

A North Pole Christmas

Brenda and David Coldiron wanted to take a trip, and they decided they would go "north to Alaska." They liked it so well there, they stayed for nearly 20 years. They bought a home in Fairbanks, but soon moved right on to North Pole,

Alaska, where the spirit of Christmas lives year-round. "My husband and I, and my two boys, went on a vacation in April of 1984," Brenda recalled. They went to visit David's sister, who



lived there at the time. They were amazed by what they saw. "We had never seen snow machines before, and my husband was so excited when he first saw them that he drove off the road into a snowbank," Brenda remembered with a laugh.

"The country was so beautiful there; the air was so clean — I knew that was where we wanted to raise our boys. David Ray was about 1 1/2 and Scott was 7 months old. I knew we would be able to fish and hunt and snowmachine and ski."

"I flew home and settled our business in Texas," David explained. Then, once in Alaska, David began working at Tip Top Chevrolet as a mechanic, and Brenda worked at Corroon &

Black, an insurance broker, and then at Baker & Associates. Christmas in North Pole sparkled with light and magical holiday festivities. "The Santa Claus House in North Pole would be really, really decorated," Brenda said. "They have

reindeers and a huge [40 foot] Santa that you can have your pictures taken with. There were lots of decorations there and on the post office."

At Christmas, neighbors would take turns gathering at each other's homes for Christmas dinner. "We would have Thanksgiving at one house, and have Christmas at another," David said. Five or six families would get together to share the holidays, since most people didn't have relatives who were close by.

Brenda is from Texas, but David grew up in Chicago. "I left Chicago when I was 13 and I had missed the snow!" David said. "I remember one year growing up in Chicago, it snowed so much, we had to go up to the second floor and jump out the window to get out and shovel snow."


Alaska had enough snow to satisfy David. "You have eight months of winter there," Brenda mentioned. By the first week of October, the snow comes and lasts until March. "There is always snow on the ground for the whole winter. You have to shovel snow from your sidewalks and your decks and even the roof, or the snow gets too heavy on it."

During the winter, the days are shorter. "You can get down to four



hours of daylight," Brenda said. "In the summertime, you can have almost 24 hours of daylight. You just want to go and do things, because you have so much light," Brenda recalled. In the summers, the boys played baseball, and the family liked to pan for gold and go camping. "In the winter, you just want to sleep a lot. When the kids were little, we played lots of games in the winter, and David and I got in a bowling league and bowled."

The Coldirons fished and hunted year-round. "The Chena River was two miles from our house, and the salmon and halibut are wonderful. I loved the

fish." Brenda said. "In the winter, we would cut a hole in the ice with ice augers and do ice fishing. The ice is so thick that people would drive their vehicles out on the lakes."

Once the Coldirons moved to North Pole, they bought a two-story, cedar-sided house, surrounded with birch trees. "Outside walls are six inches thick, instead of four," David explained. "You have triple pane windows." They had a helpful neighbor, a long-time Alaska resident, who kept



trap lines. He took them under his wing, and helped them learn how to hunt.

"We hunted caribou, moose and bear," Brenda said. "It is so cool during hunting season that you don't have to worry about the meat spoiling."

"Caribou is better than venison," David said. "We never bought meat at the grocery store. Between the moose, caribou, salmon and halibut, our big freezer was always full. You never want to get more than one moose per winter; that provides a lot of meat. My son's first moose had a big 52-inch rack."

David recalled one time when the men had a winter hunt. They went by snow machine to hunt caribou, getting three or four to bring home. "A dressed caribou gives about 350 to 400 pounds of meat. When we had friends that didn't get to go out, everybody shared."

In fact, cooperation between neighbors in Alaska is common. "Neighbors, co-workers and friends became like extended family," Brenda said. "Everybody up there is so nice and friendly. Everybody tries to help each other, and you don't even lock your



During the first six years they owned the property, the Spaes built a boathouse that served as the family's weekend getaway from the hustle and bustle of Plano. Then, the company where Bill







missions. I picked people up that were trapped on roofs from hurricanes or floods. That is a really great feeling." He also was assigned to fly dignitaries on occasion. "One of my very first assignments was to fly the secretary of energy to a geothermal well outside of Houston. That was an experience. I just thought, 'Here am I, a regular guy, taking a United States cabinet member in my helicopter." He also flew Bing Crosby's wife once. "I picked her up at the airport and took her to a charity event."

