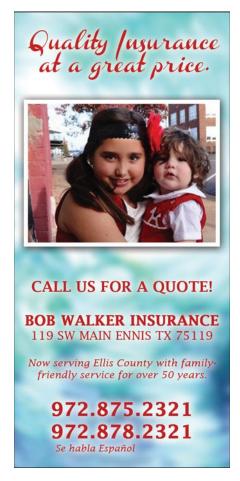

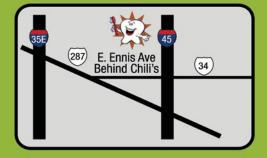

Some people just look like football players. We've all seen them. They're hard to miss. These giants of the gridiron are blessed with a dominance that's both physical and mental. Coach Kerry Jenkins is one of these gentle giants. Towering above his peers, it doesn't take much to imagine him on a football field wreaking havoc on the opposition.

Fellow coach Dondre Johnson shares Kerry's attributes and history. Like Kerry, Dondre's unique brand of confidence was born on the football field at a young age. His strength and abilities were later honed to a fine edge by four years in the United States Marine Corps.

Kerry and Dondre are joined by a common purpose — one even bigger than the two of them put together. Their shared passion is the Ennis Heat Youth Association for which Dondre serves as president and Kerry as vice president.

Most Saturdays, Kerry and Dondre can be found running up and down the football field, but they're no longer suiting up in pads, uniform and helmet. These days, they're carrying a whistle, surrounded by athletes a fraction of their age and size, but who are their equals when it comes to heart. "It was really an easy choice to start coaching," Kerry said, explaining the motivation that brings him out for practice every day. "Dondre and I both came up under Coach Sam Harrell. Watching him give everything he had to the athletes around him was inspiring. He gave us everything he had to make us better players and better people. I always thought if I ever had the chance, I owed it to him to give back at least a small portion of what he gave all of us."

Dondre tells much the same story. "We used to see all the little kids out at football practice," he recalled, "but we noticed that none from the neighborhood we grew up in were out there." The men weren't sure whether no one was willing to coach those kids or if they just didn't have the transportation to get there. "There was no way I was going to let them miss out on the opportunity if I could do something about it," Dondre added.

Soon Kerry and Dondre, along with fellow coaches Jack Alvarez, Jerry Mason, Everett Green and Terrance McAdams, set out on a task greater than teaching the fundamentals of a game they all love. "If a young kid comes to me and has the drive to improve, there's no way I'm going to tell him he can't just because his parents can't afford a pair of shoes or a football helmet," Kerry enthused.

As a result, fundraising became a skill Kerry and Dondre would need to acquire. Judging from the results, it's one they have now mastered. "The first thing we had to learn was the process of establishing a nonprofit organization," Dondre pointed out. "After that, the people of Ennis really took care of the rest. We have been given so much by so many. So many people gave whatever they could."

Once coaches were in place and athletes were equipped, success followed. Coaching with a "defense first" philosophy, Dondre and Kerry's teams have celebrated three Ellis County Super Bowl wins. The team trophy case also includes two USA Football state titles. The kids have had three undefeated seasons, in one of which they didn't allow a single point. "All the trophies are great, but that's not what keeps me coming out," Kerry admitted. "Sometimes I think about what these kids would be doing if they weren't out here with me and Dondre playing football. And I don't have to think long. They would probably be getting into trouble."

"Growing up, I saw too many kids get into trouble just because they didn't have anything better to do," Dondre added. "I guess our mission is to give them that 'special something' many of them are missing."

With such a lofty mission, it's no surprise Kerry and Dondre expanded beyond football. "After football season was over, we began to hang out with the kids shooting hoops," Dondre said. "But if we're going to be doing that, it only made sense to take it up a notch and give it a purpose."





With the formation of a proper team, Kerry and Dondre's protégés were competing and dominating other youth basketball teams in the area just as they had on the football field. And once again, support and help from the community came rolling in.

