



FOREVER 19

Austin Staggs loved being outdoors, playing, fishing, hunting and being with his friends, of which he made many growing up in Weatherford. As a teenager, he and his mother had agreements and disagreements, but she loved him, and he loved her.

After high school, Austin joined the Army. In the days before his deployment, Kaye Jordan celebrated with her son, alternating between pride and fear. "I knew there was a 50-50 chance he might not come back from Afghanistan," she said. "So, I prayed

hard for protection over my only son." Before long, her emotions collided with reality drenched in deep sorrow.

On the 96th day of deployment, Austin's unit was

had to do something. It couldn't end like this. We had to remember our kids. These are boys who walked the halls of the high school and ran around town."

Kaye contacted several families she knew who had lost military sons. She became the agent for 501(c)(3) status and formed Parker County Gold Star Families. The group includes all family members, not just mothers. Kaye purposely included fathers and one uncle on the board of directors realizing men grieve along with their wives and other children or grandchildren.



The group primarily focuses on raising money to build an amazing memorial at Soldier Spring Park. The city supported the plan, donating part of the park for the site and contributing architectural plans. Not having to pay for land gave Kaye hope. "We're grateful for the city's support," she said. "Now we just have to raise the money." So far, the group has raised over \$30,000 through fundraisers and donations. They need \$250,000. "I can't see this not happening, because I know people care," she said. "There are



over 116,000 people in Parker County. If each person gave just \$1, we'd have more than half the money."

Plans include selling memorial bricks and benches. They want any person who ever had a family member who served in the military to purchase a brick in honor or memory of their loved one. Each person who donates at least \$1,000 will have his or her name on a recognition plaque as a supporter of the military.

Gold Star Families connected with the Veterans of Foreign Wars and American Legion organizations that also believe in the idea. Each group assists with fundraisers. The Gold Star Families will work hard to make the memorial a reality. However, they seek community involvement with donations of money, time, labor and materials. One local businessman already expressed an interest in providing a fountain. Kaye's husband, Judd, will add to the donations through Jordan Construction. She hopes many others will come forward and offer assistance or attend fundraisers.

They plan to have booths at the Weatherford Christian Academy event on May 23 and Parker County Sheriff's Posse Frontier Days in the near future. "We'd like to have a skeet shooting tournament," Kaye said, "but we need a place to hold it."

The memorial will have a prayer garden where families can seek healing. The memory bricks and benches will honor current and past veterans. Eventually they will build a pavilion. Kaye envisions schoolteachers bringing children to the park, teaching them about freedom and the cost associated with it. She sees state representatives holding



meetings there, and joy entering the atmosphere through military weddings.


Although the memorial consumes meeting times of the Gold Star Families, the group also supports its members. No family chooses or wants eligibility in the organization. Circumstances have thrust it upon them. The mothers form bonds, and the families spend time together, but the wound in Kaye's heart remains fresh and deep. Gold Star Families understand, because they feel the same way. They will continue as a group after completing the memorial. As long as war exists, Parker County families need the camaraderie. "Eventually, I hope we can help those who come back home and need support," Kave said.


Memories linger throughout Weatherford for this mother — grocery stores, the lake, everywhere she goes. Simple moments resurrected in her mind affect her sometimes with joy, other times with tears. In 2013, reality hit hard. She still struggles to grasp fully what happened. It seems impossible her son isn't coming home. She can't call or text him, and it hurts. A memorial won't change that for anyone, but it will help heal broken hearts. If not for her relationship with God, Kaye readily admits she wouldn't be able to carry on. She finds peace knowing Austin is in heaven with his Maker.

"Austin is my hero, but he was my child first," she said. "He's forever 19. That will never change." NOW



if building on the sloped lot would be feasible. "We lived in the mountains in California for a while in a three-story house on stilts. I knew we could figure this out. We could build something really cool and take advantage of this view," Joel shared.

