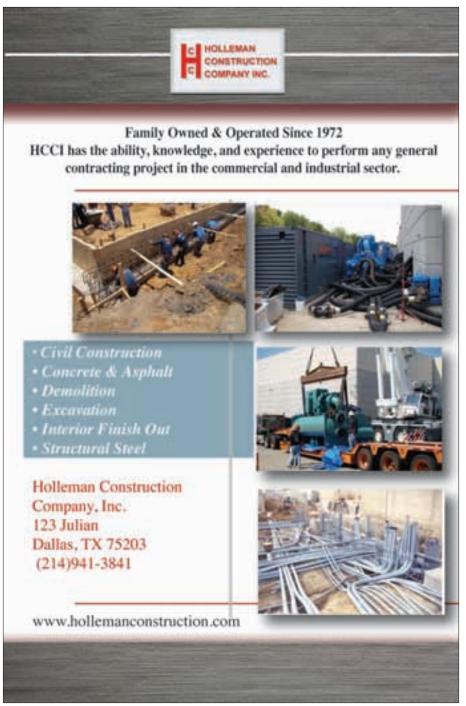
never had to borrow money again." Holleman Construction Company began in 1971 and has truly been a family business with all three sons working there at some point.

Part of the fun of having such a large family is all the memories you help create with the grandkids. Asa and Billie have traveled the world and have opened up a tiny bit of it for their



grandkids. They have taken them to Disneyworld, Disneyland and Hawaii, to name a few places. Since Asa's retirement 16 years ago, they no longer travel as much and their son, Chris, now owns the business. Billie and Asa both have continued to serve in Christian organizations, even after struggling through several surgeries. They moved to Midlothian over 30 years ago and are well-known in the community. Asa stated, "We are now members of Midlothian Bible Church."

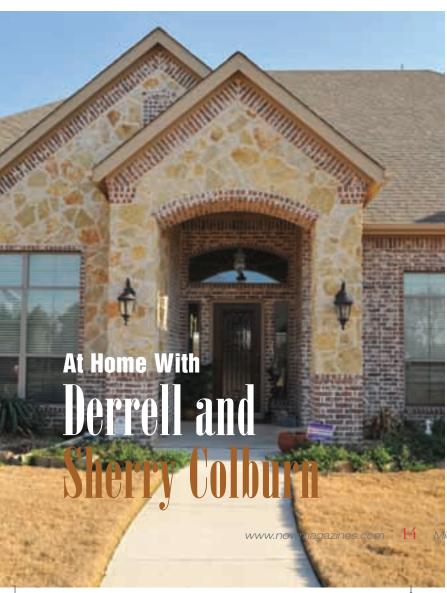

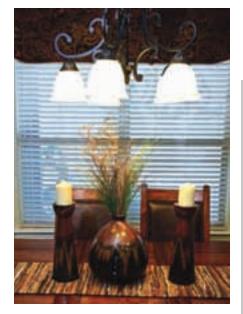

From the hand-scraped hardwood to the custom-textured walls, the home, designed and built by John Houston, is beautiful. It is 3,500 square feet of family fun, with a huge backyard of one acre. "We added the covered porch and outdoor fireplace when we moved in," Sherry added. "It has just been our greatest joy."

The couple designed only the outdoor living area; the rest of the home was already perfect for their lifestyle when they found it. Built in 2008, the house has four bedrooms and three-and-a-half bathrooms. The bedrooms form a semi-circle around the perimeter of the central living area, which opens to the kitchen.



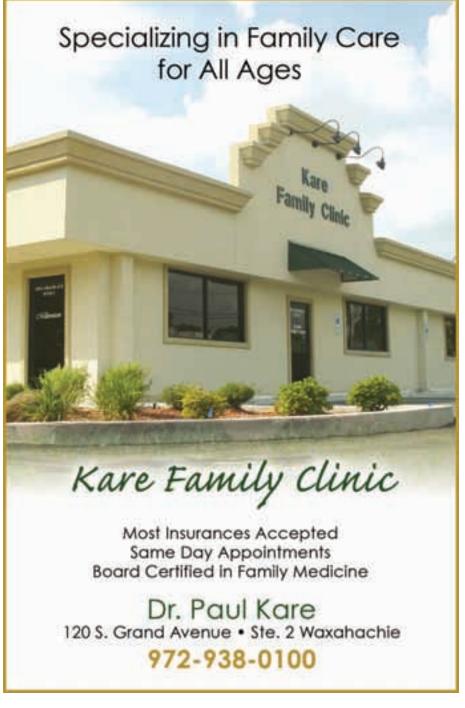


Upstairs is a game room Mimi and Paw Paw say belongs to their seven grandchildren. "I have age 17 down to 1 year old," Sherry said proudly. "When they come over, they disappear to the room upstairs. They know it's their room."

