Leading History Into the Future

Bob and Linda Lydia have lived a lot of history, and helped make some of it, but they are still working hard to build the future. Both Bob and Linda became involved with the NAACP in the early days of the Civil Rights Movement, and that commitment to justice and equality has continued to be a central part of each of their lives, and their life together.

For Bob, his involvement with the NAACP goes back to memories of Juanita Craft, the first African-American woman to vote in Dallas County. "I lived in Tyler back in the '40s, but I would come to Dallas to work during the summer months. I had heard about Ms. Craft. I started working with the NAACP's Youth Council, and since I was one of the oldest in the group, and I had a car, I got to drive her and others around. Then I went away to the Air Force, but when I came back, I continued working with the Dallas Branch."

Linda was from Tennessee, where her mother ran a restaurant and crafts store. She was an excellent student, so when integration started, her local NAACP tapped her as a pioneer. She was chosen to be the first black student at her new all-white high school. "I have been involved with the NAACP since high school. I participated in sit-ins during

college. And then, after college, I moved to Texas. I got involved in the Dallas Branch, and that's how I met Bob. We had a lot in common, the same passion for Civil Rights and similar backgrounds."

Bob and Linda continued to be involved in the NAACP at every level. One or both of them have participated at the youth, young adult, adult, regional and national levels for decades. Bob was instrumental in integrating the coffee shop at El Centro College, which meant working with the FBI. "I called them, but they showed up with these badges as big as tables! I was scared to death, but we put an end to segregation there." Names like Thurgood Marshall show up in their conversation, not as great heroes to look up to from afar, but as people they have worked with. Bob worked with voter empowerment efforts, employment complaints, statewide training of other NAACPers, housing and educations issues.


"Bob held national office for years," Linda reported. "But he was always first or second vice president, so he could stay in the background. But one year, it was at the Little Rock conference, someone called to tell Bob that he was now the president of the Dallas NAACP. Victor Smith, the previous president, had taken a fall at a banquet months earlier, but he got a blood clot and passed away. Bob finished out that term as president, then ran for a second term."

When Bob and Linda moved to Duncanville, they decided it was a good idea to try to revive the Tri-Cities Branch of the NAACP, which had been chartered back in 1988 by Kirk and Marian Hemphill and Gerald Johnson, but had gone inactive. "We had always been active in Dallas," Linda explained. "But we live in Duncanville."



Bob remembered, "When we started thinking about reactivating Tri-Cities, to serve Duncanville, Cedar Hill and DeSoto, we started thinking about who would make a good leader for the new branch. Carmelita Pope-Freeman's name kept rising to the top of the list. She'd been involved since way back."

"We were looking for stability in leadership. Bob knew Carmelita, and had heard she was retiring. We knew we wanted her. Once she was on board with the idea," Linda










explained, "it was just a matter of selling memberships until we had the 50 members required, getting letters of recommendation and organizing everything. We had our first meeting to elect officers at Acapulco's in DeSoto, over three years ago."

Then they found Janice Dunn at a health fair that they were doing with her sorority, Delta Sigma Theta, and she came on board to run the youth programs. "When Bob and Linda asked me to help, I had just moved here from Grand Prairie," Janice explained. "I had been working with the youth through my sorority. I was passionate about making sure young ladies had the resources to go to college. I saw the ACT-SO program





awarding high school students with significant scholarships, and I was on board. Mr. Lydia and another national board member helped me get started, and I even got permission to start a culinary arts program, for the youth, a few years early."

Bob currently serves as the labor and industry chair for the Tri-Cities Branch, Texas State NAACP 1st vice president and is a member of the NAACP National Board of Directors. Linda is the membership chair for the Tri-Cities Branch and Texas State NAACP secretary.

"People ask if the NAACP is still relevant," Linda explained. "It really bothers me when people think what we do is only for black folk, but we've done a lot for Hispanics, Jewish people and white folks, too. In college back during the Civil Rights Movement when legislation was being passed, I thought, The NAACP isn't needed. It's over. But the truth is, it's needed now more than ever. We fill a need in the community. We're still growing. Somebody has to say something. It's not always a comfortable place to be, but it's the best place to be." **NOW**

James and Dona Mitchell are one busy couple. Though they are empty nesters, their home is anything but empty. It's filled with love, warmth, much positive energy and memories — and many more are yet to be created.

