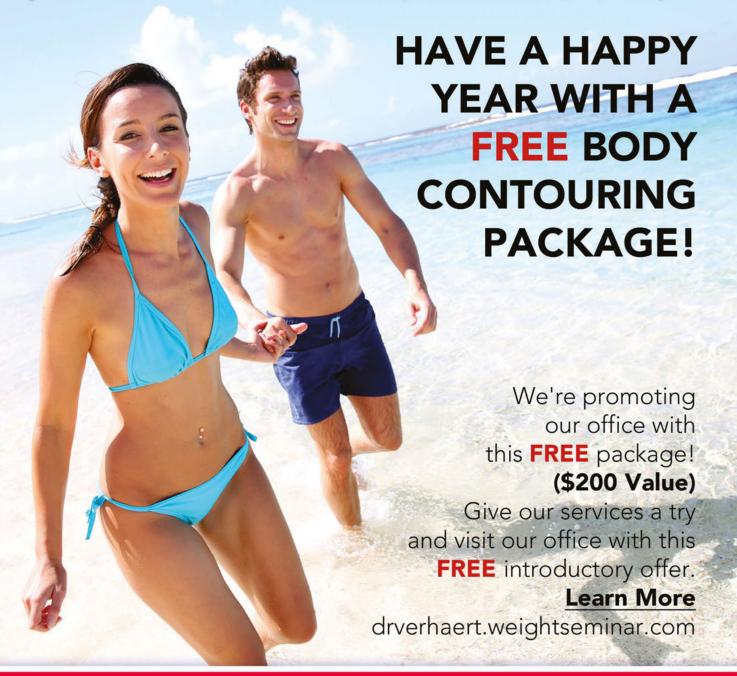

P.S. New year, new look and some fresh, new ideas! The NOW Magazines team has been working hard on this project, and we hope you love it. Cheers!