The work doesn't end with the school year either. As summer begins, the kids under Kerry and Dondre's athletic care are running track. "Summer is our most important time," Kerry observed. "Even good kids get into stuff when they have too much free time on their hands. We get them off the streets and run some of their energy off."











Bolstered by their success in other sports, the kids continue to succeed even as the weather gets hot. The varsity team at Ennis High School is chock full of athletes who first learned their love for the sport from Kerry and Dondre. Last season, one earned a spot on the varsity team as a freshman, easily keeping up with kids far more advanced. So far, 21 of the young people they've coached have gone on to win state titles. The coaches attribute their success to their adherence to the four D's: discipline, desire, dedication and determination.

But while their trophy collection expands, Kerry and Dondre know what really matters. "It would be easy to count up all the trophies and titles," Kerry said, "but it's what we can't count that's important. How many kids did we help keep out of jail? How many kids did we teach to respect their mothers? I may never really know, but I know we did our part and that we tried."

Winning games isn't all that motivates the two coaches. It's the simple things that keep them coming back. Neither has a child in the program they've worked so hard to develop. But as Kerry and Dondre roam the side lines, encouraging their young charges, it's evident they take as much pride in the budding athletes as they would if they were their own children. And it's a bond that's reciprocated.

"Every time I go to the grocery store," Kerry explained, "I run into one of the kids. When I see their eyes light up, and they run up to tell me about their grades or whatever, I'm reminded why Dondre and I do it, and it's all worth it." NOW

