stitchers started as a quilting group in 2010. Dora headed up the group and worked closely with Diane West, the group's co-leader. Together, they agreed that sewing was a terrific, unifying commonality to form the group around. The goal was to build a ministry to bring people together and do for others in the process. They gathered once a month with their sewing machines and implements to discuss, plan and work on the original, personalized quilts to be given to the senior, seriously ill and shut-in members of the church. "We just wanted to have a fellowship that would reach out to others and give them something tangible, so they would know they weren't forgotten," Dora explained.

As the group grew, Dora and Diane realized not everyone wanted to quilt, so they expanded the group to include all kinds of sewing. Eventually, they grew again to include knitting and crocheting. Thanks to their joint efforts, the pair played a pivotal role in the evolution of what is now a far-reaching ministry that contributes to the nationwide, nonprofit organization called Passing the Hat. Founded by Ellen Miller, Passing the Hat is an organization that collects









and distributes knitted hats for cancer patients of all ages all over the country. Initially, it started with Ellen knitting hats for pediatric cancer patients undergoing chemotherapy. But she soon realized, after visiting the Sammons Cancer Center at Baylor Hospital in Dallas, that there was a greater need. She saw she could teach others, specifically cancer patients, survivors and supporters, to knit hats, as well. Ellen put her vision into action, and soon, it began to take off. Not only were people making hats for patients undergoing chemo treatments, but they were keeping themselves busy and connecting with others. "Ellen really has a passion for what she does," Dora said. "We are so happy to work with her."

When Lewayne, a member of the sewing group, stumbled upon the nonprofit one afternoon, she was sitting with her brother, Al Putman, at "big Baylor" in Dallas as he underwent yet another chemotherapy treatment, one of his three Mondays a month, in fact. As a cancer patient, Al had endured numerous treatments marked by copious amounts of time, basically, spent just sitting around not doing much of anything but waiting. Like other cancer patients, he longed for something to keep his hands and mind occupied during the unavoidable lulls of time. Lewayne, too, saw a great need for an activity to keep Al and others like him busy. After reading in a magazine about what Ellen had created, Lewayne and Al knew they had found





what they were looking for. They were instantly determined to meet Ellen, and they did. They even got her to come to FSBC to teach the Friendship Stitchers how to make the hats, too.

"Ellen has created something that gives people a great way to network with others while they are at big Baylor, and I really felt we should be a part of it," Lewayne said. Therefore, the Friendship Stitchers became a diverse group of avid quilters, sewers and knitters, all making handmade items specifically for individuals in need. With the group totaling about 25, Dora soon found it difficult to keep up with both the quilting and sewing and hat knitting parts of the ministry, so she called on others to consider overseeing the hats. That's when Glenna got involved. "I was sick with back pain, so I made 35 to 50 hats because I was restricted to the couch after having surgery," she remembered.





Each month, the Friendship Stitchers gather at FSBC for their monthly meeting where they break into their respective groups to discuss new projects, teach new members and simply enjoy fellowship with one another. Ellen is also there, bringing donated yarn and joining in on the fun. On average, the group produces about 35 hats each month. They also share lunch, lots of stories and many laughs. "We knitters can get pretty loud. Sometimes we get so busy visiting, we forget to make hats!" Glenna joked, "So, we just make them at home."

Since most of the hats are made outside of meetings, Glenna collects them to give to Ellen, who then distributes the hats to hospitals in the area and all over the country. Basically, wherever there is a need for hats, Ellen makes sure they get there. "We also take hats to the babies in the nursery at Baylor Scott & White here in town," Dora explained. "Some go to Scottish Rite Hospital and other places all over Dallas. It just depends on how many we have and who needs them."

The hats are made by wrapping yarn around the little pegs on a circular handheld loom. "Remember those pot holder looms? Well, this round loom is even easier than that! Anyone can do it, and we are happy to teach anyone who wants to learn," Glenna smiled proudly. "We are also happy to accept any fabric

the building. It became apparent it was the perfect place to hold the sale. The sale will also be open Friday, October 23, from 10:00-5:00 p.m. and Saturday, October 24, from 9:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m. Admission for Friday and Saturday is free, though parking will be at a premium. "Saturday is super busy downtown, and it's hard to find parking, so Thursday is really worth the \$5," explained Library Community Liaison Holly Browning. "We recently had someone bring us three moving boxes full of Civil War books, covering North and South. These books are no longer published, and it adds a huge collection to our sale."

