
I also found out March is Save Your Vision Month and Workplace Eye Wellness Month. With that, let me plug the Lions Club International (in which I



caught up in stardom.





In spite of missed class time during track meets, Jessica maintains aboveaverage grades. She goes to teachers


ahead of time to get the assignments from her AP (Advanced Placement) classes she'll miss while racing at meets.













to his fifth, Fred devised some basic writing rules that helped his writing flow and helped him get his stories published. He likes to share his knowledge with other writers and help them on their writing journey.

Fred did not set out to write books, but when he began writing he found getting the story and idea on the page was important. "Don't worry about grammar or punctuation," Fred suggested. "That is why we have editors and spell check. Editing can come later."

He grew up in rural Texas and wrote stories about what he remembered. Several of his stories were published in a magazine, and he received positive feedback. "After I retired, I dug out a skeleton outline for a book about living in Texas," Fred said. He created a story based on his childhood. He wrote about wearing shirts made from flour sacks and how his dad would say they were "poor as snakes." He called the book published

in 2003 Chinqua Where? The Spirit of Rural America. The book is about humorous escapades and shenanigans of families living in a community where everyone knows everyone and are kin to half of them.

A guideline Fred follows for all his works is to "write about what you know. When you write about what you know, your passion for writing and your heart shows through," he said. Even with



passion and heart, Fred discovered he needed an agent who was just as passionate about promoting his work. "My advice is to get an agent," Fred said. "Writing is the easy part, but you have to find that one person who wants to see your book succeed." Fred received



his fair share of rejection letters like all writers do, and expresses having a thick skin is important. There are many avenues to publish a book: traditional, print-on-demand, eBooks. Fred decided to self-publish Chinqua Where? and it can be found in most libraries in Texas.

"Every book generates another," Fred said. He was approached by Greg Riley to write a book about a Texas oil company in Beaumont. While working on his master's at Lamar University, Fred had already conducted much of the required research. After earning his master's, he had mounds of unused material on the subject. The book took a relatively short time to write. Black Gold to Bluegrass: From the Oilfields of Texas to Spindletop Farm of Kentucky was published in 2005.

For this book, Fred and Greg made a marketing plan. Marketing plans let the publishers know the authors are agreeable to speaking engagements, media appearances and promoting their book on social media outlets. "The publisher liked the fact we were willing to spend some of our own money to promote the book," Fred explained. "Writers need to know marketing is a full-time job. Talking

to bookstores and setting up book signings is also a good idea."

Black Gold led to Devil's Pocket published in 2007. "This was my only fiction book. It's about three Southeast Texas families spanning from the 1870s through the 1930s," Fred said. "My wife



helped me with the romantic parts." Fred admitted the words flowed easily, but he did not know where the book would end. Some writers let it flow and don't know the ending. Some writers have an outline and know where the story is going. Fred had to decide whether or not to kill the hero near the end. "I didn't want people to ask me for a sequel, so I killed the hero. Now they ask me to write the prequel," Fred laughed. He thinks writing fiction is easier,

but cautions that you still have to provide the correct information and time period details to make the story believable.


Almost anything can inspire a story. Fred was touched by an account he saw on the evening news about a Ft. Worth man imprisoned for a crime he did not

commit. "I did some research and found out no one had written a book about him. I contacted the Innocence Project of Texas, and they were cooperative and willing to provide information," Fred said. "I spent time looking through news stories and documents. I made a list of people to interview. But, don't research forever. Write and research at the same time."

Fred retired after 15 years of chasing









criminals and used his skills while gathering information. He received the cooperation of the Lubbock police department, and the book was complete in a year and a half. A Plea for Justice: The Timothy Cole Story was published in 2010. "Promoting the book in the town where it took place was easy," Fred said. "But it became much harder outside Texas."

His last book, co-authored with Dr. Charles Breithaupt, was published in 2012. King Cotton: Coach Cotton Robinson and the Buna Boys' Basketball Legacy is a biography of a legendary Texas coach who set a state record for most boys' high-school basketball championships.

