



Another big year for the Waxahachie Junior Service League's Christmas Market, which is always held the first Saturday in December, has come and gone with attendance and proceeds rivaling 2011's phenomenal turn out. The annual event to raise funds for worthy organizations across Ellis County is now in its 26th year, and program committee members, Kristi Autrey and Stacie Sipes, are impressed with the increased support they've witnessed. 'Last time, we raised \$20,000 for our charities, and we believe we will top

"The 2012 Christmas Market and Gift Show was a huge hit," said Stacie, who is in her third year with the Service League and second year on the program committee. "And we owe it all to the sponsors, vendors, shoppers and volunteers who make it happen."

Making it happen is what the Waxahachie Junior Service League (WJSL) has been doing for 60 years. Founded in 1952 with Mrs. W. H. Getzendaner as its first president, the League encourages volunteerism in a wide variety of community organizations that also receive monetary support through fundraising efforts. "We're proud of the long history of the Waxahachie Junior Service League," Kristi said. "Each of the charities we support is special."

Among the organizations that benefit from League programs like the Christmas Market are Ellis County EXPO, Gingerbread House, Habitat for Humanity, Hope Clinic, Meals on Wheels, the Sims Library, Waxahachie CARE and the Women's Resource Center. "League members volunteer and raise money for over 40 groups," Stacie pointed out. "And the groups are not all based in Waxahachie, but are countywide." In the past, the League has operated an outreach for exceptional children at the American Legion Hall, supplied teacher's aides for special education classes at area elementary schools and taken part in the Tour of Homes. The League has also published a series of cookbooks and for some years accomplished a yeoman's service for the Chamber

of Commerce and the Department of Health. In addition, the League sponsors the Sue Stroope Art Scholarship and WJSL Community Service Scholarship.

Today, the greatest philanthropic effort the group carries out is the annual Christmas Market that opens at the Waxahachie Civic Center with a preshow evening mixer. Their guests can enjoy drinks and hors d'oeuvres, as well as participate in a silent auction and raffle.



"At the preview show there are always great gifts available from the vendors, and this year the raffle offered two round-trip tickets on Southwest Airlines," Stacie outlined. "It's always fun for everybody, and really it sort of kicks off the spirit of the season, for us as members and volunteers and for the public."

The next day the main market opens with more than 100 vendors offering their wares at the Waxahachie Civic Center. Apart from the ever-popular Christmas items, some of them one-of-akind, the merchandise on display ranges from clothing and accessories to home decor and lawn and garden products. Booths offering custom-painted interior signs and designer handbags were among some of the most popular vendors at the 2011 Christmas Market and were sought after again this year. "We had a packed house last year with over 1,600 attendees," Kristi enthused. And while there's no tally yet, the crowds filling the center this year likely exceeded that record. Aside from the attraction of so many beautiful gift items, the public was entertained by performances by Lone Star Martial Arts and the Gymnastic Zone. Stacie and Kristi are used to seeing many return visitors to the showcase, which nurtures a sense of family and camaraderie. "I think people want to stay involved in their community, and







this is one big way to do that," Stacie said. "It's a great place to start your Christmas shopping and at the same time know the money you spend is going to such good causes."

Kristi concurred. "It's such fun and is a real family outing for a lot of people. We love to see the moms and daughters coming out, and even the moms, daughters and grandmas. But there's stuff here for the guys, too, so it can be a whole family affair."

One regular attendee of the Christmas Market is Jana Martinez. "I come every year," she admitted. "I don't live in Waxahachie anymore, but it's not too far from Dallas to come for some great deals and to catch up with old friends."

Mary Donner, of Rice, also doesn't mind the drive to Waxahachie to jumpstart her Christmas shopping. "I have always found such neat items there, and I just make a day of it."

For Kristi and Stacie the Christmas Market is equally exciting, but it has a deeper meaning, too. "When you see firsthand how the funds we raise actually impact the lives of people," Stacie said with emotion in her voice, "it is so fulfilling and makes you realize God is at work." Kristi was equally moved in discussing the aid provided by the Junior Service League to such organizations as the Campfire Creek Therapeutic Riding Center, an equine assisted therapy outreach geared to children and adults with disabilities and terminal illnesses.

