Look around you, find a reason to celebrate and start dancing!

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
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Rose Reddish has carved out her own path in life. But there's a special path she likes to take when it comes to escaping the world for a little while. The 34-year-old Burleson resident resumed running in October 2017, after taking several years off. Now, any time she can get to Bailey Lake — and she does just about every day she loses herself in the beauty of nature, even taking photos to share and to reflect upon herself. 'I used to run from 2003 to 2010, every single day, rain or shine," Rose said, "but life, work, all kinds of reasons got in the way, as they will do."

Then, a few months ago, she found herself on the trails at Bailey Lake. She knew she could no longer say no to something she once loved so much, so she resumed her daily routine of running/walking, as much for the peace of the setting as for the health reasons. "This is my church. Sometimes, I'll go walking back in the woods. It's full of trails," she said. "I'll go back for three or four hours and take pictures of things I see. Flowers, animals and, here lately, I've been taking pictures of animal tracks - deer and bobcat. And I have seen a pack of wild dogs chasing what I think was a rabbit. People don't realize these things are right here in their backyard."

Rose doesn't have a scheduled time for her run/walk, as she is busy with life, caring for her mother; her 7-year-old niece, Alannah; and her daughter, Ashleigh, who recently graduated from Centennial High School. She loves evenings best, and





it was one evening when she took arguably her best photo, to date, of a beautiful sunset. As she often does, she posted it on social media and got great response. "I looked over one night, and the sunset was breathtaking," she said. "I've never had a photo get a reaction like that."

She also doesn't run to compete. However, she does sometimes push herself with personal goals,

such as in February, when she set a goal to run 60 miles in the month (only 28 days, remember). She ran 80. "I was so pleased with myself at the end of that month," she said. "I've lost about 30 pounds since I started this."

Rose grew up in Burleson and is a 2002 graduate of Crossroads High School. She moved to Dallas in 2006, but moved back to Burleson in 2008, to help take care of her father, who passed away a few years ago. "He was my hero. I couldn't see anybody else taking care of him but me," she said.

Now she cares for her mother, who was once the librarian for the city of Burleson. She said her mom is her "other hero." "She and my dad were such strong influences in my life," she admitted. "I knew I could always turn to them."

Rose strives to be the same kind of parent and aunt to Ashleigh and Alannah. "I was a teenage mother, and she was my anchor," she said of Ashleigh. "She kept me out of trouble. We have a strong bond. And Alannah — she's hilarious, something else completely. She's changed all of our lives so much."

Rose was "inspired" to return to running last September when she had her gallbladder removed. It got her thinking about her health, and how she wants to live a long life to see Ashleigh and Alannah grow up and accomplish things in life. Family Medicine | Urgent Care

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
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"I woke up screaming in pain. It scared me so much. I was the same age as when my dad got sick," she said.

When she's not running or spending time with her family, Rose is busy with her eBay business. She loves scouring thrift stores, garage and rummage sales and storage auctions. For example, she'll buy an item for \$2 and sell it for 50 times that amount on eBay. "I'll sit there sometimes in the dark with a flashlight just going through boxes," she said. "It's so much fun. I sold an old Kool-Aid package from around 1976 for \$55, and I paid five cents. A woman brought me a doll she said was haunted. Within a day there were 30 people watching the doll [online]. I didn't think it would sell, but I told her I'd try. It shocked me that so many people were interested."

Rose's goals include opening a brick-and-mortar business. "A thrift store, perhaps a coffee or taco stand. I want something I can leave for the kids," she said.

And she plans to continue running for the rest of her life — this time with no interruptions. "I want to get at least a mile or two every day," she said. "If it's raining, I'll go twice as far the next day. It's just like a car. For a body to run good, you've got to take good care of it." NOW

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With a little ingenuity and time, one idea can morph into a beautiful reality. The renovation of the original homestead of Kenneth and Ellen Toal on McAllister Road in Burleson originated as a discussion among the current owners: granddaughter, Tina Maness, her husband, Michael, and her brother, Justin Toal. "We loved the original house, but when we had gatherings, people didn't fit," Tina said.

Their vision included a sprawling, eco-friendly addition that maintains the nostalgia of the original farm house built by Kenneth in the late 1940s. "I couldn't bear to lose the feel of the farm," Tina shared.

They decided to keep the front section of the original home that includes a living area, two bedrooms and a Jack-and-Jill bathroom. Not much of the decor has changed in the space since Tina's grandparents lived there. The wall of original light blue, built-in cabinets now includes a barn door of refurbished wood that opens to the addition.