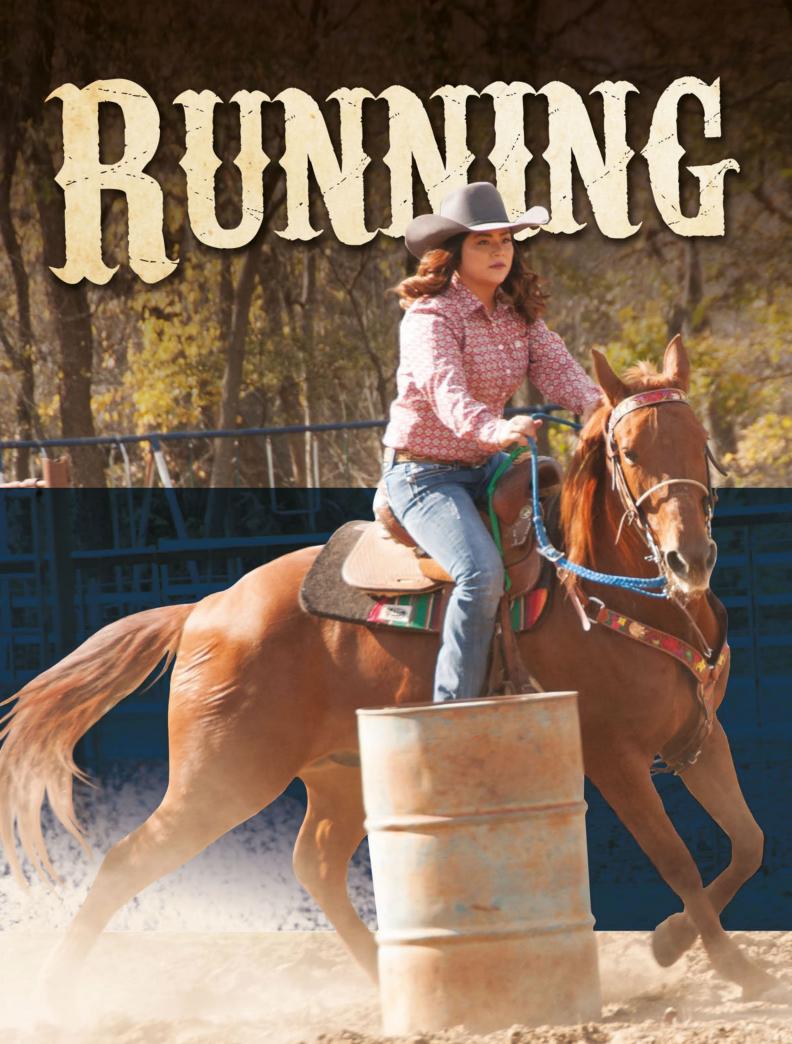

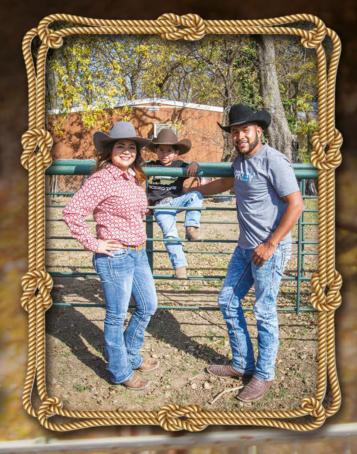

Out of the gate, a flash and dash around three barrels as fans scream support, blasting down the alley to a halt and then waiting for results that will, hopefully, include setting a record and taking home the gold — that's barrel racing. Greats in the sport, like Ennis' Mary Walker, are an inspiration for Yolanda Morales who started racing in February 2017. "I love the adrenaline rush," Yolanda said. "Every time we compete, it's different."



An equine enthusiast prior to competing in barrel racing, Yolanda has owned a horse for the past five years and ridden trails for fun with her fiancé, Oscar Don Juan, and Giovani, her 3-year-old son. Oscar's ranch is home for their horses. But when she found Spicy Peach, a barrel racing quarter horse who was previously owned by friends, Valeria Diera and her dad, Eusebio, 28-year-old Yolanda started training and setting goals for gold. She hauls Spicy to Rancho la Rosa in Alvarado, where the Dieras live, for a weekly training session. She also competed on Tuesdays in buckle series competitions during April through May, with her first run at the M7 Arena in Alvarado, Glen Rose and the Fort Worth Stockyards. "Each week, if you place 1st, 2nd or 3rd, you get points," Yolanda explained. "We've been 2nd in 5D competition. My goal this season is to win a jackpot buckle."

During her first ride on Spicy, she knew that he knew what he was doing, even though she didn't. "But Spicy made me feel comfortable. He's not a big, expensive horse, but he can do everything I want to do. I had never thought about competing in barrel racing before. It was our chemistry and bond that made me want to continue to learn more. We trust each other and think and move

as one. The other girls who have been doing this all their lives inspire and encourage me to get better every time," Yolanda said. "This is a whole new world. Every run is filmed and critiqued, so I can have a cleaner run next time. I want to prove myself worthy."

To ride, train, care for a horse and compete, one needs to be prepared physically, emotionally and mentally. "It's a stress reliever for me, but hauling, training and maintaining a horse is a lot of work," Yolanda said. "At first, I felt it physically all over. Conditioning for both Spicy and me takes time."

The attributes of perseverance and having a positive attitude, drive and work ethic are all important to success. Keeping focused and in the moment during training and competition is critical to success and safety for both the rider and the horse. "In Glen Rose, I wasn't focused," Yolanda recalled. "I knocked down the very first barrel after rushing in to compete. I learned that a poor first run can govern the rest of the competition, unless I can overcome it. I have to be mentally prepared to ride every time."

Yolanda's best memory made, to date, was her first competitive ride. "It was the breaking point," she recalled.

"Was I going to do this thing or not? I went in and did it with the support of my friends and family. I don't think anyone ever forgets their first run. All I could think at that time was, I did it!"



With every ride, Yolanda gains confidence in her abilities to compete well, overcoming her late start in this rodeo event and being able to handle the physical demands of riding at an increasingly higher level. In that way, she's following in Mary Walker's footsteps. Mary, the 2012 WPRA (Women's Professional Rodeo Association) World Champion Barrel Racer, won her title at the age of 53 on her horse, Perculatin "Latte," who earned honors that same year as the AQHA/WPRA Horse of the Year. After losing her son in a car accident and experiencing a fall during a competitive run on Latte in 2011 that resulted in multiple injuries to her, Mary fought to recover and regain confidence and trust Latte. Her 2012