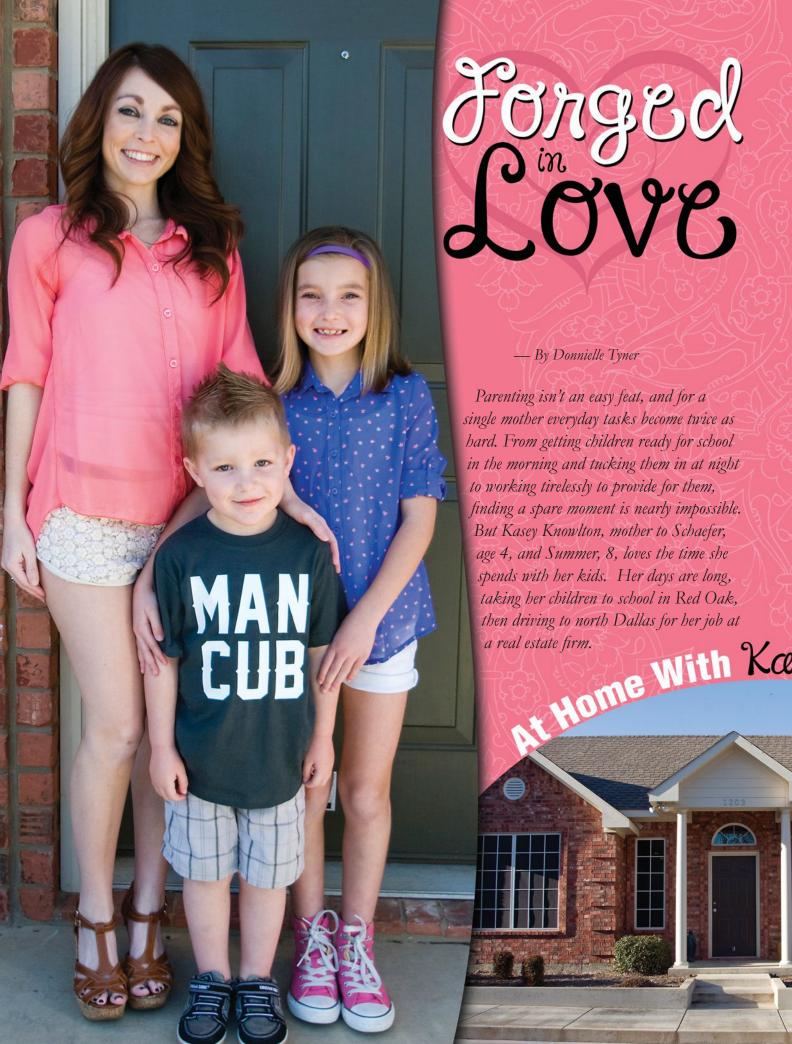

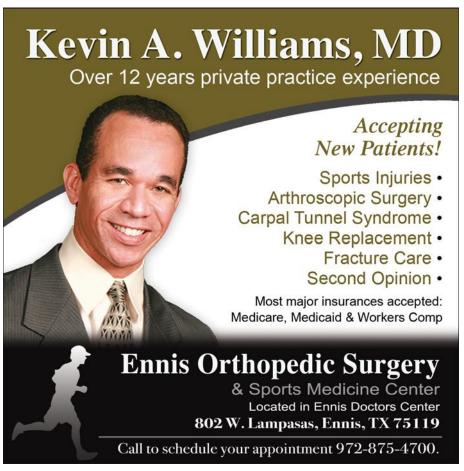

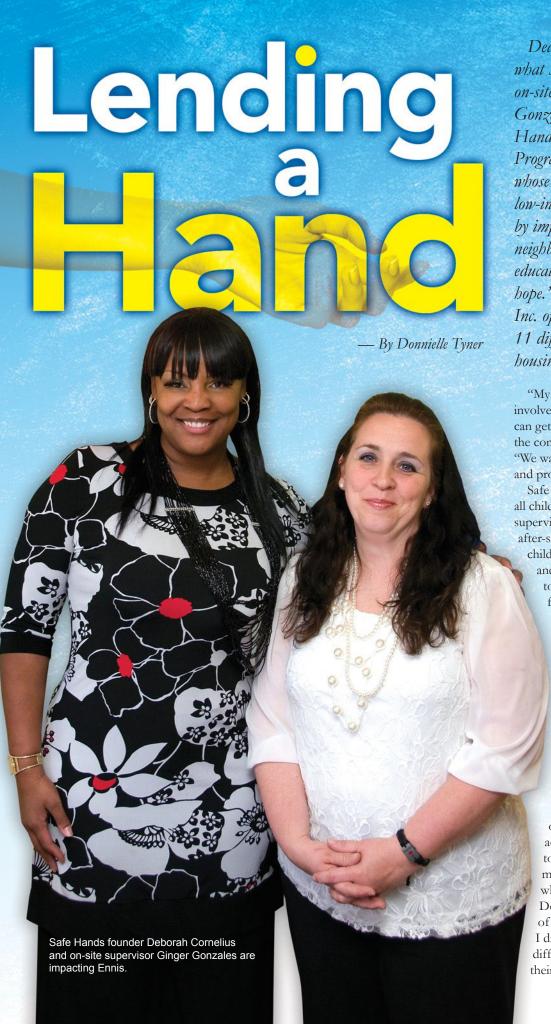

Safe Hands, Inc.'s belief is that all children should have a protected, supervised place to go during after-school hours. "We must give our children an alternative to the violence and negativity this life exposes them to," explained the organization's founder Deborah Cornelius. "It's imperative we teach our children to serve. We must encourage our children to not only follow their dreams, but to pursue them. We must give them the tools and guidance they need to become productive members of society."

Deborah saw a need for after-school kids' programs but understood how costly child care can be for parents. Safe Hands, Inc. was formed with this need in mind. The group not only provides safe after-school activities, but extends its outreach to parents, particularly single mothers on budgets. "I feel good when I can help those in need," Deborah said. "It gives me a sense of peace and contentment knowing I did my part and somehow made a difference assisting others to improve their own lives."

