

Remember to avoid the RUSH at the last minute! This year we will not be taking appointments after April 1, but as long as your return information is in our office by April 1, we will try to get the return done without an extension. We will still accept return information up to April 1, but can'tpromise the returns will get done without an extension unless the information is in our office by April 15, 2009. Extensions can be done anytime before October 15, 2009.

New Tax Relief Law for Individuals and Families was signed February 12, 2009.

"Making Work Pay" tax credit — this will essentially provide a tax credit of up to \$400 for working individuals and \$800 for working families through a reduction in the amount of income tax that is withheld from paychecks or through claiming the credit on year end tax returns. Recipients of social security, SSI, Railroad Retirement and Veterans Disability Compensation Benefits and government retirees will receive a one-time payment of \$250 which is a reduction to any allowable making work pay credit.

\*\*\* Increased Earned Income Credits

\*\*\* The refundable child tax credit for dependents under the age of 17 is scheduled to increase to \$3,000 from \$1,000.

\*\*\* Refundable First Time Homebuyer Credit - For homes purchased (or built and moved in to) after January 1, 2009 and prior to December 1, 2009, a refundable credit of up to \$8,000 is available for certain first time homebuyer taxpayers and so long as the home is not sold within 36 months of the date of purchase.

\*\*\* Sales Tax Deductions for Vehicle purchases is extended through 2009.

\*\*\*Temporary suspension of taxation on federal unemployment benefits up to \$2,400.

\*\*\* For Businesses: Extension of bonus depreciation, election to accelerated recognition of Historic AMT/R&D credits, extension of enhanced small business expensing, 5-year carryback of net operating losses for small businesses, delayed recognition of certain cancellation of debt income, incentives to hire unemployed veterans and disconnected youth, new markets tax credits, recovery zone and tribal economic development bonds and many more.

\*\*\*Energy Credits: Many energy credit extensions, including tax credits for energy-efficient home improvements - 30% of amount paid up to \$1,500 credit available for installed qualified energy efficient improvements.

\*\*\*Health Insurance Assistance: The bill provides a 65% subsidy for COBRA insurance premiums under certain circumstances.

# Cigh the Cross – By Joan Kilbourne

It can be seen from Highway 14: a simple white cross, the tallest cross in Navarro County. Behind it is the white clapboard church building, resembling a country farmhouse. Reverend J.E. Ferguson and Reverend J.G. Hardin founded this United Methodist Church in 1847, and it is the home of the oldest continuing Methodist congregation in Central Texas. First located at Pisgah Ridge, the building was moved to an area called Richland Crossing when a railroad line forced it to relocate. The current lay leader John Bruce Thomas, known as Bruce to his congregants and family, explained, "Later, the building was eventually moved across the road to its present location."

While Bruce was growing up in Dallas, he spent his summers in Richland with his grandparents. "I attended service every




Sunday, and I was baptized in this church. As an adult I lived in San Antonio, attending the second largest Methodist church in that city. Sunday services included four worship services, as well as several different choirs and an orchestra," he said. At the same time, Bruce's parents, who years earlier had relocated to Richland, were becoming elderly and needed





help keeping the church alive. "Just imagine," Bruce said, "it's a church that has survived the early days of gunfighters, Indians and rustlers; the Civil War; World Wars I and II; the 1929 depression; Vietnam; and now, another recession. So much good was being done by the people here; it [the church] just had to keep going."

So, Bruce made a life-changing decision to move with his wife, Shirley, from San Antonio to Richland, to support his parents and the ongoing mission of the church started by his great-grandmother and founding member Amanda Swink. "It felt like it was a calling I couldn't ignore. I had to learn patience. I had to slow down to appreciate what's here," he shared.

The effort to revitalize the church began at the urging of Bruce's cousin, Dr. Reese Brown, and Arthur Patrick, a retired banker and cattleman. Bruce said, "It was Arthur Patrick, a 50-year member and supporter of the congregation, who persuaded me to serve as our church's lay leader and to volunteer as a financial officer for the city of Richland." The congregation rallied behind their efforts. "In the big church in San Antonio," Bruce said, "it was necessary to coax people to help out, but here everyone wants to be involved." He offered as an example church member Sybil Brister, who walked into the church, still recovering from double knee replacement surgery, and asked, "What can I do?" "Harriet




Albertson has been playing the piano for us, even though she is not in the best of health. Caren Smith is our youth leader and her high-school-age daughter, Bree, serves on the pastor's parish committee. Jean Tidwell sings and cooks for us, and Betty Jean Murray teaches the young children in Sunday School," Bruce added. "These women here have this 'can do' attitude and they really do everything - from canning food to branding cattle."

