

The publicity of his invention is timely since Earth Day is on April 22. This special day reminds us to be friendly to the earth. Remember to recycle and turn


off your lights when you aren't using them.



was the center of the community.

"We want the view from Main Street to be historically accurate, so we're using the right colors," Mary explained.

"We're also being careful of the color palette so each building has its own individual character."











Eddie, Mary and their four children moved to Rendon a few years ago to live on his family's land there. They created a sculpture garden and art center where they could build something for and contribute to the community. It was important to Eddie's family that the land remains in the family. Eddie and Mary have bought more land around it, piece by piece, to its current seven acres. "We have so much space we wanted to do something creative. What's the fun of having seven acres if you're just going to mow it?" Mary asked.

They have been building their home, affectionately known as their Bohemian Homestead, since 2005, piecing together old buildings purchased from Hester Home Movers. Currently, it is comprised of three separate buildings: a former Wienerschnitzel restaurant, a lake cottage and a modular home. They are expecting delivery of another building soon. "We drove up on the guy's lot and started buying buildings," Eddie said. "The





Wienerschnitzel was decaying on the lot, and he begged us to take it."

Also on their land are large organic gardens which reflect Mary's love for art and science. As a graduate student at Appalachian State University in North Carolina, she researched heirloom crops that could help transition farmers' crops from tobacco to something sustainable. She focused on apples and found many varieties that had ceased to exist anywhere else. Her love of botany has carried over to her gardens, where composting and natural methods are the rule.

"When we moved here, the soil was terrible, but I love a challenge. We are dedicated to organic farming, so we began sheet composting every bed," she explained. "We laid down cardboard, then added six tons of organic material, such as paper, leaves and horse manure.

"Gardens are like people," May continued. "They don't look like anything you see on the cover of a magazine,



and they're always changing. A garden is the best kind of art because it's fourdimensional. You have to account for time."

Eddie is a skilled painter, but he also has a talent for building things. "If you can draw it, he can build it," Mary said. His medium of choice is metal, which he mixes with organic materials like glass and wood. He learned to weld on his first art job using metal, using the upfront money he received to purchase a welder. "Metal is like magic. There's nothing you can't do with it," Eddie said, his eyes sparkling. "You're limited with wood, but metal seems to defy gravity and will hold any shape. There's also the added benefit of it being easy to find in junkyards."

His medium became even easier when gas companies began building oil rigs



Food, Fun and GIBA — By Mikaela Mathews




Seeing Garry Crabtree with his grill at a Mansfield High School track meet, flipping salty burgers on a Saturday afternoon is a normal event. His wife, Brenda, is right there with him, cheering on their youngest son. In fact, it's unusual if the Crabtrees aren't either attending or holding an event. As highly active members both in the Booster Club and the

PTSA at Mansfield High School for 10 years, the Crabtrees carry a legacy of service for both their children and the school.

"We believe you need to be involved," Garry explained. "You've got to do your part to help out." For the Crabtree family, helping out means manning the concession stand, soliciting donations for the football players and passing out fruit to the track players.

Garry and Brenda's three sons all attended Mansfield High School — Jacob, a senior at Oklahoma State University (OSU);



Lucas, a junior at Midwestern State University; and, Zachary, a senior at Mansfield High School, who will go to OSU with a football scholarship. However, their commitment to service started long before their sons were in high school. "Garry was a commissioner with the Pee Wee football team there in Kennedale. So, we're used to being involved," Brenda explained.

The couple believed sports would be beneficial for their boys. "We always felt like our kids needed to stay in sports to stay out of trouble. And, we just like being involved." Once their

oldest son was in the seventh grade, the Crabtrees started volunteering to man the concession stand. By the time their youngest son was in junior high, Coach Hulme, Mansfield High's football coach, approached Garry about being the football representative for the Booster Club. Garry gladly accepted. "It just got started from there. We've been involved with just about everything there is to do up there," Garry said. Soon after, Coach Stout, Mansfield's track







coach, asked the Crabtrees to also be the track representative.

