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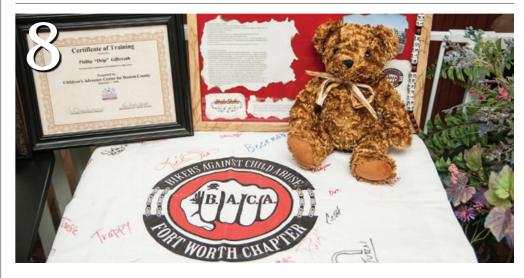

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violence or physical force in any manner; however, if circumstances arise such that we are the only obstacle preventing a child from further abuse, we stand ready to be that obstacle."

Lisa was given her nickname, "Bobalu," from some of her co-workers in Burleson. Bobalu checked into BACA because, as she said, "Drip was never home." For that reason, she went and checked it out for herself, and before too long, she was finding herself actively involved. "I can't think of anything better to do with my free time than to do what I do," Bobalu said. These two fun-loving do-gooders are quick to point out that BACA is not about invading any child's life. "We are simply there to offer encouragement."

"We are in their life as much as they want us to be," Drip explained. Usually, referrals are given to them from advocacy centers, police departments and other agencies. Once BACA has the child's name, the child liaison will set up the initial interview with the child and the parent/guardian. That's when the child, and no one else, decides to adopt BACA into their family. Allowing the child to make that decision is empowering. "When they adopt us, we give the child a certificate of appreciation, a pillowcase with the names of the BACA members who attended the adoption, a BACA blanket, a vest with their road name on it and a special Teddy bear filled with hugs by all those who attended the adoption. When the hugs and love are used up, the child tells us to come back and refill it."

At the adoption, the child is given the name and number of two BACA





members who live near them. They then become the child's primary contact person(s). Drip pointed out not everyone can be a part of BACA. Before becoming the primary contacts for any child, the bikers are cleared for participation through an extensive background check. In addition, they must also have ridden with the chapter for at least a year and have received special instructions from the Licensed Mental Health Professional. "Anytime the child feels scared and feels the need for the presence of his new BACA family, the child may call upon these bikers to go to the child's house so they can provide the necessary reassurance for the child to feel safe and protected," the Web site states. BACA members and supporters also provide escorts for them if they feel scared in their neighborhoods, ride by their homes on a regular basis, support the children at court and parole hearings, attend their interviews and stay with the children if they are alone and frightened.

"BACA members never go to the child's house alone," Bobalu said, "and they never go without the knowledge or permission of the parents. Their mission is to not be permanently engaged as the child's power. BACA's mission is to help





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the children and their families learn just how powerful they can be. "Our presence will be available as long as the child needs us," Bobalu said. "BACA also hosts other functions to benefit the children, such as barbecues and parties."

When the court day arrives, the BACA crew will show up. If the judge will allow, they will all wear their biker vests. "When the kid looks up from the witness stand, he sees all of us," Drip said. "We're there to empower the child, to give them the strength they need to testify."

Once a child's case is over, the BACA crew will stay available if the child still wants them in their life. But, Bobalu pointed out there is never any pressure for them to do so. "If they want us, we are there. If the perpetrator gets out later, and the child still wants us, all they have to do is call," she explained. "We'll camp out on the yard if necessary. The truth is that if they don't ever need us again, then it just means we've done our job."

Most children do still stay in contact with them. "We'll have regular reunion parties, and the kids will still show up," Drip said. With tears in his eyes, he shared a time when a debriefing was occurring in a convenience store parking lot. A young girl in her early 20s recognized their patch and approached them. "She said we had taken care of her when she was 12 years old," he shared. "She just wanted to thank us. I will never forget that." Neither will that lady, or countless other children who have been helped by Drip, Bobalu and so many others like them. NOW