The walls display custom paint and texture techniques, but the windows are the real focal point of each area. They are as unique as the carpentry throughout the rest of the home, since Sherry is a seamstress who creates her own window treatments, often following the design of fabric to cut scallops on a valance or add finishing touches. The thing that makes her talent stand out is that she never uses a pattern. She just measures, finds that perfect bolt of fabric and creates a unique look; all this on an old Singer sewing machine. Derrell used to complain about the short-term mess his wife's creativity requires, but











when he realized the cost of purchasing custom window treatments, "He said I could keep the sewing machine," Sherry laughed. "Somehow, I can sew in chaos."

It is funny how creative people always

know what they have in their piles. "Sherry knew where all of hers was, too. It just about all used to be on my pool table," Derrell said. "We lived in our other house {in DeSoto] for nearly 25 vears." Now, with the newfound space they enjoy, the only remnant of sewing is Sherry's machine, which sits on a small sewing desk against a wall in one

of three spare bedrooms. Although she is talented enough to make a business of her interior decorating, Sherry prefers to design the decor only in her own home. "I do it for myself, because when you make it a business, it takes

the fun away," she said.

This is their dream home, but there was nothing easy about moving 24 years of belongings to a new place. They both admit they still have not found

> everything they packed into boxes last year. Beyond that, although their interests have stayed the same, many of their collections of little things have evolved or gone away completely. "I love birds, and I used to collect ducks. Those are all pretty much gone now," Sherry said. "This house needed something different."

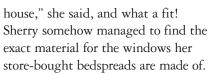

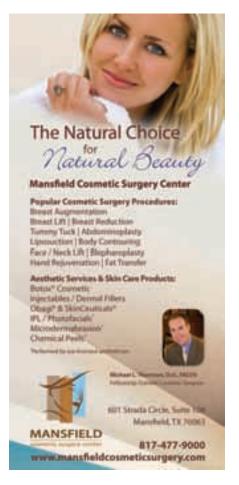

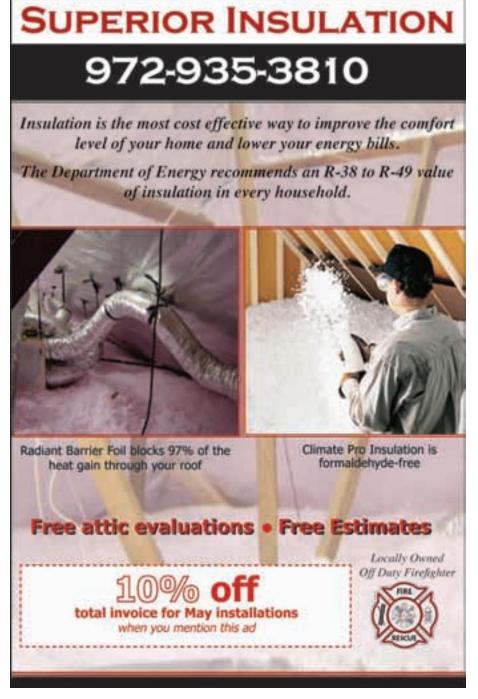

Married for 36 years, they are the creative minds and loving hands behind beautiful hand-made pieces, which include throws, blankets and gift baskets.

Although Sue has always dabbled in artistic endeavors, it took a trip to her sister-in-law's home in Missouri to open Sue's eyes to what she could really do. "I didn't know I could do all of this stuff," she laughed, when asked how she got started. While in Missouri, Sue observed her sister-in-law crafting homemade candles. Sue discovered she had a knack and interest in creating her own designs.

Sue's sister-in-law used straight paraffin wax when creating her candles, but Sue decided to go a step farther. She decided to use blended waxes, getting the most for her money. By



chance, Sue created the first product on her candle journey. "I'd do fun designs like making the candles look like hot fudge sundaes, pies and cakes," she added. "I made them into really decorative items."

Sue, who is a bus monitor for special needs children, and Donnie, who is retired, share responsibilities in their hobby. Donnie, who does a lot of the sewing for different projects, likes to describe himself as the chief cook and bottle-washer. "I clean up a lot of stuff," he laughed. Throughout his life, he has held jobs as an electrician, mechanic and ranch hand, and is skilled at working with his hands. Though it may seem unusual that he does the bulk of the sewing, he does not mind mentioning his mother taught him how at a young age.