Some of the credit for the spiritual,

help raise funds for a youth mission trip planned for this summer. Former church members from all over Texas come back and visit Richland UMC and want to help. They all want to see our church continue," Bruce explained. "In addition, we have offered brick pavers for sale, which can be inscribed with the names of family members who have passed away, or in honor of someone. We will use the pavers around the base of the cross, along with a bench and some landscaping,




so people will have a place to come to reflect, relax, meditate and pray."

The person in charge of managing the pavers is Sara Brown, who lives in Liberty, Texas. "We were in a meeting, thinking about a way to increase interest and awareness of the church," Bruce remembered. "Arthur Patrick suggested a cross be placed at the back of the church. The idea grew quickly. Someone said, 'Let's put it in front, so it can be seen from the highway.' Another said, 'It should be lighted,'" Bruce recalled.

Donated H-beams determined the great 40-foot height of the cross. Clearly, the project was challenging. Nevertheless, with the volunteered advice of an architect and the generous assistance of local building professionals, the beams were welded, painted and

planted by a crane in a 10-foot deep hole filled with six yards of concrete. The structure is built to withstand 90-100 mph winds. "Just in case," Bruce smiled, "we placed the cross 40-feet from the building, so it won't come down on the roof."

Bruce could not say enough about the generosity of the people who helped with the project. Haynie Drilling Company dug the hole, and then dug it again when rain collapsed it. Corsicana Sign and Crane lifted the iron cross into place. Sherwin Williams Paint and Transit Mix Concrete contributed, along with the other contractors. Darwin Myers, the manager of the Texas Department of Public Safety for



Navarro County, personally inspected and approved the cross's location near Highway 14. The advice and reduced prices made this large endeavor possible for a small church.

Bruce explained what the cross means to church members. "The cross is intended to commemorate the people, who have served this church in the past and those who will serve in the future. It also represents our outreach to the community. We want the cross area to be a peaceful place where everyone can come and feel welcome," he stated. Bruce looked pleased to tell a story about standing in front of the church one day when a car came up from the highway. A man got out to stand and look at the cross. He stood for a while and then he knelt to pray. Then he got back into his car and went on his way. "That's what we hoped for," he said, "a beacon that invites the community to come here. Just look for the cross."


These two were predestined to be together. Not many of us can say that we have known our spouse since kindergarten,




the big question and they were married in the summer of 1998.





## Thirty Years in the Making - By Samantha Daviss

Navarro Council of the Arts (NCA) has accomplished something that most nonprofit organizations strive for on a continual basis, and that is to hit the 30-year mark of success and existence. "The NCA started out as a Dallas Symphony League member, where they would present one concert per year for kids in Navarro County, and we would raise money through sponsorships and memberships," Leah Blackard, executive director of NCA, explained.

Since its inception 30 years ago, the NCA has evolved into a showcase which offers over 10,000 students throughout Navarro County the opportunity to see and experience exhibit art, performance art and various cultural phenomena they would never get to experience otherwise. "We give the students the opportunity to see two professional touring performance companies per year," Leah stated. "We work very hard trying not to repeat like performances or genres, such as vocal, dance, symphony or acrobatic shows."

Even though the shows are offered to all the students within Navarro County, the NCA does not draw solely from

Texas or the surrounding areas. "In fact, the majority of our performances come from out-of-state or international origins," Leah said with pride. "We have seen the Chinese acrobats and so many other foreign performers," Jane Biltz, current NCA board president, added. "We really try to take the performers or shows to the schools (for a more personal experience) around the county, but sometimes the shows, like last year's Barrage and this year's illusionist is too grand, so we bus the students to the Corsicana High School auditorium,"

Leah said, explaining the magnitude of some of the events and shows.

Even though the Palace Theatre and NCA are two completely separate entities, they combine forces once a year to assist with the cost of bringing in a performance for the students to see. If there is a musical or concert portion to the performance, then the Palace will typically pay for that, and the NCA will pay for the educational portion of the show. "The performances





that we bring to the children fulfill so many requirements," Leah said. "I typically try to do enough research on each performance that it in some way affects the preparation or studying for the TAKS test. I always try to prepare a packet for the teachers so they can see how the performance will enhance test scores on the TAKS exam. Each performance has the opportunity to really fulfill an educational component, if the teachers take full advantage of each opportunity and apply it within the classroom, not to mention that these

shows give students opportunities they wouldn't normally have in life.

