

Barnabas Life Consulting ...a ministry of encouragement

"I have not retired," Jim Morrow said. "I've redirected." As Bob Buford stated in his book, Halftime, Jim spent the first half of his life on success; the second is for significance. Ironically, his passion includes encouraging people, redirecting them to achieve a higher level than they ever dreamed possible.

Jim volunteers with many organizations including Rotarians, his church, the Center of Hope, Crossroads Youth Ministries, Bridge Academy and Weatherford GED program, as well as Texas Agrilife Extension, where he gets to teach parenting classes. "I get to teach, not as a professional anything," he said, "but as a dude who messed up so much."

The Center of Hope holds a special place in his heart. What began when his church volunteered to serve a meal quickly grew into something larger. The center was in the middle of a construction program when Jim walked through the door January 12, 2009. Jim swept floors and hung pictures, close to the ceiling, he admitted with a laugh. "No one moved them, and they're still hanging. I consider that an accomplishment," he said.

Jim served as director of the Weatherford Center of Hope for a short time, then they asked him to develop a program titled Hope for Tomorrow. The Center of Hope provides services for economically challenged families and individuals, providing food and help with utilities at times. Hope for Tomorrow offers mentoring and classes for individuals who desire change. In many cases, no one ever told these individuals they could succeed at anything. Some of the men Jim has mentored during the past five years have recently graduated from Weatherford College. These men, who once relied on the Center of Hope, now have careers. Although they may still receive food stamps, the families are moving toward self-sufficiency.

Jim's passion was ignited through this program, but his passion flames from working with youth in Crossroads, The Bridge and GED classes. "We figured out if we don't work with them in their teens, they'll be at Center of Hope looking for help as adults," he said. They seek to impact young men and women as early as possible, letting them taste success. Using what he learned about appreciative inquiry, he looks for the very best within and encourages it. "No matter how deplorable, how run-down, how worn out an organization or organism is, there's still something good to be found within that organization or organism," he said. "That's appreciative inquiry."

His experiences led to Jim's personal ministry, Barnabas Life Consulting. "It's the neatest job I've had in my entire life walking around town encouraging people," he admitted. Many people have stressful jobs with no outlet. They may not have anyone to listen. He goes in, affirms a job well done and listens if they want to talk. In exchange, his clients may pay a modest fee. "I never hesitate to ask them for payment. It isn't about the money, it's about their self-esteem," he said. "Pay is pretty light, but the rewards are tremendous."

After 33 years as a successful business owner in Richardson, Texas, Jim sold the business and relocated to Sugartree with his wife, Sheila. With children and grandchildren in Abilene and Belton, Parker County seemed the perfect place for life after retirement. They built their home in 2006, living there on weekends. Following Jim's stroke in 2008, the couple moved there permanently.

While they were still living in McKinney, a neighbor came over one night asking to fertilize the yard. This man, who had retired







at 58 with plenty of money, had nothing to do with his days. "Before you retire, you have to have something to do," Sheila told Jim.

"And golf doesn't count," Jim jokingly added.

At that point, Jim implemented a 10-year plan. He enrolled in a master's program at Abilene Christian University for organization and human resource development, where he learned to manage 501(c)(3) organizations and developing, rather than using, employees.

Before then, Jim didn't know how low he ranked when graduating from college. While the university initially indicated he wasn't a candidate for graduate work, some professors went to bat for him. His success in the business world and passing of certifications courses convinced them he could handle graduate courses. The school admitted him — on probation.

"At 58, I entered the program on probation. Got a hat and shirt because I was the oldest matriculator that year,"



he said, laughing. Nevertheless he made all A's. He cited two reasons. "I was committed with a reason to be there, and I learned how to use cookie diplomacy."



He often visited with professors. Most of them were younger and valued his business experience and life wisdom.

Jim struggled with a form of dyslexia and had done poorly throughout school. When he entered college, he met four upper classmen, all with challenging backgrounds. They mentored him. One in particular, Jerry, also had a learning disability. The two spent one to two hours every day studying in the college

library. All five men became highly successful after college, including Dan, who gave his life in military service. Jim credited these men as the reason



he finished college, which led to his successful career.

"I am forever indebted to them for taking time to make me a different person," he said. "I want to pay back what these men, and so many others along the way, did for me."

