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




Me, I had a really blessed year. Not only did I get

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# Where Railroads and Cotton Fields Meet




Pete Watson will soon be retiring from the railroad. He has already surpassed the 30 years of service eligibility rule, but he is having trouble deciding exactly when to say goodbye to the rails and hello to a much different kind of life. His new one will be filled with busy days on the family farm, relaxed competitions at the local golf course and more quality time with his family, especially his grandson, Jackson. "I will be 60 on February 3, but I'll have 33 years of service in May," he stated. "In all those years, I never missed a day's pay, and I've never had a disciplinary action taken against me. The times I was furloughed, I may have been off long enough to draw two week's worth of unemployment pay before getting called back to service."



A lifetime of working on the railroad is not an easy task regardless of the position one holds, just ask any railroader. The first thing they are likely to mention is the long hours, with the dangers and adverse conditions coming in a close second and third. For Pete, the journey started many years ago. "I went to see Mr. Merritt, the division engineer at the time," Pete said, also sure to mention he was but a young man right out of high school. "I asked him about a job."

Mr. Merritt pointed to the tracks beyond his office windows. He told Pete, "If you go to work here, that's what you'll be doing."



Pete took one look out the window and decided the railroad life was not for him, at least not at that time. "Guys over 6 feet tall and weighing in at about 250 pounds were swinging picks and shovels and handling railroad ties with ease," he admitted. "I decided to go back to the convenience store where I had worked since the age of 14."

Eight years after marrying Rhonda, his wife of 41 years, Pete took another journey to the railroad yard in Ennis. This time at age 27, he did not travel alone. "I rode down with Steve Hunt, a guy who worked for us at the store. I had no intention of applying for a job that day," Pete said, "but Steve encouraged me to fill out an application anyway." On that fateful day in April, when he was hired on the spot alongside Steve, Pete not only fooled Mr. Merritt, but he also started down a career path in the Maintenance of Way department he will always fondly remember. "In the first 12-15 years, I was predominately on the road," he explained. "I haven't traveled as much since the merger between Southern Pacific and Union Pacific railroads in July of 1996."

Pete not only worked long hours away from home in those early years as a track laborer before being promoted to his current position as track foreman in April of 1981, he also dealt with the harsh elements of nature. "All track work used to be done manually. We didn't have trucks that ran on the rails in those early days," he remembered. The downtime was greater, the weather was much hotter and colder, and the mosquitoes could take "a bite" out of the biggest men. "We either froze to near death or burned up to the point of heat exhaustion in the motor cars of old. High rail pickup trucks and gang rail trucks didn't come along until late 1984, early '85," Pete stated. Although many laborers lost their jobs during this time of technological



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
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advancement, "the technology definitely made life on the railroad sweeter," Pete added.

Staving ahead of the wheel is Pete's mantra. Keeping the track in working order regardless of the conditions has always been the goal of those in the Maintenance of Way department. What began in 1871 when the Houston and Texas Central Railroad purchased 647 acres of land in the county for \$5 per acre to merge the railroad with the vast cotton crop has continued throughout the years with dedicated workers just



like Pete. "I think what we do in this department is the most critical railroad job," Pete said without hesitation. "They [train engineers] don't know how to run them [the trains] on the dirt vet. Our job is to keep the rail running; staying one step ahead of the wheel at all times."

In most instances, any job pertaining to track work is relentless and unforgiving. So many things can bring trouble to the tracks, causing adverse effects on rail travel, as well as the number of hours Pete and his crew must work away from home on a day-to-day basis. "Gosh, the elements of nature can wreak havoc on the tracks," Pete said. "Snow and freezing temperatures can cause malfunctions in track switches. Excessive summer heat causes thermal misalignment of the track. Too much rain causes washouts that remove the sub-grade ballasts." The list goes on and on. Fallen trees can put an engine window out or cause a derailment. A single grain of sand left behind during the manufacturing process can grow like the rings on a tree trunk, also causing a derailment.

In days gone by, Pete remembered being called out for emergency track repairs on a regular basis when a train "would feel it" or a worker "would see it." These same rules apply today, but

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
Broken rails equate to slower speeds from one destination point to the next.

