




"To safeguard and transmit to posterity the principles of justice, freedom and democracy ..."
These words rang out over the room as the boys, representing Corsicana, Hubbard and Mildred school districts, stood and listened to the Preamble of the American Legion Constitution. They were beginning to understand the responsibility of being chosen to represent their peers and community.

Many of them would admit to not knowing anything about Boys State and why or how they were selected by their school counselors. They even laughed at the thought of being tapped on the shoulder, during class, and being told to step into the principal's office, for a reason unknown to them at the time. Imagine their surprise when they found themselves members of a group headed to Austin to learn about the mechanics of the government system!

Nathan Roller, of Mildred, grinned as he remembered the first week of June. "We woke up early and went to bed late, every day!" Everyone laughed with him. Nathan appreciated being able to see all the original flags on display at the Capitol. "Boys State was great," he said. "We learned how leaders are needed everywhere."

The boys took turns briefly sharing their memories. Ty Tidwell, of Corsicana, spoke of how beneficial the teaching was and how he felt humbled and honored to have been a part of the week.

They all wore bright red T-shirts in honor of

the 75th year of Texas Boys State. Boys State was totally unfamiliar to John Heard. After hearing of the program, these tech-savvy students quickly found their answers on Google. "The hands-on learning experience ..." John hesitated, then added, "Well, no other organization teaches or helps kids learn about our different forms of government. I ran for justice of the peace."

During Boys State, juniors from schools all over Texas assemble for a week of exercises that teach them about the government system from the ground up. They are divided into groups typifying various bodies of government. Members are given the opportunity to run for office and be elected by their peers. They also participate in sporting activities, such as baseball and basketball. These boys all agreed this was some of the best fun they had.

Tahoe Mickle, of Corsicana High School, was quick to share how much fun he had. "I enjoyed making new friends. I learned a lot about the different levels of government. I ran for a position on the Board of Education."

Daniel Barrera proudly represented Corsicana by running for public office as well. "I made lots of friends," he said. "We were encouraged to become better citizens and improve our character. I enjoyed practicing my public speaking skills."

These guys were focused on learning all they could. They all agreed about the importance of local politics and educating themselves more about issues that affect them and their community directly. "It taught us to work well with others, listen to opposing sides of issues, how to debate and understand the



differences between political parties," they spoke together. They will surely remember standing in the midst of the current representatives in the Texas State Capitol during the summer of 2015.

"Our first day was confusing and crazy. Everyone was arriving, looking for their rooms and trying to find their way around," Grayson Watkins said. The Boys State Motto is: Learning by Doing. This experience mirrored that sentiment. Grayson stood before the group and shared that he had won his run for office, in the House of Representatives. The boys went back and forth from the campus to the Capitol every day, listening to speeches on the actual legislative floor. They divided up into committees and discussed the pros and cons of each of the points brought forth. "We actually discussed the criminal justice system and wrote a bill to have body cameras worn by police officers," Grayson explained. "But, it did not pass. It had not been put on the agenda in time." This was another valuable lesson learned about leadership.

Montgomery Townear, of Hubbard, talked about "the speeches, the many speeches we listened to every day. We learned the good and the bad — that











there are many sides to politics, and sometimes not everyone who runs for office is interested in what is in the best interest of the people." This is perhaps where they learned the value of voting and understanding the issues and points of a piece of legislation.

Braydyn Gillham, from Hubbard High School, like all the boys, exhibited that his enthusiasm and knowledge have not waned. Braydyn is taking his newfound knowledge with him. "They showed us how our system works. It's going to help us in college and in our future," he stated. Braydyn spoke with excitement and confidence about the education the local American Legion volunteers have helped them all find.

Roger presented each of these interesting young men with a certificate in honor of their striving for excellence as citizens and leaders of the future, whether it be in the military, business or government, or just as importantly, in their own homes and communities. They are a group of students who have already shown their strengths through hard work, good grades and good conduct. The meeting ended soon after Roger had the boys sing the "Boys State Official Song," which they had learned the first day at camp and sang each day during their time in Austin.

"One thousand young men attended this year's event. I am confident these leaders will prove worthy of the task of being ambassadors to the next group of participants," Roger said with great pride.

