

March is the month of spring and fun. The children are out for spring break, the flowers are beginning to bloom, and the rains wash away the tiredness of winter.





# Lone Star Allegiance

The history of who we are and where we originated is a fascinating and intriguing hobby to some. In fact, research on the history and genealogy of our families and forefathers could be considered a passionate unpaid vocation. That is exactly what knowing the history of our great state is to Geneva Davis, the current president of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas.

Geneva is currently in her second term as chapter president, serving her third year. She became a member of

the Daughters of the Republic of Texas about seven years ago when she began researching her family roots back to the Colonial Period, and the more she studied the more she learned about herself.

Her interest was alive in her entire family. Her sister, Gelene Simpson, discovered that their mother, Vera Chapman Duncan, had family related to William Flatt, one of the original recipients of a Texas land grant from Mexico. This information peaked Geneva's interest and led her to become a member of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas.

After discovering that her ancestral roots ran so deeply into the history of Texas, Geneva instinctively wanted to become a part of its living history through this society. To become a member, each interested candidate must show proof they had relatives who inhabited the land of Texas when it was a republic, before it became a state, or when land grants were being offered. The Navarro County chapter currently has 30 active members, some who are the original members of the chapter.

The organization was started by two cousins, Miss Betty Ballinger and Miss Hally Bryan. They conceived the idea of forever perpetuating the memory of the Texas pioneer families and soldiers of the Republic of Texas by forming an association of their descendants. Thus, on November 6, 1891, the Daughters of the Republic of Texas was born.



The idea behind the group is to inform the public of the history of Texas and the genealogy involved in the beginnings of this great state. The Daughters have two primary goals, including educating our students throughout the county and informing the public of the good the chapter does



at an event called A Day in December.

Recently, Geneva was able to cart an antique trunk around from various schools within Navarro County. She and her husband, along with a few other members, were able to re-enact what life might have been like before Texas became a state or when the land grants were being offered. The trunk was nothing short of a mobile museum. It was filled with treasures from pioneers of all ages, from dolls to trinkets to firearms and axes, as well as the various types of foods the pioneers might have consumed. Geneva and her husband, Bill, dressed in appropriate garb to represent just how the women and men of that time would have dressed. The children were able to come up and look in the trunk and touch and handle little pieces of history. It gave them the opportunity to learn outside of the box, to really "feel" what it was like to live and survive in the early pioneer days.

The other informational training the children receive from the Daughters is presented in a speech about the Mexican empresarios, or land agents,

and the "invitations" they extended to people to settle in Texas because the land was vast and cheap. Geneva recalls a time when she was informing the children of the empresarios and their position and responsibility with all the Texas settlements and land grants. One young man shouted out in

the Republic

the middle of her speech, "Hey, I know what you are talking about — those empresarios! We learned about that in history class."

"It was such a joy and pleasure to see the light bulb go off with that young man," Geneva reminisced. Those light bulb realizations are exactly why she works so hard for the Daughters, to see the history and knowledge click in the minds of the generations of tomorrow.

"The other item of Texas history that we stressed were the notes left for family members and friends ...Gone to Texas," Geneva explained. "Each pioneer typically left a note for those to find that just simply said, 'Gone to Texas.'"



There is an annual history essay contest that is judged by the Daughters of the Republic of Texas in May. "We primarily work with the fourth- and seventh-graders," Geneva stated. This year the fourth-graders are to write about the Austin family and the relationship they had with the inception







A plan is indeed what Eric R. Meyers needs with the daily schedule he leads. A husband and father of two, president of his family owned company, Oil City Iron Works, and the Navarro County Emergency Management coordinator, Eric is a busy man.

When Eric was a student at Corsicana High School (CHS), he discovered his passion in life — something many do not find until later in life. He took an immediate interest in volunteering for local Navarro County fire departments and aiding people who were in difficult situations. Before he graduated from CHS in 1996, Eric had already attended his first Emergency Management Conference, where he met Steve Vaughn, the former assistant state Emergency Management coordinator. Steve introduced Eric to the world of emergency management, beginning with the huge fire that took place at Fort Hood in 1995. "I just always had

a passion for volunteering to help people in emergency or disaster situations,' Eric recalled.