The annual book sale helps support the Friends of the Library, who support the plentiful number of library programs. "We provide the carnival at the end of the Summer Reading Program, the Easter Egg hunt and the Dallas Zoo Program in the summer," Walter said. "The Friends also support three reading clubs at the library, including providing the books."



Holly stressed the importance of the Friends organization. "We try to keep all our programs free to the public, and with the Friends, we can keep it that way," she said. In addition to books, the Friends also purchase supplies and equipment for the nonprofit organization and any other needs that come along to maintain an operation the size of Sims Library.

The library was founded in 1905 and is one of the earliest public libraries in Texas. The middle portion is the original facility, with additional room on both sides added through the years. Most recently, the building underwent a renovation to make it more userfriendly, while the programs and offerings continue to evolve to meet the community's needs. "Part of our job is encouraging literacy, so we need to stay as current as possible," Barbara said. "We want to keep people coming."

Staying current includes having Kindle eReaders available for checkout and iPads to use in the library. There are public computer stations. Community members use them for diverse needs, including



research, job hunting, printing legal documents and filing taxes online. "This is a gathering place for the community," Holly said. "It's a welcome, safe, no-judgment place, no matter what you want to research or learn about." There are filters on the computers, as well as safe Internet surfing in the kids' area, but otherwise, the window to the world is open. "The library is trying to be



accessible," Holly added. "We want to be inclusive to all communities, and we're stepping up our game to offer those services."

The monthly calendar covers all ages and nearly every interest. For young readers, there are four story times in the week: a new one for Spanish speakers, two hosted by the Junior Service League and a new pajama story time on Tuesday evenings. For the Tweens, there's book club and activity day, while the teens have their own advisory board, with Librarian Connie Colston coordinating their activities. The Teen Lair is home to the latest technology, including gaming nights and iPads, along with book club, Movie Night and more. There's also a new program for homeschool teens, and as always, the Junior Master Gardener meetings.

For adults, there are free ESL classes, book clubs, craft classes, writer groups,



computer courses, eReader instruction and more. With a Sims Library card, patrons can access Mango online and learn a new language or use training videos via Lynda.com. "We are a central hub of information, and if we don't have it, we'll find it for you," Barbara said. There are databases with scholarly articles for research, as well as study books for the GED, ASVAB, SAT and ACT, and the citizenship process. "We are working to develop our community relations," Holly said. "We want to teach people something new, from crochet to gardening to finances."

The library has also extended its efforts to bring people together, share interests and form friendships. Library Grounds is held every Tuesday, where attendees share a cup of coffee, tea or water and meet library staff, talk with members of the Friends or just read with a beverage in hand. "We foster conversation as we get to know the patrons," Holly explained. "There are so many with really happy memories of this place and its programs. They grew up in the library and know its historical and community value."

With a broad grin, Walter added, "Sims Library belongs to the people. If you're not here, you're missing a lot." NOW

## CABINET REFRESH

Looking for an inexpensive way to dramatically change the look of your kitchen? Painting cabinets is a great way to get the look of a new kitchen without the price tag of a complete remodel.

## FIND THE PERFECT COLOR

For most people, one of the hardest parts of painting kitchen cabinets is finding the right color. With all the paint options available, even opting for white cabinets can result in having to sift through hundreds of variations to find the "right" white.




One of the biggest obstacles to choosing a color is lighting. The number of windows in your space (natural lighting), as well as the type of bulbs you use (soft white, bright white, daylight, etc.), can drastically change the way a color will look. Buying your paint from a paint specialty store can alleviate a great deal of indecision, as the employees in these stores are able to provide you with the best options, depending on your lighting. Keep in mind, homes with a lot of natural light tend to cast a blue hue on white paints, whereas homes with artificial lighting can cast colors ranging from blue to orange, depending on the bulb used.



After selecting a few sample colors, purchase scrap pieces of wood strips that are the same species as your cabinets and paint them using the sample colors. Leave the samples in your kitchen for a few days to see how the color changes throughout the day. Once you've decided on a color, select your sheen. Choose a high-gloss sheen for a more modern look or an eggshell for a more classic feel.

## PREP YOUR AREA

Begin by taking the cabinet doors off and removing the hinges. Be sure to label each cabinet door and hinge for reassembly. Next, tape off the wall area around the cabinet frames.



