


Melanie Mitschke grew up in a family of musically inclined individuals. Her love for the arts began at a very young age, thanks in large part to those same family members. "My maternal grandfather and his brother were both Juilliard graduates. They performed duo piano concerts all over the world," Melanie shared. "My mom was also a piano teacher."

Her German heritage took her to many places when she was young. She vividly remembers the many times her family's band played at the annual Wurstfest event in New Braunfels, Texas. "The band needed a trumpet player," Melanie said with a laugh. "I was in the fourth grade when I became a member of the family band — as the trumpet player."

With an upbringing rooted so deep in the arts, it made sense for Melanie to pursue a career that has allowed her to share her love of music with others. She began her profession as an educator of music in Austin, Texas, where she spent 10 years. After moving to Ennis, she spent three years at Ennis Junior High School, before taking 10 years off "to just be a mom" to her two sons. "This is my second year at Austin Elementary, and I'm loving every minute of it," she admitted.

While in college, Melanie took classes that allowed her to learn "a little about the violin and a little more about the clarinet." Upon graduation, she was educated to teach instruction on all instruments, from elementary up to the high school level. When she first entered the classroom at EJH, she went in on the fallacy that seventh- and eighth-graders would be set in their ways. "I was wrong in my assumptions," she admitted. "They were still open to seeing themselves able to achieve greater things."

Returning to the classroom after being home for so many years may have given Melanie cause to be just a bit anxious, but that anxiety was soon put to rest. "I do believe teaching band at the junior high level prepared me for the elementary-level students I teach today," she stated. "I have found that both age groups strive on structure and routines." Once the younger students were comfortable

in the classroom, their creativity grew. Teamwork and self-expression became the norm. "Coming into elementary, I was able to gain some trust," Melanie explained. "I've been able to see them flourish, as they continue to grow from one level of instruction to the next."

Challenges are expected no matter what subject is being taught. The work of a music teacher is difficult at times, but it is also equally rewarding. Keeping her young charges engaged and involved is key to the overall success garnered in the classroom. Later this month, students will perform in the annual Christmas program — the Austin Elementary Christmas Revue — to a lunchroom filled to overflowing with faculty, parents and grandparents. "Every grade level performs two songs each, as they bring the Christmas spirit alive in music," Melanie said. "We also have students who dress up as Frosty the Snowman and as a dancing Christmas tree. Teachers love the program because it gives them time to relax and just enjoy the show."

Students learn so much about life as they perform. It teaches them about dedication and commitment, as they see actual rewards from their hard effort and increased attentiveness. "Music, performance and the arts enhances their overall quality of life," Melanie said, as she referred to the NAMM Foundation's How Children Benefit from Music Education website. "They are more wellrounded individuals who gain confidence in the world around them."

While making final preparations for the upcoming Christmas Revue, Melanie





also travels to the David Crockett Early Childhood Center daily to instruct her youngest students at the kindergarten level. Her classes rotate to participate in music twice a week for 30 minutes each time. "The program at Austin is fantastic, too," she added. "I see each student no fewer than two times per week. I'm able to teach, and they are able to learn so much more in the extra time provided for music education."

As if this doesn't keep her busy enough, Melanie also works with students who are involved with the Chime Choir and Drum Club, in an afterschool setting. "There are so many choices available in music arts," she stated, "and I want students to have as many choices as







possible. I want them to interact in the choices that best fit them."

Chimes are similar to hand bells, except they aren't as heavy to play, while plastic buckets from Home Depot are used in the Drum Club. "They decorate their bucket drums for the seasons, or in ways that reflect their personal tastes," Melanie shared. "Last year, during the annual Spring Musical, they came out to a fog machine."

As soon as classes resume from the winter holiday, Melanie will dive into preparation for the spring musical, scheduled for Thursday, April 19, 2018. Several students will vie for solo parts, while many others will play a featured part or dress in specific costumes. "The musical allows them to show their personalities," she confessed. "Once they find their niche, they also find success."

The future looks bright for the EISD music program. Melanie hopes to bring ukuleles to the Austin campus in the future, thanks to Donors Choose, a U.S.-based nonprofit that allows individuals to donate directly to public school classroom projects. "Ukuleles are affordable, at \$30 each, and they're the right size for their little hands," she explained. "Once they learn just three chords, they are able to accompany themselves on thousands of songs." NOW



which usually involve at least 25 people."

"I really like the master bedroom," BriAnn added. "It's at the back of the house and has two closets and a large master bath." 
is a black tree in the master bedroom, with silver, blue and black decorations. and the guest room/office tree features a mix of nostalgia, with homemade and vintage ornaments.
