Campfire Creek, currently the League's long-term project, was established in 2004 by Emily Oliver who maintains the 501(c) 3 entity with the help of

half weeks following the accident, Steve woke up to questions an 11-year-old boy should never have to ask. "The story I was told was that my dad, Champ Mitchell, had been slapping me to get me to wake up," Steve said, sharing the story as he best remembered it. "The doctors didn't like his method, but look at me today. I'm proof it worked."

Champ, the boxer who once fought Sugar Ray Robinson and Jake Lamotta, wasn't about to let his son wither away. A body atrophying was not an option. A

week after Steve "woke up," he returned home to continue the recuperation process. "My dad was persistent," Steve confessed. "Dad felt I still had so much to prove to the world. He wasn't about to let me lie in bed and feel sorry for myself."

The road to recovery was filled with many volatile moments. The things which once came naturally to Steve had to be relearned. Steve's mom wanted him to rest while she took care of his needs; his dad wanted him to "hurry up and get better."

"Dad would carry me from the bed to the wall. He would tell me to put my hands on the wall and then put them at my sides. I would do this over and over again until I became too tired to stand any longer," Steve said, explaining the first of many challenges he would have to face in his lifetime. "This exercise taught

me how to balance again. Dad knew what I needed. He knew what was good for his son."

Before the life-changing accident, Steve was in the latter half of the fifth grade. He was an active member of the Flexsteel baseball team. By the time the next school year began, Steve was once again playing little league ball. "I got hit in the head with the ball. My mom was in the stands freaking out," he admitted. "I shook it off and ran the bases. I guess I was a hard-headed young man."

His second challenge came at the age of 13 when Steve began training to be a boxer. His dad had boxing in his blood, so it



seemed Champ wanted Steve to have it in his, too. "I was fighting for me and my dad," Steve shared. "I had something to prove, and my dad didn't know any other way than to push. He pushed me hard to be successful." At the age of 17, Steve competed in the Golden Gloves, where he was crowned the Light Welterweight Champion. "I won with a TKO (technical knockout)," Steve said. "I had the hardest punch in the state as a teenager."

Steve had class to go with his punch. When he would knock his opponent down or out, he would always help him back up. He was a champion who believed in sportsman-like conduct,









something he came by on his own. "I just loved what I was doing at the time," Steve added. "I liked being a champion. I knew being a champion meant I had to win, and sometimes I had to hurt my opponent to win."

One three-day tournament came to mind as Steve reminisced about the past. His opponent was a Spanish guy who head-butted Steve in the face as soon as the starting bell rang. "He hit me so hard he broke my nose," Steve said, rubbing his nose for emphasis. "That was on a Thursday. I ended up beating him with a broken nose. On Friday, I fought and won against a guy I'd beaten before. I won again on Saturday night. I won the

whole tournament with a broken nose and two black eyes."


Before long, his winning reputation caused his opponents to think twice before meeting him in the boxing ring. "They would gain or lose weight so they could move out of my division," he admitted with a smile. Everyone, including Champ, thought Steve would go "pro." But, he surprised them all at the age of 20, when he came to the ring and announced he was quitting the sport that had taught him so much about life. "During this time, I'd gotten married and had a little girl. My wife left with my baby," he said, describing yet another challenge. "All I did was cry and cry over the loss. My heart wasn't in boxing anymore. It wasn't into anything."

He got over his depression. He learned the art of karate, making it to the level of blue belt before moving on to his next challenge — stock car racing. He shared his love of racing with his second wife, Marla, whom he felt he'd known all his

life. "When I was in the coma, I spent time in heaven," Steve said. "God showed me the long road ahead. He showed me the hardships, but he also showed me Marla."

Life for Steve has been marred with one roadblock after another, some admittedly of his own making. To rise above the adversity, he knew he had to remain strong and vigilant, always climbing his way to the top in whatever he set his mind to. He survived a tragic




accident when doctors and injuries spoke otherwise. He found great success in boxing, karate and stock car racing.

This same attitude of proving himself has grown to include a book, *No Tears for a Hero*; a documentary, *CHAMP*; and an upcoming movie. Why a movie? "No one has ever done what I've done," he said with a strong conviction. "It's important for me to tell my story, so it can inspire others to be all they can be and to do all they can do. It's important for people to rise above and never give up!"

At the age of 56, Steve continues to learn new things. He is still finding success with the challenges that come his way. He believes in "mastering it and moving on." His mom inspired his tender spirit, while his dad was the driving force that pushed him to a life filled with successes. "If I can do it," he said, "anyone can do it. God will show them the way."













