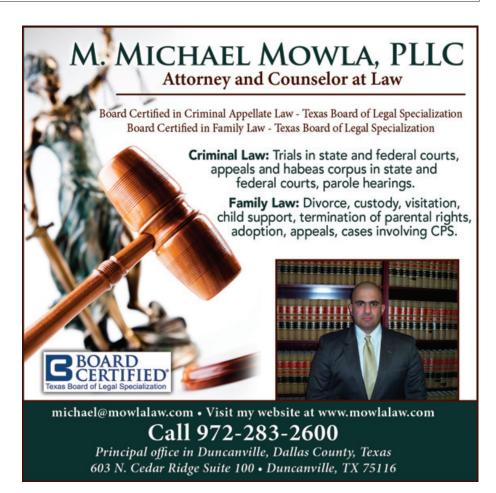

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Online Registration Coming Soon

Home Access Accounts Required



Duncanville ISD is launching online student registration this summer, in time for parents to complete all the required back to school enrollment forms for 2012-2013 digitally. Starting next year, every

student must be registered through the online module, which requires parents to have Home Access Center (HAC) accounts. HAC is a one-stop web portal that allows parents to view student schedules, attendance records, grades, and academic progress through a secure web interface.

Only about 42% of current Duncanville ISD students have parent HAC accounts, so the district is starting to promote HAC signup this spring in preparation for Fall 2012 Registration. "Online registration will eliminate the need for parents to fill out numerous forms by hand year after year," said Tammy Kuykendall, Chief Communications

At the start of the next school year, parents will still need to physically visit their child's school to complete the residency verification process that includes providing an original utility bill; however, the overall process of completing the necessary back to school paperwork will be easier. Parents who establish HAC accounts this spring will also be able to immediately begin accessing student daily information like grades, attendance, and academic progress.

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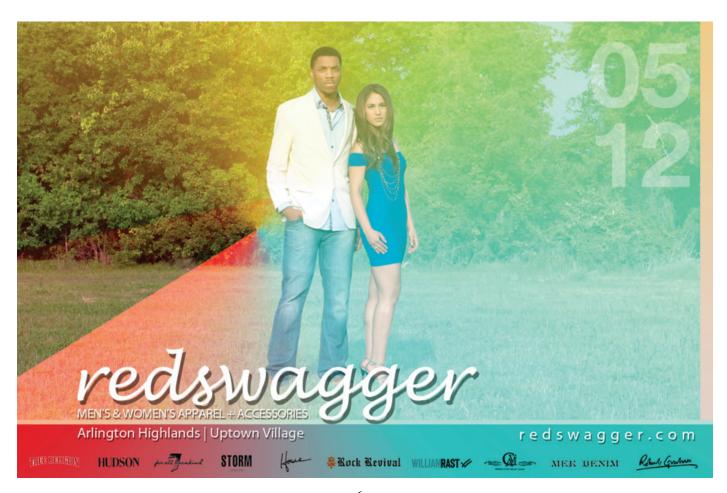

disease had spread to her lymph nodes, lungs and bones. She immediately started treatment and survived five years longer than expected, never losing hope, despite going blind in both eyes before her passing February 26 of this year.

"She was such a strong woman that she made such a big difference in our community. Everyone knew her, and she knew everyone!" Lacey said. "If her disease had been detected earlier, her survival rate would have increased by 85 percent. Some people's survival rate goes up to 98 percent, with early detection."

While grieving her mother's death, 18-year-old Lacey said it also pushes her in her pageant endeavors. "I feel the pageant has kept me on my feet. It has occupied me, so I won't dwell on my mom's sickness and passing," Lacey said. "My mother is in heaven now, but I know she is so proud of me and wouldn't want me to give up on my dream to win Miss Teen Texas International 2012."

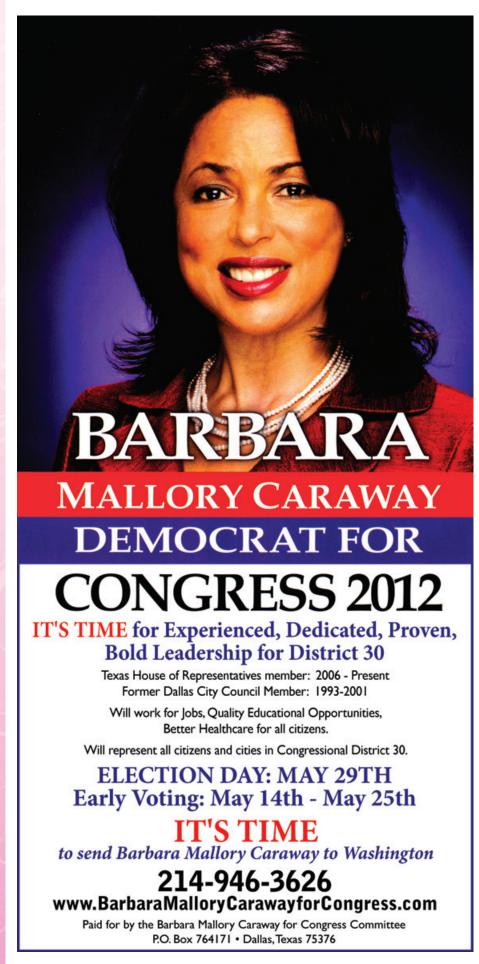
To that end, Lacey must not only raise pageant participation funds, she must also refine her pageant skills to win over teen contestants from around the state. The full-time Northwood University student has learned to juggle her educational workload with the responsibilities of her pageant title.

"I have invested all hours of the day. Whether it's at school informing my professors and fellow Knights about my pageant to help raise money for my expenses or going out during the week and weekends making appearances during community events," Lacey said, "I'm determined to show that a small-town girl can make a difference, and how staying in school and making good grades can open up so many doors throughout your life."

Involved in the pageant system since childhood, Lacey was Petite Miss Country Day 2005 and Little Miss Ellis County in 2006. Miss Teen Cedar Hill International is her most prestigious title to date.

"When I was selected Miss Teen Cedar Hill International 2012, I was tickled pink! I believe I was picked based on my community service, honors and academics, as well as my overall belief system — for what I stand for as a young woman," Lacey said.