"Books have a short shelf life," Fred explained. "You have to continually find a different audience in order to keep a book selling. Local stories are hard to promote nationally. But for a full impact, your story needs to appeal to a



wide range of readers." Even though Fred understands what sells books, his motivation to write is simply that he loves it. "When I write a book, I become obsessive. I tend to write eight to 10 hours a day until the book is done," Fred said. "My wife and I will yell across the house to check on each other." Fred stresses the importance of being able to balance life and writing. He admits it is something he has a hard time doing.

"You have to have a fire in your belly to write, and you have to love writing," Fred said. For now, he has not found that fire for another subject. Fred spends time in the backyard these days. He maintains the vegetable garden, fruit trees and the gravel pathway with his wife, Dottie. He even built a pergola and deck. Maybe he will find inspiration someday for another story that needs to be told, but for now, he's taking it easy while he waits for the words. NOW



















At Home With JJ Prater and Margaret Perkins

in a place of honor in the flowerbed near the ostriches. John F. Kennedy roses in reds and pinks, Oklahoma roses in yellows, cactus and yuccas surround the little sitting area JJ made for friends who smoke. By the front door two plaques are strategically positioned. The first reads, An Old Crow and a Cute Chick Live Here. The second says, God Blessed The Broken Road That Led Me Straight To You.

This month, they're watching for daffodils. Margaret's birthday is the last day of March, the day the daffodils usually bloomed on the farm in Ohio, where she grew up. For her sake, JJ has planted 300 daffodils in his front yard, plus irises artistically arranged in an old iron wheel with monkey grass surrounding it. "Eighteen years ago, there was one daffodil, right where that monkey grass is. I saw the bud and knew it would bloom the next day. I came out here to see it, and the flower and bloom were gone," said Margaret. Turns out, JJ had picked that fresh bloom and taken







it to the school secretary, who needed cheering. "I was so disappointed, but he was doing it to make someone happy, and he had not known I was watching for it. So, I've made him plant more daffodils since then!"

That's all been a joy for JJ. "I like to work in the garden," he said. "If you love something, you take care of it." He has owned this home since 1971, and originally the garden took intense labor. "Hedges had grown up all around the place. You couldn't even see the house." Little by little, between long hours working for companies like General Dynamics and the Santa Fe Railway, JJ renovated the interior and exterior and created a livable and beautiful home.

Adding to the one-bedroom home, JJ built on three bedrooms, a utility room,



dining room, back porch and another bathroom. He salvaged the shower from a railroad car and added the long tall

mirror above the marble lavatory. "I did all that while married to my first wife, and as my children were born I kept building on," JJ said. "It's made out of true 2x4s and true 2x6s. I tore down houses and then built it with those materials." JJ's

intent was to create a place to live and be happy. "Really, home is what you make of it. As long as you have the Lord in your heart, you can be cheerful," said this part Cherokee, part Irish gentleman.

When JJ's wife died of cancer, and Margaret's husband died of cancer, somehow the two found each other. "My first wife was a Yankee, so I had to get me another Yankee," joked JJ.

"I don't like to do housework, but he does," replied Margaret, who is part German, part Welsh and purely practical. Together they buy and sell antiques just so they can reinvest in more antiques and enjoy their hobby. JJ deals in Western



stuff, and Margaret in collectibles. Several cabinets in the living room display her favorite figurines, The Royal Daltons.

Hughes Middle School students agree Mr.

Tim Brooks is one of their favorite teachers. A sixth-grade social studies teacher, Mr. Brooks is known at Hughes for his fun-loving and entertaining methods. "He always makes my day when I come help him during seventh period," said Haley Hostetler, a seventh-grader who works as his teacher's assistant. "When I had him in social studies last year, I could be having a bad day, and he would joke around with me. It would get me feeling better every time."

Haley enjoys spending time in Mr. Brooks' class so much, she happily agreed to help him and her classmate, Camille Rasor, lead the school's efforts to accept Rachel's Challenge. The two



girls work closely with Mr. Brooks to organize and facilitate regular activities that work to exemplify the program's mission of starting a chain reaction of kindness. "Rachel's Challenge is all about spreading happiness while being a positive influence," Haley said, which made Mr. Brooks an obvious candidate to head up the program at Hughes.