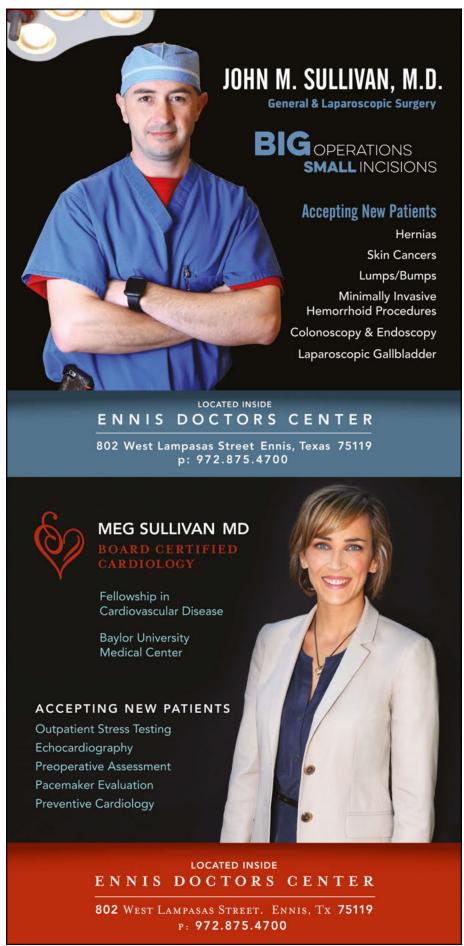
comeback is legendary in the world of barrel racing and inspires Yolanda.

"The rodeo world is a whole new world to me," she said. "People are so nice, sharing and caring. Through this experience I've learned to have more patience. This is a fun sport."

Yolanda is an involved mom. To support her family and sport, she has worked two jobs for eight years, which makes it challenging to find time to ride and train. This Ennis native daughter is a hairstylist at Salon de' Allure and is a justice of the peace court clerk. "I love my hair clients and enjoy making them feel special," she said. "I'm really busy, but the payoff is that no matter whether I'm at work, with my family and friends or riding Spicy, I'm somewhere I want to be. That makes everything worthwhile."

For Yolanda, the joys far outweigh the challenges. "First, riding horses is time I spend with my little family. Second, I have the feeling of running free. Third, I get to bond with an animal that weighs so much. And fourth, I'm gaining trust and confidence with every ride." Yolanda's discovered what Winston Churchill meant when he said, "No hour of life is wasted that is spent in the saddle."

"Anyone who has a dream or goal they want to pursue," Yolanda advised, "should just take a chance and do it."

wall beside an entry table purchased new, but painted and roughed-up to look old.

The floor plan is almost completely open, providing space for large gatherings from the front to the back. The dining room is a walk-through area that leads to the kitchen and family room. Over the dining table hangs a pendant light from a boiler room where Nick once worked. It originally used a 300-watt bulb but has been transformed into a normal socket and restored to the original green finish.

Nick carefully fashioned the cabinet doors in the kitchen. White rules the room with touches of metal, stainless and fashionable softcolored decor. An unbelievable find rests at the end of the counter that houses the farm sink. The couple had wanted a Sub-Zero refrigerator, but the cost seemed astronomical. After searching a social media site, they ran across a 48-inch-wide, Sub-Zero refrigerator, made in 1991. "The only problem was the yellow color of the front panels," Nick said with a chuckle. Of course, they painted the panels white, and it's a highend addition to their refurbished kitchen. An old-fashioned scale hangs in the corner that was rescued from a general store that Cassidy's grandfather frequented as a child.

The modest home has two bedrooms and two baths. Cassidy has each room professionally polished, even though the renovation is still incomplete. "We are willing to wait





for what we want," Cassidy shared, as she spoke of future projects to be completed in the house.

"This refurbished home represents the kind of people we are," Cassidy said. "We try to make the best of everything, to see the positive in life." Because of this perspective, the home is filled with items that could have been tossed but, instead, became unique and useful additions to their home. 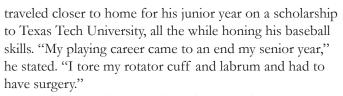
# Where **NOM** s Kellen Monreal

Kellen Monreal was a toddler when he first wrapped his little fingers around a baseball and picked up a ball glove. "It was about the same time I learned to walk," Kellen remembered. You'd think playing baseball would be expected, especially since Kellen came from a family of ball players. His dad, Pete, and older brother, Cole, loved the game and had played since they, too, were quite young. "But, I was never pushed to play," he explained. "I grew up in a small town and baseball was what kept us out of trouble."

