

These days, Jerrie Alexander is a writer on fire. Her page-burning tales of dark mystery and hot modern romance are making waves in the literary world of romantic suspense. Her first novel, The Green-Eyed Doll, was unveiled in December 2012 to the delight of reviewers and readers. At the age of 69, this woman has just begun to write.

Writing was an early dream for her. "I was a closet writer in my youth," she said. When her real life story took a bold romantic turn, she packed the writing away. "Life presented me with Jim, my John Wayne husband of 53 years now," she smiled. Life also presented her with two children and a highly successful career. "I stayed at home until the children were in junior high," she explained. "Then, I wanted to buy a new car, a Dodge Dart," she grinned. She found a job filling orders at Montgomery Ward.

Before long, order taking at Montgomery Ward evolved into a group leader with paid education. "I enrolled in creative writing











classes at what was then Tarrant County Junior College," she explained. That first job, then, morphed into bigger, more responsible positions with companies like Wal-Mart, K-Mart and Service Merchandise and ultimately, as operations manager over three import distribution centers. "I traveled a lot," she said. "Jim sold his construction company and, off we went. We lived in Arkansas and Georgia and finally came back to Texas. We bought a house in McKinney in time for our daughter, Jackie, to give birth to our granddaughter."

Although they were back in Texas, Jerrie still traveled from Oregon to Florida and, after another five years, time arrived for a life-changing decision. "We were preparing to leave for a company event in London," she explained. "I was 62 and had long passed the thrill of being a platinum traveler. I told Jim I had always wanted to be a writer, and he said, 'Go for it!" Happily, she unpacked and retired.

"We decided to sell the house in McKinney," she said. "Our son-in-law's family had lived in Mansfield for many years, and we knew this is where our granddaughter, Alexa, would grow up." Their McKinney home sold within two weeks, and with daughter Jackie's help, they found a house on a quiet Burleson cul-de-sac on 2.5 acres. "We love our neighborhood," Jerrie said. "Most of us are retired, and everyone watches out for each other. Nothing much happens on our street that everyone doesn't know about!"

Not surprisingly, Alexa is the apple of




her grandmother's eye. "She's 14 now, in the ninth grade and a brainiac athlete," Jerrie said with a smile. "She attends Oakridge School in Arlington, has been on the headmaster's list every year since first grade and plays varsity volleyball."

Meanwhile, Jackie is vital to Jerrie's writing. "She reads rough drafts and is my best critic," Jerrie said. "I also have wonderful friends. When we moved to Burleson, I didn't know anyone. I looked for a writing group and that's when I heard about a book club. We call ourselves Books and Broads." They meet monthly on the second Friday at the Burleson Library. "The group was so supportive throughout the agonizing process of getting my first yes from a publisher," Jerrie smiled. "They listened to me bellyache about the rejections and then, the day I received, not one, but two contracts, their cheers were deafening. They organized a surprise book signing party for The Green-Eyed Doll and presented me with a plastic tiara!"

Jerrie also belongs to Romance Writers of America, a national nonprofit writers association. "They're a great networking and information source," she said. "I'm a member, too, of the North Texas chapter and an online romantic suspense writers group."

She's also savvy about reaching out to her readers. "I blog on Mondays and am active on Twitter and Facebook," she said. "I think it's good to know people and for readers to know me."

Her experiences as a logistics professional and the years of travel have proved to be rich sources for her writing.







"I'm also a research freak," she said. "I'll have as many as a 100 pages of research before I begin to write."

Her fast-paced stories are filled with tension, death and danger, hints of humor and multiple points of view. "I begin with the bad guy," she explained. "He's the reason the story is here, the impetus that sets the wheels in motion and brings the hero and heroine together. Something has to drive him to be a killer, and for the story to be real, I must know the reason — the breaking point — so I spend time searching the Internet and reading FBI profiles."

A typical day for Jerrie starts early and, always includes her Chihuahua/ Pomeranian pal, Buddy. Buddy was severely injured, near death and a stray puppy when she discovered him in the backyard. Jim scooped him up. Together, they rushed him to the animal hospital. Today, Buddy is going on 3 years old, and he rules the roost. "Buddy and I get up at 6:30 a.m.," Jerrie said. "He loves his blanket and bed in my office and, it's in the mornings that I usually get most of my work done. I start by checking my Yahoo loops, Facebook and Twitter and reviewing questions and notes that I've written on a big white eraser board. Buddy stays with me until I get coffee, and then he's out the doggy door to his fenced-in yard."