The Strongs met and fell in love when Sandra was still reeling from a divorce and after Kevin's wife had passed away. Introduced through mutual friends, they soon married and initially planned to live in Mesquite where Nebraska-born Kevin lived at the time. Sandra, born in Dallas, moved to Palmer when she was in elementary school and later lived in Ennis where she reared her sons, Jeremy and Nick. "When I moved to Waxahachie," Sandra admitted, "people just took me in

and loved on me, so I see them as my extended family, and I feel the same way about my readers. I love them. And, of course, I love our house!"

The three-bedroom, two-bath, brick home, nestled in an attractive residential addition near the city, has more than its 1,700-square-feet to recommend it. The home has style, thanks largely to Sandra, whose talents not only include writing, but cooking and decorating. Family and friends alike admire the unfailingly

individual touches Sandra adds to her environment, whether at home or work. She applies the same energy to all aspects of her life. Although Sandra is more talkative than her laidback, better half, the pair share a quirky sense of humor and a penchant for the outdoors. "We love horseback riding, boating and taking road trips," Kevin said. "We've been to Hot Springs, Arkansas, and Ruidoso, New Mexico, recently, and we really enjoyed ourselves."











With Christmas coming up, Kevin and Sandra are looking forward to spending time with family, which includes his son Shaun, daughter-in-law, Christina, and grandchildren, Dillon and Kaitlyn. Also visiting at Christmas will be Sandra's sons and their wives, Valerie and Mickey. It will be an especially poignant time. Kevin's parents have moved out of state, and Sandra's father passed away six months ago. "But we are grateful for so many other things," Sandra pointed out. "Falling in love again at our age, having our health and this beautiful home — it's all worth celebrating. In fact, it's been like starting over. New beginnings can be hard, but there's a lot of happiness, too." One of the bright spots of the last year has been the birth of Sandra's grandchild, Easton Rider, son to Nick and Mickey. "Easton has been such a compensation for the loss of my father," she confessed. "It's sort of like the changing of the guard."

Kevin and Sandra consider themselves big kids when it comes to Christmas. "My fondest memory as a child was watching the *Rudolph the Red Nose Reindeer* cartoon on TV," Kevin reminisced. "And I recall our aluminum tree with all the colored lights."

Sandra remembered, with much levity, a Christmas gift she received as a little girl that didn't quite please her. "It was a Crissy doll," she said. "Well, I was a tomboy, so I cut all of the doll's hair off and drew tattoos on her!"

The couple's Yuletide memories have inspired their dedication to decorating for the season. explained, "because they're heavy enough not to blow in the wind."

A White Willow manger scene, with tiny, handcrafted figurines, sits atop the entertainment center in the living room. Ornaments bearing messages peek out among the greenery and twinkling lights that surround the group: "Unto you a child is born" and "God so loved the world." Nearby, a mantel, full of cleverlyarranged Santa Clauses, sparkles with lights tucked into pine branches. Dolls, ceramic figures and crafty cutouts, are all assembled against a backdrop of artistically wrapped presents above and hand-embroidered stockings below. In this room, the Christmas tree is hung with hundreds of bright ornaments in the form of balls, bows, snowflakes, Santas, crosses, dolls and angels, topped by a golden star. Sandra's favorite ornament is a cameo suspended from a ribbon, enclosing a portrait of Easton, her "chunky little monkey."

Even the kitchen gets a Christmas makeover, and Kevin and Sandra delight in such festive touches as oven towels with the mottos "Naughty" and "Nice" printed on them. On the window beside the dining table, greeting cards are displayed from the blinds while a secondary set of stockings, one for each of the grandchildren and Max, the dog, are hung from the ledge.

Sandra likes to keep a little bit of Christmas in her home year round – witness a wall of decorative crosses and a painting of the Wise Men arriving by camel to honor the Christ child. But her passion for the season isn't confined to indoor enjoyment. Outside, in the garden that borders her front porch, arise painted wooden figures of Santa, his trusty reindeer Rudolph and a bevy of angels. Wreaths festoon the front door and windows, and swags of ornamented greenery and twinkling lights are strung between the pillars.

Although this year holds bittersweet memories for Kevin and Sandra, they are thankful for the chance to find love again, for the new home they share, for the grandson who brightens their world and for the opportunity to give back to others. "We believe in blessing people because we've been blessed," Sandra said. "Giving is so easy to do, and it's what Christmas is all about."