Sue and Donnie may have begun with the art of candle making, but they have added other fine crafts to their repertoire, including throws, Bible bags and fabric crosses,

which are some of their favorite items to create. Sue has even created a candle she said lasts forever and is currently working on fashioning custom bibs for special needs children and adults. "I was shocked at myself," she said. "Now, I've been creating items six or seven years, and it's like nothing else."

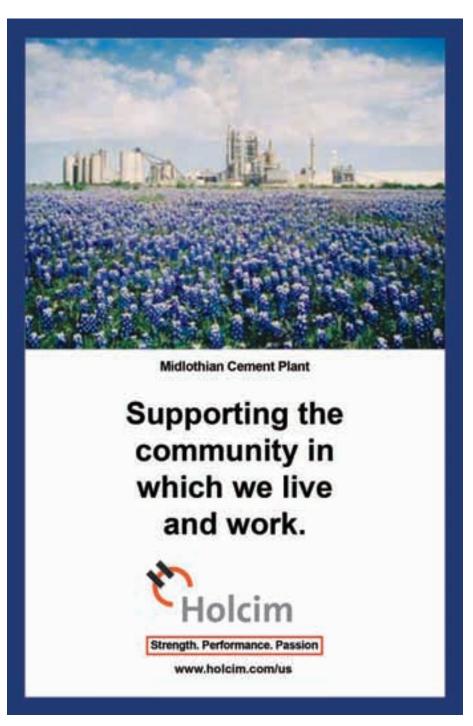

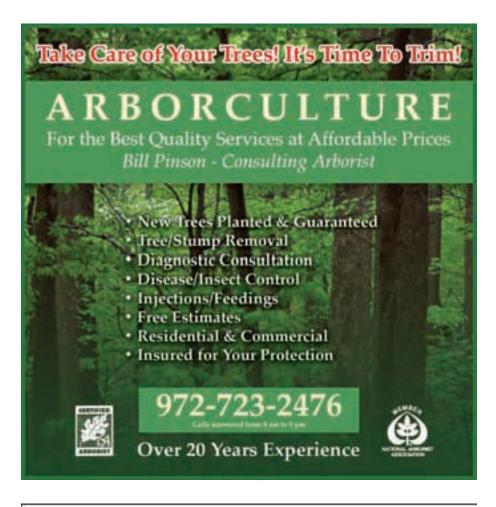

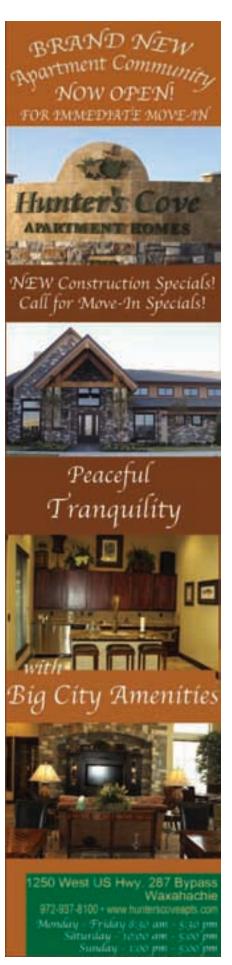

Christine Engebreton started yoga to pursue the most noble of goals — to touch her toes. She said, "I could do cardio all day long but it really bothered me that I couldn't touch my toes! I wanted more flexibility and I couldn't balance on one leg for very long at all." Christine, who goes by Chris, definitely reached her goal of becoming more flexible and not letting her initial hesitancy on her first visit stop her. She stated, "I wasn't sure I liked it on that first visit. The reason I went back to it was it was relaxing," she explained. "At that time, I was a young mother with kids and not taking any time out for myself. Yoga gave me that one hour of peace and calmness. At least once a week, I was doing yoga and it started to grow from there. Now I do it every day. It gets the blood circulating and calms the mind. My flexibility and balance have improved dramatically. My strength and inner peace [are] also [a] major improvement."

As an exercise enthusiast, Chris was familiar with the aches and pains, which

come with pushing your body physically. She shared, "Yoga is the type of workout you can do at any age. That was one of the reasons I decided to dive into yoga. I can't do step programs forever, and I can't do kick-boxing forever, but I can do yoga when I'm 100. As we get older, we lose balance and the metabolism slows down. It is harder to lose weight. Yoga is gentle, noncompetitive and nonjudgmental. Everybody can come as they are and not beat themselves up

because they can't do what the person next to them is doing."

