



Jecales of College Me


Rarely do you find a person who has been in the same profession for over 50 years, and it is even rarer to find that person still passionate and excited about their job. For Weatherford College Athletic Director and Women's Basketball Coach Bob McKinley, the last 52 years of coaching have been filled with just as much motivation and work ethic as his first year in the business.


Bob is one who is quick to point out the success of his players and not himself, but when looking at his accolades over the last five decades, it is easy to see why he has been able to coach for so long. His résumé includes 14 conference championships, Coach of the Year 11 times, and one trip to the National Junior College Athletic Association's Final Four. The awards and titles don't stop there either. Bob is the winningest active coach in the NJCAA and was inducted into the NJCAA's Women's Basketball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2015.

"I actually didn't go to college, originally, to become a coach," he said. "I had plans of being a minister. One speech class was all it took for me to realize I couldn't stand behind the pulpit. A good friend of mine told me I could have just as much influence in coaching as I could in ministry, so I changed my major."

In fact, the players he impacts every season are the reason he stuck with coaching for so long. "I just think that if the players know you genuinely love and care about them, then you can do whatever you want on the court and in practice. They know it's all left on the court because they know I still love them, no matter what," Bob explained. "That's the philosophy I have followed my whole career, and I know performance from my players is maximized because they know I love them."









Bob, who keeps track of most of his players through Facebook, is happy to be coaching second generations. "It really makes you wonder when your old players now have kids old enough to come play for you," he shared.

With almost 900 wins under his belt as both a men's and women's coach (some seasons coaching both), there is no doubt that Bob was most deserving of his hall of fame induction last year in Niceville, Florida. He was inducted along with Ricky Gene Ford, formerly of Northeast Mississippi Community College, and Denny Jerome, formerly of Waldorf College in Iowa, during the Women's Basketball All-Star Weekend. The three men had 2,043 wins between them, with Bob's 872 wins leading the pack.

"That was a really special award and one of my fondest memories here at the college. It meant a lot to me because it's a special recognition in relationship with all the other junior college coaches in the nation," Bob said.

He also pointed out that WC is unique because it has not one, but two coaches who have been inducted into the NJCAA's Women's Basketball Coaches Association Hall of Fame. Former coach, Betty Jo Graber, who coached at WC for more than 35 years, was inducted in 1998 in the hall's inaugural class.

The majority of Bob's wins have been right here at WC, where he has coached for 39 seasons. "The environment, the city itself and the school system have been the key factors that made Weatherford College our home for so long," Bob stated. "My family and I just really love it here."

Bob coached at Pasadena High School in 1964 and then at Houston Baptist University from 1975-1977 before making Weatherford his home





and joining the WC staff. "It's always hard to leave a school when you have good friends there. From a coaching standpoint, the move may not be difficult, but my family always makes decisions together. I was once offered a job in Alaska, and my wife was quick to help me make the decision that we would not be living in that state," Bob said with a smile.

His basketball career started early when he was a player for Bowie High School, where his team went to state in 1959. Bob was later inducted into the High School Basketball Hall of Fame. In college, Bob was the team captain for Trinity Christian University (TCU), where he played and lettered three consecutive years.

Bob even had the opportunity to coach his son, Trey, who played at WC before going on to Abilene Christian College (now Abilene Christian University). Now he is head of the kinesiology department at WC. His daughter played basketball at TCU, and both kids live nearby. "I get to see all five of my grandkids almost every day. They have pretty good basketball coaches in their parents, but I don't mind playing and teaching them either," Bob said.

Apart from his family, the players really are Bob's world. "In junior college, you get a new set of players at least every two years, so things change quickly around here. It's always exciting to see them progress and get opportunities to play after they leave Weatherford College," Bob admitted.


For Bob, one of the most difficult aspects of coaching is when players don't make the grades, and he isn't able to award scholarships as a result. It is also difficult when he isn't able to bring a player back for a second year. "Those decisions, hard as they may be, have to be











made sometimes," he noted. "Discipline problems are easy. They take care of themselves. But apart from that, it gets really hard making calls as a coach."