By the time Eric headed off to Texas State in San Marcos, formerly South

West Texas University, he was completely engrossed in the idea of helping others and getting to the root of every situation. While at college, he took specific emergency management courses in Houston or Austin, wherever they were being offered. "I remember coordinating

the appropriate emergency management course around my college courses," Eric said.

"It was inevitable that I was going to return home to Corsicana," Eric continued. "My life is here. I knew I

would return to work at Oil City Iron Works; it's who I am." Before Eric's graduation in 2000, Alan Bristol, the former County Judge, appointed him as the official Navarro County

> **Emergency Management** coordinator. With all of the extended

> > learning courses and experience Eric obtained, there was no better candidate.

"When I was appointed by Alan, Navarro County already had an Emergency Management Program

on paper; I just helped put it into play," Eric clarified. He immediately began his newly appointed voluntary position by writing the *Emergency* Operations Plan manual for Navarro

County. This binder, over six inches in thickness, is filled with every imaginable emergency management solution from A to Z.

"Emergency Management works in close relation to the sheriff's office. Mike Cox, who is my first deputy, is the liaison between the Sheriff's Department and Emergency



Management," Sheriff Les Cotton explained. "Mike did an excellent job working with Eric and the federal government as the Sheriff's Department liaison when the Columbia explosion disaster occurred."


The primary objective of Emergency Management is to coordinate all entities within the public service realm. "I work extremely close with all emergency service agencies and even private sectors," Eric stated. "It is a fine-tuned operation. It really is a coordinated effort between all county officials."

Emergency Management falls under the "umbrella" of the Department of Homeland Security, which means every time Navarro County is involved in an incident requiring state or federal assistance or resources, Eric coordinates the entire situation between Navarro County and those agencies involved.

The current County Judge, H.M. Davenport, is the director of the county side for emergency management, and the mayor, C.L. "Buster" Brown, is the director for the city side. "I work with H.M. and all of the county officials as needed. H.M. has done a really great


job of self-training himself and through DEM courses, having walked into this with very little experience," Eric said.

Eric's work primarily involves the coordination of the county, so his responsibilities entail coordinating with transportation agencies, fire services, law enforcement, commissioners and even private sector agencies — really any emergency response sector needed for a specific incident. "Don McMullan, Corsicana Fire Chief, is the Emergency Management coordinator for the city of Corsicana," Eric stated.

"When the space shuttle Columbia exploded, Navarro County Emergency Management and NCSO immediately sent deputies out to the sites, and they walked the fields looking for debris. And once it was found, they had to cover it with a five gallon bucket and log it with a GPS device so the feds could come down to find the rubble's exact location," Mike Cox explained.

Other responsibilities Emergency Management may have to handle include coordination of evacuation efforts, especially during hurricanes affecting the Texas coast. "When Hurricane Rita did her damage and everyone was driving up I-45, Emergency Management had to coordinate with state agencies on exits and re-routing options for drivers. Some people were running out of gas, so we had to coordinate impromptu refueling stations, and we also had to make sure there was medical attention always at hand. People were getting ill from driving in the heat so long," Sheriff Cotton recalled.

Upon returning home in 2000, Eric went on to obtain his master's in public administration with an emphasis in emergency management. It is quite clear Eric does not take his responsibilities to the county of Navarro or its citizens lightly, even though he holds this position on a volunteer basis. "I don't know why, it




is just a passion of mine, and always has been. It is what I do," he expressed. "With Eric on the side of Navarro County, his volunteering, expertise, funding management and experience probably saves Navarro County well over \$100,000 each year," Mike Cox said.

