





# ANOMENT Of Of Control of Control

Memorial Day weekend traditionally heralds the beginning of summer with its picnics, baseball games, camps and school vacation that's just over the horizon. Family and friends gather for fun and fellowship with cookouts and trips to the spray parks, swimming pools or Lake Richland Chambers. Nestled amongst the hustle and bustle of activities on this holiday weekend is a quiet, beautiful place in Corsicana. Oakwood Cemetery, with its tall American flag, is the site of many veterans' graves where, on this weekend, smaller flags are placed in honor of their service to their country. "Oakwood is a beautiful cemetery. There are so many stories to tell from the graves," Dana Stubbs said.

Dana, director of the Liz Gillispie Genealogy Department of the Corsicana Public Library, along with her husband, Norman, love to tell the stories of those buried within the rolling terrain of the cemetery. "I have always been interested in history and genealogy," Norman said. "As a child, I asked my momma about a tricycle that was in a case in the cemetery." His mother explained that a child was buried there.

Dana's interest in genealogy was sparked when the couple started dating. "I asked Norman what CSA stood for," she remembered. She learned that CSA stands for Confederate States of America. Since that time, the couple has cultivated a shared interest in history by taking vacations to visit cemeteries across the nation and attend Civil War reenactments.

Norman, a sixth-generation paper hanger and painter with a family business dating to the 1890s in Corsicana, has family members buried in Oakwood Cemetery, along with Dana's ancestors who settled in Navarro County in 1858. "I love history. I started reading about Cynthia Ann Parker when I was young and 'in the way' in my grandfather's antique store," Dana said. "I was hooked on history."

Grave markers in the cemetery rarely tell the whole story. While Oakwood Cemetery has historical markers for notables such as Texas Governor Beauford Jester and Elizabeth Glover, the Mother of Confederate





which the couple is continuing to do, more historical markers may be erected and stories can be shared on such Web sites as http://rootsweb.ancestry.com. Such information is valuable to people searching for their own roots and branches of their family trees.


Owned and maintained by the city of Corsicana, Oakwood Cemetery's first burial dates to the pre-Civil War year of 1851. Re-internments of remains from earlier Catholic and Methodist cemeteries located nearby were some of the first burials in Oakwood.

Among the graves are many who have died in service of their country. Memorial Day traces its roots to the Civil War days when women from the South decorated graves of both Union and Confederate fallen soldiers. The day was first officially observed May 5, 1868, when General John Logan, national commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, placed flowers on graves of Union and Confederate soldiers buried in Arlington Cemetery. The date became a federal three-day holiday with passage of the National Holiday Act of 1971. While the intent was to honor veterans who had paid the ultimate sacrifice, many families pay their respects during the holiday weekend to those veterans who served but survived to return home and contribute further to their communities.

"There is someone buried in Oakwood from every war except the Revolutionary War," Norman said. There are over 500 Confederate Army veterans including two generals. Confederate Airman Pvt. Adolphus E. Morse, the last man who went up in a "Oakwood is a beautiful cemetery.

balloon (aeronaut), is buried in Oakwood. Another interesting story surrounds Confederate Colonel Albert Miller Lea, a graduate of West Point Military Academy, who later settled in Corsicana and is buried in Oakwood. He paid, as a parent, the ultimate sacrifice. He was at the Battle of Galveston when his son, Edward Lea, a Union officer, died in his arms.

Among the many veterans' graves that will bear flags on Memorial Day are Lt. Frank Benson, James P. Lumpkin, Arthur D. McKinney, Jr., Lt. Alfred Marion






Gibson and Dana's relative, Zane Christie. Lt. Benson was not killed in action but died like many wartime veterans of disease (pneumonia) in 1917, at age 25, while in training. James P. Lumpkin died at age 30 in France on Armistice Day 1918. Pilot "Sonny" McKinney

was killed in 1945 at age 24 while piloting his plane, which was hit by enemy ackack (anti-aircraft fire). He hit his target but went down in water off Formosa (Taiwan). His body was not recovered. Another pilot whose remains were not recovered was Lt. Gibson, who at age 28, died piloting his F-86 when it exploded and crashed into the Mediterranean Sea off the shores of Libya. Staff Sgt. Christie was killed at age 22 in Vietnam in 1970.