After 39 years in Weatherford, coaching 18 seasons of men's basketball (six of those years coaching both men's and women's teams), Bob has seen a lot of changes on campus, most notably from a physical standpoint. "There have been quite a few new buildings built in the last years, including the addition of our new baseball and softball facilities. It's been exciting to watch the college grow and expand," he said.

Five minutes with Bob is all one needs to know and hear about his passion and love for the sport and the players. Having been called to coaching to make an impact, he is certainly doing just that. With a new group of players every two years, hundreds of players have received the honor of playing basketball for one of the all-time greatest basketball coaches at the junior college level.

When asked if there are any signs of slowing down, Bob simply said, "Social Security keeps asking me the same thing. The last time, I wrote down 2024 is when I plan to retire, mainly because I figured that would get them to leave me alone until then." NOW

Realizing Their Vision



AT HOME WITH
BRUCE AND
CARINE KINDINGER

For months, Bruce and Carine Kindinger's home was an ambitious dream waiting to be realized. They discovered the once-in-a-lifetime find in February 2014. The Kindingers were looking for a place large enough to accommodate their growing family. The two-story home was perfect, but it would take some trials and tribulations to make their dream home a reality.

The home sat vacant and would soon hit the auction block. After months of back-and-forth talks with the bank, they became even more determined to purchase the home. "It was one thing after another, but we knew this was our house," Carine said. "Our minds were constantly here. We were here every other day checking on the house, dreaming of it." While on a working trip in Puerto Rico, they kept running into a man who was CEO of a bank in Texas. On a tip from "Charles," they were able to escalate the home-buying process. "We are 100-percent sure Charles is an angel," Carine said.

Within two months, they closed on the 4,800-square-foot home and moved in the fall of 2014. The house was in disarray, thermostats needed to be installed and the waterline repaired, but they were home. "You name it. We've had everybody out here — plumbers, electricians — to check it or fix it," Bruce explained.

The Kindingers spent many nights remodeling and renovating the interior. As owner of a local general contracting business





that specializes in residential remodeling, Carine has used her professional experience to create an inviting home. The walls, once yellow, are now white, reflecting the brightness of the windowlit dwelling. Large windows, on both the front and back of the house, as well as skylights scattered throughout, provide an abundance of natural light. Dark wood floors are a nice contrast to the walls, which are decorated with simple accents and family photographs. Metal artwork collected by Carine over the years is displayed on a rock wall in the fover and on a built-in bookcase in the formal living area, which they transformed into a dining room. The Kindingers envisioned adding a table to seat just over 20 of their







family members, and they found just what they were looking for at Restoration Hardware. The chairs surrounding the long, wooden table feature white covers. High chairs for their grandchildren can be added, providing all family members a spot at the table. "With so many family members, nobody feels left out," Bruce shared.

Bruce and Carine were both looking for a serious relationship when they met through eHarmony in 2011. "Sometimes, he'll have a certain behavior, and I'll remember it was in his profile. He does the same thing with me," Carine shared. They married about a year-and-a-half later, blending their families. Their children were able to watch their Las Vegas wedding via webcam. "The Vegas wedding was a blast. Elvis did a great job," Bruce said with a grin. Between them, they have seven children who have added six grandchildren to the family since Bruce and Carine wed.

Their children range in age from 16-27. Olivia, 16, and 18-year-old Sixtine, live at home with Bruce and Carine. Olivia attends school online and is a social media personality. Sixtine graduated in December. Both girls often travel to New York and LA for modeling jobs. Sixtine plans to travel to Europe this spring.

Carine hopes to one day take Bruce to Europe to meet her family in Belgium. In high school, Carine spent time in Abilene as a foreign exchange student and always planned to make her way back to Texas. She returned to Abilene in 2000 and transferred to Weatherford after meeting Bruce. When she's not working as a general contractor, Carine is a "Strategic Intervention Coach." A wall in her coaching office displays picture boards. One board features a magazine photograph that has an uncanny resemblance to their current homestead. The flower gardens, front porch beams and pergola in the photograph, once thought a vision of the future by Carine, are almost identical to the Kindingers' home. "I always dreamed of a house of brick and lots of flowers in the front," she said. Carine believes vision boards are

a huge tool in life. "You need to know what you want."