Eric proudly showed off the new OEM (Office of Emergency Management) building, which has been completely funded through government aid. "No money is free," Mike continued, "but Eric manages to file all the right paperwork and get government funding or grants for OEM." The new state of the art facility is equipped with 16 computers, radio and phone stations in the conference area and a digital video link capability with regional or state agencies on a 60" projection screen system.

Eric's responsibilities as the Navarro County Emergency Management Coordinator are endless. He is basically on-call 24/7. No situation is too small and no disaster is too large. Eric is responsible for knowing the status of the grasses and drought indices around the county in order to notify the commissioner's court if a burn ban needs to go into effect, all the way to such major disaster coordination efforts such as tornadoes, effects from hurricanes and other natural or man-made disaster repercussions. "As I said earlier, it truly is a group effort. We couldn't do it without the help of everyone involved. We work closely with all agencies, and other various volunteer organizations such as volunteer fire departments, Red Cross, LEPC (Local Emergency Planning Committee) and VOAD (Volunteer Organizations Active and Disaster)," he detailed.

This is Eric's passion. However, you can tell by the humble pride he has in his group and their efforts that none of this would be possible without the aid and assistance of all groups and entities involved on a daily basis.

### **GOURMET CHICKEN**

- 3 chicken breasts, split
- 3 drumsticks
- 3 thighs
- 16 oz. whole purple plums juice of 1 lemon
- 1 onion, chopped
- 1/4 cup chili sauce
- 1/4 cup soy sauce
- 1 Tbsp. Worcestershire 2 drops Tabasco sauce
- 1 tsp. ginger
- 2 tsp. mustard

Arrange chicken in a single layer in a 19 x 19 x 2-inch pan. Seed and puree plums and add remaining ingredients to make a sauce. Pour over chicken and cook at 350 F for 75 minutes.

### **OUTER BANKS CLAM CHOWDER**

12 large clams 1/4 lb. fat bacon or salt pork 2 medium onions, sliced fine 3 medium potatoes, cubed salt and pepper to taste

2 Tbsp. corn meal or all-purpose flour 1 cup light cream

Scrub clams and boil in enough water to cover. Remove clams from shells, chop fine, reserve. Strain liquid and add enough water to make 6 cups, reserve. Cut bacon in very small pieces or, if using pork, into 1/2 inch cubes. Fry until crisp and brown. Add onions, potatoes, clams and reserved liquid. Simmer until potatoes are done and season with salt and pepper to taste. Mix corn meal or flour in a little cold water and stir into chowder. Add cream. Serve in warm bowls at once. NOTE: When fresh clams are not available 2 8-oz bottles clam juice and 2 8-oz cans minced clams and their liquid can be substituted.

### ANGELS ON HORSEBACK

1 12 oz. jar fresh oysters 8 slices bacon, cut in thirds 1 Tbsp. chopped parsley 1/2 tsp. salt paprika to taste

pepper to taste

Drain oysters. Place an oyster on each piece of bacon. Sprinkle with parsley and seasonings. Wrap bacon around oyster and secure with a toothpick. Place "angels" on broiler rack and broil 4 inches from source of heat for 8 to 10 minutes Turn carefully. Broil 4 to 5 minutes longer or until bacon is crisp and oysters begin to curl at the edges. Makes about 20 to 25 hors d'oeuvres.

### ARTICHOKE PANCETTA TART

TART CRUST

1 1/4 cup unbleached flour pinch of salt

1 stick unsalted butter

ice water

2 cups chopped onions (2 medium onions)

3 Tbsp. unsalted butter

1 cup diced pancetta (use meaty part — about 1/2 lb.)

1 cup frozen artichoke hearts, defrosted and chopped



3 eggs

TART CRUST: Combine flour and salt in a food processor fitted with steel blade. Cut butter into pieces and add to the processor.