To develop characters, Jerrie finds pictures that remind her of her heroine, hero and bad guy. "I like to have at least three points of view," she said. "I create profiles for each character and post them with the pictures so I always know who I'm writing about."

Her second book, *The Last Execution*, was released in February 2013 followed by a short story *Someone to Watch Over Me* in June 2013. The first of her Lost and Found, Inc. four-book series, *Hell or High Water*, was released in July 2013 and will soon be followed by *Cold Day in Hell*.

According to Romance Writers of America, writers are either plotters or pantsters (seat of your pants). "I'm definitely a pantster," she smiled. "If I start laying out a story, I'm not having fun anymore. If I know what's happening, I'm bored."

Her covers are striking. Her stories are riveting. The tension, peril, romance and humor are as hot as they come. Boredom is not something that comes with a Jerrie Alexander novel. Fortunately, this amazing woman with tales to tell has just begun to write.








"We get warrants to allow entrance, and requests for information from other agencies," Phil said. "And we take a lot of nonemergency calls." Whether people need city assistance outside of regular



City Hall hours, or just directions to an old friend's home, the communications specialists help. They are the nerve center of the city.

During lulls in their shifts, dispatchers encourage each other by patting each other on the back, for doing the best they could, and also by sharing techniques which have worked in similar situations. Outside of their shifts, the dispatchers' concern for each other shines through. When Phil spent a Christmas in the hospital, his co-workers made an effort



to bring the holiday to him. "There's a practical part of having a team, but also there's that emotional part," Phil said.

All of the dispatchers live in the Burleson area, and some are children



of people who grew up here. "We're interested in the schools, development and roads just like any other resident." Phil and his wife, Linda, moved here 20 years ago. The first 12 years they lived in Crowley, where they reared their son and daughter. Both have since married and live in Fort Worth, where the Lewises often go to visit their grandson. "It's great having them close while we enjoy living in this area."

Born in Maine, Phil met Linda at a Christian college in Pennsylvania. "I



had entertained thoughts of going into ministry," said Phil, whose father is a minister in New York. "But I worked in construction until I was injured in 1991." While he was working on a job at a supermarket in Danbury, Connecticut, scaffolding collapsed. Phil survived with a broken vertebra. After five months in a hospital and rehab hospital, his children already in grade school, Phil and his family adjusted to his new life in a wheelchair.

Two years later, he and Linda decided to move to a warmer climate. They chose Crowley, where Linda taught school and Phil attended seminary on and off. He has used the seminary degrees in lay positions in the churches they have joined. "It's something I enjoy doing," said Phil, who considered becoming a teacher. But we are not always in control of our destiny.

"I reached a point where I value my life more in terms of the relationships I'm in and not so much by what I am going to accomplish," he said. "I wake up and consider what is my wife doing, what are my kids doing and evaluate myself in terms of whether I am being a good worker, a good friend, a good church member and a good member of my community in relation to other people."

Despite his setbacks, Phil responded to his wife's encouragement and his own determination. "I found a way to be involved, and it's so much more rewarding than being a recluse," he said,





explaining that people with disabilities are very intimidated to look for work. "Sometimes it seems easier just to collect disability. I always encourage people to get out there and try. There are places to serve, to contribute — to be a part of society."

Prior to joining the Burleson Police Department in 2007, Phil knew few first responders. His brother, a volunteer firefighter, gave him an idea of what the dispatcher's job would be like. He recalled his time as a rural youth, when his dad pastored a church in Massachusetts in a place where getting emergency help could take a long time. Generally, a person would call the operator or a neighbor if they needed help. Phil remembers a church member who worked night shift as a police officer. "He did not talk about his job a lot," Phil said, "but we knew if we were out late and got in trouble we'd hear about it from Mr. Marcy, in a friendly way."

