

BAYONET AND BAYONET AND BATON

Having a mother who taught piano lessons and directed a church choir helped define Zeno King's lifelong love of music as a passion and vocation. "I'm one of the few kids who grew up with two pianos," he recalled. His mother's musical career also played an important part in Zeno's choice of a wife. He met Anita Massey in his family's Mexia home, where she took piano lessons.

In high school, Zeno's eyes were actually set on obtaining an appointment to the U.S. Naval Academy. "I was Annapolis bound," he said. But that all changed during the required physical exam, when his eyes didn't measure the required 20/20. Instead, he found a place in the Southern Methodist University Mustang Band on full scholarship, while working on a music degree. Anita, a flautist, was at nearby Texas Woman's University until there was a need for her talents in the SMU band. "I think Anita may have been the first woman member of the SMU band," Zeno said. They shared a life together for 61 years of marriage, until her death in 2001.

As a young couple their life together was interrupted, as with so many young people of the 1940s, by military service during World War II. After basic training, Zeno went into an Army Air Corps band in Victoria, TX. He showed such talent that he was soon sent to the U.S. Army School of Music at Fort Myer near Washington, D.C. As a newly minted chief warrant officer, Zeno was ordered to create "the finest band in the world" for the 83rd Thunderbolt Infantry Division and serve as its leader. Soon, Zeno and his band members were crossing the Atlantic Ocean to England, where they performed in parades and concerts every day.

Those days came to a close with orders to leave England without their musical instruments. Instead of a director's baton, Zeno had to pick up his rifle with fixed bayonet. Historically, military band members become warriors, stretcher-bearers and provide security, when needed, as they were when the 83rd hit Omaha Beach as part of the Allied D-Day Invasion at Normandy, France, June 6 through mid-July 1944.

Zeno remembered having to prepare to go ashore while many of the troops were still seasick from the crossing of the English Channel. Then things got worse. "We were right in the middle of it," Zeno remembered. "Three band men and a medic were assigned to each stretcher. We wore the Red Cross on our helmets and cloth arm bands. The terrain was awful with the dead and shell holes," Zeno recalled. "It looked like every plane in the world was flying over our heads." In all, 21 of the 56 men in the band were captured or wounded at Omaha Beach. The Army's official count for the 83rd Division numbered 3,620 deaths and 11,807 men wounded during WWII.

The Allied troops broke through German defenses and headed for Berlin under the command of General George S. Patton. Zeno and his men served in different capacities during that time. Over 26,000 German soldiers had surrendered and become prisoners of war. The band members ran a POW camp and aided in the transporting of POWs. Zeno remembered the Americans could get 90 prisoners into trucks or use "40 and 8" railway freight cars. "I'm not sure whether the name came from 40 horses and 8 men that could be loaded into one car or the other way around," Zeno commented.

Another duty performed by band members during that time was to act as security for the headquarters of the 83rd Division. By the end of WWII, the 329th Infantry Regiment, a part of the 83rd, had the distinction of being the closest U.S. troop unit to Berlin, just 30 miles from the city. Patton remarked of the 329th, "That's the finest body of soldiers I have ever seen in the field." Zeno remembered talking with Patton on several occasions.

The band was relieved when their instruments arrived during the occupation of Europe by U.S. troops. The band took charge of about 100 Hungarian musicians. Among them was Sári Barabás, a famed coloratura soprano. "We put together a show and went all over Germany one summer," Zeno remembered. "They all spoke English and were very well educated." The band also played for what turned out to be one of Patton's final reviews of the troops in July 1945. "We were wearing new chrome helmets. Patton saw a Purple Heart and Silver Star on the coat of one of the

trombone players and came over to hug him," Zeno said.

The time came to return home to Texas. Zeno moved to a National Guard band unit, but otherwise had no job. He went back to SMU and not only got a job offer to become an assistant band director, but completed his degree. He returned to playing trombone professionally in bands as he had done prior to joining the Army and, for a short time, was a high school band director. "Anita and I didn't have anything. Poor didn't even begin to describe us," he said.

"In the music world, I was known as 'Buddy,'" Zeno said. During the Big Band Era, he played with orchestras led by Durwood Cline and Ted Weems. "We played lots of dances. You came to the bandstand, hair cut and combed, shaved, tuxedo cleaned and pressed, shoes shined and took your seat on time ready to play. I loved it," Zeno remarked. "I was never that good a musician, but I knew a lot of them," Zeno remembered.