Pulse until combined. Add ice water by the Tbsp. until mixture holds together when pinched with fingers. Wrap in plastic and refrigerate for a couple of hours or freeze for 45 minutes. Preheat oven to 350 F. Roll out dough on lightly floured board. Lay pastry in a 9-inch tart pan with removable bottom, folding the overhanging dough back into the pan. Press in place. Freeze tart shell for 15 minutes. Bake shell on cookie sheet for 10 minutes. Remove from oven and let cool. FILLING: Sauté onions in butter until they begin to wilt. Add pancetta, half the artichoke hearts, diced red pepper and herbs. Sauté briefly and set aside to cool, then place in tart pan. Whisk together the eggs and heavy cream. Add cheese, salt and pepper. Carefully pour over filling. Arrange remaining artichokes and julienned red pepper on top. Bake tart on cookie sheet at 350 F for 40 - 45 minutes until top is browned and knife inserted in middle comes out clean. If you make this without the pancetta, use a little salt. Will keep for several days in refrigerator. Serve at room temperature or reheat in microwave.

### CHEESE WAFER HORS D'OEUVRES

- 1 cup butter or margarine, softened
- 1 lb. New York cheddar cheese, grated
- 2 cups flour
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. cayenne pepper
- 4 cups corn flakes, crushed or 2 cups rice krispies

Blend butter and cheese thoroughly. Add flour, salt, cayenne pepper and corn flakes, mixing well. Shape into balls about the size of a walnut. Place on an ungreased cookie sheet and flatten with a fork. Bake in a preheated 325 F oven 20 to 30 minutes, until dry. These keep well in a tin box.













## Great Outdoors

One of the best long-blooming plants for our area is a "rose" that is not really a rose! The common name is Rose of Sharon or Althea and it blooms continuously from spring through fall. This six to 15 foot, small shrub can be trimmed up into an attractive small tree with a festive topknot of blooms or left to its upright, but sprawling, natural shape. One of its best attributes is that it can take the extremes of our finicky

weather in stride and do quite well with little water. Of course, a wide choice of colors does not hurt either!

The single lavender and single white are the most common, but the doubles are more than twice as pretty. As a relative of the hibiscus family, it has large circular, ruffled blooms in striking colors, but with none of the temperamental need for "hothouse treatment." Rose of Sharon goes into the ground and happily stays there to thrive through our hot summers and cold winters!


With a long European heritage starting in the 16th century, Rose of Sharon was brought to American soil by the colonists as a favorite plant, and has come into the national interest once more. The originals probably were "pass a long" plants given to family as they set out across the world on their quest for new horizons.


Hybridization in the 1960s and '70s expanded the size and the color choices. Some of the newer varieties such as Lavender Chiffon, Blue Satin and Olana, may be available in the nurseries. The standard double white and pink as well as the single purple will be available at the coming Ellis County Master Gardener Spring Expo scheduled for Saturday, March 29 in the Waxahachie Civic Center.


All of these hardy plants tolerate our alkaline soils and prefer compost rather than heavy doses of fertilizer. They bloom on new wood so should be pruned lightly in late winter, while still leafless, to stimulate that topknot of bright blooms. Find a place with full to partial sun and give these beautiful, hardy "roses" a try!

# Are You Taking Advantage of a Roth IRA?

Simply put, contributing to a Roth Individual Retirement Account (IRA) may be a smart money move. The question then is, are you taking full advantage?

The benefit of contributing to a Roth IRA is that money you put into one of these accounts grows tax free and distributions may be tax free<sup>1</sup>.

If you have not yet opened a Roth IRA, do it now. You have until your tax return deadline (typically April 15) to set up and make contributions for the previous tax year. Annual contributions are limited — currently \$4,000 annually². That means you can invest \$4,000 for 2007, giving you a solid start to your savings. The contribution limit rises to \$5,000 in 2008².

If you are just getting started investing, the Roth should be one of your first stops — even before you open a regular, taxable account, or contribute to a workplace retirement-savings plan.

The only exception is if your employer

offers a match on your 401(k) contributions. That is free money you do not want to pass up. Yes, you can invest in both a Roth as well as a workplace retirement plan.