Performing yoga takes care of a multitude of fitness concerns. Chris acknowledged that when doing yoga, she does not need to do other exercises. "Yoga gets my heart rate up; [by] doing a lot of different poses I get a cardio workout. I'm doing weight lifting, because of all the pushups and the muscle squeezing and contracting to help strengthen the muscles. Strength





training, weight loss and muscle gain are all the things you don't usually associate with yoga."

Chris has practiced yoga for 10 years. She now teaches yoga to eager participants wanting to be schooled in the areas of exercise and brings a sense of inner calmness to their lives. "Yoga has been around for over 5,000 years. Some say it is a science and some say it is an art. I think it is both. It is definitely a



science of the body. It is very well studied and the effects of it are well documented. For the artist in me, I am in touch with the grace of the movements."

Chris taught yoga for six years before she decided to enroll at Sunstone Yoga in Dallas for a more intensive look at the sport. Sunstone Yoga is known primarily for hot yoga. Hot yoga helps to make the muscles less tight; more flexible. The profuse sweating is believed to have cleansing effects. She explained, "My exercises were done in 98.6 degrees and 60-percent humidity. The training lasted for one year. I could live 10 lifetimes and still not understand everything there is about yoga. During my training there, I learned different branches of yoga, breathing techniques, meditation and the history and philosophy of yoga. I became certified, and once I had that certification, I thought I needed to deliver it to more people."

The teaching she received helped her determine the best positions for different body types, as well as learning how to avoid injuries. "I wanted to make it safer for everyone," she said. "For example, if

One of the common misconceptions is that yoga is merely a bunch of chanting hippie types. Although there is a form of yoga that does involve chanting, the

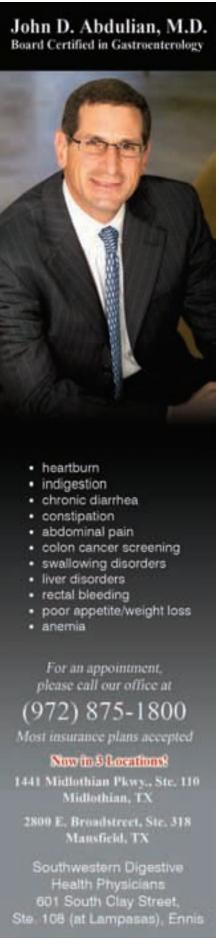

He stated, "In the industry, it is called micro overlay, because it is very thin — one-eighth of an inch. We can do a false finish to make it look like a flagstone pattern with individual stone. If you have a commercial property and you

have big heavy trucks coming in and out all the time, you couldn't have real stones because they would crack. This you can drive over because it has double the strength of concrete. It has compressive strength that gives it resistance to cracking."

There is no need to feel left out if you already have the traditional concrete driveway or walkway. The overlay can be placed over it with whatever design works for you. Todd added, "If you have concrete that is weathered with cracks or the surface has washed off and you can see the big rocks in it, we can come put an overlay on it and make it look like new for a fraction of the cost of tearing it out and re-pouring. If you are pouring new concrete and you want that look, you can get it with a stamp. Stamping the concrete would probably be more economical than doing the overlay once the concrete is dry. We can put a sealer on it to resist anything dripping on it, like oil or tree sap that would stain it. We also do regular concrete work for sidewalks, walkways or patios."

This amazing product also works inside the home. Todd can make your flooring look exactly like tile but without the worry of grout line hassles or the tile popping off. He said, "The benefit of micro overlay is you can do all of these patterns but not raise the height of your flooring. So, you can make your kitchen floor look like laid-in-place flagstone, but it is not actually flagstone but a concrete product that is very

smooth and easy to mop. It is sealed so you don't get any stains on it, but get the look of flagstone, brick or slate. It is a neat product because we can go and do things where others can't because it is such a thin overlay."

Fortune Cookie Frogs

Do you remember dissecting those little frogs reeking of formaldehyde back in junior high school? Of course you do. It is one of those memories recalled when you fall prey to a certain sentimental wooziness about your school days. Chances are after you cut into your frog you found ... well, frog stuff, but when a select group of seventh-grade students at Frank Seale Middle School (FSMS) started to dissect their frogs, they got something extra. Don Kirby, eighthgrade teacher of Integrated Science at FSMS, spoke of pulling light-hearted pranks occasionally. He explained, "A few years ago when the seventh grade was dissecting frogs, I went to the lab after school and typed up all of these sayings, such as eat more chicken, I love science, you go Frank Seale and this teacher rocks. I laminated them and put them down the frogs. When the students opened up the frogs during dissection, they saw the notes, told the teacher and she didn't know what was

going on. Kids need a sense of humor. I want them to enjoy science while they are learning it. I think they learn it better that way. That's my philosophy. If they enjoy my class, I think they will do better in it."