The role of a sport representative is primarily to assist the coach in parent communication, assist in raising money and garner food donations for the players. "Last year, we decided we were going to give chocolate milk to the football players after practice," Garry explained. "I called around and got 500 cartons of chocolate milk donated for the boys."







The players appreciate the efforts made by the Crabtrees and other parents' work, especially the students who did not come prepared for an all-day track meet. "They're all very thankful. They'll shake your hand, give you a hug, that's the best part," Garry said.

In addition, Garry helps to coordinate the football team's largest fundraiser of the year, the spring golf tournament. "The golf tournament is huge for football," Brenda described. "When we started working with the other reps eight years ago, their profit was in the single digits. By last year, we were well into the double-digit profits."


The Crabtrees don't take the credit for the work, however. "A lot of parents help. We couldn't do what we do without so many parents helping," Brenda smiled.

"We have very good parents at Mansfield High," Garry agreed. During their time with the Booster Club, the couple has learned how to recruit volunteers. "It's funny. A lot of people won't help unless asked to help," Garry explained. "We do our best to send out e-mails to keep parents updated as to what is needed and what is going on." Organization is also important. "She's the organizer. I'm the beggar," Garry laughed, pointing at his wife.

Brenda's organizational skills eventually earned her the position as first vice president over membership on the Booster Club's executive board. She works to build membership by equipping the representatives with information. "We have increased steadily, probably by about 15-20 percent every year," she said.

But, the Crabtrees don't just interact with the parents. On Thursday nights during football season, many parents from the varsity football team, including the Crabtrees, host dinners for the varsity players. Sometimes, these dinners are in restaurants, but the Crabtrees always insist on having the players in their home. "We're funny because we love doing it at our home. I love having all the boys here," Brenda said. "So we'll cram 60 varsity football players in our house."

Even though the Crabtrees are heavily involved, both Brenda and Garry also hold full-time jobs. Brenda has been an administrative assistant for Sabre for 19 years, and Garry is the owner of Heritage Tire & Wheel. The couple credits the

kindness of bosses and the flexibility of owning a business to allow them to be involved. "We've been very fortunate to have jobs and work for people who know that it's about the family, us being there for our kids," Garry explained.

If being football and track representatives wasn't enough, Garry and Brenda are also highly involved in the PTSA at Mansfield High School. Their biggest assignment with the PTSA is Mansfield High's after-prom party, Gold Rush. The event takes a full year to plan with organizing donations and booking activities to keep the kids at the party. "It's all a way to entice the kids to stay there and not be out drinking and driving," Brenda explained. At the party, which lasts from midnight to 5:00 a.m., kids can play in the casinos, get a fake tattoo, have unlimited food and are even awarded prizes at the end. "Every senior that night will go home with something," Brenda said.

The event is exhausting for the couple, but year after year, they keep volunteering. "The first year I did it, I said, 'We're not going to do this again. It's too much work," Garry explained. "And then, about 3:00 in the morning, you wheel the gifts out, and you hear the boys screaming like girls, because they're so excited because you give away so much stuff."

The Crabtree boys have grown up with watching their parents volunteer. "They're just used to it," Brenda laughed. "The funny thing is if we weren't going to be somewhere, they always ask, "Why aren't you going to be there?" And the Crabtrees wouldn't have it any other way. Brenda explained it this way, "What makes it special is having all the interaction with the kids and knowing that what we're doing makes a difference down the road for them."







OTRIBUR THEIR Loved

Military legacies pulsate through both Steve and Carla Joyce's families. With a father who made waves in the Senate Arms Committee and Clinton administration, a brother who served his country and died as a Ranger in the Black Hawk Down operation in Somalia, a father who fought in the Battle of the Bulge and a son who is currently an F-15 crew chief in the Air Force, the Joyces believe it's important to honor their loved ones. They do so in one of the most intimate places — their home.

