



No Place Like Scout House

Over half a century ago, the Ferris Lions Club built a brick ranch-style home for the local Boy Scouts troop, but the small house at the end of the road was forgotten when the group disbanded. That is until a local resident purchased

it and gave it back to the city for use as the public library. Then the library moved into a new building leaving the house empty once again. Knowing the rich history of the property, Scoutmaster Paul Martinez petitioned the city to



reclaim it for Ferris' Boy Scouts Troop 206. Successful in his efforts, the troop house is once again filled with boys building character, learning responsibilities of citizenship and developing personal fitness.

"Our troop had already moved around three times, and we were in need of another place to meet," Paul said. "When I heard that the old troop house was coming open, I couldn't believe the timing. The city jumped on board when I approached them about it. It's awesome that this house came back to the Scouts, because it was built just for them so long ago. There is so much history here."

The building has changed with each owner and tenant over the years. Built specifically for the troop, it doesn't follow the typical house layout. There's one large room at the entrance, a small meeting room off to the side, a kitchen and a restroom. A closet serves as the office for leaders. Little by little, Paul and his wife, Misty, worked alongside the city to make repairs and restore the house. Misty tiled the bathroom as soon as she could. "We have been here two years and are updating as we go," Paul said. "Can you imagine that this room used to be filled with shelves after shelves of books? We helped the library move out, put up a new coat of paint and moved in right away."

In its original form, the facility had exposed wood beams for storing canoes, kayaks and other equipment needed for camping and exploring. Ceiling tiles were installed by past tenants to create an attic space where old memories and pieces of history still lie awaiting rediscovery. With the hope of bringing the past back, the Scout house now features vignettes

arranged in nooks that tell the history of the Ferris troop. Photographs from troops long ago, awards from canoeing trips, badges, books and bugles add to the history of the house as much as the original walls.

A large open space is the main meeting room for the troop and is filled with tables. On one side is the original stone fireplace, no longer in working condition, but members still gather around it for stories. The wall on the opposite side holds the flag flown over the United States Capitol on May 26, 2003, at the request of Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison. "This flag was flown specifically for our troop," Paul explained. "It was in honor of the men and women who served our country and kept it free."

A trash bin repurposed into an old flag drop zone sits on the front porch. The Scouts encourage anyone that has a worn out American flag to drop it off in the bin, and they will be respectfully retired during a special ceremony. Each year the Scouts perform a retirement ceremony during Christmas on the Square. Caring and showing respect for flags is one of the lessons Paul stresses to the boys. "We started doing this in public ceremonies to educate our community," Paul said. "Many

people are unaware of the process. Now that we have held the ceremony a few times people are getting it. It's an incredibly moving process, and I recommend that everyone attends at least one."

The flag pole original to the Scout house still stands in the front yard. A coat of rust and an overgrown tree have prevented the Scouts from flying a flag of their own out front. Getting the pole back in working shape is the next project on the long list of to-dos for the troop.



"We would love to see a flag flying out here again," Paul said. "We are working closely with the city to get it repaired and the tree trimmed to let it fly freely."

Even though the city owns the house and provides for its maintenance needs, the troop takes pride in its day-to-day upkeep. From manicuring the lawns and planting flowerbeds to painting and cleaning the rooms, the troop works together to keep the place in top shape. Many duties to be completed turn into Eagle Scout projects. The troop works together to help an Eagle Scout candidate meet his project requirement by taking on a major task. One nominee replanted all the flowerbeds in the front yard. Another repaired and painted all




the covered shelters over the picnic tables in the backyard.

"We have a city park right in our backyard," Paul said. "The boys have taken responsibility for that, too, and make sure it's clean and safe for the kids who come and play in it. We go out often to make sure trash stays out of the creek that runs through here."

Community responsibility is instilled in the Boy Scouts from their first meeting onward. While many of the projects the troop participates in are performed around the house, they accomplish just as much in the community. When the animal shelter was low on food, the troop raised money and collected food to help out. They participate in the Scouting for Food program and collect more than 600 food items for those in need. From timeto-time, the police department calls on the boys to volunteer their time to help with special projects. "My goal is to teach the boys that this is their hometown, and no matter where they end up, one day this will be the place they recall growing up," Paul said. "I want them to take pride in their community and remember the great times here."