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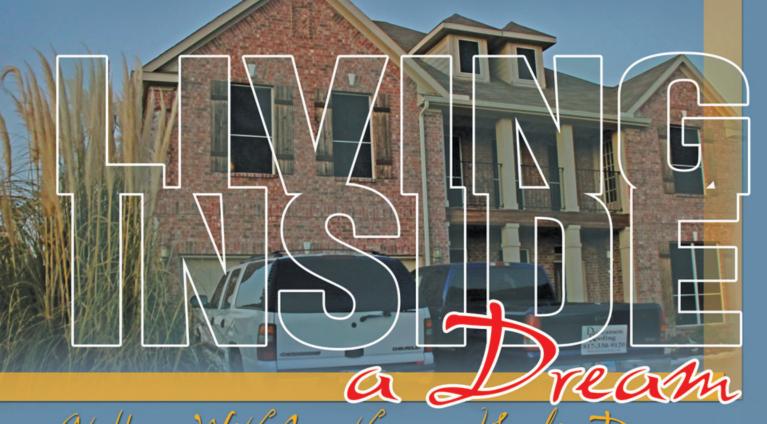
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At Home With Ionathan and Leplie Duncanjon

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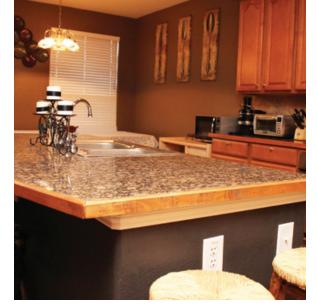

The family finds great pleasure in music, so their home rings with joy. "I'm



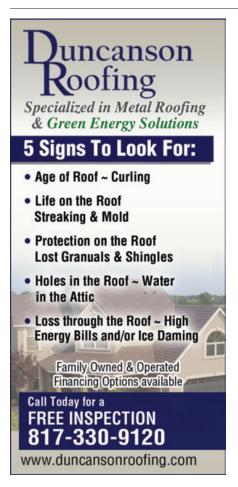

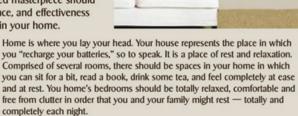

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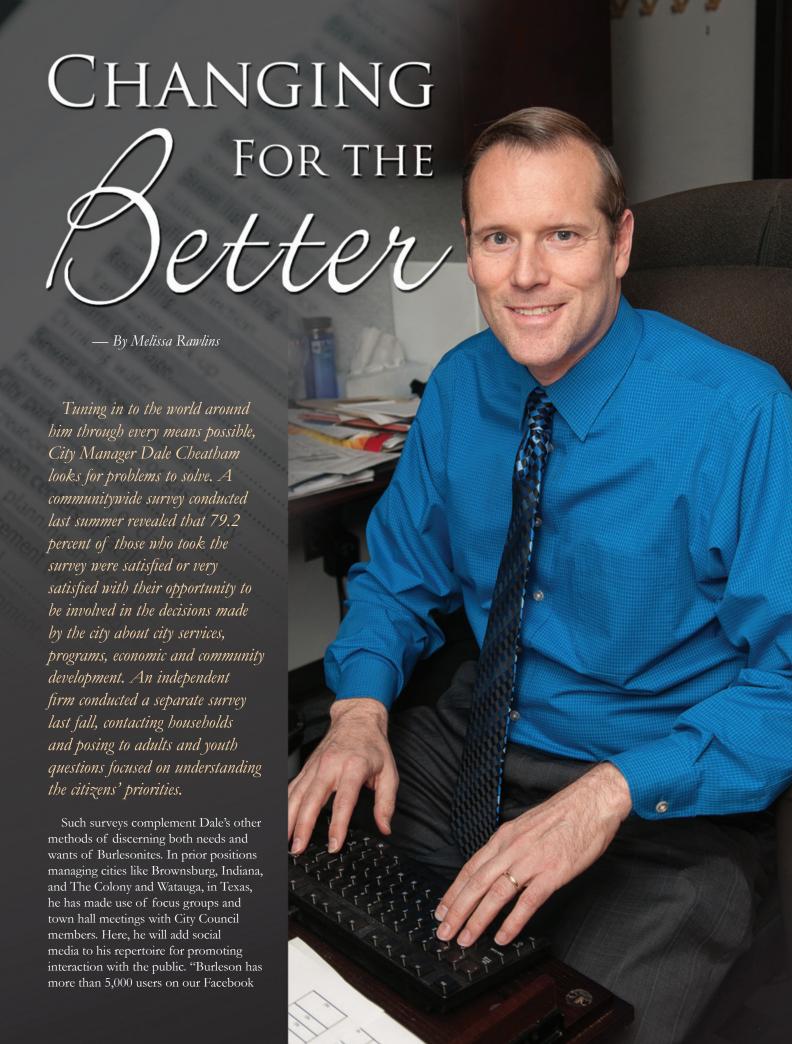

page," Dale said. "That's a lot of friends for a city our size."