Some veterans' lives were cut short due to physical complications resulting from their service. One such case was that of Cliff Pagano, who served as an intelligence officer in Alaska during the Korean War and Cold War Era. Fluent in Russian, he aspired to be an astronaut in spite of injuries sustained when he had thrown himself on a grenade. He died at age 42 in 1962.

History of all sorts is recorded in the epitaphs of Oakwood Cemetery. Joel Trimble, composer of the "CHS Fight Song," is buried in Oakwood along with coaches and players from former championship CHS teams. Graves of Navarro County's founders, movers and shakers, the famous, not so famous and infamous can be found among the rolling hills.

Among the infamous are several "ladies-of-the-night." "Corsicana was a pretty wild town. We were one of two towns in Texas that had licensed red-light districts. The other town was Galveston," Dana revealed.

Norman and Dana will continue to enjoy their shared hobbies of visiting cemeteries to find ancestors, Hood's Brigade and Navarro Rifles veterans and stories. Along the way, they also study the Old West. "We like stories about outlaws and scalawags," Norman said.

"For me, it's all about preservation," Dana added.

On Memorial Day, Norman and Dana will pause, as all Americans are asked to do at 3:00 p.m. local time, for a National Moment of Remembrance. It's a moment of silence to remember and honor the fallen. NOW

On Sunday afternoons starting in March each year, anyone in listening distance to the Optimist Softball Complex at Nature Park is sure to hear a series of loud pops. That distinctive sound of a bat connecting to a softball is a welcome sign, reminding everyone that summer is well on its way.

Chances are very good those sounds come from the Lady Texans girls' select softball team as they practice for their next tournament. The team's coaches — Kris Matthews, Kevin Ward, Troy Reid and Coby White — each bring unique perspectives and history to the practices.

"We were asked to coach the 10 and under softball team in Dawson back in 2006, and back then, none of us knew all that much about softball," Kris remembered. Through a variety of factors that included attending tournaments, watching softball games on television and a good dose of pure tenacity, all four men quickly became educated in the nuances of what makes a successful, winning girls' softball team.

"I knew a little bit about the sport, as we had all coached a Dawson team, so when the idea to form a girls' select softball team was mentioned in 2007, we met with the parents and decided to go ahead and form the team," Kris said.

After that, the coaches continued to learn more about the game of softball from a variety of sources. "We picked other coaches' brains, watched other teams play and paid close




attention to how they did certain things compared to how we do them," Kevin explained. "We started picking up tips from each tournament and, along with watching videos of games, we are continually learning new drills and techniques to teach the girls."

It was a winning combination, apparently, as Kris recounted that the Lady Texans took fourth, fifth and first in their first three tournaments, an admirable record by anyone's standards. "Team success is determined by several factors, I think. The parents are great and do so much for the team, always with a wonderful attitude, and the other coaches are fantastic," Kris said. "And we couldn't do this without my wife and Kevin's sister, Kami Ward-Matthews." In addition to tournament fees, the parents transport the girls to and from practice and tournaments, as well as help with fundraisers that pay for uniforms and equipment.


While each team has its own unique characteristics, the game itself is earmarked with some basic tenants shared by all members. For example, pitches are always performed "windmill" style, always underhanded, and the bats used by most teams are composite with smaller barrels, which make them significantly lighter than regular baseball bats.

The 12-girl Lady Texans team practices from 2:00-4:00 p.m. Sundays at the 24.5 acre park, located at 2200 Oak Valley Road. According to the city of Corsicana Web site, part of the park is leased to the Girls Softball League Association, a very successful city program.

By all indications, 2012 will be a busy year for the team. "We began to attend tournaments in April and will continue our weekly practices and tourneys all the way through the middle of December," Kris said. Tournaments generally host 20 or more teams, and the Lady Texans are especially excited about the "Triple Crown" tournament that starts June 1.

"The parents are a fantastic part of the success of the team. We would have a hard time without their financial help and willingness to take the girls to and from practice and tournaments," Kris shared.