This means a loss in revenue. Many times, how large the loss is may depend on the split second decisions Pete makes on a daily basis. "Communication is paramount," he stated. "Sometimes a train delay I've requested means standing around doing nothing. Other times it means a lot of hard work in a short period of time. You can never be too careful working on the railroad."

Pete's job has come with a great deal of responsibility, warranting a career-long commitment to hard work, a stringent rule book and a great deal of time spent away from family. Even though he may have walked away from such an undertaking as a teenager, Pete is so glad he gave the railroad a second chance. "I've always taken my job seriously," Pete confessed. "It's been a good place to work."


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718 W. Lampasas 972-875-6521 • 972-878-3784 hands while Andy pronounced with a grin, "We are still high school sweethearts."

The family that works together also plays together. They often take their four-wheelers camping, and Andy uses vacations from Suez Energy to go with










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I guess I could be wrong?" she joked.

## **MEDICAL CARPENTRY**

Orthopaedic sports medicine is a perfect fit for Dr. Gregory Todd Moore. — By Sandra Strong

When putting it in a nutshell, orthopaedic sports medicine is the care of any muscular skeletal problem. These may include torn ligaments, sprains, strains and broken bones. To be a physician who specializes in orthopaedic sports medicine, you must be prepared for years of education and hands-on experience, just ask Dr. Gregory Todd Moore. "Before opening my office in Ennis," Dr. Moore said, "I spent four years in medical school, completed five years of residency and then took an extra year." He devoted that extra year of fellowship training to his specialization — sports medicine. Once the fellowship at Texas Tech University was complete, Dr. Moore relocated to Ellis County, making Ennis his home.

Throughout his years of training, Dr. Moore learned what he

feels is paramount in a successful doctor/patient relationship. "Listening is the key," he stated. "The patient will give me all the information I need to make a diagnosis before I ask a question, as long as I listen. And it's equally important to give them a chance to ask questions and listen, too."

When asked, "Why orthopaedic sports medicine?" Dr. Moore wasted no time in forming his answer. "Tve always been interested in medicine," he said. "I played sports in college, and my granddad was a carpenter. Orthopaedics is medical carpentry." These three, when added together, made orthopaedic sports medicine a perfect fit for Dr. Moore.

When first opening his practice, Dr. Moore expected his largest patient base to be senior-aged individuals. He expected

hip fractures and knee- and hip-replacement surgeries. Although he treats his fair share of seniors, the larger numbers of patients are children, teens and young adults. Normal "kid accidents" and trampolines have been the cause of many appointments for broken wrists and legs. Dr. Moore has always found it difficult to see a child in pain, but since the birth of his daughter, Mia, now age 3, he seems to have an even bigger heart for his younger patients. "I don't like to see a child hurting. I want to fix what's broken," he admitted. "I've learned children are so resilient. They heal quickly and remarkably well."

Dr. Moore also believes in preventative medicine. He firmly believes keeping his patients informed is the blueprint to good muscular/skeletal health. "The biggest problem I've faced on the medical side of the practice has been in the healing process," Dr. Moore explained. "Patients with fractures and breaks, who are also heavy smokers and/ or do not take care of their diabetes properly take longer to heal." Dr. Moore's recommendations for these patients are strong, straightforward and to the point. "Stop smoking! Keep your diabetes under control. Check your blood sugar on a regular basis. Eat the correct diet, and be sure to get the proper amount of exercise."



By far, his greatest joy comes from Mia. "Nothing I've done, no achievement in life, compares to being a dad," he quietly added. "Everything I never knew I was missing has been fulfilled with Mia. I love what I do for a living, but Mia is the best part of my days."




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



## Ear Infections and How to Avoid Them

Ear infections, also referred to as otitis externa, are infections of the ear canal, which is the tube-like opening in the ear that carries sound from the outside of the body to the ear drum. Otitis externa occurs most commonly during the summer, when the temperature is hot and people tend to spend more time in the water. Excess moisture in the ear can break down the skin in the ear canal and allow bacteria and fungus to penetrate the skin and cause an infection.

Water in the ears is the most common cause of otitis externa, but it is not the only cause. Anything that causes a break in the skin of the ear canal can lead to an infection. Some other common causes include scratching the ear canal with foreign objects such as paperclips or bobby pins and using Q-tips to clean the ears. These activities can irritate the skin in the ear canal and increase the risk of developing otitis externa.

Symptoms of otitis externa include pain, swelling and drainage from the ear.