Recently, Julia signed up with Yoga 4 Love of Ovilla to learn to become a yoga teacher. She dreams of using salvage art and voga to help people who live with autism. Another recent endeavor is an inspirational mural for the Ferris Intermediate School Gifted and Talented Program. She and the director, Michelle Beard, are planning further creative endeavors for the students participating in the program. Just as her grandmother taught her, she is sharing her talents and loves it, especially passing on her creative recycling ideas to a new generation. "I believe in using all the things we have at our disposal, rather than disposing of all our things," Julia added.


Sculptures are a specialty of Julia's. She built a 20-foot walking puppet, from recycled material, to cross the Margaret Hunt Hill Bridge a few years ago. "I often use mannequins for my art, installing lights for their heads and turning them into what I call 'mandeliers," she said. "They hang from the ceiling or stand independently. I mosaic, collage and paint them. I have a kind of fascination with angels, so you will see a lot of winged things in my art." These are her current works in progress for an upcoming art show in the spring. Julia is being assisted by local educator Lisa Day Schriner, who is using this experience to accrue hours to further her degrees. Together, they will curate the spring art show.


Until it closed, Julia taught a Styrofoam art class at The Women's Museum in Dallas' Fair Park. She created



many samples for the young ladies to use as inspiration, and those samples ended up showing in the Women's Building at the State Fair. "Big Tex's Blue Jeans were a big hit," she added.

In her own home, Julia has created a shower mosaic. Each wall represents nature's elements. A tree represents earth, a sunflower represents fire and water is represented by waves and shells. The open door of the shower represents air, and she has sewn feathers to a sheer blue shower curtain to catch the breeze as it moves through the house.



# Beautifully Comfortable

Women of every size find affordable, boutique clothing at The ZigZag Stripe. — By Melissa Rawlins and Sandra Strong

Imagine acting on your dreams every day. Leslie Hall does. She did it four years ago, when her stay-at-home-mom habit of shopping online triggered a vision. Her desire was to design and sell apparel for the curvaceous busy woman.

In 2013, The ZigZag Stripe was launched, and the online store began selling cute, comfortable and affordable apparel out of a 10-foot-by-10-foot room in Leslie's home. Sales exploded, possibly because Leslie chose models who are everyday people like stay-at-home moms and school teachers. With the growth, the move from the space at her house to the first warehouse became real.

Realizing women wanted to touch, feel and try on the clothes, the decision was made to utilize a small space at the warehouse. This allowed for a small store front. Not guessing that ladies would be willing to stand in line to get in, it soon became obvious that a real store front was needed.

It was not long before the first brick-and-mortar store opened in historical downtown Mansfield. Waxahachie was next, but this was not the original planned location. They had just visited another city to look at property and were headed home. The Waxahachie location came after an evening of just "passing through town," just in case there might be something available. "We literally parked and walked the square and surrounding streets. 

# Diversify With Bonds (Even If Rates Are Low)

If you've needed a mortgage or another type of loan over the past several years, you've probably appreciated the historically low interest rates we've experienced. But if you've wanted to own fixed-rate investments, such as bonds, you might have been less pleased at the low-rate environment. Now, interest rates may be moving up somewhat, but even if they don't hit the heights we saw in previous decades, you can still gain some key advantages from owning bonds.

One of the biggest benefits provided by bonds is their ability to help you diversify a stock portfolio. Stocks and bonds often move in different directions — in fact, the same economic or political forces that can be bad for stocks might be good for bonds, and vice versa. Consequently, if you own a reasonable percentage of bonds, you may not be as vulnerable to the impact of those inevitable downturns in the stock market. Keep in mind, though, that diversification can't guarantee profits or protect you against losses.

Of course, the other major attribute of bonds is the regular income they provide through interest payments. Unless the issuer defaults — an event that's generally unlikely, assuming you purchase quality, "investment-grade" bonds — you can count on receiving the same payments for the life of your bond. Then, once your bond matures, you'll get back the original principal, again assuming the issuer doesn't default. The ability to receive regular payments may help improve your cash flow and possibly help you avoid selling stocks to meet unexpected costs, such as an expensive car repair. And holding your bond until maturity can help you plan to meet specific goals. For example, if your child will be starting college in five years, you can buy a bond scheduled

to mature at the same time, providing you with an influx of cash you can use for tuition and other school expenses.

Still, despite the benefits of diversification, steady income and the repayment of principal, you may find it hard to ignore the relatively low interest rates you're seeing on your bonds. This is especially true if market rates rise, causing the value of your bonds to fall. (Investors won't pay you the full price — that is, the face value — of your bonds when they can buy new ones issued at higher rates. So, if rates have risen and you want to sell your bonds before they mature, you'd have to offer them at a discount.)