Kevin said weekly practices follow a similar sequence of events. "We start with drills at each station, with the goal being repetition, repetition, repetition,

as repetition creates muscle memories in each player. We want the girls, who range in age from 14 to 16, to work on their



mental state while they are tired. They need to make themselves focus no matter how tired they feel," he said.

Kris agreed. "We tell them to play during practice as if they are in a real game. By the time they are done with practice, they have usually given 110 percent of themselves." During practice, Troy and Coby work with the girls on their hitting. It isn't unusual in fast pitch softball to see the pitcher throw the ball at speeds that average around 60 miles per hour.

Three of the girls on the Lady Texans team live in Navarro County, while the rest live an average of one to three hours away from Corsicana, some as far away as Dublin and Stephenville. With no hesitation about living that far away and

continually attending each week's practice, dedication and a love of the game are evidently a hallmark of the team.

While winning a tournament is always great, using weekly practices and attending tourneys to prepare the girls for higher education, as well as life, is a goal each coach shares. "Yes, the tournaments are fun, but what we really want to do is get the girls interested in participating in college sports and the scholarship opportunities that go hand-in-hand with that," Kevin said.

"We've got kids being looked at by colleges, which is the real payment we get for coaching the team," Kris said. "Along with fostering in them a love of the game, we get the kids into 'select,' which keeps them out of trouble." According to softball vernacular, the word "select" is a category used to describe the top softball players in an area.

The coaches also help the girls create résumés, which they hand out at colleges. "You want them to have all the opportunities and scholarships possible," he said, noting that thanks to such efforts, the girls are regularly recruited by colleges throughout the country.

"In 2007, nobody knew what select was," Troy said. "We've watched softball grow as a sport to where it is probably the biggest girl's sport out there today, and the Lady Texans is a perfect representation of how great the sport can be."

All the coaches agreed that the girls are learning so much more than how to play a good game of softball. "Out there on the field, attending weekly practices and competing in tournaments, they are learning invaluable life rules such as discipline, respect and sportsmanship," Kris stated.

Each coach has a focused interest in making sure the girls on the Lady Texans team have every opportunity for success in and out of the game. Kevin summed it up this way. "As their coaches, we sort of become their extended family, and we want only the best for each one of them." NOW

(2012), Producer of the Year, Songwriters of the Year, Best Duo and Tex's individual awards for his playing and singing in several categories.


Mary's office occupies the other bedroom. From this headquarters, she operates the family business appropriately titled Miles of Memories. An ouzo bottle and


"This program has literally become my entire life," Sarah confessed. "I work with four kids, and to hear them call me 'Granny Sarah' is an indescribable joy."

The Foster Grandparents Program began in 1967 as a part of the Older Americans Act of 1965, according to Director Larry Lynch, who has been at the helm of the Mexia-based program since 2003. It is funded through a federal grant from the Corporation for National and Community Service under the Senior Corps umbrella.

"It all began as part of the national equal opportunity movement that started gaining momentum in the '60s," Larry said. "There are programs like ours in every state now, with 17 programs currently active in Texas. Our program serves children and seniors in Limestone, Freestone, Navarro and Bell counties. The Corsicana program currently has approximately 20 volunteers who serve children at the Boys & Girls Club, Two Dimensions Preparatory Academy Charter School, Head Start, Mosaic Day Habilitation Center, Mary Peterson's Child Care Center and the Corsicana Public Library," Larry said, adding that the more volunteers he can bring on board, the greater the number of kids who can benefit from the program.

To be a foster grandparent, volunteers must be 55 years of age or older, have an annual income that falls within federal

guidelines and be willing and able to volunteer with children on an average of 20 hours per week. Larry added that volunteers must also be "mentally and physically able to love and encourage an at-risk child for four hours per day."

"We work with a wide range of children, such as those who are handicapped or those with parents who, for whatever reason, are not continually present. Basically, anything that disadvantages or could possibly endanger a child enables them to have a foster grandparent," Larry explained.

