

One morning in 2001, a firefighter rode into his own Bermuda Triangle of tragedy that began with a 30-mile bike ride. An accident caused him to be thrown into a ravine with the force of the impact paralyzing him from the neck down. As he lay there, out of the visual field of motorists, with fire ants crawling on him, he devised a way to take his life and put himself out of his misery. However, a series of miracles or coincidences saved his life. Alex Allred, local author of 15 books, chronicles the story of Alex's own life reads just as interesting as the characters in some of her books. Growing up in Moscow, Russia, she recalled her daily sprints to elude the tenacious KGB agents. Later in life, while being four-and-a-half months pregnant, she became a member of the first U.S. women's bobsled team. Her winning performance earned her the title of Athlete of the Year by the United States Olympic Committee. Being somewhat of a daredevil, Alex was not afraid of taking on a challenge. However, writing this book became a difficult ordeal because of her conflicting emotions about God

and her original belief that life was about connected coincidences. In addition, Marshall's story, while inspirational, has some heavy and heartrending moments.

"When I was fighting God, I wrote three full books of 300 pages, and it didn't work," she exclaimed. "It wasn't until the end that it all came together. That was a God thing, too. The last time I wrote the book, I decided to let it fly. It was a relief to let go. My thoughts went

back and forth: Was it a coincidence that I met Marshall? I was sent to Marshall. I'm on a mission. I'm part of the mission!

"When I started to write again, it went so quickly because it just flowed. I was so into it [writing the book] that I broke all my own rules. If I have a good book concept, I do my query, a rough outline, a couple of chapters and I'll send it off and just keep writing it. The kind of feedback I get will let me know if I'm on the right track. In this case, I didn't care. I just wrote it, rewrote it twice and then sent it out."

Alex received two instant hits back from publishing houses that wanted to see the book. One hit back was a definite no, but Alex was not discouraged because, "It was the most amazing rejection letter I've ever gotten, so I saved it," she smiled. "He said it wasn't right for his publishing house, but he knew I would get published, and, he wanted to be on my Christmas letter list!"

The publisher from World Audience Publishers in New York contacted Alex and said, "We want to do the book." Having never heard of them, she researched and discovered, "They are babies in the publishing world. I told Marshall, it's a gamble with a new Happy Holidays! MISD



publishing house. I ended up talking to the publisher at World Audience several times, which is really rare. You usually talk to an agent. You don't talk to the publisher. It was new, exciting and questionable, but I really liked the guy." After several conversations with him

He explained, "T'm going to need to send you a new contract of 30 percent so Marshall and you can each get 15 percent." Recalling that moment, Alex said,





"We were team teachers," Candy said with a smile. For more than 20 years, the two were the best of friends teaching English and reading in the Lancaster school system. While both were married to other people, their commitment to their students formed a strong bond between them. "I'd also bring her coffee every morning," Ray smiled. "And jelly beans!" Candy added.

Though they joke about their early teaching days, they both forged a critical path for many at-risk students who faced tremendous obstacles. They grieved with their students when a few were murdered, lost to gang violence, but cheered far more often when students raised up far beyond the expectations of others. The Boyds were fearless leaders and mentors, friends and confidants. But when they each went through a divorce and Ray left the school district and state,



charming two-story home built in 1901, with all of its original wood flooring, tile and even a 1919 coal-burning stove in the middle of old town Midlothian. 

complete with a wooden banister. It is charming and quietly elegant.


The stairs blend perfectly with the formal dining area. Again, antiques offer a feeling of tremendous warmth but are also fully functional. One china

complements to the woodwork and plethora of pictures hung throughout the home. Pictures of family coincide with older portraits of landscapes, flowers and wilderness settings. The tone is cathartic, leaving one very definite impression: This is home. Candy's style of decorating, especially during the holidays, with oldfashioned ornaments, rich colors and fabrics and different Christmas trees in each room, is traditional. It honors family, history and community.

Even the back porch and yard are representative of this. A tin roof that covers the back porch, "because we like the sound of rain," Candy said, protects the two porch swings and table setting that overlook what can only be described as a hidden oasis. Heavy ivy and other plants, including seasonal flowers, and a



rock slab pathway weave patterns around the yard. A koi pond that contains two fountains, birdhouses and a side deck with yet two more table settings offer the feel of a secret garden. 





French horn, trumpet, guitar, piano, bass and vocals may sound like the makings of a band, but for college student Patrick Campbell they are a few of the instruments and talents he has developed thus far on a list of many more he would like to add to his musical repertoire. He has lived and breathed music most of his life, and it has had a major impact on his future.

It all began in the sixth grade with the



To those who prefer the English saying of "on guard," the meaning is essentially the same; it is time for the participants to get ready to compete. David Allmon and his son, Jace, are familiar with both terms. Although new to the sport, they have come to appreciate its cerebral and physical nature. "The whole thing is a chess match," David stated. "You have your offensive moves, with your main offensive move

being a lunge. You lunge. You extend. You parryriposte. (Parry is a block, and riposte is a lunge). You have to draw them in, move your sword different ways and do feints or fakes. My favorite thing about fencing is it is a mental game. When you do research about fencing, it's about strategy. You see reference after reference about this being real chess. Chess is a game of battle, wit and strategy."