After six years as a DPS pilot, Don made the leap to the corporate world, as a helicopter pilot for Grant Corporation and then Mac-Carey Properties. He was drawn to this area when he accepted a pilot position with R. E. Hable Construction Company in Corsicana. "We moved to this area, and bought a house in Blooming Grove." Don reared twin daughters and a son there. "They turned out to be great kids. I am extremely blessed," Don said. He decided to go back into law enforcement, since he really wanted the stability of a long-term job while he was rearing the children. "I spent 14 years with the Navarro County

Sheriff's Office. At the same time, I did maintenance for the Blooming Grove Independent School District, helping build the baseball and football fields, and working security for ball games." While the children were growing up, Don was vice president of the Corsicana Girls Softball League. "My twins, Brittney and Courtney, played high school softball and they went to state all four years. They graduated second and third in their senior class and went to college on academic and softball scholarships. I really like getting to see my son, Clay, and his wife, a school teacher, a lot now, because he lives close to me. Clay enjoys working in the Avalon area as a heavy equipment operator."

With the young Cokers on the way to adulthood, Don began to explore his flying options again. "I thought I had put that behind me. I really never expected to fly again." Then, a former DPS state police pilot recommended Don as a helicopter pilot with an air ambulance service called Critical Air. "They hired me, and I really liked working for Critical Air; they are good people." After three years, when Air Evac Lifeteam bought Critical Air, Don stayed on and eventually became a base pilot supervisor in the city of West, Texas. "Air Evac Lifeteam told me they were going to open the Ennis base, and asked me if I would like the job. We opened at the Ennis hospital in mid-July, and it is a good experience starting up a new base." He was glad to have a shorter commute from Blooming Grove, where he lives with his wife, Terri, and is also now the proud dad of two grown stepdaughters, Jennifer and Corey. Terri also works in Ennis at Alliance Data.

"Air Evac is very safety conscious," Don said. "We are very communityminded. What makes it possible for us to do our job is our cooperation with local firemen, policemen and medical



personnel." The team's base-life functions much like a fire station. "We each have our own crew-quarter room, and we have a living area where we have a refrigerator and a microwave. During off-times, we can work on continuing education, but when a call comes in, which is usually from one to three times a day, our job is to be ready to go."

The team makes transports from

hospital to hospital whenever a patient needs to be moved quickly. They also answer emergency calls, especially providing rapid transport for people in rural areas. "I like scene calls the best. It may be at night, and we go into different kinds of loading zones (LZs). I have an 875,000 candlepower light to use for illumination to watch for wires, cell towers and obstacles. We move into the LZ and orbit a couple of times to make sure it is safe to land. Then, the medical team gets out quickly and goes to work."

Some calls are especially gratifying. "We got a call to transfer a lady from Hillsboro to Waco. I landed, and the medical crew went inside the hospital. Before transport, she went into cardiac arrest. The Air Evac medical crew saved her life."

"Flying is a passion for me. I've really enjoyed it. I spent a total of 30 years as a lawman, but this is a good occupation. I am working with true professionals. It is a great experience to be involved in seeing someone's life saved."

The production of his second album, With a Woman Like You, did





premature when he wrote them, but they have all managed to come to fruition in one way or another. "Once I start something, I always finish it," he said.


Dave is not through seeing the country. Although he has settled into living in Corsicana, he would still like






accepted the challenge — although he did not find writing about his passion to be a challenge at all.



Life is **Full of Choices**

Barbara LePoris has been a counselor at Lee School of Choice since the program opened in 2005. "I love it here," Barbara said. "It is great. We have students come here who are behind. We can catch them up and accelerate them. It is good for the kids. The first year we were opened, we had 32 students graduate, and the second year,

34. Those are students that wouldn't have graduated otherwise." The Options Program at Lee is for Corsicana High School (CHS) students who are two or more years behind where they should be, credit wise, or are at risk of dropping out.

"As our students graduate, and places become available, we look at juniors and seniors, and pull in people who we think would benefit from the program," Barbara said. "Eventually, our goal for this year is to move up from our present enrollment of about 60 to an enrollment of 80."

When a student is behind and struggling to catch up, they can work at their own pace with the computer-based curriculum at Lee. Students work individually, not in a normal classroom setting. "We have two programs: one is called

an A+ program and is on our servers here. The teachers are here at the campus and can do one-on-one help. We also have Advanced Academics, which is an Internet-based program. Students can talk to teachers, who are based all



that class away from campus and take the tests here."