Larry obtained his associate degree in child development from McLennan Community College in 1996. In 2000, he received his Bachelor of Applied Arts and Sciences from The University of Texas at Tyler, where he would later get his Master of Science in human resources development in 2003. "All my degrees were obtained from night classes I took while working at the Mexia State School (now the Mexia State Supported Living Center)," he said. Earning his master's enabled him to direct the Foster Grandparents Program, which he's done

ever since. Now 65, an age when many people choose to retire, he shows no signs of stopping or slowing down.

"I love what I do. Directing the program is so much more than just a job. It's more of a mission," he said. "It's a 50-50 thing because there are equal benefits to both the grandparents and the kids." According to the official program description, the rewards that seniors participating in the program enjoy are hugs and kisses, unconditional love, the opportunity to socialize with others and, perhaps most important, the opportunity to feel needed and useful.

For Shirley, Sarah's daughter and a foster grandparent herself since 2010, the program is an ideal means by which to "connect the generations" by bringing youth and the elderly together. "Lots of kids don't know what a grandparent is, so it's a chance for me to work with these kids. It helps them


and makes me feel useful," she said. "It's also a chance to be a role model, as well

as be someone who can help them grow as individuals."

Emma found out about the Foster Grandparents Program seven years ago through word of mouth. "My cousin was working at Mary Peterson's Child Care Center and told me about the program. I applied and am so very, very grateful to her to this day for opening that door for me," she said. "When the kids come up











to you years later and say, 'I remember you,' it means so much to me."

Emma's son, Gerald, has also been with the program for almost a year. "I told him about the program and encouraged him to become a volunteer, because he's so good with children," Emma said.

"My mother encouraged me to get involved," Gerald admitted. "After hurting my back, I took early retirement, and would go with mom and watch her work with the kids at the child care center. I joined the program and now work with kids at the Two Dimensions Preparatory Academy Charter School five days a week. Working with the Foster Grandparents Program has given me a level of fulfillment I had not known before and an opportunity to meet different people and cultures."

Sarah agreed. "I think I've spent more time with these kids than with my own grandkids," she laughed.

"There is no color or race in their eyes," Shirley said. "They don't see that, and we work with all races. They just love you."

Each volunteer undergoes a state background check, a federal fingerprint background check, and each is run through the National Sex Offender registry before being assigned to a child. Volunteers with the Foster Grandparents Program get an hourly stipend of \$2.65, as well as a free daily hot meal, travel reimbursement, insurance, annual physical examinations and 40 hours of orientation and training. "New volunteers to the program are assigned a mentor for the first week of service to ensure an easy transition into their new role and environment," Larry explained.

Once a month, Larry gets all the volunteers together for an in-service at Lake Mexia, where they meet for four hours at Camp Rip Recreational Center. Larry's hope is that, with the recruitment of additional volunteers, his program will be able to add the Corsicana Independent School District to the current roster of entities they serve. "We want more volunteers," he said. "For every child we reach, there's a 100 more we could help."

are varied in subject, but united in style and color. "I love color and more and more my work is impressionistic," she said. "I try to paint every day to keep the creative juices flowing, and I get together regularly with other artists



to paint and just enjoy each other's company." Lucy's most recognizable paintings are of flowers — especially roses, although she admires bluebonnets and other wildflowers. "I love to go out and find some great spot to paint," she said. "Around Bazette and along FM 636 there are some nice patches of flowers, particularly bluebonnets."

Yet Lucy has become noted for her bright pictures of that eminent denizen of the farmyard — the rooster. Deeply textured swaths of color mark these works. The yellow and red head of a bobbing bird dominates her portrait of *A Proud Rooster*, and although it's a soft focus portrayal, the play of light she has achieved is exquisite, even to the blue-black, fluttering tail feathers. Lucy's impressionistic streak is similarly seen in



the still life Roses in Sunshine, where great, puffy blossoms spill over a wicker hand basket. Roses and Fruit captures another summery scene of freshly picked blooms in a glass carafe surrounded by a lemon, a lime and a watermelon. In addition to her signature roosters and flowers, Lucy likes to paint cats, and there are several examples of her feline sitters, framed and unframed, in her home.

