





Sometimes good things come in small packages with rosy cheeks, grand ideas and big hearts. Katherine Neal, age 11, looked at the world and decided not to sit on the sideline, as others struggled with the necessities of life, but to do something about it. Rummaging through her Grandma Lo Lo's (Lois') garage one day, she came across a huge roll of tickets and asked to have them. Permission granted she announced to her mother Rosemarie that she wanted to have a raffle for the people at Manna House. Katherine explained, "I thought Manna House would need help because of all the people that need food, shelter and medicine."

Manna House is a local charity that seeks to meet the needs of struggling families offering food, clothing and, sometimes, financial help. After Katherine got permission from her mom to proceed with the raffle, she went "shopping" in Grandma Lo Lo's garage and found bags of jewelry and other items. "I called it garage shopping because I gave her things to go in there," Katherine said, explaining she replaced what she took from her grandmother with ceramic objects she painted or coins she had collected.

Katherine also wanted to have an auction for Manna House, so it was back to grandma's for more free shopping. This time she came up with a big-ticket item — a television. Rosemarie stated, "They had a silent auction at her school and she got this concept of *W* hy can't I do that? Katherine has an attitude of I can do that; then she will actually do it. She is very detail-oriented and always thinking of the next project. She barely finishes one project and she's ready for the next one."

Katherine meticulously planned the auction and raffle herself. She explained, "For the silent auction, I took pictures of the items up for auction and put them on pieces of paper to show people." She sold the tickets for \$1 per ticket or five tickets for \$3. "I sold them at church, school and people in the neighborhood



the money people give can help with prescriptions. That's why I didn't want to donate things, but to give them cash."





their own carnival was taking advantage of everything in their backyard. As soon as the carnival was over, Katherine was ready for her next project. Her mother suggested the family take a breath between projects, but that did not stop Katherine from mentally planning it. Katherine also volunteers at Manna House. "I organize the clothes, help with filing and, sometimes, I dust and clean. I help put the clothes in the back on hangers."




Keeping It Simple At Home With Mike and Carrie Houston

District Receives Superior Financial Rating

The Midlothian ISD has received a "Superior Achievement" rating under Texas' Schools FIRST financial accountability rating system for the seventh consecutive year by earning a perfect score by passing all 24 state indicators.

The Superior Achievement rating is the state's highest, demonstrating the quality of the school district's financial management and reporting system.


The Schools FIRST (Financial Accountability Rating System of Texas), was developed by the Texas Education Agency in response to Senate Bill 875 passed in 1999. The primary goal of Schools FIRST is to achieve quality performance in the management of school districts' financial resources, a goal made more significant due to the complexity of the state's school finance system.

The financial rating system assigns one of four ratings to Texas school districts. In addition to the superior rating, a district could be rated as "Above-Standard Achievement," "Standard Achievement" and "Substandard Achievement." Districts with serious data quality issues could receive an additional rating of "Suspended-Data Quality." Districts that perform poorly on the accountability assessment must file corrective action plans with TEA.

Under the system, a district's rating is based upon 24 different indicators hased on the district's fund balance, audit, titueliness of reports, delinquent tax collections, administrative costs, PEIMS financial information, debt service expenditures and budget. Midlothian ISD earned a perfect score by passing all 24 indicators.

Auditor's Report = Good Financial Practices

The MISD auditor recently commented that the district's financial statements proved once again to be examples of the exceptional standards and practices of the MISD Business Office. The Audit Report is available on the MISD Finance Web page.

Students at LaRue Miller Elementary School returned to school this year to discover new walls in their library to capture their interest. Angela Edwards completed these murals right before school resumed for the fall session. She said, "It is a country landscape kind of scene. They wanted me to add some things that LaRue Miller [school is named after her] likes to the paintings. She likes schoolhouses: so on one wall there will be a schoolhouse with a dirt road going up to it. She likes frogs; so on another wall there is a pond with frogs and a boat with a kid in it reading. In the reading section, it is just bluebonnets and oak trees."

For as far back as Angela can remember she has always liked to draw and color. "Mom wanted me to play the piano and had me in piano classes, but I never liked that," she recalled. "She noticed that I liked drawing, so she put me in an oil painting class when I was 10 years old for about five or six years. The instructor was a schoolteacher who taught art classes after school. I was in the kid's class and she noticed I was serious about it. After one lesson, she

said, 'We need to put you with the ladies.' So, for the rest of the time, I was with the older ladies."

Angela's confidence soared when her grandmother bought her paintings. She recalled, "She framed them beautifully. She was a decorator and had a lot of different artists on her wall. She had an open house for a newspaper and she put my painting on an easel in the front and told everyone I painted it. It boosted my ego."

Taking art classes at school was the only formal training Angela received. However, such talent does not stay hidden. Others started to recognize and acknowledge her talent by giving her the highest compliment — they wanted her art for themselves. She added, "I always did different projects for others. I had oil paintings from my classes, but I haven't painted on canvas for years. I went to college and had a friend in drama, and he would always get me to do the backdrop for the school plays. I also painted on furniture, on chairs and trunks."

