and Annett is a physical education paraprofessional at Drane Intermediate. What makes this story remarkable is that both were nominated, by their respective principals, as paraprofessional of the year within the school district.

Paraprofessional is a term that describes a teacher's aide. According to the website, ehow.com, "Paraprofessionals are defined as individuals who assist a teacher in the classroom or help with other school programs under the supervision of the principal." Paraprofessionals play an integral part in the educational process.

To become a Texas paraprofessional, ehow.com states: "You must first have a high school diploma or GED certificate. In addition to having a high school education, you may also need up to 48 college credit hours in subject areas, such as English,

mathematics, reading, child growth and development and other relevant areas." An individual can also earn an educational paraprofessional associate degree. A minimum amount of experience working with students is also recommended, which varies by school district. Paraprofessionals must take a screening test and pass the required competency examination, called the Paraprofessional's Assessment of Competencies Test, before becoming a Texas paraprofessional, and all school districts in the state require a valid paraprofessional certification, awarded through the State Board for Educator Certification.

Karmon, who was born and reared in Corsicana, said she received the bulk of her experience from more than 12 years of working in the Corsicana ISD. "At Drane, I was a paraprofessional for seven years before going to work in the school library," she said. "I moved over to Fannin Elementary as a librarian aide, where I read to the kids and help with checking books in and out. Recently, they changed the title of what I do there from librarian aide to librarian facilitator."



Annett is also a Corsicana native, who recently celebrated her 19th anniversary at Drane Intermediate. "I work with the kids and help teach them how to play volleyball, basketball — all kinds of sports," she said. "I'm in the gym all day long!"

The principal at Fannin, Diane Acock, called Karmon in June to let her know she had been nominated as Paraprofessional of the Year for Fannin Elementary. Karmon was amazed when she won the prestigious award. The plaque she received from the district is engraved: Superintendents Award for Outstanding Paraprofessional Service, Presented by Dr. Diane Frost Superintendent 2012-2013.



Annett, who was nominated for the award by Drane Intermediate Principal Adan Casas, was thrilled her daughter came out as the winner. She felt like she had won, too. "I was so proud of Karmon when her name was called out," Annett said. "She's worked hard and deserves the honor, that's for sure."

Annett explained that every year, each Corsicana campus nominates one individual for Paraprofessional of the Year. These campuses include: Carroll, Fannin, Bowie, Sam Houston and Navarro elementaries; Drane Intermediate; Collins Middle School;





and CHS. The number of paraprofessionals at each school varies by campus. "There are approximately 12 paraprofessionals at Fannin and eight at Drane," Annett said.

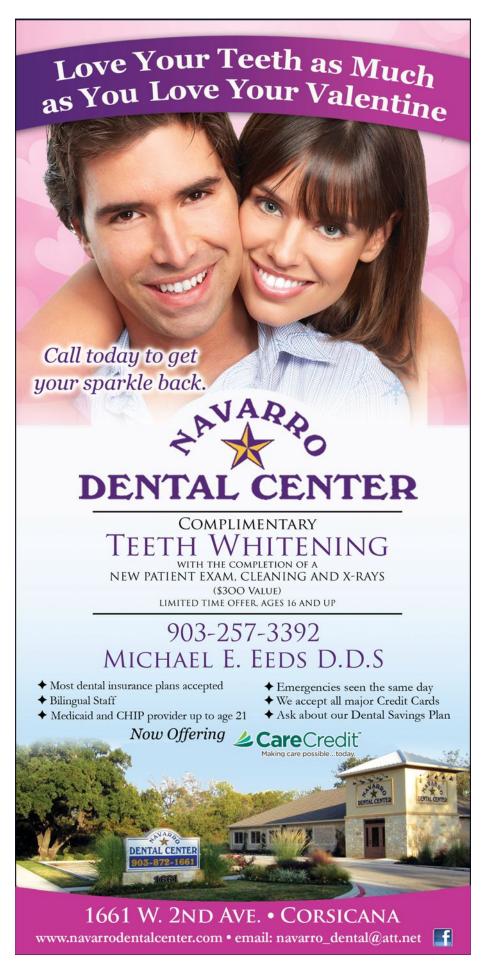
In addition to her paraprofessional work at Fannin, Karmon also works at the YMCA during the summer while school is in recess. "This past year, we started summer day camp in early June and finished in mid-August," she said. "Along with eight staff members, two junior counselors and two counselors in training, I worked with kids there who ranged in age from 5 to 12 years of age, Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m."