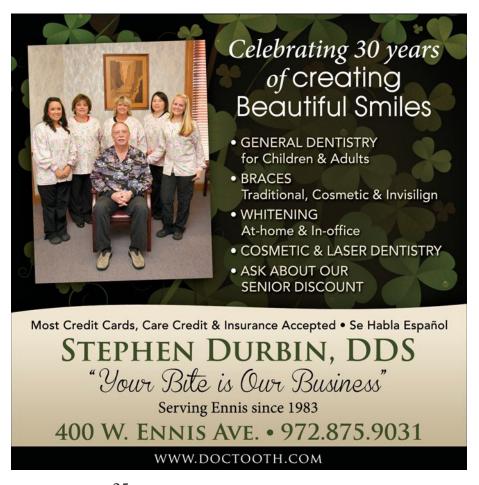

Safe Hands, Inc. is a Dallas-based nonprofit association founded in 2001. The agency provides a variety of programs and services including GED/ESL classes, job search assistance, health screenings, financial planning, computer literacy, mentoring and help with homework. Safe Hands, Inc.'s Ennis campaign is a new addition to the community, beginning its integral work at Grace Townhomes. Ginger is currently leading the after-school program at that apartment complex. Moving with her family to Ennis six years ago, she worked in various administrative positions while homeschooling her son. "Homeschooling wasn't taking as much time as I thought, so I sought out a job that would work with our school schedule," she expounded.

Despite Ginger's business qualifications, it was her history of volunteering that caught the eye of Safe Hands, Inc. "They hired me because of my ministry work at Refiner's Fire," she explained. "Everything they needed me to do, I was already doing through my current ministry work." Over the years, Ginger has served children's church programs, from a clown ministry to helping a praise and worship team teach Bible studies at the Texas Youth Detention Center.

Currently, Safe Hands' after-school program, available to children four days a week for three hours a day, is the most popular of the services the group provides. In addition to this outreach, Safe Hands offers a 30-minute workout session, an ESL class and a course teaching healthy cooking on a budget. The food for the cooking classes is donated by local businesses, and families can take leftover ingredients home to practice making dishes taught in class. In the future, Ginger is planning to add a Bible study, a money-management class and a how-to on home health care.

Safe Hands also helps residents obtain financial assistance through other programs and supplies groceries when the need arises. Residents looking for a job can contact Ginger who will help them make contact with potential employers. Eventually, she hopes to oversee classes to instruct residents of Grace Townhomes in writing résumés, dressing for success and how best to present themselves via mock interviews.





"We're trying to have something for every demographic, but overall it's all about building a community," Ginger pointed out.

As Ginger takes charge of classes and programs, making sure all are up and running, the children have captured her heart. "I've always had a love for children," she confessed. "My honest opinion is if you can make a child believe they have value and that you care about them, you can really change the world. If you are proactive when kids are young, then you can help unlock their untapped potential."

In sync with Ginger's own philosophy, Safe Hands, Inc.'s after-school program is designed to aid the children who attend in every way that matters. Children can learn valuable life lessons through the curriculum Ginger implements. Most recently, she hosted a sewing class, teaching kids how to repair clothing. Arts and music are also taught through outside volunteers and donations of tickets to concerts. In the summer,

Unlike contrary Mary of the classic nursery rhyme, you probably don't have silver bells or cockleshells in your garden. But as spring escapes winter's gloom, you're no doubt as ready as she for the bounty the season brings to your little patch of Mother Earth.

Robin Smith, an Ellis County Master Gardener, is poised to start her routine fired with the enthusiasm brought on by warm, blue skies and green leaves sprouting. "At this time of year, I find it hard to contain my excitement," Robin admitted, "and I tend to get ahead of myself a bit. If you're like me, a bit of restraint is in order."

Robin insists a checklist is a good method for prioritizing time and effort in the garden, even for experts. "It will allow you to have fun but still get great results," she explained. Items on Robin's list include pruning evergreens, summer flowering trees and shrubs early in March. "For trees and shrubs that bloom

in the spring," she cautioned, "wait until they have finished blooming, and prune fruit trees before bud break." She also advocates cutting back all groundcover early in the month, so it "looks nice and tidy when it sends out new shoots later."

Raising vegetables in small city gardens is increasingly common, and Robin has useful tips for those just starting out. "Don't be in a hurry to put out young pepper or tomato plants," she cautioned. "Wait until close to the end of the month to be sure all chance of frost is gone. And be prepared to cover them if temperatures dip low one night."





