


# **EDITOR'S NOTE**






For Phelp Benjamin and Mike Langford, youth sports offer an arena to teach children how to be successful on and off the field. 'Learning the correct way to play football is important, but so is learning how to be a person of good character," Mike said.

"Being involved in youth sports gives students something to work toward," Phelp added. Phelp serves as president of the Tomahawks Youth Sports Organization, which operates under the Waxahachie Youth Athletic Association. Mike serves as vice president.

"We started Tomahawks two years ago with a mission to offer the youth of Waxahachie a safe place to learn and grow as athletes," Mike explained. Currently, the organization offers opportunities for football and cheer.









"The first year of football," Phelp said, "we had around 34 athletes, and this year we had over 80. As for cheerleading, we only had six girls the first year, and we had over 20 this past year." Apparently, the Tomahawks resonate with the community, and the two men expect to see participation numbers grow exponentially over the next few years.

When it comes to football, Phelp and Mike have a straightforward and simple approach. "First, we focus on the fundamentals of the game," Mike said. "Every kid should know the rules of the game and how the game is structured." Their coaching strategy does not stop, however, with just knowledge. Mike explained, "I think one of the things that has contributed to the athletes' excitement to play in this league is we believe every player should get quality playing time. How is a child supposed to get better at the sport unless he is actually able to participle in game situations?"

"We strive to make cheer and football a positive experience," Phelp added, "and that is why the kids are excited to participate."



Sports is about community for the Tomahawks, where kids from kindergarten through sixth grade gather to pursue their passion. "All of our practices take place on the same field, so you have the older kids working with the younger ones, stretching together and offering advice and help," Mike noted. This is different from many other sport organizations where coaches have their practices scheduled at different times and in different locations all over the city.

"It's cool to see home games where the older kids cheer for the younger ones, because they know them by name from practicing together," Mike stated. "There is such a strong community bond when kids workout together, and that is what we want to foster in the organization."

Ultimately, Phelp and Mike hope to see kids progress through their youth and leave with a passion to pursue cheer and football at the junior high and high school levels. "Playing in school is why we focus on fundamentals, such as blocking and tackling," Mike explained. "We want









the kids to learn to do it right, so they can develop a proper appreciation for the game."

"We want to develop these kids so they can contribute in the classroom, on the field and in life," Phelp added.

The list of people who have contributed to the success of the organization over the last two years is long. "We operate under a board of directors who are committed to the vision of a quality athletics program, and they are dedicated to carrying out that vision," Mike said.

"We have some of the most dedicated and hardworking coaches, and since we are a nonprofit organization, they don't get paid," Phelp said. "They do it for the love of the kids and the game."

Both Phelp and Mike acknowledge that developing these athletes so they may one day contribute to the success of the Waxahachie Indians is part of their game plan. "I can't tell you how much we appreciate Waxahachie ISD," Mike said.

Phelp offered some clarification. "They understand what we are trying to do in preparing a future generation of players and have been fully supportive of our program."

The last two years have been a huge success, and Phelp, Mike and the board of directors show no signs of slowing down. According to Phelp, "We currently offer programs for cheer and football, but in the spring of 2018, we are going to add a track program, and we hope to add a volleyball program in 2019."

"The kids and the parents are always so down when the season ends, because they have so much fun," Phelp said, "so, hopefully, expanding our programs over the next few years will guarantee kids have opportunities throughout the year."

As for the desire to create and grow a quality athletic program like the Tomahawks, they both agree it started at home. "We have kids of our own and simply wanted to create a program we would both want them to participate in," Mike said.

The two men believe a positive relationship between the coaches and community is key. "Our coaches have worked hard to gain the parents' trust and build relationships with the community," Phelp said.








The oversized island is the focal point of the kitchen with lighted cabinets and counter space galore. The sunflower arrangement on the dining table invites guests to stay awhile and enjoy the beautiful view from the floor-to-ceiling windows.

These empty nesters turned a blank slate into the home of their dreams — a home they can be proud of. Building their new home to include Marilyn turned out to be exactly the right thing to do. In fact, Daryl and Jill wouldn't change a thing. **NOW**

# The Lunch Bunch

There are kind souls all around us who volunteer to deliver hot meals to homebound people with Meals on Wheels of Johnson & Ellis Counties. "In 2017, we had 600 volunteers who served over 225,000 meals to almost 1,300 people," said Lisa Deese, community development coordinator for MOWJEC.

