

Go Green, Corsicana!



It's prom time in communities everywhere as the school year winds down toward summer, and this month, Corsicana High School's Special Prom will again live up to its name. The idea wasn't new to CHS special education teacher, Kelsey Whiteley, who had taught, coached and helped with a special prom at Athens ISD before coming to CHS three years ago. "When a CHS senior told me he had never gone to a prom and couldn't

afford to go, I figured we could come up with a way to make prom happen for him," Mrs. Whiteley said.

That was during the 2011-2012 school year. CHS' Special Prom has grown each year and is a truly magical experience, not only for the special education students for whom the prom is designed and their peer coach dates, but also for their families and area business people.

Elegantly dressed and coiffed students, proud and mistyeyed parent and staff chaperones, great dance music, beautiful




decorations and a full, elegant meal make this prom a very special experience for all who attend or contribute to its success. Memories by Melissa's, Melissa Stacey, remembers the prom's first year when she volunteered her services to take photos of prom attendees, their dates and families. "When the kids were announced, they had the biggest smiles and were so excited. They felt so important."

"I cried like a baby that year," Mrs. Whiteley added.


Last year, Melissa and her oldest son, Jacob, not only were official photographers for a second time, but they were the proud family of Clayton, a Special Prom attendee. "It means

so much to the other parents and me. Our children's lives are usually so restrictive, but we get to see our child in a normal environment during this prom. It means so much," Melissa revealed.

There are some "special" changes from the regular prom's tradition. One change is that the Special Prom is held on campus and during a regular school day. "We can give our special education students the medical, physical and staff support they need. We have these resources on campus," Mrs. Whiteley said. Another change is that there is no cost to the students or parents. Preparations begin early. Throughout the school year, special



education students raise prom funds with their traveling coffee cart from which they sell their baked goods, coffee and flavored tea to staff. "The students cook and serve everything," Mrs. Whiteley said. However, businesses also donate their services or charge only at-cost prices. Donations from community members, parents and special education staff help



Clayton, a CHS junior, has attended the Special Prom for the last two years. "We get the hottest dates on campus," he said. "I like the dancing and get to take a date to the dance. The prom makes me feel good."

The Special Prom is a student-centered learning opportunity. The high school's culinary arts students cater and serve the meal. The graphic arts students use their


artistic abilities to create certificates. CHS cosmetology students provide hair and makeup services. A campus student is elected to be the DJ, and the CHS girls' basketball team helps fundraise and clean up. "Our overall goal is to make this a very student-oriented experience," Mrs. Whiteley stated. "It's a joy to watch the general education students get excited about participating in the Special Prom." These general education students learn so much. They learn the joy of giving.

In many ways, the Special Prom resembles any other spring prom. This prom has a king and queen, a royal court and awards. Danielle Lopez, a graduating senior, was crowned the 2014 Prom Queen after having been named a prom princess in 2013. A reminder of many of these students' medical vulnerability came when Danielle passed away on June 20, 2014. The prom and Danielle's school days meant so much to her, that Danielle's family chose to bury Danielle wearing her queen's crown.

The magic will happen again this year when the Calicos' dance studio is transformed into The Great Gatsby's most elegant party venue by Tom Adams and his wonderful crew at Victorian Sample.

"I want to really emphasize how much school and community support it takes to pull this event off. Shelby Curl, Misty Fletes, and many of our fellow teachers and coaches are all involved," Mrs. Whiteley stated. "A special thanks goes out to the administration for allowing this to happen."

Classrooms become dressing rooms. Male coaches and paraprofessionals help

dress the boys in their tuxes provided by Lone Star Western Wear. The girls' prom dresses are donated. "We now have about 50 dresses. CHS paraprofessionals alter the dresses to fit perfectly, and Corsicana Cleaners donates the cleaning and pressing of the dresses and tablecloths. The Spa of Corsicana's Lori Hippard creates prom up-dos. Boutonnieres and corsages are donated by the Corsicana Police Officer's Association and Wives Auxiliary. Steve Morgan provides snow cones and Erin Abay of 22TZU donates her photography services.


"It takes all of the special education team to make this event happen. Our wonderful team always works together to help in every way. We have the most supportive parents, grandparents and family friends who volunteer much of their time in assisting. My husband, James, is also super supportive," Mrs. Whiteley, a busy mother of two, said. "It takes a village."

"I've gotten to know these students. It's wonderful to watch the girls look into the mirrors, turn in circles and smile," Melissa said.

"And they are all giggles," Mrs. Whiteley added.

"Everything about this celebration is to create memories for our students and their parents. We have a father/daughter and mother/son dance, as well as a family photo," Mrs. Whiteley explained.

The adjective "special" can be applied to Mrs. Whiteley. "The Special Prom would never have happened without Mrs. Whiteley," Melissa revealed. "She is a caring, sharing teacher who goes above and beyond." NOW




When Barry Horne came to coach basketball at Dawson in 1978, the job ended up leading him down a road he never expected. 

