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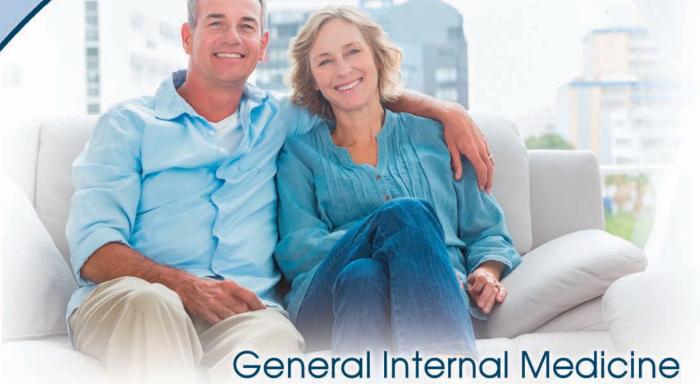


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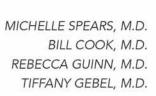

A familiar face has been running and biking along the byways of Navarro County and swimming in the Corsicana YMCA pool for many years. That face belongs to Nathan Bugg, who not only trains locally but has also won and placed well in area races. His biggest accomplishment came when he earned the right to wear the Ironman tattoo after completing the grueling 140.6 Ironman Triathlon within the

specified time limits. 'I qualified in Houston on May 17, 2014, after 14 hours of nonstop physical activity. I can't describe the feeling when I crossed the finish line and the crowd shouted, 'You're an Ironman!''
Nathan revealed.

The Ironman Triathlon is organized under the authority of the World Triathlon Corporation. A sanctioned event consists of a 2.4 mile (3.86 km.) swim, a 112 mile (180.25 km.) bicycle ride and a 26.2 mile (42.2 km.) marathon run that are completed in that

order without a break. The events usually have to be completed in 17 hours. Typically, a triathlon begins at 7:00 a.m. with each of the three events having maximum time limits. A competitor must complete the swim within 2 hours, 20 minutes; the bicycle ride within 8 hours, 10 minutes; and the marathon run within 6 hours, 30 minutes. Any competitor who can accomplish the feat within the time limits can become an Ironman. The Ironman World

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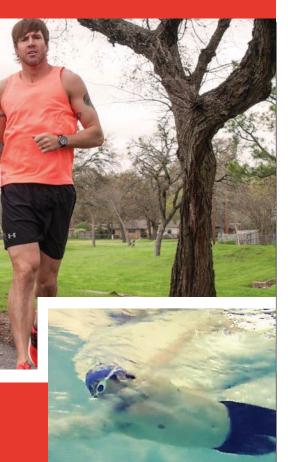
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reunions every consecutive year since 1996! "I played just about every sport in school, but was better in track. I didn't really hit my growth spurt until I was 20 years old," Nathan explained.

A runner with the DFW Runners Club and president of the Corsicana Running Club, Nathan enjoys the companionship of fellow runners/walkers whether he is out for a training, fun run or competing in a race. He competes in area races, winning the Derrick Days Oil Town Mini-Thon in 2013 and placing first and second in the Jingle Bell Jog. But Nathan also promotes running just for health and fun. "We run these streets" is the motto of the Corsicana Runners Club. Members are split into pace and age groups to complete the 3-mile loop around Northwood and Bowie streets in Corsicana. Some longer runs take in the county's scenic countryside. During most of the year, on weekdays, the group meets at 7:00 p.m. and on weekends at 7:00 a.m. "Only the faithful run during the winter," Nathan revealed. "We have all ages - members from all walks of life. We are good with any level of runner or walker. In the summer we get a lot of school/college kids and teachers. It's a social club for



people who like to run or walk. There's a small group of ladies who walk, and then there is Coach Rodriguez who has left all of us behind!"

One lady in Nathan's life doesn't just cheer from the sidelines or sidewalk. Whitney, his wife, has become a serious competitive runner. A graduate of Corsicana High School, Whitney was a CHS cheerleader and played softball. "I hated to run in softball, but once I figured out how to breathe right, running is OK," she said. From 2006-2011, she participated in small 5K races. Since then Whitney has graduated to the Dallas Half-Marathon last February 14. "In the beginning you just have to start adding miles," she explained.