## GIVE EVERYTHING A GOOD SANDING

Whether your cabinet doors, drawers and frames are painted or covered in stain, you will need to sand them. Begin by using a 100-grit sandpaper, and then move on to 120-grit sandpaper. Note: Most of the cabinet can be sanded with an orbital sander, but the smaller areas will need to be sanded by hand.



After sanding everything, remove the dust created. The frames are easy to clean, but doors and drawers can be tricky. Dust will ruin your paint job, and you will find yourself having to sand out specks and reapply paint. To ensure maximum dust removal, start by simply turning the cabinet door or drawer over and patting the back so most of the dust falls out. Follow this with a quick pass over with a vacuum wand. Finally, use a duster and get into the crevices. If you find you still have dust specs, use mineral spirits and a rag to remove any remaining dust.

## FIX ANY GOUGES OR DENTS

If you have deep scratches or dents, fill them in with wood filler. Let it dry, and then sand it down using a 180- or 220-grit sandpaper. Be sure to clean away any excess dust.

## PRIME THE CABINETS DRAWERS/FRAMES

Using a 2-inch paint brush, apply a light coat of primer to the cabinets, drawers and frames. Tinting your primer to match the color of the new cabinet paint is excellent insurance against future nicks and scratches showing.

Begin by priming the back of the cabinet door. Start in the center panel section. If you get primer on the stiles or rails, make sure you brush them out, so they don't leave a blotchy finish.











Next, prime the rails, and then the stiles. Do not prime the edges of the cabinets at this stage. After priming the cabinet doors, move on to priming the drawers. Since drawers only have a front, prime the entire drawer (edges included). The next step is to prime the cabinet frames. If desired, prime the inside of the cabinets, also.

Once all items have been primed, allow them to cure for at least 24 hours before lightly sanding (by hand) all the primed surfaces with a 300-grit sandpaper. Sand them just enough to remove any imperfections or random pieces of dust that may have fallen on them while they were still wet.

Turn the cabinet doors over to the front, and repeat the entire process above. Be sure to prime the edges of the cabinets, and allow them to cure for 24 hours.

## PAINT THE CABINETS/ DRAWERS/FRAMES

After the primed pieces have been allowed to cure for 24 hours, begin painting. Painting is really no different than priming, and you should follow the same process as priming. Begin by painting the back of the cabinet door, and



then lightly sand out any imperfections before moving on to the drawers and cabinet frames. Allow them to cure for 24 hours, and then repeat the entire process for a total of two coats of paint.

After the second coat has been allowed to cure for 24 hours, move on to painting the front of the cabinet doors. Again, follow the same process as above (panel, rails, stiles but now also the edges). Allow them to cure for 24 hours, and then repeat the entire process.

## ADD THE POLYURETHANE

Before actually adding the polyurethane, lightly smooth out the door's finish using a 300-grit sandpaper. Apply the polyurethane with a foam brush for a suggested total of three coats on each side. Allow the polyurethane to cure per label, reassemble the cabinets and enjoy the beautiful new look of your kitchen for years to come!

## TROUBLESHOOTING

The biggest concern most people have with painting their cabinets are brush marks. Inferior products are one of the biggest reasons for brush marks. If you use high-quality primer, paint and brushes, and apply the paint in thin coats, you should not have this problem. **NOW**



### **Artist Enclave Castleberry Hill**

Just southwest, Castleberry Hill etches out a space among former warehouses. Inman Park combines small urban green spaces with winding boulevards lined with colorful Victorian and Queen Anne-style homes in the city's first planned suburb. The classic architecture







## **Breast Cancer Health**

With breast cancer, there are hordes of drugs, treatments and therapeutic options. Some of these can carry pretty scary side effects. It is imperative that anyone being treated for this disease follow their health practitioner's advice and plans, and that they give approval for any alternate treatment plans. However, there are a couple of areas where you can give your health a helping hand with possibly great benefits — diet and exercise.

Diet can possibly play a crucial role in lowering your risk of getting breast cancer and can aid in the recovery process when healing from the disease. There are some studies that suggest an increase in the incidence of breast cancer in women who are menopausal and overweight. Weight can also play a factor in the recurrence of breast cancer. More research is needed before definitively stating that a lowfat diet carries the benefit of lowering the incidence of breast cancer. But, the research that is available does suggest a possible connection.

