EDITOR'S NOTE


Isn't it amazing?







laughing. At first, they had an orchard with apples and peaches. Then in 1997, they planted 500 Virginia pines. They no longer grow pines, and the orchard no longer exists. But they still grow an abundance of Cypress Christmas trees. In 2000, the family opened up their farm to the public and sold their first trees. A year later, they added one card table with one plate of cookies. Since then, they open up on the Saturday after Thanksgiving. Although people come to buy a tree, the farm is so much more than a place to cut the perfect Christmas tree. For many, it became an annual tradition. One young family came each year. Now they return with their grandchildren.

Glenda and Dean always talked about returning to the farm. Four years ago, after having their third child, they outgrew their house and decided to make the leap. They built a house backing up to the farm. They can easily help with never-ending work. Brady, their 9-year-old son, already helps out and is learning to drive the mowers. At 6, Hannah claims she will run it someday. Even though Preston is only 4, he already loves planting trees. The kids also have a big part in making sure kidfriendly crafts and games remain part of the seasonal activities.



Each year, the day after Thanksgiving is a special event for the family. The Dearmans adopted Glenda's family. A more-than-30-foot tree towers in the middle of the other trees. The entire family comes out from Fort Worth and Dallas. They decorate it and allow anyone who wants to use it for a backdrop to do so. Every year, many families come out and take a photo in front of the giant tree, measuring their children's growth and enjoying tradition. Whether they purchase a tree or not, it is an opportunity to slow down and simply enjoy time together.

Now, 4D Farm includes hayrides, a barrel train — created for Glenda and Dean's children, but shared with guests — and other farm games to play. A small building provides a place to come in out of the cold and enjoy hot chocolate, apple cider or coffee, along with fresh-baked cookies. The original farmhouse still stands on the property. Although it was literally falling down, they remodeled it, and now Ron's mother lives there. At 94, she still loves baking cookies, which they serve to guests. A warm, clean bathroom was also an important addition. Although they sell some homemade gifts and jams to cover the operation costs of the building, that isn't their primary purpose. They have lots of crafts and goods made by local neighbors, family and friends. One of their cousins has Parkinson's disease, but she makes beautiful cards they place in the shop. It is an outlet to help others, as well.

Marion was a former assistant principal and still serves on the board for Couts Christian Academy. She wrote a book, Destination Heaven. She plans to use proceeds from book sales to support

For all of the family, Christmas is a favorite time of year. They love sharing their farm with others. One couple came out last year supposedly to take photos for a special Christmas card. What she didn't know was that it also included an engagement ring and proposal. The Dearman family loved being part of the surprise, and hopefully an annual tradition for these new friends. That's the greatest blessing of their farm — the many friends acquired over the years.

"Glenda's great with people," Marion said, smiling. "She remembers people. Dean does the research, and Ron fixes things. I weed and water."

Dean shared that it takes five years for a tree to grow. "There's always something to do," he said. "We want to keep it going for the next generation." In doing so, they provide a place for families, who become lifetime friends. to return and create memories for generations to come. NOW

AT HOME WITH JESSICA EAVES

From OLD to NEW

It's difficult to use just one, or even two, adjectives to describe Jessica Eaves' home. It's historical, industrial, vintage, yet modern. It's DIY and most of all, it's gorgeous and perfectly decorated. Her talented eye for grouping décor items and staging beautifully refinished pieces keep the eye entertained and drawn to all corners of the home.



"I think the belief is that when you decorate it has to be 'matchy-matchy,' but variety is more entertaining for the eye and draws people into the décor of the home," she said. Her Christmas decorations are perfectly styled, as well, creating a scene that would put anyone in the holiday spirit.

When she moved to Weatherford, she wanted a historical home and ended up purchasing one built in 1896 by Sam R. Williams, a confectioner, and his wife. The home was later sold to a widow who raised her six young sons in the home, along with her mother-in-law and brother-in-law, who lived with them. The home changed owners over the years, only making the history richer for the home Jessica desired.

The exterior at Christmas time is picture perfect. With a white exterior, antique red wagon and old snow sled, all decorated with garland, Christmas wreaths or poinsettias, the home looks adorable and inviting.

The Queen Anne-style home boasts Eastlake-style ornamentations and has been remodeled several times, with the exterior remaining the same. One of the major changes Jessica made to the home was the removal of a huge wall that divided the living room, dining room and office space.

"This house had great bones to it, but I didn't put a bid in until I knew I could remove the wall and open the dining room and living room into one big area,"





she said. "To separate the two spaces is a huge distressed and stained wooden beam I added that runs along the top and serves as a focal point in the room."