Jim is always in learning mode, helping develop programs for the Weatherford ISD and spending several days each week at the different places where he volunteers. A survivor of throat and tongue cancer plus two strokes, he chooses to pour into people who simply need to know they have value.

"It's just so ironic how God worked. Everything I learned in my master's work translated," he said. "I wanted to get a master's degree, so I could work for the Master." He has transposed his learning into caring and development of men and women.

When Jim looks at young men and women in the youth programs, he sees himself with the pain he knew as a child. "These young men and women come to respect me. They may not like me, but they respect me," he said. He tells them they are precious to him, words some of them never heard before. Over time, the toughest person in the room longs to hear Mr. Morrow speak those words. He may never see them again, but they will never forget him.


"I'm not looking for any major rewards," he said. Out in the community, Jim often hears, "Mr. Morrow." He turns and sees someone from these programs, a redirected life. "That's enough," he said. "That's significance."





For the Myser family, Christmastime is an opportunity to continue long-standing traditions and build new memories with loved ones. Each Christmas Eve, Scott and Sarah Myser and their two little ones, 4-year-old Abby and 2-year-old A.J., will start their annual holiday traditions with a visit to Aledo United Methodist Church. "We always go to the children's service at the church, so they can dress up," Sarah said. "The kids dress up as angels or shepherds." Back at home after the service, they gather in the kitchen to bake homemade pizzas. "We have all the toppings, and the kids can do it however they want." They have plenty of space to spread out on the large, natural rock-covered island in the center of the kitchen. On their glass dining table, Sarah will set special Christmas dishes to continue the cheery mood during dinner. The cooking continues in the kitchen as the children mix up reindeer food and bake cookies for the jolly fellow's visit.





As Santa and other guests visit the Myser home, they are automatically filled with joy and comfort. The home's neutral tones exude a soothing feeling, and traditional Christmas colors of red, green and gold instill happiness and hope to all who enter. On display in the open-concept living room and kitchen area, Sarah has decorated a tall, slender Christmas tree to fit the space. "For Christmas, the word joy is everywhere," she said. Texas A&M University-Commerce and Scott moving to College Station to attend Texas A&M University. "We wanted to know if it was real and do our own things. We grew together," she said. Scott and Sarah dated for about seven-and-a-half years before they got married in July 2006, and the




Aggies keep their school spirit alive with A&M memorabilia displayed throughout the home. "We'll decorate the outside with an A&M Christmas theme."

The outside back patio is the perfect place to plop down and enjoy the warmth of the fireplace. Scott spends plenty of time grilling in the backyard and watching football on the outdoor TV. He and his two youngsters often curl up by the fire to make s'mores. The fenced backyard allows the children to run free and provides some relaxing scenery. "We only had about five lots to choose from in this neighborhood at the time. We chose this one just for the fact that we weren't backed up against anything except for this pasture over here," Scott explained.

You can see miles of open space from the upstairs play room windows. The space houses most of the children's toys and artwork, and provides a comfy location to cuddle and watch movies. But, it isn't all kid's play. "Occasionally,

I'll have poker nights up here," Scott said. "I'll set up two poker tables with chairs. We'll get about 20 guys up here. It's nice to have this big space."

The Myser family moved to Aledo from North Fort Worth in August 2012, but they had established ties to the community two years before that when Scott opened his

business, Myser Orthodontics. They wanted to find the perfect community - one that had a great school district. "Aledo was on the top of our list in every category," he said.

"When we came to drive through the community we immediately fell in love with it. When you go on the ridge on 1187, and you see the high school and the A at night. You see the orange. It felt right," Sarah recalled. Sarah is now teaching



math at Aledo High School.

They love their new neighborhood and recently celebrated the one year anniversary of their home. They questioned if there was anything they would change about their house, and the answer was a resounding no from both of them. "We love it. It is everything we hoped it would be. We are so blessed to have this house for us and for our kids,' Sarah stated.

Abby enjoys spending time in her room, which is decorated in pinks and purples. "My favorite is everything," Abby said. "Everything in my room is pretty, and I like everything that's pretty." Sarah and the children participate in fun runs for charity, while Scott takes on the 5Ks. Scott is also on the Education Foundation with Aledo Independent School District to raise money for teacher initiatives, serves on the committee for YoungLife Aledo and provides pro bono treatment with Smiles Change Lives.