"He makes it more fun to be at school," Camille said. "If there was a day last year when I was dragging and just

did not want to be at school, I would be smiling by the time I left his class." That's how Haley and Camille want students to feel when they come across someone involved in Rachel's Challenge. "Seeing people have a better day because someone said something nice to them or did something nice for them is great," Haley said. "It just makes me feel good to see that and to know we are making a difference through Rachel's Challenge."

According to its Web site, Rachel's Challenge is a "series of student empowering programs and strategies that equip students and adults to combat bullying and allay feelings of isolation and despair by creating a culture of kindness and compassion." The program is based on the writings and life of 17-year old Rachel Scott who was the first student

killed at Columbine High School in 1999. Her dad founded the organization shortly after she died when he discovered a number of drawings and journal entries describing her vision for such a program. Over the last 14 years, Rachel's Challenge has grown into a remarkable phenomenon across the country.

Mr. Brooks, Camille and Haley firmly believe there was something special about Rachel and want to do everything they can to carry on her vision. Burleson Independent School District (BISD) first tried the program last year at one elementary and two middle school campuses, but it really took off this year when Hughes Middle School principal, Makesha Brown, and Mr. Brooks took the initiative to fully develop it. "After 15 years of teaching, I have seen the worst examples of what kids can resort to. However, on the flip side of that, I have also seen a lot of good in every kid I've taught. Take the worst kid that we have, whoever that may be, and there is some good in that child. They just don't know how to show it, or they are afraid to show it," Mr. Brooks said.

"This program to me is all about its motto, which is to start a chain reaction. We feel if we can instill a few good things in our students, it will then have a domino effect and start reaching kids who otherwise may have led pretty negative lives," Mr. Brooks said. "It's just common sense to be a part of something that is instilling positive values in our

kids. Why wouldn't you want to be a part of that as an educator?"

Now every BISD campus has accepted Rachel's Challenge. Speakers came out to each school in November to show them the program and help them get started. "It's a powerful presentation," Mr. Brooks said. "I've seen it three times now, and it moves these kids. It captivates them, and they take it seriously, but it's up to us to keep that impact going."

At Hughes, Camille and Haley are determined to help Mr. Brooks do just that. They are thrilled to see participation thrive. Their monthly meetings grew from 20 students last year to nearly 200 this year. They work with students on a number of kindness projects. They hosted a morning kindness walk in which students greeted everyone arriving with friendly words of encouragement. They



created a chain of kindness for students to write down kind deeds they do and add them as links to a long paper chain. They created notes on which students can write kind words to slip in students' lockers. They've even dedicated weeks to showing kindness to teachers, cafeteria workers, bus drivers and custodians. "The adults need this, too," Mr. Brooks said.

Even the city of Burleson and community businesses have accepted the challenge. Kindness Matters signs can be seen all over town. "It's amazing. We have businesses saying Kindness Matters that have nothing to do with the school district," Camille said. "I am so













glad Mr. Brooks asked me to be a part of this. He set an incredible example and has given the two of us all the support we could need."

Mr. Brooks selected Camille and Haley because they are both exceptional leaders and have positive reputations with both students and teachers. Yet even as well-known and well-respected as they are, they have experienced bullying first hand. "It's terrible," Camille said. "There was a time where I was crying everyday after school. No one should have to go through that."

Mr. Brooks couldn't agree more. "That's why this program is so significant. If it's happening to someone like Camille, then we know for a fact that it's happening to those kids we never hear from," he said.

Mr. Brooks chose to become a teacher after a Crowley High School coach left an impression. When he and his high school sweetheart, Leslie, went off to Tarleton State University, he wanted to do something to pay forward the guidance he received. "My goal as a teacher has been to reach as many kids as I can in a positive way. If you don't reach the child first, you are not going to teach him anything," he said. "I hope to shape our kids into effective leaders, so they can take what they've learned both about being a person and the subject and use it to become successful."

He and Leslie have been married for 13 years and now have two sons, ages 10 and almost 2. Before he taught sixth grade, Mr. Brooks taught high school, but sixth grade is by far his favorite. He plans to finish his career as an educator right where he is.