Designing and building the house turned out to be quite the undertaking. The house was completed in 1997, but at the same







time, it will never be truly "complete." "It's a constant work in progress," Barry said. "The design and style was inspired by the lake, and I also like the Southwest style. The Southwest decor fills the main part of the house, and the tropical lake decor is most obvious in their cantina-inspired patio.

Some of their favorite features are the private decks for both bedrooms and the large adobe-inspired fireplace in the living room. but one decoration is repeated in several places. "I put a few Kokopellis up, and then everyone started giving us Kokopelli stuff," Barry said. "It's everywhere in the house! 
come down to the lake house to play music with him. Their house is a huge hit among their friends. "Once they get here, they don't want to leave," Barry admitted.





downtown preservation and businesses get busier, my job is going to get more challenging but much more enjoyable and fun," Sara Beth expressed. "A lot of people have approached me wanting to become involved. Just about everyone is interested in working to make Corsicana a real destination."

A team of those interested people make up the Main Street Advisory Board with which Sara Beth directly works. The board is 100-percent volunteer. "These volunteers live and/or work in Corsicana and are a huge influence on me, as well as Corsicana," she explained.

Four other volunteers man the visitor center three days a week. "These volunteers are so valuable. They know Corsicana's history well and help by telling stories and giving valuable information to visitors. We are looking for more of these volunteers," Sara Beth said.

Before taking this position, this Tyler native's main impression of Corsicana had been formed during her college years traveling between her home and Baylor University in Waco. "I spent many years

driving through Corsicana and knew it as the town with no turning lanes," Sara Beth revealed. "A lot of people view Corsicana as 'that city' between Tyler and Waco or Houston and Dallas. It is truly a hidden gem. My ultimate goal is to encourage people to stop, shop, tour and stay awhile." Being aware of a major problem inhibiting tourism is just one of the many strengths this 2012 BU graduate brings to her position.

Sara Beth first used her expertise in Dallas working as a corporate event planner alongside Lisa Buchannan with




Hello! Texas Destination Management. "Lisa was a true mentor. She let me learn from mistakes and taught me everything I know about the hospitality business," Sara Beth said, "but community event planning is much more satisfying. We are planning for local folks to come and have fun growing downtown."

Corsicana area residents have enjoyed the events that Sara Beth has coordinated including the expanded Second Saturday series and returning Pumpkin Patch, as well as the Taste of Downtown, which was an extremely popular new event.



"I approached all the restaurants with the Taste of Downtown idea, and they were immediately onboard. We only had two weeks to get the word out, and we expected to sell about 50 tickets. Instead, we sold 128 tickets! It's fun to see the event become so successful and see the smiles when kids get out and have fun," Sara Beth explained.

Downtown is enjoying a makeover and facelift. Fourteen buildings have been sold since Sara Beth came to town. "I love working the design aspect of this position — new colors, designs,



windows and awnings. We now have many buildings undergoing renovation," she said.

Investors and developers have seen the potential of new businesses moving into those buildings. "Most of the downtown businesses are family-owned and -operated," Sara Beth said. "Downtown has a real homegrown, down-home feeling. We work with the owners to promote the businesses through grand openings, creating an online presence and rebuilding and building of new Main Street sandwich board signs.









Recent visitors and business owners have commented on the increasing parking problem along Beaton Street. "Parking is a great problem to have! It means people are utilizing the downtown businesses and supporting the local business owners," Sara Beth said.

Downtown is becoming a popular residential area with developers offering loft apartments above stores for lease or for sale. "This is another success story. Most people in this area don't realize there are more than two dozen people living downtown," Sara Beth revealed.


Another aspect of her job is the operation of the electronic billboard located at I-45 and State Highway 31 (7th Street). "Its sole purpose is to attract visitors into the city to shop in our stores, eat in our restaurants and spend the night in our local hotels," Sara Beth said. "It's a primary draw into the city along with advertising in print media, such as *CorsicanaNOW*."

A typical day for Sara Beth begins by checking emails at 8:00 a.m. in her office at the visitor center. She spends about 50 percent of her day in her office and 50 percent downtown when not in meetings. "I check in with business owners regularly to get feedback and see if they need anything that we can help with. I love working downtown and developing relationships with owners," she said. Her day often goes into the evening hours with meetings or events.

The only child of Mike and Melody Wilson, Sara Beth credits her parents as being her lifelong mentors. "Whenever I've had an idea, they would just say, 'How high will you jump?" Both parents play tennis competitively, and Sara Beth loves to join them when she has spare time. A love of travel takes her to Napa, California, often, and Sara Beth studied abroad in Spain while at Baylor.

Future plans are to increase the number of benches and bronzes (two are already funded) and sandwich board signs. Sara Beth's five-year plan includes a completely revitalized downtown with every building occupied with businesses and/or residents. With her enthusiasm and professionalism combined with the cooperative efforts made by volunteers and the city of Corsicana staff and officials, Sara Beth is right to believe, "It won't be out of the ordinary for people to say, 'Let's go downtown!"