Not sure where to find the money to fund your account? Consider investing your tax refund. About 70 percent of Americans will get a refund this year, and last year the average check totaled more than \$2,000. That cash would make a great start to your Roth.

Contributions are limited based on a taxpayer's filing status and Modified Adjusted Gross Income (MAGI) as indicated below.

The MAGI ranges, for 2007, are: **Single filers:** Up to \$99,000 (to qualify for a full contribution); \$99,000-\$114,000 (to be eligible for a partial contribution); above \$114,000, no contribution allowed.

**Joint filers:** Up to \$156,000 (to

qualify for a full contribution); \$156,000-\$166,000 (to be eligible for a partial contribution); above \$166,000, no contribution allowed.

**Married filing separately:** \$0 (to qualify for a full contribution); \$0 -\$10,000 (to be eligible for a partial contribution); above \$10,000, no contribution allowed.


Your exact contribution amount can be calculated using the worksheets found in Publication 590 on the IRS Web site at www.irs.gov.

### Notes:

- 1. Withdrawals are tax-free if you are over age 59 1/2 and at least five years have expired since you established a Roth IRA. Otherwise withdrawals of gain may be taxable (unless the withdrawal is "qualified") and may be subject to a 10 percent tax penalty.
- 2. An individual can contribute up to \$4,000 (or 100 percent of earned income, whichever is less) for tax year 2007 and \$5,000 for tax year 2008. If you are over age 50, you are allowed to make additional "catch-up" contributions of \$1,000 for tax years 2007 and 2008. Your adjusted gross income may limit your contribution amount.

# When a Tonsillectomy is Necessary

That pesky sore throat that comes with the cold or flu every year may actually be tonsillitis, and a throat lozenge just will not cut it when it comes to relieving the pain. While tonsillitis usually occurs in children, adults can be affected as well.

Tonsils are part of the immune system, which helps the body fight disease and infection. Tonsillitis is the inflammation or infection of the tonsils, or the collections of tissue located on either side of the throat. It is contracted when small droplets, which carry bacteria or viruses, are moved through the air as an infected person breaths, coughs or sneezes.

There are two types of tonsillitis, both with their own symptoms and treatments. One type is a viral infection. A viral infection usually lasts about two weeks and will go away without any prescribed medications. Symptoms of tonsillitis caused by a viral infection are cold-like, including a sore throat, runny nose, sneezing or coughing. Antibiotics are

not effective when treating a viral case of tonsillitis, but there are a few remedies to alleviate pain like gargling salt water, drinking warm tea or taking a nonprescription pain reliever.

Tonsillitis may also be caused by a bacterial infection like strep throat. Symptoms include a sore throat and a sudden fever without any other upper-respiratory problems. Warning signs of bacterial tonsillitis can include a dry

> mouth and tongue and ear pain. When these symptoms arise, individuals should visit a physician for diagnosis and proper medication since untreated cases can lead to serious complications.

Antibiotics are used to treat bacterial cases of tonsillitis, and it is important to finish the prescribed dosage, even if symptoms have disappeared. Bacteria may become resistant to the antibiotics if they are not taken as directed.

In some instances, a physician may recommend a tonsillectomy. This procedure is performed under general anesthesia and the tonsils are removed completely. The incisions heal naturally in about two weeks. A tonsillectomy should be considered if someone has:

• Frequent or chronic infections.

• Enlarged tonsils that interfere with breathing or general well-being.

• A boil or sore on the tonsils.





# Health

After a tonsillectomy, a humidifier, ice packs and soft food may help alleviate pain or discomfort. Once a person has recovered, the frequency of throat infections should decrease, but may not go away completely.

While tonsillitis will usually go away with time or some medication, there are a few simple tips to keep you from catching the disease, like: avoiding close contact with someone who has been infected, washing your hands and regularly disinfecting surfaces such as door knobs and countertops. If you or someone in your family is experiencing any of these symptoms, or has frequent throat infections, talk with your physician about possible treatment options. WOW