He played on baseball teams — city, school and select — from the time he could walk all the way through high school. He was the tall, lanky young man in the baseball cap who always had a smile on his face. Kellen vividly recalls his junior year at Ennis High School. "We went further in the playoffs than any other EHS team," he explained. "We went three rounds deep."

Kellen also played football and basketball, but his main focus was always baseball. The effort put forth in his sport of choice earned him a partial scholarship to New Mexico State University. He then transferred to New Mexico Junior College as a sophomore. From there, he



As they say, when one door closes another one opens. But, it took a few years for the door to the right career to open for Kellen. From 22 to 25, he worked his way up the ladder making money. He traveled all over the country installing equipment. He learned what it truly meant to "live out of a suitcase." Each promotion came with more money, but it also came with a transfer to a new location. It seemed each new location took him farther away from home. "After a couple years, I realized life wasn't all about making money," he admitted. "I had to make a choice, and I chose to come back home. I no longer wanted to be a traveling man."

In the back of his mind, Kellen knew he wanted to coach, he just had to put the "young man mentality of making money" to rest. He was at a point in his life where he wanted to enjoy going to work every day. He needed to excel at something he would enjoy, something he felt he

would be good at — that something proved to be coaching.

A couple of close friends gave Kellen the encouragement he needed to pursue his newfound career. Once the decision was made, it didn't take long for the proverbial ball to roll. "I flew into Dallas from North Carolina on a Friday morning. Later that same day, I took the Social Studies Composite test," Kellen said. Following the test, he went on a coaches' retreat, not knowing if he'd passed the needed test or not. "Before the weekend was over, I learned through an email that I had most definitely passed the test," Kellen explained, sharing that it's not normal to pass the difficult test on the first try. "I knew my career choice had changed. I called my parents first and my boss in North Carolina second."

Kellen coached at Arlington Martin High School for a couple of years, and is currently teaching U.S. history and world geography and serving as the head baseball coach and the assistant football coach at Kemp High School. "It just made perfect sense to coach both baseball and football, since I played both myself and was on a couple of championship teams as an Ennis Lion," he shared.

#### Chicken Stew

This recipe can be doubled or tripled and can be cooked outside in a large stew pot over an open fire.

- I whole chicken
- 1 16-oz. bag frozen corn
- 2 14.5-oz. cans diced tomatoes
- 1 2-lb. bag carrots, washed, peeled and diced
- 6-8 medium-sized potatoes, washed, peeled and diced
- I small onion, washed, peeled and sliced
- 1 46-oz. jug V8 Juice, Spicy Hot
- I tsp. salt
- 1 Tbsp. pepper
- 1 Tbsp. garlic powder
- 1 Tbsp. chili powder

#### 1 tsp. paprika **Cornbread or crackers** Choice of cheeses, sliced or chunked

- 1. In a pot, boil the chicken until done; drain, reserving the broth for later use.
- 2. Let the chicken cool while preparing the vegetables. When cool enough to handle, debone, remove skin and shred the chicken.
- **3.** In a large stock pot, add the shredded chicken, vegetables and next six ingredients. Cover with the reserved chicken broth; extra V8 juice may be added if needed during cooking.
- 4. Bring the soup to a boil; turn down heat to low. Keep covered, and cook for about 1 1/2-2 hours.
- 5. Serve with combread or crackers and sliced or chunked cheese.

- 3 oz. cream cheese, cut into small pieces I cup pecans, chopped
- 1. Drain the cherries and pineapple, reserving the juice. Add water, if necessary, to make a total of 2 cups of liquid.
- **2.** In a saucepan, bring the juice to a boil; add the gelatin. Stir until it dissolves.
- **3.** Remove the saucepan from the heat; stir in water. Chill mixture until it reaches the consistency of an unbeaten egg white.
- 4. Fold in the cherries, pineapple, cream cheese and pecans.
- **5.** Spoon the mixture into a lightly oiled. 7-cup mold or dish. Cover; chill until firm.