While drawing is her primary interest, Elizabeth has added a second passion















Bang Theory on TV. Elizabeth also likes to shop and cook, and all that stuff with her mom.



A trailblazing academy, once thought a risky experiment, is celebrating its sixth year as an integral part of the Waxahachie ISD. One of 58 facilities of its kind across Texas, Global High School maximizes the potential of students enrolled in its unique courses in science, technology, engineering and mathematics, subjects collectively known as STEM. Now also designated as an early college high school, Global's students can earn college credits beginning with

their freshman year and even graduate from high school with an associate degree. "All courses here are taught at a rigorous level," explained Don Snook, Global High's principal. "And that's true even during freshman and sophomore years, because our job is to prepare the students for the college classes they will take in their junior and senior years."

The implementation of a science and technology-driven campus that offers preliminary college education has been a runaway success, and Don and his assistant principal, Ken Lynch, are proud of the strides the school and its students have made. "It is very satisfying to see the progress of our students, who come from all over Ellis County, not just







Waxahachie," Don said. "I tell people in the community that we have ordinary kids doing extraordinary things."

Ken is equally encouraged. "We are currently at capacity with a little over

400 students," he pointed out. "We expect to have about 60 percent of our seniors graduate high school this year with their associate degree. Next year we expect that number to grow to as much as 75 percent."

The STEM plan was controversial when it was instituted by the district in 2007, but it has since won the public's full support. "At first there was the misconception that we were just a big experiment," Don reflected, "that we were





so different from the traditional system kids wouldn't get a normal high school experience." That concern has faded as classes grow and students adapt to an environment that is new, and yet not as different as many feared. While there is no athletics program, Global offers most of the same social events and activities, such as prom night, that teenagers enjoy at other high schools.

"There's also the perception we are



only a school for smart kids," Don continued. "Well, we're not a school for smart kids, but we do produce smart kids."

In fact, all Global High graduates have earned college credits and many have gone on to four-year campuses, some to Ivy League schools, some to Texas Tech University, the University of North Texas, The University of Texas at Austin and other leading state schools. Many have chosen to continue their education locally





at Navarro College, which already provides the courses that Global High students take to earn their formative credits and degrees. "We have a great relationship with Navarro," Don confirmed. "The school waives tuition and Waxahachie ISD buys the books, so our students don't have to pay for their college classes here." Moreover, college credit classes at Navarro are carefully worked into the students' schedule at Global.

One aspect of the facility's status as an early college high school which helps pupils is that all courses are administered as they would be at a university or community college. This prepares students for the future and enables teachers to maintain more control of curriculum and class structure. For instance, the bell system for ending classes at most high schools is not employed at Global. "Here the teacher starts and ends the classes," Don said.















"That way, kids get trained to listening to the teacher and working the entire time, not waiting for the bell the last five minutes."

Even physical education (PE) classes are conducted at the college level. "It's not just rolling a ball and playing," Don affirmed. "Students keep a journal of their fitness progress, of what they eat and how they exercise." The PE course is among the first freshmen at Global take, earning them three credit hours (along with their college orientation classes), and it helps set the tone for their academic experience at this exceptional campus.

"We mirror college more than we mirror high school," Don said, although he concedes not every tactic can be based on the university model. A kinder attitude accompanies disciplinary situations, for example. "Teachers don't kick kids out of class here like a professor might do at college for inattentiveness or not

doing homework," Don added. "Instead, I'm able to step in and help the student get motivated to finish their college course work."

Ken is similarly optimistic about the special curriculum and approach to study that Global sponsors. "Without attending an early college high school, a student is normally limited on the number of dual credit hours they are allowed to take," Ken specified. "But our students can easily get the 63 hours they need for an associate degree."

Both Don and Ken come to their positions well-seasoned. Don, a science teacher originally from Houston, has spent 15 years as an educator in the Dallas area. His past experience includes teaching and administrative posts in Duncanville, Irving and Mansfield ISDs. "When there was an opening at Global, with its focus on math and science," Don said, "it seemed a perfect fit."

In the business world for 10 years before going into education, Ken also has wide experience, serving in two Ellis County school districts — Midlothian and Red Oak — prior to Waxahachie. "I have taught every grade from fifth to 12th," he admitted. "I've served as an assistant principal at both the junior high and high school levels."