Bruce is employed as a systems support representative and works directly with the National Guard. He's originally from Ohio but traveled the world while serving with the United States Air Force. He moved to the Dallas-Fort Worth area for work and retired from the military.

Bruce and Carine spend much of their free time working on the house. Carine is in the process of staining the woodwork in the home a rich brown, including the trim around the windows and doors and the kitchen cabinets. The family often gathers in the kitchen to share conversation. They've converted the adjoining breakfast nook into a living space with plenty of seating, including a built-in window seat. In his book, *Pay Checks and Play Checks*, author Lt. Col. Tom Hegna writes: "Saving for retirement can be challenging enough. However, how you draw down and distribute your retirement savings will determine whether or not you run out of money."

"Distributing assets in a way that ensures you get the most out of your retirement without running out of money is a difficult balancing act, and should be taken even more seriously than accumulation."

Longevity Risk

Since we all want to live a long life, there are other issues to

consider as well: coordinating Social Security, health care, lifestyle concerns, long-term care decisions. These are all affected by one important factor in your retirement years — longevity risk! Hegna explains: "It is also important to understand that longevity is not just a risk. It is a multiplier of the other risks. Because of this, it is imperative that you transfer that risk. ...

"If you retire at age 65 and die at age 68, it would not matter if the stock market dropped 40 percent. It would not have mattered if you had withdrawn 12 percent per year, or if inflation increased by double digits, or if you did not buy a long-term care policy. You did not live long enough for any of that to matter. However, if you live to age 100, any one of those things would have devastated your retirement. So if you ask me what the biggest risk in retirement is, I would say that hands down it is longevity risk, simply because it has a multiplier effect on all of the other risks."

Enjoying your golden years for a long time is important to all of us. Thus, solving the longevity risk is the pathway to a financially healthy retirement.



Healthy Heart

Imagine a pipe drain inside your bathroom. Over time, hair, soap residue and other gunk may stick together and start to collect on the internal walls of the pipe. Naturally, since the deposits are inside the pipe, the pathway for flowing water begins to narrow. In coronary artery disease, or CAD, the pipe is your blood vessel and the gunk is cholesterol. If the gunk in your pipes builds up enough, water flow will cease, and you'll have a clogged drain. If the cholesterol in your blood builds up enough, you could have a heart attack or stroke.

CAD is the buildup of cholesterol containing deposits called plaque in the arteries that supply blood to the heart. This plaque causes the arteries to become narrow and rigid, which in turn restricts the blood flow through the vessels. It often takes years to receive this type of damage. Some people may not be diagnosed with CAD until they have a heart attack. As the arteries narrow, it becomes more difficult for enough oxygenrich blood full of nutrients to reach the heart.

One of the most common symptoms of this disease is angina, or pain in the chest. In women, especially, this pain can also be felt in the back, abdomen, jaw and arm. Angina may feel like indigestion, squeezing, pressure or aching. Another telltale symptom is shortness of breath. If your coronary arteries are compromised enough by plaque buildup, the proper amount of

blood cannot get through to meet your body's needs. This leads to breathlessness and fatigue.

Risk factors for CAD are interrelated and can exacerbate each other. Some of the factors are smoking, which can restrict the flow of blood vessels; high blood pressure; high cholesterol; being overweight; family history; and diabetes. Men are more likely to have CAD than women. But that statistic changes when a woman reaches menopause. A sad fact is that some risk factors now begin in childhood, with so many children being overweight and inactive.

CAD can be prevented and/or treated. There are medical procedures and medication to treat CAD, but there is a lot you can do for your health on your own. It begins with living a healthy lifestyle by watching your diet, keeping your weight under control and getting enough exercise. Much of what makes a healthy body is up to you.