They, in fact, deliver more than a meal. "We've been involved with Meals on Wheels of Johnson & Ellis Counties since 2003. It is so rewarding to be able to visit with so many sweet people. Providing a hot meal is important, but it's the personal interaction that really means the most. Sometimes, we're the only people they'll see each day, so it's nice to be able to give a hug and put a smile on their faces," said Brian and Kim Holley of Ennis.

Nearly 80 percent of the individuals served by MOWJEC last year were senior citizens, and all were homebound for a short or long period of time. By providing meals and other support services, people can remain in their homes, saving

thousands of dollars in nursing home or hospital expenses. "MOWJEC can serve one individual a year of meals for roughly the same cost as a one-day stay in the hospital or a 10day stay in a nursing home," Lisa explained.

There are more than 80 routes where volunteer drivers deliver each weekday, serving 15 Ellis County and 12 Johnson County communities, including Lillian. All of this can be a challenge, but it is one that Lisa has taken on happily for nearly 10 years. "I love seniors and love to serve! I know there is a need in our community, and I have the privilege of sharing that need in all of our communities throughout Johnson and Ellis counties," she said.

One of the beautiful things about this organization is that people of all ages come together to serve. Some mommy/ toddler groups deliver, as do working adults and healthy, mobile seniors. Several organizations also volunteer, such as universities, car dealerships and athletics groups. "Being part of Meals on Wheels has been a blessing to me and my team. Each one of us who delivers views it as a privilege to serve," said Steve Stafford, general manager of North Texas Jellystone Park.

Community leaders join this lunch bunch, too, from time to

time. Every year during the month of March, Meals on Wheels carries out a campaign called March for Meals. "This is our month-long celebration where we raise funds and awareness. We have businesses, churches and individuals who sponsor meals in their community or county," Lisa said.

One week during this month, called Community Champions Week, draws elected officials from both counties and local celebrities to help. "Dale Hansen joined us last year in Waxahachie!" Lisa said enthusiastically.

Delivering meals is not the only way folks can get involved with this endeavor. Many school-aged children contribute by making placemats or cards. Others donate holiday gifts or their time to wrap them. Recipients' faces light up with joy when they see that others have taken time to remember them. It's beautiful.

Many of those served by MOWJEC have pets that act as their steady companions. Through the AniMeals program, deliveries are made once a month, providing precious food for these furry friends, as well. "We have some middle and high school student groups that help to deliver these on a special Saturday route. It's a great way for them to earn their community service hours," Lisa added.

All of the services that MOWJEC provides are covered through donations and government funds. "Last year, 50 percent of our revenue came from local support. We are extremely blessed to serve in very supportive communities," Lisa said. A major fundraiser for the organization is the annual golf benefit held each September. People play individually or in teams, having fun while they support this vital pillar in our community.

Because the aging population continues to grow at a rapid pace, more volunteers and donations will be needed to keep the individuals MOWIEC serves in their home sweet homes. **NOW**





when I was doing personal study in the Book of Exodus and began to ponder what the Egyptians might have experienced during the plagues, so a first-person story emerged from that," Connilyn explained.

When Chad was transferred to Seattle, Washington, and Connilyn was "stuck in the house with Seattle's rain," she started to "plug away" on a book manuscript. The first book in her series, *Out of Egypt*, was born. "I had started writing 'by the seat of my pants," she recalled. "I read library books on writing and researched on the Internet and just started doing it."

After a move back to Texas, she posted on Facebook about her manuscript. "A friend asked to read it and thought it was worthy. I didn't know about literary agents or getting published, but I submitted my manuscript to contests. That first book, Counted with the Stars, won the My Book Therapy Frazier Contest and was a semifinalist in an American Christian Fiction Writers contest. She met with agents after the award presentation and signed with The Steve Laube Agency, which led to her books being published by Bethany House Publishers. "When I got that call from my agent, my life changed," Connilyn said. Her writing was a Christy Award best debut novel finalist and was shortlisted for

a Christian Retailing's Best Award and an INSPY Award last year. "The Christy Award, an enormous honor even to be nominated, is likened to the Oscars of the Christian fiction world," Connilyn stated. She blogs as a guest sometimes and keeps up with readers and fellow writers through social media.