When it came to house plans, they created a unique floor plan to meet their needs. "We designed our house on an Excel spreadsheet, because we couldn't find what we liked," Joel said. They chose an architect and contracted out most of the work. With help from their teenagers' friends, the family completed most of the interior projects themselves. They painted every room, and Braxton and his friends installed all the doors, hardware and wood flooring throughout the house. Joel and Lisa thought the experience would help their children learn fundamental building skills. "They did a great job," Joel said. "Everybody came over to work, and then we would barbecue and swim afterwards. We had all the free help we wanted," he grinned.

Each room in the house has a window, so when they are open, a continuous breeze flows throughout the home. Braxton and Rachel have their own suites upstairs, with a bedroom, bathroom and large walk-in closet. A small office sits upstairs between the teens' rooms. Each room has a set of French doors opening onto the second-floor covered porch. With help from family members and friends, they welded and painted the

metal porch railing, which is accented with crosses.

The family often spends time in the downstairs living area, which is full of windows, providing the perfect view of the lake. A taupe sectional offers space for visitors to chat. They don't have cable television, so evenings are often spent visiting with one another. Floating cabinets in a nook in the living room lend space for family photos. 




at Trinity Bible Church, so their home has an open-door policy. "A lot of the kids will come and hang out, just to get some quiet time," Joel said. And, there is never a shortage of places to find tranquility at their lake house. Whether it's sitting on the dock, swinging on the covered porch or warming up around the fire pit, visitors can find solace or a conversation with friends.

Joel graduated from Weatherford High School in 1988 and attended The University of Texas at Arlington. Just after graduating from high school in Grand Prairie, Lisa met Joel during his freshman year at college, while she was working with his sister at a Bennigan's in Fort Worth. The couple's unofficial first date was at the restaurant on July 4. "We got married two years later to the day," Joel said, grinning. They'll celebrate 23 years of marriage this July. Joel and Lisa own a local business, JDAROOFING, and plan to live on the lake for quite some time. Their home will provide space for the children when they return home for a visit from college and, one day, with their own families.

Braxton will graduate from Trinity Christian Academy this year and plans to attend the University of North Dakota this fall. "It's very bittersweet. I'm so proud of him," Lisa shared. "It's so exciting to see him have a goal, a dream, a desire and be able to follow it, because he's done the hard work," she boasted. "It will be such a huge hole without him here."

Braxton stays busy playing sports and is involved in choir and theater at TCA. He is president of the National Honor Society and a member of the praise team at school. Graduation is just weeks away, and he finds himself wondering about



the new experiences awaiting him in North Dakota, where he will be pursuing a degree in unmanned aircraft systems operations. Braxton would eventually like to operate drones. "I want to be as involved as I can in that industry," Braxton said. For that major, the FAA requires students to acquire their private and commercial pilot licenses. Braxton has always wanted to fly and plans to enlist in the North Dakota Air National Guard.

With Braxton heading off to college this fall, he and Rachel aim to take advantage of their lake time together this summer. "I'm happy for him. I don't want him to leave, but I think it will be a neat opportunity for him," Rachel shared. "I'm excited to see where it leads him in his life. I think it will open up so many roads for him." Rachel will graduate from TCA in 2015. She's excited, but a little nervous about her senior year. She also keeps busy playing sports and as a member of the praise team and choir. Music is a big part of her life, and she would like to put her musical talent to use once out in the real world. She plans to major in music therapy and minor in sign language. The University of North Dakota has a music therapy program, so the Aldridge children may be back together again after she has graduated from high school.

For now, Joel, Lisa and their children will cherish their time together on Lake Weatherford. With summer at their doorstep, they'll spend their days sailing the lake or sitting around the campfire, as Rachel sings to the melodies emanating from Braxton's guitar. "There's not going to be a lot of lake time in North Dakota," Braxton laughed. NOW






were simple crafts, such as a drawstring bag or an apron. "As a child gets older, the skill level gradually increases," she explained about the 4-H program. She made a denim coat, which her mother wore proudly, and a formal dress for a school dance. Her mother packed away some of her creations, and when she and her family go back to Indiana to visit, Lee-Ann often rummages through her mom's fabrics, sparking memories. "It's fun, because a lot of the fabrics are from sewing projects from my childhood."

