Family Heritage



Joni Cato is very proud of her heritage. But up until a few years ago, she did not know the true depth of her family lineage. Joni was born in Seminole, Texas, and always heard stories from her grandmother about their family heritage. Some of the stories seemed a little too far-fetched. "Truth is, they seemed unbelievable," Joni said with a laugh. But they would always listen with rapt attention every time they were told. One of the stories tells of them being part of Stephen F. Austin's Old Three Hundred.

The name Old Three Hundred refers to the settlers who received land grants in Stephen F. Austin's first colony in Mexico. The Father of Texas arranged for settlers to come to Texas in exchange for land. In payment for his services, Austin would collect 12.5 cents an acre in compensation. Austin returned to New Orleans and sought willing colonists, and



by the end of the summer of 1824, most of the Old Three Hundred were settled in Texas.

According to the terms of the 1823 Imperial Colonization Law of Mexico, each family engaged in farming was to receive one labor (about 177 acres) and each ranching family one league (about 4,428 acres), for which the family would have to pay the state \$30 within six years. An additional caveat was that the land had to be occupied and improved within two years. Those who accepted these terms are considered to be the beginning population of the colonization of the Republic of Texas.

One of those original settlers was a man named Christian Smith who is a direct ancestor of Joni. However, Joni didn't find this information out overnight. In fact, had it not been for a conversation with a cousin, it may not have ever happened at all.

At her grandmother's funeral in 2003, Joni ran into her cousin, Donna Hilburn. Joni had not seen Donna much since childhood, but at the service, they began reminiscing about their grandmother's stories. They decided to investigate the Old Three Hundred to see if there was any truth to be found.



The first step was to write to the Austin Old Three Hundred Club and see what it would take to become a member of the organization. When Joni e-mailed the registrar of the organization, she received a two word response — "Happy Hunting."

Obviously, becoming a member of this organization wasn't simple. To apply for membership, extensive proof must be provided that your ancestor was one of Austin's

Old Three Hundred. One acceptable item of proof would be a copy of his/her land grant. "Names, dates and places must be given for both father and mother of all generations connecting you to your Old Three Hundred ancestor," Joni explained. "Each relationship, date and place must be proven by birth certificate, marriage license, death certificate, census records, wills or other acceptable documents." As you might guess, it's a very time-consuming process. However, it was a project Joni and Donna took on gladly. "We became research assistants," Joni shared.

Joni and Donna soon found themselves crisscrossing the state in search of information. One of their visits was to their 93-year-old great-aunt Margaret. When they first asked her about their family heritage, Aunt Margaret simply replied off-handedly, "Oh, I doubt I have anything that could help you." In spite of this, she graciously agreed to let the ladies peruse some of her letters and old records. "We found a plethora of stuff!" Joni remembered. One of the finds was a family Bible which helped give more information and ideas of where to look. The Bible also spurred them on to continue in their search.

Their research proved very fruitful, and in fact, Joni found out they were qualified for the Old Three Hundred through Christian Smith. Another ancestor had been part of the Mier Expedition, which was the most disastrous of all of the border confrontations between Texas and Mexico during the days of the Republic. Still, another had fought in the Battle of San Jacinto, which proved to be the decisive battle of the Texas Revolution.

"We have relatives going all the way back to the Mayflower. One of our earliest ancestors was Stephen Hopkins who signed the Mayflower Compact," Joni stated proudly. Joni even found, through her research, a direct kinship to Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis.

On another occasion, Joni remembered her grandmother telling of a home on Lipscomb Street in Fort Worth. After much research, she finally found where the house would have been located and discovered it had been torn down. In its place is one of the Travis Avenue Baptist Church's parking lots. However, a conversation with the church secretary led to her receiving a picture of the original house.

Obviously, Joni had all she needed to gain membership in the Old Three



Hundred Club. However, she also found out she qualified to be a part of another organization, too. Founded in 1891, The Daughters of the Republic of Texas (DRT) is the oldest patriotic women's organization in Texas and one of the oldest in the nation. To be accepted, you must have a lineal descendent of a man or woman who rendered loval service for Texas prior to February 19, 1846. Joni and Donna qualified 12 times over. One of those ancestors was Solomon Barrow, a very close friend of Sam Houston. They are both now members of the Charles Calvin McCoy DRT Chapter in Arlington.

The time of digging and research has not only opened doors for Joni, but she has also been able to use it to open doors for others. One time, Joni brought her friend, Tammy Newbern, to a DRT meeting. Tammy told Joni she was part of a great thing, but that she, herself, did not have that deep of a family heritage. Joni took that as a challenge and began to do some research in Tammy's family history. She found out that Tammy was an ancestor of Samuel Lewis who fought in the Texas Revolution. "Now, Tammy is also a DRT card-carrying member of the Arlington Chapter," Joni smiled.