The first book in a new series, A Light on the Hill, was released in February and the next two will release over the next year. "I can write faster now and finish a first draft in 6-8 months," she said. "Then my manuscript goes through three major edits before it's printed. It's a very intricate process, and I have wonderful friends who critique my work."



As busy as she is with writing, editing and occasional book signings, Connilyn still homeschools her children. Since she writes into the night, school doesn't usually start until 10:00 a.m. — every student's dream! "Homeschooling offers a flexible schedule, and our kids are inspired by what I do," Connilyn, the mom and teacher, said. The family belongs to a homeschool co-op through which she volunteers.

Connilyn admits that procrastination is sometimes a challenge. With all the children's activities and schooling, she's become a master at time management. "I've had to become more disciplined," she said.

Natives of Spokane, Washington, Chad and Connilyn enjoy life in Texas. "When we found out we would be based in Waxahachie, my









husband was fascinated with living in a town with such an unusual name," she remembered. "I love the small-town atmosphere and consider Waxahachie as our second hometown. The people make this town what it is, and they've been very welcoming and supportive of me. We had more than 120 people at my first book's launch party."

She was able to do firsthand research during a trip to the Holy Land last fall. "I went with another author. Our focus was on visiting battlegrounds, past, present and future in Israel, but I enjoyed watching the people and learning about the culture. We rode camels and went to a Bedouin camp to eat. The trip was a fabulous experience and so inspiring. I took a million photos."

An artist, she enjoys painting and drawing. She loves dabbling in graphic design, and she was a preschool teacher for 14 years before her children were born. Still a reader of history, she loves reading out-ofprint history books, watching people and is an earnest note taker.

Spending time with her family, including Chad's father who also lives in Waxahachie, is always a priority for her. However, there aren't any other authors in the family. "I don't know where my writing comes from," Connilyn said.

She encourages those who wish to follow in her author footsteps to find other writers. She's a member of ACFW and Romance Writers of America. "There's such a great camaraderie among writers," she explained. "They are honest and will challenge me. Writers keep pushing themselves and write even when they don't feel like doing so. Most of all, have a teachable spirit."

While open to writing in other genres, Connilyn continues to find inspiration in the Bible and through her travels to the Holy Land. She concluded, "This is where my heart is now." NOW

### **Enchilada Casserole**

- 4 chicken leg quarters
- 8 oz. Velveeta cheese
- 3 Tbsp. seasoning salt
- 3 Tbsp. Mrs. Dash, or to taste
- 2 10.5-oz. cans cream of mushroom soup
- 2 15-oz. cans turkey or regular Wolf Brand Chili with no beans
- 1 10-oz. can enchilada red mild sauce
- 2 1.25-oz. pkgs. taco seasoning
- 1 13-oz. bag corn chips
- Shredded cheddar cheese, to taste
- **1.** Boil the chicken leg quarters until they are done; reserve at least 4 cups of the broth in the pot after removing the chicken.
- 2. Allow the chicken to cool; debone carefully. Return the deboned chicken to the pot.
- **3.** Add the Velveeta cheese, seasoning salt, Mrs. Dash, cream of mushroom soup, chili. enchilada red mild sauce and taco seasoning: mix well. Bring mixture to a boil.

- **4.** Pour the corn chips into a baking pan sprayed with cooking oil; pour the sauce mixture over the chips.
- **5.** Using a large spoon, stir the sauce mixture and chips together well; all chips should be covered totally by the sauce mixture.
- **6.** Top with the cheddar cheese; bake in the oven for 30 minutes, or until all cheese is melted and slightly browned.

### **Broccoli & Cheese Casserole**

7 oz. Minute White Rice 5 cups chicken broth (divided use) 1 28-oz. bag broccoli florets 2 10.5-oz. cans cream of mushroom soup

8-oz. Velveeta cheese

1 stick salted butter

3 Tbsp. seasoning salt Mrs. Dash, to taste

2 eggs

Shredded cheddar cheese, to taste

- 1. Cook rice according to package instructions in 4 cups of the chicken broth; drain.
- 2. Pour rice into a lasagna pan sprayed with cooking oil.
- **3.** Add the remainder of the ingredients, except the cheddar cheese. More broccoli florets and seasoning salt can be added, if desired.
- **4.** Mix all ingredients well; cook at 350 F for 30-40 minutes, or until the Velveeta cheese is melted.
- 5. Remove from the oven; stir well. Add the shredded cheddar cheese; cook for an additional 30 minutes.