The program hosted between 38 and 54 kids in YMCA summer day camp this past year, and one

of their most popular outings was going to Camp Wanica. "We boarded the bus at the YMCA around 9:30 a.m. and got to the camp around 9:50 a.m. The activities included swimming, arts and crafts and board games, and everyone, including the counselors, had a really good time," Karmon said.

Each week of summer day camp is a different theme, with Fridays usually reserved for a field trip. "We've been to Chuck E. Cheese's, the movies, bowling and the Cook Center," Karmon said. "I'm looking forward to doing it again this year."







With childhood obesity at an all-time high in the country, Annett believes the secret to creating an all-around successful physical education program is listening to the students. "When you listen, really listen, you learn about each of the children," she said. "You learn really quickly how to deal with the challenges and problems the kids may be experiencing. You learn how to build relationships, and soon they begin to trust you."

Annett's seven physical education classes, often range in size from 52 to 90 students, ages 10 to 12. She motivates the kids to participate in sports by making sure she's a part of the team. "I get out there and do it with them," she said. "It shows them that if I can do it, they can do it, too. Once I do that, everything eventually falls into place."

Both Karmon and Annett agree that having "the patience of Job" goes a long way in creating a successful learning environment for students of any age. Karmon is very thankful for the help and assistance she's received from all the teachers at Fannin, whom she calls her "Fannin family," and Annett feels the same way about her Drane Intermediate family.

Mother and daughter believe they have found their own secret to staying involved with students for a long time, and they are happy to share that advice with others who work with children in the school system. "Just make sure you are prayed up," Annett said. "I love what I do, and I know Karmon does, too. If you have a passion for children, it shows, and they feel it." NOW

But the wait was worth it. John has since retired from a career with Atmos Energy and TXU, and loves spending his time settling into the condo. This means tackling the many repairs and chores on his "honey do" list that accumulated at their principal residence in Irving during his career days. Carolyn is still employed by Guidestone Financial Services in Dallas but is starting to discuss retirement possibilities. Weekends find John and Carolyn enjoying time at the condo with new and old friends and family members. "People ask me what I do at the lake, and I tell them, 'I look out and watch the water go by, and then I watch it change directions," John laughed. "It is so relaxing out here."

John has seen many changes in his hometown of Irving. "When I was growing up there, Irving was just a small town," John reflected. "Now we are in the flight pattern of DFW." Carolyn was born in Longview, but she arrived in time to spend her high school days in Irving after her dad was transferred there for his work. "John and I met at church," she remembered. "Our first date was the sweetheart banquet." In 1969, John and Carolyn were married at that church, the First Baptist Church of Irving.

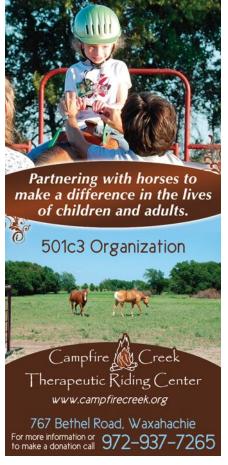

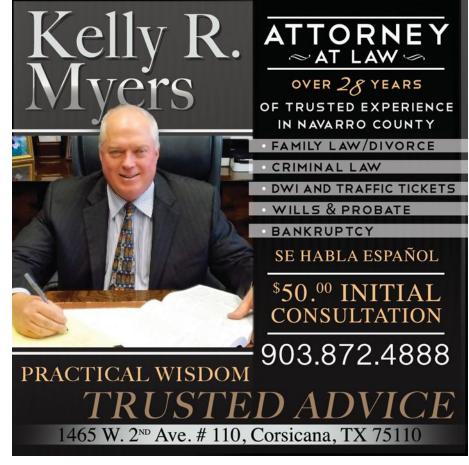

be outdone either, since the balcony has proven to be the perfect place from which to watch Fourth of July fireworks shows in all the small communities surrounding the lake.