Lucy is motivated in her work as much by the people around her as by nature and animals, and her art provides a release from routine. It also is a way for her to express her love of life. She and Neal have both suffered from cancer, and while they are doing well now, keeping involved in the community and with pastime pursuits has enabled them to thrive. "We are active in our church," Lucy said. "And while I do my thing, painting with friends in Corsicana, Neal plays music at local venues. So we stay busy." Lucy is also a longtime member of the Corsicana Art League, which sponsors a National Juried Art Show each fall and a membership showcase in the spring every year. At the 2007 juried show in Clifton, Lucy's entry sold within 30 minutes of the event's opening.

"It was one of my chicken paintings," she said. "It was called *Henny Penny* and the collector who bought it loved it so much I was able to sell her one of my rooster paintings." Lucy enjoys her work with the League, especially in assisting Barbara Jones, a well-known local art teacher and a representative for the
















group. "I joined when I first came to Texas and have been active ever since," Lucy said. "I took watercolor classes from Barbara, too, and now I help her out in her studio and at meetings, taking her place sometimes when she is away."

Founded in 1976, the League is funded through dues, gifts, grants and profits from public programs and showings. Meetings are held monthly and demonstrations from local artists like Barbara and Lucy are highlights. Special workshops and painting sessions are regularly scheduled, and Lucy shares teaching duties with Barbara for these events as well. "Teaching is rewarding," Lucy said, "and you also learn when you teach." Corsicana Art League exhibits are displayed at the Warehouse Living Arts Theatre and Gallery. 





## Living With Diabetes

## Good habits are key to diabetes management.

More than 23.6 million people in the United States have diabetes, according to the American Diabetes Association. Because diabetes increases the risk of other serious, chronic conditions and terminal diseases, it's critical to make a commitment to healthier habits to delay the onset of the long-term effects of diabetes and related diseases.

People with diabetes are susceptible to a host of health issues, including gum disease, pregnancy complications and a weakened immune system, making them more susceptible to illnesses like pneumonia or the flu. Other complications can include: kidney disease, cardiovascular disease, eye problems and nerve damage.

#### Your Diabetes Care

Diabetes is a complex condition to manage, so your doctor will probably involve other professionals in your care: a nutritionist or dietitian and other specialists such as, an eye doctor, an endocrinologist (a doctor who specializes in hormonal disorders), a podiatrist (a foot doctor), a dentist, a nurse educator with a specialty in diabetes and possibly, an exercise trainer. If you're a diabetic, you should see your doctor every four to six months (if your treatment involves oral medication or diet) — or every three to four months (if you're receiving insulin shots).

Whether your diabetes diagnosis is recent or you have had diabetes for years, diabetes management begins with controlling your blood sugar. Keeping blood sugar near normal helps reduce risks for diabetes complications. A healthy diet, regular exercise and weight maintenance are imperative.

You should test your blood sugar regularly at home, and your doctor will check it during scheduled exams. Your doctor will provide guidance on how often and when to check your blood sugar level and will recommend a target level based on your health history and treatment plan. If you cannot control your blood sugar with diet and exercise alone, your doctor may prescribe medication or insulin injections.

## Retirement Planning -Nearing Retirement

Most people have an ideal retirement age in their head. Perhaps you hope to retire early and travel the world, or stop working right at age 65 — for years, the traditional retirement age. Or maybe you're nearing your 60s, or even your 70s, with no desire to slow down.

Whether you've been stashing away money since the beginning of your career, or started a retirement fund a little later than you intended, you're likely wondering if you have enough savings to stop working. Financial experts estimate that you'll need between 70 and 80 percent of your pre-retirement income to maintain your standard of living. Yes, less than 100 percent, because hopefully you've paid off your mortgage and other installment loans, aren't carrying a heavy load of credit card debt, and no longer have costs associated with children, such as child care or college tuition. Plus, you'll no longer be saving for retirement.

To determine your post-retirement income, you may want to start with a thorough examination of all the resources you're planning to use during retirement. These might include a combination of funds from Social Security, your pension, a 401(k), an IRA, mutual funds, stocks and bonds, annuities and savings accounts.

Be sure you know how much you can expect from Social Security. Knowing the amount of your benefits is essential if you're planning to rely on them during retirement. Remember: You can start receiving Social Security benefits at age 62, but you'll receive more money each month if you wait until your U.S. government-deemed full retirement age. Your benefits will continue to increase the longer you wait to file, up until age 70.