One way of coping with interest-rate movements is to build a "ladder" of bonds of varying maturities. When your short-term bonds mature, you can reinvest the proceeds in newly issued bonds that may offer higher rates, while your longer-term bonds continue to pay you greater income. (Generally — but not always — longer-term bonds carry higher interest rates than short-term bonds.)

Even within this type of bond ladder, though, you will want to diversify your holdings among different types of bonds from different issuers. In any case, be sure to evaluate whether a bond ladder and the securities held within it are consistent with your investment objectives, risk tolerance and financial circumstances.

Don't ignore bonds when constructing and maintaining your investment portfolio. No matter what interest rates are doing, you'll find that bonds can play an important role in your portfolio.

### The Amazing Liver

The largest organ inside the body reveals remarkable regenerative properties. You can lose a majority portion of your liver, and the remaining tissue can grow into a whole organ once again. Amazing! This vital organ performs numerous functions, and without it, the body would perish.

It is located in the upper right side of the abdomen and below the diaphragm. One of its more important jobs is to remove waste products from the bloodstream by performing as a filter. Drugs, alcohol and environmental substances are just a few of the substances removed or neutralized by the liver. The liver produces and regulates cholesterol and manufactures clotting factors for the blood and other proteins. It helps to maintain the balance of hormones. Making and secreting bile and storing some vitamins and minerals are among the more well-known functions. The liver also helps to regulate blood sugar levels by storing glycogen.

There are many things you can do to keep your liver healthy. Excessive intake of alcohol is the leading cause of liver disease, so drink in moderation. Use over-the-counter medications and herbal or natural remedies with caution. Your liver still has to process these, whether they are man-made or "natural." Even high doses of certain vitamins can be harmful. Follow your physician's instructions on any prescribed medication. Limit or avoid any exposure to environmental hazards and toxins, such as certain cleaners and insecticides. If you

can breathe it, consume it or have it penetrate your skin, it will eventually reach your liver. So, use gloves and a mask in a well-ventilated area when handling hazardous chemicals. Try to avoid foods that are high in unhealthy fats. Hepatitis A, B and C can cause significant damage to the liver, but there are vaccines available for Hepatitis A and B. Since the virus is spread by contact with another's bodily fluids or blood, try to avoid contact with these substances.

Although it can regenerate itself, the liver is not indestructible. Some of the signs and symptoms that your liver could be headed for trouble may, at first, be too vague for a diagnosis. Nausea, weakness, lack of energy and a change in appetite can be attributed to a host of diseases. The more specific indications that are cause for alarm are yellowing of the skin, eyes and urine (jaundice). Advanced cases would present with symptoms such as unexplained itching of the skin, abdominal pain and swelling, in addition to the previous presenting symptoms.

These symptoms are cause for concern and warrant monitoring by your physician. Many liver ailments can be treated. The best course of action is to protect yourself and keep you and your liver safe. **NOW** 



## Relish the Region

Fond memories are easily created in Copenhagen, Denmark. The bronze-and-granite Little Mermaid, inspired by Hans Christian Andersen's fairy tale, perches on a boulder in the harbor and can never be cliché. One of the most beautiful and enjoyable ways to see this old, maritime city is from a boat sailing down its charming canals, but even if you choose to visit in the winter, ice cannot stop your investigations of its history and beauty.

Holiday lovers might want to start by booking themselves into the Nimb Hotel, which offers 17 unique and individually decorated rooms - 12 of which are suites. Almost all the rooms have open fireplaces with birch wood, large bathrooms with luxury bath products and views of the charming Tivoli Gardens, where the Christmas spirit abounds.

Tivoli Gardens amusement park is a must-see for all visitors. Located just a few minutes' walk from City Hall, with the Copenhagen Central Station as its nearest neighbor, Tivoli Gardens was founded in 1843

and has become a national treasure and an international attraction. The scenery is beautiful with exotic architecture, historic buildings and lush gardens. At night, thousands of colored lights create a fairy tale atmosphere amidst the charmingly themed villages and shops full of tasty treats and dazzling decorations. Add to that wonderful restaurants and thrilling rides, and you are set for a day's adventure.

Danish weather can be tricky. But there are plenty of things to do in Copenhagen even on a rainy day. For the price of a normal bus ticket, you can get from the Royal Library at one end of the harbor to The Little Mermaid at the other end, passing the idyllic district: Christianshavn, Nyhavn and the Royal Opera House. If you purchase a Copenhagen Card online, you — and two children under 10 — can use public transportation and visit more than 70 museums and attractions for free.

The best way to get a realistic perspective of Copenhagen is a trip









to its highest tower. The property of the Danish Parliament, whose members took the initiative to open it to the public at no charge every day except Mondays, the tower of Christiansborg Palace offers views unique and magnificent.