The large living, dining and kitchen areas provide ample room and seating for gatherings of holiday proportions. A full lake view through floor-to-ceiling windows is available even when the weather doesn't allow for sitting on the balcony. Over the windows is a plaque that reads: *The Smith Family Lake House, Est. 2012*.

A breakfast bar island serves as an all-purpose gathering spot. Carolyn's collection of pottery designed by an artist in Frisco, Colorado, is displayed above the beautiful cabinetry. John and Carolyn enjoy an interest in a timeshare in Breckinridge, Colorado, especially during hot Texas summers.

A master bedroom with a large walk-in closet and more-than-ample bath sports a red theme, while a guest bedroom and bath are decorated in bluish hues. "We shopped for one piece of furniture at a time," John said. "The local stores and their staff in Corsicana were great."

Along the entry hall are two closets: one holds the washer/dryer, and the other is called "the boat closet" by family members. Finding a Way E — By Jon Peeler Across America, on just about any Saturday, kids are lacing up shoes and stretching out to take part in what seems to be one of the most popular youth sports in the country — soccer. While soccer is growing in leaps and bounds in the youth category, few kids seem to participate past the age of 13. Even fewer look at it as a serious sport. Unless of course, those kids are playing for Coach Stan Jones at Corsicana High School. In a region that is dominated by football, it may seem surprising to see the turnout the high school soccer program commands. Coach Jones' coaching style and team philosophy is very appealing to the students. "I try to give every kid a chance to succeed in this program," Coach Jones said. "Most teams have just enough kids to fill out one or two teams with a few backups. We had about 65 girls and a little over 100 boys at tryouts this year."

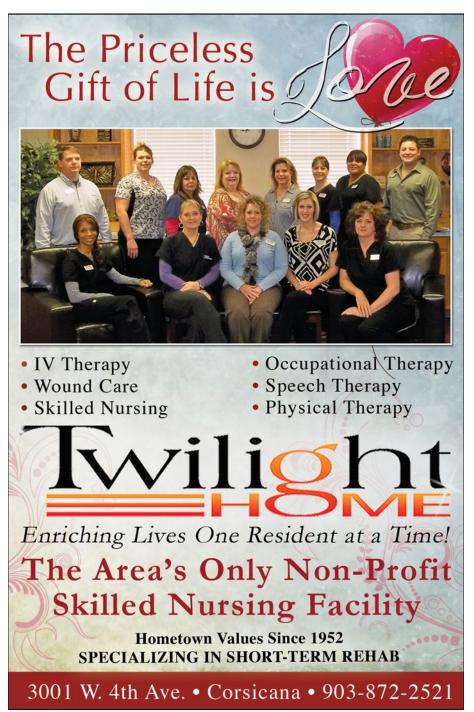


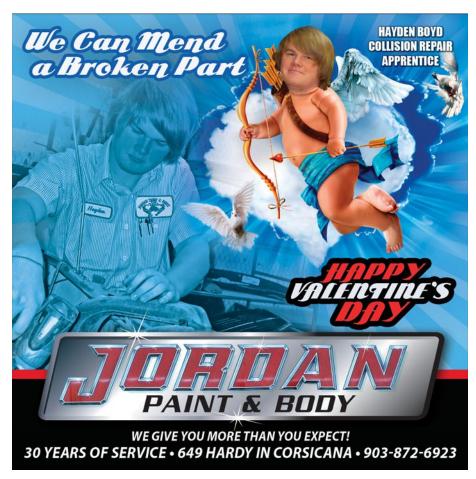

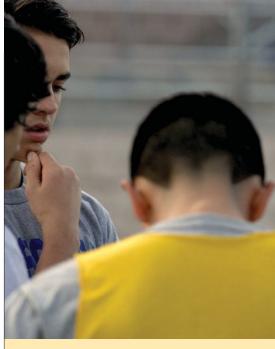
And succeed his athletes do, both on and off the field. For instance, the girls' team captain, Marisol Miranda, is everything one would expect a team captain to be and more. She's an outstanding soccer player and a leader whenever she takes the field. But Marisol is much more than that. She is also an above-average student with hopes of taking her soccer skills to the next level in a college setting. A hard worker who routinely works 20-plus hours per week on top of her demanding school and practice schedule, perhaps her most important responsibility is that of mother of a 2-year-old little boy. It may be hard to imagine, but Marisol somehow keeps it all going with a confidence that is evident at first sight. "I can't imagine not playing soccer. It's my life," Marisol explained. "We're like a big family. I'd do anything for them, because I know they would do the same for me."