Admitting she is actually a shy person,



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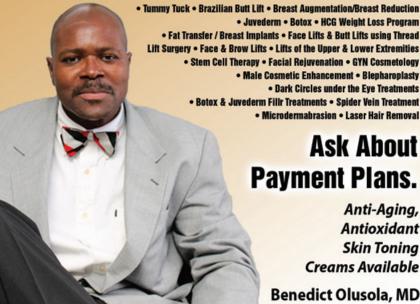






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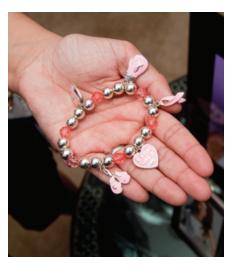
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Lacey finds pageant participation has helped her mature. "Even though I'm very passionate about breast cancer awareness, I didn't always have the confidence it takes to step up and speak out for a cause. Pageants have helped me mature. I'm more responsible and poised because of these experiences," Lacev noted.

The lifelong Cedar Hill resident fondly recalled other experiences in her hometown, including attending Bray Elementary, West and Joe Wilson intermediate schools, Permenter Middle School and Cedar Hill High School, from which she graduated on the A/B Honor Roll and as a Texas Scholar.

"One of my fondest memories is when my mom was room mother at Bray, and we would create jewelry or make gingerbread houses. That was my favorite part of attending Bray!" Lacey recalled. "I also remember staying up late when Country Day on the Hill ran until midnight. My sister and I would line dance and listen to all the great bands play."

Country Day on the Hill and the Holiday Tree Lighting are two of Lacey's favorite Cedar Hill pastimes, and she still loves the friendliness she feels when walking around town. She also admires the local library's effort to involve residents in community events.

"Being in pageants teaches you the importance of community support. I've received so much assistance from the people of Cedar Hill, and I just want to give back as a role model and educator," Lacey said.

Lacey suggests other young women consider pageantry as a way to develop poise, grace and etiquette. "I had no professional training in pageantry, although I model part time. I use my experience to entertain the audience and judges for pageants," Lacey noted. "I believe I've learned to represent myself very well in front of an audience, and that skill will benefit any young woman who wants to successfully communicate — for a classroom project, for a college interview or in their career!"



Lacey hopes to one day model full time. She sees pageantry as a stepping stone to that goal. When not preparing for pageants, she enjoys hunting and fishing, both of which allow her quiet time to reflect and plan. She is also a country music fan and likes making collages — a hobby she shared with her mom.

Lacey is excited about future pageants, which will allow her to share the early detection message, and give her a chance to meet contestants from all over.

Most importantly, she is thrilled for the opportunities to honor her mother through pageant engagements.

"Pageants make me happy. I'm so grateful for the doors that have opened and for the chance to remind anyone and everyone why early detection is crucial to breast cancer survival. I can speak about this from a very personal perspective," Lacey said. "And through that, my mom is alive. That's a rewarding feeling."

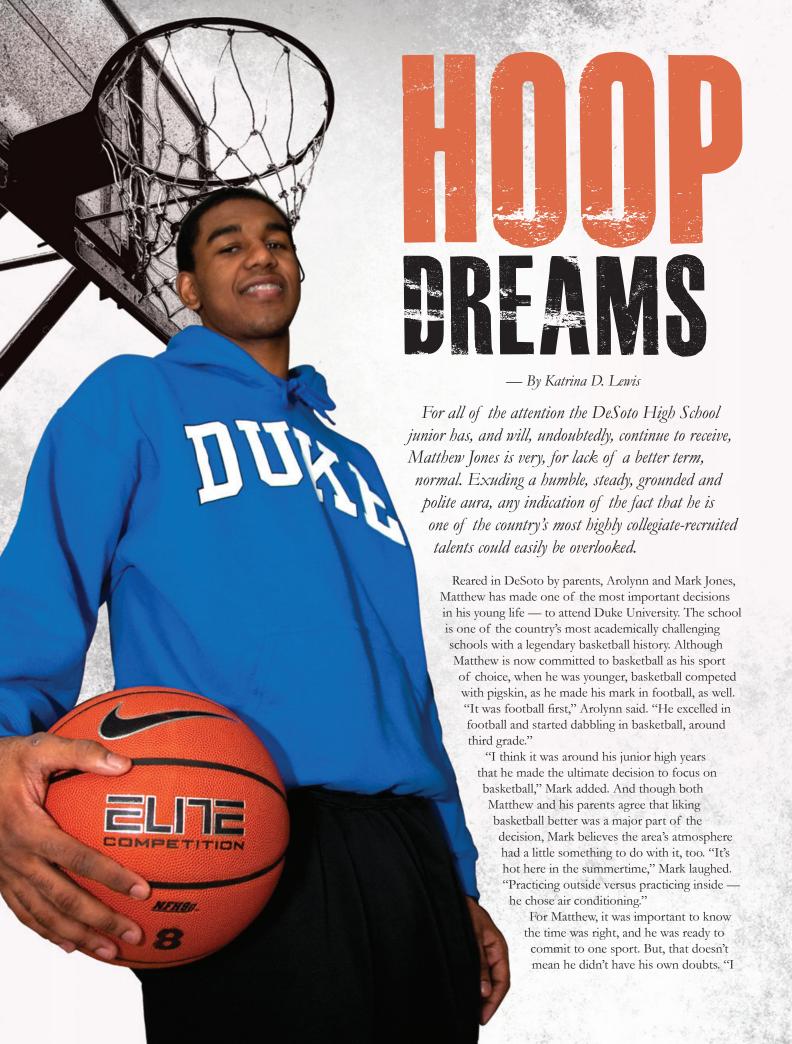

didn't know," he said, pondering if he knew his skills were on a competitive level when he was younger. "I just hoped and prayed and knew I had to work at it."

His work ethic is one of the reasons Matthew has continued to excel on the level he has, and why Duke was amongst many who wanted him to play on their teams. Matthew works out with an individual skills coach and practices upwards of four hours a day, in addition to team practices and juggling schoolwork and being an honor roll



student. "My dad, you know, he makes sure I have workouts the day before," he said. "He helps me make sure my shot is prepared the day of the game." Matthew also plays on the Texas Titans, an elite basketball team of the Amateur Athletic Union (AAU).

Indeed, Matthew's parents, along with other supportive adults in his life, are part of the reason Matthew is so grounded and "hungry" and wants to "always improve" himself. "My dad reminds me every day that, in regard to the game of basketball and working your hardest, you don't have to punch anybody's else's clock. I can have my own hours, because Lord knows, I can get lazy sometimes," he said, smiling.