A person with otitis externa may feel pain in the throat, as well as the ear, and might find it difficult to chew because the mandible joint is located very close to the ear canal. Drainage may start out clear and then turn yellow or greenish in color. Hearing may be affected if the ear canal swells and pus and debris block sound from passing through the ear properly.

Treatment of otitis externa varies depending on the severity of the infection. If the infection is caught early enough, a doctor may simply prescribe eardrops to treat the infection. The drops usually consist of an antibiotic to treat. the infection and a steroid to reduce the swelling and inflammation. In some cases, the swelling of the ear canal makes it difficult for the drops to go into the ear. If this happens, the doctor may need to place a small piece of expandable cotton called a wick in the ear canal. The wick helps carry the drops down into the ear so that they are able to reach the source of the infection. The doctor

may also need to look in the ear with a microscope and remove any accumulated pus and debris using a suction device. In really bad infections, it may be necessary to make a small incision in the ear canal to drain pus that is trapped in the ear canal skin. While the infection is being treated, it is best to keep water out of the ear completely by using a small piece of cotton while in the shower.

In summary, otitis externa usually happens when the skin in the ear canal becomes irritated. The best way to prevent otitis externa is to keep water out of the ears and to avoid using foreign objects like Q-tips to scratch the ears. Otitis externa should be treated by a doctor as soon as symptoms such as pain, swelling or drainage from the ear first appear.

## A New Start in January

Tired of the same old gardens? Try your hand at different looking beds. They are called theme gardens and can be as large or small as you want, but they all need planning.

This month, let's talk about an herb garden. Some herbs do well in North Texas and others do not. Do your homework to find out which ones do well in our heat. The growing medium is very important, and most herbs need lots of well-drained soil. Sand or our alkaline clay with copious additions of compost and expanded shale will make a reasonable foundation for an herb bed. Planting as soon as the soil warms up in a very sunny area is preferable, but later is acceptable.

As for specific herbs that will winter over, fennel is a good one. It is used in fish dishes. Lavender is used to flavor cookies, and due to its pleasant smell, it is also used to freshen drawers. Myrtle is used in meat dishes or as a substitute for bay. Curly parsley may be used as a substitute for parsley. Rosemary is great on chicken or in seasoned butter. Thyme is used to intensify any flavor or as salt. All these are cold hardy and can survive our cold spells without damage.

French tarragon, sweet marjoram, Mexican mint marigold and rose geranium are all great tasting as well as great looking. With a littler cover and care, they will survive the year. If you are short on space, you can try containers. Just remember to repot often!

Remember that the herbs may be small when you get them, but they will be much larger when grown with full sun. It will help to plan accordingly. All theme gardens will have several common characteristics: They will all need the right soil, sun and water for the plants you are planting. Mature size should also be taken into account. Next month, we will talk about rose gardens for North Central Texas.

## Health Care Reform Basics for 2011: Employer-sponsored Group Medical Plans

The following summary gives you the basics of what you should know for 2011 regarding the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPACA) and Employer-sponsored Group Medical Plans. Some of these changes went into effect in 2010; more updates and changes are on the table for the next several years. Further updates on PPACA are available at www.healthcare.gov. For specific information regarding employee benefits under your employer-sponsored group medical plan, contact your insurance agent or carrier.

#### • Your Dependents

If your employer-sponsored group medical plan includes dependent coverage, dependents up to age 26, are eligible for coverage — provided they meet the usual eligibility requirements.

A dependent whose coverage or benefits ended because they reached a prior age limit, must be given written notice that coverage is available and informed of their 30-day enrollment or re-enrollment opportunity.

#### • Preexisting Conditions

Children under age 19 cannot be denied coverage because of a preexisting condition. (Prohibition of preexisting condition exclusions for adults, as applied to medical plans, takes effect in 2014.)

#### • Lifetime and Annual Limits

Effective on or after September 23, 2010, there will be no lifetime or annual dollar limits on "essential services." However, other non-dollar limits on essential benefits, such as the number of allowable visits may apply. "Grandfathered Plans" may not receive this benefit until the next scheduled renewal date. Check with your insurance carrier for specific details.

#### •Mental Health Coverage

Beginning July 1, 2010, mental health and substance abuse treatment claims will be covered at the same benefit level as medical claims. Certain types of mental health and substance abuse treatment may require prenotification and authorization.