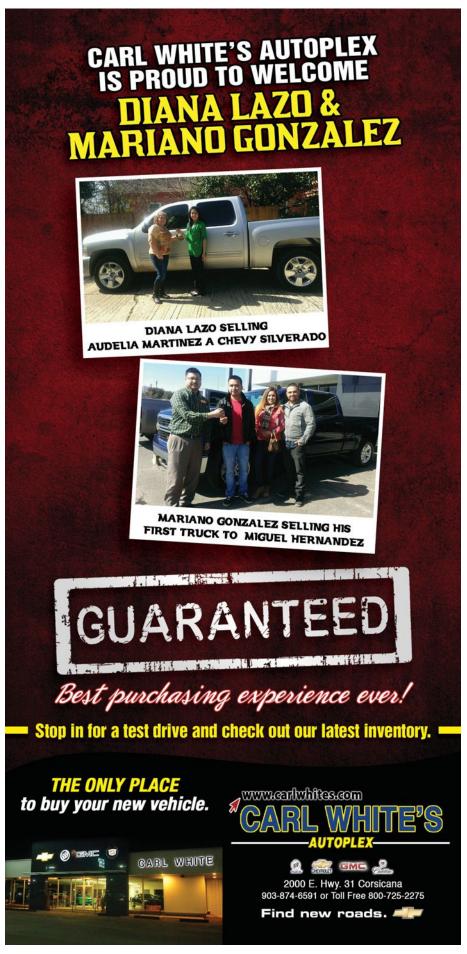
Joseph Masabni, assistant professor and extension horticulturist for the Texas A&M University System, also has words of advice for new urban gardeners. "Home gardening continues to grow in popularity," he wrote in the Texas Home Vegetable Gardening Guide. "One of every three families does some type of home

gardening." He ensures great results for vegetable and herb gardeners who observe basic, practical considerations. Joseph believes the following rules can make all the difference between a merely functioning veggie patch and one producing high-quality, delicious specimens year-round:

## Choosing a Garden Site

The city offers limited space for growing herbs and vegetables, but a well-placed and tended garden can be a productive one. "The ideal garden area gets full or nearly full sunlight," Joseph specified, "and has deep, well-drained, fertile soil. The garden should be near a water outlet but not close to competing shrubs or trees."

## Selecting Crops

Choosing vegetables suited to the size of the garden space is an important consideration. Vine crops like watermelon or squash require more room unless situated near a fence or trellis. For the small garden, beets, broccoli, onions, spinach, carrots and eggplant are ideal. For larger spaces, cantaloupe, cauliflower, pumpkin, okra and cucumber work well.

## Garden Planning

The placement of long-term crops like Brussels sprouts or sweet potatoes, which mature in 80 days or more, shouldn't interfere with caring for and harvesting short-termers like leaf lettuce or turnips. "When you plant a new crop, it should be totally unrelated to the crop

it is replacing," Joseph cautioned. "This is called crop rotation. Crop rotation helps prevent the buildup of diseases and insects. For example, follow early beans with beets, squash or bell peppers."

## Preparing the Soil

For top production, make sure the garden soil is aerated and drains well. Adding organic matter can improve soil that has a heavy clay or sand component. "Never work wet garden soil," Joseph advised. "And seeds germinate better in well-prepared soil than in coarse, lumpy soil."