As Matthew's game grew stronger, and his reputation as an athlete and a student also grew, his mailbox begin to spill over with a steady flow of recruitment letters, emblazoned with the logos from places like North Carolina, Kansas and Notre Dame, just to name a few. And as humble as the 6-foot, 4-inch (and still growing) player can be, he kind of knew the letters would be coming. Still, seeing that first letter was exciting, especially since he was only a freshman at the time. "It was





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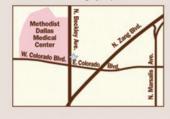




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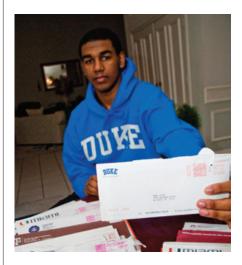

from Notre Dame," Matt shared. "I did expect it, to some extent, but I didn't really expect it to be that big," he said, musing aloud about his recruitment. "In the beginning, it was really overwhelming. I was in awe, but I've gotten used to it."

Another reason for the excitement was that Matthew's sister, Jordan, a senior basketball player, had started receiving her own recruitment letters. "He hadn't started receiving his letters yet, so when he got that first one, it was like, 'OK, they're going to start recognizing me now," Arolynn laughed.

Although many collegiate recruiters were after him, Matthew's decision to commit to Duke University had just as



much to do with how his life would be both off and on the basketball court. "It's the education. It's the fact that you can play for one of the greatest coaches who ever coached the game. And the people who are around me are happy with my decision," he said. Matthew first noticed the Duke coaching staff watching his play after attending the LeBron James Skills Academy last year in Akron, Ohio, the NBA star's hometown. "I was fortunate to play well there," he said. Even though he didn't get to have a one-on-one with LeBron, Matthew was still excited to meet him, and the picture of the two together that he brought home is not a shabby souvenir at all.

Like any basketball enthusiast, Matthew has players whom he admires and whose play he would like to possibly mirror someday. Not surprisingly, LeBron James tops that list. "I just like to watch





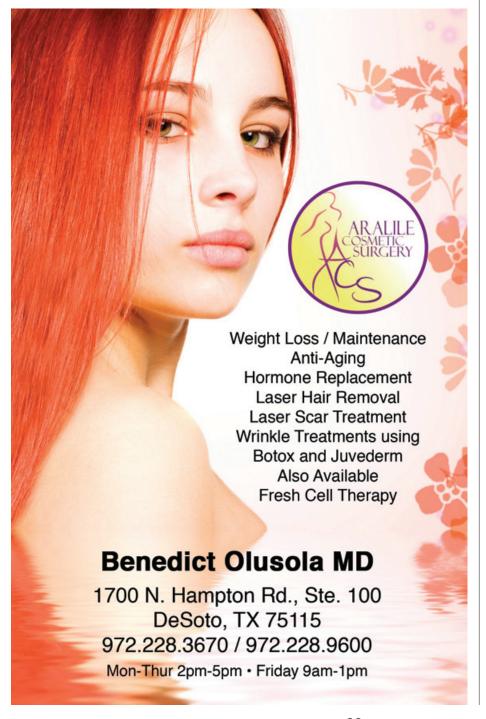
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LeBron play. I like Ray Allen, too, and I see myself when I watch him play," Matthew said. "We have a similar style of play." Matthew's dream team roster reads like today's Who's Who in basketball and includes LeBron James, Dwyane Wade, Chris Bosh and Mario Chalmers.



Despite having already committed to playing on the national stage, life still has to continue in DeSoto. Matthew could easily rest on his laurels and coast through his last years of high school, but that just isn't the way he goes about things. Although his first days on the storied Duke campus are not quite upon him, the campus already feels like a second home. "I just try to go out there and get better for my teammates now and just pick up my intensity," he said about his fellow DeSoto Eagles. "But, the atmosphere at Duke is crazy. I've never been around so many people who love basketball or their team. It was really overwhelming, but I felt like it could be my home away from home."

"It's the complete package," Mark said, "and we feel good about him there. The coaches are great. They're Christians. It's a great atmosphere. It's a family-oriented environment."

Truly living a dream of playing ball for one of the country's best programs, it would be normal and almost cliché for Matthew to mention dreams of hitting the winning shot during the NBA Finals or casually playing a game of pick-up with one of his idols. But, Matthew is not your normal high school recruit. "I take it one day at a time," he said regarding himself in the future. "I'm not too worried about the NBA. Maybe one day I could have a career in sports journalism, but I'm good with where I am now."

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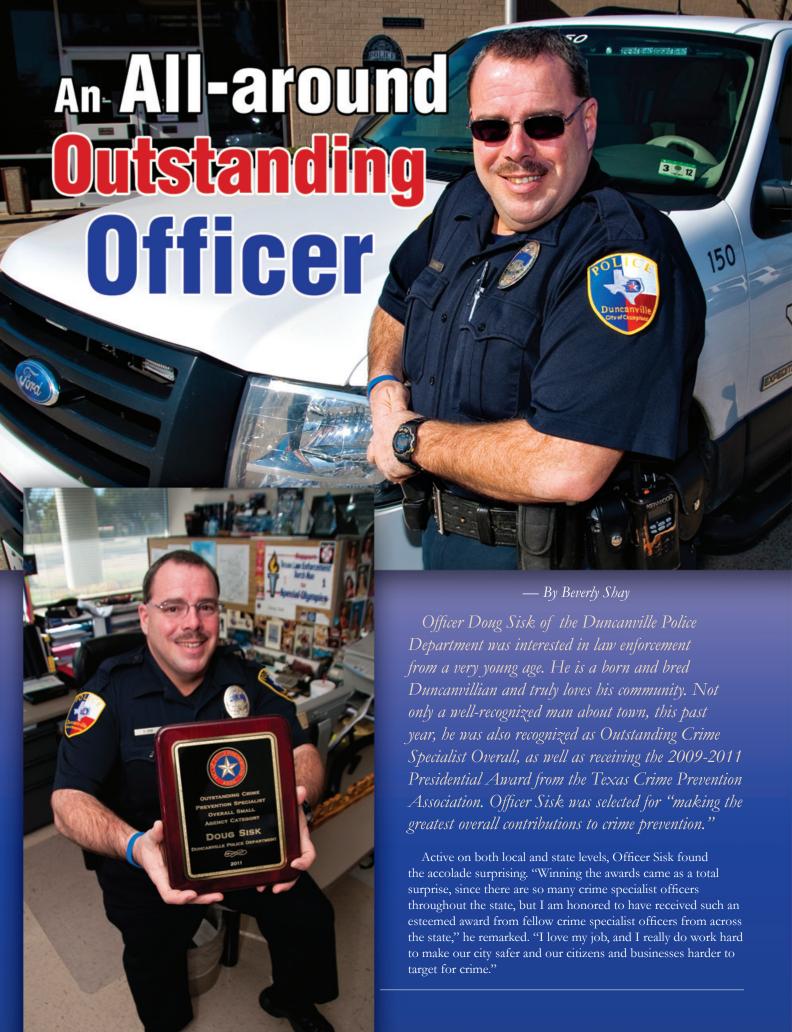
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As a crime prevention specialist, Officer Sisk presents safety talks to various civic organizations, businesses and schools, as well as oversees citizens on patrol, neighborhood crime watches and coordinates special events, such as parades. Officer Sisk is quick to admit the two-percent drop in crime in Duncanville from 2010 to 2011 is the result of efforts of the entire department of 62 officers. "We all work together to reduce and deter crime, but when people become more aware of their surroundings and can move away from potential crime-related situations, they are better able to reduce the risk of becoming a victim," he stated.