Ken and Don are excited about the future of Global. "Our students continue to be motivated," Don acceded. "They know coming in the expectations are higher, and they deliver every time."

Ken agreed, "We're also expecting to increase the number of students we send to four-year institutions, majoring in some form of engineering. We would like for every student to have at the minimum at least 26 college hours."

Both men find their jobs fulfilling. "I enjoy almost all aspects of my job," Ken said, "but I think I most enjoy supporting the teachers to enable them to be successful in teaching the students."

For Don the most rewarding part of his job is seeing the turnaround in students. "It's a thrill to see kids who weren't expected to graduate from high school, not only graduate, but do so with an associate degree in college. Many parents have told me it's been the answer to their prayers, so it just doesn't get any better than seeing these young people succeed."


shopper, attraction rider and children wishing to visit the North Pole Play Land.







A 2011 study from finance research firm LIMRA revealed that 41 percent of U.S. adults don't even have life insurance.

That doesn't mean it's not on their minds. Sixty-two percent of respondents said uncertainty in the economy makes having life insurance even more important than it had previously been.

Bringing up the subject can be difficult. It may be that discussing the unexpected death of a spouse is awkward. Or that one spouse already feels the pressure of being the primary wage earner. Or that a spouse who has recently lost a job will react negatively to the topic. But whatever the obstacles, talking about life insurance is critical to both partners — even if one earns substantially more than the other, or one doesn't earn an income.

To start the discussion, try these tips:

- Talk before you're in a financial crisis. Pick a time when you're not stressed and treat the topic as you would any other aspect of your financial planning.
- Make a plan that incorporates life insurance as a primary component of your overall financial strategy. Having a plan in place can be reassuring if your circumstances change.



- Set a monthly budget and learn what options you can afford. Schedule follow-up evaluations and adjust your coverage as your needs, family situation and income change.

- Focus your discussion on the love you have for your family and your desire to protect it from financial burdens, rather than on the possible death of a spouse.



The E Myth

It may come as a shock but vitamin E is not the panacea for scars some people thought it would be. Vitamin E is essential and has many necessary functions, but alas, not for scar removal. Hopes have been definitively dashed with a published report from the *Journal of the American Academy of Dermatology* (Dec. 2006) that concluded, "The evidence that topical vitamin E alone improves the cosmetic appearance of scars is poor. It is also associated with a high incidence of contact dermatitis. The use of vitamin E should, therefore, be discouraged." So, far from being the cure, it can cause additional problems and dermatologists consider it contraindicated for use for that purpose.

There are many positive functions for vitamin E. It is an antioxidant that protects body tissue from damage caused by free radicals. Free radicals are molecules that cause tissue damage. Free radicals are thought to contribute to visible signs of aging. This vitamin also plays a role in improving our immune system. The first line of defense for the body is the skin, and vitamin E, along with other vitamins, works to keep the skin cells healthy. Another function of vitamin E is helping in the formation and protection of red blood cells.

Vitamin E is a fat soluble vitamin found naturally in many foods and will interact with some medications and with some conditions. You should check with your doctor first before embarking on a campaign to increase intake of any vitamin. Believe it or not, in incorrect doses, some vitamins, particularly fat soluble ones that stay in your body for a while, can do more harm than good. For example, too much vitamin E can interfere in the functions of vitamin K. If you have taken too much vitamin E, you might experience headaches, diarrhea, nausea, fatigue, muscle weakness and possibly abnormal bleeding.

The total amount of vitamin E required per day is quite small. It is possible to get what you need from your daily diet. It is found in vegetable oils, olive oil, nuts, meats, eggs, vegetables and whole grains. Vitamin E deficiency is actually a rare occurrence and is treated by vitamin E supplements.

Although the news is disappointing regarding vitamin E and its relevance to helping improve the appearance of scars, the vitamin is extremely useful and essential for the proper function of many cells and organs within the body. If you eat properly every day, you will receive what you need for a healthy level of vitamin E. **NOW**



Mother's Orange Slice Cake

Cake:

I tsp. soda

1. For cake: Mix candy, dates and pecans in

a large bowl. Pour 1 cup of flour over the mixture; set aside.

3. Bake at 250 F in a well-greased and floured Bundt pan or small loaf pans for approximately 2 hours.

4. For glaze: Bring juice and sugar to a boil. Pour over cake.