Additionally, Jessica came in and replaced some of the carpet with wood floors carried throughout the home, and



she added shiplap to the ceiling of the dining/living space, along with canned lighting. "Making this open living room/ dining room area just how I wanted it was very important, as this is the room my friends and I gather in and where I feel the most comfortable," Jessica said.

The living room has the fireplace that was part of Jessica's checklist when looking for a home and is complete for the season with two perfectly hung burlap stockings, a gorgeous poinsettiathemed Christmas tree and garland along the mantel. The cream-colored couch is paired with an oversized print chair and rustic red coffee table with a subtle Christmas-themed bowl, Christmas pillows and a lamp Jessica rewired, using an olive basket as the lamp shade.

Jessica aims for a cozy feel in her home. Fortunately, the styled décor for the season, combined with the historical feel, gives the exact vibes she seeks.















In the kitchen area, the handmade table is surrounded by chairs from the '70s Jessica had refinished, much like many other pieces in the home, and one side of the table has couch seating. Across from the table is a serving buffet with various Christmas photo frames and knick-knacks that add the extra "pop" in the room. Colorful artwork from an old cigar box is blown up and framed in an antique window.

Jessica's office space has windows overlooking her backyard, with a desk she made by taking an old door, covering it with epoxy and adding bed posts for the legs, as well as barn hinge doors. To the right of her table is a narrow wall and bookshelves carved out of the wall.


Her eye for decorating and refurbishing old pieces doesn't go unnoticed. "What you might call my china cabinets were pieces a neighbor asked if I could use. I refurbished those and they sit near my kitchen table now," she said. "I have a closet full of pieces and décor items that friends decided they no longer wanted. and while I don't have a use for them now or have time to refurbish them. I hang on to them and change out my décor when the time is right."

While her kitchen is smaller than she preferred, it offers beautiful wood countertops, with the countertop space to the right of the sink built at two different levels to improve the ergonomics of the kitchen. The other side of the kitchen has bar-style seating that faces the wall. In the middle is a metal cart she uses as the island. complete with a chandelier above it.

"The island has an industrial feel to it. much like many pieces throughout the home, but I'm always looking to soften the industrial feel with an antique vibe," lessica acknowledged.

In the master bedroom, Jessica wired old chicken feeders to serve as lamps that hang on either side of her bed, and she turned an old door into her floor-length mirror. "I cleaned this door and added new hardware and embellishments and then had the mirror attached to it," she said, "It's a duck egg color with a glaze over it."

Also, in the master bedroom is a dresser Jessica found from a lady who sells replica vintage furniture. She uses a robin-egg-blue jewelry cabinet featuring deer antlers mounted above it as a necklace holder. Her room has a door to the front porch, which served as one of the front entrances to the home when it was a duplex.




Adding more of her DIY touch, Jessica built beautiful shelving in the master bathroom using thick wood she purchased, distressed, stained and placed on top of black plumber's pipe. The master bath, just like the guest bath, has wood countertops and an industrial light fixture hanging in the center.

"I'm constantly finding something and have ideas for the embellishments and hardware and what I want for the final product," Jessica said, "Most of the items around the house are 'recycled,' as I pick them up while antiquing, or junktinguing, as my friends and I call it."

Jessica's style, combined with her beautifully restored historical home, was featured as part of the Parker County Candlelight Tour of Homes last Christmas. The tour, which takes place each December, features historical homes in the county that are decorated for the holiday and open to the public for tours. NOW

They laugh at the silly and most unique gifts, competing to get the one they want most.

This tradition, often referred to as "Chinese Christmas," is shared by many families. Mother and daughter, Sue Curry and Tami Pitts, also play this game and others on Christmas Day.

Tami said they have a lot of "stealing" going on. With 25-30 people around for holidays, it's a fun option for gift giving. They also incorporate small prizes for some games they play. They choose traditional turkey and dressing for Thanksgiving. However, at Christmas, everyone brings food to share, usually following a less traditional theme like Mexican dishes or barbecue.

Some celebrate with extended family on Christmas Eve. Jessi Smith said, "We enjoy Mexican food and bingo every Christmas Eve."

Judy Gilliam gathers with her family on Christmas Eve, as well. Although they all bring dishes, her kids think it isn't Christmas without tamales on the table. But she doesn't attempt to make homemade tamales. "Rosa's does a really good job," she said, chuckling.

Summer Wilkes has three sons. In December they welcome their fourth child. She made sure to buy a new ornament for this baby. It is a tradition started for her as an infant. Each year,

her grandparents and parents gave her a new ornament. Now she's passing on the tradition to her children, and her parents give one to them, as well. Like Summer, her kids will have years' worth of ornaments when they reach adulthood and have their own families.