"The mission of the NCA is to present quality arts to our students," Leah said. The NCA was formed by Navarro County residents to act as an umbrella agency to run and represent all the various organizations around the county. The NCA, the Palace Theatre and the Warehouse Living Arts Center remain their own entities but work closely with one another. The NCA also works with Corsicana Parks and Recreation during the summertime to get children







Five years later, these same 11 players are still together. This in itself is a sign of their loyalty and dedication to the game.





At the National Tournament, the Tigers Team demonstrated its strength right away by winning three games, which put them in fifth place for the next level of play. Staying strong, the



# Order in the Court

Some of us find our calling in life at a very young age, and then there are those of us who never really find the right fit, yet we have a vague idea of what we might be really good at doing. The paralegal program offered at Navarro College can fulfill both of those needs. It offers a chance at a great life and a great career, and the opportunity to know that you are really good at assisting others, organizing an office and aiding a busy lawyer with all their legal needs.

Damara Watkins, director of the paralegal program, knew she wanted to go into law from a very young age. "I always knew I wanted to be a lawyer — ever since the fourth grade," Damara admitted. After graduating from Corsicana High School in 1986, she received her bachelor's degree from Southern Methodist University (SMU) in 1989 in management information systems. "Once I started interviewing [postcollege], I definitely knew designing computer systems wasn't for me, and I headed to law school at the University of Texas," Damara said.

Upon returning to Corsicana in 1993, aside from planning her wedding, which was to take place in January 1994, Damara was busy studying for the bar examination to further her lifelong dream of a career in law. "I went out and practiced for a year on my own," she recalled. "But then an opening came up in January of 1995, in the district attorney's office, which I knew was a perfect fit for me." After seven years of trying everything from speeding tickets to capital murder cases and working her way up to first assistant district attorney, assisting with half of the felony case load, Damara knew it was time for her to stay home with her two babies, Grayson and Graham. "While I was at home, though, I still got to work part time out of my house, mainly criminal defense and termination of parental rights cases," Damara stated, explaining one position she held as the second chair alongside Kerri Anderson Donica on a capital murder case and another appointment as appellate counsel on a capital murder case.

Damara was able to do it all: be at home with her kids, while still fulfilling her lifetime dream of being a lawyer. "Although it is a very difficult job on an emotional level, it is particularly satisfying to work on capital cases, because of being able to pull out all of the stops," Damara said. "The



county (or state) pays for the accused's experts, so really no expense is spared; therefore, you know you are getting and working with the best of the best. Also, I love doing research, which is required for these types of cases. You definitely have to be at the top of your game."


In 2004, after working from her house and spending priceless time with her children, Damara felt it was time to start practicing outside of the house again. "But then, the opportunity to become the director of the paralegal program opened up at the college [Navarro College]," Damara said. 





BAKED POTATO SOUP

2 leeks, split, rinsed, chopped — no substitutions

1/4 cup butter — no substitutions 3 lbs. baking potatoes, peeled, cut into 2-inch chunks

2-3 cups chicken broth

1 qt. half-and-half — no substitutions

Sauté the leeks in melted butter over low heat until tender, about 10 minutes. Peel and cube the potatoes; add to butter and leeks. Pour enough chicken broth to just partially cover the potatoes. Cook for about 12 minutes or until fork tender. Make sure that the broth is reduced by about half. Pour half-and-half into potato and broth mixture. Heat through, but do not boil. Top with whatever you would put on a baked potato — chopped bacon, sour cream, grated cheese or chives. Serves 6-8.

### **COUSCOUS SALAD**

2 cups chicken broth 2 cups couscous 1 small shallot 1/3 cup + 2 Tbsp. olive oil, separated 1 garlic clove, minced juice of 1 large lemon plus zest salt and pepper, to taste grape tomatoes Parmesan cheese, shredded 1/2 cup fresh basil, finely shredded Bring chicken broth to a boil: remove from heat. Add couscous, cover and let sit for 5 minutes. Stir couscous with a fork to fluff; transfer to a bowl. Cover and refrigerate for about 1 hour or until chilled. Mince shallot; sauté in 2 Tbsp. olive oil until tender. Add garlic; sauté until garlic is cooked but not brown. Remove from heat; add to a deep bowl. Add lemon juice and zest. Slowly stream about 1/3 cup olive oil into mixture, whisking quickly. Add salt and pepper to taste. Pour the dressing over the couscous; stir to coat the pasta. Cover and chill. Before serving, add grape tomatoes, Parmesan cheese and basil; toss gently.