You may have seen the posters around the area admonishing people to LOCK, TAKE and HIDE. Locking your car, taking your keys and hiding any valuables helps impede crime in parking lots where people often lurk, looking for an easy opportunity to steal. The same principle applies to residential and business properties. "Car burglaries and stolen cars are our main thorns in the flesh," Officer Sisk admitted. "For the most part, they are random, with no set pattern. And that is why people need to be aware of how they can protect themselves." To provide maximum aid and to keep his speaking engagements up to date, he frequently peruses other cities' crime prevention Web sites to glean new ideas on presentation and prevention.

Officer Sisk's experience within the police department is quite varied. He has worked with a K-9 partner and was one of the first SWAT officers in Duncanville, serving in that role for 10 years. "All the officers participate in ongoing defensive tactics training and in-service classes dealing with legal updates, as well as firearms training and certification. Fitness and agility training and expertise are important, especially for SWAT officers," he stated.

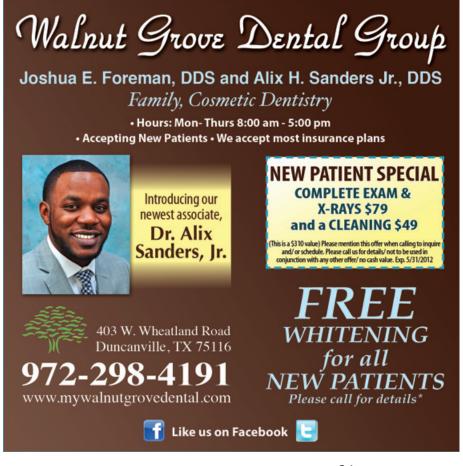
The Citizen Police Academy is one of the main avenues through which Officer Sisk affects the community. "This is an excellent way we can provide the public with an understanding of how and why we do what we do. For example, most people get frustrated if a patrol car approaches an intersection,





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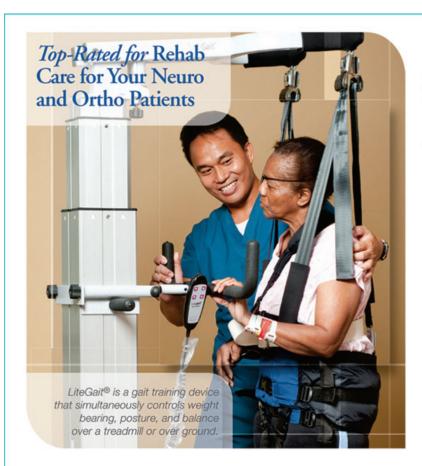
suddenly turns on the siren and lights, so they can move quickly through the red light and then turns the lights and siren off. They tend to think the officer was 'cheating' and just wanted to get to a restaurant quickly. In reality, the officer is most likely on call where a burglary is in process and needs to get there quickly but doesn't want to alert the criminals of his impending arrival," he explained.



"Through the academy, word gets out to our citizens and rumors are dispelled. The citizens also educate us about issues or problems and even about public opinion. We really appreciate their input.

"We are starting our 44th Citizens Patrol class. We have two each year, with about 10-20 people per class," Officer Sisk said. Classes last for 12 weeks, followed by two-three nights on patrol with an officer. Alumni classes are also conducted. One in particular was notable an FBI instructor came and taught forensics. They have also had a DEA (Drug Enforcement Agency) instructor. "We also implement 'suspicious scenarios' in our classes, so we can teach them how to call information in. Our patrols extend our 'eyes on the street.' They don't confront people or situations. Instead, they report what they see. Last year, they logged about 11,500 miles, providing 5,800 hours of volunteer service to Duncanville," Officer Sisk commented. "That service saved the city of Duncanville \$145,000 in salary and \$6,000 in mileage costs."

But addressing crime and crime prevention is not the only thing this allround police officer pursues. Officer Sisk loves supporting the Law Enforcement Torch Run, which raises funds for the Special Olympics. Throughout the year,



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small runs provide funds (and practice) for the spring and summer games, which feature field and track events for Special Olympic contestants. "I know if I can get a new officer to just one Special Olympic event, they will be hooked for life," he stated with a smile. "There is just something so rewarding and so inspiring about being around those kids. We are often thrust into dealing with people in peak stress or frustration, so these games are a welcome change of pace and attitude. You think you are giving something to these kids, but you always walk away having received more than you have given," he said.

For the past four or five years, Officer Sisk has participated in a four-day event at The University of Texas at Arlington, along with 150-250 other officers from across the state. "The kids love it when the officers and team members dance on the field and volunteer to help with the summer games," he remarked. "I find it amazing that the kids seem more impressed with the beauty queens and police officers than they are with the professional athletes who come. But they sure know how to make us feel special, too!"

Other events that serve as fundraisers include the Polar Plunge and Tip a Cop. Police officers work tables in restaurants, sell T-shirts and join in fire truck pulls, where teams of 12 people can be sponsored to pull the dead weight of a fire truck. "Last year, 12 teams raised \$7,000 at a fire truck pull held in the Costco parking lot," Doug recalled. "We have a lot of fun to offset the more difficult issues involved in police work.

