

The sound of hoof striking wood, a nearly 1-ton bull snorting its displeasure and a bull rider quietly focusing on details that will help keep him on that bull — all that action and more is chronicled by the deep resonating tones of the longtime rodeo announcer, T.C. Long's, words as the Derrick Days Pro Rodeo crowd anticipates the outcome of man against bull. The bull rider nods, the gate opens and man and bull erupt into the arena. "We do whatever we can to put on a quality show and make it bigger and better every year," Ronald Burton, a bull rider turned clown/bull fighter and partner in VLK Rodeo Productions, stated.

His partner, rodeo judge and Kerens native David Atkeisson, concurred. "We bring in both the standard and non-traditional events each year and provide

something new. All the events are crowd pleasures." The events planned for this year's rodeo on April 28-29 at the Navarro County Expo Center include: tie-down roping, steer wrestling, saddle bronc riding, girl's break-away roping, team roping, bareback bronc riding, bull riding, American freestyle bull fighting and barrel racing. Last year, participants' ages ranged from a 12-year-old barrel racer to bull fighters and ropers in their 50s. The events are sanctioned by the Cowboys Professional Rodeo Association and the United Professional Rodeo Association.

Although pro rodeo participants come from all corners of Texas and neighboring states to compete for a payout of over \$16,000, the Derrick Days Pro Rodeo offers amateurs and people involved in other types of entertainment chances to participate. "We'll feature an equine drill team and involve local youth as much as possible," David said. Young kids participate in the mutton bustin' and the calf scramble. Area FFA chapters

operate concession stands, and a portion of the event's proceeds benefit the Go Texan Scholarship Fund. Shopping is available through area vendors. "We'd love to get even more area students involved, and it's always a challenge to provide new events and a good payout for contestants," David added.

The rodeo honors Navarro County's long history as a ranching and farming area. Some of the pro participants from this area include Justin Garris, a Blooming Grove freestyle bull fighter and former bull rider, and Chuck Goff, a Frost American freestyle bull fighter. "This is a fun rodeo that's getting more popular every year. I compete in area rodeos, since family comes first, and I like to see my friends compete," Chuck, a welder who's competed in rodeos for 11 years, stated.

The rodeo became a part of the annual Derrick Days in the early 1990s but hasn't been continuously associated with the event. About 30, mostly area corporate sponsors, help promote the rodeo. "Our sponsors and partners have been very faithful," David stated. "I remember the rodeo's earlier days and being so excited with the house packed. Then I went off to college. I came back and now get to judge several rodeos a year." The chief financial officer for Palestine ISD, David has helped produce this rodeo for the past four years. "I grew up in the country and around rodeos, starting with the Kerens High School Rodeo. I like to go to other rodeos to get new ideas. We are just rodeo nuts. It's an addiction." David serves on the board of directors of the CPRA and loves spending time with his wife, Leah,

and their two daughters, Lauren and Katherine, with all their many activities.

Working with David and Ronald will be 10-12 experienced staff members and two to three local volunteers. "We get the best livestock through three stock contractors," David said. Safety issues also have to be addressed for both the contestants and crowd members. "We hire Navarro County Sheriff deputies, and Ryan Farish, an emergency medical technician, helps coordinate our needs with the Corsicana Fire Department," David explained.

Two volunteers help promote the Derrick Days Pro Rodeo and are active throughout the community and other events. Ann Marett, a native of Fort Worth who grew up in Corsicana, moved back here to care for her mother after spending a 32-year career in marketing and public relations both in the high tech and magazine industries. In addition to serving on the Derrick Days board of directors, Ann volunteers with the arts, the Corsicana Preservation Foundation, the Corsicana Convention & Visitors Center and the Corsicana Orphans' Home Cemetery Project. Along with Carey Dean, a local radio personality at The Ranch, Ann has handled publicity for Derrick Days events for the past two years. "The rodeo's pure fun. I grew up going to the Fort Worth Stock Show & Rodeo every year," Ann said.