Their lives may be busy, but the Mysers never let a spontaneous family moment pass by. That rings true at Christmas, as the children shriek with joy baking Santa cookies or tearing into gifts under the tree. Although time-honored, these traditions are best for making new family memories. NOW

When the Parker County 4-H shooting sports teams get on the range, they must have a steady hand. In most competitions, they're shooting at a target smaller than the size of a dime and 50 meters away. The goal is to shoot directly in the center of the target for the highest score. Both Mindy Miles and Sydney Casey know the excitement of shooting competitively. They've competed all the way up to the national level in air rifle and small bore, or .22 rifle. — By Amber D. Browne



The teens did so well at state competition this year that they were invited to compete at the National Junior Olympics in Colorado Springs, Colorado. Mindy took home the silver medal for her age group in air rifle. She then competed in a shoot-off to get into the overall finals. "It was exciting," Mindy said. She shot the best score in the air rifle final and moved up from eighth to sixth place overall. In small bore, Mindy shot slightly behind the second-place score and brought home the bronze medal. She barely missed becoming a Junior Olympics team member for the small bore competition, but continues to train and hone her skill. "It is a lot of fun. I come back from a match, and I'm feeling good. Let's do it again!"

Sydney also had a great run while at the Olympics competition in Colorado. She won bronze for air rifle for her age category and placed fifth for small bore. The 13-year-old enjoys the unique sport. "It's different from other sports. Other sports are more team-oriented. This is a team sport, but it's not like if you lose, it's a big deal. You want to get better, and you want to beat yourself more than beating other people," Sydney explained. They travel to other cities in Texas and out of state for competitions. Sydney enjoys meeting new friends while touring the country.

For Mindy, it's about the camaraderie as well. "Everybody's nice," Mindy said, referring to the other competitors at regional, state and national competitions. "We have dinners every night with a big group of people. You'll finish a match,

and maybe the guys are shooting. Then you go check out all the guys who are shooting. Well, maybe not 'check them out," she said, laughing. "You go watch them shoot, and you can learn a lot from each other," Mindy explained. Shooters are very supportive of each other during competitions, too. "It's mainly just yourself and what can you do to get better."

Back home in the Weatherford area, the teens practice nearly every day. At the Lone Star Guns, Gallery & Gear in Weatherford, they meet with other teammates on the Parker County 4-H rifle team to practice shooting their .22 rifles. But, back at home, their fathers have set up shooting ranges for air rifle, which Mindy describes as a fancy pellet gun. During competitions, the air rifle shooter stands and shoots at a target. The .22, or small bore, is a little different. The competitor must shoot from three different positions - kneeling, standing and prone. The shooter can wear special glasses, a visor to keep the lighting even and a shooting suit. The suit includes special shoes to keep their feet flat while





shooting and stiff pants and a jacket to keep them steady. The shooter can see his or her heartbeat in the gun sight, so the suit lessens the prominence of the heartbeat.

Mindy prefers air rifle, because she likes to stand and shoot. Air rifle is also Sydney's first choice for competitions. "I find air rifle easier. Not that .22 is way harder, but I get better results out of air rifle," Sydney explained. "Because I'm doing better now with air rifle, I like it a little more." Sydney can be hard on herself, but she just wants to excel in the sport.

Sydney's father, Lieutenant Colonel Scott Casey (Ret.), is her coach. She has developed a close relationship with him through the sport. "I have an older brother and a younger sister, so we split time. He's coach on the range, apparently. To him, he's coach on the range, and off, he's dad," Sydney said, grinning. "He's supported me a lot, and he's taken me everywhere."

Scott was instrumental in getting Sydney started in competitive shooting. He met Mindy's father, Chip Miles, at

Scott had been searching for a local program and found only Parker County 4-H had a shotgun team. With their backgrounds in competitive shooting and their desire to get their children involved in the sport, Scott and Chip decided to get certified and established the rifle team.

"It's neat to watch her go through the sport," Scott said about his daughter. Seeing Sydney progress through the program has been quite an experience for Scott, but he thinks it's a good opportunity for her. "Sometimes, it's tough being coach and dad at the same time. That's when Chip and I will reverse roles."

The two rely on each other to coach the girls. "Everybody involved in the sport seems to be nice and helpful. They seem to be really good people, and it's a good crowd for her to hang out with," Chip said, about his daughter, Mindy. "She takes criticism and help very well," he said. "She's at the point where she is self-assessing, so she's pretty far advanced. Her coaching from me is limited now." He is a little nervous about her going off to college next year, but he is excited for her and knows she will succeed.