#### • Flexible Spending Accounts (FSAs)

Effective January 1, 2011, you will no longer be able to use your health care flexible spending account (FSA) to pay for over-the-counter (OTC) medications without a prescription from your doctor. While insulin continues to be a covered medication, the final definition of other OTC medications, subject to this new law, has yet to be fully defined by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Resources.

#### • Health Savings Accounts (HSAs)

Effective January 1, 2011, you will no longer be able to use your health care flexible spending account (HSA) dollars to pay for OTC medications without a prescription from your doctor. You will be able to use HSA dollars for prescription medicines, including insulin, if those are eligible expenses under your employer-sponsored group medical plan. Check with your insurance carrier for specific pharmacy benefits. If you have prescriptions for OTC medicines and pay for them with your HSA dollars, you must keep copies of your prescription and receipts for the purchase with your tax records.

Beginning January 1, 2011, if your HSA is used to pay for items or services that are not qualified medical expenses, the IRS penalty will increase from 10 percent to 20 percent of the HSA dollars used.



1 1/2 cups sugar
1 tsp. vanilla
1 stick butter
1 tsp. cinnamon

 Press 1 can of the crescent rolls into the bottom of a 9x13-inch pan, pinching the edges together.
 Mix cream cheese, 1 1/4 cups of the sugar and vanilla until smooth.
 Once mixed, spread cream cheese mixture over the crescent rolls.

**4.** Take second can of crescent rolls and roll them out over top of the cream cheese mixture.

**5.** Melt butter and pour over top of crescent rolls.

**6.** Mix together remaining sugar and cinnamon and sprinkle over cheese cake.

**7.** Bake at 350 F until golden brown on top, about 30 minutes.

In The Kitchen With Don — By Adam Walker

Don Walker was born and reared in Forreston, but has lived in Ennis for years. He is a retired educator of 45 years, who has also worked in the cattle business since his grandfather gave him his first calf at age 5. He acknowledges his mother's and aunt's influences on his cooking style. "I enjoy plain, simple, down-home country cooking," Don explained. "I was raised during the Depression, so I also try to cook as economically as possible." But he also likes to cook with organic ingredients. "I like backyard garden- or farm-grown vegetables in season." With his background in ranching he is also very particular about his meats. Mexican friends and employees and time living in Ireland have added breadth to Don's cooking.

## 1/2 tsp. salt 1/2 tsp. ground mustard

**I.** Place hash brown patties in a single layer in a greased 9x13-inch dish.

**2.** Sprinkle with cheese and ham.

**3.** In a bowl, beat together eggs, milk,

salt and mustard. Pour over ham.

**5.** Uncover and bake 15 minutes more or until edges are golden brown and a knife inserted near the center comes out clean.

#### **OVEN-FRIED GREEN TOMATOES**

Vegetable oil spray 2 large green tomatoes 1 Tbsp. olive oil 1/2 cup yellow cornmeal Paprika, to taste 1/2 tsp. salt

Preheat oven to 425 F.
 Line baking sheet with foil and spray with vegetable spray.
 Remove a thin slice from top and bottom of each tomato. Then slice into 4 1/2-inch slices.

**4.** Pour olive oil into a shallow bowl. Dip tomato slices into oil, then into cornmeal.

**5.** Place slices on baking sheet. Sprinkle lightly with paprika and salt.

6. Bake 10 minutes. Turn slices. Bake8 minutes more or until tender.7. Remove from oven. Let stand3-4 minutes.

MEAT AND POTATO PIE

2 lbs. ground beef
1 onion, chopped
1/2 green pepper, chopped
1 1/3 cups water
2 bay leaves
1 can diced tomatoes
2 Tbsp. cornstarch

- 3 potatoes, sliced
- A little olive oil
- 2 cups shredded cheddar cheese

**I.** Brown beef, onions and peppers. Drain and return to skillet.

**2.** Add 1 cup of water, bay leaves and tomatoes. Simmer 15 minutes.

**3.** Remove bay leaves. Add remaining water and cornstarch.

4. In another skillet, brown potatoes in oil until tender. Drain. Place in baking dish and top with beef mixture.5. Top with cheese.

**6.** Brown in oven at 375 F for 10 minutes.