Carey admits that he's been involved in the Derrick Days Pro Rodeo almost

since it started. "I love the build-up to the event," he said. Contestants are attracted through several trade publications and the event is publicized through print media, radio, posters and through area sponsors/partners. "The rodeo brings in contestants who will stay over and contribute to the local economy," Carey explained. Volunteers with the rodeo have earned the Derrick Days Committee of the Year Award.

Ticket prices this year are \$10 for adults, \$5 for kids 12 and under and free to children under the age of 5. Tickets can be ordered online at www.vlkrodeoproductions.com or at area sponsors' business locations.

As exciting as this rodeo is for the packed houses of spectators on both evenings of competition, it's the area youth participants and pro competitors who really get their adrenaline rush. Ronald has spent 25 years in the sport of bull riding and bull fighting with 17 of those years as a rodeo clown earning Top Clown kudos from the CPRA. While he professes to enjoy the production end of rodeo life, his heart and humor still lie in his rodeo clown acts that entertain but have a very serious purpose, as he distracts irate bulls from fallen riders as they are rescued by the pick-up men in the arena. Known in the rodeo jargon as a barrelman, a documentary was filmed featuring Ronald as the Man in the Can. "It's a feel-good film about living your dream and the life of a rodeo clown," Ronald explained. "It's a joy to work with rodeo people, and rodeo fans are the greatest fans in the whole world. It's good, clean fun for the whole family, and where else can a cowboy work on weekends while wearing make-up and tights?" NOW

ABLESSED - By Virginia Riddle PEACEMAKER

A photo of a child hangs low on the wall by Det. Ronni Phillips' desk, daily reaffirming her personal mission in law enforcement. "This was my first case where a child was a victim and died," Det. Phillips recalled. "The suspect got life without parole. When justice is served for people like this child, it reminds me of why I'm here."

A native of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, Det. Phillips' childhood experiences gave her an empathy for children. Her dad served the public as a fireman, and though she wasn't interested in following in his footsteps, she did want to be a police officer. "I always wanted to test everything, so my family warned me away from a career in law enforcement. But I was determined, and now my family is proud of me," she said.

Following high school, Det. Phillips married; worked in banks; had her son, who is now serving in the U.S. Army; moved to






Texas and became a single, divorced mom in Waxahachie. "I had been a stayat-home-mom for nearly 10 years, and then I started working two jobs while going through the Navarro College Police Academy," she remembered.

Upon graduation, Det. Phillips became a Corsicana Police Department patrol officer in July 2006. In 2007, she became a canine officer, partnering with Rambo until his retirement in 2010. The landscape of Corsicana offers quite a learning experience for police officers. "With a lake, I-45 and a college, there are so many calls while on patrol. It makes the time go by fast. I've made so many contacts, especially with this community's tremendous business owners," Det. Phillips said. "I enjoy meeting people and learning what they do. I'll always talk to anybody."

Training and education helped her obtain a promotion to detective. A binder contains her many certifications. "Tm one class away from having an intermediate/advanced peace officer license," Det. Phillips revealed. "I'm



working on a criminal justice degree at Navarro College and would like to get a four-year degree in the subject. I try to take as many courses as I can. Some classes are mandated like the legal updates every two years. We have to keep up with Texas criminal and traffic laws, changes in technology and forensics. To be a police officer means going through a lot of training, but you want to know what you're doing."

Det. Phillips, like all her fellow officers, wears many hats on the job. "We have to be a disciplinarian, counselor and law enforcement customer service representative," she explained. Cases get referred by dispatch and patrol officers or can go straight to detectives if a major crime is involved. Detectives conduct general investigations on all cases above Class C misdemeanors to felonies. They take turns being on-call for a week at a time. "We prepare cases for the grand jury, process crime scenes, work with prosecutors and other agencies and obtain and serve arrest and search warrants. We must be neutral while finding the evidence and going where it takes us. Every crime is like a puzzle. We have to put the pieces together," Det. Phillips explained. "I do fight for my cases. I had to fight to be where I am today!"

The worst of times happen when a fellow officer is lost. "Being in law enforcement makes us so much more aware of our surroundings. We see what others don't and what people can be capable of doing, so we can develop trust issues," she said. "Also, all infant deaths





are tragic. We feel the pain, go on, but we can't forget. We learn to appreciate the good times because we see so much that's bad. We have to be strong and hold together at a scene for those who can't."