A husband and wife team at Station 2 of the Briaroaks Volunteer Fire Department enjoys protecting citizens. Bobby in February 2012 an astounding Bobby and Angela like doing things together, so they have unincorporated areas of Burleson.

Bobby grew up around Alvarado and is a full-time paramedic and firefighter for the city of Keller. On his days off, he willingly gives his time in his own community. "I wasn't always a firefighter. I was a brick layer for 12 years," Bobby said. He met a fireman in Grapevine, through the baseball league his children were affiliated with, who precipitated Bobby's interest in fire service. He has volunteered for Briaroaks since March 2008 and full-time at Keller since January 2011.

Angela also grew up in Alvarado. She has volunteered with the fire department for about two years. "I joined because I was always here with Bobby doing whatever was needed," Angela said. "We do everything together, so I decided
















to join." Angela was working dispatch, but those duties changed. Now she works behind the scenes taking pictures at the scene for training and documentation, while also helping with fundraisers and administration.

"People do not have to have any special training to become a volunteer firefighter," Angela stressed. "You learn on the job as you go." After being accepted, the volunteers take 40 hours of classes in first response and rescue.

While working at Briaroaks Volunteer Fire Department (VFD), Bobby attained the rank of captain and was awarded Firefighter of the Year for 2011. One of Bobby's peers, veteran firefighter, Mike Hill, said, "To be firefighter of the year, you have to show overall commitment and dedication that stands out from the rest. You have to go above and beyond by taking more calls and more training [than what is expected]." The members of Briaroaks VFD are committed to providing a superior level of emergency service that improves the quality of life, health and safety of the communities they serve, as shown through their level of performance and impressive response times.

Not only is Angela frequently at the station, but their three children also come to hang out. Denton is 12 and wants to be a meteorologist. Jayci is 9. "She changes her mind all the time. Right now, she wants to own a ranch and barrel race," Angela said. "Brady is 5 and will probably be the fireman in the family." Bobby took the fire truck to the kid's school for career day.



Much training is required, and Bobby teaches several courses, including Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA) and Emergency Medical Services (EMS). "We get hands-on practice," Bobby said. "Some training is done at the fire training center in Cleburne, and some as far away as Texas A&M University." Brayton Fire Training Field in College Station provides a variety of classes, such as rope rescue, water rescue, Hazmat training and a structural collapse class, to name just

However, sometimes the department trains right in their community. "Some people out in the country needed a big house moved, and they asked us if we wanted to practice with it and burn it down," Bobby explained. "We finally got approval to practice, so we used it for hands-on training. It was different and fun." The firemen cut holes in the roof to practice ventilation. They started it on fire to practice a real-life simulation.

All this practice helps them when they are called in on an emergency. "A lot of calls are on FM 917, which is a dangerous road with lots of curves. The sun shines in people's face going and coming to work," Bobby said. They have been called to get snakes out of houses and horses out of swimming pools. And, yes, they have been called to get cats out of trees. "Have you ever seen a dead cat in a tree?" Bobby laughed. "They will come down on their own." Bobby remembered one winter when the team was fighting a fire in the snow. The water they sprayed froze, and the truck got stuck. "We had to chop ice

off the road to get the truck out of the driveway. It was exhausting," Bobby explained.

Some of the calls are really hard. "Some of them get to you. One of my instructors told me to remember I did not put them in that situation, and I am there trying to help," Bobby said. Remembering that helps, but some images stay in the mind forever.

"When kids are involved," Angela said, "those are the worst ones." Bobby and Angela find ways to release the tension. Bobby plays golf and plays with his kids. He also plays on the department softball team. "The department plays in a public league, but we would love to get a VFD league started," Angela said.

Other fun events include the countywide Hose Off in the summer, a family-friendly get together. Various teams throughout the county have competitions spraying water at barrels on a pulley to see who can move theirs to the end of the course first. Their big fundraiser for the year is a fish fry held in April or May.

Multiple duties must be performed at the station. Once a week, the trucks are checked. Medical equipment is restocked. Hardware is refueled and tested to be in good working order. All the lights are assessed. Once a month, expiration dates are observed. Bobby orders any maintenance needed, as well as keeping track of all the volunteers' hours. Each has to acquire a minimum number of hours on the job.