The Boy Scouts are finally home again in the old Scout house that was intended for them, and no longer have to worry about using someone else's space. Each week, the boys meet to learn how to survive in the wilderness, be good citizens and stay active and healthy. Stories of their latest adventures are retold around the fireplace and camping trips are planned by the boys in the meeting hall. For Troop 206 there's no place like the Scout house. "It is still amazing to me that this house has circled back to us," Paul reflected. "We are thankful the city lets us care for this place."

Now What

"Frank and I started a church in our living room Christmas 2009," Dawana said, "and





"We discovered that two weeks' worth of remodeling is about all we can stand at a time," Frank admitted. "Eating out because you can't get in the kitchen or living out of suitcases while bedrooms are re-floored and painted gets old pretty quickly!"

Despite remodeling chaos, each of the children has made their mark in their own rooms, reflecting their individual interests. Rachel loves volleyball and recently won first place in sculpting at the State Fair of Texas. Renee is into art and playing with her Littlest Pet Shop collection. And Logan loves LEGOS, *Star Wars* and *Toy Story*.

"When Logan was diagnosed with leukemia, my work colleagues came in and totally redid this room for him," Dawana beamed. While Logan's space might belong to any typical young boy, his Wipe Out Kids' Cancer keepsakes nod to his recent health struggles. "He is winning over leukemia and is currently a Wipe Out Kids' Cancer Ambassador," Dawana noted. "His chemo treatments are almost done!"

With full-time jobs weekdays and



church work weekends, the Quintanas are one busy family. As they carve out special family time and time as a couple, Frank and Dawana agree time has been the biggest challenge to making their house exactly as they want it to be.

"As a family, we have a goal to visit all the national parks and caves," Frank

said. "Whenever we have a few days off, we look at each other and say, 'That's enough time!' and we hit the road."


The couple also celebrates each year of marriage in some way, with bigger events for five-year anniversaries. "We just celebrated our 15th anniversary by going to Hawaii and getting re-married," Dawana said. 

As Zach was running, Josh became a recognized soccer player, named All State Goalie in TAPPS 3A soccer the last







Fearless Dental takes the anxiety out of a trip to the dentist.— By Angel Morris

Some may dismiss the concerns of those who lose courage when faced with the prospect of having work done on their teeth. Not Fearless Dental. "We take our patients' anxieties seriously," said Alan Martin, DDS. "Some folks may be daredevils. But when it comes to going to the dentist, they're scared to death. To further lessen patients' fears, a strong Oragel-like topical is used to numb gums before any Novocaine is given. Soft lighting and music is also used to help patients relax. "Patients usually have no memory of the specific dental procedures," Dr. Martin said.



Heart Disease Remains Top Killer of American Women

Each October, as the leaves turn yellow and orange, a lot of other things seem to turn pink in recognition of Breast Cancer Awareness Month. While these efforts have certainly been a huge boost to increasing breast cancer awareness, leading to better prevention and higher survival rates, many women may not realize that they are far more likely to fall victim to heart disease than breast cancer.

Heart disease is often still thought of as a "man's disease." But in reality, it's also the top killer of American women. In fact, women are six times more likely to die from heart disease than they are breast cancer, and by the time a woman reaches 80, her risk of dying from heart disease actually surpasses that of a man.

February is National Heart Month. Between this national recognition and Valentine's Day, what better time to focus on matters of women's hearts?

Putting Her Heart in Jeopardy

Many of the risk factors for heart disease are the same in both men and women, including:

- Family history
- Hypertension

- Diabetes
- Obesity
- High cholesterol
- High triglycerides

However, there are some risk factors either unique to women, or that play a much bigger role in the development of heart disease in women than in men. For instance, smoking seems to be a bigger risk factor in women than in men. Other examples include:

Menopause — After menopause, the reduced levels of estrogen rapidly accelerates a woman's risk of heart disease, especially in blood vessels.

High Stress — High stress can put women at risk for broken heart syndrome, a life-threatening condition unique to women that mimics a heart attack.