Lee also offers a night school on Tuesday and Thursday, so students can work during the day. "If a student from CHS

> has taken a class and not passed, they can come to the night school and recover that credit. Or, if you have a senior that needs nine credits to graduate and they can only take eight at the high school, they can come at night and take that class."

"We see good results from the program. We like to recognize students who have successfully graduated, so we have a ceremony for them and have their parents here. We have cake and punch." If students choose, they can also go to the regular graduation ceremony at CHS.


As an academic counselor, Barbara's job is to make sure everybody has the classes they need in order to meet their goals. "I meet with students and we talk. I want to know what their plans are; what do they want to do when they go

out of here. If I have an idea what they want to do, then that helps me figure out what classes they need to take, and what is their next step for getting into a two-year or four-year college or a technical program."

Barbara was previously a counselor at CHS. "I've been in the school district since 1967. I took two years out when I had our daughter, Anna, so this is my 38th year." Barbara went to the University of North Texas (UNT). "It was a good school; a good time. I'm



from Abilene and thought I wanted to go to Oregon, because it sounded exciting. After graduation, I was working at a summer camp near Marshall when I found out about the job opening in Corsicana and it sounded fun. I was so glad I came; it is a great place. It is better than Oregon." The first year she was at CHS, Barbara met her husband, Bill, a math and science teacher at the school. "He was a great teacher," she said, with a smile. "He taught physics and calculus." Barbara started as a teacher of physical education and health. "I had the drill team, which was called The Blue and Gold Brigade then; I had boys' and girls' tennis and girls' track."

Eventually, Barbara decided to go back to school at Commerce and get a master's, returning to become a counselor.

When Barbara retired a few years ago, although she enjoyed having the time to work on her place in Corsicana and visit her family in Abilene, it was not long before she missed the students. "It was hard for me to be away from





the kids; working with the kids is the whole idea," she said. "I missed it, and so I came back to CISD. Most of my friends are in the district, and I missed them. The high school needed some help with a program there, and I had the opportunity to go back part time." She also worked at Collins for a half-year, and then came to the Lee School of Choice.

"Life is full of choices; we all get to make them; we all get to live with them. That is what I talk about with students. Many students have no plans for the future. We talk about where the choices they have made in the past have gotten them." Barbara reminds them that they cannot do anything about their choices of the past, but they can do a lot to change what is coming. "What we do here can help students make the choices to get where they want to go."



In the Kitchen with Helen Griffiths

oming from New Zealand, a beautiful country with only four million people and 70 million sheep, it is not surprising that lamb tops Helen's list of favorite dishes. "I want to share a roast lamb dinner, complete with trimmings and topped with New Zealand's famous desert — Pavlova," Helen said.

Lamb is meat from a sheep under a year old, after that, it is referred to as mutton and destined for the stew pot. "With the advent of boning the leg, half the fun and flavor went with the bone. New Zealand lamb is available at Sam's, and the leg is wrapped in a net which makes it really sporting when one tries to remove the webbing from the cooked lamb without losing all the scrummy spices," Helen said. WOW

ROAST LEG OF NEW ZEALAND LAMB WITH ROAST VEGETABLES

(Allow 40 minutes per pound for well done.)

- 4 5 lbs. lamb (New Zealand lamb is already boned and rolled in a net)
- 2 Tbsp. seasoned salt
- 1 2 Tbsp. black pepper (to taste)
- 1 2 Tbsp. garlic powder (to taste)
- 1/2 cup flour for dusting
- 1 cup of olive oil or previously-saved drippings
- 6 quartered potatoes (rolled in 1 cup flour with 1 Tbsp. salt & 1 Tbsp. pepper)
- 3 4 quartered parsnips (optional, not everyone likes them)
- 2 3 quartered onions
- 6 Tbsp. flour for thick gravy
- 2 cups water for gravy
- 1 tsp. kitchen bouquet 1 tsp. salt (to taste)
- 6 average-sized julienned carrots (or one per person) 15-oz. can Le Sueur baby peas

Place lamb in roasting pan and season with generous

amounts of seasoned salt, black pepper and garlic powder. Shake a dusting of flour over the roast for gravy purposes. Drizzle olive oil or previously-saved drippings over the roast and seal the juices by cooking at 400 F for 30 minutes. Lower the heat to 325 F and slow cook around 3 hours depending on the size. In the final 1 1/2 hours, add potatoes, parsnips and onions, placing them around the roast and basting every now and then. When done, remove the roast and keep warm. Pour off the oil and grill veggies for a few minutes to make crispy. Remove roast veggies, drain fat leaving 1 Tbsp. and make gravy with scrapings, adding more flour, water and kitchen bouquet for color. Salt to taste. Serve with baby peas and julienned carrots. Use Mint Sauce for final dressing.