The entire Boys State experience provided the participants with a real sense of accomplishment. American Legion members, who have served so bravely in our military, come together at their meeting place and share stories. At this meeting, they were looking into the eyes of a few future representatives they have helped to shape.

is an expression of the love and excitement that surrounds a couple's wedding day and the continued togetherness in which they will never be lonely again. Connor Chaney, a third-grader at CISD's Navarro Elementary School, is too young to identify with that song, but he shared the overjoyed sentiments expressed in its lyrics when he announced in church one Sunday, "Me, Daddy and Babe are getting married!"

Daddy is Richard Chaney and Babe, otherwise known as Nancy Chaney, has been Connor's official stepmom for the nearly two years following the wedding ceremony, which took place at a cabin just past Mildred. "We had about 60 people there to share the day, December 7, 2013, with us, but the wedding was really just all about the three of us," Nancy recalled. More than one person has pointed out to the couple, before and since then, that their wedding date is also Pearl Harbor Day and that freezing weather could have been a problem for guests' travel. But the day was beautiful. Nancy,

an administrative assistant to the executive dean of academics at Navarro College, is only 15 semester hours from earning her Bachelor of Applied Arts and Science degree. "I had to schedule the wedding date around semesters ending and beginning," she explained.

The couple was introduced to each other through a mutual friend. Richard and Nancy were already dating when Richard and Connor moved into the home that the family now shares. "We have become a family in this home," Richard said. Family dinners and movie and popcorn nights by the fireplace are just some of the traditions this new family has established. and Poppies), live behind them, sharing an extended backyard with no fences. Richard's dad and stepmom, Allen and Norma Chaney, live in Clifton, Texas. Nancy grew up attending schools in Rice and Blooming Grove, and her parents, Jeff and Peggy Harwell, live in nearby Tupelo.

Their home and street are shaded by tall trees. An American flag flies proudly and a bench near a birdbath creates a peaceful spot in which to rest. With old-fashioned hospitality, most guests and family members are greeted at the kitchen door by Connor and Booboo, the family dog. According to Nancy, there is plenty of room in the kitchen for "all the fixin' that goes into the family dinners." Three stools line up at the breakfast bar. A collection of crosses and wedding photos decorate the wall overlooking the dining and kitchen areas. "My niece took hundreds and hundreds of engagement and wedding pictures for us," Nancy explained.

The living room holds other precious reminders of their wedding day and the







vows all three of them spoke. A sand art picture perfectly reflects the family's life together through three chosen colors that not only stand on their own but are also woven creatively together. Richard is the blue. Connor is the green, and what else? Nancy is the pink sand.

Connor's bedroom is painted John Deere green and decorated from floor to ceiling with John Deere everything — a footstool, posters, curtains, bedspread and collectable license plates. "I love

tractors of all kinds," Connor explained. He was given a John Deere lawnmower, with no blades, that didn't work, but that was no problem for John Dawley, the head of Navarro College's John Deere program. He volunteered to return the small "tractor" to running order. Connor also has quite a collection of key rings and keys.

But Connor's favorite room in the house is the game room. An air hockey table and dart board provide many moments of family fun. Mounted trophies that hang high above the picture window view of the backyard testify to Richard's success as a hunter. "I got to watch Daddy shoot a doe," Connor exclaimed. He has the bullet as a foreverto-be-treasured keepsake. Even though Connor loves his bedroom, he still claims the game room is his favorite place to be.

The family has more peaceful moments relaxing on the back porch swing, playing with rabbits KK and Gracie, who reside in their backyard pen or working in the yard. Exercise


















is important for Connor, since he has cerebral palsy, a permanent neurological disorder which affects his body movement and muscle coordination. There is no cure, but with physical and occupational therapies, braces and now a walk-aid attached to his leg, Connor's condition will remain stable. He wears glasses, since his vision is also affected. Richard and Connor work together in the backyard. "He's a good helper with anything we do outside," Richard said. An employee of the Texas Department of Transportation, Richard puts his on-the-job skills to work at home with various projects.

"Richard's a jack-of-all-trades: welding, electrical, remodeling projects or driving a truck," Nancy said proudly.





Since 1895 when the Texas game wardens were first commissioned as state police, they have earned reputations as can-do men and women. With border patrol duties added to their job description recently, Navarro County game wardens Jimmy Woolley and Brian Srba are very busy. "With a state as diverse in terrain as Texas, we have to meet the challenges and know how to handle any situation involving any of those ecosystems," Warden Woolley said.