The best diet is one in which all food groups are represented in appropriate amounts. Saturated fats are usually the problem, and it is generally a good idea to aim for less of them in your diet. They are found in fatty meats, butter, many cheeses, breads and pastries to name a few examples. Antioxidants are substances that help to prevent and limit cell damage — a great boon to someone in the process of healing. Some foods rich in antioxidants are berries, citrus fruits, whole grains, liver, carrots and green, leafy vegetables. Check with your doctor before changing your diet. If you get a recommendation to see a registered dietitian, try to follow through. Proper nutrition is crucial to your overall health.

Exercise can be a great mood lifter. However, when in the throes of recovery, the last thing someone may want to do is exercise. Before starting any exercise program, discuss it with your physician. Your level of performance will depend upon many different things, such as the treatment you receive, severity of the disease, your prior fitness level and your current health status. Some exercises will affect you adversely. For example, if you had the lymph nodes removed under your arm, you may be at risk for lymphedema. Some forms of exercise may cause further injury to that area.

On the other hand, exercise can carry great benefits. Physical activity can help control weight gain. It can also increase your stamina, which in turn will increase your energy level. Taking particular care with diet and exercise will not only offer benefits regarding breast cancer, they can improve your overall level of health.

## Great-great-grandma Mayne's Coffee Cake

2 cups granulated sugar 2 cups all-purpose flour 1/4 tsp. salt 1 Tbsp. baking powder 3/4 cup Crisco shortening 2 eggs, beaten 1 cup milk Cinnamon, to taste

**I.** Mix first 4 ingredients thoroughly; cut in the shortening with two table knives, or you can use a pastry blender. The mixture will be very coarse. Remove 1 cup and reserve for later use.

**2.** Add eggs and milk to the coarse mixture, beating until smooth using a wooden spoon. (The mixture will be a bit lumpy by today's

standards, but this recipe includes the order: Do not mix with an electric mixer!) **3.** Grease and flour 2 baking pie pans. Divide the batter evenly into the two containers. Sprinkle 1/2 cup of the reserved mixture on top of each cake. Then sprinkle each cake generously with cinnamon. **4.** Bake in a 350 F oven for 35-40 minutes. Edges will be brown. Test center with a toothpick, making sure toothpick comes out clean. Cool a bit, but serve warm.

### **Honey-apple Pie**

- 1/3 cup honey
   2 Tbsp. granulated sugar
   2 Tbsp. cornstarch
   1 tsp. cinnamon
- Dash of salt
- 2 Tbsp. margarine or butter, melted

- 6-8 medium cooking apples, cored, peeled and thinly sliced2 pie crusts (Use your favorite recipe.)
- l egg, beaten
- 1 Tbsp. coarse sugar

**I.** In a large bowl, combine honey, sugar, cornstarch, cinnamon and salt. Stir in the butter. Add the apples, making sure to coat well with honey mixture.

**2.** Fill a pastry-lined pie pan with the apple filling. Cover the top with the second crust. Finish the edges in your usual way.

3. Create 3 leaf cutouts from excess dough. Artistically place the leaves on top of the pie. Brush top with egg and sprinkle with sugar. Cover the edges with foil to prevent burning.
4. Bake at 350 F for 30 minutes. Remove foil and bake for 30 more minutes or until filling is bubbly and the crust is golden brown.

### **Mushroom Salad**

Makes 5 cups.

- 3/4 cup salad oil
- 1/2 cup white vinegar
- 1/4 cup water
- 2 tsp. salt
- 2 tsp. garlic powder
- 1/4 tsp. black pepper
- 1 1/2 cups sliced carrots (about 1/2 bag of crinkle cut carrots)
- I lb. fresh, sliced mushrooms (or 2 6-oz. cans)
- I cup green bell pepper, diced
- 1/2 cup onion, sliced in thin rings
- 2 Tbsp. dried basil
- I cup red bell pepper, diced (or 1 4-oz. jar sliced pimento)

**I.** In a large saucepan, combine oil, vinegar, water, salt, garlic powder and black pepper. Bring the mixture to a boil.

**2.** Add the carrots. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer for 5 minutes.

**3.** Add the mushrooms, green bell peppers and onion. Mix, cover and simmer for 3 minutes. Remove from the heat.

**4.** Add basil and red pepper or pimento. Put salad in a bowl, cover with plastic wrap and chill for at least 24 hours.


