change and both new gifts and new challenges. Enjoy the transition, as the evershortening days of winter give way to the lengthening days of spring.


Meanwhile, I'll be in my closet digging out the sweaters. I hope to have a few days that are cold enough to really enjoy wearing them!

When Christmas comes to Cedar Hill, Toni Simmons is Santa's chief elf. Back in 2009, she was the children's librarian, and the book The Polar Express was at the height of its popularity. Toni was a traditional storyteller and was always on the lookout for ways to make literature come to life for young, budding readers. She got the idea to make this children's favorite really come to life. From that desire sprang a community tradition.

"Traphene Hickman was the library director at that time," Toni explained. "She and I were both storytellers. Lots of schools were having Polar Express events with Macy's-style displays. I wanted to do something different." Toni found plenty of support for her idea, and soon the library was hosting a minor event with train rides in the parking lot and live storytelling of the book. "We had Phil Edwards as our conductor. The kids came in their pajamas. We gave out hot cocoa and bells with the word Believe on them, just like in the book. I couldn't believe the number of kids who showed up!" The event was a major hit, and a tradition was born.

The second year, Toni, her boss and the library staff decided to go even


bigger. "We included the gold tickets, and we got the youth to be helpers and dress up as elves. We needed more space for everything. We added caroling for the kids who were waiting for rides on the train, and there were hundreds!" The event kept growing and adding more crafts and activities, requiring more volunteers and more space as word got out, and the crowds of kids wanting their turn to ride the Polar Express kept growing!

And now as library director, Toni has inherited full responsibility for her brainchild. "The last year we did this as a solo event was 2015. That year, we had 1,200 kids show up. We had an inflatable movie screen to show the film. The event had grown so big we needed two trains, and more community groups had gotten involved. We had crafts in the meeting room, balloon animals, Santa with live reindeer. In fact, there were so many kids lined up before the event that the conductor decided to start the train rides early, just to be sure everyone got a turn!"

Last year, the Zula B. Wylie staff combined their efforts with the longstanding city event, Holiday on the Hill, which just meant it got even bigger! "We had over 5,000 in attendance. The trains blocked off the whole downtown! And this year, we'll have three trains!" Toni exclaimed. "Mrs. Claus joined Santa and his reindeer. We still had the crafts,

but now we had four hot cocoa stations offering chocolate milk and cookies. Five school groups from Cedar Hill ISD performed as part of the Holiday on the Hill and Stacia's School of Dance brought six or seven age groups of dancers, who performed on stage. There was a snow hill and bounce houses and the traditional tree lighting with the mayor."

To bring about this combined Holiday on the Hill featuring The Polar Express, the library collaborates with the Parks and Recreation Department. "We were already partnering on other events, so when someone suggested combining these two, everyone said, 'Why not?"" But Toni has worked hard to ensure the combined event retains that Polar Express magic, which made the original library event such a success to begin with. "We still have the cocoa, bells, crafts and rides — all at no charge," Toni explained. "The whole library staff is involved, either holding down the fort here at the library, or manning the event downtown. The Sit and Sew group put the ribbons on the bells. The Senior Center helped with the letters to Santa. Last year, we added a model train display. And this year, we are adding life-size scenes from the book."

The planning starts in the spring, when the committee gets together for their first monthly meeting. There are performers

to contact, before they get another offer. And trains to book. And stilt-walking toy soldiers to invite. And the schools have to plan their participation in time to teach their students their roles. Then, in September, they start meeting every other week. The committee includes five to six people from the Parks and Recreation Department and another five or six from the library. That all leads up to the big night, when it's all hands on deck. That night more than 20 people from Parks and Recreation and seven or eight from the library, plus 20-30 volunteers from the community are there making sure everything runs smoothly. Other city departments also send volunteers, and the Tourism Department pitches in. Of course, the mayor and others from city government are there for the tree lighting and to enjoy the festivities.

