





Courtship

Growing up, Rocky knew how articulate his father was when it came to writing. After some pondering and getting the clearance he felt he needed from his mother, he decided to compile his father's letters to his mother in a book that could be shared with others. Even though Guy and Jacquelyn are his parents, Rocky knew the "courtship in

letters" had merit. "I wanted to share the history of wartime," he admitted. "I felt others would be as intrigued and interested as I was when I read the letters for the first time."

In his first edition, the letters were transcribed in chronological order, with all mistakes and misspellings left intact. Putting them in order was not the ordeal some might think, because his father had not failed to date each letter, while including details of the where and when. "People who read the first edition said they would have loved to read more about the history of wartime," Rocky said. "They wanted commentary from others, including my mom, along with the letters. That's what prompted the second edition."

To fully understand the weight and importance of Guy's letters, we must return to the time when Jacquelyn had just

turned 18. She had met, courted and married a fellow named George Wrigley, who is no relation to the Wrigley Gum company. They were married in January of 1941, but Rocky's mother will never forget the announcement that took George away. "We were in a movie theater in Tampa, Florida, on December 7, when the movie stopped and the lights came on," Jacquelyn remembered. "An announcement said all military personnel must report for duty."

George was a sergeant in the Army Air Corps. He was only given three to four days to prepare for his journey into WWII. "He was a bombardier," Rocky explained. "He was the one who rode in the nose of the plane and released the bombs."

"We weren't even married a year," Jacquelyn said, with tears in her eyes for her first love. "We were still considered newlyweds."

George never returned. In mid-August, 1942, the B-17 bomber he was in was hit during a scheduled mission. Everyone was ordered to bail out. When George exited the hatch, he was slammed into the landing gear, which caused his parachute to tear. It never opened. George fell to his death in the desert below. Jacquelyn wouldn't get word of his tragic passing for several days.

"It wasn't but a month or two later that she met my dad," Rocky said. She had moved to Tallahassee, and was still very







much in the grieving process. Realizing the picture show she had gone to see was about the war, she quickly vacated the theater. She went to the drug store across the street to get a Coke. "She was sitting there when my dad and his friends came in," Rocky shared, retelling it the



same way his mother had told him. "Guy walked boldly over to her and said, 'You look as pitiful as a dying calf in a snow storm."

She didn't waste any time telling him why. Once her story about George was complete, Guy felt just horrible for his insensitivity. "He talked to her and tried his best to cheer her up," Rocky said. "He told her he was sent to Tallahassee to




cheer up the civilian population, and he was going to start with her."

Her heart was still broken. She wasn't interested in Guy, but it was a much different story for Guy. He was "head-over-heels" for her from the start. After a great deal of prompting, she later



agreed to go on a group date with Guy, his friends and their girlfriends. That first date took them to the Edgewood Club. Before long, Jacquelyn became close friends with Guy's best buddy, Harry Duncan. "I think she liked him because he was the best dancer in the group," Rocky laughed. "She dated Dad, but she was always dancing with Harry."

They dated for a month before Guy, a



P-40 fighter pilot, was shipped overseas. "Mom said she couldn't afford to give her heart to another," Rocky said. "But the letters from Dad over a course of a year changed her mind and her heart."

Guy's letters to Jacquelyn were witty and charming. He was able to be serious and a jokester at the same time. "Here was great pathos," Rocky said with pride. "He wrote with such detail about the things not of the war. My narrative between his letters allowed me to tell the parts he was unable to tell due to security issues. Thanks to Dad, I was able to fill in the blanks."

The wedding proposal came via the mail. Jacquelyn answered, 'Yes' in her reply, also in the form of a letter. These two letters started a series of letters where the couple planned their wedding.



Theirs truly was a courtship in words. "They only knew each other for a month before he shipped out," Rocky stated. "The courtship really did take place thanks to Dad's way with words and the postal service."

The couple finally exchanged vows on November 7, 1943. "During his time in WWII, my dad saw so many horrific things," Rocky confessed, "but he never let it define who he was. He never considered himself to be a hero. It was his job, and that's how he looked at it."

