Happy Whatever Day!



# Never Too Late

Jennifer Pope's love of running began early in life. Starting as a fifth-grader and continuing through high school, she competed in what she refers to as fast stuff. "I always found myself on the 400- and 800-meter relays," Jennifer recalled. "I ran in college for the exercise of it."

As an adult, things in life — marriage, family and career — took precedence. But 12 years ago, Jennifer once again found solace in putting on running shoes and taking to the road, this time as a distance runner. "My father-in-law, Don Pope, wanted to lose weight, so he asked if I'd be interested in running with him," she explained how the journey she's now on began. "Saturdays became our training days. We were an encouragement to one another."

Those weekend workouts with Don turned into half marathons, 8-mile turkey trots and local 5Ks for Jennifer. Training for her first big marathon, the White Rock Marathon held annually in early December in Dallas, began soon after her son, Chase, was born in 2003. Caroline Ford, one of Jennifer's friends expressed an interest in running a full marathon. "People talk about marathons," Jennifer admitted. "Caroline and I wanted to do more than talk, so we decided to get serious about training for White Rock."

Just two short months prior to the marathon, Jennifer's mother passed away. Many runners would have put their plans on hold, but Jennifer knew her mom would want her to continue on with her plans, and continue she did. "I remember running with Caroline the day after Mom died," Jennifer shared. "Caroline asked me how I was doing, and I calmly answered with, 'My mom passed away yesterday." Of course, Caroline was momentarily taken aback, but Jennifer knew running and putting one foot in front of the other during the final two months of training would bring the peace in heart, mind and spirit she desired. "Running became my therapy," she confessed.

As the years came and went, Jennifer's weekends once again were spent competing in local 5Ks, half marathons and full marathons. In 2006, Jennifer ran the Fort Worth Marathon. Her visit to Cowtown earned her a spot in the Boston Marathon. After she crossed the finish line, her father-in-law told her he

thought her time had qualified her. "You have to earn a spot in Boston based mostly on your time and age," Jennifer explained. "I did qualify in 2008, and I ran the race in April 2009."

Jennifer was healthy and without injuries when she ran in Boston. Since the day of the marathon

Jennifer was healthy and without injuries when she ran in Boston. Since the day of the marathon is a holiday, runners, totaling well over 30,000, are treated like royalty. "I felt like a rock star," she confessed with a grin. "I ran by

myself, but I didn't feel alone. It was so cool!" The crowd noise was so loud there was no need for her to turn her iPod on. "I wouldn't have been able to hear the music anyway," she

laughed. The crowd noise gave Jennifer the confidence she needed to keep pounding the pavement toward the finish line.

The excitement she felt was overwhelming. When she got to Heartbreak Hill, the marker that lets runners know they are more than halfway to their goal, Jennifer was feeling pretty good. "The cheers sounded like a rumble," she said. "They made my insides shake, and I couldn't control the smile on my face." When she saw her dad and her husband at mile 23, she knew she had this. "After the finish, they found me," she said. "My dad said he was proud of me. You're never too old to hear those words."

After getting back to the hotel, Jennifer was thinking seriously about returning to the half marathons, since training takes less time, and it's much easier on the mind and body. But Jon had other ideas for his wife. "He thought we should do the New York Marathon," she remembered. "I hadn't even changed clothes yet. I asked him, 'What part of we is running that marathon?" Then Jennifer realized that it's a team effort. Jon is so supportive of Jennifer, and that showed as he stepped up to help with Chase's daily routine, so Jennifer





could sign up and begin her training. Friends and family show Jennifer support through prayer and encouragement.

The New York Marathon is a full marathon for which anyone can sign up. Runners are drawn on a lottery system prior to the race. The first two years

Jennifer did not get in. The third time proved to be the charm Jennifer needed. I wanted to run New York before I turned 40. I was chosen the year I turned 38," she said. "I ended up taking advantage of the year-postponement rule. I had to decide to run injured with severe shin splints or wait another year, which meant I'd be 39. I decided to wait."