On the bookshelf in her house are several binders full of information of Joni's family history. But there are more places to research and many more binders to fill. "I am extremely proud of my family heritage," Joni confessed. "I would encourage everyone to look into their own. You never know what you might find." As for Joni, she now knows, and has the documentation to prove her grandmother's stories were true. NOW



be, so that was a challenge." Her black belt came after 10 years of training, with those 20 years in between.

The children have been in tae kwon do since first grade, about four years. Michael's son, Alec, is 10 years old. His favorite part of tae kwon do is learning new forms. He enjoys the martial art because it provides a challenge and is good exercise. "It's an honor to have my black belt, and I like spending time with



my dad," Alec said. "I think the discipline has made a difference in how I act at school and at home."

Connie's son, Michael, is 11 years old. He enjoys sparring because of the strategy involved. "I was excited to finally get my black belt so I could tell my



friends, and I was happy because I could defend myself," he said. "It does make a difference because even though some kids may say they have a black belt, if you really do it means a lot, because it means you're worth something. It takes a lot of time and a lot of concentration. It's amazing for me."

Greg and Debbie's son, Zachary, is also 11 years old. He likes to learn all kinds of fighting moves and said having

his black belt makes him feel safer because if someone grabs him, he knows what to do. "I was excited to earn my black belt because a lot of people don't stay with tae kwon do (or any martial art) long enough to get a black belt. It was a big thing for me to accomplish," he said.

After the boys earned their black belts, they continued taking classes as their parents advanced closer to their goal. When it came time for the adults to take the test, Master Yang had a surprise in store. Most times, he is the sole judge of whether or not

a person has earned a belt, but in this case, he brought chairs for the boys and made them sit with him and critique their parents. It was a sign of respect and a big moment for parents and children alike.

"I thought it was a really neat thing to have Zach critiquing us at first, but then I

remembered that he was pretty tough on us when he was tutoring us, so he might be a tough judge," Debbie laughed. She had no reason to worry.

"We practiced every night before the test. At the beginning I knew they'd do very well, but there were a couple parts where I was a little nervous. They did very well," Zachary said.

The black belt test is cumulative and ensures that students remember everything from the white belt (the starting point) on. "You have to know everything. Master Yang put us through





more rigorous calisthenics that night. We had to do something like 70 sit ups and 50 push-ups at the end after completing all the tae kwon do forms. I was thoroughly exhausted," Michael Morton said. "I remember looking at the kids during the test and they were really into it. They took their responsibility seriously."

For Alec, the experience gave him insight into his parents' lives. "It was really weird watching my dad test, because in every other way parents watch over their children, but this time it was us looking at our parents," he explained.

Michael Rabel also found out what it is like to be an adult while watching his mother test. He learned the pride of seeing someone you care about do their best. "When Mom got her black belt it



All of the friends, young and old, will continue their studies for the foreseeable future, not just for the experience, but also because of the friendships formed.

The three-bedroom, traditional home with its three-car garage sits on a narrow and deep 2.5-acre lot. The exterior is finished in a beautifully variegated orange/rose brick, and the interior is detailed in fine oak cabinetry, exquisitely carved moldings and stunning leaded glass.

Two days later, the house was theirs. "We still had two houses to sell,"




she added. "Between August 5 and September 21 — 9/11 happened yet amazingly, both of our houses sold."




The Banks are active with a passion for motorcycles, cars and sailboats. "We also enjoy traveling," Teresa said. "John and I go to the Caribbean every year."

















the ones who give back and make a difference in other people's lives." With this philosophy, Mike sent his students off on a mission of community service.

Mike himself has learned about making an impact. As an economics professor with Tarrant County College (TCC), he never thought he would enjoy teaching until he started teaching a few classes. His adventure began in 1997 while he worked his day job with Equipment Technologies, a company he had helped start. He began teaching as an adjunct instructor at TCC (called Tarrant County Junior College at the time).

The experience for him has been life-changing. "I've done a lot of things in my life, had a lot of different opportunities to earn income," Mike described. "But, I've never had a job as rewarding and as fulfilling as what I do now. I finally figured out that helping out other people is a whole lot more important than maxing out your income."

Before becoming a teacher, Mike had owned and operated three companies. Those opportunities give him real-life experiences to teach in the classroom. He is also a history buff and likes to pull in history lessons to teach economics. "I love history, and I lecture on the Lewis and Clark Expedition," Mike explained. "I bring in a lot of history of economics into the classroom because it's part of our heritage."