"I really like where I am and what I do. I find a lot of satisfaction in my job," Officer Sisk stated simply. "Every morning, when I am putting on my uniform, I, like most of my fellow officers, tell myself, 'I'm coming home at the end of the day.' It's good to come home feeling I have been a positive, effective influence in the community I call home."

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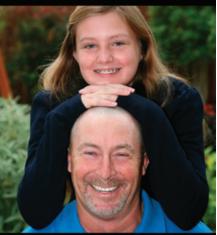
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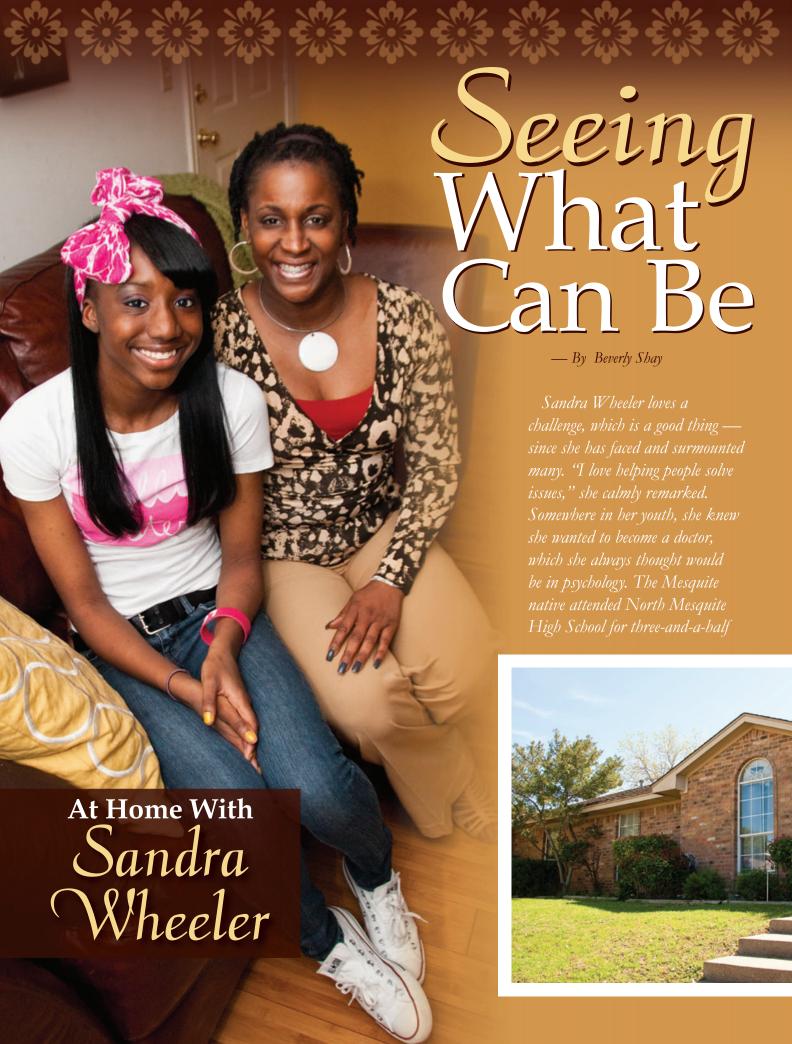
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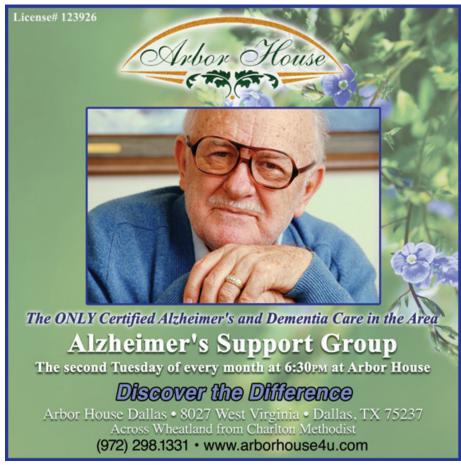






years but actually graduated from H. Grady Spruce High School in Dallas. Sandra then attended Eastfield College in Mesquite for a few years before transferring to Texas Woman's University, from which she graduated in '98 with a bachelor's in psychology. While she was in school working toward a degree in psychology, she worked as a physical therapist and with management in retail stores. She earned her master's in human resources from Amberton University in 2000.









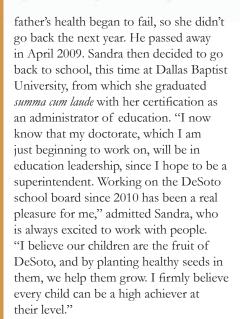
"You just don't realize how all the different experiences you have will work together at some point in your life. At that time, I was still trying to figure out where I fit, and I knew I was good at human resources," Sandra admitted. But needing to pay off her school loans, she became a firefighter, a job she really loved and worked at for seven years. "When I got caught in a really serious house fire, I knew that wasn't how I wanted to go," she confessed. "I was a mother by then, and that changed my perspective."

Following her time with the fire department, she worked for two years



as human resource manager for Gap clothing stores. "I also worked four years for Walmart as human resource manager but also as operations manager, specifically as a liaison over the co-op program with the local schools. I loved working with the kids, as well as being in the community, which is probably why I ended up teaching school. In fact, after a year teaching science at South Grand Prairie High School, I taught science at Spruce for a year. I would never have imagined returning to my former school," Sandra laughed.

The year Sandra taught at Spruce, her



The same dedication and perseverance that has marked her schooling and careers is evident in Sandra's home. "I moved here one week before 9/11," she recalled, marking events, as all mothers do, by happenings in her children's lives. "This home fit my budget and gave both of my children their own space.









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Although the entire house was blue when we moved in, I could see what it could be and have been gradually implementing my taste. I gave this house color!" she said proudly.

Sandra has filled her home, much like her career, with those things that mean the most to her. Photos of family and pieces of artwork, both things she loves, are everywhere. "I love history - art history, family history and artistic depictions of history," Sandra said of her taste. Her home has some interesting angles, and with bold colors on single walls, the feeling is one of added space and dimension. Gold enriches the walls of the living room and provides additional glow to the bamboo flooring that looks like hardwood. "What I didn't realize is that bamboo flooring is soft so no stiletto heels in here," she smiled. "Even the furniture has to sit on pads or area rugs."