Compiling the love letters from his father to his mother into a book has meant a great deal to Rocky. He's shared his father's extraordinary courage, which was an ordinary characteristic during WWII, while also sharing the long-distance love story he finds great pride in retelling. "I told their story as a way to give tribute to both my parents," Rocky admitted. "I wanted something I could hand down to family and friends who knew them." No doubt, *Warhawk: Letters From Out of the Blue* does that and so much more. **NOW**



Fred & Nora Puckett

A young couple, recent converts to Ennis life, has found the house of their dreams nestled in the heart of an idyllic neighborhood in the small town they've come to love. The leafy charm of the Historic Templeton-McCanless District, laced with Victorian and other period homes, first captivated Fredric and Nora Puckett in 2009 when they purchased one of the jewels of this picturesque enclave, the 1904 Campbell House with its green-painted façade and uniquely angled position to the well-known thoroughfare it faces.





"We fell in love with the house from the start," admitted Fred, whose family medicine practice prompted the move that brought him and his wife to Ennis from Fort Worth three years ago. He and Nora are history buffs who always hoped to restore and live in an old house. Improving upon upgrades made by previous owners, local builder, Bob Agar, helped Fred and Nora complete major renovations to the home's interior before they moved here. Later, Fred collaborated with builder and neighbor, Paul Penfold, to refine the front porch, a key feature of the house. Fred, who learned construction from his tradesman father, has made significant improvements to the storage buildings and children's play house.

When not looking after the couple's children — 4-1/2-year-old Penelope and 1-year-old Eric —Nora conducts tours at the Dallas Museum of Art, a job that comes easy to the young mother whose education is in art history. But Nora also applies her interest in history locally as secretary of the Ennis Heritage Society, spearheading projects to promote information on historic properties through printed and online materials. "I have enjoyed working with the Heritage Society," she said. "It's a great group of people."

Through neighbors and fellow
Heritage Society members, Nora and
Fred have learned a lot about their
elegant old house. Built by Dr. W.E.
Campbell, one of Ennis' first surgeons,
the home is familiar to locals for its
unusual orientation to the street, sitting
at a 45-degree angle. The prettily gabled
house with a sunburst motif over the
porch was entered in the National
Register of Historic Places in 1985.
According to a program for the 2001
Tour of Homes, "the plan is a variation
of a common regional L-shaped house
with a front entry door placed diagonally

at the junction of the two ells of the house." The five-bay front porch once extended farther along in a wrap effect and was formerly screened in.

The floor plan is octagonal and the home's many windows allow for varied views of bordering homes and the shady street beyond. Originally one story, later owners installed a second floor, an innovation that increased livability without compromising the house's curb appeal. The Pucketts hope to learn more

about the pioneering doctor and his family who first lived in the house. Dr. Campbell was one of the first medical practitioners to offer his services at the Ennis Municipal Hospital, which opened its doors in 1924. He was also a member of the Ellis County Medical Association, a 1912 meeting of which was photographed and is now archived at the Ennis Public Library.

Fred enjoys the link his house has to an earlier doctor. "Older homes have a

character of their own," he said. "They're not just shells. They have a life already because of their history."

Both he and Nora appreciate the house's roots in a simpler time and the small town aspect of the neighborhood. "It's a slower pace here, and we like it," Fred continued, adding that living in the Bluebonnet City melds a countrified existence with modern city life. Nora agreed. "Coming from a big city, a lot of things you think you would miss, you

really don't," she pointed out. "Ennis has been perfect for us, and the people have been so welcoming."

She singles her neighbors out as particularly hospitable. "There is such a community atmosphere here," Nora said. "There's a great sense of family, yet the people represent all phases of life." She values the friendships she and Fred have made and the feedback they've received as they renovated their house.