He now enjoys spending time with his sons, David King and wife, Carol, of Jefferson, Texas; Stephen King of Dallas; and Lindsay King and wife, Shannon, of Corsicana. Zeno has eight grandchildren,

Although there are actually six members of the popular Corsicana singing group, The Gospel 5, that little discrepancy has never gotten in the way of the group's mission of spreading God's message near and far through their beautiful music. Founder Terry Thomas has made sure of that. He remembers when the group gave their very first performance 28 years ago at Taylor Memorial Church, now called Total Man Ministry. "The original members that night, other than me, were Mike Horn, Eric Grant, Mark Lewis and Myron Williams," Terry said. The group members have changed over the years, but the original purpose — to "make a joyful noise" as instructed by the Bible in Psalm 100 — has continued without ceasing.

"We got the name, The Gospel 5, from missionary Mary Joe Dixon, who was Mark Lewis' mother," Terry recalled. "Mark has since passed away, and although we've increased the number of people in the group, we always felt the name should stay the same."

Current members of the group include Terry; his wife, Thelma Thomas; Aaron Dominic; Terry's brother, Gayland Thomas; Shalena McBride; Terry's nephew, Kiante Nolen; and honorary member, Bishop K.D. Davis Sr., who is pastor of the Sixth Avenue Baptist Church. Vince Jones fills in, when needed, as alternate drummer. "I play lead guitar and sing. Gayland and Thelma both sing, and Kiante plays the keyboard. Aaron plays the bass guitar, and Shalena is our drummer," Terry said.

In addition to singing with The Gospel 5, Thelma has taught second grade at Carroll Elementary for the last two years. It's making music, however, that makes her heart really beat. "Singing with The Gospel 5 is everything to me," Thelma said. "It is an outlet for me, both spiritually and artistically, and I feel like I'm able to spread the Word and minister to people through the music. Singing has been a part of my life for as long as I can remember."

With a background rich in music starting at childhood, it wasn't a surprise to anyone when Terry formed The Gospel 5 group. "I started playing guitar when I was around 10 years old. My brother had bought a guitar, and when he was out of the house, I would sneak in and play it," Terry remembered. "He finally found out I was playing it when I broke a string. He was upset but decided to let me have the guitar anyway. That's how my musical career really started," he laughed.

Terry graduated from Corsicana High School in 1979, where he ran track in addition to playing the guitar. After graduation, he attended Ouachita Baptist University in Arkadelphia, Arkansas, where he continued to run track and play the guitar. "When I got to the university, I was mainly playing rhythm and blues music. After I got involved with the church there, I started playing gospel music, which was a big change in my life, in a lot of areas," Terry said.


Thelma remembers seeing a big change in Terry at that point in his life. "When he met me, he learned to love going to and being involved in church, since my daddy was the pastor," she admitted with a smile. "He still loves it, so I guess it stuck."

Gayland was director of the choir at the university, and that's when I started getting interested in gospel music," Terry said. "Thelma's dad was a pastor in Arkadelphia, and I met her at a church

concert. We got married in 1981 and have two children, Princeton and Shamalon, and two grandchildren, Shamaria Houston and Princeton Thomas Jr."

The couple moved back to Texas in 1985, and Terry began working for the Texas Youth Commission, finally leaving after 21 years of employment. He also started The Gospel 5 that year. "The members have changed a lot over the ensuing years," he said. "The former members of our group played a big role in the success we enjoy today. I can't thank them enough for everything they did for us. Those individuals include: David Richardson, Michael Horn, Eric Grant, Myron Williams, the late Mark Lewis, Aaron Myers, Ronnie Washington, Charles Moore, C.J. Douglas, the late Laron Green and the late W.C. King."

According to myspace.com, The Gospel 5 "has a reputation of being one of the best groups in the area, and being able to mimic nearly any other group. Although under recent years the Gospel 5 has undergone various line-up changes, they still have not lost the sight and love of God, and the original sound that was given to them."

When they perform, The Gospel 5 often includes all kinds of spiritual music, from familiar and much-loved standards to new compositions. They perform at all types of venues, such as churches, banquets, family reunions and weddings. "We sing locally, in Dallas and throughout Texas, and we've even traveled to Oklahoma and Arkansas a

few times," Terry said. "We usually take separate cars or rent a van when we have to travel."

In March of each year, The Gospel 5 hosts a banquet at the Martin Luther King Center. This year was their 19th anniversary of performing at the banquet. "Terry is the music writer in the group," Thelma commented. "He'll write a piece, give it to me, and I'll edit it. Then after a few rehearsals here at the house, we'll perform it."