Jace acknowledged the mental aspect of the game. "I like the mentality of it. You have to constantly think about everything you're doing. Heaven forbid you do the same thing twice," he said smiling. "Patterns in fencing are bad




because they [opponents] discover them and will oppose or hinder you. Everything is pre-thought out. There are endless amounts of combinations of things that you can do. You're thinking, *Am I going to run inside the sword or attack ontside the sword?* If I attack outside the sword, their parry is going to be here. I can disengage and come back in. 

One of the necessary features of fencing is the weapons — the swords. There are three weapons associated with the sport: foil, saber and epee. Because the club is a sport club, the foil has a plastic safety tip. "Currently we are studying foil. It is a practice weapon and is the smallest and lightest of the three," David stated. "Each weapon has its target area. For the foil, it's strictly the torso. The epee is heavier than foil. It is the only weapon in the current sport of fencing that is in the same form it was designed hundreds of years ago. It is essentially unchanged. It's not a practice weapon and hasn't been adapted to fencing. It is actually a sword that came into being around the 17th century and was used up into the 20th century when wearing swords went out of vogue. A lot of guys are drawn to the epee because it is a real weapon. The entire body is the target area."

The saber, patterned after the cavalry weapon and used during the Civil War period, is the only weapon in fencing that uses a slashing motion. David stated, "It does not have a sharpened edge, but you fence with it as though it does. The target area is waist up, so the arms and head are now part of the target area. The epee and foil are the only thrusting weapons. Each weapon has its own personality. You fight differently with each of the weapons. With us being newbies, we are just sticking with the foil for now."

David has enjoyed this additional opportunity to have another positive connection with his son. One of the signs someone is enjoying themselves is when they ask others to join them. David and Jace hope others will come see for themselves what the fun is all about.



For the best-looking dog in the neighborhood, all you have to do is sit in your home and relax. Dina Klotz of Glamour Dog Salon will drive to your address and take care of everything. Her mobile van is a traveling salon and holds everything necessary to turn your pooch into a well-groomed dog. As the owner of three Yorkies, Dina loves caring for Muffin, Millie and Missy. "We have always had a dog. I love all kinds of animals, but Yorkies are my fave. I decided I did not want to take them to groomers, because I wanted to bathe and groom them myself."

In 2009, Dina went to a program in Arlington called Texas Allbreed Grooming School (TAGS). She explained, "It is a 12-week program for instructing individuals to know the basics and to become a pet stylist. I got my certificate as a certified pet stylist from TAGS."

After Dina's training was completed, she had to decide if she would practice her profession in a storefront or in a mobile unit. "I decided on a mobile van, because I like that I can be flexible with my time. My youngest son is still at home. My mission as a mother is to have my children as my first priority. The benefit of a mobile unit for the clients is just the simple fact they don't have to get in the car and drive their dog to a storefront. I will drive to their home. Their dog doesn't have to stay in a kennel several

hours or all day and is not subject to other dogs barking and other distractions. Your dog is never kenneled and receives oneon-one care."


Dina's service area is within a 20-mile radius of Midlothian, and she only grooms dogs weighing less than 40 pounds. Her grooming van is a fully self-contained van that never needs to hook up to your home for any reason. She has her own electricity and fresh water on board, even a tank that receives the dirty water. "Every dog is bathed at least twice, sometimes more, until I am satisfied that they are clean," she stated. "The bath includes trimming their nails, cleaning the dirt that is visible in their ears and cleaning their sanitary area."

One of the more enjoyable aspects of her van is her hydro-surge bath system,

which offers a deep-cleaning experience and helps with one of her specialties handling dogs difficult to groom. "The system I have massages the dog through the entire bath process," Dina explained. I do what I can to make sure they have a good experience in my van."

I have a deep passion for what I do, and it helps others because it helps the owners feel good, knowing that their dogs are being loved, cared for and cleaned. had enough of the big city!"

When Cherie returned to Midlothian and implemented the bilingual program, her goals were "for the students to be bilingual and biliterate in both languages. We don't want them to lose their

Spanish as they are learning their English." Students in the program at Vitovsky are growing and flourishing in their studies. Cherie stated, "Our children have gone all the way through since prekindergarten, and they are heads and shoulders above our ESL (English as a Second Language) only students. The research showed they are scoring out much better."

Bilingual education is part of the Texas education system. Cherie described the school's responsibility: "By state law, if you have 22 or more in one grade level in a school district and their first language is all the same language and they qualify as limited English-proficient students, then you have to start a bilingual program. Some districts will file a waiver, but we decided that because the population demographics were changing that we would go ahead and investigate programs. We visited lots of bilingual programs in the area and went to workshops to determine what the best program model would be. We started at prekindergarten and kindergarten, and last school year we added fifth grade. So, we have now completed the program and have it all the way through fifth grade."