Like many people, Shelley Shrader wants to remember Jesus at Christmastime. While her kids were young, each year, a few days before Christmas, she made a cake, decorated with a nativity on top. On Christmas Day, she gathered around the table with her husband and children, singing "Happy Birthday" to Jesus. It was her way of keeping the special meaning in the holiday. She also made an advent wreath, which she still uses. This family always traveled to a nearby Christmas tree farm and cut their own live tree. With her kids now in adulthood, she's moved away from some of their old customs, but the memories remain.

Emilie Lofgren describes her Christmas traditions as rather international in nature. A Sicilian from New York, she always makes lasagna on Christmas Eve. However, her husband, Magnus, is from Sweden and was a chef by trade. He always makes Swedish crepes (also known as lingonberry crepes) with ice cream and berries on top. Each year, they invite neighbors to come over and celebrate before going to a church service.

When the Lofgren children were younger, they participated in Christmas Lucia, a beautiful Swedish tradition. The girls, dressed in white with a red sash, proceed into the church. The wreaths on their heads may have electric candles, but often they use actual lighted candles, which the girls must keep balanced. "Having my girls participate in Lucia was magnificent," she shared with a glimmer in her eyes. They also have many handmade wooden ornaments from Sweden, which she displays proudly.

Whatever traditions your family uses, Christmas is a perfect time to make wonderful memories. Perhaps you have old ones from your childhood you are passing to your children or you are working at creating new, unique ones. - **6.** Refrigerate the pie at least 3 hours or overnight. Top with mini marshmallows, maraschino cherries and rainbow sprinkles.

Peachy Keen Tarts

4 personal-size containers peach yogurt Cheesecloth

- 1 1/2 cups peaches
- 1/2 cup kiwi

- 1 1/4 tsp. cinnamon 1 1/4 tsp. sugar
- 10 sheets phyllo dough (divided use) 1/4 cup peach preserves
- **1.** Preheat oven to 350 F. Drain yogurt for 1 hour in cheesecloth.
- 2. Thinly slice the peaches and kiwi. Mix cinnamon and sugar together.
- **3.** Spray tart pan with cooking spray. Press 5 sheets of the dough into the tart pan; fold the edges over toward the center of the pan.
- **4.** Spray the dough with cooking spray; sprinkle with 1 tsp. of the cinnamonsugar mix.
- **5.** Lay the remaining dough on top; sprinkle with 1 tsp. of cinnamon-sugar mix. Press dough against the sides of the pan to secure it. Bake for 10-15 minutes, or until golden brown.
- 6. Cool the dough; toss the fruit slices with remaining cinnamon-sugar mix.
- **7.** Spoon yogurt into the pastry shell; top with fruit.
- **8.** In a saucepan, over medium heat, melt the preserves; brush on top of the tarts.

Falling in Love Pie

- 1 14-oz. can condensed milk 2/3 cup water
- 1 3-oz. pkg. chocolate pudding mix (not the instant mix)
- 1 1-oz. square unsweetened chocolate
- 2 cups whipping cream
- 1 9-inch baked pastry shell
- 1. In a large saucepan over medium heat, thoroughly combine milk, water and pudding mix.
- 2. Add chocolate square; be careful not to burn the mixture.
- **3.** Over medium heat, cook and stir very fast until the chocolate melts and thickens. Remove from heat: beat until smooth.
- **4.** Cool the mixture; refrigerate until chilled.
- 5. Beat whipping cream until stiff. Stir chilled chocolate mixture and fold in the whipping cream.
- **6.** Pour the mixture into the pastry shell; chill for 4 hours.



company, ask if they have used all their charitable funds. Many businesses offer a charity matching program to incentivize employees to give. You could be doubling the contribution to a charity just by asking a simple question at the office.

Date

- Keep records of your giving. The rattle of change hitting a red kettle at the mall or grocery store is as much a sound of the season as the bells the volunteers are ringing. If you are wanting to give more than just your pocket change to The Salvation Army, or any nonprofit for that matter, it is better to donate online or with a check, so you can keep track of your giving. Your taxes are nowhere near the most important part of giving to others, but it is nice to get a small break in April as a result.
- Do not assume paperwork is coming. If you are giving to a charity you have not previously supported, make sure they will send a letter you can use in case the IRS tries to disallow your exemption. Most large nonprofit organizations do this regularly, but you may want to double check before giving a large sum away. If you wait until the IRS has denied a return, it will probably be too late to avoid penalties.