There are over 500 game wardens and 180 park police in Texas. They serve at the direction of the governor, and their duties include enforcing all state laws, with an emphasis on

hunting, fishing and water safety regulations. Game wardens are fully commissioned police officers, who can be called into any kind of situation while working with other law enforcement agencies. There have been 18 Texas game wardens who have died in the line of duty.

"Most applicants come from a ranching/farming or hunting/fishing heritage," Warden Woolley said. "I like the out-of-doors in any weather."

Warden Srba agreed. "It's a lifestyle," he said. "We do what we enjoy."

Less than 10 percent of applicants are accepted each year into the Texas Parks and Wildlife Game Warden Training Center located in Hamilton County. "Applicants must have a bachelor's degree, which isn't a requirement to become a commissioned officer," Warden Woolley explained. "That requirement gives us time to grow up a little more and get some life experiences.



Since we have to patrol so much on our own, we have to think on our own. We aren't micromanaged by superiors. We have to be self-starters and manage our time." The training is intense, but upon graduation, new game wardens become part of one of the best trained corps of conservation and peace officers in the United States.

Because of their unique training, game wardens can even be assigned to emergencies out-of-state or to other countries. Warden Woolley served in New Orleans following Hurricane Katrina. Both game wardens were put on standby for duty in Haiti following its hurricane. While these wardens' current duties in Navarro County don't include salt water ecosystems, they are trained to work anywhere in Texas, including the Gulf Coast.

Navarro County provides a diversity of duties that these officers like. "It's the freedom of doing something different every day," Warden Srba said. "We can change which bodies of water we patrol, and there is usually a new hunting season around the corner." Nearly every duty involves being outdoors and often, the use of 4-wheelers and boats. Most wardens base out of their residencies.

There are no set hours for game wardens. They can be called to the job 24/7. By day, they might be speaking in schools, church groups, Boy or Girl Scouts meetings or at 4-H or civic clubs. Following speaking duties, Navarro County game wardens might be found

on either of the county's two lakes or any of their tributaries making sure folks are following boat and swimming safety guidelines and fishing regulations. By night, wardens might be checking on illegal nighttime hunting. Work is seasonal, since both the weather and the allowed hunting changes. "We have water fowl, dove and deer hunting, so there is always something going on," Warden Woolley stated. "The only thing we don't have in Navarro County is salt water."





An emphasis is placed on working with landowners and the public. "We enter private property respectfully and close gates we've opened. Most ranchers and farmers welcome us," Warden Woolley said. Since they are state officers, game wardens can go anywhere they are needed. "We call ahead to that area's law enforcement agencies, but we can work wherever the case takes us," he added.

The work can be dangerous, since game wardens are often working alone and backup by fellow commissioned officers from other agencies can be as long as 20-30 minutes away. "We are always on alert. We can't miss anything anymore," Warden Woolley said. "Sometimes, people are doing illegal things beyond hunting and fishing, such as running a meth lab. Nothing surprises us anymore. The open carry law is going to be interesting as it's implemented. We see people doing some really crazy and

even funny things all the way to some really dangerous behaviors."

For that reason, during the past seven years, game wardens have received funding that gives them up-to-date equipment. A lot can be checked on cell phones. "Most of the people we contact have a weapon of some kind, so we try to be easygoing and respectful when checking sportsmen and women," Warden Srba stated.

Both Warden Woolley and Warden Srba cite working with the youth of the county as a plus. They help at the fishing events, such as the annual Hooked on Fishing at I.O.O.F. Park and fishing programs at Fairfield Lake State Park and the Texas Freshwater Fisheries Center in Athens. Youth hunter education programs are conducted through 4-H and by private landowners and hunting camp owners. "Kids aren't outside as much, so they need to be taught outdoor skills. They will be the future voting citizens and game wardens," Warden Woolley noted.

A criminal justice degree from Sam Houston State University led Warden Woolley first into adult probation and work with the Texas Department of Corrections before becoming a game warden. He is a bow hunter and enjoys family time with his wife, Danica, and their two daughters who join their dad in the hunt. "It's hard to be off, but when I am, I am doing what my kids like to do," he said. "The great thing is that we get to see things in nature that other people don't."