Nora has implemented her good taste and knowledge of art in the color scheme and furnishing of her dream home. The dark wood trim has been painted white for the effect of greater space that it affords, and while bird's eye molding and some original fixtures have been retained for their vintage feel, the overall look Nora has evolved is modern. She has mixed genuine antiques, some of which are family heirlooms, with period-inspired furniture from Ikea. The dining room comprises modern and





The cook-off, which is always held on the third Saturday in May each year, was started in 2006 by J Bar C Cowboy



Church's then-pastor Brad Borstad, who met with local pastors and came up with the idea of a brisket cook-off. "Brad — who resigned as pastor in 2010 — reached out to all the churches in Ellis County and invited them to participate," Mark said. Planning the event starts in January each year when local churches are invited to participate as sponsors.

Event coordinator, Jean Stout, said the church that wins the brisket cook-off gets a plaque they can display for a year. "Each church will cook four briskets for the cook-off. There will also be homemade beans and potato salad," she said. "We ask them all to make enough of the side dishes to feed everyone who will be there from their church with a little extra." Soft drinks, tea and water will also be provided free of charge.

"There will be prizes available at each game, at least one bounce house, and the youth from each participating church will be responsible for organizing two games per church," Jean shared. "We'll also have a Carter Blood Drive bus onsite for people who want to donate blood, something we've included in the last two cook-offs."

The cook-off, previously held on the Palmer Square, will be held at the Palmer

Middle School Pavilion. "Our goal is to have it there from now on," Jean added.

Both Mark and Jean emphasize this is a free event, open to the public and is not a membership drive in any way, shape or form. The event is about giving praise to God, sharing fellowship and giving back




to the community. "We want to remind everyone there's no money exchanged anywhere during the cook-off, that it's 100-percent free," Mark said

Jean agreed. "It's just a day of fellowship. We think Psalm 133:1 best expresses the reason behind why we do this every year: 'How good and pleasant it is when God's people live together in unity!"' Sponsoring churches will start

cooking the night before, filling the pavilion with the scrumptious smell of brisket emanating from the smokers the participating churches will bring in.

Since its inception in 2006, the cook-off has been a collaborative effort between all the participating churches in Ellis County, and each year past participating churches try to get additional churches involved. "We reach out to radio stations to spread the word, as well as make sure the event is on the Ellis County community calendars," Mark said. "We schedule our first planning meeting right after the first of the year, then meet once in February, March and April. In May, we start meeting once a

week here at the church, right up to the night before the event, to iron out the details."

Mark, who lives in Waxahachie, started attending J Bar C Cowboy Church in 2007. "After I joined, I became a team leader, then a lay pastor and was eventually asked to be an elder of the church last year," he said. The church's open-door "come-as-you-are" policy was one of the things that attracted him to the J Bar C, which is the first western heritage church in the Palmer area, according to the church Web site.

Jean has lived in Palmer for 11 years and is going on her second year as a member and her first year of organizing the community brisket cook-off. "A lot of people put in a lot of work toward this event starting in January," she explained.



"There's a lot of preparation involved over a long period of time, which makes it work so well every year."

With last year's attendance exceeding 400, Jean thinks the cook-off's success each year boils down to the fact that it is a no-strings-attached opportunity for fellowship among the county's churches and the public. "It's really about unity and the community," she reflected. "It doesn't really matter where people go to get the Word if the churches in our county can come together and show that kind of unity through events like the cook-off." For Mark, Jean and the hundreds who look forward to the annual event, it's become so much more than good meat. NOW



Rather than doing without some of the items that were beyond their budget, they discovered that they could make and repair things themselves. Along the way, the process spawned some new skills, which are now percolating into their four children's lives as hobbies.

The three oldest, all boys, have been learning woodworking in the garage workshop from their dad. The shop is well-appointed with power tools and Dallas Mavericks posters. While keeping safety a top priority, Jeremy said, "I give them their heads and let them do as much as possible on their own."

Lucas, an eighth-grade honor student, is the eldest. Now 14, he has advanced to using the scroll saw. He put that skill to good use last year with an Alamo project for his history class. He designed and created a three-dimensional model made of thin pieces of wood, each cut to shape and then stacked and glued together. Lucas plans to one day attend Texas Christian University (TCU).