The couple's training schedule is daunting and dedicated. Nathan trains about three hours every morning. Training for them during a typical week might include 60-plus miles of running, 50- to 100-mile bike rides and swims. Often running with them is their Boxer, Minka. "Raider, our other pet, doesn't run, but Minka is in as good a shape as we are," Nathan said. Fortunately, since Nathan coowns N8 Logistics, an oil-field equipment







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hauler, with his brother, and Whitney is a hair stylist at Tangles, they can schedule their training around work hours. Work is important, however, since a three-day event typically costs approximately \$650 per entry plus travel, lodging and meals.

Pretty well self-coached, Nathan was encouraged by a friend to compete in his first triathlon. Now he is helping three friends and Whitney to rise toward that level of competition, while he is working toward qualifying to run the Boston Marathon. "I remember my first triathlon



at Lake Aquilla (Hillsboro). Running is my strength, not free-style swimming, and open water swimming is very different from swimming in a pool. I was challenged to learn to swim and be able to get out in open water. There were 110 competitors, so I had people kicking me, and I didn't have any equipment except my bike, but the cool part of competing in the triathlon is that it inspires other people. Getting to the finish line is the most awesome feeling," Nathan related. "I had seen the Ironman on TV as a child, and it just stuck in my head — that it was something I had to do."

Injuries can occur. Only 12 days before he was to compete in the Austin Triathlon, Nathan stepped in a puddle and broke bones in his foot. "I was a late bloomer, but now I push my body to new realms. There's a joy in the pain," he said.

When asked what it takes to pursue Ironman status, Nathan advised, "Anything is possible if you put your mind to it. It's definitely a matter of mind over matter. Don't let your age or abilities dictate what you can or can't do, and don't let someone else dictate your story. It excites me to see other people get excited and enthusiastic about this sport."

Wayne has a background in construction and carpentry, so he handled many of the home's renovations himself. Since moving in, they have replaced all of the flooring with tile and reclaimed hardwood. The wall between the kitchen and dining room was removed to make one large room. They completely remodeled the kitchen and, in doing so, opened up space to add on a spacious sunroom. Skylights were installed, and the couple added a custom entertainment center that Wayne built, and even added a large deck in the backyard. "I have followed Wanda's directions for all



of the changes," Wayne said. "She tells me what she wants, and I find a way to do it. The house is more a reflection of Wanda."

The work Wayne and Wanda have done on their home has improved the way it

functions as well as made it much more attractive. "The neighbors around us say it's not the same house," Wanda said. Each of the rooms in the house has undergone changes, some subtle and some astounding. Some rooms have been created from scratch, like the beautiful sunroom

on the back of the house, which serves as an entertainment room. Wanda found the windows for the room first and designed the room around them. "I just love natural light," she said.

Other rooms have been repurposed, like Wanda's office at the front of the house and the sitting room in their bedroom suite, which was once one of the bedrooms. Every room has been updated and redecorated to complement Wanda's style. One example is the large living room, the first room guests see when they walk in. and it made this room feel really dark," Wanda said. "It just felt depressing. So, I decided we would paint over the paneling, and I think it turned out well." Wanda painted the room light green and filled it





with heirloom furniture from her greataunt and mother. "My taste in decorating is very eclectic," she noted.

Wayne has added many personal touches throughout the house to transform it into Wanda's dream home. He connected the back two bedrooms to create a master suite, which includes a sitting area, master bathroom and closets with crystal chandeliers Wayne found for her. He built a new fireplace mantel and display cabinets for Wanda's china collection. Wayne has a workshop in the backyard, and Wanda, who loves making craft projects, has a work area set up in the garage. "We're both kind of crafty," Wanda said. "I have the ideas, and he has the skills."

One of Wanda's favorite projects Wayne has built is her greenhouse in the backyard. "Wanda was at the Habitat for Humanity ReStore and saw a stack of 8-foot wood doors filled with glass panels," Wayne said. The French doors had been salvaged and were priced at \$5 apiece. "She took me back over and said they were so nice and such a good deal



that she wanted them. We got them all and brought them home." Wayne figured out a way to put them together and built a roof from spare lumber he already had. He even ran power out to the greenhouse and set it up so a garden hose can be attached and provide running water.