The importance of the team to the athletes is not lost on Coach Jones. "Even though she's a strong girl, I can say that without the soccer program, Marisol's story could have been different," he said











with pride. I can't say all of my kids are perfect. After all, they are kids. I like to think this team and the family soccer culture I'm trying to instill plays a part in making [the kids] better people."

Part of that family culture comes naturally. Many of the players share family ties that stretch back generations and cross between the boys' and the girls' teams. While many of the players are not related, most of them have been playing with and against each other since they were old enough to wear cleats. These common ties are what drive these players to not only play for Corsicana High School, but to play for Coach Jones when so many of their classmates chose to focus on other sports or simply move on in a different direction.

This is something that Coach Jones doesn't take lightly. "It's flattering, really, to see how hard they all work for me," he recounted. "The best way I can repay that loyalty is to push them, to help them find out just how good they can be."

The evidence that Coach Jones' coaching methods bear fruit is found in the results, on the field, in the locker room and in students like Allen Bernal.





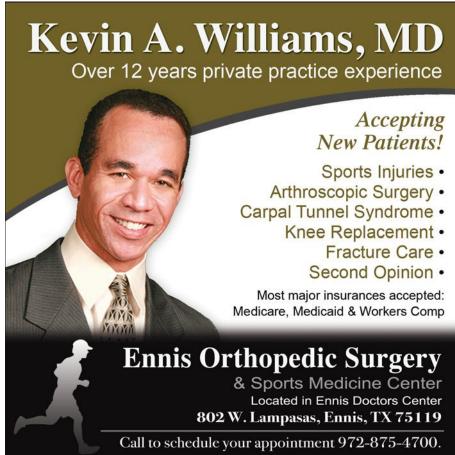
Allen is a senior on the team and the boys' team captain. His leadership comes without effort, whether from years of training or from a natural ability. Most likely it's a combination of the two, honed to a fine edge. But where it comes from is really unimportant. What is important is that Allen is carefully skilled at that leadership. "We're lucky enough to have a lot of good soccer players on



the team," Allen said with a wisdom that's hard to find in a young man his age. "But that's not what makes us a good team."

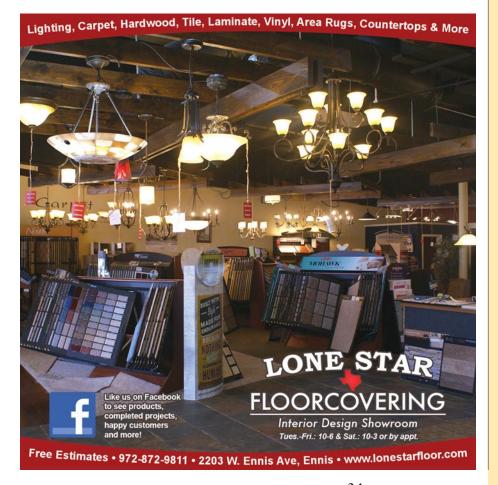
What makes the CHS soccer teams great goes back to the philosophy of a soccer culture and family that Coach Jones has worked all these years to instill. "I have a tremendous amount of respect for my teammates — a respect for their abilities and all the work we have all done to get ready for each game," Allen explained. "I trust that my teammates won't let me down, but I know that I can't let them down."

Allen's words reflect the unspoken pact everyone shares. "It really is fun to watch it all come together," Coach Jones said. "I know they have the skills. We've all put in











the work. When they're out on the field, I have complete trust that if there is a way to win, they will find it."