Now Phil works within a brave new world, where sometimes the 911 call is from a child playing with a cell phone. Sometimes it appears to be nothing but a pocket dial. "We call those back all the time. Ninety-nine times out of 100 it was nothing," Phil said, "but that one time out of a hundred, we can tell something is wrong and send officers out there just to make sure everyone's OK." It's comforting to know help is so close by.





This Craftsman-style house was known as one of the gathering places for young people in Joshua. In the early 20th century, people would sit on large porches and play games such as Snap, Spin the Bottle, Knock for Love or Drop the Pillow. My, how times have changed! The current owners, Larry and Cindy Jones, are

recreating nostalgia and opening their house to the community.

Cindy plans to open their historic home to clubs and organizations, and has already hosted some bridal and baby showers under the large white gazebo in the backyard.

J.E. Brumbach, who owned a lumber yard in Joshua, and his wife, Estella, started building the home in 1913, but

didn't finish until 1915. The Brumbachs had no children, but with ample space, they opened their home for the youth of Joshua to gather and socialize. Often, they hosted parties in the spacious living and dining room. The five-bedroom home has always been remembered by the older neighbors as being white. After a few owners during the '40s, Homer and Hattie Strickland bought the house in 1948. They made an apartment upstairs, which they rented to many newlywed couples. The house was fondly known as the Honeymoon Hotel, and many Joshua

couples began their marriage there. In 1963, the Stricklands sold the home to their daughter and son-in-law, Helen and Robert Bloxom, who owned it until 1985. The home had several owners from 1985 until Larry and Cindy purchased it from Jennifer Harper in 2011.



I get stories with every piece I purchase," she shared. "I look up the history on everything."

Larry and Cindy have created their own getaway upstairs. The bedroom suite once belonged to Cindy's great-grandparents. All of the beds in the home display patchwork quilts from Cracker Barrel indicative of the era. Cindy finds many antiques on Craig's List, including a free Hallet, Davis & Company piano, a fainting couch and a Victorian couch, which came with two armchairs she put in the sitting area in the master bedroom. The first antique Cindy ever refinished was an antique bar someone had painted green. She brought the wood back to its original luster, and her husband created decorative knobs by gluing the state quarter from each of the four states where they have lived.

Cindy also loves the holidays. She

dresses up the home for people to enjoy. She has so many decorations for Christmas that she recruits college girls to help her set them all up. Garland lines the stairs in the foyer, and a large Santa welcomes visitors with his jolly smile. Electric candles light each window in the dining room. Four live trees, each with a different color and theme, are arranged throughout the house.

Cindy's favorite, uniquely flocked black with white tips, is found in an extra bedroom. A red tree on the large porch has candy cane ribbon and is adorned with gold decorations. "I like to coordinate the color of the trees and rooms," Cindy said. "I get the trees from December Design, and they sponsor all the yard art for the candle walk." Standing guard on the porch is what appears to be a life-sized Nutcracker, but it is actually an antique polo player rumored to have once belonged to John Wayne's third wife. He is clothed in a red coat, gold epaulets and a tall black helmet, dressed up for the holidays each year.

Larry and Cindy were the first homeowners to showcase their home on the Candlewalk tour of homes. Many unexpected and interesting stories have come from that tour. People who lived in the house or resided in the Honeymoon Hotel back in the day, came to visit part of their past. One young 11-year-old boy stared at the antique organ so intently that Cindy allowed him to play it. Cindy is proud of the history in her home and enjoys people reminiscing about time spent there.

Larry and Cindy hope to make their historic home available to the community for events and allow school students to use the grounds for gardening projects. Cindy wants to plant red roses that would pop next to the home's white exterior. She would also like to remodel the carriage house and add a pool table and shuffle board. Her vision is to see young people enjoying the space like they did in times gone by. An adage on Cindy's bedroom wall says, Learn From Yesterday, Live for Today, Hope for Tomorrow. - Bird seed
- 3-5 pine cones

HOW TO DO IT. ▼

1. Make popcorn garland

by popping the corn per package instructions. Allow to cool. Using double thread cut at a length of your choosing, string popcorn.

2. Make orange swirls

by cutting a swirl pattern in oranges with a paring knife starting from the navel. Make sure to cut deep enough to reach the pulp. For safety, parents of younger crafters will need to do the cutting. If the swirls break, don't worry. You will just have more swirls for your tree.