As a 10-year-old, Cameron's skills do not lag far behind, while he also keeps busy with sports and student government. An outstanding baseball player, he wants to try football, too. Meanwhile, the goal-oriented fifth-grader has been elected to the student council at his school and is already making college plans.

Bryce, the youngest son at 9, adds a little humor to every situation. Whether intentional or not, "He's just naturally funny," Brooke said.

Each of the three boys have created ball-point pens by turning a small length of one-inch-square wood on a



lathe, then polishing and adding the mechanical parts. Before crafting the pens, Jeremy took the boys to a woodworking store. "Each one got to pick out the blank he wanted to use. The blanks can be wood or acrylic," he remarked. Though the boys did not try to outdo each other with elaborate carving, they did race to see who would go first. "But everybody gets that one-on-one time with Dad," Jeremy added.

The pens take less than an hour to turn, polish and assemble. The various grains make each wooden pen unique, while the acrylic pens, like the purple-and-black one Jeremy made for TCU fan Brooke, have their own elegant look.

As for the family focus on crafting, Brooke actually started it all when the couple was expecting their youngest child, now-5-year-old Grace. "I taught myself to sew while I was on bed rest," she said. Months later, with a small baby, three older children and no paying job, Brooke began to make custom accessories and clothing for little girls. She still sews professionally. "The kids were my test dummies — that's why Grace ends up with so many clothes. She still tells me every day, You should make a new shirt for me."

In turn, Jeremy's woodworking interest sprang from Brooke's need for a desk. He decided he could figure out how to build one for her. One thing led to another, and Jeremy began crafting wood products for sale. Now the sawdust often flies in the garage, while KLTY radio competes to be heard over the noisy power tools. As Jeremy accumulated tools, he built his own wooden cabinet with flat drawers to hold them. "I could have bought a metal one cheaper," he admitted.





While Grace has yet to take on the woodworking tools, she loves every aspect of sewing. She enjoys planning the colors, never seems to run out of ideas, and eagerly does as much of each project as her mother will allow. The boys have no interest in sewing, but they readily lend their muscles to their mother when it is time to carry or organize her materials.

As they teach crafts, the Ruffins are also handing down their financial wisdom to their children. "We want them to learn from our example — from our mistakes," Jeremy said. "We teach them to save and to live within their means."

"We're also truthful with the kids when money is tight," Brooke agreed. Though they never lack anything they need, their parents never hesitate to tell them, "You're not going to get everything you want."

Creating things for themselves has given the Ruffin children some added benefits. First, everyone in the family has a strong sense of self-sufficiency. "All of us, even the kids, actually prefer to do things for ourselves," Brooke pointed out. This attitude has spilled over from craft projects into household chores. The children generally cooperate with their assigned responsibilities, and they all cook dinner together — everything from scratch, of course — on most evenings.

also allowed the family to freely practice generosity. "We taught our kids to give," Brooke said. The children realize that, even with little money, they can use their talent to benefit others. For example, they have been known to sell homebaked goods and donate the proceeds to a charity.

At the same time, the two older boys are earning their own spending money by working with Jeremy in his part-time lawn care business. Lucas, thinking ahead a few years, is saving for a vehicle.

Of course, a certain amount of trial and error is part of the adventure. "We try new things, and they don't always work," Brooke said. "The office and shop are full of half-finished projects."

Things are rarely quiet at the Ruffin home. Jeremy holds a full-time job and runs two part-time businesses, while Brooke juggles working from home with keeping up the household and ferrying the kids back and forth. On Sundays, Jeremy and Brooke take the family to church and often host groups of church friends. In between, the family cheers for their beloved Mavericks and Texas Longhorns and squeezes movie or game nights in among the activities. Two nearby parks give the children space for riding bikes, skateboarding and outdoor games. Two lively dogs - Dirk, the boxer and Ricky Bobby, the terrier mix - add to the general commotion. "It's crazy but it works," Brooke observed.