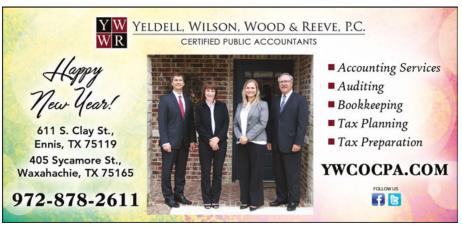

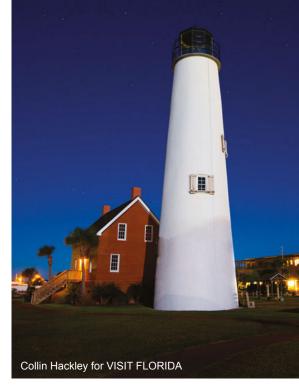

#### Getaway to Good Times

Northwest Florida often gets less attention than Miami and Orlando, but it makes an ideal spot to explore and relax without the crowds. Sugar-sand beaches, emerald waters, historic landmarks and sunny outdoor adventures await families or couples designing the perfect getaway.

You don't have to venture far beyond the Alabama-Sunshine State border to find a treasure of activities, ranging from museums and mini-golf to waterfront dining and fishing. At the northwest tip of Florida sits beautiful Pensacola, known for its protected beaches and 18th centuryera restored neighborhoods.

Santa Rosa Island is home to five fascinating all-brick forts built to defend coastal Florida after the War of 1812. Fort Pickens, finished in 1834, was active until 1947. Walk through the halls where soldiers were in the Civil War, World War I and World War II and where the great Apache leader, Geronimo, spent seven months after he was captured in 1886.

Fort Barrancas was built on the ruins of an old Spanish fort and finished in 1844. Fort McRee was built too close to the water with too much wood in its construction and was blasted to bits by artillery in the first months of the Civil War. The ruins are clearly visible near the surf at Perdido Key.

If the family is up for another threehour drive continuing east on US-98, St. George Island is a perfect getaway along the water. Climb the 92 stairs to the top of the Cape Saint George Lighthouse, built in 1852, for a beautiful view of the island and surrounding waterways. St. George Island is also home to 17 miles of paved bike paths and numerous off-road trails for exploring. Jolly Roger Beach Shop rents bikes by the hour, day and week and is located in the center of the island.

For sunset, stop by the Blue Parrot Oceanfront Café for fresh seafood. cocktails and a great view of the water. Don't miss trying the fresh Apalachicola Bay oysters while you're there.

And if you want an even closer look at the sparkling waters, check out Journeys of St. George Island to charter boat trips for great fishing, rent kayaks or take your little ones on the guided dolphin tour or sunset cruise.

Whether you wish to relax or explore, look no farther than the sunny shoreline of northwest Florida. Its rich history combined with soft beaches and nature trails make it your getaway for good times. NOW

#### Gluten-free vs. Low-carb1

- Know why you are changing. Fruit is high in natural sugars, which is better than foods with added sugar, but too much fruit can still be a bad thing. The key in low-carb eating for weight loss is to avoid sugar and sugar substitutes like aspartame and sucralose as much as possible. If you need something other than water to drink, try unsweetened tea with a fruit wedge, instead of diet soda.

#### Diabetic Diets<sup>2</sup>

- Control your glucose. Diabetics should eat at regular times, with a focus on healthier foods like fruits, vegetables and healthy carbs. This helps the body produce and regulate the insulin it either makes or gets from injections.
- Know what to avoid. Diabetics are at a higher risk of heart problems, so limiting the amount of both saturated and trans fats is important. Fats in avocados and almonds are healthy in moderation, but animal proteins and processed foods aren't. Sodium and cholesterol should also be limited.

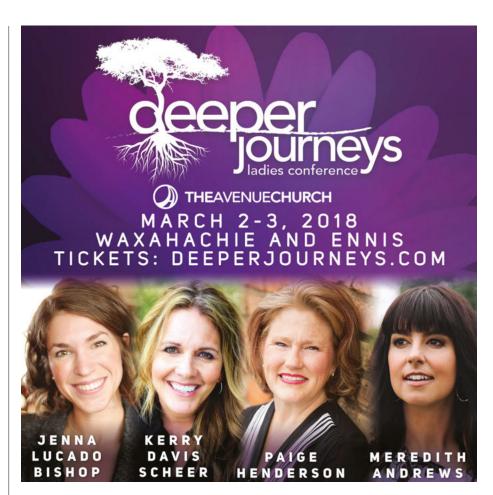
#### Heart Healthy<sup>3</sup>

- Make good choices. A heart-healthy menu includes good fats like those in healthy oils, nuts and seeds. Limit saturated fats and avoid untrimmed beef or hot dogs. Instead, choose good proteins like lean ground meat or poultry, eggs and legumes.
- Follow a plan. Find a variety of healthy options and buy groceries with a menu in mind to get food that meets your nutritional needs, while limiting the unhealthy options you are trying to avoid. And include a sensible "cheat" meal once in a while to curb cravings for unhealthy options.