Making friends easily, Dale periodically visits service clubs like Rotary, Kiwanis and Lions, and attends meetings of the Chamber of Commerce. "The important thing is being involved and hearing what people have to say," said Dale, who takes his job very seriously and sees it as an extension of the strong work ethic instilled by his parents during his childhood in Chicago suburbs.

"Despite the fact that neither of my parents got a high school degree, they talked about the importance of education, work ethic and Christian values," Dale said. Attending The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints every Sunday, or spending the day providing service to individuals, Dale and his wife, DeeAnn, regularly visit and help members of their church, some active and some not.

Giving DeeAnn kudos for enabling their mutual mission of giving back to others, Dale appreciates her recent efforts to homeschool their children. "DeeAnn has the same education background as I, holding a master's in public administration," Dale said. "She was in charge of a program providing investment training in cities, counties and schools. She worked out of the home when we were married, and after our children turned 10 and 8, we jointly made the decision that she would take on the primary responsibility of educating them."

Since becoming city manager in March 2011, Dale has brought his children to work with him a few evenings, yet it took them until very recently to complete the decorating of his office, and get pictures and certificates hung on the walls. He had other goals, written as bullet points in blue ink on lined paper. "Lists help













me stay on track," Dale said, "not only personally but also as city manager. You have to juggle a lot of balls, and I wouldn't be able to operate otherwise." Much on his lists consists of reminders to follow up with others on his staff to get status updates. "Monthly I visit with all those who directly report to me to find out what I can do to be of direct assistance to them."

Dale is leading the city staff to fulfill the City Council's priorities and objectives. Dale brought Kevin Lasher on as community development director so Bradley Ford could focus on his job of economic development director. That is the only hiring decision Dale has directly participated in thus far. "For the



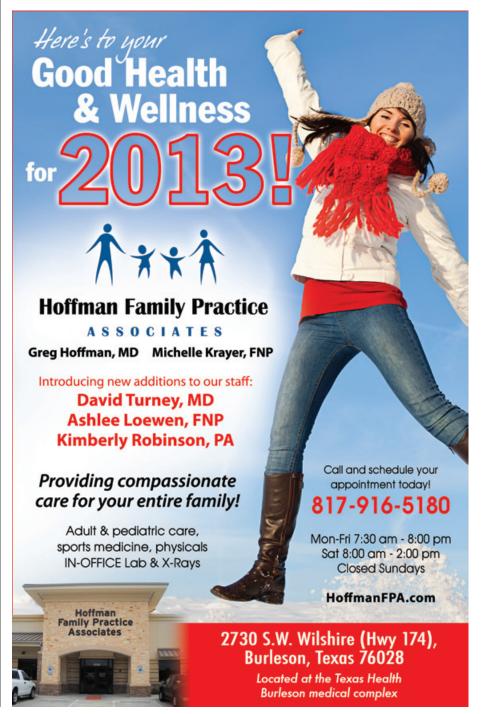
next budget year, I don't anticipate major changes to staff, but after that additions may be warranted," Dale indicated.

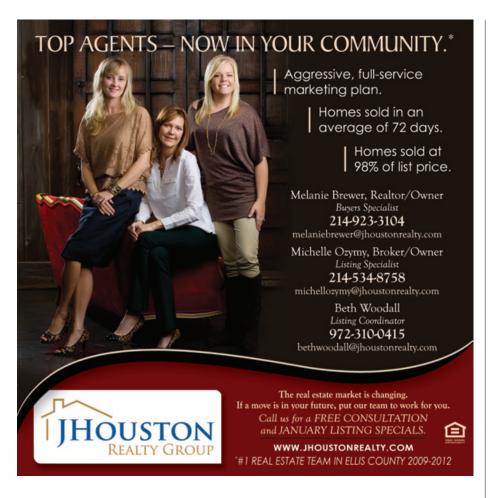
In his first year, Dale also analyzed Burleson's financial position and developed a budget. That required six months of soliciting input from City Council, staff and citizens to find out priorities and develop a strategy. "I want to feel comfortable that we have flexibility, and want to draw down on fund balances," he said. "In terms of cash flow, 70 percent of our general fund budget goes to personnel so we don't have flexibility. That makes us reliant on developing additional growth via business development to get additional property and sales tax: one cent for the general fund, half a cent for parks and recreation and half a cent for economic development."