On the other hand, law enforcement officers experience some funny times. "Some people can say and do the most incredibly funny things. I have about 1,000 funny stories," Det. Phillips quipped. She also enjoys the public relations aspect of her job. "I read to students at Carroll Elementary. I've learned how much teachers are involved in kids' lives."

Joy on the job comes through her police family and in knowing that justice is served and that the work she and her fellow officers do makes an impact on someone's life. "I've gotten to learn, see and be a part of so much. It helps me to feel that I'm giving back to my community," Det. Phillips said. "It makes












someone's day when we solve a problem or reach out to them."

Her work can be exhausting. "We have to be multitaskers, and this is not a 9-5 job," Det. Phillips revealed. "We have to be available in all kinds of weather, hours and situations. It's hard to be away from our families during times of crises."

Equally hard for peace officers is to find folks who know what you see and do while on the job. Det. Phillips is married to Capt. Jeramy Phillips, who's over the Navarro County Sheriff's patrol and SWAT unit. Together, they are raising their 15- and 8-year-old children. "When I walk out my office door, I'm me. I leave work at work, but my husband and I understand each other well. My children still need a sensitive, comforting mom at home," she said. The couple are very involved in their children's lives and at their church, the Lone Star Cowboy Church. "A parent is a leader to a child. We lead by example," Det. Phillips explained. Camping; animals, especially horses; school activities; FFA activities; and learning to play the guitar and banjo are things she enjoys. "I sing in church in the band ministry. My passion is to never take time for granted but spend it with my family," she said. She also loves to decorate their home for Halloween and Christmas. "I go above and beyond. I want my kids, and eventually my grandkids, to always remember these holiday times."

Det. Phillips advises young people interested in a law enforcement career to also lead by example and not get into trouble. "Corsicana has a hometown atmosphere and a potential for growth and development, so officers will be needed. Make sure it's really what you want, and then follow your passion. We are all people — sons, daughters, mothers, fathers. Stay strong and on the right path. I know I'm here because God put me here to help people."




Downtown Atmosphere


"I've lived in town all my life," Irvin said. "I'm used to the trains and the fast pace of downtown life."

Slow Cooker Enchiladas

- 2 lbs. lean ground beef
- 2 1-oz. pkgs. taco seasoning mix
- 2 1/2 cups water
- 2 12-oz. jars chunky salsa
- 2 10.75-oz. cans condensed cream of mushroom soup
- 2 10.75-oz. cans condensed cream of chicken soup
- 8 cups Mexican cheese blend, shredded (divided use)
- 20 6-inch corn tortillas, quartered
- **1.** Crumble ground beef into a skillet over high heat; cook while stirring until beef is evenly browned.
- **2.** Add taco seasoning and water; simmer for 15 minutes over low heat.
- **3.** In a medium bowl, stir together salsa and both soups. Mix in 7 cups of cheese.
- **4.** Cover a slow cooker's bottom with a layer of tortillas; add a layer of the beef mixture,

then a layer of the cheese mixture.

- **5.** Repeat layers; end with a layer of tortillas; top with remaining cup of cheese.
- **6.** Cover; cook on high for 45 minutes.

Jicama-orange Salad

- I small red onion, sliced
- 1/2 cup orange juice
- 1 Tbsp. olive oil
- 1 Tbsp. rice wine vinegar
- 1/8 tsp. pepper
- I medium jicama, peeled and cut into strips
- 2 cups orange sections
- 1/2 cup avocado, diced
- 1 Tbsp. cilantro, chopped
- **I.** In a skillet, cook the red onion, orange juice, olive oil, rice wine vinegar and pepper in a skillet for 3 minutes.
- 2. Toss the onion mixture in a large bowl

with the jicama and orange sections.

3. Top with avocados and cilantro.

- 1 8-oz. pkg. cream cheese, softened
- 1 14-oz. can Eagle Brand Condensed Milk

Potato Soup


- 1 lb. bacon, fried crisp and crumbled