With all the coming and going, "We are a chaotic mess most of the time," Jeremy said. "But it all gets done." He shook his head. "When there's nothing going on, it doesn't feel right."



Medical Marvel

If someone asked you to name a marvel of modern medicine, would the Papanicolaou (Pap) smear be one of the breakthroughs that you would consider naming? I would suggest that it should be. With its introduction in the 1940s, early detection and treatment of preinvasive malignancies of the cervix became possible. Subsequently, by the end of the 20th century, the incidence of and mortality associated with invasive cervical cancer in the United States decreased by approximately 75 percent.

Despite these statistics, cervical cancer remains a significant problem within our society. The Centers for Disease Control estimates the incidence of cervical cancer to be 7.9 cases per 100,000 women in the United States. The incidence is even higher in Black and Hispanic women, rising to 10.2 and 11.5 cases per 100,000 respectively. Over 12,000 women in the U.S. were diagnosed with cervical cancer in 2007. There were over

4,000 deaths associated with cervical cancer in that same year.

These numbers clearly illustrate the importance of continued emphasis on the need for cervical cancer screening and should serve as a reminder to all women that interval screening is a necessity. In fact, new screening recommendations have recently been issued by the U.S. Preventive Service Task Force (USPSTF) and the American Cancer Society/American Society for Colposcopy and Cervical Pathology/American Society for Clinical Pathology (ACS/ASCCP/ASCP). These recommendations are listed below. Should any of these recommendations raise questions, schedule an appointment with your doctor. Take advantage of the protection offered by one of the marvels of modern medicine. NOW





Mama's Fudge Squares

Brownies:

1/3 cup cocoa

1 cup sugar

1 cup Crisco

2 eggs

2 cups flour

1 tsp. vanilla

1/8 tsp. salt

Fudge icing:

2 cups sugar

1/3 cup cocoa

1 stick butter

2/3 cup milk

1 tsp. vanilla

- **1.** For brownies: Mix well as you add each ingredient. Dough will be very stiff.
- 2. Smooth onto greased 9x12-inch pan. Bake in preheated 375 F oven for about 12 minutes. Do not overcook. Mix fudge icing in the same pan.
- **3.** For fudge icing: Mix all ingredients; bring to a boil on high, reducing heat to medium. Cook to soft ball stage.
- 4. Remove from heat; beat until creamy. Pour over warm brownies.

Oatmeal Cookies

1/2 cup Crisco 1/2 cup butter

1 cup sugar

2 eggs

2 cups flour

1 tsp. soda

Pinch of salt

I heaping tsp. cinnamon

1 tsp. vanilla

4 Tbsp. milk

2 cups uncooked oatmeal

1 cup raisins

1 cup pecans

- 1. Cream Crisco, butter, sugar and eggs together. Add flour, soda, salt and cinnamon.
- 2. Add vanilla, milk, oatmeal, raisins and pecans.
- 3. Drop onto greased cookie sheet. Bake at 350 F for 12 minutes or until golden brown.

Stir-Fried Sugar Snap Peas

2 Tbsp. olive oil

I pkg. frozen sugar snap peas or equivalent of fresh peas

2/3 cup almond slices

1 Tbsp. soy sauce

1/2 tsp. ginger

I tsp. minced garlic

1/2 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp. pepper

- 1. Heat oil in skillet or stir-fry pan. Add peas and stir until almost done.
- 2. Add remaining ingredients and stir-fry until peas are crisp and tender.

Glazed Carrots with Bacon and Onion

I lb. pkg. baby carrots

3 bacon slices


I small onion, chopped

3 Tbsp. brown sugar

1/2 tsp. seasoned pepper

- 1. Cook carrots in boiling water for 15 minutes or until tender; drain.
- 2. Cook bacon until crispy; draining on paper town and crumble. Reserve 1 Tbsp. bacon drippings.
- 3. Sauté onion in bacon drippings until tender.
- **4.** Stir in brown sugar, pepper and carrots. Cook for 5 minutes or until carrots are glazed and thoroughly heated.
- **5.** Transfer to serving dish; sprinkle with crumbled bacon.