Opening his office door and venturing out enabled great communication with staff and the City Council. He met with each, either individually or in groups, and offered to meet with councilmembers once a month. "Council members do not need to be in City Hall all the time but need to have a comfort level with all that is going on here," Dale said. "I don't have all the answers, and may have questions, so let's discuss it around the table." And yet he recognizes that ultimately many of the decisions are his to make.

For instance, Dale helps prioritize the list of possible capital projects developed by the Infrastructure and Development Committee, and then takes those recommendations to council. One









area Dale would like to see developed is extending Alsbury Road to Hulen. "However, there are no funds for that expansion, which I have been told could cost \$6 million. Since that would open up growth, I think we should focus on it," Dale said.

Hence, his interest is bringing businesses to Burleson. "Several have knocked on our door, some we're aggressively pursuing. We are doing



an industry study trying to identify what industries out there might be best matches for the city of Burleson," Dale explained, "as well as a retail site analysis to identify what locations are best suitable for some of the retailers that might want to come here. After those two are in place, we will be able to develop an economic incentive policy."

Interestingly, this man who had great success in expanding Brownsburg's land mass is not placing annexation at the top of the city's list of priorities, because feedback from his investigations indicates lack of interest in aggressive annexation. "We won't be a big city like Dallas. I guess our population will end up in the range of 60,000-65,000," Dale said. "If there are property owners interested, we would consider voluntary pre-annexation." On another front, Dale pushed to the top of his list an update of the city's zoning ordinance to remove contradictory policies.

In his first year, Dale looked at Burleson's big picture. "There is nothing that jumps out indicating we're operating inefficiently," he said. "But as a multimillion dollar organization, there are opportunities for improvement." You can be sure Dale will continually tune in, looking for why corrections should be made and how Burleson could change for the better.