Don't Get Tricked by These Tax Scams

Each year, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) releases a "Dirty Dozen" list of common tax scams. The following ranked high in 2014, so keep an eye out for them.

Telephone Tax Refund Scams

Scam artists may pose as IRS employees or law enforcement in an attempt to steal your money or identity. These fraudulent callers might say you owe money or are entitled to a large refund.

- Red Flags: Callers generally use common names and false IRS badge numbers. They may be able to recite the last four digits of your Social Security Number, and some might even issue threats.
- Protect Yourself: Never give out any identifying information over the phone, no matter what the caller threatens. Hang up and contact the IRS to verify any issues with your return or refund. If there aren't any, report the tax scam to the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration at (800) 366-4484.

Phishing Emails or Websites

Scammers may use well-crafted, fake versions of tax-related websites and emails bearing the IRS logo to steal personal information.

• Red Flags: Emails claiming to be from the IRS (which doesn't contact taxpayers to request personal information) or websites that ask for personal or financial information in order to receive a refund.

• Protect Yourself: If you receive an email regarding your tax refund, do not reply, open any attachments or click any links. If you think you have found a suspicious website, let the IRS know.

Phony Return Preparers

While most tax preparation consultants file their clients' returns honestly, some will commit tax fraud scams or identity theft. You are responsible for your tax return even if you didn't prepare it, so do your research before letting someone else file for you.

- Red Flags: Preparers who don't offer electronic filing, who offer to file your return without a W-2 form or who don't sign your return or enter their Preparer Tax Identification Numbers (PTINs).
- Protect Yourself: Before selecting a tax preparation consultant, review their history and the status of their license. Make sure they have a PTIN, and avoid preparers who base their service fees on your refund amount. If you're looking for a safe, reliable way to file your return, try Turbo Tax. 

Measles Again

What is going on with measles? The United States was well on its way to eliminating this viral infection from this country. But today, measles (*rubeola*) is making a distressing comeback in big numbers. Recently, a visitor to Disneyland ended up bringing more than expectations for a fun-filled day. This person brought measles, which set off a reaction of contagion across multiple states and involving over 100 people. Many of those who were diagnosed with measles were directly connected to the case at Disneyland.

Over the years, there has been a steady decline in immunization rates. More and more citizens are traveling to countries that are still battling the disease. Reason dictates if you haven't been vaccinated, travel to a country with measles and come in contact with someone with the infection, you are more than likely to contract the infection and bring it home with you. Those who come in contact with you who have not been immunized will more than likely get measles, too. And, so the cycle will repeat itself until the immunization rates start to rise again.

Measles is highly contagious, which makes it so easy to catch from another person. Adding to the difficulty of contagion, measles is transmissible about four days prior to the rash's appearance. The symptoms of coughing, runny nose, sore throat, fever and conjunctivitis are symptomatic of many respiratory illnesses. Unless someone knows they have been exposed to measles, the diagnosis of measles probably will not be made until a rash known as Koplik spots appear.

Measles is not a benign illness. Thirty percent of people who get measles also develop secondary infections such as pneumonia, bronchitis, inflammation of the brain, diarrhea and ear infections. Measles in pregnant individuals can lead to premature birth or even pregnancy loss.

If you do contract measles, rest as much as possible. Take palliative measures to ease your symptoms, such as fever reducers and drink lots of liquids. Fever can be dehydrating. A humidifier can be helpful for your cough and sore throat. Check with your doctor before taking herbal supplements or vitamins for your symptoms.

If you want to eliminate your chances of contracting measles, then immunization is the most recommended course of action. If you choose not to take advantage of immunization, then please follow your doctor's instructions on what to do in case of a local outbreak. The only way to avoid the illness is to get your shots. NOW

1 3/4 lbs. lean ground chuck 2 eggs, beaten 1/2 cup milk 2/3 cup fine, dry breadcrumbs 1/4 cup onion, finely chopped 1 tsp. salt 1/2 tsp. chili powder Dash of pepper 1/2 cup ketchup 2 Tbsp. brown sugar 1/2 tsp. dry mustard

- **1.** Mix first 8 ingredients; shape into a loaf.
- **2.** Place into loaf-baking dish; bake at 350 F for 1 hour; drain fat.
- **3.** Combine last 3 ingredients; spread over baked loaf.
- **4.** Return loaf to oven; bake 10 additional minutes.

Salmon Fillet With Citrus and Thyme

Hint: Serve with brown rice and asparagus.

3 lbs. salmon fillets
1 tsp. olive oil
Dash of sea salt and black pepper
1 small orange, thinly sliced
1 lemon, thinly sliced
8 thyme sprigs

- 1. Preheat oven to 375 F.
- **2.** Place salmon on a baking sheet lined with parchment paper; drizzle with oil and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Bake 20-25 minutes.
- **3.** Place baked salmon on a serving dish; top with orange and lemon slices and thyme.