### Mac & Cheese Casserole

1 16-oz. pkg. elbow noodles

3/4 cup whipping cream (comes in a carton)

I stick salted butter

12 oz. Velveeta cheese

3 Tbsp. seasoning salt, and additional to taste

2 Tbsp. Mrs. Dash

2 eggs

Shredded cheddar cheese, to taste

- **1.** Cook the noodles according to package directions until almost done; drain water.
- 2. Add whipping cream, butter and Velveeta cheese; add 3 Tbsp. of seasoning salt, then salt to taste. Add Mrs. Dash.
- **3.** Cook noodle mixture on stove top until the cheese has melted; pour it into a lasagna baking pan sprayed with cooking oil.

- **4.** Mix the two eggs into the noodle mixture; top with the shredded cheese.
- **5.** Bake for 20-30 minutes at 350 F.

#### Corn Casserole

- 3 15.25-oz. cans corn, drained or 2 16-oz. bags frozen corn
- 2 14.75-oz. cans cream style corn
- 1 stick salted butter
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup flour
- 2 Tbsp. seasoning salt
- 1 Tbsp. pepper
- 2 eggs
- **I.** Preheat oven to 350 F; mix all ingredients well in a baking pan sprayed with cooking oil.
- **2.** Cook for 1 hour, or until the casserole is a little thickened.

#### Spinach Chicken Casserole

- 4 chicken leg quarters
  10 cups water
  7 oz. Minute White Rice
  11.25 oz. Ricos Gourmet Nacho
- 1 10.5-oz. can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 10.5-oz. can cream of celery soup
- 3 Tbsp. seasoning salt
- 3 Tbsp. Mrs. Dash, or to taste
- 5 oz. frozen spinach

**Cheese Sauce** 

- Shredded cheddar cheese, to taste
- **1.** Boil the chicken leg quarters in water; remove the chicken, reserving 4 cups of the chicken broth.
- **2.** Boil the rice according to package instructions in 2 cups of the reserved broth. When rice is cooked, add remaining chicken broth and all remaining ingredients, except the cheddar cheese; mix well. *Note*: more seasoning salt may be added, if desired.
- **3.** Pour mixture into a baking pan sprayed with cooking oil; add the chicken leg quarters. Top with shredded cheddar cheese.
- 4. Bake mixture for 30 minutes at 350 F.

#### An Ozark Haven for Art and Architecture

A forested hollow in the Ozarks may seem like an unordinary place for a nationally recognized art museum, but Crystal Bridges Museum of American Art in Northwest Arkansas, is no ordinary place. This jewel of a museum brings together art, architecture and the natural landscape for a total package unlike anything you've likely experienced.

The museum itself is an architectural wonder. Designed by international architect Moshe Safdie, the structure is nestled into a ravine in a 120-acre wooded park. Its monolithic concrete walls and curved copper roofs make the building appear to be almost a part of the surrounding landscape. A stream runs through the complex, its waters slowed by a series of weirs to create ponds encircled by the museum's galleries. Two glass-sided bridge structures span the ponds and inspired the museum's name.

Inside, massive oak beams support the soaring ceilings of the galleries, and the walls are graced by hundreds of American masterpieces. You'll encounter familiar favorites like Gilbert Stuart's portrait of George Washington, Norman Rockwell's Rosie the Riveter, and Andy Warhol's Dolly Parton, as well as breathtaking works that are sure to become new favorites. From colonial portraits to contemporary works, the entire history of America is laid out here in art. Quiet reflection areas offer an opportunity to relax, as well as to take in views of the museum's breathtaking landscape and architecture.

Architecture is central to the Crystal Bridges experience. On the museum's grounds are works by two American icons of architecture and design: Frank Lloyd Wright and Buckminster Fuller. The Bachman-Wilson House, designed by Wright and

built in New Jersey in 1956, was relocated to Crystal Bridges' grounds in 2015. It is located near the museum's south entrance and is open for public viewing. On the museum's north lawn is a 50-foot dome designed by theorist and architect Buckminster Fuller. Constructed as a prototype for a revolutionary affordable and efficient style of housing Fuller envisioned, the "Fly's Eye Dome" is built of fiberglass — a new material in the early 1980s — and covered in round openings like the lenses on a fly's eye. It, too, is open for public viewing.