Although she took some time off from sewing while in college at Purdue University, Lee-Ann jumped right back into the craft when she and her husband, Andy, had children. "I thought it would be more fun to sew things for my kids." She no longer sews as much clothing for her children, but one Halloween, Lee-Ann decided to make her daughter, Lyla, an Ariel costume. "I laugh because it was like \$70 for the fabric. And, I spent probably 10 hours making it. I should have just gotten a store-bought costume," she admitted, chuckling. Despite spending all that time and money on Lyla's costume, Lee-Ann wouldn't trade the experience or the artistic expression she achieved by making it for her daughter. Lee-Ann enjoys the

creativity of sewing. "I love textiles. Vintage fabrics are particularly interesting to me. I love to go to flea markets, thrift stores, antique malls or garage sales and pick up old sheets or tablecloths," she explained. "Many times, I'll pull out tablecloths that have stains on them. I cut around the imperfections and use the fabric. These items most likely would have ended up in the trash, but a lot of it has really intricate embroidery or lacework," she said.

Vintage fabrics and lace often adorn her creations. "Right now, I'm focusing on bold, fun, one-of-a-kind steering wheel covers. A lot of the fabric is funky hippy orange and olive green from the '60s and '70s — the graphic prints." She sells some of her final products on Etsy.com and at local craft shows through her small business, Whoopsie Daisies. Each steering wheel cover is unique, featuring colorful fabrics and often fun, ink-stamped phrases. "Steering wheel covers are just something very different to purchase or to give a friend as a gift."

In the past, Lee-Ann has sewn tooth fairy pillows, often gifting them to her children's friends as birthday presents. Most recently, she began sewing with

felt. For her son, Gray, she sewed a felt campfire set. And, this past fall, she sewed felt pumpkins, which dotted her home with warm shades of orange.

Hats and headbands are part of her repertoire, along with flower brooches. Pajama pants are always a favorite with her children. She sews them from vintage sheets, which are very soft to the touch. "Pretty much anybody can go online and find an easy tutorial and teach themselves how to sew pajama pants," she explained. "To me, the fun part is to change that around and use fun fabric. Or maybe make each leg two different fabrics or put a pocket in an odd spot."




Lee-Ann likes taking a simple skill and expanding it. "I'm always cutting up T-shirts — making tube tops and swimsuit cover-ups for myself and Lyla." Aprons were once one of Lee-Ann's favorite items to sew. One of her apron patterns was published in *Craft Challenge: Dozens of Ways to Repurpose a Pillowcase* by Lark Books. "It was a tiered ruffle apron. I would cut off the embroidered portion of pillowcases," she explained. "Then, it would have five different ruffles with different motifs on the front of the apron."

Regardless of what creative sewing Lee-Ann is doing, she finds solace behind the sewing machine. She and her family moved into a new home in Aledo about two years ago, and now, she has her very own sewing room. "I walk by and stare longingly," she laughed. "I never get enough time in there."


















Finding time appears to be a nagging hassle many people face when they want to redirect their efforts to something joyful. "It's nice to have a sewing room where I can go work on a project for 10 minutes, then come back out and start dinner, go back in there for 10 minutes," she laughed. "Ideally, I would have my coffee, my music playing and just sew all day."

Sewing a steering wheel cover takes about an hour, but the behind-the-scenes work can be time-consuming. Lee-Ann spends hours looking for the perfect fabric, washing it and making other preparations before sitting down to sew. Lee-Ann bought her Janome sewing machine about 10 years ago, and it has been a great investment. She also owns a serger, which finishes the edge of the fabric with a zig-zag type stitch, giving a professional look. Without an embroidery machine, Lee-Ann must hand-sew any creative wording onto fabric.

A large wooden armoire in her sewing room provides a spot for piles of colorful textiles. Her closet is filled with buttons, vintage lace, thread and stuffing. A table gives Lee-Ann plenty of space to measure and cut the fabric, which is always ironed to make the cut straighter. She often uses a rotary cutter to cut more evenly. If using a pattern, Lee-Ann pins it to the fabric before cutting. When it comes to needles, she will use a thinner, more delicate one for knit fabric, but a thicker, stronger needle is needed for fabrics such as denim. Servicing her sewing machines once a year is also an important rule to follow, keeping them clean and in working condition.