As the 2012 race loomed in Jennifer's future, she and her running buddy, Katy Curtis, began to train together. Katy had never run a marathon and was ready to give it a try. The week of the race, Hurricane Sandy showed up and wreaked so much havoc that she and her cheering section ended up cancelling the trip. New York also cancelled the marathon because of Sandy. Instead, Jennifer ran the Fort Worth Marathon with Katy, which in the end was a true blessing. "God had other plans for me," she confessed.

Jennifer set her sights on the 2013 New York Marathon. Training once again brought challenges. She found her oncehealed shin splints hurting again, and she was 40. By mile 23 of the marathon, Jennifer was in a great deal of pain and dehydrated to the point of needing to walk some in order to finish. She






Originally, becoming a firefighter wasn't part of Randy's plan. "My parents were farmers, and my brother still is a farmer," he said. He spent his earliest years of adulthood working with farm equipment, doing mechanics and welding. Then one day, he decided he needed a change. "I had some friends who worked at the fire department. I thought I needed to find something more secure, so one day, I thought, I'm going to be a fireman!" Randy said. "I always saw the trucks there and talked to my friends who were firefighters, and I said, 'I can do that!""

He began his career in December 1988. Once he started, he realized he'd made the right choice. "I just enjoyed it," Randy said. "You get to the point where you're helping people and doing it for others. It just felt good." Randy discovered a passion for serving others and protecting the people in his community. "The best part is being able to help people when they're down, whether it's through EMS, or their house is on fire, or helping them if they're stuck on the side of the road or locked out of their house. When people are appreciative, that makes you feel really good."

Throughout the years, Randy had his share of strange moments on the job. "I've taken raccoons out of the nursing home. I've taken snakes out of houses. You never know what the job's going







you second chances," he admitted. "You have to learn how to talk to it, let it talk to you, learn how to read it." He had to learn many skills on the job, including lifesaving techniques. "The medical part surprised me more than anything. You see things you sometimes have to talk

out to get out of your mind." Some parts of the job never got easier, even after 25 years. "The worst part was dealing with death. You never get to where it doesn't bother you," Randy stated. "That's the hardest part — the firefighting stuff is easy compared to that."

Although the job was difficult, Randy loved serving the community and made



great friends during his years with the Waxahachie Fire Department. "Some of it's harder than you think," he shared. "It's the same thing every day, but it's also different every day. That's what keeps you there. There's no better job." Before Randy was promoted to main pump

engineer, he worked 23 years with the same group of firefighters. "You're gone a third of your life," Randy said. "You have two families—one at home and a family away from home." Since he retired, one of the hardest adjustments he has had to make is not seeing his friends every day. "Yeah, I miss the guys," he admitted. "I miss them a lot.

"I miss the work, too," he added. "You get into a routine. It's hard to get out of it." Part of Randy's routine involved cooking for his fellow firefighters every day in the station kitchen. "I had been the cook for 15 years when I moved out to Station 3," he explained. "I'd go in, and my main duty was to cook. I think what the guys miss most about me is my cooking," Randy joked. "I'd cook, and we'd eat and start our day. Sometimes we didn't get to eat, because the tones would drop. We'd come back to cold eggs."

For Randy, the decision to retire and hang up his helmet was difficult but obvious. "Everybody asks, 'When do you retire?" Randy said. "There's not a time. You just know it. Something inside you just tells you it's time."

Even though he no longer serves as a firefighter, he reflects on his career with fondness daily. "It's just a great job," he said, labeling his years in Waxahachie as very rewarding. Serving his community was a great experience for Randy. "The citizens of Waxahachie have given the fire department a lot over the years, and







milled cabinetry, white and tan tile, glass inserts and high-end appliances, including a six-burner gas stove with grill. 




The facility began as a dream eight years ago during the construction surge that brought SAGU two new dorms and a fitness center. "It began with recognizing the potential of the newly developed drama and digital media programs. We realized if we were going to see those take off, we needed quality facilities," said Kermit Bridges, president of the university. "In an era of digital media and drama, what we had in terms of facilities was completely inadequate."

According to President Bridges, the digital media and drama programs were originally developed with the knowledge

that new facilities would eventually need to be built. "Before the communication center, we still had tremendous success with students coming out of the communication program and getting high-level jobs," President Bridges noted. "If those kinds of kids are having that kind of success with no facilities, think of the kind of success they can have with new facilities."