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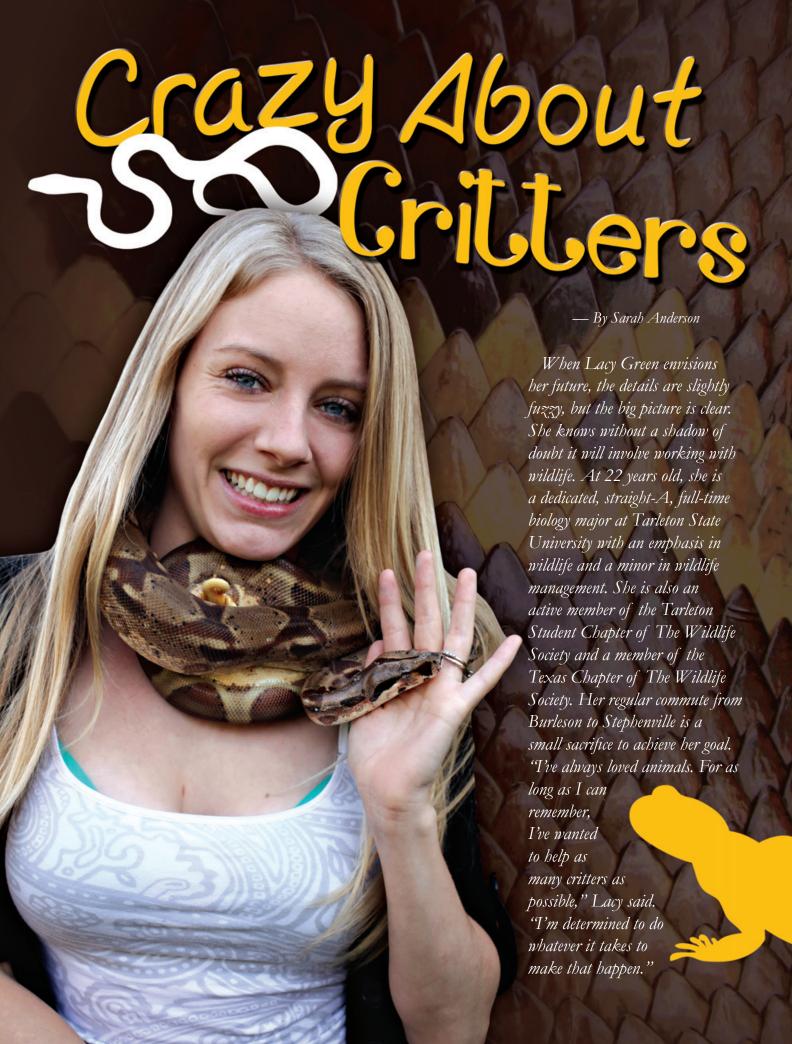
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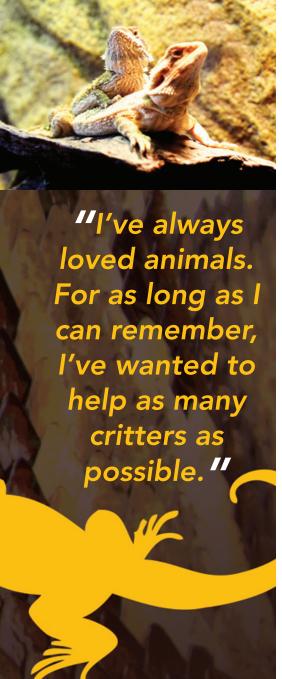
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But Lacy was not always a driven and goal-oriented student. As a teenager, she barely made it through high school. In 2008, she graduated from Burleson High School with a 1.43 GPA after a frantic last-ditch attempt to pass. "I hated school, and no one could give me a satisfactory reason why I should care," she said. Then she was picked up for truancy and court-ordered to go even more than before. Lacy's mother, Patsy Plummer, always knew her daughter had it in her. It was just a matter of convincing her. "Of course, a teenage girl doesn't want to listen to her parents," Patsy said. "It's no surprise there. I was just so grateful for Jeremy's influence. It's been wonderful to watch Lacy grow from a stubborn teenager with attitude into a lovely young woman so determined to do whatever it takes to achieve her dream."

When Lacy graduates from Tarleton, she will be the first to earn a college degree on both sides of the family. Patsy and Mike, Lacy's father, said they couldn't be more proud. They adopted Lacy the day she was born, and despite her difficult years, Lacy has always been the light of their life. "We were proud as punch when she graduated high school," Patsy said.

"She's a bundle of dynamite, and we know she is headed for good things."

At first, Lacy didn't plan on higher education. But then a woman from Burleson High School presented information about a brand new scholarship, the Burleson Opportunity Fund. Funded by individuals, businesses and organizations in the community, it was created with the goal of providing "every high school graduate from Burleson the opportunity to attain post-secondary education." The few requirements were all things Lacy could do. "If it weren't for that scholarship, there's no way I would have gone to college. It not only gave me the idea, Hey maybe I could go, but it gave me direction and a place to start, a place where I could go locally. It made a huge impact on my life."

Once enrolled in college classes, Lacy soon encountered Nancy Holland, the dean of Hill College at Burleson. "I believe the Lord puts people in your life for a reason, and I knew He put Lacy in mine," Nancy said. "I saw a lot of myself in her, and I could tell she was a sharp young woman — stubborn, but so smart. She just needed some guidance and direction, some smoothing out, if you will."

Three years, and many frank and very direct conversations with Nancy later, Lacy earned her associate degree in liberal arts and graduated *summa cum laude* with a 3.9 GPA in May 2011. "Watching her graduate was like watching one of my own," Nancy said. "She is a prime example of what we are all about here and our mission with the Burleson Opportunity Fund." Lacy was one of the first 28 students to receive the scholarship, and now five years later, nearly 100 students have used it to build their future.

Several months before Lacy graduated from Hill College, she and her inspiration (Jeremy) tied the knot. When she finished high school, their friendship gradually blossomed into romance, and it wasn't long before Jeremy asked her parents for her hand in marriage. "Lacy is an energetic, beautiful and extremely smart girl. When she was given the awesome opportunity to go to college, she ran with it," he said. "I knew who she was on the inside all along. I loved her before her



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transformation, and I'm still in love with her now."