Mike believes it is important to also teach students about surviving financially after college. "There are three things that I say: 'If you get nothing else out of the



course, remember this: there is no free lunch out there. There is no such thing as zero-percent financing. And thirdly, beware of businesses offering anything free," he remarked. "In other words, I encourage them not to be naïve."

With the dual credit program, Mike is employed by TCC, but has classrooms at both Mansfield High School and Legacy High School in order to teach the dual credit classes. His relationship with the schools isn't new. He was also on the Mansfield school board from 1989 to 1995 and encouraged the development of



the dual credit program. "I'm proud to say as a board member I helped to get the program started," Mike said.

With the program, students can complete 24 hours of college credit from TCC during their junior and senior years, then move over to TCC after graduation to complete their associate degree. Students only need to earn 16 more hours of class credit to get their associate degree. Afterwards, students can progress to The University of Texas at Arlington











to earn their bachelor's degree for less than \$10,000.

"It's an extraordinary program for students, many of whom had never dreamed of going to college had it not been for this program," Mike said. He would even put himself in that category, as he was the first in his family to go to college. "I went to the Navy and to Vietnam and made up my mind that if I survived it, I would go to college," he explained. "And I did survive. I went to college on a GI bill. I can relate to what these kids are going through. I can reach them."

Many of his students are feeling the impact of their extra-credit community service projects. "These kids just make you proud. They're exceptional kids," Mike said, smiling.

One of these students is Blair Levesque, who participated in the Susan G. Komen 3-Day, which is a three-day, 60-mile event to raise awareness and funds for breast cancer cure. She participated in honor of her mother. "My mother is a breast cancer survivor after having a lumpectomy in 2010," Blair explained. "It occurred to me for a split second that I might have to live without her."

Fortunately, Blair's mom survived, but it inspired Blair to still help to raise \$2,400 to help find a cure. "Cancer is a horrible illness, and no one on the earth deserves to lose someone because of it," Blair shared. "I am hoping one day













there will be a cure, so there are no more painful losses. Everyone deserves a lifetime."

Calum Rodriguez is another of those students. For his Eagle Scout project, he built three benches in front of his church. "I built the benches where I did because after Mass gets out, people don't have a place to gather and socialize. So, with the benches and the shade of some trees outside of our church, people can now talk in comfort," Calum explained.

Mike also described how a whole varsity baseball team got involved. "One boy on the varsity team got his entire team to go out for a whole weekend to work with special education children. They taught them the fundamentals of baseball," he said.

Kate Koch, a senior at Legacy, also took the extra-credit challenge seriously and started to volunteer her time with the special education program at her school. One boy in the program with whom she worked, Ben Hart, has become one of her closest friends. "Ben doesn't judge, he doesn't gossip, and he is never mean, which makes him an amazing best friend," she explained. She has also learned some meaningful lessons from him. "Ben made me realize that you literally choose if you want to be happy or not."

When talking about his students, Mike can't help but gush. "It's heartwarming. I still get goose bumps talking about it," Mike smiled. "These kids have made me so proud. They have gone out and done great things." NOW






marbled floor. His passion for history is evident, ensconced in the cases and frames comprising the "Quanah Parker" exhibit. A majority of the artifacts were lent from his personal collection: war chief headdresses, peace pipes, spears and tomahawks, drums, ceremonial gowns, jewels and feathers. Doug spent his life collecting tangible pieces of the past, the Quanah Parker story being one of many interests among his collection.















So, why have all this cool stuff if no one can see it? That question motivated Doug to take a leadership role in the Texas Lakes Trail, an organization that has given him and countless others among the nonprofit's membership the chance to bring history alive for others in fun and memorable ways.

The Texas Lakes Trail is one of the 10 Heritage Trails established by the Texas Department of Transportation in the 1960s. The Texas Heritage Trails Program divides Texas' 254 counties into 10 regions that collectively showcase "real



places telling real stories" to millions of heritage, cultural and recreational travelers visiting Texas. Visitors step into landscapes unchanged by the march of time, stand in century-old, majestic county courthouses and stroll around




vibrant town squares and early-era residential districts. For example, 86 Main Street communities in Texas have preserved their original architecture and restored their downtowns to pulsing city centers once again. Within the trail regions are 700 historical museums, more than 15,000 historical markers, monuments and cemeteries, plus hundreds of designated historic landmarks. Each one tells part of the grand Texas story people are hungry to experience, whether they travel from across the sea or right next door.