Angela remembers when murals became popular in the culture but felt

a little inadequate about doing it. That, however, did not stop her from giving it her best effort. "I'm a believer," she declared. "I have a lot of faith and I would just say, 'Lord help me to do this.' Most people have been real pleased with what I have done. I know I got my talent from God."

As with most artists, there is always one more thing to add to make their work perfect. "I like detail, but I don't think I am as detailed as I want to be because there is never enough time. A lot of my stuff looks detailed, but to me it's not quite where I would like it. On walls, it is kind of a challenge because you might be painting on a textured wall and someone would say, 'Well, it looks great to me.' Then I would be like, *Just get it done. You know not* [to] be so meticulous on the murals."

LaRue Miller Elementary is not the only school to experience Angela's touch. At J.R. Irving, her western handiwork gallops across the walls of the library. In one scene, a Pony Express rider makes his way carrying not the mail, but books. On another wall, a miner pans for books. The educators in


the teacher's lounge get to relax with a Tuscan theme on their wall. Angela also did the teacher's lounge at Mountain Peak.

Austyn Rapp is many things, but the real story behind the Midlothian teenager is not what she can do on the ground but in the air. Austyn can fly. Nationally ranked as the 14th best pole-vaulter in the nation, little holds Austyn back. As the district champion and record holder in pole vaulting for the last three years, her personal best is an astonishing 12 feet 6 inches. Throughout the state of Texas and nationally, Austyn has made a name for herself, as she has participated in the USA Track and Field Junior Olympics and AAU Junior Olympics.


Prior to pole vaulting, Austyn had been in tumbling and cheerleading since the age of 5 and, no surprise, traveled with a competitive cheer team at the ages of 14 and 15 to compete in a "world championship" two years in a row. By


> all accounts, she was on her way to becoming a nationally competitive cheerleader. Midlothian, however, was also home to pole-vaulter Nick Frawley. When Austyn was invited to watch Nick practice on an elaborate pole vault run in his own backyard, her world changed.

"I went to that practice and fell in love. I had butterflies in my stomach," Austyn recalled. She was in the sixth grade and had never seen anything so powerful and exciting. As Nick soared through the air, Austyn knew she wanted to fly, too. A thrill seeker with a competitive nature, she had all the qualifications, as pole vaulting is a sport about power, speed, precision and positively no fear.

In the track world, pole vaulting is an event in which a seasoned athlete uses a

pole to lift him or herself up and over a bar. Dating back as far as the ancient Greeks and Celts, it has been a recognized Olympic sport since 1896. Women, however, did not make their Olympic debut until the 2000 Sydney Games. Until that time, the sport was considered too dangerous and too rigorous for women. Austyn was completely unaware of her








pioneering efforts. She only knew she was the only female pole-vaulter for years.

At state and national events, while other pole-vaulters were busily sizing up their competition and trying to rid themselves of growing nerves, Austyn was truly happy to be among "the girls." In fact, it took Austyn some time to realize that it was she who was considered the competition.

Described as "tenacious," "ferocious," "dedicated" and "committed" by her coaches, Austyn has never questioned



the sport that has been relatively lonely and unquestionably dangerous. "I really think the sport chose me," Austyn said. "I've never been scared of hurting myself. I'm only afraid of failing." As her success rose, so, too, did her expectations. "It's cliché, I know, but I want to be the best I can be."

Still in the midst of growing an impressive résumé, pole vaulting is not Austyn's only activity. She is currently Miss Teen Ellis County and was third runner-up in the 2009 Miss Teen Texas International Pageant, which led to invitations to both the Miss Texas USA and Miss Teen USA to represent Ellis County. She is also the official model for a local photography studio. While cheering on the Midlothian High School's varsity squad, Austyn was named "Cheerleader of the Year" in 2008-09 and was three-time All-American and



Today, as college recruiters come knocking, Austyn's expectations have remained high. "If my grades are good enough," Austyn smiled, "I want to get

my degree in dentistry." Specifically, this young woman with a brilliant smile wants to give smiles to those in need through children's orthodontics.

Education is her number one priority, but she is also excited to take her pole vaulting to a higher level — to train with other female athletes and have that camaraderie that she never experienced before. "I want to continue to be a role model, make my parents proud and give back to my community," she said. "My family is everything to me, and I love them more than anything."

As Austyn talks about the highs and lows of sport, her gratitude to a community "that has always been so good to me," and what she calls her continued walk of faith, she is described by those who love her as "grounded." It is an ironic statement about the young woman who loves to fly.

"I heard someone say once that attitude determines altitude," Austyn said. "I loved that! It doesn't just apply to pole vaulting, but to my life, too!" For Austyn, armed with both a great attitude and altitude, she really can fly.