Depression and Metabolic Syndrome — While men's hearts can be affected by depression and metabolic syndrome (belly fat combined with high blood pressure, high triglycerides and high blood sugar), these conditions seem to take a greater toll on women's hearts.

Symptoms for Women

Both men and women often report heart disease's

classic symptom: angina. Angina is pain radiating from the chest to the neck, arms and legs. But women with heart disease frequently suffer from less obvious symptoms as well:

- Incredible fatigue
- · Abdominal discomfort
- Upper back pain
- Swelling in the ankles

Heart Guard

There are many things women can do to keep heart healthy.

- Take time out to relax, get a massage or otherwise reduce stress.
 - · Stop smoking.
 - Eat a low-fat diet.
 - Exercise regularly.
- Get a heart screening if there is a family history of the disease.

In the Kitchen With Helen Gotte

Helen Gotte enjoys cooking because it's "just a way to make something great out of so many small things," she said. "It is probably one of the most relaxing things for me to do. I have been cooking for my family since I was about 10 years old. When my younger brother and I would be at home alone during the summer, I would cook complete meals for us!"

Taking her recipes from wherever she may find them, this young culinary student surfs the Net for ideas and uses cookbooks from family and friends. While she likes experimenting with all types of spices, Helen dubs cayenne pepper her very favorite. "I love the flavor it gives food!" she said.

Eggs Benedict

I/2 English muffin
Butter, to taste
I egg
I slice Canadian bacon
I I/2 fl. oz. hollandaise sauce

- **1.** Toast muffin. Spread it with butter and place on a serving plate.
- **2.** Poach egg in simmering water. While egg is poaching, heat Canadian bacon for 1 minute in sauté pan. Place meat on toasted muffin.
- **3.** Drain the poached egg well and place on Canadian bacon. Ladle hollandaise over top. Serve immediately.

Hollandaise Sauce

2 1/2 lbs. butter

12 egg yolks 2 fl. oz. cold water Lemon juice, to taste Salt, to taste Cayenne pepper, to taste

- **I.** Clarify butter by heating in saucepan. As it melts, skim milk fat off until completely gone.
- **2.** Place egg yolks and cold water in stainless-steel bowl and beat well. Beat in a few drops of lemon juice.
- **3.** Hold bowl over a hot-water bath and continue to beat until yolks are thickened and creamy.
- **4.** Remove bowl from heat. Using a ladle, slowly and gradually beat in warm butter, drop by drop at first. If sauce becomes too thick to beat before all butter is added, beat in a little water.
- **5.** Once all butter is added, beat in lemon juice, to taste, and adjust with salt and cayenne pepper. Keep warm until served.

Duchesse Potatoes

7 lbs. potatoes, peeled and quartered 4 oz. butter Salt, to taste White pepper, to taste Nutmeg, to taste 10 egg yolks

- **1.** Steam potatoes or simmer them in salted water, until tender. Drain and let dry.
- 2. Pass potatoes through a food mill or ricer.
- **3.** Add butter and mix to a smooth paste. Season to taste with salt, white pepper and just a little nutmeg.
- **4.** If potatoes are very moist, stir over a low flame to stiffen. They must be much stiffer than mashed potatoes.
- **5.** Add egg yolks and beat until smooth.
- **6.** Put mixture in a pastry bag with a star tube and bag out into desired shapes on sheet pans, or as platter borders. Coneshaped spiral mounds are most popular for individual portions.
- **7.** Brush lightly with egg wash for greater browning.
- **8.** Place in oven at 400 F, until lightly browned. Serve.

Chocolate Chip Cookie Pie

2 eggs

1/2 cup flour

1/2 cup white sugar

1/2 cup brown sugar

1 cup melted butter

I cup semisweet chocolate chips


1 9-inch pie shell

- 1. Preheat oven to 325 F.
- **2.** In a large bowl, beat eggs until light and foamy. Add flour, white sugar and brown sugar. Beat until well-blended.
- **3.** Blend in melted butter. Stir in chocolate chips. Pour into pie shell.
- **4.** Bake for 1 hour. Remove from oven. Serve with whipped cream or ice cream.