For Lee-Ann, sewing is a creative outlet — one she makes time to enjoy. "You would be surprised. A lot of people don't know how to do basic sewing and repairs," she said. One day, she hopes to pass down the craft to her own daughter. "It's nice to know that I can do it." **NOW**





basketball, tennis and soccer. Whatever children's interests might be, Misty Luttrell, director of overnight and family camps at Camp Fire, recognizes a common denominator: togetherness. "With all the electronics out there, kids spend more time plugged in and less time interacting face to face," she pointed out. attending VBS with other kids who come from families where values are important and faith is central."


- **4.** Engaging entertainment: "Kids at VBS don't just spend time reading the Bible. VBS programs have curriculums built for and around kids that are full of adventure."
- **5.** Economic value: "Because they are church based, most VBS programs are not set up to make a profit. They are set up to share a message."


Library Programs



Prepare for Health Care Costs During Retirement

As you save and invest for retirement, what are your ultimate goals? Do you plan on traveling the world? Purchasing a vacation home? Pursuing your hobbies? People often think aboout and plan for these costs. Yet, too often, many of us overlook what potentially could be a major expense during our retirement years — health care. By preparing for these costs, you can help yourself enjoy the retirement lifestyle you've envisioned.

Many of us may ignore the impact of health care costs, because we just assume Medicare will pay for everything. But that's not the case. In estimating health care costs during retirement, you may find that \$4,000 to \$6,000 per year per person for traditional medical expenses is a good starting point, although the amount varies by individual. Furthermore, this figure does not include the costs of long-term care, which can be considerable. To illustrate: The national average for home health aide services is nearly \$45,000 per year, and a private room in a nursing home is nearly \$84,000 per year, according to a recent survey by Genworth, a financial security company.

So what can you do to help cope with these costs? Here are a few suggestions:

Estimate your costs. Try to estimate what your out-of-pocket health care costs might be, based on your health, your age at retirement, whatever supplemental insurance you may carry and other factors.

Know the key dates. Things can change in your life, but try to identify, as closely as possible, the age at which you plan to retire. This will help you spot any coverage gaps before you become eligible for Medicare at age 65. Also, be aware of the seven-month window for enrolling in Medicare, beginning three months before your 65th birthday.

Review your insurance options. Medicare-approved insurance

companies offer some other parts to Medicare, including Part D, which covers prescription drugs; Medigap, which covers gaps in Parts A and B (in-hospital expenses, doctor services, outpatient care and some preventive services); and Part C (also known as Medicare Advantage, which is designed to replace Parts A, B, Medigap and, potentially, part D). You have several options for Part D, Medigap and Medicare Advantage, each with varying coverage and costs, so choose the plans that best fit your needs. (To learn more about Medicare and supplemental insurance, go to www.medicare.gov.)

Develop a long-term care strategy. To meet long-term care costs, you could self-insure or purchase insurance coverage. To learn about long-term care insurance solutions, contact your financial advisor.

Invest for growth and rising income. Health care costs typically rise as you move further into retirement, so make sure that a reasonable portion of your assets is allocated to investments with the potential for both growth and rising income.

Think about health care directives. If you were to become incapacitated, you might be unable to make health care decisions — and these decisions may affect not only your quality of life but also your financial situation, and that of your family. Talk to your legal advisor about establishing a health care directive, which allows you to name someone to make choices on your behalf.

Health care costs during your retirement may be unavoidable. But by anticipating these costs, you can put yourself in a position to deal with them — and that's a healthy place to be. **NOW**

Silence in Loss

"What did you say?" In a louder voice you ask again, "What? I can't hear you." It may not be the speaker's fault you did not hear something as well as you used to. Maybe your hearing needs your attention. Your hearing is a valuable sensory commodity you have used since before you were born. How well you continue to hear will affect the quality of life you enjoy. So it's important to have any problems with your ears investigated by a physician to prevent hearing loss.

Everyone has difficulty hearing or understanding another person at some time or another. Here is a list from the National Institute on Deafness and Other Communication Disorders to help objectively determine if there is reason for concern. If you answer yes on three or more, consult with your physician for further guidance.