"Something was odd that morning; it was something that made the air heavy and cold. Was it the stench of the old socks in the corner? Was it the sleep in your head? No ... but something was different that morning, something that no one could foresee, no one except Kevin Trace." So begins the winning short essay in the annual Walnut Grove Middle School Library Writers' Club Winter Holiday and New Year Writing Contest written by 14-year-old Daniel Cole.

Daniel titled his essay "The Alien and the Boy." He explained, "It's about an alien crash landing in a backyard and the boy finding it. The boy and the alien then become friends, but he has to keep the alien a secret because if people found out, they would probably take him away. Then his mom finds out." At this point, Daniel shows his comedic touch in his story with the words: "There is always that one moment, when you get in serious trouble, where everything slows down to where you can feel your heart pump. During that moment, all you can think about is how much trouble you're going to be in. Well, this was one of those moments." Many people have been in this spot before and would no doubt be able to relate to that feeling!

Writing for Daniel comes easy. He stated, "Once the idea comes to me, I figure out what would be best to go with it or what will work story-telling wise. I think, *Is this a good idea for a story or something to keep in your imagination?* If I think it is a good story, I'll visualize the story in my head, how it will play out, and then I write it down."

No one in Daniel's household was surprised that he won the contest that included participants from both Walnut Grove and Frank Seale middle schools. His mother, Nanette Wofford, stated, "When he started learning how to write, he wrote all the time. He always had these creative pictures with his stories. I knew he would win when I read the story." According to Daniel, "I love to write. I started writing in the first grade. I like creating stuff and letting other people see it."





All of that practice with writing led to his win last school year. He recalled the day it happened. "I was in the middle of science class dissecting a frog and the librarian came in and said, 'I need to talk to you.' I thought, Oh thank goodness, because I really didn't want to be in there [science class]. We went to the library, and when they told me I won, I was like *Whoa*!" Daniel was very impressed with his prizes — a picture with the mayor and a \$50 gift certificate to Barnes and Noble. Another bonus from winning the contest is the prospect of a novel from his story. An agent considering having him expand his story into a children's book has contacted the family.

Another aspect to Daniel's writing is his drawings. He wants to become an animator for cartoon television shows. "I really love drawing characters and thinking up stories for

them. My favorite hobby is drawing. I would like to own an animation studio, write stories and design characters for them." Daniel is currently working on episode two of the adventures of his animated characters, Hammey and Vlosey. Daniel created them in the first grade and now has a following for their adventures in the Hammey Club. He posted his first animation video of the characters on YouTube. He admitted rather sheepishly, "My running animations are, in fact, kinda embarrassing. It is about what you could expect from a 14-year-old with a Windows Movie Maker and Paint." However, embarrassing or not, Daniel dares to experiment with different venues as an outlet for his creative writing.

Daniel mentioned the importance of his English classes and found them helpful because "even if you are a really great writer, you still need to know things like climax and foreshadowing. In order to have a great story, you need to have a beginning, middle and ending. There always has to be a climax point to a good story and having some sort of problem. I didn't learn that until I was in the sixth or seventh grade. I was doing beginning, middle and ending but didn't know about other details like foreshadowing and, obviously, my grammar was horrible," he stated with a grin.

In encouraging other youth to experience the joy of writing, Daniel had this advice, "If you think you have a great idea, try visualizing it like a movie in your head. Then think of how it will play out. Just keep at it. Keep on writing rough drafts. It will probably take quite a few trys to get exactly what you want. As long as you don't give up, you will definitely get a good story down."

Daniel's future is full of exciting possibilities and just think — it all began with a love for writing.





15-year vs. 30-year Mortgage

It is often said that one of the greatest sources of wealth is our homes. Now more than ever, when we purchase something we want to save the most money and receive the greatest value for our dollar. 

Wow! Twenty-five percent equity in five years vs. seven percent, incredible. Our assumption was the value of the home did not appreciate or depreciate during the five years. If you ended up selling this home, after five years, the 15-year option would allow you to pay a six percent realtor commission, and still have 19 percent in cash to you, the 30-year option only would leave you one percent after a six percent realtor commission.

One last comparison. So how much would you pay in principal and interest






Alzheimer's disease (AD) holds the dubious distinction of being the most common cause of dementia. We still do not know what causes this disease, but evidence points to brain damage occurring over a long period of time before any sign of forgetfulness becomes worrisome. How much forgetfulness is enough to warrant further examination? Obviously, if you are very concerned about this, a trip to your physician may allay your fears.

We all have those minor "senior moments" of forgetfulness. However, if memory challenges disrupt your daily routine in some manner, that may be cause for concern. Being unable to balance the checkbook when you have done it previously with little effort may be worrisome. An inability to follow a plan or understand a favorite recipe is another sign. It permits you to have a say in legal matters regarding your estate while you can still do so. Becoming involved in support groups will help to enhance the quality of your life. Your family can benefit from these services also.

Yes, there is always hope, and it may be in early diagnosis. Research continues to advance in this area and early treatment may become crucial. Early detection can give you an opportunity to receive treatment or participate in clinical trials that can slow down the progression of the disease. Knowing what is ahead may give you a better future.