It's yet to be discovered how far soccer and Coach Jones' lessons will take these kids as they move on to other lifetime endeavors. After graduation, Allen plans on attending college. "I'm not sure if I'll be playing for a college team or if I'm going to focus on my studies and stick to club soccer. Either way, I can't imagine not playing in some way," Allen said.

Whatever road Allen chooses to follow, Coach Jones has faith in his young star. "Allen probably doesn't know yet exactly what he wants to do with his life. Who does at 17?" Stan explained. "But whatever he decides to do, he's going to be awesome at it, because he knows how to work for a goal."

For Coach Jones, teaching students how to reach their goals is the real point anyway. Less than 10 percent of high school athletes will be offered a scholarship, and fewer still will play beyond that level. But the players for the CHS soccer teams won't need the game of soccer to find their way through life. "I see so many kids who take everything for granted these days," Coach Jones said. "What I really want to teach my kids is what it takes to succeed. I'm just using soccer to teach them that." Judging by the athletes who play for Coach Jones, both on and off the field, he's taught these athletes well. NOW

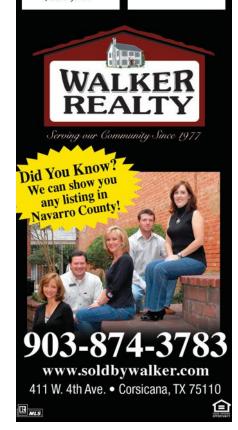

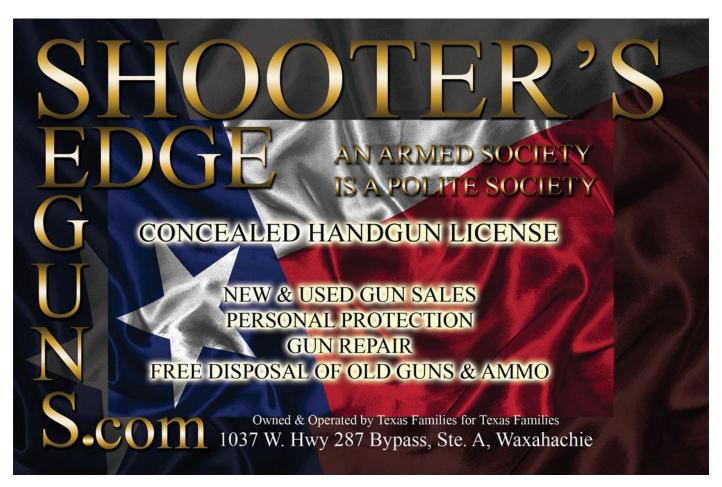

Give Your Baby a Healthy Start

Planning a pregnancy or already expecting a baby? Ensuring that your baby boy or girl has a healthy start to life begins with good prenatal care. Following a prenatal care plan can positively impact both you and your baby's health by minimizing pregnancy complications, decreasing the likelihood of birth defects and easing postpartum recovery. It's important to begin prenatal care early — and see your doctor regularly — to get the maximum benefit for you and your developing baby. The first step in promoting your growing baby's good health is to establish healthy habits for yourself, before you become pregnant: a nutritious diet, regular exercise and avoiding harmful substances such as tobacco, alcohol and certain medicines and foods.

Once you are pregnant, good nutrition, plenty of exercise, sleep and avoiding stress are good guidelines to follow. Babies born to mothers who do not receive prenatal care are three times more likely to have a low birth weight and five times more likely to die than those born to mothers who do get care, according to the March of Dimes. Babies that weigh less than 5 pounds, 8 ounces at birth are considered low birth weight and are at greater risk of serious health problems and disabilities such as mental retardation, learning problems, cerebral palsy, bleeding in the brain, digestive problems and vision or hearing loss. These infants' survival rate is also lower than babies of normal weight (about 5 1/2 to 9 pounds).

The main reasons that a baby may be born with a low birth weight is premature birth — born before the 37th week of pregnancy — or growth

restriction (a baby that is full term, but underweight). This means during pregnancy something happened to slow down or stop the baby's growth. A variety of factors can cause premature birth or slow growth and development during pregnancy.