In the front office of their two-story home, Steve and Carla have decorated their Soldier Room with war memorabilia. pictures, medals and articles from their war

Steve's father was Lieutenant Colonel Larry Joyce, who served two tours in Vietnam. "I am very proud of my dad and his service to our country," Steve shared. "He had a very diverse career. Not only was he an infantry officer and an aviator, but he was also a public affairs officer in the Pentagon. Talk about a tough gig - PR for the Army in the '70s."

In the far left corner hangs a small piece of Lt. Col. Joyce's airplane, scarred with shrapnel pieces, that holds special memories for Steve. "In one letter my dad asked me what my favorite cartoon character was," Steve recalled. "He said they were naming their planes, and he wanted me to help him. There was no doubt who my favorite character was - Underdog." With this information, Steve's father named his plane Underdog and even had a picture of the character painted on the plane. The plane was unfortunately destroyed one night in an air raid. But, the door survived. Steve's dad had the image cut out and mounted in a teak frame.

To the right of Underdog, Steve framed all of his father's









brother, Sergeant James Casey Joyce. Sgt. Joyce served as a Ranger for the U.S. Army during his trip to Somalia. Steve remembers his brother as someone with great determination. "He knew what he wanted, and he was going to do whatever it took to accomplish it," Steve remarked. "He sounded a lot like my dad." Pictures of Sgt. Joyce line the wall with a framed article Steve's dad had written in honor of his son.

Sgt. Joyce's legacy doesn't just live on the wall, however. "The VFW chapter in Plano named their post after Casey in 2001," Steve said. "Every year, they have a golf tournament to benefit a Plano High School scholarship fund in Casey's name."

To the right of the tribute to Sgt. Joyce hangs memorabilia from Carla's dad, First Lieutenant Carl Auberger, who served in the 429 Fighting Squadron as a P38 fighter pilot. He spent much of his time in Belgium during World War II and fought in the Battle of the Bulge. "He wasn't a career officer. But you would think he was by the impact it had on him and the stories that he shared with his family members," Carla said. "My children have been impacted by his stories. They call his generation the greatest for a reason."

While stationed in Belgium, 1st Lt. Auberger lived in a chateau with a pastry chef and his wife who treated their squadron like family. "In the middle of a war, it was a really warm place for them to be even though it was cold and snowy," Carla described. Photos of 1st Lt. Auberger are framed along with his Distinguished Flying Cross on their wall.

Below 1st Lt. Auberger's Distinguished Flying Cross hangs a replica of the insignia on his airplane. Now both she





and Steve had copies of their father's planes to cherish. "That was a surprise," Carla said, pointing at the replica. "It was a Christmas present. Steve got up really



early in the morning and came in here. He was nailing it into the wall without waking me," she laughed.

Currently living in England, he maintains and cares for F-15 jets. "The pilots don't fly the jets without his approval," Carla explained. "He has a very close relationship with his pilot."

As well as military memorabilia, Carla and Steve also have Bibles from their parents, siblings and grandparents. "I have my dad's and my brother's Bibles, as well as those that belonged to my grandmothers," described Steve. "It is neat to go back and see what they marked in their Bibles."




Jennifer has been married to Chris for the past four years and has taught 23 years with the Mansfield Independent School District. The last 10 have been at Roberta Tipps Elementary. To Jennifer, who also taught first grade for five years, it's a dream job. "When a kindergarten student learns to jump rope or a third grader lets you know they've made a healthy decision, that has its own reward," Jennifer said. "As with any job, the work is challenging at times but always worth it."

This past year, Jennifer was approached by her principal, Violet Maxwell. Violet e-mailed her a link and asked her to check into it. Jennifer clicked on the link and found the Ultimate Fitness Challenge. With the Ultimate Fitness Challenge, kids of all ages get the opportunity to raise money for their organizations in an active and healthy way by participating in a timebased obstacle course. The course is provided by the company and comes with inflatable boundaries, tunnels, mats, etc. that include sprinting, jump roping, wall crawls, hurdles, jumping jacks, sit ups, tunnel crawls, a slide for an exit. The course is finished off with a grueling 75-meter run. The Web site clearly states no door-to-door selling is involved. A student does have to go out and ask relatives and family friends to sponsor them. The challenge is based on a point system, and those who serve as sponsors are asked to help by pledging toward the total number of points achieved on the day the challenge takes place.