Take, for example, Dona's office, or "Dona's Playground," as it is called. On the walls are some posters of shows she's written, directed, produced or helped bring to life in one form or another.

There's one special poster of a one-woman show called *Rising Above All*, a show starring their daughter, Johnique, which was performed in 2014 at the Dallas Convention Center. Dona choreographed her in the production that benefited her study abroad trip to Europe. "It was really great to watch her perform it. She did such a sensational job," Dona said proudly. "I loved working with her on that show." Johnique, 25, now holds a master's degree from Penn State University and plans to go to New York and break into professional show business.

Their 31-year-old son, James, is a coach, mentor and also performs rap songs. He sang a moving number in a film Dona created about the 30th anniversary of the world being introduced to AIDS.

Youngest daughter, Joslyn, is the subject of her mom's upcoming documentary, Sculpture of a Miracle. Joslyn, now 23 and a journalism major at the University of North Texas, was diagnosed at age 3 with Kawasaki disease, a rare condition that causes inflammation in the walls of mediumsized arteries throughout the body and can lead to serious heart damage. "We're getting a team together, and we're going to make it happen," Dona said. "We're going to start filming in 2018. Johnique is going to play me."

Dona's creations often tackle tough subjects to raise awareness, such as AIDS and the aforementioned Kawasaki disease. She and James have also worked with incarcerated youths through a project named Locked, giving them an outlet while locked up and an opportunity upon their release.

Hanging on a clothes line (she loves hanging photos on clothes lines) are some photos of her and











James and their creation, Project Under. They deliver bottles of water to homeless people during the summer, and the project is so named because many of these people seek shelter from the sun under bridges. "We must have collected 5,000-6,000 bottles of water to hand out," James said. "It's not much, but it can sure make a person feel better."

Next door is James' man cave. On the door is a sign that reads, For Cowboys fans only. However, that is not entirely true, as James has a small poster of the Philadelphia Eagles on one wall. "I have a couple of friends who are Eagles fans, but make no mistake, this is a Cowboys room," he said with a chuckle.


Of that there is no debate. On one wall are some photos of him and Dona in Cowboys jerseys, celebrating their 26th anniversary. There are a variety of Cowboys

jerseys on an adjacent wall. A few other items include Mavericks, Penn State and North Texas paraphernalia, and there's a football from their son, James', indoor football team, Texas Revolution, that won its league championship.

There's a TV to watch Cowboys games with family and friends. And there's workout equipment. James recently became a basketball official, so staying in shape is important to him.

In fact, James and Dona have worn a lot of different hats in their lives and throughout their 26year marriage. Along with being a playwright, screenwriter, actress and artist, Dona is an award-winning poet and a talent scout. She is also first vice president of the International Association of Truancy and Dropout Prevention and works with the Lancaster ISD truancy office and is a 2017-2018 Life Changer Nominee. James has been a building engineer and football coach and continues to motivate young men through a group called 33 Men's Bible Study.

Often, he and Dona will work together to help others. For example, they mentor newlyweds and young married couples, sometimes using skits.

James and Dona still have date night at least twice a month. They say they are, even today, always learning something new.

Family is important to James and Dona, and the kitchen is a place to accent that love. The big center island is filled every holiday with everyone's favorite food, and there is a clear view of the large TV in the den to not miss a minute of his beloved Cowboys. In the den is a love seat recliner with a matching reclining sofa. The wall across from them is left clear for when they want to project a movie or one of Dona's productions. The hallway is filled with family photos, many in Cowboys jerseys. There are a couple of framed family photos, but most are hanging on a clothes line. "It's creative and a lot easier to put them up that way. I think it looks pretty neat," Dona said. "It's something different."



Modern art can be found throughout the home, particularly in the living room. Dona, however, loves to create her own art, such as the apples she painted that hang on the wall in the kitchen or the single vines hanging below a plaque that reads believe.

"She's the most creative person I know," James said. "I'm talking people I see on TV, anywhere. I'm the speaker between the two of us, and she's the creator. And between us, we're a long way from finished when it comes to helping people with our work." NOW

Scoring High

Good things are happening at The Canterbury School, where John Lage and Rainelle Nevers, two seniors, just scored 1460 on the SAT. Both of these students are highly motivated and have big plans for their futures.

