


So much so, that I'm already looking forward to the memories we're going to make in 2014. We'll share trips to



Members of the Gold Wing Road Riders Association, a motorcycle club with a mission, are some of those people who see a need and work diligently all year long to make holiday dreams come true for the children and teens in the community. Lee and Linda Gravley and Bob and Sue Tompkins are two couples within the group who have found their calling on the second Saturday of December. "There's a great need for what we do," Lee

said, referring to the association's annual toy drive held on the Citizens National Bank parking lot directly across the street from Waxahachie High School. "If we didn't do this, CASA wouldn't get the quantity of items they need to make Christmas a happier time for so many children in Ellis County. We see a need, and we enjoy helping fill that need."

"We've found a great majority of people want to give back," Linda added, "but they aren't sure how. The toy drive gives them an option."




Under the leadership of Rhodie Rawls, Court Appointed Special Advocates is a nonprofit organization focusing on improving the lives of children in the county who have been neglected or abused. The group depends on the giving spirits of those in the motorcycle association. Without them, it would be nearly impossible to bring holiday



cheer to the ever-growing number of children in need within the community. "Everything we do all year long is filtered through Rhodie," Sue said. "She knows best how to disburse the toys and cash donations we receive, not only on that Saturday, but throughout the entire year leading up to the annual toy drive."

Lee and Linda have been giving back





in one way or another for 21 years, while Bob and Sue have only been in the motorcycle club for a couple years. As for CASA, this will be the seventh consecutive year the GWRRA has banded together to help the local nonprofit organization. "Donations come in all year long," Bob explained. "The toy drive is for children birth to age 18. We don't want to forget the teens, so a good bit of the cash donations we receive goes toward gift cards for the older children."

No doubt, both couples enjoy the wind in their faces and the scenery along the way as they travel on their trikes (three-wheeled motorcycles). "Riding gets in the blood," Lee stated. "You either love it or you don't. If you love it, you can't get enough of it. It all depends on the person."

"Until Bob bought the trike, I wouldn't ride," Sue admitted. "Now, we ride everywhere together."

And ride they do — every chance they get. Bob and Sue's longest trip has been to Kerrville, Texas, while Lee and Linda have travelled as far as Fox River, Illinois. "Our first long trip took six weeks from start to finish," Lee remembered.

But, both couples absolutely love what they see and hear during the toy drive. Volunteering for the event is something neither couple plans on missing, as long as they are able to ride and brave the sometimes inclement weather. The





passion for what they do is apparent in the excitement they exude as they retell stories from last year's event.


Linda doesn't recall a drop in giving, even when the recession hit several years ago. "People seemed to give more during what some would consider a tough time," Linda said. the event with piggy banks under their arms. "They donate money they have saved all year," Sue said with emotion. "Some families are giving back what they received. They are paying it forward."

"Last year, a pizza delivery guy stopped by several times during the day to donate the tips he made," Linda shared.

"We also bought bicycles last year," Sue recalled. "That was one of the big items needed to fill the wishes. We receive whatever the need is, because those giving make it happen."

"People must feel sorry for us," Lee said with a laugh. "We stand out in any kind of weather — sleet, rain, wind, freezing temperatures and even pretty weather."

Lee, Linda, Bob and Sue may be givers with big hearts, but they are also on the receiving end of the Christmas season and the wonderful spirit the toy drive brings out in others. Bob can hardly contain his emotions as he remembered several people who made donations last year. "I had my Army hat on my head," Bob said. "As people dropped off their donations, I would tell them, "Thank you.' At least five people extended their thanks to me because of my past military service. Their comments made me feel good."



several of her friends and staff members. "Some help out for about an hour," Lee stated, "while others stay all day."

When the day of the annual event begins, the trailers are empty. But, it doesn't take long for them to be packed to overflowing with toys and items for the older children. And they can be packed to overflowing many times throughout the day. "Events the size of the toy drive happen so much easier when a group is involved," Sue stated. "You do it one time, and you're hooked."

What inspires couples like Lee and Linda and Bob and Sue to get involved in such a worthwhile undertaking? "Back in the days when we were young, we took care of ourselves, with nothing extra to give back to others," Sue explained, as the other three nodded in agreement. "We know what it's like not to have a lot, so giving to others now because we are able to is why we do what we do."

They realize the toy drive would not happen without the continued dedication of club members, Rhodie and her staff from CASA and most importantly, the overall public. Everybody involved with the event has an integral part to play, and it takes everyone doing their part for the drive to be a success year-after-year. "Ellis County is filled with so many caring, giving individuals who aren't aware of a need until they are made aware of a need," Linda said.