The event is promoted by a company called All Star Active. The company operates on the belief that childhood obesity can be reduced and prevented by encouraging physical activity and healthy living. This can be done through active fitness programs and events for children and families. Per the Web site, studies have shown that active children are better equipped to excel in school and live a much healthier quality of life when staying physically active. The company desires to reverse the epidemic of childhood obesity through active programs and events designed to make people healthier and "ease the tremendous financial strain on our health care system caused by obesityrelated illnesses."

Jennifer decided she liked what she saw and began to talk about it to her students. Seventy students stepped up to the plate, and the all-day event was slated for late October 2012. As an added incentive, prizes were offered to students who received the most pledges. Top pledge earners had their names placed in a drawing to win an Xbox 360 gaming system. Other prizes up for grabs included T-shirts, light-up jump ropes and a fitness bag. Was the event successful? "By the time it was over, we realized we made \$1,800 profit!" Jennifer admitted.

Long before the event took place, Jennifer had an idea for what she wanted to do with the money earned. "Our school is in a semi-affluent area. The idea of a fundraiser is usually to raise money for your benefit. I wanted to teach

the children a little more about giving and let them use what they earned to benefit others," Jennifer explained. "Our students here at Tipps have so much, and I wanted them to give to others here in Mansfield who don't. I'm trying to teach empathy for others, and I wanted them to see it in action for themselves." With that in mind, she made a call to the P.E. teacher at Erma Nash Elementary School. With that phone call, an idea was born.

The P.E. teacher at Nash Elementary assigned a writing project to her students. The topic was which piece of athletic equipment would they want and why. "We gave them a choice," Jennifer said. "They could choose between a football, a soccer ball, a basketball, a hula hoop or a jump rope." Seventy-eight children were chosen to write the essay, and money from Tipps' fundraiser was used to buy equipment.



"I'm thankful for the equipment, and I hope someday we can do something like this for other students, too."

Needless to say, it made an equal impact on the Tipps students. "I think they are really happy, and it made me



lawns, spurred her to do more. Sarah and her co-workers have unintentionally become leaders for social change in and around their community.

30th birthday, and decided to do the same thing. She added a creative twist though, by involving her friends and family. She sent an invitation to everyone and asked them to bring five one-dollar bills to Applebee's on her birthday. When her guests arrived, she divided them into groups of two to three, and gave each group a sealed envelope with directions not to open it until they got in their cars. In the envelope were instructions on how to spend the group's money and a

requirement to take photos of the group in action.

One group had to go to a local Laundromat and leave quarters on the washing machines. One had to hide dollar bills in the bins at the Target dollar section. Other assignments included writing notes that said, "You're such a great mom!" and taping them to packs of diapers; taping dollar bills to a soda machine at the hospital; giving lottery tickets to people at a gas station; and buying cocoa for a Salvation Army bell ringer.

"I was tired of boring dinners, and it wasn't a milestone birthday, so I wanted something different," Sarah explained. "The girls really got into it, and the guys did pretty well, too. It was really cool seeing their reactions and those of the people they met. They got some sour looks at first, but everyone ended up being nice, and it changed their attitude a little bit. People took pictures and gave them to me so I could blog about it. When they got back, I had thank you notes for everyone who participated, and two of the envelopes contained gift cards for dinner that night as my act of kindness."

Last year, Sarah and her friends made care packages for a local nursing home, which they then hand-delivered to residents. One woman wanted to participate, but didn't have any money, so Sarah told her to write notes to include in the packages. The notes were one of the most appreciated items.