For a child who has been in the program from the beginning, the instruction is primarily all in English by the fourth or fifth grade. The school does continue with Spanish maintenance so

Cherie Wagoner, principal of J.A. Vitovsky Elementary School, created something special for her school. It houses the only bilingual program in Midlothian. This is a natural fit because Cherie originated the program eight years ago as principal of Baxter Elementary School. "The program moved with me over here six years ago," she stated. "That was exciting to start and implement a brand new program. It was the first time having a bilingual program here in Midlothian, and I must say, I think we have a real good one."

Cherie prepared for this field while in college. At The University of Texas at Arlington (UTA), she had a double major in elementary education and in Spanish. She earned her master's degree in counseling at University of North Texas. While getting her degree, she also became bilingually certified. Returning to UTA, Cherie earned her administrative certification and superintendent certification. She also has 18 hours toward her doctorate degree.

Cherie remembers when she first came to Midlothian 25 years ago and started doing her student teaching here. She said, "I got hired on as a fifth-grade teacher at J.R. Irvin. I went away for a short period to be a bilingual teacher in Ft. Worth and decided I wanted to come back to Midlothian." Laughing she added, "I'd

the students do not lose that language. Cherie attributes much of the success of the program to the program model they use. "I think the program model we have is a very developmentally based program. The children only do Spanish, writing, reading, listening and speaking in the lower grades, and we slowly transition over time. A lot of programs immediately immerse them in English, and that defeats the purpose.

"Another reason for the success is we have a very strong teaching staff. They are highly qualified and just outstanding. They are certified bilingually and are fluent in both languages. Once they come here, they stay because they have been in other bilingual programs in the area and they feel like this program is head and shoulders above wherever else they have been in terms of support. We have had strong support from the administration in anything we needed in training and materials."

Cherie is very proud of what Vitovsky has accomplished. The school has been at exemplary level for the last two years without needing exceptions or TPMs (Texas Projection Measure). Community volunteers in the school's mentoring program have helped with the success of the students. "We have a huge mentoring program on campus," she said. "Last year there were about 48 community members who came in and mentored students. We've seen kids really turn around [because they know] there is another adult in their life who cares about them.

This is probably the most diverse campus in Midlothian, but we embrace that. We don't hire anyone here unless they ascribe the same philosophy we have that all children matter. We want all children to be successful at the highest level, whether they have a disadvantaged background, a learning disability or even our gifted students. I could step away from this campus and the kids would still be successful, because this campus really works very closely together. It's a unique place to work. There is something special about Midlothian Independent School District and about J.A. Vitovsky. If Midlothian wasn't a great place to be, I don't think I would've stuck around 25 years!"





Health MOW BREATHING EASIER

An elephant is not really sitting on your chest; pneumonia just makes you feel as if one is. The manifestations of pneumonia can indeed make breathing difficult. This infection resides in one

or both lungs and usually owes its origin to a viral, fungal or bacterial invasion. Foreign substances such as aspirated vomit can also cause pneumonia. When the lungs are invaded, the air sacs or alveoli fill with mucus, pus and fluids. The exchange of oxygen and carbon dioxide occur in the alveoli. If they are full of another substance, the alveoli's function is impaired, and it becomes more difficult for oxygen to reach the cells of the body.



Most of the time when the foreign matter enters the body through the nose, mouth or eyes,

our immune system is strong enough to fight off an infection. However, if a person is in a weakened condition, the infection has the opportunity to grow and spread. That is why the elderly, children under the age of 2, a person with pulmonary disease, someone undergoing chemotherapy or anyone with an impaired immune system is at a greater risk for becoming ill. Having an upper respiratory infection, such as the flu or a cold may make you more susceptible to pneumonia. Chronic or long-term conditions, such as heart problems or cancer also make it easier for the pneumonia germs to take hold.

Several factors determine what symptoms an individual with pneumonia will experience. Some of the symptoms are chest pain, cough that produces mucus or a nonproductive (dry) cough, fever, chills, rapid breathing, racing pulse and extreme weakness. Often older adults experience milder symptoms.

Treatment will depend on the type of pneumonia one has and the severity of the condition. With bacterial pneumonia, your doctor will probably prescribe antibiotics. With viral pneumonia, antibiotics are usually given if you develop a secondary infection. Other palliative treatments for pneumonia which address the symptoms are pain relievers and fever reducers.

Practicing good hygiene, such as washing your hands often can help you avoid getting an infection. Get an influenza and a pneumococcal vaccine on the advice of your health care provider. Try to avoid those who are

ill with respiratory illnesses. If you smoke, please stop. Smoking makes you more susceptible to pneumonia. If you do get pneumonia, take care of yourself by drinking lots of fluids, eating properly and taking your medication responsibly. Make sure you keep your follow-up visit with your doctor. Get completely well so you can stay healthy.