George's experience with scouting began like most. "My dad was the leader of Pack 29 in upstate New York," George said. "My brother was in Cub Scouts. It looked like a lot of fun, and I didn't want to miss out."

And so began what would become a lifelong passion for George. "We had a great scoutmaster. His name was Stanley Mikrut," George shared. "I don't think he ever knew the affect or influence he had on all of us boys." With Mr. Mikrut, George and the rest of Troop 29 grew into men while hiking the Appalachian Trail and learning leadership skills from the great leaders around them.

Sadly, Mr. Mikrut passed away shortly before George received his Eagle Scout Award, but he was never forgotten. "I remember looking up and saying, This is for you," George said, clearly emotional about the man who had been such an example.

For most Scouts, earning the rank of Eagle Scout is a well-deserved end to a long and sometimes hard trail. George didn't know it at the time, but for him it was just the beginning.

"I guess I was about 20 years old at college when I heard that my old troop didn't have any adult

leaders who could get off work to take the boys to Scout camp. That just wasn't acceptable, and I couldn't let it happen," George remembered.

So George became involved in spreading the program that had given him so much. "I was dating my future wife at the time, and I remember sitting in my tent reading the love letters she would send during that first leadership experience."



As George started a family, his bond with scouting seemed to grow along with his children. Over the years, he performed tasks ranging from troop committee chair to den leader to Cub Master. His job with the government working for the EPA also grew. This responsibility eventually moved George to a new position at the Dallas office and a new home in Waxahachie.



But Scouts across the country are all the same. They all need willing adults to make the program possible, and George just wouldn't be George if he wasn't involved. "I went through Wood Badge, the most intense adult leader training Scouts offers not long after I moved to Waxahachie," George said. And there was never any lack of opportunities to put that training to use.

A common thought indicates that

in most organizations, 80 percent of the work is done by 20 percent of the people. Scouting is no different. The more George became involved, the more was asked of him. But a Scout is helpful. A Scout is cheerful. George gladly worked at each task with the attention and enthusiasm it deserved.

"People who aren't involved in scouting don't get it. But people who are see it right away. We're not just making men. We're making leaders," George explained. "Leadership

comes easy for our boys, because we've made them do it. The adult leaders don't really lead. We design a quality program. We make sure it's safe, and then it's the older boys' job to lead and get the younger boys ready for when their time comes."

This strategy has paid off for scouting time and again for many years. "Part of what made men like Neil Armstrong



such good leaders," George said, "is that they started working at it when they were 14-year-old first-class Scouts."

Not long after George came to Waxahachie, he helped area troops by sitting on Eagle Scout review boards. The review is the final step and hurdle for boys hoping to achieve scouting's highest award. That board is usually made up of volunteers from across Ellis County. Most members are scoutmasters, and a qualified Eagle Scout is always a welcome addition. "When I first started sitting in on Eagle boards, Larry Candy over in Ennis was our district advancement chairman. I learned a lot from Larry about the purpose of the process I hadn't ever noticed as a youth," George admitted.

Anyone who has ever met Larry knows how giving he is with his time and energy to his community and the people in it. But sadly, failing health forced Larry not necessarily to stop his activity, but at least pace himself a little better. So the district calling Ellis County home found itself in need of a new advancement chair. Luckily, they had the perfect man in their midst. "I took over as the advancement chair from Larry in 2005," George remarked.

Part of that responsibility includes helping Scouts form a plan for their Eagle Scout project — a community service project every Scout plans and executes under his own direction. Just about everyone who has earned their Eagle Scout Award in Ellis County in the last 10 years has met George.

Some people may have difficulty understanding why George spends so much time working with these kids. But George knows exactly why. According



to government reports, 181 of the men who have traveled to space were Eagle Scouts, 16.3 percent of West Point cadets are Eagle Scouts and 18 current state governors and 189 sitting members of Congress are Eagle Scouts. A Baylor University study found that Eagle Scouts were 56 percent less likely to drink on a regular basis, and 58 percent were more likely to exercise at least 30 minutes a day.



The same study showed that Eagle Scouts were 56 percent more likely to work on community improvement projects, and 92 percent were more likely to become involved in environmental projects.

Will any of the over 400 boys George has helped on their path to Eagle Scout become a congressman or a governor? Who knows? But George, who firmly believes that once you're an Eagle Scout you're always an Eagle Scout, has helped prepare them for whatever path they will walk as adults. NOW



the back, and then, in the 1930s, it was a boarding house." By the mid-1950s, the house had fallen on hard times. In 1960, after standing vacant for five years, it was mercifully saved from the wrecking ball and reconverted to a single-family dwelling. "We purchased it in 1997," Matthew said. "By then, previous owners had done a lot of physical reconstruction over the years, and it had great bones. But, as is often the case with older homes, it needed work. Heidi and I were young and poor and thought we could 'do it ourselves,' until we quickly realized the need and expense for the right tools, plus the skills to use them!"