So why is a grown woman with several degrees and a professional job so passionate about bringing a children's book to life? Toni doesn't have to think for even a moment to answer that question. "If you could see the excitement on the kids' faces - their eyes light up when they see Santa and the Believe bells. They think it's all magic." And Toni likes a bit of drama. She majored in theater in college, then did her graduate work in library science and started storytelling, which she now does at some of the big storytelling festivals. "This is a way to bring the story to life, to get the kids to experience the book. When I tell stories, kids light up. It's another way of interacting with books. It helps develop their imaginations. My ultimate desire is to increase the kids' desire to read. This is a way to develop literacy by exposing kids to a fun story and getting them excited about books and reading. And every time they read The Polar Express, for the rest of their lives, these memories will come back." NOW






wanted to get a piloting license, but it was too expensive," he remembered. "So, I built and flew radio-controlled airplanes, which was a kind of sculpting, too. I remember carving the propellers out of wood. I even challenged myself to build a Starship Enterprise that would actually fly." Earlier, while in high school, Tom took ceramics. "One thing I remember making was an art deco cat. The teacher said it blew up in the kiln, but I always wondered if he just liked it and kept it," he joked. So, hidden bits and pieces of a construction worker's life, going back to early childhood, were preparing him for his future as a sculptor.

When Tom found himself sidelined from his previous career as building manager and set builder at the Studios at Las Colinas, recovering from major surgery and suffering from boredom and a need to do something with his hands, sculpting emerged to give him new purpose. "My wife, Rayanna, was leading an after-school program focused on arts for inner city kids. She wanted a sculptor to show the kids another art form, and she asked me to do a live sculpture for one of the assemblies. I had some oil-based Plasticine clay, so I spoke to the class while I sculpted a bust of Jesus. I got the face finished, but I didn't have time to do the hair." In that first presentation, Tom discovered that he enjoyed doing his sculpture as a kind of performance art. Much of his



sculpture is Christian-themed. He has done heads of several of the disciples, Christ on the cross and other such pieces, often sculpted live during church worship sessions, which are sometimes captured on film. He admits that having a cameraman filming close up while he sculpts is sometimes awkward, but the live aspect fuels his creativity. "I don't use models, and I try not to look at the audience while I'm sculpting. It's just me and the clay," he said.

Tom starts his sculptures with a simple wig head. "I just scrape off all the features, then I apply a patina and go to sculpt." Once he is finished sculpting a piece, his process is only partially done. "As the clay dries, it cracks. I fill the cracks as they form, and then sand it down and apply a sealer. Then I add the finish that makes it look like bronze."



One of Tom's most recent pieces is a commission. It's a close-up of Jesus' hand being nailed to the cross. "I started that as a smaller piece, but the person who commissioned it wanted it bigger, so I made it big!" Tom has done other commissions, including a samurai head for a restaurant in Waxahachie. A local museum asked him to sculpt Adam and Eve. A coffee shop in Midlothian displays a lighthouse he did for them. One of the first pieces he sold was a roaring lion. Tom sculpted it during a seminar, and when he was done, a senior vice president from Merrill Lynch approached him. He told Tom that lions were a theme in his home decor. He asked several times to



buy the piece. Tom wasn't sure how to price his work, since he didn't usually sell his pieces. "I asked him what he thought it was worth. He offered me \$2,000, and I said, 'Sold!" A giant eagle's head and busts of Wyatt Earp and Chief Black Kettle are among his other work.

Tom teaches classes for budding young sculptors. He proudly shows off some of the pieces the kids have made for assignments. "A teacher is always more proud of his students' work than he is of his own. It's fun to be able to say, 'I have a student who did this!""

Tom has a number of pieces in the works. "I'm doing a bobcat mascot for the school my stepson teaches at. Also, I'm making a matched set of lifesize lions out of sculpted concrete for an outdoor garden. For that one, I'm going to have to create some of the tools I'll need." He also has plans for a lion mailbox.