The group recorded its first cassette in 1985, and Terry is thankful to Bobby Sparks Jr., who played the keyboard on that first recording venture. These days, The Gospel 5 takes its CDs to each performance venue. The group's latest CD is titled I've Got a Friend, which can also be found at The Ark bookstore. "We are working on another CD, which we hope to have ready by this summer," Terry said, adding that he has his own recording studio in the back of his home, where the group meets every Tuesday to rehearse. "We will sing just about anywhere," Terry stated. "It's all about getting the Lord's message out, and The Gospel 5 has been doing that for a long time." NOW

Their home on the range near the small town of Kirvin holds many memories. The home was created from an old slave cabin that Jim's grandmother had moved to the hill on which it still stands. "We can see the lights of Wortham and Streetman," Jim said. Jim and Martha moved to the home after completely remodeling it, doing most of the work themselves. "It was a labor of love, and we didn't even get a divorce," Jim said. "We have had a lot of good times throughout the years out here. Christmas has always been celebrated on the ranch with all the family present. "Kim, Meagan and Granddad would always go cut a Christmas tree," Martha said. Their Christmas celebration also included the celebration of Jim's parents' anniversary since they had been married on a Christmas Day.

A front porch has served as both a relaxing gathering place, as well as a sleeping porch. "We have made lots of memories on the front porch," Martha said. The main focal point of the living and dining area is the brick fireplace. The bricks are from the original cabin. "The bricks are solid," Martha pointed out. At that time, "there weren't that many ESL students enrolled in school," Adela remembered. "Since then, the number has grown substantially. I didn't care that there weren't many kids to work with. I just loved helping out." This year marks Adela's fourth year teaching prekindergarten at Carroll Elementary.

According to the Center for Public Education Web site, prekindergarten enrollment has increased markedly over the last decade. In 2005, 69 percent of all 4-year-old children nationwide participated in some type of early childhood program, including statefunded pre-K, the federal Head Start program, government-funded special education programs and non-public nursery schools or preschool centers.

In Adela's current position at Carroll, she has a morning class and an afternoon class. Her classes include giving the students assessments on their skills with such things as letter knowledge and counting. It also marks her 20th year in the classroom, a hallmark anniversary that will be commemorated with a 20-year pin she will receive from the Corsicana Independent School District this month.

In those 20 years of teaching, Adela said the most frequent and predominant changes she's seen have been in the world of technology. "The little kids come in to school with iPads now!" she laughed. "In fact, my grandson is the one who finally taught me how to text."

Another technological improvement to classroom teaching Adela has seen is the installation of SMART Boards, which are interactive and immediately responsive to input from students. "Technology has come such a long way in education, and it's been a challenge, at least for me, to keep up with the frequent changes," she admitted. "You just have to do the best you can."

Adela has also seen changes in the students during her career. "The family unit has changed a great deal over the years with more single and foster parents than ever before," she said. One thing that has not changed for Adela is the joy she gets from seeing the fruits of her teaching reflected on her student's faces. "I never get tired of seeing the excitement in their faces when they learn a new letter or word. They just light up when they realize they have succeeded," she explained with a smile. "That look of satisfaction on their faces, of seeing that light come on, of knowing they accomplished something, makes all the difference."

"It's a bilingual church where I've been a praise team singer for several years. I also teach Sunday school for first through sixth grade," she said.

Her husband, Luis, works for Guardian Industries and is thinking more and more about retiring. "I know when he retires he will want me to join him, so that's something to think about in the next few years. When we do both retire, we want to take a short, three-day cruise, do some traveling and visit family," she said.

Adela believes before anyone decides to embark on a teaching career, they should take a long, hard look at what factors are behind their decision to teach. 

up some routine items, a do-it-yourself bracelet kit caught her eye, and she bought it. "It really made me want to buy more beads," she said. "So I kept buying and buying and buying all of these beads and things years ago when I was just trying to get rid of the boredom."

They also frequent a bead shop not too far from where they live called Simply Beadiful, in Gun Barrel City, where they offer different classes on jewelry making. Heather and her mother have attended several of them together, including classes on different techniques for making bracelets, rings and earrings.