"I get my ideas from all over. The nursing home idea came because I was running by one day, and I remembered my grandmother, who lived in a nursing



For Larry Ford and Angie Brodie, honesty is of top priority. With a NASDAQ feed in their store to show the exact price of gold at the time of purchase and a 30-day guarantee should the price of gold increase, Amy's Gold & Silver Exchange makes their customers feel like gold.

Amy's Gold and Silver Exchange has been buying and selling jewelry since 2009. With stores in Arlington and Mansfield, the company is looking to open a third store in Cedar Hill in April. Both Larry and Angie are managers at the stores, but Angie pulls double duty as the master jeweler. "Angie is the anchor of it," Larry said.

Angie has been making jewelry since 1986 when she apprenticed with two master jewelers. She finds satisfaction

not just in working with gold, but also in working with people. "It's about meeting so many different kinds of people with all different walks of life and getting to deliver the product — all shiny and new — and seeing their appreciation. That's where I get my pats on the back," Angie smiled.

In addition to making custom pieces for customers, Angie also does repairs. "We are building up a healthy repair business," Angie explained. "People bring in their broken or old jewelry."

Consequently, you should review your portfolio to determine if it contains an appropriate amount of growth-oriented vehicles for your individual objectives, time horizon and risk tolerance.
- Seek professional assistance. 
















Beer-braised Brisket Tacos

1 lb. beef brisket
12 oz. can beer
Small can chipotle peppers in adobo
sauce
Salt, to taste
Corn tortillas
Lettuce, shredded
Shredded cheese or queso

- **1.** Place brisket, fat side down, in slow cooker with beer. Cook on low until fork tender, 4-6 hours.
- **2.** Remove brisket from slow cooker; shred beef with a fork. Season with salt.
- **3.** Blend chipotle peppers in adobo sauce until smooth; add to brisket. Serve on corn tortillas with shredded lettuce and cheese or queso.

Tomatillo Salsa

6 tomatillos, peeled and quartered
1 onion, chopped
3 cloves garlic, minced
2 Tbsp. butter
2 jalapeño peppers, seeded and ribbed (reserve seeds)
1 ripe avocado
4 oz. sour cream
Salt, to taste
Tortilla chips

- **1.** Sauté tomatillos, onion and garlic in butter until tender.
- **2.** Blend in food processor with jalapeño until smooth. Add avocado and sour cream. Salt to taste; add jalapeño seeds to achieve desired heat level. Serve with tortilla chips.

Broccoli Cheese Soup

Large head of broccoli, cut into florets
2 cups chicken broth
12 oz. can evaporated milk
1 tsp. onion powder
16 oz. Velveeta, cubed
Salt and pepper, to taste

- **1.** Boil broccoli in chicken broth until tender.
- **2.** Mash with potato masher. Reduce heat; add evaporated milk, onion powder and Velveeta. Stir until melted. Salt and pepper to taste.

Chicken Piccata

Sea salt

2 servings angel hair pasta

1 cup mushrooms, sliced

2 Tbsp. butter (divided use)

1 large chicken breast

Salt and pepper, to taste

1 cup flour

1 cup milk

1 cup bread crumbs

1 Tbsp. olive oil

1 Tbsp. capers

1 clove garlic, minced

- **1.** Boil water for pasta. Add enough salt that the water tastes like the sea.
- **2.** Cook angel hair according to package directions and drain. Sauté mushrooms in 1 Tbsp butter until browned. Set aside.
- **3.** Butterfly chicken breast into 2 thinner cuts of meat and pound flat. Salt and pepper each side, dredge in flour, dip in milk and coat in bread crumbs.
- **4.** Sauté in 1 Tbsp. butter for 3 minutes on each side or until browned and set aside.
- **5.** In same skillet, add 1 Tbsp. olive oil; fry garlic and capers for 1 minute. Add mushrooms back to pan. Add cooked pasta to pan and toss with tongs to deglaze the pan.
- **6.** Place 1 serving of the pasta and mushrooms with one chicken cutlet.