#### Am I on Track?

Now that you're aware of your resources, calculate your retirement income to see if you're on track. If you're unhappy with the results, you can try making some small changes to boost your retirement savings these last few years, such as increasing your savings as much as you can, making sure you're contributing enough to your employer-sponsored plan to receive the full match, and contributing the maximum to your IRA. Remember, you can make "catchup" contributions if you're over 50, which are additional contributions to your IRA.

You may also consider tightening your budget to increase your savings. At the same time, to make your post-retirement budget lower, work to pay off credit card debt and your mortgage.

#### Should I Reevaluate My Investments?


Now may be a good time to conduct an asset allocation analysis to compare how your assets are invested in stocks, bonds and cash. Since you're nearing retirement, you need to consider the risk of your portfolios. You may want to seek a combination of investments that are more conservative, because you have a shorter time frame to compensate for the inevitable fluctuations of the market.

You also might consider investing part of your retirement savings into an annuity. Annuities are often offered by insurance companies, which make a series of payments to you in exchange for a single premium or series of premiums. These payments can continue for a defined length of time or an indefinite period, such as your lifetime. Deferred annuities begin at a set time in the future and help you accumulate money for future use.

#### Should I Readjust My Plan?

If you fear that the amount in your retirement fund won't be enough to get you through the rest of your life, you may want to adjust your timeline. Retiring a few years later will give you more time to save, and more time for your savings to grow. NOW

#### **Peppernuts**

- 3/4 cup shortening
- 2 cups sugar
- 1 egg
- I cup dark corn syrup
- 1/2 tsp. anise oil
- I tsp. baking soda
- 3 tsp. cinnamon
- 1 tsp. cloves
- I tsp. nutmeg
- 6-7 cups flour (stiff dough required)
- 1 cup buttermilk
- Optional: nuts and/or candied fruit, chopped

- **1.** Cream shortening, sugar, egg, corn syrup and anise oil.
- 2. Mix dry ingredients.
- **3.** Add dry ingredients and buttermilk alternately, until stiff.
- **4.** Add nuts and fruit, as desired. Chill dough in freezer.
- **5.** Roll in long rolls 1 inch in diameter. Slice and bake 10-12 minutes at 350 F. Note: Dough can be wrapped in wax paper and stored in freezer until ready to bake.

#### **FUMC Methodist Bread**

1 cup shortening

- 1 cup sugar
- 3 tsp. salt
- 4 cups water (divided use)
- 2 pkg. yeast
- 1 cup Kellogg's All-Bran Cereal 10-11 cups flour
- **I.** Melt shortening, sugar and salt in two cups boiling water. Set aside to cool.
- **2.** Dissolve yeast in 1 cup of lukewarm water. Add to the shortening mixture when cooled. Add a fourth cup of cold water to help the cooling process.
- **3.** Add the cereal and flour to make a stiff dough.
- **4.** Place in a large greased container for rising process.
- **5.** When doubled in bulk, divide dough into 5 balls. Knead to make 5 loaves.
- **6.** Place in pans. Let rise again until doubled in bulk. Bake at 375 F for 20 minutes. Reduce heat to 325 F Bake for 20 additional minutes.

#### Shepherd's Pie

#### Base:

1 lb. lean ground beef or turkey

1 egg

3/4 cup bread crumbs

2 tsp. steak seasoning

1 10 1/2-oz. can cream of mushroom soup

#### Topping:

4 potatoes, peeled and diced 1/4 cup butter, softened 1 cup milk Salt and pepper, to taste 1/4 lb. regular or low-fat cheddar cheese, shredded

- **I.** Mix first 4 base ingredients. Press into a deep dish pie plate.
- **2.** Bake in oven at 350 F for 15-20 minutes or in microwave for 3-5 minutes until meat is browned. Top with soup.
- **3.** Make mashed potato topping with first four topping ingredients.
- **4.** Frost meat and soup mixture with mashed potato topping.
- **5.** Add layer of cheddar cheese.
- **6.** Return to oven for 15-25 minutes or microwave for 3-5 minutes. Bake until cheese is melted.