Hunting, fishing, rock climbing, mountaineering and scuba diving are Warden Srba's favorite "off time" activities. He is a single guy who likes to travel. "This job is tough on a social life, but as game wardens we have an opportunity to see and do some pretty unique things in this state," he said. A graduate of Stephen F. Austin State University with a degree in forestry and wildlife management, Warden Srba was a New Mexico game warden before becoming a Texas warden.

Game wardens live where they work. "Doing things for your community is taught in the academy, but most of us are from that heritage already. We never know when a simple contact we've made affects a person's direction in life," Warden Srba said.

Edge Medical Supply has been the go-to place in Corsicana since 2005 for respiratory and mobility aids, as well as equipment and clothing for medical professionals and sports enthusiasts. Its initials spell out the mission: E-excellent customer service, M-motivated by desire to enhance community health and S-service to all patients with respect, dignity and compassion. "Everything we do, and everything we supply is something that patients need as an aid to ease pain or enable mobility or ease in breathing," location manager, Vicky Neason, stated.

In 2013, EMS merged with AeroCare Holdings, a respected respiratory supply company. Products carried include: walkers, oxygen concentrators, portable concentrators, wheelchairs,

seat pads, power and lift chairs, nebulizers, braces, canes, crutches, compression hoses, boots, bathroom aids, Crocs, physical therapy exercise equipment, scooters, basic equipment for nurses and scrubs. "We carry a little this, a little that," Lori Ellis, customer service representative, said. Most items are in stock, but if not, they can be ordered. Customers receive expert advice by employees who receive up-to-date training at seminars, in-house workshops and refresher classes at other EMS stores located in Fort Worth and throughout East Texas. Technicians are available to service mobility apparatuses. An in-house pharmacy can fill prescriptions for Part B Medicare patients, and the business delivers breathing apparatuses to homes in the area. In all, EMS Corsicana employs three

customer service representatives and two technicians.

Most major insurance companies are billable by EMS, and the business accepts major credit cards, cash, money orders or checks. EMS is an authorized Veterans Administration dealer. "We do take care of our veterans," Vicky said.

Getting to know and being able to help customers is a joy felt by all the employees. Customer needs vary from the college nursing and occupational therapy students needing supplies and scrubs to patients who are experiencing either short-term or long-term health problems. "We are all going to need this kind of help at some time in our lives," Erin Pardo, another CSR stated.





Don't Ignore Digestive Troubles

As we age, digestive problems can become more likely because the muscles responsible for moving food through the digestive system become weaker and less efficient. Sometimes, trouble results from the foods or combinations of foods that we eat. Other digestive disorders can be caused by chronic illness, infection, an allergic reaction or heredity.

The discomfort from digestive issues can sometimes be relieved through dietary changes and over-the-counter medications, but the long-term effects of untreated digestive conditions on your overall health can be serious. The most common chronic digestive conditions are acid reflux, irritable bowel syndrome, lactose intolerance or ulcer disease. Symptoms vary, but may include:

- Swallowing problems
- Nausea
- Bloating
- Abdominal pain
- Vomiting
- Indigestion
- Constipation or diarrhea
- Gas

Common Digestive Conditions

The following disorders are not curable, but controllable with a structured treatment plan that can include dietary and lifestyle changes, and medication. Be sure to share your symptoms with your doctor, as digestive trouble can also indicate more serious conditions, such as gallbladder or pancreatic disease or some types of cancer. • Gastroesophageal reflux disease (GERD): GERD is severe or chronic acid reflux (stomach acid going back up into the esophagus) that can lead to complications such as sleep disorders, esophageal bleeding, ulcers or cancer. GERD symptoms include difficulty swallowing, coughing and wheezing, sore throat or hoarseness, a sensation of having a lump in your throat, a burning sensation in the

chest and chest pain, especially when lying down at night. If you experience GERD


symptoms for more than two weeks that

isn't relieved by taking over-the-counter antacids or medications, see your doctor.