Building the communication center began with the design. "We looked at comparable facilities at other major schools and created our wish list," President Bridges said. "We ended up with a building on paper way beyond what we were capable of realizing." However, the building committee refused to be discouraged, trusting the funds would somehow come. "Rather than impose the limitations of what we thought was possible, we decided to dream a little, and say, 'Alright, if money was not an object and if resources come through, what would we like the building to look like?""

President Bridges said. "That's how the dream began to unfold."

Of course, that dream couldn't come true without adequate funds. In the spring of 2011, the university decided to move ahead with the project, initially borrowing \$8 million. Although a couple of donors had expressed interest in the project, the university didn't have a commitment from either of them. As summer approached, the university began to accept the building of their dreams might not be attainable and would take much longer to build than originally expected. However, help arrived just in time. "I was in Roswell for my uncle's funeral," President Bridges explained. "I received two text messages: 'You're not going to believe this,' and 'Have two checks totaling \$7 million."

After setting up a scholarship fund for \$2 million, the anonymous donors heard about the new communication center and came back to offer an additional \$5 million toward the project. "Over the course of the next six months, they gave us another \$3.8 million," President Bridges said. "On top of that, Dr. John Hagee, from San Antonio, committed \$2.5 million for the project, and we received another \$1 million Challenge Grant from the Mabee Foundation. We had never had gifts of that level in the history of the school." All of these donations, along with multiple smaller donations, helped make the communication center a reality.

The Hagee Communication Center features a 600-seat auditorium set up as a performance hall with all the amenities,



including theater seating, state-ofthe-art audio-visual board, orchestra pit, green room and rehearsal hall. Also included is a black box theater that seats 80-120 patrons. As part of the College of Communication Arts, the facility has faculty offices, computer labs, classrooms and a television broadcast studio. Digital media students have the equipment to make full-length feature films. Music students have state-of-theart, soundproof practice rooms. Drama students have access to a workshop,



dressing rooms and a fully equipped stage.

The main emphasis of the facility is to serve the students on campus, according to Tom Lepper, programming manager for the Hagee Communication Center. "It's a hands-on facility. 
for receptions and other events. The fountain courtyard is an excellent space for concerts and smaller gatherings. The auditorium is available for plays, concerts and conferences.

# When It Comes to Colorectal Cancer, Put Facts Over Fears

Nobody likes getting a colonoscopy. But the fact remains that it's the best way to prevent colorectal cancer or catch it in its earliest stages. If you are over the age of 50 and have never had a colonoscopy — or if you are 60 or older and it has been 10 years since your last one — it's time to talk to your physician about getting a colonoscopy.

Likewise, men and women with a digestive disease, such as: inflammatory bowel disease, ulcerative colitis or Crohn's disease, or who have a family history of colorectal cancer, should talk to their physician about colonoscopy much sooner. The procedure typically is not as bad as most people think, and it's the best way to stop colorectal cancer early, or before it even starts.

# Knowing the Facts

- A leading cause of cancer deaths. According to the National Cancer Institute, colorectal cancer is the second leading cause of cancer-related deaths in the United States.
- Equal opportunity offender. Unlike some cancers, colorectal cancer impacts both men and women in nearly equal numbers. In 2013, the American Cancer Society estimates approximately 73,000 men and 69,000 women were diagnosed with a form of the disease.
- No symptoms doesn't mean no problems. Unfortunately, most people won't experience any symptoms of colorectal cancer, such as pain and bleeding, until it's already in its later stages, often making treatment more difficult.
- Prioritize prevention. By removing precancerous tissue called polyps from the colon during a colonoscopy, you can prevent them from ever becoming cancer.

# Overcoming Your Fear

Here are three common fears (or excuses) physicians hear for not getting a colonoscopy, and why they shouldn't hold you back anymore:

• The day before: Preparing for a colonoscopy usually involves fasting and drinking a laxative to flush your system before the procedure. In the past, patients often complained about the taste of the laxative. However, depending on where you're having the screening done, the laxative may just consist of a powder mixed with Gatorade, so it tastes much better.

While there is no way to sugarcoat the diarrhea that accompanies a laxative cleanse, keep in mind that for most people a colonoscopy is a once-a-decade screening, and it could save your life.