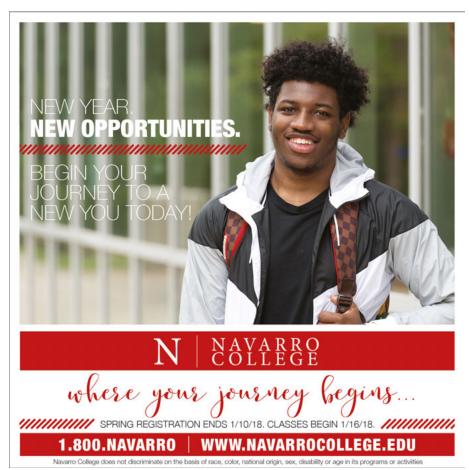

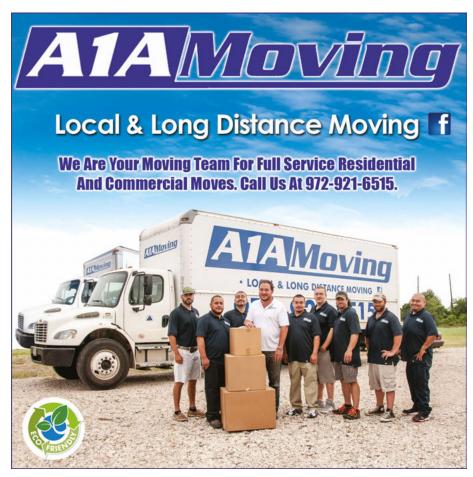

# Match Short- and Long-term Goals With the Right Investments

Not all investments are created equal. Some are better suited for short-term goals, while others can help you build resources for objectives far in the future. As an investor, then, one of your biggest challenges will be to match your short- and long-term goals with the appropriate investment vehicles. How should you proceed?

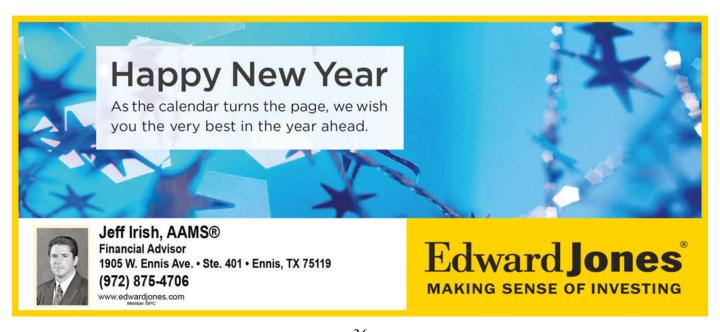

Consequently, you may want to avoid stocks or stock-based vehicles, which will constantly fluctuate in price, because you don't want the value of your investment to be down at the moment you need the money. Instead, for short-term goals, you may want to consider a fixed-income vehicle, such as a bond, which is designed to provide regular interest payments and return your full principal upon the bond's maturity (providing the issuer doesn't default, which, with investment-grade bonds, is generally unlikely).

For longer-term goals, such as college for your kids and a comfortable retirement for yourself, it's a different story. To achieve these goals — and especially for retirement — you generally need to accumulate as much as you can. As a result, you need investments with growth potential, which means you will need to consider stocks and stock-based instruments. As mentioned above, stocks will always fluctuate in value, and they may be worth more or less than your original investment when sold. However, building a portfolio with an investment mix that's appropriate for your risk tolerance, and that contains a reasonable amount of growth-oriented vehicles, can potentially help you overcome short-term volatility and continue making progress toward your long-term goals.

Plus, you have some attractive long-term options available. With a 529 college savings plan, you can save for college and possibly achieve tax benefits, too. And by contributing regularly to your IRA and 401(k) or similar employer-sponsored plan, you can defer taxes while spreading your dollars among a wide range of investments. But there's one thing all long-term investments have in common: You need patience and discipline to stick with them.

So, there you have some ideas on short- and long-term investing. Keeping this distinction in mind when you invest can help boost your confidence that you're making appropriate moves for all your goals.