The two celebrated their second wedding anniversary in November and actively work together to rescue displaced pets, especially exotic animals. They currently care for turtles, snakes and lizards along with a sugar glider. "We make sure they get proper care and then find them a new home," Lacy said. Two of Lacy's favorites are a pair of Savannah Monitors — Jack Hana and Selena. They were rescued from an unfortunate situation and immediately earned a special place in her heart. Jack Hana is often Lacy's study buddy. "I just lay him against my skin under a blanket, so he stays warm, and he rests right there with me," she said.

When Lacy isn't making her two-hour trek back and forth to Stephenville, studying or tending to her beloved reptiles, she and Jeremy do everything they can to help their mothers, who are both battling cancer. "It makes things more difficult for sure, but we are happy to help. We don't want to miss any opportunity to spend with them," Jeremy said.

Lacy agreed, "It's tough and scary, but we just take it day by day."

Patsy said no matter what happens, she knows the future is bright for Lacy. "We cannot wait to see where all her hard work takes her."

Dr. Chase Dyess is here to help during these cold winter months, which bring with them common colds and flu, aches and pains from moving Christmas decorations. Dr. Dyess employs three-phase treatment plans. He re-examines patients every six visits to determine their progress. 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North Texans More Hopeful About Their Financial Future than Other Americans, Despite Lack of Retirement Savings

North Texans are more hopeful about their financial futures than other Americans, according to the inaugural Life Tracks Poll, released recently.

Dallas-Fort Worth area residents also say they've done more financial planning and view buying a new home as a more realistic goal than their national counterparts.

In this new poll, 1,000 adults were surveyed across the nation in 18 markets, including the Dallas-Fort Worth area. Here are some of the key findings:

- 63 percent of North Texans are hopeful about their future finances, compared to 53 percent of respondents nationwide.
- 54 percent of North Texans say they have planned a great deal for their future finances versus 39 percent of respondents nationwide.

• Only a quarter (25 percent) of North Texans view buying a new home as not realistic, compared to half (50 percent) of respondents nationwide.

As the Life Tracks Poll points out the need to take greater action to prepare for our financial futures, it recommends three immediate actions to help improve your financial health:

Financial professionals can guide you through this information and help you set financial goals. Crawling With Life

Once again, the two sisters found themselves on a familiar path to the nurse's office at school. They were sent there by their teachers who noticed the troubling symptoms of another round of head lice infestation. Head lice are wingless parasitic insects that live on your scalp, feed on your blood and lay their eggs in your hair. They are very tiny, about the size of a sesame seed, and when they move around on the scalp, it can feel like a tickling or crawling sensation. Lice infestation is not a sign of uncleanliness or poverty. Anyone can get lice. They are nondiscriminatory about whom they choose to crawl on. They spread by crawling from person-to-person and by the sharing of personal items, such as combs, brushes, hats or headphones.

The earliest and most predominant sign of lice infestation is itching with resultant scratching. The itching is because of an allergic reaction to the saliva excreted from the louse (singular form for lice). Intense scratching can cause open wounds which can then become infected. Another visual to determine if lice are present is the actual bug itself and its eggs, which are called nits. Nits are deposited on the hair shaft next to the scalp. One can find the bugs most often on the back of the neck and behind the ears.

Getting rid of lice is involved but worth it. There are products and medications available over the counter (OTC) and by

prescription to kill lice and their eggs. Follow directions carefully. Use a fine toothed comb on wet hair to remove nits. Check the hair of all persons in the household. Remember to wash all brushes and combs in hot sudsy water. Afterwards, either soak them for an hour in isopropyl alcohol or replace them. Sheets, pillow cases and clothing that have come in contact with the infected person need to be laundered using hot water. Items such as large comforters or stuffed animals that cannot be laundered should be placed in a plastic or airtight bag tightly sealed for at least two weeks. The environment, floors and furniture, should be vacuumed thoroughly. For children under the age of 2, check with their health care provider before using any chemicals or OTC medications. For them, it is usually sufficient to remove live bugs and nits by hand.