John has applied to The University of Texas at Austin, where he is interested in pursuing a career in medicine. He comes from a family of doctors and really enjoys biology class. "I'm a perfectionist," he admitted, "but I try to only compare myself with myself. I don't want to compete with other students. I just want to keep improving." John is also president of the school chapter of the National Honor Society, is the yearbook editor and is on both the soccer and basketball teams. By all reports, he is also a very competitive dodgeball player. John was responsible for starting a journalism club for the upper elementary students, who are now producing a campus newspaper.

Rainelle is no less ambitious. She also comes from a family of doctors and has followed her mother on house calls. She has applied to The University of Texas at Austin and Vanderbilt University, where she hopes to study neurology and psychology because she finds psychopaths interesting. "The brain is fascinating. I'm interested in how people think, and how that influences their behavior." She considers herself a relaxed person. She is the secretary for the school chapter of the National Honor Society and is chief of staff and captain for the Canterbury debate team. Glazed Seafood Trio

2 5-oz. salmon fillets
Lemon pepper, to taste (divided use)
Italian seasoning, to taste
I large lemon (divided use)
6 3-bite prawns
Seasoned salt, to taste
1/2 cup clarified butter (divided use)
I cluster fresh steamed crab

3 Tbsp. honey

1 Tbsp. soy sauce

1/2 tsp. cayenne pepper

3 cloves garlic, minced

I. Put broiler on low. Wash salmon; season to taste with the lemon pepper and Italian seasoning. Squeeze the juice from half of the

lemon on the fish. Wrap the fish with plastic wrap; place in the refrigerator for 15 minutes.

- **2.** Devein and wash prawns. Season with seasoned salt, lemon pepper and 1 Tbsp. of clarified butter. Wrap the prawns with plastic wrap; place in the refrigerator for 15 minutes.
- **3.** Remove crab from shells; place in a bowl with 1 Tbsp. butter and lemon pepper. Wrap the crab with plastic wrap; place in the refrigerator for 15 minutes.
- **4.** While the seafood is resting, make a glaze by mixing the honey, soy sauce, remaining lemon juice, cayenne and garlic. Stir all together; set aside.
- **5.** Put fish on a sheet pan; broil for 7-9 minutes. Add 3 prawns to the top of each fish; broil for another 4-6 minutes on high.
- **6.** Add the glaze; add the crab to the top. Broil 2-4 additional minutes.

Strawberry and Cream Sorbet

1 lb. frozen strawberries

1/4 cup cold water

1/8 cup cream

1 tsp. vanilla

1 tsp. orange zest

1/4 cup, plus 2 Tbsp. sugar

- **1.** Add frozen strawberries to a blender; pulse for 30 seconds. Add all the remaining ingredients; blend until smooth with light chunks.
- **2.** Pour into a glass bowl. Place parchment paper over the bowl; wrap in plastic completely.
- 3. Freeze for 10-12 hours before serving.

Cheesecake Stuffed Strawberries

4 oz. cream cheese 1/2 Tbsp. vanilla extract

I tsp. almond extract

1/2 tsp. lemon zest

6 large strawberries

1/8 cup graham cracker crumbs

I. Mix the first 4 ingredients in a bowl until smooth. Rest in refrigerator.

- 2. Remove stems and cores from the center of the strawberries.
- **3.** Once removed, pipe cream filling inside. Dust the bottoms of the strawberries with graham crackers.

Ribeye With Herb Butter

2 nice marbled ribeye steaks 2 cups red wine 3 Tbsp. EVOO Salt, to taste Corse black pepper, to taste 6 garlic cloves, halved 6 sprigs thyme, or more to taste

- I bundle fresh sage
- 2 sprigs rosemary, or more to taste
- 2 dried bay leaves
- I large white onion, cut in medium slices

Herb butter:

2 cloves garlic, finely minced I tsp. thyme leaves I sage leaf, chiffonade

- 1 tsp. rosemary leaves, chopped
- 2 sticks salted butter, room temperature
- 1. Take a steak and place it on a cutting board. Cover the steak with plastic wrap; lightly tenderize it with a meat cleaver. Flip the steak over and repeat. (Repeat this step with second steak.)
- **2.** Place the steaks in a pan deep enough to be covered by wine. Pour wine and EVOO over steaks; gently massage both sides.
- **3.** Season the steaks with salt to taste; cover with the remaining ingredients.
- 4. Wrap with plastic wrap; place in the refrigerator for 2-4 hours.
- 5. For herb butter: While steaks are resting, make herb butter by placing all ingredients in a bowl and mixing until completely smooth.
- **6.** Scoop herb butter onto plastic wrap. Roll into a log on the plastic. Wrap securely; place in freezer.
- **7.** Preheat oven to 400. Preheat a heavy cast-iron skillet to medium heat. Sear both sides of each steak 2-3 minutes. Return steaks to the pan with the marinade. Cover with foil; bake 6-8 minutes for medium, 10-12 minutes for medium-well or 15 minutes for well done. (These times are based on the thickness of your steak, 3 inches or thicker.) **8.** In the last 2 minutes of cooking, add 3 or more slices of the frozen herb butter to the center of each steak. Remove foil; allow to finish cooking uncovered.

Basecamp for Adventure

Nestled at 9,318 feet above sea level in Colorado's San Juan Mountains, Silverton is a picturesque former mining town steeped in Old West history. Established in 1874 as Baker's Park, the town was named a National Historic Landmark in 1961. Today Silverton has a population of 600, and has become a perfect basecamp for adventurous travelers of all stripes.

The San Juans boast some of the most rugged and beautiful terrain in the lower 48, and are home to 13 of Colorado's "Fourteeners," mountains so called because their peaks rise to over 14,000 feet. The range is dotted with alpine lakes and waterfalls, fields of wildflowers and historic ghost towns that are relics of a bygone era.

Train buffs can enjoy an unforgettable adventure on the Durango & Silverton Narrow Gauge Railroad, traveling by

coal-fired, steam-powered locomotive on the same tracks that miners, cowboys and settlers took over a century ago. Climbing nearly 3,000 feet, the train winds through spectacular canyons and remote wilderness. Travelers disembark on Notorious Blair Street, whose wooden sidewalks were once lined with saloons, gambling halls and bordellos.

The Million Dollar Highway, built as a toll road in the late 1880s by railroad magnate Otto Mears, is one of the most spectacular drives in the USA. This journey weaves through the mountains, clinging to tight curves and topping out at an elevation of 11,017 feet on Red Mountain Pass before dropping into the town of Ouray. In autumn, the abundance of Aspen trees makes this ideal for leaf peepers.

For the adventurous, a jeep or OHV tour along the Alpine

Loop provides a full day of thrills. This 65-mile, four-wheel-drive byway connects Silverton, Lake City and Ouray, climbing over two 12,000-foot passes. Along the way, stop for a visit to Animas Forks, a well-preserved ghost town. In its heyday, this bustling mining hub had more than 30 structures including hotels, saloons, a post office and a general store. Today fewer than a dozen buildings remain, restored by the San Juan County Historical Society.

Silverton is a mecca for winter recreation, too, with two ski areas and boundless backcountry. Kendall Mountain offers affordable family fun, with 240 feet of vertical drop, four groomed trails and one double chair lift. Ice skating, sledding and snowshoeing are allowed any time. For fat bikes and Nordic skiers, the Town Loop offers 2.5 miles of groomed cross-country trails accessed right from town. For the advanced skier, Silverton Mountain is a challenging big mountain experience with expert-only terrain and heli-skiing. The extensive winter trails on Molas Pass can be explored on your own or with a local snowmobile outfitter like Ice Pirates. Be sure to bring a camera to capture the impressive views.

Summer visitors seeking tranquility will relish Molas Lake Campground, rated "Most Scenic Campground in Colorado" by AAA. Just six miles south of Silverton, atop Molas Pass, the wellmaintained campground provides unforgettable scenery, starry skies, a stocked 25-acre lake and hiking access to the Colorado Trail.

For year-round accommodations with historic flair, the Grand Imperial Hotel provides an upscale lodging experience in the heart of downtown Silverton. Built in 1882, recent renovations have returned this 135-year-old landmark to its original grandeur.