Out of sight of the front door but open to the living room is the kitchen, with the last standing vestige of blue. "The cabinets and the 'ice blue' countertops are my next project," Sandra, a do-it-herself interior decorator, said. "I discovered I really enjoy painting. And I stripped down and refinished the dining room table and chairs, upholstering the seats. I am really proud of that." The back wall is olive green, one of Sandra's favorite colors. While the bamboo flooring carries over into the dining area, the kitchen flooring is a cream-colored stone. "The countertops will be granite, and I will refinish the cabinets, at least the fronts," she shared.

Sandra's house has three large bedrooms and two-and-a-half baths. The guest bathroom, found off the living room, has a slate floor with cranberry walls. "This mirror was left here, but it was gold, and I wanted something antique-silvery. So, I painted the frame silver and used a toothbrush to work black paint into the filigree design and then wiped the excess paint off with a cloth. It worked!" she said.

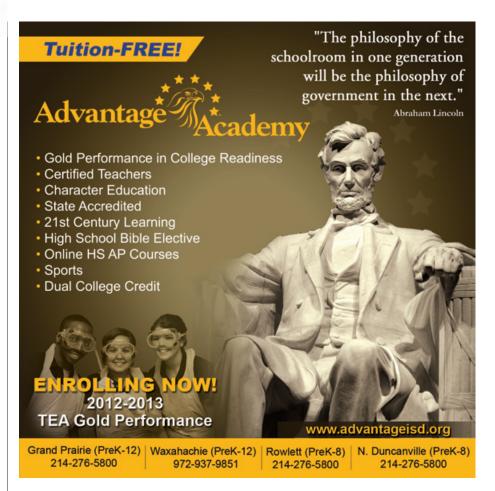
Sandra's son, Brandon, just recently returned from a tour of duty in Iraq, the culmination of a little over six years in the military. "I never really wanted to go to war. In fact, after basic training I was not sure I had made the right choice. But my mom always taught your word is your bond, that you must honor what you say," he paused. "My mom has never gone back on her word, so I followed her example. I know God is in control no matter what I saw there, and I believe he kept me, not only safe, but strong." Brandon and his new bride, Keira, are living with Sandra while he rests a bit and looks for a job.

"After Brandon went in the military, I updated his room a bit, staining the walls brown with furniture stain in two shades to give it a faux finish of sorts. It didn't take him long to turn it back into his 'cave,'



although now it's more of a man cave than the teen cave he left it," Sandra laughed.

Alasandra's room is pure teen with bold purple, green, hot pink and turquoise. Posters and photos and handdrawn artwork cover nearly an entire wall, behind the flowered-covered bed. Books and assignments signify the domicile of the upcoming 2014 graduate of DeSoto High School. Gliding over the marble-tiled entryway, eyes are drawn to the framed puzzle Alasandra and her mom worked together, rather summarizing the story of Sandra's life — challenges she has worked through to a beautiful rendition of clear meaning.





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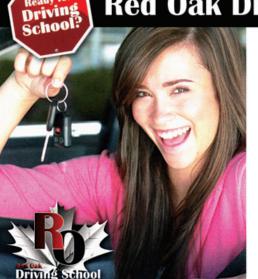

Vivianna Ruiz gives true meaning to the phrase "big things come in small packages." A 17-year-old senior at Duncanville High School, Vivianna is diminutive in stature, but her artistic talents, work ethic, heart and faith, and better yet, her dreams, are much larger than life.

Never a shy spirit, as far as she and her parents, Michael and Sandra, can remember, Vivianna has always had a creative side she's had to answer to. As a child, Michael recalls her crafting new ensembles for her Barbie dolls and little purses for herself. Although active in theater in high school, Vivianna soon turned her eyes to another artistic challenge — fashion. "I had already gone as far as I could in theater," she said. "It was fun, but I've always liked making things. I think God made me creative."

Even though Vivianna had dibbled and dabbled in fabrics in the comfort of her own home, she had never taken a class in fashion, including the prerequisite beginner course to the class she wanted to take. With persuasive appeal, although she had no portfolio, Vivianna was able to enroll in an advanced, senior-level fashion design class. "I am very persistent. When I want something, I will speak up," she shared.

After creating custom-made outfits

for her dolls, a skirt and other pieces, Vivianna was doing well in class when her teacher told her about a competition, which challenged students to make competition pieces in a variety of categories. Vivianna chose to participate in the recycle and redesign portion. "We were allowed to use anything recyclable," she recounted excitedly. "I didn't want to use fabric or cloth, but I didn't know what to use. I even thought about Target bags."

While brainstorming and researching on the Internet, Vivianna begin to formulate a plan to create a dress out of good, old-fashioned newspaper. "They cheated," she said, clearly displeased at some of the work she saw online. "They used patterns."

Once Vivianna formulated her idea, the real work began. In spite of having an image in her mind, actually sitting down and constructing the dress, while trying to corral every thought she had for it, proved to be a big challenge. So much so, that she worked on the dress up until the day before the competition this past February. The competition, sponsored by the Family Career and Community Leaders of America (FCCLA) was held in Waco. "I like princess dresses," Vivianna confessed. "And I really wanted a corset too, because I've always liked how they look." The finished gown slowly became a reality, as Vivianna worked tirelessly for about three months to complete it, paying homage to her school by using copies of the school paper to bring her vision to life.

Occasionally seeking assistance and the opinions of others, Vivianna managed to keep a very close wrap on the dress, something her mother can laugh about now. "I didn't want to hear it, when she first brought the dress up," Sandra admitted with a smile. "I was like, OK, the paper dress. She wouldn't let us in her room! She was very 'top secret' with what she was in there making."



















Vivianna admitted she was secretive, but only because she was her harshest critic, and she wasn't sure what other people's opinions would be. But, she shouldn't have worried. She placed third in the recycle and redesign segment of the competition and qualified for the state competition in April. "It was a lot," she said. "Plus, I was working on another project and couldn't give all the time I probably should have to the dress. But people at school saw it and liked it, too. So, that was good."