- **3. Carefully pull** or cut pulp from peel. Remove navel to make hole.
- 4. Thread twine through hole to complete hanger. If the peel breaks, a hole will need to be made with the paring knife in the pieces without a navel. Make sure loop in twine is large enough for the swirl to hang freely from the tree limb.



Step 5 5. Smear peanut butter on white side of peeled swirl. Sprinkle heavily with bird seed.



6. Make peanut butter pine cone by tying twine to the top of the pine cone to make hanger.

7. Generously dot the tips of the pine cone with peanut butter. Sprinkle heavily with bird seed.

8. Decorate an outdoor tree with your bird-friendly ornaments and then watch the birds enjoy eating what vou've created.

- 38 toothpicks
- 1 piece tag board (2 5/8x2 1/8 inches in size)
- Craft glue
- Scissors
- 2 dry butter beans
- 3 dry black-eyed peas
- Cool melt hot glue
- 1 yellow button shaped like a star
- 3-inch length twisted jute twine


HOW TO DO IT. ▼

1. Attach **32** toothpicks to the tag board using craft glue. The tag board may need to be trimmed on one side depending on size of toothpicks. Let dry.



Step 1

2. Create manger by attaching the remaining toothpicks in a triangle, two picks to each side, using craft glue. Let dry.



- **3.** Create Joseph, Mary and baby Jesus by attaching beans using cool melt hot glue as shown in photo below. Hot glue button in place. Let dry.
- **4. Glue looped twine** to back to complete ornament. Hang on the family tree or use as a package decoration.

- Scissors
- Floral wire
- Wire cutters

HOW TO DO IT. ▼

1. Create foundation for wreath by painting frame. It's best to spray two light coats to keep paint from running. You can also use a decorative frame that doesn't need to be painted. Both examples are pictured.





Step 1

2. Make bow by folding ribbon endover-end into layers. The length of the layers will depend on the size of bow desired. More layers will make a fuller bow. Longer lengths will make a larger bow. Leave a longer length on the first and last fold to make the tails of the bow.



3. Create the center of the bow

with floral wire. Twist the wire tightly around the center of the layers several times to secure. To form center knot, take the longest tail and wrap it around the center. Tie to the shorter tail in back of bow. Make sure wire is still accessible. Fluff ribbon. Cut tails evenly to complete.



Step 3

4. Attach bow to frame using the wire, making sure to cut any excess wire with wire cutters. Reinforce with hot glue if desired.



Step 4

5. Add finishing touches to wreath using ornaments, photos, Christmas cards and/or holiday embellishments.





Step 5 6. Make hanger from twine and attach to the back of frame with hot glue.

How Should Your Risk Tolerance Influence Investment Decisions?

As an investor, how much risk can you tolerate? It's an important question — because the answer can help you make the right investment choices.

Before you know your risk tolerance, you'll want to make sure you first understand the nature of investment risk — the risk of losing principal. This risk is especially prevalent when you invest in stocks, because stock prices will always fluctuate — and there are never any guarantees about performance. Of course, a decline in value does not mean you need to sell. You can always hold on to the stock with the hope that its value will bounce back. And this can certainly happen, but again — no guarantees.

How you respond to this type of investment risk will tell you a great deal about your own risk tolerance. Of course, no one, whether he or she has a high tolerance for risk or a low one, particularly likes to see declines. But people do react differently. If you're the sort of person who can retain your confidence in your investment mix and can focus on the long term and the potential for a recovery, you may well have a higher tolerance for risk. But if you find yourself losing sleep


over your losses (even if, at this point, they're just "paper" losses), becoming despondent about reaching your goals and questioning whether you should be investing at all, then you may have a low tolerance for risk.

This self-knowledge of your own risk tolerance should help inform your investment decisions — to a point. Even if you determine you have a high tolerance for risk, you almost certainly should not load up your portfolio exclusively with stocks. If the stock market enters a prolonged slump, you could face heavy losses that may take many years to overcome, causing you to lose significant ground in the pursuit of your financial goals. Conversely, even if you discover you don't have much tolerance for risk, you won't want to invest only in supposedly "safe" vehicles, such as certificates of deposit (CDs). During those periods when rates on CDs and similar instruments are low, as has been the case in recent years, your interest payments from these investments may not even keep up with inflation meaning that, over time, you could end up losing purchasing power, which, over the long term, can be just as big a risk as market declines.