Prepare Now for Taxes Later

- Start collecting paperwork. You will not have all the forms you need to file your taxes for a few months, but you can still start consolidating papers and receipts now. Try to make it a goal to have a file with all the tax paperwork already in your possession before the new year begins. And if you moved into a new home this year, you will want to be sure you have your Homestead Exemption Form ready to file at the start of the year.
- Check your accounts. You may not need to do much between now and the flipping of the new calendar, but the

end of the year is a good time to assess your accounts. Be sure you are paid up and ready for the next round on any property taxes or business taxes if you are self-employed. Make sure there are no changes you need to think about for any bank accounts or mutual funds.

• Buy now to save later. If you are already thinking about making any big purchases, it may make sense to buy them before the end of the year. You might forget to claim the exemptions or sales tax on a fridge if you buy it in January and have to wait until next year's tax return. Check if there are any energy-efficient tax credits for appliances you are looking for, as those are not guaranteed to remain next year.


A Penny Saved

- Know your deadlines and limits. When it comes to retirement accounts, you have until the filing deadline, as opposed to the end of the year, to claim contributions on your taxes. The other thing to consider is your yearly limit. You can contribute thousands of dollars through your 401(k), if applicable, at your job. For individual retirement accounts, you can claim up to \$5,500 dollars each year, and you can double that if you are married and file jointly with your spouse. If you receive a large bonus, or anticipate a large raise next year, it might be in your best interest to maximize this year's contributions.
- Find other ways to save. Aside from typical mutual funds and retirement accounts, there are other options, especially if you are trying to save money for your children. There are multiple college savings accounts available, and they typically have more flexible limits than retirement funds.
- Reflect on the year. If you are taking advantage of an employer's 401 (k) matching offer, there is a science involved in maximizing your contribution. You can top out too early or wait too long, so look at the end of the year to see if you did all you could.

This season, while you are staying warm by the fire or watching your favorite holiday movies, take some time to make sure you ring out the old year with as much financial stability as you can.

The City of Lights

Natchitoches is known for many things — its culture, cuisine and hard to pronounce name (Nack-a-tish). Named after a Native American Indian tribe, Natchitoches translates to "pawpaw eaters," a fruit tree once plentiful in the region.

From its roots as the oldest settlement in the Louisiana Purchase, Natchitoches was established in 1714 by French explorer Louis Juchereau de St. Denis as a French Outpost along the Red River. After the river changed its course in the late 1800s, Cane River Lake was created, a 33-mile long section of the Red River that is now landlocked. The downtown Historic District is nestled along the banks of this picturesque body of water.

"The City" is known as the filming location for Steel Magnolias, as the Bed and Breakfast Capital of Louisiana and as a popular tourism destination. Nicknamed "The City of Lights," Natchitoches is best known for its six-week Christmas Festival of Lights, featuring more than 300,000 lights that make the town twinkle with magic. Starting the weekend before Thanksgiving with a "Turn on the Holidays" celebration, the festival continues through January 6. The official Natchitoches Christmas Festival Day is the first Saturday in December. A Christmas parade winds its way through downtown. Vendors sell fresh meat pies, and bands perform through the night. 2018 marks the 92nd annual celebration.

While this is the most popular festival, there's a plethora of events to enjoy year-round. Enjoy a day of competition, and cheer on rowers at the Dragon Boat Races, held annually at the beginning of March. In April is the Melrose Arts and Crafts Festival, where more than 100 vendors sell

their wares beneath the canopy of oak trees at Melrose Plantation, just 17 miles south of Natchitoches. And the Natchitoches Jazz R&B Festival is held annually in May with four stages playing a variety of music from jazz to rock.

For 39 years, the Natchitoches/NSU Folk Festival has been held annually in July in the air-conditioned Prather Coliseum on the Northwestern State University Campus. Browse through vendors and demonstrations, and listen to an eclectic variety of musicians.

Both the Fall and Christmas Tour of Homes offer sneak peeks inside some of the town's historic buildings, presented by the Natchitoches Historic Foundation and the Association for the Preservation of Historic Natchitoches. Also in the fall, stroll the streets and look under the hoods of antique autos at the annual Natchitoches Classic Car Show.

Each October, prominent figures from Natchitoches' history come to life at History Among the Tombstones: Stories from the American Cemetery. And the Grand Ecore Visitors Center, Los Adaes State Historic Site and Fort St. Jean Baptiste each offer unique programming throughout the year from lectures to demonstrations and re-enactments.

Stroll through downtown shops like Kaffie Frederick — Louisiana's oldest general store. Bring a boat and cruise Cane River and Sibley Lake for some of the best fishing spots around, or grab a kayak and take it slow. Whatever adventure you have in mind, Natchitoches will welcome you with its true Southern charm and hospitality.