In the Kitchen With Brittany Coop

Brittany Coop works for Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service of Parker County. Teaching nutrition and cooking skills to families gets her out of bed. At home, she cooks for her fiancé and 8-year-old son. Growing up in Benjamin, Texas, she saw few gourmet foods but learned a lot about canning. Now she teaches food preservation skills.

The meals are low-cost and nutritious, but for some recipes, Brittany substitutes foods she already has, saving even more money. "Cooking is a chance to show others your culture and learn about theirs. If I can change just one person's ideas about healthy cooking and eating through a recipe demonstration, then I know I accomplished something important," she said. NOW

Skillet Pasta Dinner

Makes 4 servings.

1/2 lb. ground turkey, ground sausage or beef (85% lean)

1 medium onion, chopped

1 tsp. or 2 garlic cloves, minced

1 15-oz. can tomatoes

1 8-oz. can tomato sauce

I cup water

8 oz. uncooked tube pasta (ziti, penne or macaroni)

- 2 cups fresh or frozen vegetables (try zucchini and carrots)
- **I.** Brown the ground meat, onion and garlic in a skillet or heavy saucepan. Drain any grease.
- **2.** Add tomatoes, tomato sauce, water and uncooked pasta.
- 3. Cover and simmer for 10 minutes.

4. Add the fresh or frozen vegetables; stir. Continue cooking until the pasta and vegetables are tender (about 10 more minutes).

Avocado Breakfast Bruschetta *Makes 4 servings.*

Wakes 4 Servings

I ripe avocado 2 medium tomatoes

I green onion

4 hard-boiled eggs

1/2 cup chopped fresh basil (plus 2 Tbsp. for garnish)

Cracked black pepper, to taste 12 slices whole-wheat baguette bread

1/4 cup ricotta cheese (reduced-fat)

- **I.** Dice avocado, tomatoes and green onion. Peel and chop hard-boiled eggs.
- 2. Reserving 2 Tbsp. of basil for garnish,

gently toss first five ingredients in a small bowl. Add pepper to taste.

3. Toast baguette slices and smear with ricotta cheese; top with avocado mixture and garnish with chopped basil.

Fiesta Wrap

Makes 6 servings.

1/4 cup quinoa, dry

3/4 cup water

- 2 1/4 cups canned low-sodium black beans, drained and rinsed
- 1/4 cup fresh red bell pepper, seeded and diced
- 1/4 cup fresh red onions, peeled and diced
- 1/2 cup fresh carrots, peeled and diced
- 1/4 cup reduced-fat white cheddar cheese, shredded

1 tsp. chili powder

1 1/4 tsp. ground cumin

1 1/4 tsp. fresh lime juice

6 whole-wheat 6-inch tortillas

1 Tbsp. vegetable oil

- 1. Preheat oven to 325 F.
- **2.** Rinse quinoa in a fine mesh strainer until water runs clear, not cloudy. Combine quinoa and 3/4 cup water in a small pot. Cover and bring to a boil. Turn heat down to low and simmer until water is completely absorbed, about 10-15 minutes. When done, quinoa will be soft and a white ring will pop out of the kernel. The white ring will appear only when it is fully cooked. Fluff with a fork and set aside. A rice cooker may be used with the same quantity of quinoa and water.
- **3.** Place black beans in a large mixing bowl. Lightly mash beans by squeezing them using gloved hands (at least 50 percent of the beans should appear whole). Be careful not to over-mash the beans.
- **4.** Add to the mashed beans the quinoa, red peppers, red onions, carrots, cheese, chili powder, cumin and lime juice.
- **5.** For each wrap, place 1/2 cup of filling on the bottom half of a tortilla, and roll in the form of a burrito. The wrap may also be folded in half like a taco.
- **6.** Brush filled wraps lightly with vegetable oil and place on a baking sheet. Bake for 10 minutes at 325 F. Wraps will be lightly brown. Serve with fresh, diced tomatoes, corn salsa and/or lettuce.