Most of Tom's work to date has consisted of unique projects. "The neat thing is if you buy a piece from me, they're all one-offs. That makes them more valuable — especially if I die!" But Tom does have plans for some more commercial pieces. He's studying how to make plaster molds of his work, so he can produce a run of some items. "And now that we're in the 21st century, I want to get a 3-D printer and a 3-D scanner, so I can print off some of my work."

For Tom Fields, when one career ended, another was just starting. And he's embracing this new direction with as much energy as he did the first. NOW

don't mind the parking problem that creates. I'm the main cook, but everyone brings dishes. We draw names and have a gift for the person we drew."

Baking is a skill passed down through the generations in Charlotte's family. But when she was first learning, getting the temperature just right was tricky. "I would give all the burnt cookies to my neighbor. He would eat them and come back the next day for more! Still, today, when I see him, he always asks me if I have any burnt up cookies!" NOW

Christmas Snowballs

2 cups all-purpose flour 2 cups pecans, chopped 1/4 cup sugar 1 cup sweet cream butter

I tsp. vanilla extractI 1-lb. bag powdered sugar

1. Preheat oven to 325 F.

2. Add all ingredients, except powdered sugar, to a large bowl; mix well.

3. Roll dough into 1-inch balls; place on a greased cookie sheet. Bake at 325 F for 5-10 minutes, until edges are lightly brown. Remove from oven. Roll in powdered sugar. Place on a plate.

Momma's Favorite Sugar Cookies

1 1/2 cups powdered sugar

1 cup butter

1 tsp. vanilla extract

I tsp. almond extract

1 egg

2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour

I tsp. baking soda

I tsp. cream of tartar

I cup nuts, chopped (optional)

1. In a large bowl, beat powdered sugar and butter until nice and creamy.

2. Add extracts and egg; mix well. Add flour, baking soda and cream of tartar; blend together. Add nuts.

3. Roll on waxed paper; refrigerate for 3 hours.

4. Preheat oven to 375 F. Cut into 1/2-inch slices. Bake for 8-10 minutes.

Chocolate S'mores

3/4 cup butter
I cup dark brown sugar

1/2 cup granulated sugar

2 large eggs

1 Tbsp. vanilla extract

2 3/4 cups all-purpose flour

I Tbsp. baking soda

1/2 tsp. salt

1 12-oz. bag semi-sweet chocolate chips (divided use)

I bag bite-size HERSHEY'S chocolate bars

I bag large marshmallows

1. Preheat oven to 375 F. Line a cookie sheet with parchment paper.

2. Beat together butter, brown sugar and granulated sugar until creamy, about 2-3 minutes. Add eggs, one at a time, mixing after each. Add vanilla extract.

3. In another bowl, combine flour, baking soda and salt; mix well. Add chocolate chips. Add to wet ingredients; mix well.

4. Using a cookie scoop, roll into balls and place on cookie sheet, 3 inches apart. Bake until edges are golden, but middles still look doughy, about 11-12 minutes.

5. While cookies are still hot, add a HERSHEY bar and a marshmallow; top with another cookie.

6. Bake for an additional 3 minutes, giving the chocolate in the middle a chance to melt.

Old-fashioned Tea Cakes

I cup vegetable oil

1 cup butter

1 cup powdered sugar

1 tsp. vanilla extract

2 eggs, beaten

4 cups flour

I tsp. salt

1 tsp. baking soda

1 cup granulated sugar

1. Cream first 4 ingredients; add eggs. Stir in flour, salt and baking soda; mix well.

2. Chill dough. Roll dough into small balls (6 dozen).

3. Coat the bottom of a smooth, glass plate with vegetable oil. Dip each ball in granulated sugar. Press against oiled plate to flatten: repeat with each cookie.

4. Bake 10 minutes at 350 F. Cool on a wire rack.