The 31 counties within its regional borders realized long ago the name, Lakes Trail, is a bit misleading, because lakes are only a small part of the North Texas story. But this makes the Lake Trails unique among the Heritage Trails. Doug Harman pioneered the concept of themes, like the "Quanah and Cynthia Ann Parker" exhibit. Others have since followed, the region

now offering historical and cultural experiences tailored to specific interests.


The Horse Country Tours theme evolved from the wealth of worldrenowned horseflesh, equine trainers and breeders who settled on the northern and















western areas of the Lakes Trail region's sandy loam soil foundation. Thousands of lush, sprawling acres and billion-dollar empires gave this pocket of Texas the name Horse Country USA, and people from all over the world have visited to



saddle up, see a horse or meet a real-deal cowboy. Others come to shop, hoping to take a prize stallion or mare back to their own ranch. Horse Country is unlike any other equine concentration in America, and it always amazes.

The Butterfield Overland Trail was the first intercontinental mail route in America, a stagecoach service that traversed the country from St. Louis, Missouri, or Memphis, Tennessee, to San Francisco, California, in a swift 21 days — an astounding speed for 1857. Crossing Texas from Sherman to El Paso, this trail brings the romance of stagecoach travel into stark reality, trekking the unforgiving geography between water stops and Cavalry forts for safety and survival in one of the



last wild frontiers. Battlegrounds, forts, stagecoaches, cemeteries and museums narrate this awesome road trip, the 1850s version of historic Route 66. Many

















people explore it in segments though, especially when time is a constraint.


The Chisholm, Shawnee, Great Western and Goodnight Loving Trails have fans of the Old West following these famous routes over which cowboys and vaqueros drove millions of cattle across Texas to points north before the railroad's debut. Rodeos, re-enactments, stockyards, famous Texas ranches,



museums and landmarks keep the historic trails alive across unspoiled rural Texas and through the heart of what are modern metropolises today. With their imaginations ignited, cultural adventurers can "see" how the cowboys' and cattle trails' stories unfolded and, in the process, find surprising places and faces in the mix.

"The Texas Lakes Trail is the sum of all these other trails," Doug said. "Architecture, festivals, music, food, art, dinosaurs, gardens and courthouses — these are the themes we turn into experiential trails are as infinitely varied as Texans and the people who visit us here."

Taco Seasoning

- 2 Tbsp. chili powder
- 1 Tbsp. garlic powder
- 1 Tbsp. onion powder
- 1 rounded Tbsp. ground cumin
- 1 Tbsp. oregano
- 1/2 Tbsp. salt
- 1. Mix all ingredients together. Store in an airtight glass container.

Chewy Mocha Macadamia Nut Cookies

I cup blanched Honeyville almond flour 1/2 cup unsweetened Dutch process cocoa powder 1 tsp. baking powder

1/2 tsp. salt

2 Tbsp. coconut flour

1 Sweet Riot Organic 85-percent dark chocolate bar, chopped

1 individual-size pkg. Starbucks Via coffee

- 1 stick Kerrygold grass-fed unsalted
- I cup local raw/unfiltered honey (North **Dallas Honey Company)**
- 2 large pasture-raised eggs, room temperature
- I tsp. gluten-free vanilla extract
- I cup Mauna Loa macadamia nuts, chopped
- **1.** Preheat oven to 350 F with top rack in middle of the oven. In a medium bowl, mix almond flour, cocoa, baking powder, salt and coconut flour; set aside.
- 2. In a double boiler melt chocolate bar: add coffee. Mix well.
- **3.** In a stand mixer, beat butter and honey until very creamy. Add eggs one at a time, until well incorporated; mix in vanilla. Slowly add chocolate/coffee mixture on low speed until well combined.
- **4.** Add flour mixture to wet ingredients a small amount at a time until well incorporated; fold in nuts.
- 5. Drop dough by teaspoonful onto parchment-lined cookie sheet. Bake for 15 minutes. Remove, let cool on cookie sheet for 5 minutes; move to cooling rack until completely cooled.

Tex-Mex Avocado Eggs

I whole ripe avocado 2 eggs, pasture-raised Taco seasoning (recipe at left) Cheddar cheese

- **I.** Preheat oven to 350 F. Halve avocado: remove the pit. Scoop out some of the meat so the egg will fit. Put avocado into oven safe dish, make sure it's stable and doesn't fall over (ramekins work nicely).
- 2. Crack egg into each halved avocado; sprinkle each egg with taco seasoning. Bake
- 3. Top the eggs with cheese; bake another 10 minutes.
- 4. Broil 2 minutes.