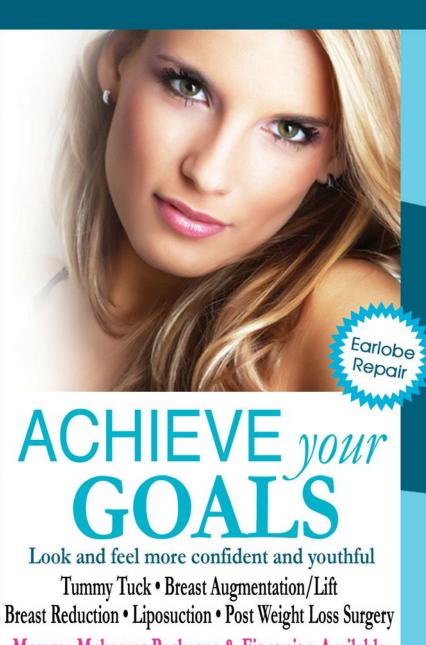


## **Fertilizing**

"Heavy clay soils can be fertilized much more heavily at planting than can sandy soils," Joseph pointed out. "Heavy clay soils and those with lots of organic matter can safely absorb and store fertilizer at three to four times the rate of sandy soils. For most soils, two to three pounds of 21-0-0 (ammonium sulfate) per 100 linear feet of row, applied in the furrow and watered in, is adequate."

### **Planting**

For successful production, plant vegetables in early spring or early fall.

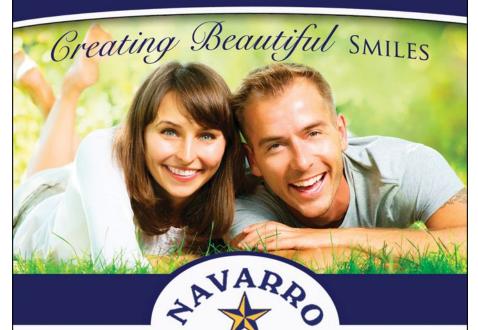

"Using transplants rather than seeds, when possible, allows crops to mature earlier and extends the productive period of many vegetable crops," Joseph shared. Beets, lettuce and cabbage are among easily transplanted crops. Carrots and pepper plants require more care while sweet corn and peas are hard to transplant without the use of containers.

### Watering and Mulching

"Apply enough water to wet the soil to a depth of at least 6 inches," Joseph recommended. "For best production, most gardens require about 1 inch of rain or irrigation per week during the growing season." Organic mulches like straw, leaves, peat moss or compost, applied to a depth of 1 to 2 inches, are commonly used.

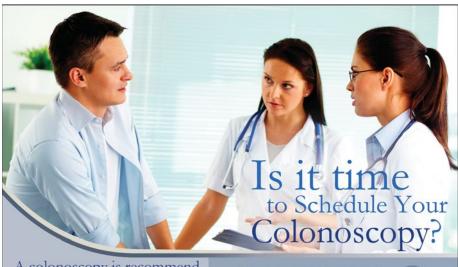
## Weed and Pest Control

A long-handled hoe is the tool of choice for removing unwanted growth in a vegetable patch. To eradicate pests, use only approved chemicals.

### **Harvesting**

"A vegetable's full flavor develops only at peak maturity," Joseph pointed out, "resulting in the excellent taste of vineripened tomatoes, tender green beans and crisp, flavorful lettuce. For maximum flavor and nutritional content, harvest the crop the day it is to be canned, frozen or eaten."

As home vegetable gardens continue to multiply, the influence of organic gardening methods has spread as well. That's a good thing, according to Robin. "The awareness of the environment," she concluded, "has opened up this earthfriendly approach, and it's another great way to enjoy gardening."