Wayne and Wanda have made sure their home is pet-friendly to accommodate their three dogs: Scooter, Victoria and Lottie. "I love them to death," Wanda said. "They're my babies. They're all rescue dogs." Scooter, a Dachshund, wandered to their house one day, and the Wards immediately loved him. "He never left!" Wanda laughed. Since no one ever reported Scooter missing, they decided to keep him. One day, he escaped their yard, and neighbors called them later to let them know they had found Scooter and that he had originally been their dog. "They graciously said we could keep him," Wanda said. Victoria, a Westie-Yorkie mix, came from a pet rescue in Houston. "She looked so pitiful," Wanda remembered. The weather may be challenging, people may be frazzled or tired, but Marcus, a greeter at the local Walmart for the last four years, strives to make the day better for each person who comes his way. "My mom always told me to respect everyone no matter who they are," Marcus explained.

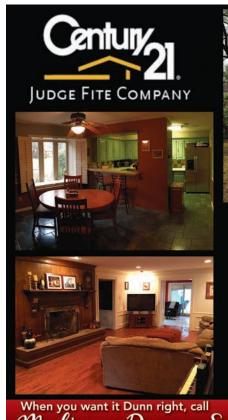
His mom, Daisy Polk, also made sure Marcus knew his Bible. One of his favorite verses guides his friendly attitude: "So in everything, do to others what you would have them do to you, for this sums up the Law and the Prophets," (Matthew 7:12, NIV).

"Everyone wants to be recognized and be significant, so greeting people by their name is important no matter where I am," he explained. Marcus not only remembers people's names, but he also recalls the details of their lives. "I don't share my problems and life much. Instead, I don't mind listening to how other people's lives are going."

So it's no wonder that after growing up in Corsicana and graduating from Corsicana High School in the class of 1992, Marcus earned an associate degree in psychology from Navarro College. 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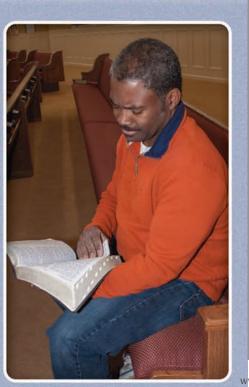
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Marcus began to further his studies in counseling and psychology by attending Texas A&M University-Commerce for one year. "My mom was a fantastic mentor. She helped me go to school in Commerce that year," Marcus said. However, his studies were interrupted when some troubled times came. In 2005. Marcus was in a traffic accident in Waxahachie. "Someone was tailgating me and forced my car to fishtail. I went off a bridge and my vehicle landed upside down," Marcus remembered. Luckily, people ran to help him get out of the vehicle. "Your life really does flash in front of your eyes in those few seconds. It was a blessing and a miracle from above that I survived," he added.

Other troubled times then came his way, when Marcus found himself between jobs with expenses still mounting. "People I thought would be there for me just disappeared," Marcus recalled. "I don't focus on my problems. I focus on how big Christ is," he stated. "I've learned that there is a reason for everything that happens. Hindsight is 20/20, but you just have to move on in life," Marcus said.

However, even he was a little surprised at how much his life had taken a turn toward the light when he became dehydrated one day while on the job. "My energy was just zapped out of me, so I had to sit down. Managers came and walked me to the office and called an ambulance. My family and good friends came to my house, and a close friend texted me to ask how I was doing. When it was posted on Facebook, 30 people showed me support there. Before that all happened, I didn't really think people

cared that much," Marcus revealed. "Now my mom cooks for me almost every day to make sure that I am eating right."

Work and special work-related honors have come Marcus' way. At Brookshire's, Marcus earned a trip to Cozumel, Mexico, after receiving the store's District Employee of the Year award in 2004. "I love to travel," he revealed. Also, this high-energy greeter received Employee of the Month honors from his present employer in 2011. The secret is in Marcus' "can do attitude."

Marcus attends not one church, but two — Westhill Church of Christ and Eastside Church of Christ. "I put Christ first and give thanks every day for all I have, and ask myself, 'Do you have an attitude of gratitude?"" Marcus said.

Self-studies have been a part of Marcus' life. He gets inspiration from the words of Christ, Dr. Charles Stanley; Joel Osteen; Dr. Robert Jeffress, pastor of First Baptist Church in Dallas; and Stephen Covey's *The Seven Habits of Highly Effective People.* "Of course, the Bible is No. 1 with me, and both my dad, Robert Polk, along with my mom, are real mentors to me. I have found that we are all works in progress," Marcus said.