Surprisingly, Vivianna is not sure her future is in fashion, however obvious the choice would seem to others. Vivianna has chosen to not really reflect and make a hard decision regarding her future — all due to a battle with leukemia from her past. Diagnosed just shy of her seventh birthday, Vivianna fought what her father calls "simply a nightmare" for more than two-and-a-half years. "It was as awful as you can think," he said, "blood transfusions, spinal taps, everything. We honestly didn't know if she was going to survive it."

Vivianna's diagnosis came at a time when things were tough all around, including the family's finances and job outlooks for her parents. But with their united front as a family, while also going against an obstacle they couldn't see, the Ruiz family began to grow stronger in their faith. Despite not being the ideal catalyst, all of them believe Vivianna's diagnosis was a turning point in the family's walk of faith. "I was not living for the Lord then," Michael said. "But, we went to this church, and people were so welcoming. She was so sick,



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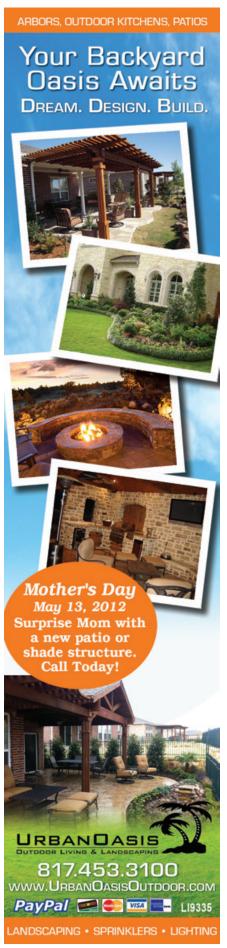
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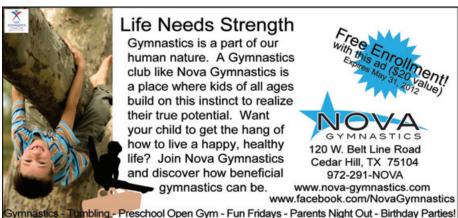
















and the whole church prayed over her." The family still attends Mountain Creek Community Church, where Vivianna is very active with the youth group.

Vivianna's illness was well-documented with photos, and even while she was very sick, most of the photos show a smiling, happy child during Make-A-Wish Foundation and Kidd's Kids (organizations that provide vacations and other wishes for ill children and their families) trips and posing with local celebrities at various charity events.

Vivianna's solid anchoring of faith began to take shape as she sought to get through her treatments. "It was hard, and it was tough," she said, simplifying how she had to fight for life. "But, prayer brought me comfort. I used to ask my mom to just pray with me."

Years later, her mom still truly marvels at the level of energy her daughter has. "Just to see her now," Sandra said, "is exciting. We didn't know if she was going to make it, but we prayed about this. We knew He kept her here for a reason."

Perhaps the sensation of not being able to have full control over whether she recovered from cancer is what has given Vivianna the calm tone of voice, as she speculates on what lies ahead for her. Active in youth ministry in her church, she has considered becoming a missionary and has visited Honduras, a trip her father calls life-changing. "I don't know, I'm just not sure just yet about a four-year school," she said. "I'm not sure about fashion. I just know that whatever I do, I want it to bring glory to God. It's wherever God wants me to go."

"Communication has always been integral to who I am and what I want to accomplish," Dr. Barbara Parker admitted. "So to have this practice for 15 years now is perfect," remarked the owner of Hearing Solutions. The Oak Cliff native pursued communications at Angelo State University having discovered communication disorders while working on her high school senior thesis at Callier Speech and Hearing Center, where she met several leaders in the field of audiology. She earned a Bachelor of Science in education from the University of North Texas (UNT), where she was licensed to provide speech pathology in public schools. Barbara works with oral motor skills and occupational aural rehab, and completed her master's in audiology at UNT in 1981.

Audiology encompasses hearing disorders and aural rehab, more than mere provision of hearing aids and auditory devices. Barbara is a certified audiologist and speech language pathologist through American Speech-Language-Hearing Association (ASHA). She completed her doctoral studies at The University of Iowa in psycho-acoustics, the study of sound perception — how the brain processes sound. "I loved the cutting-edge research at their amazing labs," Barbara shared. She worked as an assistant professor at the University of Oklahoma Health Sciences Center. "I loved teaching and received the outstanding junior faculty and research award."

Barbara received national and state grants to develop a computer program called MAC AID to teach the hearing

impaired to use their hearing aids. She had the honor of serving as one of three ASHA-certified aural rehabilitationists in the country and five years on the board, with one year as president, of the Academy of Rehabilitative Audiology. Barbara also provided consumer information on rehabilitation and amplification referrals.

Most people take about five years to process hearing loss, which usually begins with a loss of consonant sounds. They hear vowels, but cannot understand dialogue and find themselves missing things. People will withdraw because it allows them to avoid responding improperly.

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"Some will need more noise reduction. Now, we even have Bluetooth compatible devices," Barbara related. In rehabilitation, Barbara works both with the patient and their family members. "I teach them how to clue each other in on what is being said or not being heard. Less than a third of sounds are visible on the mouth. Even with a hearing aid, the brain has to adjust to handling additional input." Barbara focuses on the process, not the product. "I work with the brain and consider all the different types of loss to provide restored hearing and processing."

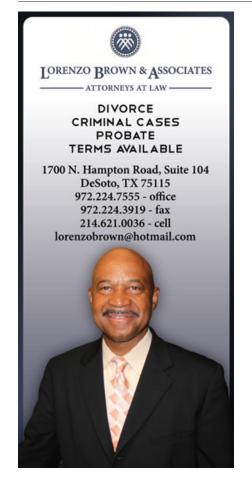

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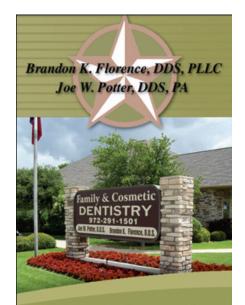

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Natural Therapies for Common Problems Women Face

The purpose of this article is to offer some natural therapies for those looking for alternatives to traditional medical treatments and to offer a discussion point with your treating physician so as to reduce possible conflict.

Infertility is a heart-wrenching problem for any couple wanting to have children. A woman can do many things to naturally increase the probability of conception. One of them is to use herbal therapies such as: chasteberry, false unicorn root, red clover, shatavari and wild yam. These should be used under the direction of a naturopath or a doctor/chiropractor trained in alternative/functional medicine. Another consideration is proper functioning of the nervous system and the organs. If the spine is misaligned, this can cause function of the corresponding nerve to not function properly and thus, the organ will not function properly. Eating healthy foods and exercising also help prepare the body to be a healthy environment and increase the chances of conception.