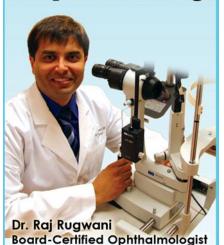

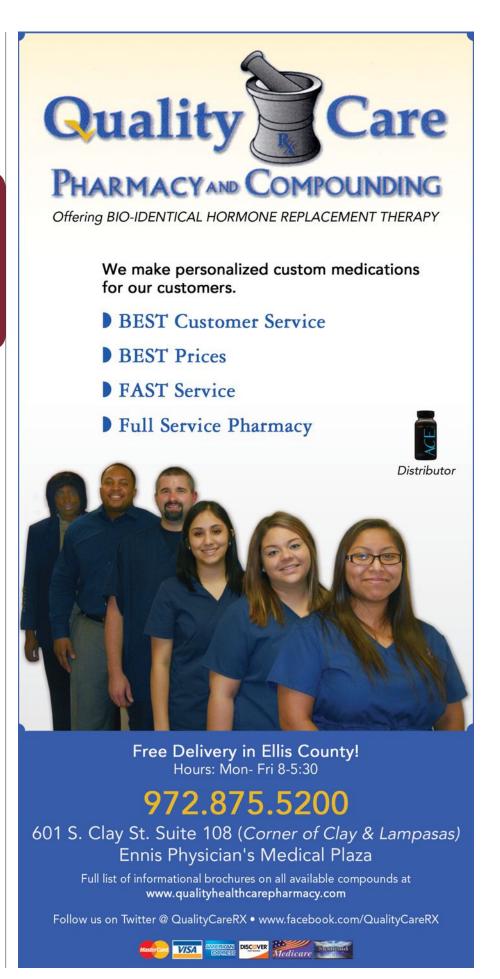

## Alphabet Soup and Other Designations

Nurse practitioners, clinical nurse specialists, certified nurse midwives and certified registered nurse anesthetists are a few of the health care providers who have evolved to serve in our community over the past 20 years. They work in roles that in the past were only held by physicians. They care for primary health care needs and perform wellness exams, order screening procedures, such as mammograms and colonoscopies and provide treatment for illnesses like the flu and pneumonia. They also provide care for people experiencing chronic illnesses, such as diabetes or heart disease. Nurse practitioners are specialized in family practice, pediatrics, women's health and gerontology. Some nurse practitioners provide acute care and work in hospitals and emergency rooms.

If their titles include the word "nurse," they are nurses. Nurse practitioners do not need physician permission to perform the care they provide, because they are independently licensed by the state of Texas as nurse practitioners. Nurse practitioners must have the designation of RN, as they must be registered nurses in order to be licensed as nurse practitioners. The other initials at the end of their names sometimes look like alphabet soup but are significant for their level of education. Nurse practitioners are trained health care providers who are capable of taking care of your health care needs.

Nurse practitioners have a collaborative relationship with their physician counterparts, but this is not a supervisory relationship for most of their

practices. They do and should have access to a physician who can assist them with more complicated patients, such as those requiring hospitalization, those requiring home health services or invasive surgical procedures. The nurse practitioner license is independent of the physician, and therefore, they can operate their own private practice within this collaborative relationship.

People frequently ask, "What exactly can nurse practitioners do that a doctor cannot do?" The answer is nurse practitioners do many of the same procedures and tests, but their abilities are dependent on their education and experience. For example, some nurse practitioners perform minor surgical procedures such as suturing or mole and cyst removal.

Another frequently asked question is, "When are you going to medical school and finish?" Some clinicians also have their Doctorate of Nursing Practice, which means they are not a physician but have the ultimate degree granted in nursing as a practicing nurse practitioner. Those with a Doctorate of Nursing Practice have completed their formal education and usually continue to review current research. They digest and synthesize the information for application to patients for their well-being and education. The goal is to keep patients well and happy, with hope for the future within the framework of advanced nursing practice. **NOW**

## In The Kitchen With Donnielle Tyner

Reared in Rice, a country stone's throw from the Bluebonnet City where she lives and writes for EnnisNOW, Donnielle Tyner has turned cooking into an experience in healthy eating. Schooled in the tradition of Southern comfort food by her grandmother, Donnielle has transformed the rich dishes of her youth into lighter fare for her husband, son and daughter.

Donnielle's inspiration in the kitchen comes from the ingredients themselves. "I always try to cook in season," she explained, "because the ingredients are fresh, and you're more likely to encounter a better quality of organic food." Fruit and vegetables bought locally are another key to her prowess in the kitchen where cooking is never just about the food. "It's evolved into a way to show love," Donnielle said.