Ultimately, then, you'll probably want to let your risk tolerance guide your investment choices — but not dictate them with an iron hand. So, if you believe you are highly tolerant of risk, you might have a somewhat higher percentage of stocks in your portfolio than if you felt yourself to be highly risk-averse — but in any case, you'll likely benefit from building a diversified portfolio containing stocks, bonds, government securities, CDs and other investments. While this type of diversification can't guarantee profits or protect against loss, it can help reduce the effects of volatility on your portfolio.

By knowing your own risk tolerance, and the role it can play in your choices, you can help yourself create an effective, suitable investment strategy — one that you can live with for a long time and that can help you avoid the biggest risk of all: not reaching your long-term goals.





Raspberry Chipotle Bacon-Wrapped Jalapeños

Serves 10.

I pkg. thin-cut smoked bacon 10 medium jalapeños, halved and seeded Fischer & Wiser Roasted Raspberry **Toothpicks Chipotle Sauce**

- 1. Thin bacon is important in this recipe: it ensures the bacon is cooked through.
- 2. Preheat grill to medium heat or let charcoal settle into a red coal.
- **3.** Slice bacon pieces in half. Wrap bacon around jalapeño halves. Pin bacon into jalapeño with toothpicks.
- 4. Grill jalapeños, turning often to reduce
- **5.** When bacon starts to brown in the middle. brush top of jalapeños with raspberry chipotle sauce.
- **6.** Flip jalapeños. Brush top of jalapeños with

raspberry chipotle sauce.

- **7.** Grill for another 2-3 minutes on each side to set glaze.
- 8. Remove jalapeños and toothpicks; let rest.
- 9. Serve warm or room temperature.

Molasses Cookies

Makes 2 dozen.

2 1/4 cups flour

2 tsp. baking soda 1/4 tsp. salt 1/2 tsp. cloves 1 tsp. cinnamon 1 tsp. ginger 2 tsp. pumpkin pie spice 1/2 cup shortening I cup light brown sugar, packed 1/4 cup Grandma's Molasses 1 egg

- **1.** Sift together dry ingredients.
- 2. Cream together shortening and

brown sugar.

- 3. Add molasses and egg to creamed mixture; blend thoroughly.
- 4. Slowly fold in sifted dry ingredients until a homogenous thick batter/dough forms.
- 5. Roll dough into balls; chill for 30-60 minutes.
- 6. Preheat oven to 350 F.
- **7.** Evenly space dough balls on cookie sheet lined with parchment. Slightly flatten dough balls. Bake 10-12 minutes or just until edge of cookies start to brown.

Sausage Balls

Makes 2-3 dozen.

- 1 lb. spicy pork breakfast sausage 8 oz. sharp cheddar cheese, grated/
- 8 oz. Colby cheddar or jack cheese, grated/shredded
- 1 2/3 cups Bisquick
- 2 tsp. seasoned salt
- **1.** Using a stand mixer (set on low using dough hook) or your hands, thoroughly mix 1 cup sausage, 1 cup cheese, 3/4 cup Bisquick and 1 tsp. seasoning, Repeat until all ingredients have been combined and homogenous sausage dough forms.
- **2.** Preheat oven to 375 F. Line a baking pan with parchment paper.
- **3.** Roll dough into 1-inch balls. Evenly space dough balls on baking sheet.
- 4. Bake for 20 minutes. Remove sausage balls from pan; drain on paper towels.
- 5. Wipe baking sheet and replace parchment paper before baking next batch.

Serves 8-10.

1 16-oz. bottle cranberry juice

8 oz. high-quality ginger ale 8 oz. amaretto

1 bottle Prosecco or sparkling white


Cranberries and mint leafs (optional)

- 1. Mix cranberry juice, ginger ale and amaretto in serving pitcher or punch bowl.
- 2. Fill champagne flutes or serving cups half full with cranberry mixture.