- Lactose intolerance: Lactose intolerance is the deficiency of an enzyme in the small intestine that helps the body digest lactose (the sugar found in milk and milk products). Experts believe this condition may be hereditary or linked to damage to the small intestine that may occur with severe diarrheal illness, other digestive diseases or chemotherapy. Symptoms include abdominal pain, bloating and gas. Lactose intolerance usually can be controlled through dietary changes or medication.
- Peptic ulcer: A peptic ulcer usually occurs in the lining of the stomach or first portion of the small intestine. These ulcers are caused by bacterial infection or overuse of nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs such as aspirin and ibuprofen. Symptoms include pain in the midsection between meals or at night. Other symptoms include weight loss, bloating, nausea/vomiting and frequent burping. Medication is usually effective in treating this condition.
- Irritable bowel syndrome (IBS): IBS is a disorder caused by changes in the way the gastrointestinal tract works. It causes abdominal pain, bloating, cramping, changes in bowel movements and either constipation or bouts of diarrhea. IBS is diagnosed when symptoms of pain, fullness, gas and bloating are present for at least three days a month, in a three-month period. IBS affects women more often than men and is most often found in people under age 45. There is no cure for IBS, but it can be controlled through diet and medication.

If you experience any symptoms of severe heartburn or these digestive diseases, don't continue to suffer. Your doctor can help you manage or treat the symptoms, or confirm or rule out a more serious disorder. NOW



"The recipes I chose to share are economical in time and cost, but have been family and church favorites for years." NOW

Chicken Casserole

- I large bag Doritos chips
- 2 10.5-oz. cans cream of chicken soup
- I medium onion, chopped
- I whole chicken, boiled, skinned and shredded
- 1 8-oz. bag shredded cheddar cheese
- 2 10.5-oz. cans chicken broth
- **1.** Layer Doritos chips in a casserole dish.
- **2.** Using 1/2 of the remaining ingredients add a layer in this order: soup, onion, chicken, cheese and broth.
- **3.** Add another layer of Doritos followed by the other half of the ingredients in the same order.
- 4. Bake at 325 F for 1 hour.

Kool-Aid Pie

- I large tub Cool Whip
- 1 14-oz. can Eagle Brand condensed milk
- I pkg. lemon flavored Kool-Aid (or another favored flavor)
- Ready-to-use Graham Cracker crust

- **I.** In a bowl, add Cool Whip, condensed milk and Kool-Aid; mix well.
- **2.** Scoop mixture into crust and smooth the surface.
- **3.** Cover; refrigerate until ready to serve.

Mississippi Mud Cake

- 2 sticks margarine
- 2 cups sugar
- 4 eggs
- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 1/2 cup cocoa
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1 cup coconut
- $1 \frac{1}{2}$ cups pecans
- 1 7-oz. jar marshmallow creme
- **1.** Blend margarine, sugar and eggs; add flour and cocoa.
- 2. Add vanilla, coconut and pecans; mix well.
- **3.** Bake in a square pan at 350 F for 30 minutes.
- **4.** While cake is hot, spread marshmallow creme over top.
- 5. Let cake cool; cut into squares.

Three Bean Salad

- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup apple cider vinegar
- 1/2 cup Crisco oil

Pinch each of salt and pepper

- 1 15-oz. can waxed beans
- 1 15-oz. can green beans
- 1 15-oz. can kidney beans
- I purple onion, thinly sliced
- I bell pepper, thinly sliced
- **I.** Mix sugar, vinegar, oil, salt and pepper together.
- **2.** Drain beans and mix well; add sugar mixture.
- 3. Add onion and bell pepper; mix well.
- **4.** Marinate in refrigerator over night.

Sweet-Sour Meatballs

- 1 lb. lean ground meat
- 1/2 pkg. onion soup mix
- 1 egg
- 1 6-oz. can tomato puree
- 5 Tbsp. brown sugar
- 1 cup water
- **I.** Mix meat, soup mix and egg well; shape into balls.
- **2.** In a skillet, brown the meatballs; drain and set aside.
- **3.** Mix puree, sugar and water; simmer slowly.
- **4.** Add meatballs to pure mixture; simmer until well done.

Coca-Cola Salad

- I small pkg. cherry Jell-O
- 2 8-oz. cups Coca-Cola (divided use)
- I cup maraschino cherries
- 1/2 cup pecans
- Lettuce leaves
- 1/4 pt. whipping cream
- **I.** Dissolve Jell-O in 1 cup of hot cola; slowly add the remaining cup of cola.
- **2.** Add cherries and pecans; pour into mold; chill until set.
- **3.** Serve on lettuce leaves; top with whipped cream.