The knotty pine paneling from the demolished area of the house found a home in the new entryway and kitchen. One of the favorite places to gather, the kitchen features white cabinets, floating shelves, stainless steel appliances and gray

When planning the remodel, the architect incorporated passive solar, which takes advantage of the sun to heat and cool the home. Two Smartflower Solar Panels were added to the property to cut electricity costs. Each Smartflower follows the sun throughout the day, cleans itself and closes at night. The addition has five heating and cooling zones, which are regulated with eco-friendly settings. Tina says their electric bill is now less than what it is was in the original farm house.

Dark wood floors throughout the addition are reclaimed from the original home and other sources. "It has imperfections, which I love," Tina stated. "I wanted the old house to be all over the new house."

During the remodel that began in November 2015, Michael and

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their own space," Michael said. Artwork depicting life in New Orleans adds a fun flare to the home away from home.



Tina lived in an RV. The addition is complete, but several rooms await furnishings. One wing of the home features the master suite, which is one of the final rooms the couple decorated. "Our closet is basically bigger than what we had to live in for two years," Michael said, grinning.

The suite incorporates large curtain-free windows and French doors that bring in the view of wooded acreage. A hallway of family photos and collected art pieces spark memories. Tina pays homage to her late father, James Toal, with his diplomas and plaques from various ventures.

The upstairs portion of the wing is designated for overnight guests. With three bedrooms and a kitchenette, the area is a special retreat. "They feel like they have





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
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was handmade by Michael and Jerry, Tina's stepfather. It houses bottles of homemade wine Michael produced from his vineyard that was demolished to make space for the remodel. Once retired from the Dallas Police Department, Michael aspires to plant the vineyard again and increase the size of their vegetable garden. Fresh eggs are provided by free-range chickens that prance around the yard during the day and hole up in the chicken coop at night.

One of Tina's favorite pastimes is Broadway musicals. The second wing hallway is filled with framed and autographed posters from Broadway shows such as *Kinky Boots, Cabaret* and *The Phantom of the Opera*. Tina immersed herself in Broadway the summer after her father passed away. "It helped me get over it," she said. She plans to spend more time traveling with Michael and visiting New York when she decides to retire from her management position at Texas Health Huguley.

Tina's involvement in political activism is apparent throughout the house. She has served as a delegate for the Democratic Party since 2008 and volunteers on the board of Equality Texas.

The Manesses' two daughters, Molly and Katy, live in Burleson and visit often. Molly is a coach for CrossFit, so she and her sister train with several others multiple times a week in their parents' six-car garage, in which two bays have been transformed into a gym. Michael enjoys woodworking and is in the process of finishing his workshop. He is also educating himself on how to play the guitar.

Tina's brother, Justin, lives in Miami but calls the second wing of the new addition his home when he's in town. With two bedrooms and a Jack-and-Jill bath downstairs and a master suite upstairs, he's got plenty of space for his family — wife, Christine, and son, Declan. A play room is chock-full of toys and games for Declan and Tina and Michael's grandchildren, Boston and Izzie.



Creating an eco-friendly home and preserving the farm house for the family are top priorities for Tina and Michael. 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Internalizing Quality

Charter members of the Burleson Character Council love sharing a story told years ago by a former Burleson police chief, Tom Cowan. "A little boy walking home from school picked up a paper sack. It had a bunch of money in it. He turned it in to the police, because the character program was teaching him about doing the right thing when nobody is watching," Lighthouse Church Pastor Gloria Gillaspie said. She and First National Bank Director Patsy Dumas, the grand marshals at this year's Character March, are just as happy to encourage people to show good character when people *are* watching.

At the beginning of this school year, students throughout Burleson ISD were challenged to write essays on compassion, the essence of the prompt provided to them by the BCC. This month, teachers submit their three best handwritten or typed treatises. Retired schoolteachers then volunteer their time to read and select the best. BCC member and Burleson School District Trustee Pat Worrell believes, "When students write, they internalize the character qualities they are writing about."

November 1, during the 19th annual Character Luncheon, recognition will be given to students whose essays effectively communicated their understanding of good citizenship.

One essay under consideration in 2018 is by Bailee Burgess, 14, a Centennial High School freshman who has competed in the Character Competition every year since entering school. She was a student at Kerr Middle School when she entered her first winning essay during the 2017 character contest. Her essay spoke of the teamwork required to build birdhouses with her grandfather and showcased the age-old truth that families who work together stay together. Bailee's mother, Bekki Rudd, said, "Bailee and her twin sister work also with their grandmother, making pillowcases and quilts to be given to children with different needs."

Watching seeds planted come to fruition is something Byron Black saw as one of the character council's long-term benefits. He introduced the Character First Program to Burleson's City Council while in his first year as mayor. The Burleson Character Steering Committee's first resolution, dated April 26, 1999, positioned the BCC to contribute to the "Good Life" in Burleson by strengthening the citizens, their families and the community through promoting excellence in character.