### HOT FUDGE CAKE

1 chocolate cake box mix (I use Duncan Hines devils food.) vanilla ice cream (or flavor of your choice) HOT FUDGE SAUCE:

- 1/2 cup butter 1 12-oz. can Hershey's chocolate syrup
- 1 10-oz. can sweetened milk
- 1/2 tsp. vanilla

Prepare cake mix according to directions. I use either a Bundt pan or an 8 1/2 x 11-inch pan. Prepare fudge sauce by melting butter in a saucepan. Add remaining ingredients; stir until combined. Do not boil. Sauce can be kept in the fridge for about one month. To assemble the cake, cut 2 1/2- to 1-inch slices of Bundt cake or one large square of oblong cake. If you are using oblong cake, cut cake horizontally into two slices. Place scoop or slice of vanilla ice cream, or whatever you prefer, on the bottom slice. Top with second slice of cake. Ladle hot fudge over the cake.

You can use anything extra you like, such as whipped cream, chopped nuts, cherry pie filling or coconut to garnish the dessert. This is my sons' favorite holiday dessert. We always had it on Thanksgiving and Christmas. As a special treat, it was also their breakfast on the day after the holiday.

#### MARSHMALLOW FROSTING

This is my great Aunt Christine's recipe. She cooked on a wood-burning stove and beat the eggs and frosting with a hand-held egg beater. I do not know how she made this taste so good working with those tools!

1 cup white sugar 1/2 cup white Karo syrup

- 4 Tbsp. water
- 4 egg whites
- 1 Tbsp. good vanilla

Combine sugar, syrup and water in a heavy saucepan. Do not stir more than a few times to incorporate ingredients. Cook over medium heat until syrup "spins a thread." (Dip spoon into syrup and hold above pan. When syrup is ready, a thin thread will drift from spoon down into pan.) This could take up to 10 minutes. Do not stir while syrup is cooking. While syrup is cooking, beat egg whites until stiff, but not dry. I keep the mixer going very slowly while the syrup comes up to temperature. When syrup is ready, pour very slowly into beating egg whites. Turn mixer up to medium high; continue beating for about 10 minutes. Add vanilla. This will frost a 3-layer cake. It was my mother's best frosting and she used it on all our birthday cakes. It is particularly good for coconut cake.

# Suffering From Investment Statement Shock?

Conventional wisdom tells you to be a patient "buy and hold" investor, but seeing half of your account wiped out in a year might make you feel like a "buy and fold" investor.

"Should I sell now before I lose even more money?" has certainly been one of the most frequently asked questions of 2009. We have to go all the way back to the 1930s to find stock market declines like the one that began in 2008. What we have seen is unprecedented. Using asset allocation models based on over 35 years of market history, portfolios have been constructed that had a "worst case" expected loss of 5 percent to 10 percent. The 2008/2009 bear market blew through this expectation like Hurricane Katrina hitting New Orleans. While looking back and considering lessons learned is helpful, the pressing question is what you should do now.

As an investor, the first thing you need to consider is selling down to your sleeping point. If your investments and their decline in value are keeping you up at night with worry and anxiety, it may be time to restructure your portfolio. Another sell signal would be if you and your spouse are having tense discussions about your portfolio. Do not let numbers on a statement wreck your health and your relationships.


The second point involves your investment time horizon. If the money you have invested in the stock market is going to be needed by you or your family within the next five years, you should consider the ramifications of losing another 20 percent or more. While finance professionals are confident in our country's future, it could take several years for the economy to recover from the severe shocks of 2008.

Lastly, remember the old expression, "It is what it is." You must deal with the present reality and you still need a plan.



Boone Pickens, talking about our lack of a national energy policy, said, "A fool with a plan beats a genius with no plan." As painful as it may be, you need to make a realistic reassessment of your investment plan. For example, you may have to scale back your expectations for lifestyle income in retirement, postpone retirement, or increase your savings rate. Computer technology has made financial planning widely available. Financial planners can test various assumptions and do "what-if" analyses. However, there is a big picture question that the

computer cannot answer. Do you believe this bear market will end without breaking the back of our economy? Will the stock market recover in a few years? If you see our economic future as an optimist, you can retool or modify your investment



plan with this positive and realistic point of view. On the other hand, if you believe our system has been fundamentally broken and we are heading toward a bleak economic future, it may be time to sell and avoid further losses.