"Normally kids don't get along with their coaches very well, but my dad and I are really close. He's the best coach," Mindy said. "I'm pretty dedicated, and I want to do well." Although Mindy and Sydney have only been shooting competitively for about two to three years, they see themselves growing their love of the sport. Mindy believes her skills will help her get recruited to a university shooting team next fall.

Sydney's ultimate goal is to compete in the Olympics. She would first have to make the Junior Olympics team and compete in World Cups to advance to the Olympics. "I think it would be cool to go and compete against all those people from everywhere," Sydney said.

Until then, the girls will continue practicing their shooting skills two to three hours each day. Mindy will be busy as a senior at Weatherford High School and enjoying her many hobbies, including reading, hunting and fishing. Sydney is an Aledo eighth-grader and plans to also stay busy playing on a select volleyball team. They are both very goal-oriented and keep the prize in their "sights."





What's Your Retirement "Contingency Plan?"

You probably have thought about what you'd like to do during your retirement years. But all your plans probably depend, to at least some extent, on your financial situation. What happens if you reach the age at which you wish to retire and you just don't have the money you thought you'd have?

If this occurs, it's time for Plan B. What does that look like? Here are a couple of possibilities:

• Continue working. If you like your job, you may not mind working an extra year or so. 

Pizza Pasta

1/2 Tbsp. extra-virgin olive oil
1 small yellow onion, chopped
8 oz. mushrooms, chopped
1 tsp. fennel seed
1 red bell pepper, chopped
2 green bell pepper, chopped
2 cloves garlic, minced
1 lb. pasta
1/2 cup Parmesan, grated
1 Tbsp. unsalted butter
Salt and pepper, to taste
3 leaves fresh basil

I. Place oil and next 3 ingredients in skillet; sauté until browned; season with salt. Stir in peppers. Add garlic during final 2 minutes of sautéing.

2. Boil pasta until al dente. Drain and reserve

I cup of water. Add pasta and water to skillet of vegetables. Cook until water is nearly absorbed. Stir in cheese and butter; season with salt and pepper; garnish with freshly torn basil leaves.

Rosemary Potato and Sausage Frittata

- 1 Tbsp. extra-virgin olive oil
- (divided use) I small yellow onion, chopped
- 1/2 lb. Italian sausage
- Salt and pepper, to taste
- 1/2 tsp. crushed red pepper
- I clove garlic, minced
- 4 small red potatoes, sliced
- 1/2 Tbsp. fresh rosemary, minced (or 1/2 tsp. dry)
- 4 eggs

$1/3\ \text{cup}\ \text{whole}\ \text{milk}\ (\text{or}\ \text{half-and-half})\ 1/2\ \text{cup}\ \text{Parmesan},\ \text{grated}$

I. Preheat oven to 350 F. In an oven-safe skillet, combine 1/2 the olive oil and next 4 ingredients; sauté over medium heat until sausage is browned. Stir in garlic. Drain; set aside.

2. In the same pan, add remaining oil, layer potatoes and add rosemary. Flip potatoes until browned.

 Whisk eggs, milk and cheese in a bowl.
 Spread sausage mixture over potatoes; pour egg mixture on top. Bake for 10-12 minutes until eggs are fluffy and start to brown. Cool for several minutes.

Butternut Squash and Bacon Risotto

4 slices bacon, chopped

- I Tbsp. extra-virgin olive oil (divided use)
- I yellow onion, chopped (divided use)
- 1 1/2 cups butternut squash, diced
- I clove garlic, minced
- I cup Arborio rice, uncooked
- I cup dry white wine
- 4 cups chicken stock
- 1 Tbsp. unsalted butter
- 1/2 cup Parmesan, grated Fresh parsley for garnish
- Salt and pepper, to taste

I. Fry bacon in skillet over medium heat; drain and set aside.

2. Add 1/2 of the oil and 1/2 of the onion to the skillet; sauté until onion is soft. Add butternut squash and sauté until browned. Pour mixture into bowl; set aside.

3. In same pan, add remaining oil and onion with garlic and rice. Sauté for 2 minutes. Add wine; cook for 2-3 minutes. Add I cup of stock; stir until liquid is absorbed. Repeat until all stock has been added.

4. Add butternut squash mixture, butter, cheese and parsley; season with salt and pepper; top with crumbled bacon.