One way they did so was printing a Character Card, defining honor as "respecting those in leadership because of the Higher authorities they represent," and encouraging its carrier to commit to: "show leaders my loyalty; obey leaders cheerfully; speak positively about leaders; be attentive to leaders."

"If our work affects anyone, it means a lot," said Patsy, who is known around town for handing out a cream-colored business card that simply says, *Next time* you're admiring all the wonderful things God has made, remember that you're one of them!

By 2003, the BCC was recognizing citizens who operate with integrity with The Byron Black Character Award. As a BCC charter member, Byron has always escorted the organization's banner during the Character March. He was most recently joined by Brendon Bagnell, director of the Burleson Chamber of Commerce, which acts as this year's host for all BCC meetings.

Byron and BCC's other charter members wanted the group to have a four-pronged approach via the school district, the city, the churches and the Chamber of Commerce. Since the BCC was inspired by initiatives taken by an Oklahoma City business working to build a pool of eligible new hires, the Chamber appreciated the BCC's encouragements. "Businesses made sure to hire people who had good character qualities," Patsy said. "We brought the BISD into it by the march, the luncheon and the essays.

"We only wish we could count not only the students, but the adults that we've affected," Patsy said, looking forward to the BCC's 20th anniversary in 2019. "We want to remind people to be thankful that you could be a part of The City of Character." **NOW**

Filipino-inspired Pancit Noodle Dish

- 1 8-oz. pkg. bihon thin rice noodles
- 1/2 cup lean pork, cut of choice
- I tsp. olive oil
- I cup shrimp or crab claws
- I cup low-sodium chicken broth I tsp. low-sodium soy sauce or
- Bragg Liquid Aminos
- 2 cups cabbage, chopped
- I cup carrots, julienned
- I cup shredded skinless rotisserie chicken breast
- Celtic salt and pepper, to taste
- 2-3 eggs, hardboiled, quartered

Green onions (optional)

Lemon wedges (optional) Shrimp or crab claws (optional)

I. Soak the bihon noodles in water for about five minutes.

2. Cut the pork into 3-inch pieces. In a large wok or saucepan, heat olive oil over medium-high heat; brown the sliced pork pieces.

3. Add the shrimp or crab; sauté until they're pink in color, about 1 to 2 minutes. Reserve some of the shrimp or crab for garnishing.
4. Add chicken broth and soy sauce; add cabbage and carrots. Bring it to a low simmer for 3 minutes. (Simmer time depends on how crispy you want your vegetables to be.)

5. Add noodles; mix well. Cook for another 5 minutes, or until the broth is soaked up by the noodles.

6. Add shredded chicken, Celtic salt and black pepper to taste.

7 Garnish with slices of eggs, chopped green onions, lemon wedges, shrimp and crab claws.

Chicken Butternut Squash Soup

2 cups butternut squash

 tsp. unsalted butter
 stalks celery
 cups low-sodium chicken broth
 cup almond milk
 Ground nutmeg seasoning, to taste
 cup rotisserie chicken breast, skinless and shredded
 Mix of fresh parsley and cilantro,

for garnish

I. Peel and de-seed the butternut squash; cut into 1-inch cubes.

2. In a large pot, sauté the butternut squash in butter for at least 5 minutes, or until lightly browned.

3. Chop celery; add it to the squash.Continue sautéing for another 2 minutes.4. Pour in the chicken broth; bring the vegetables and broth to a boil.

5. Reduce heat and simmer for about 30 minutes, or until butternut is tender. Let cool for at least 5 to 10 minutes.
6. Blend the soup in batches using a blender. Add some almond milk to each batch; blend until the mixture is smooth and creamy. Transfer this to another pot; continue to blend the remaining soup.
7. Season with nutmeg; garnish with shredded rotisserie chicken and a mix of chopped parsley and cilantro.

Oyster Soup With Mushrooms and Spinach

2 cups water

- I 8-oz. container shucked oyster meat, ready to cook
- I cup almond milk or half-and-half
- 1 cup sliced mushrooms

I cup spinach

2 slices whole grain toast

 Bring water to a boil in a medium-size pot.
 Add oyster with the liquid that comes in the container. Reduce heat to medium; cook for 3 minutes.

Add almond milk or half-and-half. Add mushrooms, and then add spinach.
 Serve with whole grain toast.

A Fancier Oatmeal Breakfast

I cup water

- 1/4 cup quick oats
- 1/4 cup steel cut oatmeal
- 1 tsp. dried cranberries
- I date, pitted and chopped
- I dried apricot, chopped
- I tsp. mixed nuts
- I small banana, peeled and sliced
- I tsp. chia seeds
- I tsp. flax seeds

1/2 cup almond milk or coconut milk Sprinkle of cinnamon

 Bring water to a boil in a small saucepan.