Having lice may be embarrassing, and it is definitely annoying. However, the good news is that with effort they can be eliminated from your home and your head.

In The Kitchen With Tanya Kennedy

As a youngster, Tanya Kennedy had her own countertop, rolling pin and flour supply for making tortillas. Rolling, flipping and rolling, Tanya earned great respect from her mother for how perfectly round her tortillas were. Into her 30s she practiced and learned, even taking tips on technique from a local Fort Worth chef, Louise Lamensdorf. Tanya found in her early 40s that she was, in fact, a good cook, and has even done video demonstrations of many of the below recipes.

Her meals at home are usually big entrees, guaranteeing leftovers for several days. When entertaining, she makes multicourse meals complete with dessert and wine pairings. Tanya tastes the good life in Joshua, just outside the Metroplex yet close to fine grocers carrying good brie, portabellas and wine.

Buttermilk Ranch Potato Salad

- 5 lbs. gold potatoes, peeled and cubed
- 2 Tbsp. dijon mustard
- 5 Tbsp. white wine vinegar (divided use)
- I bunch cilantro, finely chopped
- 3 shallots, minced
- 5 cloves garlic, pressed
- I red bell pepper, smoked and chopped
- 1 cup mayonnaise
- I cup buttermilk
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. pepper
- 2 tsp. dill
- **1.** Place potatoes in enough boiling water to cover. Cook for exactly 12 minutes. Drain and spread on large baking sheet. Combine mustard and 3 Tbsp. vinegar. Pour over hot potatoes.
- **2.** Combine remaining 2 Tbsp. vinegar with final 9 ingredients.

3. After potatoes have cooled, place in large bowl and combine with dressing. Serve immediately or after chilling.

Chicken Parmesan Soup

Croutons:

- 1/4 loaf French bread
- 2 Tbsp. olive oil
- **3 Tbsp. garlic and herb rub (divided use)** *Soup:*
- 1 1/2 cups unsalted chicken broth
- 2 cups marinara sauce
- 1 28-oz. can diced tomatoes with garlic and onion
- 2 1/2 cups chicken breasts, cooked and diced
- 1 14-oz. can black beans, drained
- 3 garlic cloves
- 1 oz. Parmesan cheese
- 3/4 cup mozzarella cheese, shredded (divided use)

- **1.** For croutons: Cut bread into 3/4-inch cubes. Toss bread crumbs, olive oil and 1 Tbsp. garlic herb rub in deep stone casserole dish. Microwave on high, uncovered, for 3-4 minutes, stirring every minute until they begin to brown. Spread on parchment paper.
- **2.** For soup: Stir stock, remaining garlic herb rub, marinara sauce, tomatoes, chicken, beans and garlic into casserole dish. Microwave on high for 11-13 minutes.
- **3.** Grate Parmesan and stir into soup. Top soup with half of mozzarella and half of croutons.
- **4.** Top with remaining mozzarella. Put lid on casserole dish for 2 minutes. Serve soup with remaining croutons.

Stuffed Meatloaf

- 2 lbs. ground chuck
- 3 carrots
- 3 celery stalks
- I large sweet onion
- 1 28-oz can diced tomatoes, drained
- 2 eggs
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. pepper
- 2 8-oz. pkgs. cream cheese
- 1 9-oz. pkg. frozen chopped spinach, thawed
- **I.** Heat oven to 350 F.
- **2.** In large bowl, break up hamburger. Dice carrots, celery and onion; add to bowl. Add tomatoes, eggs, salt and pepper; combine.
- **3.** Line large baking sheet with foil. Unless you have wide foil, you will need to overlap two pieces. Spread meat mixture over entire baking sheet.
- **4.** In food processor, combine cream cheese and spinach. Spread cream cheese mixture over the meat, keeping within 1 inch of the edges. Begin to roll the meatloaf up like a jellyroll by using the foil to lift the meat up and rolling it. Seal edges of foil together.
- **5.** Bake for 35-40 minutes or until internal temperature is 160 F.
- **6.** *Variation:* For an extra touch, pipe 1/2 cup mashed potatoes on top and sprinkle with Parmesan cheese. Bake for an additional 10 minutes or until lightly browned.