Another favorite activity for Don and his students involves the outdoors and getting wet. "I love watching the kids learn," he said. "I like to see them be able to relate real life situations to science. An example of this is something you see in physics called action reaction. I do a demonstration involving bottle rockets. I bring an air compressor up here and have the kids make bottle rockets. They can see that if you apply a little bit of air pressure to these water rockets, they will fly a long way. It is a real-life application, because it involves rockets and flying. I usually get wet and stay wet all day long."

Enjoying Don's class does not mean unrestrained amusement. He is very clear about his expectations for his students.

"Just because we have fun doesn't mean that I won't hold them accountable," he declared. "I still have rules in the classroom. They still have to raise their hand if they have something to say, still have to be respectful and stay focused in class. I treat them like young adults, with respect. It is important for teachers, in my opinion, to always say thank you. It is also important for me to listen to my students, not just to hear them. I try to be a very good listener and respond back to them. If they see me doing that, hopefully it will be a good model for them."

Don graduated from the University of Texas at Arlington with a degree in biology. He discovered teaching after 30 years of working at the Institute of Forensic Science in Dallas as a medicallegal investigator and performing forensic investigations. Sometimes he shares his experiences with the students. "If it is science-related and I can relate it to the children, then I do. It's real-life application." Don's venture into education as a career started when a friend encouraged him to get into the Coast Guard. He joined the Coast Guard Reserves and served for 26 years before he was ever activated. He was finally activated once for Desert Storm and once for post 9/11. After retiring from the military, he decided to look into teaching. He stated, "The military has a program called Troops to Teachers to encourage troops to go into teaching. I love science and have a background in it. You could call me a science nerd. I think it makes the world go around. I thought it was a good opportunity to share my enthusiasm with the kids."

Don enjoys sharing his passion for science with the students in Midlothian. The eighth-grade Integrated Science class at FSMS is a variety of different disciplines involving chemistry, physics, scientific method and genetics. "Midlothian has outstanding students," he said. "It has outstanding parental

support. The Midlothian Independent School District encourages its teachers to build relationships with students and then engage them. You have to build these relationships for them to learn effectively in your classroom. My students have to realize that I care for them, and I will go that extra mile for them. That doesn't mean that I give them anything. I hold them accountable and treat them like young adults. They

understand that if they don't do their homework, lack focus in class or study for tests, then they won't pass science class. Eighth grade can be difficult for some students. Academically and socially, it can be challenging. Besides teaching them science, I try to teach them values about character, perseverance and for them to do their best every day." To sum it all up, Don expressed the same emotion most good teachers experience. "When I see a student grasp a concept or understand something I said, then it makes it all worthwhile. I think that is the way most teachers here feel." WW

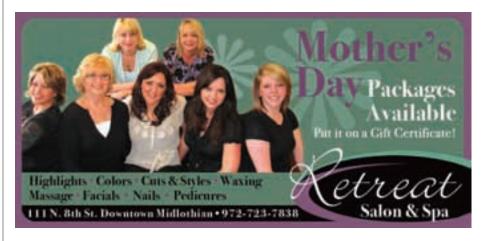

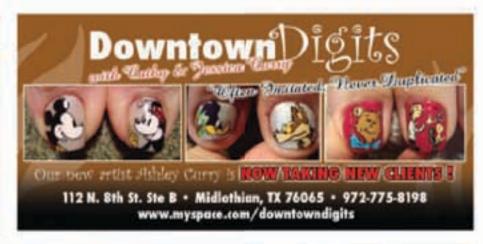

1 1/2 cups milk, divided use

3 Tbsp. flour

8 oz. processed American cheese, cubed 1/2 lb. sliced bacon, cooked and crumbled Combine first 8 ingredients in a large pot. Bring to a boil; cook 20 minutes, or until potatoes are tender. (If freezing, only boil for 10-12 minutes.) Remove from heat; add cooked ground beef. Stir milk into flour; add to soup mixture. Add cheese. (If freezing, let the soup cool and freeze in gallon-size Ziploc bags or jars, filled 3/4 of the way.) Cook, stirring constantly, until cheese is melted and soup is thickened. Garnish with crumbled bacon before serving.