Menopause, although a normal process of aging in women, can be a very difficult process physically and emotionally. In other parts of the world, supplements are widely used to abate the symptoms. Some of the supplements used are: soy, flaxseed oil, alfalfa, black cohosh, black haw, dong quai, fennel, Fo-ti, lady's mantle, red clover, sage and wild yam. Yoga, aerobic exercise and breathing exercises have calming

properties for the body and are often helpful in reducing the symptoms associated with menopause. Other helpful tips include avoiding caffeine and alcohol, which are diuretics that encourage dehydration and can increase menopause symptoms.

For *hormone imbalances*, blue cohosh, fennel and damaina are helpful. Also, make sure you get adequate rest, reduce stress, take a multivitamin, avoid caffeine and get plenty of sunshine. When your body does not have the necessary nutrients, many of the processes can be altered, interrupted or fail to happen at all. Also, consulting a functional medicine practitioner can be beneficial in finding ways to treat the imbalances naturally.

Menstrual symptoms, probably the most common of these conditions, is also one of the easiest to treat. Depending on the symptoms you can try: dandelion root, chaste tree-vitex, geranium oil, peony or lemon oil. Also try a heating pad on the abdomen or back, exercise, eating plenty of whole grains, fresh fruits and vegetables, and avoiding saturated fats and commercial junk foods. Limiting salt may help bloating. Reducing caffeine, sugar and alcohol intake may also be beneficial. Acupuncture/ acupressure, chiropractic, yoga and meditation have also been found to be helpful.

The most important considerations are to maintain a healthy body. Also, if taking medications, discuss supplements with your doctor prior to starting them, as there can be drug-supplement interactions that could be dangerous in certain circumstances.

In The Kitchen With Eloise Braun

"Cooking was never my thing, but I learned out of necessity when I got married!" admitted Eloise Braun, nicknamed "Auntie Mame" after a few years of hosting Christmas parties for as many as 125 people after her husband, Jeff, passed away. "Everything I made for those Christmas parties was from scratch. I started cooking from the day after Thanksgiving." She learned to cook, garden and can from friends and neighbors in the many different places she lived with Jeff. "My mother-in-law, who had a restaurant, taught me how to make bread," she said.

Eloise's favorite thing to make is dessert, especially lemon and chocolate. "I always use real butter and whipping cream," she confided. "I cherish my mother's recipes that my father typed with an old manual typewriter on some index cards."

Lemon Jell-O Cake

1 4-oz. pkg. lemon Jell-O 1 box lemon cake mix 2/3 cup oil 2/3 cup water 4 eggs 3/4 cup sugar

3/4 cup orange juice

I. In a large bowl, combine Jell-O and cake mix.

2. Add oil and water alternately with eggs; beat well. Pour into a well-greased Bunt pan; dust with sugar.

3. Bake at 350 F for 45 to 60 minutes. Remove from oven; use a long pronged fork

to make holes throughout the cake.

4. Mix sugar and orange juice; pour over cake into the holes. Put cake back in oven and bake until there is a crust on top, about 5 to 10 minutes. Cool in pan for 10 minutes.

Lemon Jell-O Salad

2 3-oz. pkgs. lemon Jell-O (or 1 6-oz. pkg.)
2 cups hot water
2 cups cold water
1 20-oz. can crushed pineapple
Bite-sized marshmallows

Sauce: 1/2 cup sugar

1 Tbsp. lemon juice 2 Tbsp. flour

2 Tbsp. butter

1 egg

I cup heavy whipping cream

1 tsp. vanilla Sugar, to taste

1. Mix Jell-O with 2 cups of hot water in a 9 x 13-inch dish; add 2 cups cold water.

2. Drain pineapple (save the juice for topping) and add to Jell-O. Place marshmallows on top; cover and refrigerate until set.

3. For sauce: add water, if needed, to pineapple juice to make 1 cup; combine with sugar, lemon juice, flour, butter and egg in a saucepan. Stir while cooking until thickened. Refrigerate until cold.

4. Once Jell-O and sauce are cold, whip cream until stiff; add vanilla and sugar to taste.

5. Combine sauce and whipped cream; spread on Jell-O.

Beef Stroganoff

1 lb. ground beef
1/2 cup onion, chopped
1/2 cup sherry
1 Tbsp. lemon juice
1 can beef bouillon soup
6 oz. egg noodles
1 cup sour cream

I. Brown beef and onion in a skillet; add sherry and lemon juice. Cover and let simmer for about 15 minutes; stir occasionally.

2. Push meat to sides of skillet; add the soup and noodles. Cover noodles with meat; simmer till noodles are done, adding more water if necessary.

3. Add the sour cream and serve immediately.

Cinnamon Roll Icing

For use over your favorite homemade sweet rolls.

I cup sugar I cup heavy cream

I. Combine ingredients in a saucepan; cook over medium heat, stirring constantly until mixture comes to a soft boil. (It is done when you drop a pea-sized amount of icing in cold water, stir it a bit, and it forms into a ball.) Remove from heat; stir until thickened; pour over cooked rolls.

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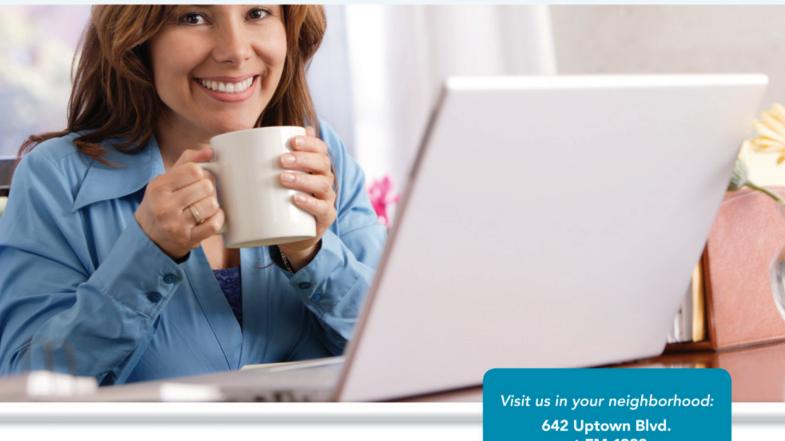
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