MINT SAUCE

1 cup finely chopped mint leaves boiling water 2 Tbsp. sugar 1/2 cup apple cider vinegar

Put mint into a jug. Cover with boiling water. Add sugar and vinegar. (Personal tip: Toss the sugar over the mint leaves to speed up the chopping.)

PAVLOVA

(Made in honor of the Russian ballerina, Pavlova, when visiting New Zealand, in the early 20th century)

- 3 egg whites*
- 3 Tbsp. cold water
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 tsp. vinegar
- 3 tsp. corn flour (cornstarch)
- 1 tsp. vanilla

Preheat oven to 225 F. Using an electric mixer, beat egg whites until stiff. Add water and beat again. Add sugar very gradually while still beating. Slow beater and add vinegar, cornstarch and vanilla. Line an oven tray with greaseproof paper. Draw a 9-inch circle on the paper. Spread the mixture within the circle keeping the shape as round and even as possible. Smooth top surface over. Bake for about 1 hour. (It is really just drying out.) Carefully lift Pavlova** onto a serving plate. Decorate with whipped cream and fresh fruit, i.e. kiwi and strawberries. Serves 6.



Who's Cooking

*Use the leftover egg yolks in steamed, boiled or baked custards.

**I hold a plate in position above the Pavlova. Quickly rotate for desert to set on plate — remove waxed paper. Add cream and toppings.

LAMB CURRY (WITH LEFT OVER ROAST LAMB)

1 1/2 Tbsp. plain flour salt and pepper to taste

Approximately 1 lb. cubed cold lamb

1 - 2 Tbsp. olive oil

1 large onion, chopped

2 garlic cloves, crushed

1 Tbsp. Indian curry

3/4 cup liquid chicken stock small handful of golden raisins

Combine flour, salt and pepper in bowl. Coat cubed meat in seasoned flour. Heat olive oil in a large saucepan. Add onion and garlic and cook until clear and remove the mixture with slotted spoon. Add half the meat and quickly brown all over. Remove and repeat with remaining meat. Return meat and onion mix to saucepan, add Indian curry. Mix well, and then add chicken stock stirring well. Bring to a boil. Toss in golden raisins, cover, reduce heat and simmer gently for an hour or until the meat is tender. Serve over steamed rice with optional coolers on the side. COOLERS: sliced bananas, cucumbers, tomatoes, pineapple cubes, fine coconut, cubed apples.





school is not in session. We offer resources that people really need here."


Though Betty will be stepping down from her presidency, she will

continue to be involved with the library, which she believes will be a wonderful place for the


community to gather. Many older people will become regulars, and we will notice if someone doesn't come in and call to check on them."







Year End Planning Opportunities

The clock is ticking and we are running out of year. As 2007 is winding down, here are some things that you can do that will make a positive impact on your financial life between now and year end.

Get organized. See if you can do a little record keeping cleanup over the holidays. Update your records. Knowing exactly what you have and why you have it is an important step in helping you make smart choices about your money. Develop a game plan that is consistent with your values and lifestyle. Formulate a budget. I apologize for using the dreaded "b" word; however, a budget is critical in order to manage income and expenses.

In order to head off a family feud, get your estate plan in order. Everyone has an estate, and it is important to them that their money, family and possible charitable interests are taken care of. If you do not have a will, go see an estate attorney as soon as possible. Also, if you have a will and possible trust documents, make sure they are current and up to date with your present intentions. If you are already in retirement and over the age of 70 1/2, make sure you calculate and take your required minimum distribution (RMD) from your qualified accounts. If you fail to take your RMD amount by year end, there is a 50 percent penalty of what you should have taken, but did not.

In the retirement area, there are two additional concerns that need to be mentioned:

1. Risk

Many investors are not aware of the risk and volatility to which their current portfolio is exposed. Having the proper asset allocation of your retirement accounts is the most important factor in ensuring that there will be enough money waiting on you at retirement and making sure that you will not run out of money during retirement.

2. Failing to plan for catastrophic medical expenses

Many expenses decrease or stay the same in retirement, with one notable exception: health care. With increasing

Women's Health, Part 2

Last month, I highlighted the top 5 causes of death in the U.S. for women. You may have been surprised by some of them. This month, I would like to explain what your OB/GYN is really there for, and what is happening when you come to us for that "annual exam."