Matthew and Heidi met in Denver, Colorado, in 1990 at their first postcollege jobs. "I have a degree in food nutrition, and Matthew's degree is in history," Heidi said. "We were hired by the same restaurant. Within six weeks, we were engaged." They married in 1991,





and by 1997, Matthew had built his true career path in the oil business. "That's when we moved to Texas," she said.

Matthew, the fifth generation in his family from New Orleans, but the fourth generation to be born there, first moved to Dallas when he was in the fifth grade. Heidi grew up on a farm in the panhandle of western Nebraska. As they prepared to head for Texas, Heidi was done with life in the big city. Waxahachie proved to be a perfect solution, close enough for Matthew to commute and small enough for Heidi to love. Discovering their prairie-style home was the icing on the cake.





"When we moved to Waxahachie, our oldest son, JJ, was 3 years old and our youngest son, Hank, was still a baby," Heidi said. "Our daughter, Katie Belle, was born in 1999." Their first 12 years in the home were largely devoted to the children and to Matthew's career. "We made a lot of decorative changes by painting, wallpapering and with the furnishings," she added. "We both wanted a red dining room." Their first investment in furniture was the dining

room buffet. "I love colored ceilings and shades of plum, red and gold," Heidi said. She also enjoys transforming bargains from estate sales and antique shops. "I like mixing period materials with new." Her designer's taste and bent for whimsy can be seen in the stately period pieces in the dining room shared with the occasional ceramic flying pig, Snow White's dwarfs and an umbrella stand turned into a bar cart.

until about five years ago," Matthew explained. "Our policy is no new debt. We pay cash, so we waited until we could afford the big projects." When that day arrived, Matthew christened it as the five-year continuous renovation project. "First, we completely gutted the kitchen," he said.

by December 1 and, each year, we add more tubs of decorations. When we moved in, I think we had 36 tubs and, at last count, we were at 50."







- Scissors
- Needle
- 3-5 medium oranges, refrigerated
- Paring knife
- Twisted jute twine
- Peanut butter
- Kitchen knife
- Bird seed
- 3-5 pine cones

HOW TO DO IT. ▼

1. Make popcorn garland

by popping the corn per package instructions. Allow to cool. Using double thread cut at a length of your choosing, string popcorn.

2. Make orange swirls

by cutting a swirl pattern in oranges with a paring knife starting from the navel. Make sure to cut deep enough to reach the pulp. For safety, parents of younger crafters will need to do the cutting. If the swirls break, don't worry. You will just have more swirls for your tree.

- **3. Carefully pull** or cut pulp from peel. Remove navel to make hole.
- 4. Thread twine through hole to complete hanger. If the peel breaks, a hole will need to be made with the paring knife in the pieces without a navel. Make sure loop in twine is large enough for the swirl to hang freely from the tree limb.



Step 5

5. Smear peanut butter on white side of peeled swirl. Sprinkle heavily with bird seed.



- **6. Make Peanut butter pine cone** by tying twine to the top of the pine cone to make hanger.
- **7. Generously dot** the tips of the pine cone with peanut butter. Sprinkle heavily with bird seed.




8. Decorate an outdoor tree with your bird-friendly ornaments and then watch the birds enjoy eating what you've created.


- 2. Create manger by attaching the remaining toothpicks in a triangle, two picks to each side, using craft glue.



1. Create foundation for wreath by painting frame. It's best to spray two light coats to keep paint from running. You can also use a decorative frame that doesn't need to be painted. Both examples are pictured.

2. Make bow by folding ribbon endover-end into layers. The length of the layers will depend on the size of bow desired. More layers will make a fuller bow. Longer lengths will make a larger bow. Leave a longer length on the first and last fold to make the tails of the bow.

3. Create the center of the bow with floral wire. Twist the wire tightly around the center of the layers several times to secure. To form center knot, take the longest tail and wrap it around the center. Tie to the shorter tail in

back of bow. Make sure wire is still accessible. Fluff ribbon. Cut tails evenly to complete.

- 4. Attach bow to frame using the wire, making sure to cut any excess wire with wire cutters. Reinforce with hot glue if desired.
- 5. Add finishing touches to wreath using ornaments, photos, Christmas cards and/or holiday embellishments.