### Fresh Strawberry Yogurt Cake

2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour (divided use)

1/2 tsp. baking soda

1/2 tsp. salt

Zest of 1 lemon

I cup pasture butter, room temperature

2 cups raw sugar

3 eggs

3 Tbsp. lemon juice, (divided use)

8 oz. raw or Greek yogurt

12 oz. fresh organic strawberries, diced I cup powdered sugar

- 1. Preheat oven to 325 F. Grease 10-inch Bundt pan. Sift together 2 1/4 cups flour, baking soda and salt. Mix in lemon zest; set aside.
- 2. With electric mixer, cream together butter and sugar until texture is light and fluffy. Beat in eggs, one at a time; add 1 Tbsp. lemon

juice. Alternate blending in flour mixture and yogurt until fully incorporated.

- **3.** Toss strawberries with remaining flour. Gently mix them into batter. Pour batter into Bundt pan. Bake 60 minutes, or until toothpick comes out clean.
- **4.** Allow to cool at least 20 minutes in pan. Turn out on a wire rack to cool completely. Once cooled, whisk remaining 2 Tbsp. lemon juice with powdered sugar and drizzle over top of cake.

### Carrots Vichy

Serves 4.

1 lb. organic carrots Filtered water 4 Tbsp. pasture butter 2 Tbsp. raw honey Sea salt, to taste

1. Peel carrots and slice into rounds; cover

with filtered water and bring to a boil. 2. Add butter and honey, boil uncovered until liquid is reduced to almost nothing and carrots are well coated. Season to taste.

### **Crunchy Peanut Butter Cups**

Makes 8.

1/4 cup pasture butter

3/4 cup organic peanut butter

1/4 cup raw sugar

1 cup semisweet carob (or chocolate) chips

1/4 cup raw milk Sea salt, to taste

- **I.** Line a muffin tin with papers.
- 2. In a microwave-safe bowl, melt butter and peanut butter together for 45 seconds. Stir until smooth. Add sugar and mix to combine. Distribute the mixture evenly among the muffin cups.
- 3. Refrigerate for 15 minutes to set the peanut butter layer.
- **4.** After peanut butter is chilled, combine chocolate and milk in a microwave-safe bowl; heat in 30 second intervals until chocolate is melted and smooth.
- **5.** Distribute evenly over each peanut butter layer. Sprinkle with sea salt and chill for about 30 minutes, or until firm. Store uncovered in the fridge.

#### **Homemade Gummy** Fruit Snacks

I cup organic mixed berries

1/4 cup filtered water

1/2 cup organic, unsweetened applesauce

2 1/2 tsp. of gelatin

1/2 cup fruit juice of choice

- 1. In a medium saucepan over medium heat, combine berries and water. Bring to a boil and cook until berries are soft, approximately 5 minutes.
- 2. Transfer to a blender or use an immersion blender to puree until smooth.
- **3.** Return to pot. Add applesauce and resume boiling. Remove from heat and set
- **4.** In a large bowl, sprinkle gelatin over fruit juice and let stand one minute. Add hot fruit mixture; stir until gelatin completely dissolves, 3-5 minutes.
- **5.** Pour into an 8x8-inch glass or ceramic baking dish. Refrigerate until firm, about 3 hours. Cut into blocks or shapes.

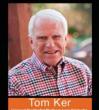

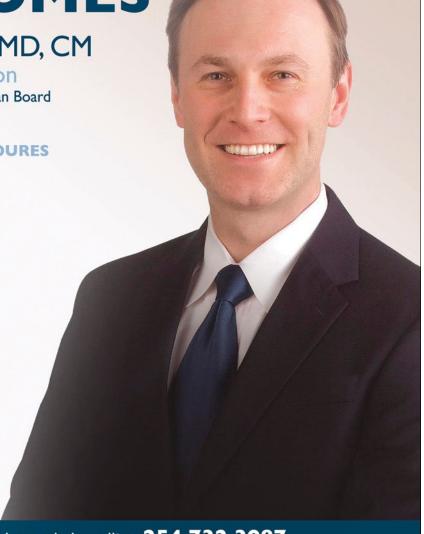