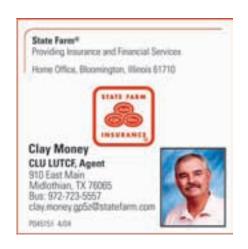

Is CD Laddering Right for You?

With the recent volatility in the stock market, people are hesitant to put their entire nest egg into the market. Additionally, with the economy creating tight times for families, it's often necessary to make sure funds are available if and when we need them. For those investors who are either reluctant to jump head first into the market or those who may have a need for cash, the strategy of laddering Certificates of Deposit (CDs) may be appropriate.

CD laddering is the process of structuring your investment into CDs to take advantage of the higher rates afforded by longer-term time deposits, yet maintaining liquidity by arranging it so that equal portions of the invested money is available periodically. To accomplish this, you

begin by buying numerous CDs with various maturities.

For instance, let's say you have \$25,000 to invest. Rather than investing the \$25,000 in one CD that matures at a designated time, by laddering CDs, you may choose to invest \$5,000 in each of

five separate CDs. In this example, you

would then purchase a 1-year, 2-year, 3-year, 4-year, and

5-year CD in equal amounts of \$5,000. After one year, when your first CD matures, you would invest it in a new 5-year CD. Each year, a CD will expire and, if the funds are not needed, they will be reinvested in a new 5-year CD to take advantage of the higher interest rate typically offered by a 5-year CD as compared to the 1- or 2-year CDs.

This approach allows you the comfort of knowing that a CD will mature each year in case you need the money, yet still take advantage of the higher rates typically offered for longer maturities. Staggering your maturity dates also helps

smooth out the volatility of the market.

If interest rates rise during the year, you will have money available to invest in a higher rate CD. Or, if rates fall, only a portion of your investment dollars will need to be reinvested at the lower rate.

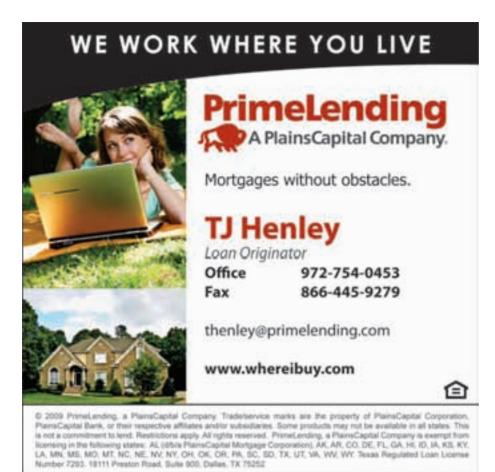

The month of May is designated for stroke awareness. It is a great time to focus on another aspect of your health. Throughout the month, various agencies, groups and medical personnel will endeavor to influence your awareness of the danger of having a stroke and inform you on how to recognize if you or someone else is having a stroke. Information will be available about how to become involved in your community

There exist ample reasons why increased knowledge about strokes is important. As the third-leading cause of death and the number one reason for disability, the numbers are disturbing enough to warrant concern. A brief look at the breakdown of the numbers is even more alarming. More women die from stroke than breast cancer. African-Americans have double the risk of having a stroke than do Caucasians. Also, compared with Caucasians, the strokes suffered by African-Americans tend to be far more disabling.

and pass the word on to others.

Strokes are so dangerous due to what occurs when a stroke takes place. When a blood vessel to the brain becomes damaged for any reason, and blood flow is disrupted, cells in that area of the brain start to die and brain damage results. Whatever area of the brain is affected, those abilities will be severely compromised or lost. The earlier treatment is received for a stroke, the better. If medication is received within a three-hour window, you can diminish damage to those areas of the brain affected and improve chances for survival. One of the slogans used by the National Stroke Association to help educate the public is Act F.A.S.T., which stands for face, arms, speech and time. If a stroke is suspected, take a close look and determine if one side of the face is drooping. Determine if there is any weakness in the arms. Is speech difficult; is there any slurring of the words? Time is crucial.

If any of these symptoms are present, call 9-1-1.

Because the effects of having a stroke are so debilitating, and an option is available for diminishing many of those effects, it is critical for the public to have the correct information, hence, the reason for May being Stroke Awareness Month. You might notice bulletin boards in schools and health care facilities all raising the awareness of strokes.

Eighty percent of all strokes are preventable. Watching your diet, cholesterol and weight are a few steps you can take to avoid a stroke. Take advantage of this month to increase your knowledge and your chances of surviving a stroke.