It can be argued that history is on the side of the optimist. All previous bear markets have eventually run out of gas. Our stock market has always recovered and gone on to make new highs. Despite our current challenges, our best days are ahead of us. Sell down to your sleeping point. Consider your time horizon. Refresh your plan.

# Health Lead Poison: Prevention

Unlike the urban legend, you can't get lead poisoning from a pencil, but lead is a hazard that can cause serious health complications.

Lead, which is toxic to many of the body's tissues and enzymes, can be found in the soil, in some household paints and even in children's toys. The number of cases of lead poisoning has decreased since a federal regulation required fuel and paint to be lead-free. However, there is still a high level of lead concentrated in the soil around major highways and in some urban settings.

High levels of lead can also be found in older houses with lead pipes and lead-based paint, on old ceramics, china, porcelain and even in household dust. When the body is exposed to high levels of lead in the environment, the result can be lead poisoning.

While it is children who are generally more susceptible to lead poisoning, adults can be affected, too. Children are more vulnerable because lead can begin to accumulate in their undeveloped tissue and nervous system. This may result in serious health problems including: kidney damage, learning disabilities, speech and language behavior issues, poor muscle coordination and hearing loss. In some cases, children can be at risk of irreversible brain damage due to high levels of lead poisoning.

Adults who have high levels of lead poisoning may also experience some health issues including: high blood pressure, digestive problems, cataracts, memory loss, muscle and joint pain reproductive issues or pregnancy complications. For both children and adults, high levels of lead poisoning may cause seizures, unconsciousness and possibly even death.

To avoid serious health problems there are symptoms that serve as a warning to seek early treatment. Children may show signs of irritability, weight loss, decreased appetite, sluggishness, abdominal pain, vomiting, unusual paleness and difficulty learning. Similarly, adults may show signs of pain, numbness or tingling in the arms and legs, muscular weakness, headaches, abdominal pain or changes in mood.

There are a few simple measures that can be taken to prevent lead poisoning:

- Have a home lead inspection and risk assessment by a professional;
- Wash children's hands after playing outside, before eating or before going to bed;
- Clean floors, windowsills and other dusty surfaces with a damp cloth;
- Restrict children's play around roadways or bridges;
- · Provide meals that are high in iron and calcium; and

 Run cold water in old lead pipes for at least a minute before using.





It is important to have children tested at 6 months old for lead poisoning and to have a yearly exam if they live in an older house with lead-based paint. It is also important to have an annual lead check if exposed to high levels at work or in daily activities. If diagnosed, a physician may provide different treatment options, depending on the severity of the diagnosis. Visit your physician if you think you need to be tested for lead poisoning and find out what treatment options are available, MIIII





# Great Outdoors

Weep, Creep

and Leap!

Are you planting yet? Flowers, shrubs and trees are only going to be as beautiful as the care given to them merits. This includes planting! The old wives' tale about perennials, shrubs and trees "weeping, creeping and leaping" makes sense if you watch your plants and think about it.


All plants need to be planted in our clay at ground level or a bit higher, so they do not start out with soggy feet. The roots need to be loosened from that tight ball they get in while in those little pots. I have even taken a knife or spading fork to them if they are in a giant ball! You can see why they might "weep." Just the shock of planting can set some back for quite a while. New plants need a good cover of mulch (three-four inches) to protect them from heat and drought. If your plant is very small, just take the mulch up to within two inches of the plant until it grows a bit, then move it on in closer. Trees need to have the mulch pulled back from the trunk at least two-three inches to lessen the possibility of fungus or disease.

I am watching a certain tree right now. It did not do much last year or the year before, but I hope it will have established itself and be ready to "leap" up and grow like mad this year. If it does not, I may have to do some digging and check out roots. If they did not get unwound, they will still be growing round and round. That tree will not be very stable (watch out for high winds) plus it will exhaust all the food and water in that confined area. Not a good situation for the tree!

If you are planting annuals, be sure and loosen up the roots as you put them in the ground. Those tight little squares do not do much for water and food acquisition. Our plants really are pretty resistant and can take a bit of handling if given a good soaking.

Farmers' Market begins in May, so I may see you there! **STAUS**