Four trucks sit in the bay waiting — but not wanting — to be called up for service. The rescue truck is the first on the scene and carries most of the medical equipment and the basic hardware for rescue. A new brush truck was recently purchased with grants, donations and monies from the fundraisers. "We do pride ourselves in the new equipment," Angela said. "Not many VFD have this." The big engine called Old Faithful is next on the list to be replaced. Their goal is to upgrade every 15 years.

Bobby has an associate degree in emergency medicine. His goal is to continue his education in fire science, so he can be promoted in fire service. He and Angela are committed to helping the community for years to come. They are building many memories they can pass down. They're proud of protecting and serving the citizens around them.



Her hands-down favorite cook is her brother, Rex Sullivan. "He likes to cook western-style: biscuits in the iron skillet, a big pot of beans." Leva cooks some of everything for her husband, their girls and their families, and she especially loves preparing Mexican food.

Beer Bread

- 3 cups self-rising flour
- 3 Tbsp. sugar
- I can beer (any kind)
- I cup dry instant mashed potatoes (optional)
- 3 Tbsp. butter, melted
- **1.** Mix first 3 or 4 ingredients. (You can add instant mashed potatoes for a slightly different texture.) Put in a greased and floured loaf pan.
- 2. Pour melted butter over top.
- 3. Bake at 350 F for 45 minutes.

Tortilla Soup

- 1 Tbsp. garlic, minced
- 1/2 onion, chopped
- 1/2 green pepper, chopped
- 1 Tbsp. butter
- 2 cooked chicken breasts

- 2 14-oz. cans chicken broth
- 2 6-oz. cans tomato paste
- I package taco seasoning
- 1 15-oz. can hominy, drained
- 1 15-oz. can corn, drained
- 1 15-oz. can Ranch Style beans
- 1 8-oz. pkg. cream cheese
- I bag tortilla chips
- I cup Monterrey Jack cheese, shredded
- 1 cup Cheddar cheese, shredded
- **1.** Sauté first 4 ingredients in a large stock pot.
- **2.** Add next 7 ingredients. Bring to a boil and simmer for 20 minutes.
- **3.** Remove about 2 cups of the juice and place in a bowl with cream cheese. Stir until the cream cheese is melted, then return all back to the soup. Simmer an additional 10 minutes.
- **4.** Serve over crushed tortilla chips with cheeses and other condiments as you choose.

Okra-bacon Salad

- 24 oz. breaded okra
- 6-8 slices bacon
- 1 bunch green onions
- 2 medium tomatoes
- Dressing:
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup apple cider vinegar
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- **1.** Fry okra. Drain on paper towel.
- 2. Fry bacon until crispy; crumble.
- **3.** Mix okra and bacon with chopped onions and tomatoes.
- **4.** Shake dressing ingredients in jar. Pour over salad just before serving. Toss.

Cilantro Rice

- 1/2 cup onion, chopped
- 1 cup rice
- 2 Tbsp. olive oil
- 2 cups water
- 3/4 cup cilantro, chopped
- 2 Tbsp. lime juice
- **1.** Brown onion and rice in olive oil.
- **2.** Add 2 cups water; bring to a boil. Cover pot; continue to simmer for 25 minutes.
- **3.** Stir in cilantro and lime juice. Serve.

Pulled Pork

- 1 1-2 lb. pork roast
- I onion, diced
- 2 Tbsp. brown sugar
- 1/2 7-oz. can Chipotle peppers in Adobo sauce
- 2 12-oz. cans Dr Pepper
- **1.** Put all ingredients in Crock-Pot. Cook on high for 6 hours. Pull apart with fork. Good served on flour tortillas with Cilantro Rice (recipe above) and pinto beans for a full meal!

Brown Rice

- I cup uncooked white rice
- 1 stick butter, melted
- 1 14-oz, can beef broth
- 1 14-oz. can French onion soup
- 1 6-oz. chopped mushrooms (optional)
- **I.** Mix first 4 ingredients together. Put in greased baking dish.
- **2.** Top with mushrooms. Cover and bake at 400 F for 45 minutes.