Family and friends are important to Marcus who has two sisters and a brother. Even though he stays busy helping others when needed, Marcus finds time to work out at the gym and travel to Houston or Dallas occasionally to visit with friends. He is also planning to return to college in the near future to finish the approximate year of studies remaining to complete his B.S. degree.















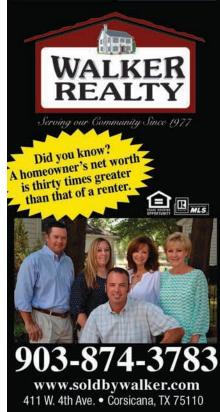

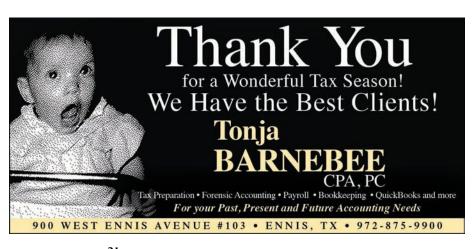

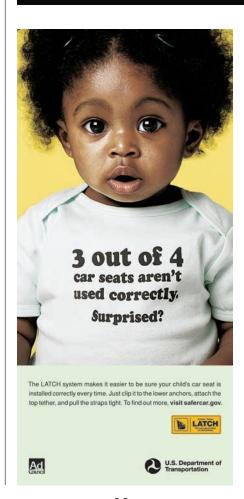

Every occupant on a personal watercraft is required to wear a life jacket.

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of Dermatology suggests applying sunscreen with an SPF of 30 or higher to all bare skin at least 15 minutes before heading outdoors. The sunscreen should be reapplied every two hours.

students to just paint. If they 'mess up,' we can help them 'fix up.' The idea is to have fun," Amy said.

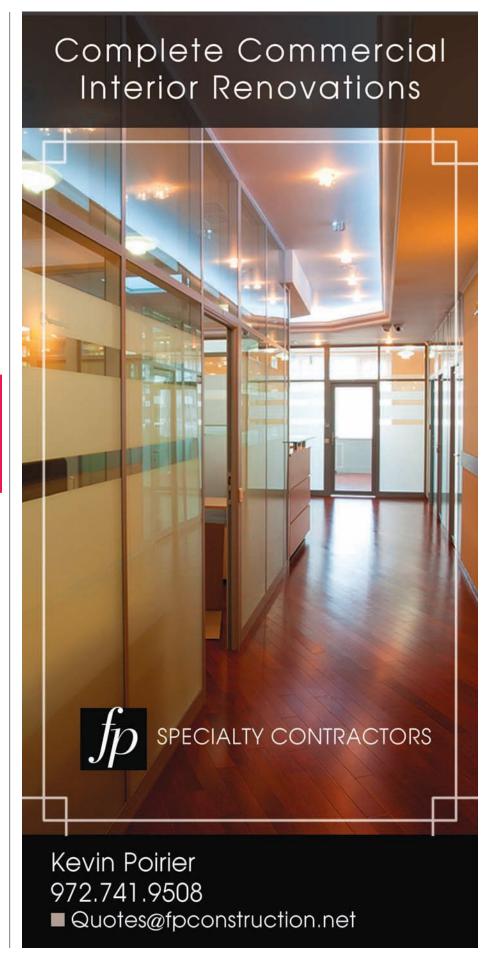

Four Ways to Help Teens Establish Credit

Even before they're old enough to get a credit card or apply for a loan, teenagers can get a head start on developing a strong credit history. Here's how to help your teen get started.

Encourage your teenager to get a job. Your teen will be more invested in managing his or her money if it's hardearned. And holding down a job reflects favorably on your teen's responsibility.

Open checking and savings accounts. Responsibly managing and maintaining these basic accounts will show a financial institution that your teen can handle money. If the account comes with a debit card, your teen will get a feel for using a card for transactions.