In addition to these classes, the mother-daughter duo continues to expand their knowledge base through the



videos and a growing collection of books on the art of jewelry making. Where else do they find inspiration for designs? "I am drawn to the bright colors of the beads," Heather stated, as she shared a short story from a recent trip she and Kim took to Las Vegas. During their trip, they visited

Heather compared the process to the simple task of grocery shopping. "It is





One of Heather's favorite parts in the process is picking out and matching up different color schemes, and Kim is always impressed. "Heather is great when it comes to picking colors that match and coordinate well," Kim shared. "On our most recent trip to Vegas, we just had to shop the local stores for stringing goodies! It was great to spend the extra time with her."

As one can imagine, this hobby can be time consuming, and much more goes into it than just beads and string. The longest the two have worked on a single piece was four-and-a-half hours. This particular piece was made with help from the first YouTube video they watched. With lots of practice, they've since cut that time in half, and a nice, detailed piece can be completed within two to two-and-a-half hours. Heather and Kim try to get together to work on things three times a month on average, and they often meet at Kim's house where they have an entire room dedicated to jewelry making. During this time, the two either make jewelry or separate beads. "There is so much organization that goes into it," Heather emphasized, "and with beads, there are so many ways to organize, depending on if you want them sorted by color, by size, etc."

The techniques used are diverse, and as Heather and Kim have continued to expand their knowledge of the art, they've discovered they each have different strengths. While Heather enjoys the actual stringing and techniques, such as the right-angle stitch, Kim is better at wire wraps in which charms and other embellishments are made. Together, their strengths form a steady balance from which beautiful pieces are often produced. They enjoy giving their creations away as gifts. "It is great to be able to connect with your children outside of normal family activities," Kim noted.

And Heather has similar thoughts on the subject. "Every crafty thing about me comes from my mom," Heather shared. "I love having fun things like this in common with her!" **NOW**



Don't Ignore Digestive Troubles

Digestive troubles are common, ranging from periodic discomfort after a large meal to severe, chronic pain. More than 70 million Americans suffer from digestive problems, according to the National Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases.

The pain and discomfort from digestive issues can sometimes be relieved through dietary changes and over-the-counter medications, but the long-term effects of untreated digestive conditions on your overall health can be serious. Among the most common chronic digestive conditions are acid reflux, irritable bowel syndrome, lactose intolerance or ulcer disease. These ailments affect the upper digestive system, also known as the upper gastrointestinal (GI) tract. Symptoms vary, but may include:

Swallowing problems Nausea Bloating Abdominal pain Vomiting Indigestion Constipation or diarrhea Gas

Common Digestive Conditions

Gastroesophageal reflux disease (GERD): GERD is severe or chronic acid reflux (stomach acid going back up into the esophagus) that can lead to complications such as sleep disorders, esophageal bleeding, ulcers or cancer. GERD symptoms are similar to those experienced with heartburn, but are more severe and frequent. Symptoms include difficulty swallowing, coughing and wheezing, sore throat or hoarseness, a sensation of having a lump in your throat, a burning sensation in the chest and chest pain, especially when lying down at night. If you experience GERD symptoms for more than two weeks that isn't relieved by taking over-the-counter antacids or medications, see your doctor.

Lactose intolerance: Lactose intolerance is the deficiency of an enzyme in the small intestine that helps the body digest lactose. Health experts believe this condition may be hereditary or linked to damage to the small intestine that may occur with severe diarrheal illness, other digestive diseases or chemotherapy. Symptoms include abdominal pain, bloating and gas. Lactose intolerance usually can be controlled through dietary changes or medication.

Peptic ulcer: A peptic ulcer usually occurs in the lining of the stomach or first portion of the small intestine. These ulcers are



caused by bacterial infection or overuse of nonsteroidal antiinflammatory drugs such as aspirin and ibuprofen. Symptoms include pain in the midsection between meals or at night. Other symptoms include weight loss, bloating, nausea/vomiting and frequent burping. Medication is usually effective in treating this condition.

Irritable bowel syndrome (IBS): IBS is a disorder caused by changes in the way the gastrointestinal tract works. It causes abdominal pain, bloating and cramping, changes in bowel movements, and either constipation or bouts of diarrhea. IBS is diagnosed when the symptoms of pain, fullness, gas and bloating are present for at least three days a month, in a three-month period. IBS can be controlled through diet and medication.

If you experience any symptoms of severe heartburn or these digestive diseases, don't continue to suffer. Your doctor can help you manage or treat the symptoms, or confirm or rule out a more serious disorder. Be sure to note the nature, frequency and timing of your pain to share with your doctor.

In another saucepan combine sugar, cocoa, milk and butter; bring to a boil.