6. Make hanger from twine and attach to the back of frame with hot glue. Hang completed wreath on your front door or display on a wall or mantel in your home. NOW







A Coughing Nuisance

Coughing, the hallmark of many respiratory diseases, can be a necessary aggravation. This is particularly true when it is a productive cough - meaning when you cough, it helps your body expel sputum or phlegm. This is beneficial, because your respiratory system needs to be cleared of any substance that hinders its performance. One of the diseases that falls into this category is bronchitis. Bronchitis is a disease that affects the mucus membranes lining the airways or bronchial tubes to the lungs. In the disease state, the tubes become inflamed or irritated and swollen. As the lining swells, the airways will narrow, making breathing more difficult. The mucus-producing cells are there to protect the bronchial tubes. But when irritated, the amount of mucus produced will increase.

Bronchitis has two forms - acute and chronic. Acute bronchitis may last for a few weeks. Chronic bronchitis may last for months or years with repeated incidences. Both forms may produce these symptoms:

Cough

Thick mucus which could be clear, white, yellow or green

Fatigue

Chest pain

Mild fever

Shortness of breath

Acute bronchitis is most often activated by viruses that affect the respiratory system. The primary culprit that causes chronic bronchitis is cigarette smoke. Second-hand smoke, industrial pollutants, air pollution, dust and toxic gases are a few of the other triggers that can cause chronic bronchitis.

Since cigarette smoke is a huge contributor to this disease, you increase your chances of becoming ill with bronchitis if you smoke. Others in your environment are also exposed to the same risk. The chemicals in the cigarette smoke will harm the cilia, hair-like structures that help move excess mucus and other irritants out of the bronchial tubes. If the exposure is frequent, over a period of time the cilia can become permanently damaged. Other risk factors include your general health, such as whether your immune system is weakened from fighting another illness. Your place of employment could put you at risk if you are exposed to irritants, pollutants or toxic substances. The elderly and infants have an increased risk, because they are more vulnerable.

Treatment will depend upon whether the bronchitis is acute or chronic. Acute bronchitis without complications can usually be treated at home. Rest, increasing your liquid intake, cough medications, expectorants and avoiding lung irritants can usually get you through an infection. Check with your physician for the best course of treatment. Chronic bronchitis will definitely require the attention of your physician. You can help yourself avoid bronchitis by washing your hands frequently and if you smoke, please stop. That will greatly increase your chances of a good outcome. NOW



Halupki (Cabbage Rolls)

I head cabbage I to I 1/2 lbs. ground beef Salt and pepper, to taste

I egg

1/2 tsp. parsley

I clove chopped garlic

1/2 dried chopped onion

1/2 cup rice, cooked

2 cans tomato soup, optional

1 Tbsp. sugar, optional

1 Tbsp. vinegar, optional

1 3/4 cups water, optional

- **1.** Boil cabbage 10-15 minutes. Carefully remove the leaves from the head.

- **4.** Mix remaining ingredients together. Pour over cabbage rolls. Cover; bake at 350 F for I hour.

Sugar Cookies

2 cups sugar

I cup shortening

2 eggs

I cup sour milk (add I tsp. white vinegar to whole milk)

2 tsp. baking soda

2 tsp. baking powder

1/4 tsp. salt
4 1/2 cups flour
1 tsp. vanilla extract
Mix-ins: chocolate chips, coconut, peanut butter chips, nuts, etc.
Food coloring of your choice

- **1.** Mix sugar and shortening until fluffy. Stir in next 7 ingredients.
- **2.** Divide the dough into 2-4 equal parts. Add mix-ins of your choice to make each portion a different flavor. Add food coloring to each part.
- **3.** Drop on greased cookie sheet. Bake at 375F for 8-10 minutes.

Jalapeño and Bell Pepper Chicken

3-4 jalapeños
I each red, yellow, green and yellow bell peppers
Cajun seasoning, to taste
Salt and pepper, to taste
2-4 chicken breasts
1/2 cup cilantro

- **I.** Slice jalapeños. Cut bell peppers into bitesize chunks.
- **2.** Season and butterfly chicken breasts. Place 4-5 slices of jalapeños in each piece of chicken. Sprinkle with cilantro. Close the chicken.
- **3.** Place chicken in 9x13- or 8x8-inch baking dish. Add bell pepper chunks around the chicken. Place remaining jalapeños and cilantro on top of chicken.
- **4.** Cover with foil. Bake at 350 F for 30 minutes until juices run clear.

Coconut Chicken

2-4 chicken breasts

2 15-oz. cans of Goya cream of coconut 1 cup coconut flakes, divided use

- **I.** Poke holes in chicken breasts. Marinate in cream of coconut and 1/2 cup coconut flakes for at least 4 hours.
- **2.** Sprinkle rest of coconut flakes on chicken before baking uncovered at 350 F for 30 minutes.