Consider putting one of your household bills in your teen's name. Have him or her pay the bill. Even if you're helping to supplement the payment, having the bill in your teen's name establishes a payment record. You also can add your teen as an authorized user on your credit card. Your teen receives a card in his or her name, and any purchases go on your account, which allows you to closely monitor spending habits. And,

purchases and payments made under your teen's name will be recognized on his or her credit report.

Obtain a secured credit card. These cards can be put in your teen's name. Make the initial deposit together, which is the credit limit for the account. Then he or she uses the card to demonstrate expenses can be handled and payments made on time.

Monitor your teen's activities as he or she gets into the credit habit, allowing more flexibility as responsibility is demonstrated. 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Hope for Clearer Skin

Some things cannot be changed, but acne doesn't have to be one of them. Getting rid of it may be a challenge, but it is possible. Acne is a skin condition that is very common in the U.S. and usually occurs during adolescence. When the sebaceous glands (oil glands) over-excrete sebum (oil), the pores can become clogged with sebum and dead skin cells. When bacteria get in and find a favorable place to multiply, you have the beginning of acne.

Acne can become quite severe and leave the face scarred. The best option is to begin to treat it early and lessen the chance of any lasting physical damage. It can appear on face, neck, shoulders, chest and back. Acne is not just pimples but can be a combination of blackheads, whiteheads, papules, pustules, painful clogged pores beneath the skin called nodules or cysts, which are pus-filled lumps larger than pimples.

Zealous efforts to get rid of acne can actually make it worse. Scrubbing can aggravate the condition by irritating the skin. If washed too frequently, the skin can dry out and trigger the glands to make even more oil, which could lead to increased acne. If you use a washcloth to clean your skin, use a clean one every day to avoid a buildup of dirt and bacteria being rubbed back onto your skin. Scrubbing pads, sugar scrubs or

cleansing products that promote exfoliation should only be used once or twice a week. Clean skin gently with mild soap or cleanser and water.

Pay attention to things that touch your face, such as hair or your cell phone. Try to keep hair as clean as possible, particularly if you have oily hair. Clean your cell phone according to the manufacturer's instructions. Keep your hands away from your face. Avoid popping, pinching or manipulating pimples. Be aware that hormones, such as changes seen in adolescents or during pregnancy, can trigger an outbreak of acne or exacerbate an existing one.

Mild cases of acne usually can be treated with over-the-counter products that contain the ingredients benzoyl peroxide or salicylic acid. If the acne is severe, then it's time for a dermatologist. There are many treatments available that offer hope of clearer skin, such as stronger medications, chemical peels, laser treatment and extraction of troublesome cysts. It is important to note acne will not clear up overnight. Consistent attention to detail will quite possibly win the day.

Creamy Chicken Enchiladas Verde

1 cup sour cream

I cup tomatillo salsa

I small onion, chopped

2 cloves garlic, minced

2 tsp. oil

3 cups cooked chicken breasts, shredded

1 1/2 cups Kraft Touch Of Philadelphia Natural Mexican Style Four Cheese Shredded Cheese (divided use)

1 4-oz. can chopped green chiles, drained

8 flour tortillas (6-inch size)

I. Blend sour cream and salsa.

2. Stir onions and garlic in oil in a large skillet on medium heat 4-5 minutes or until onions are crisp-tender.

1. Heat grill to medium-high.

- **I.** Using an electric mixer, combine the cream cheese, goat cheese, garlic and chives.
- 2. Add salt and pepper; set aside.
- 3. Preheat oven to 400 F.
- **4.** Lightly butter one side of each baguette slice; arrange butter side down on baking sheet.
- **5.** Bake 5-7 minutes or until lightly toasted; allow bread to cool slightly.
- **6.** Layer on goat cheese mixture and smoked salmon. Garnish with additional chives if desired.

Sausage and Spinach Fettuccine

1/2 lb. fettuccine, uncooked

1 6-oz. pkg. baby spinach leaves

3/4 lb. Italian sausage

I onion, chopped

1 24-oz. jar spaghetti sauce

I cup shredded mozzarella cheese

1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese

- **I.** Cook pasta in a large saucepan according to package directions, omitting salt; add spinach to boiling water for last minute of cooking time.
- **2.** On medium heat, brown sausage with onion; drain.
- **3.** Add spaghetti sauce; cook 10 minutes stirring occasionally.
- **4.** Drain pasta mixture; serve topped with sauce and cheeses.