If you're planning to start a family, begin with a preconception checkup. Your doctor can help screen for certain health problems, infections, make sure your immunizations are up to date, as well as discuss your nutrition and lifestyle habits, medications and certain foods and beverages to avoid during pregnancy.

Your doctor will establish a regular schedule of check-ups and various screenings. It's important to follow this plan and comply with your doctor's instructions for your medical care and personal health habits. Specific lifestyle choices an expectant mother can make to reduce the chances of having a low birth weight baby include: avoiding tobacco and alcohol, getting adequate rest and nutrition, managing stress and taking a daily multivitamin with folic acid (0.4 mg). It's also important to work with your doctor to manage any chronic conditions that can affect your pregnancy and your baby's growth, such as high blood pressure, diabetes or thyroid disease. NOW

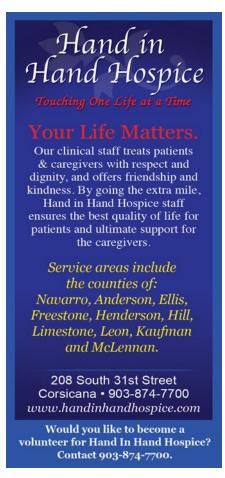

Chicken Spaghetti

Makes two casseroles.

I chicken, boiled and deboned Salt, pepper and garlic salt, to taste

I large onion, chopped

I green pepper, chopped

2 stalks celery, chopped

I pkg. long Italian spaghetti

1 lb. Velveeta cheese

1 stick margarine

1 4-oz. jar pimentos, diced

1 2.25-oz. can sliced black olives

1 10 3/4-oz. can mushroom soup

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 F.
- **2.** Cook onion, pepper and celery in chicken broth until almost tender.
- **3.** Add spaghetti; cook until tender and drain.
- **4.** Add Velveeta cheese, chicken, margarine, pimentos, olives and soup; stir well.
- 5. Bake for 30 minutes.

Pasta Salad

12 oz. pasta of choice
8 slices thin bacon
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1/2 cup cold milk
4 Tbsp. white vinegar
1/2 tsp. salt
Dash of sugar
10 oz. grape tomatoes
1/2 lb. cheddar cheese, cut into small cubes
3 green onions, sliced
Black pepper, to taste

- **1.** Cook pasta according to package instructions; drain, rinse in cold water and set aside.
- **2.** Cut bacon into 1/2-inch pieces.
- **3.** In a large skillet, sauté bacon until crisp; transfer to drain on paper towel.
- **4.** Mix mayonnaise, milk, vinegar, salt and sugar in a small bowl.

5. Thoroughly mix all ingredients in a large mixing bowl.

Hash Brown Quiche

3 cups shredded, frozen hash browns

3 Tbsp. butter, melted

I cup cooked ham, chopped

I cup cheddar cheese, shredded

1/4 cup bell pepper, chopped

3 large eggs

1/2 cup milk

1/2 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp. pepper

- 1. Preheat oven to 425 F.
- **2.** Press hash browns into bottom and sides of 8-inch pie plate; drizzle with butter.
- **3.** Bake 25 minutes; reduce temperature to 350 E.
- **4.** Combine ham, cheese and bell pepper; spoon into hash brown crust.
- **5.** Beat eggs in a small bowl.
- **6.** Add milk, salt and pepper; pour over ham mixture.
- **7.** Bake for 25-30 minutes, until set.

Pumpkin Bars

4 eggs

1 2/3 cups sugar

I cup vegetable oil

1 15-oz. can pumpkin

2 cups sifted all-purpose flour

2 tsp. baking powder

2 tsp. ground cinnamon

1 tsp. salt

I tsp. baking soda

1 12-oz. can cream cheese icing

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 F.
- **2.** In a large bowl, mix eggs, sugar, oil and pumpkin with an electric mixer until light and fluffy.
- **3.** Stir together flour, baking powder, cinnamon, salt and baking soda.
- **4.** Add dry ingredients to pumpkin mixture; mix at low speed until batter is smooth.
- **5.** Spread batter onto greased 13x10-inch
- **6.** Bake 30 minutes; cool and spread with cream cheese icing.