If you wish, you can take an early morning, 6-K jog on the paths surrounding the lakes, or head for one of the fine cafés: Kaffesalonen at 6, Peblinge Dossering; Café Front Page at 21, Sortedam Dossering; and Den Franske Café, 101, Sortedam Dossering. If you prefer enjoying the view from the tower, you can also give yourself a culinary experience in Restaurant Tårnet, run by the recognized restaurateur Rasmus Bo Bojesen. And foodies always make a trip to eat Danish smorrebrod (openfaced sandwiches) and traditional Christmas food at the cozy restaurant Kronborg, in the center of Copenhagen. Visitors relish their classic Danish Christmas lunch, following the traditional four "rounds" of fish, meat, cheese and traditional Danish rice pudding with almonds.

The Botanical Gardens, located in the center of Copenhagen, are open to the public October through March. Of its 27 historical glasshouses, the most notable is the old Palm House, circa 1874, which is 16 meters tall and has narrow, cast-iron spiral stairs leading to a passageway at the top.

If you stay through the New Year, watch the Queen's New Year's speech on television before going out for a great New Year's feast. At midnight, listen to the City Hall clock strike 12, then sing along to the national anthem and have a piece of the traditional marzipan cake, kransekage, along with a glass of champagne. While the fireworks roar, you'll celebrate New Year's like a true Dane and give yourself memories to last a lifetime. **NOW**

#### Rum Cake

Cake:

Nonstick cooking spray I yellow cake mix 1 3.4-oz. box instant vanilla pudding 1/2 cup light rum 1/2 cup oil 1/2 cup water 4 eggs 1/2 cup nuts, chopped (optional)

Glaze:

1 cup sugar 1/4 cup sugar 1 stick butter 2 Tbsp. rum

- 1. For cake: Preheat oven to 350 F; spray a Bundt pan with cooking spray.
- 2. Blend cake mix, pudding, rum, oil, water and eggs for approximately 2 minutes, or until the mixture is moist and smooth.

- 3. If desired, sprinkle nuts into bottom of the pan; pour the cake batter over the nuts.
- 4. For glaze: While cake is baking, prepare the glaze. In a saucepan, combine all the ingredients, except the rum; boil for 3 minutes.
- 5. Remove the cake from the oven, but while still in the pan, punch holes in the cake with a wooden spoon handle.
- 6. Carefully, add the rum to the glaze mixture just before pouring the glaze over the cake, since the rum will cause the glaze to foam and rise. Pour the glaze over the cake; let it cool 1 hour before removing the cake from the pan.
- **7.** Store in the refrigerator for best results.

#### **Christmas Eve Creamy** Crock-Pot Hot Chocolate

1 1/2 cups heavy cream 1 14-oz. can Eagle Brand Sweetened Condensed Milk

2 cups milk chocolate chips 6 cups milk I tsp. vanilla Marshmallows or whipped cream, optional

- **1.** In a Crock-Pot, whisk together all ingredients except the optional marshmallows or whipped cream.
- **2.** Cover; cook on low for 2 hours, stirring occasionally until mixture is hot and chocolate chips are melted.
- 3. Whisk well before serving; garnish, if desired, with marshmallows or whipped cream.

- 8 squares BAKER'S Semi-Sweet Baking Chocolate (divided use)
- I box Duncan Hines Dark Chocolate Cake Mix
- 1 3.4-oz. pkg. JELL-O Chocolate Instant **Pudding & Pie Mix**
- 4 eggs
- 1 cup sour cream
- 1/2 cup oil
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 8-oz. tub Cool Whip Whipped Topping, frozen
- 2 Tbsp. almonds, sliced
- 1. Preheat oven to 350 F; grease 2 9-inch round baking pans. Chop two chocolate squares; set aside.
- 2. In a large bowl, beat the cake mix, dry pudding mix, eggs, sour cream, oil and water with an electric mixer on low speed until moist. Beat on medium speed 2 additional minutes; stir in chopped chocolate. Pour mixture evenly into prepared pans.
- 3. Bake 30-35 minutes until a wooden toothpick inserted into the centers comes out clean; cool on wire racks 10 minutes. Loosen cakes from pan sides. Invert cakes onto racks; gently remove pans. Cool cakes completely.
- 4. Place the frozen whipped topping and remaining chocolate squares in a microwavable bowl; microwave on high 90 seconds (stirring after the first minute) or until chocolate is completely melted and the mixture is smooth.
- **5.** Let the mixture stand 15 minutes to thicken. Place one cake layer on a serving plate; top with 1/4 of the chocolate mixture; add second cake layer.
- **6.** Spread the top layer and cake sides with the remaining chocolate mixture. Store in the refrigerator overnight; serve cold after garnishing with almond slices.