• Pain and discomfort: Patients are under sedation for the duration of the procedure, which usually only lasts 20 to 30 minutes. Normally, patients come out of sedation with no memory of it. Even if polyps are found and removed during the procedure, it doesn't hurt.

In addition, advances in colonoscopy over the last 10 years have improved the procedure. For instance, often CO<sub>2</sub> is used instead of air to access the colon with the scope, which is absorbed much quicker by the body. So the gassy feeling that some patients were once left with after a colonoscopy is normally much less now.

• An abnormal finding: Some people fear medical tests because of what might be found. But that should serve as motivation. Especially with a colonoscopy, since it is one of the few screening tests that can also eliminate potential troubled tissue at the same time, all while you're sedated. And not only is cancer, if found early, more treatable, the treatment is usually a lot easier. NOW

- I small or medium can diced Ro-Tel tomatoes
- 2 pkgs. dry Hidden Valley ranch dressing mix
- Grated cheese of choice, in desired amount
- Tortilla chips, in desired amount, broken
- **1.** Combine first 4 ingredients in a Crock-Pot. Heat on high for about 20 minutes, or until flavors blend. Turn pot to low until ready to eat.
- **2.** Pour into individual bowls; top with cheese and chips.

# Oven-baked Ritz Chicken Serves 6-8.

8 boneless, skinless chicken breasts 2 sleeves Ritz Crackers 1/4 tsp. pepper 1/2 cup plain yogurt

- **1.** Preheat oven to 350 F. Spray a 9x13-inch baking dish with cooking spray.
- 2. Cut breasts lengthwise.
- **3.** In a bowl, crush crackers into fine crumbs. Add pepper; toss to blend and set aside.
- **4.** Place yogurt in another bowl; dip chicken in yogurt and roll in cracker mixture. Place chicken in dish; bake 30 minutes. Turn meat over, bake another 30 minutes.

# Flaky Pie Crust

Makes 5 9-inch crusts.

4 cups sifted flour 2 tsp. salt 1 1/2 cups Crisco shortening 14 tsp. ice water

- **1.** With electric blender, mix flour, salt and shortening until texture resembles coarse corn meal. Sprinkle water over mixture. Stir with fork until large ball of dough forms.
- **2.** Turn dough onto a floured board or waxed paper. Roll dough in flour, cut into 5 equal portions.
- 3. Roll each portion out to fit a 9-inch pie

tin or plate with an inch hang over. Roll edges under, crimp or flute with fingers.

**4.** If recipe calls for baked pie crust, prick dough all over with fork. Bake in a 400 F oven for 15 minutes, or until crust is browned.

# Basic Cream Pie (With Variations)

1 1/2 cups sugar

4 level Tbsp. flour

1/8 tsp. salt

4 eggs, separated

2 cups whole milk

2 Tbsp. margarine

1 1/2 tsp. vanilla

1 9-inch baked pie crust

- **1.** Mix together sugar, flour and salt. Add small amount of milk to mixture to make a thick paste.
- **2.** Mix beaten yolks, remaining milk and margarine.
- **3.** Cook in microwave on high setting at 2 minute intervals, whisking between intervals. Three times is enough. Add vanilla. Pour into crust.
- **4.** Top pie with meringue (see meringue recipe below). Brown 15 minutes at 300 F. **Variations:**

For coconut cream: Add 1 cup of angel food coconut to filling. Sprinkle coconut over meringue.

For chocolate cream: Add 1 pkg. Nestlé Pre-Melted chocolate or 2 level Tbsp. cocoa to step 1 of recipe.

For pineapple cream: Add 1 8-oz. can crushed pineapple (drained) to filling. For banana cream: Slice 1 or 2 bananas into crust before pouring in filling.

# Sibling Rivalry Miracle Meringue

- 4 egg whites
- 5 Tbsp. Sibling Rivalry meringue powder
- **1.** Beat both ingredients at medium to high speed until meringue stands in peaks and does not run when bowl is tilted or turned upside down.
- **2.** Spread meringue over 9- or 10-inch pie. Swirl or make peaks with a tablespoon.
- 3. Brown at 300 F for 15 minutes.