Crystal Bridges' expansive grounds are another attraction. The native hardwood forest is threaded with walking and biking trails, and the landscape features natural springs, soaring trees and stone outcrops, as well as several outdoor sculptures scattered along the way. Crystal Bridges' trails connect with downtown Bentonville, offering independent restaurants, galleries, shopping and the modern luxury of a 21c Museum Hotel. Just 40 minutes away is the lively nightlife of nearby Fayetteville, and the funky, artistic Victorian Ozark village of Eureka Springs is just an hour away.

Northwest Arkansas, as a whole, offers an additional array of outdoor activities. From kayaking the beautiful Buffalo River — the United States' first National River — to boating on Beaver Lake, trout fishing at the White River and hiking the many trails at Devil's Den State Park, adventures abound that will make it clear why Arkansas is known as "The Natural State." If cycling is your thing, the area's mountain bike trails are rated among the best in the nation. And the Razorback Regional Greenway is a 36-mile, shareduse trail system that links six communities from Bella Vista to Fayetteville.

Year-round, it's fun to explore the area beyond Bentonville and Crystal Bridges. All you need is a map and a car. But beforehand, check out www.crystalbridges. org/visit/#regional for help planning your total experience. NOW

#### Herbs and Honey

As food from around the world has become more readily available, a trend has developed with people growing their own crops. If you want to plant an organic garden or harvest honey yourself, here is a quick guide to help get you started.

#### Have a Plan

to no return, you could face the choice of spending more money or calling it quits.

#### Get the Right Supplies

• Organic Can Mean Simple. Depending on your location and soil quality, you may only need to put seeds in the ground and keep them appropriately watered. If you do need to buy soil or fertilizer, you can get materials at any lawn and garden supply store. Just make sure you see Organic on the bag. For ground covering, you can use your own grass clippings or mulched leaves for a cheap and easy solution.




• Bees Take a Little More. You will need a beehive, a suit and a few tools to begin harvesting honey. Unless you happen to live near a specialty bee supply store, you will have to order your supplies online. There are brushes and tools for separating the honeycombs, as well as a smoker, which is crucial for keeping the bees calm as you collect your honey. And, of course, you will have to buy bees from either an existing, local beekeeper or an online retail site.





#### **HealthNOW Breast Cancer** Screening Is Essential

In the U.S., one in eight women will be diagnosed with invasive breast cancer during her lifetime. While awareness of breast cancer has improved, the disease, unfortunately, remains the second-deadliest cancer among American women.

Early detection with regular mammograms remains the single most effective way for combating the disease. As physicians, we know that the earlier we can detect the disease, the more effective treatment can be. When detected early before it spreads, women have a 99 percent survival rate after five years. Mammograms can detect the majority of breast cancer in women, but they are not the only way to identify breast cancer.

Women should begin monthly breast self-exams in their 20s. Women in their 20s and 30s should have a clinical breast exam every three years. Women in their 30s and 40s should discuss their breast cancer risk level with a physician to determine the most appropriate cancer screening options. Women age 50 and older should have a mammogram and a clinical breast exam at least every two years and, if recommended by a physician, an annual MRI screening. If any changes in the breast are detected, contact a physician immediately to be evaluated.

A common myth is that only women who have a family history of the disease develop breast cancer. While the majority of cancer happens by chance, about 5-10 percent of people with cancer have an inherited cancer. Women with a family history of breast cancer should discuss genetic testing with their physician. If genetic tests indicate a woman is BRCA-positive, there are a number of risk reduction strategies to discuss with her physician.

Age, diet and exercise can also impact risk. Approximately two-thirds of invasive breast cancer cases occur in women over age 55, though the disease can occur at any age. Being overweight and/or physically inactive increases your risk.

It's also important to watch for warning signs and symptoms. The signs for breast cancer are not the same for all women, and some women show no signs in early stages.

- A lump in the breast
- Change in breast size or shape
- Thickening of breast or underarm
- Nipple retraction
- Dimpled skin near the breast
- Tenderness
- Pain in breast or nipple

- Nipple discharge
- · A lump under arm or around collarbone
- Irritation, redness, scaliness or swelling on the breast, nipple or skin near the nipple

Until a cure for breast cancer is found, regular screenings, awareness and healthy lifestyle choices, such as eating well and exercising regularly, are among the best tools a woman has to reduce her risk of developing the disease.