- 1. Do you have trouble hearing people on the phone?
- 2. Do you have a problem following a conversation when two or more people are talking?
- 3. Do people complain that the volume is too high when you watch TV?
- 4. Do you have to strain/try hard to understand conversation?
- 5. Do you have trouble hearing in a noisy background?
- 6. Do you find yourself asking people to repeat themselves?
- 7. Do many people you talk to seem to mumble or not speak clearly?
- 8. Do you misunderstand what others are saying and respond inappropriately?

9. Do you have trouble understanding the speech of women and children? 10. Do people get annoyed, because you misunderstand what they say?

Even if you score the requisite three points, do not panic. Your hearing may be affected by something treatable. An excess amount of ear wax will dull your hearing. An ear infection, certain diseases and/or medications can interfere with the normal operation of your ear. Your first course of action should be to consult with your primary care physician, who may refer you to a specialist such as an otolaryngologist, sometimes called an ENT (ear, nose and throat) doctor — a medical doctor who specializes in those areas. You may be referred to an otologist, who is a highly specialized otolaryngologist focusing mainly on matters of the ear and balance.

Treatment for hearing loss depends upon its cause. If loss of hearing is permanent, then hearing aids or hearing transplants may be necessary. The goal is to improve hearing and communication. Protect your hearing and seek professional help when warranted. NOW

Roasted Shrimp Cocktail

Tbsp. olive oil
 Ibs. shrimp, cleaned, deveined and dried, tails intact
 tsp. kosher salt
 tsp. freshly ground black pepper

1 tsp. lemon zest

Sauce:

1/2 cup Heinz Chili Sauce
1/2 cup Heinz Tomato Ketchup
3 Tbsp. horseradish
2 tsp. fresh lemon juice
1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
1/4 tsp. Tabasco

I. Preheat oven to 400 F. Oil baking sheet; spread shrimp evenly on pan; season with salt and pepper. Roast 8-10 minutes; set aside to cool. When cooled top with

lemon zest.

2. For sauce: Mix together all ingredients. Serve shrimp with sauce for dipping.

Potato Pancakes

Vegetable oil

2 large potatoes, peeled and finely grated
1 Tbsp. onion, grated
2 eggs
2 Tbsp. flour
1 1/2 tsp. salt
Dash of pepper

1. Mix first 6 ingredients in a bowl.

2. Place about 1/4-inch of oil in a skillet on medium heat. Drop 1 Tbsp. of batter into the skillet; spread each pancake with the back of a spoon until thin. Cook each side about

3-5 minutes or until browned. Serve with butter and applesauce or sugar.

Green Enchiladas

Sauce

1 10 3/4-oz. can cream of chicken soup

1/2 lb. Velveeta cheese

1 5-oz. can evaporated milk

1 4-oz. can green chilies

1 4-oz. jar chopped pimento

Enchiladas:

I lb. ground beef
I small onion, chopped
I/2 lb. longhorn cheese, grated
12 corn tortillas

- **1.** For sauce: Mix together all ingredients in a pot on medium heat until cheese has melted. Set aside.
- **2.** For enchiladas: Preheat oven to 350 F. Brown beef in a skillet. Add onions and cheese.
- **3.** Wrap tortillas in a moist paper towel and heat in microwave for 30 seconds. Fill tortillas with meat mixture, roll and place in a 13x9-inch baking dish. Pour sauce over enchiladas; cover dish with foil. Bake for 30 minutes.

Avocado Bombay

2 Tbsp. butter

I small onion, chopped

I small apple, peeled and chopped

1 10.75-oz. can cream of chicken soup

Salt, to taste

2 tsp. curry powder

3 cups cooked rice

3 ripe avocados peeled, seeded and halved

Bacon, toasted nuts, sliced green onions for garnish (optional)

- **1.** Melt butter in a skillet on medium heat. Add onion and apple; sauté for about 3-5 minutes. Stir in soup and seasonings.
- **2.** Spoon rice into serving dish. Top rice with avocado halves; spoon heated mixture onto avocados. Top with bacon pieces, toasted nuts or green onions, if desired, before serving.
