



As children, many experience dreams of flying through the clouds by one's own will. Flying in dreams often provides a feeling of freedom and can symbolize the limitlessness of possibilities. Although humans taking flight on their own accord may seem unattainable in real life, the dream still exists for many. Retired Sergeant First Class Dana Bowman realized his dream of flight three decades ago.

Dana's journey to find his true calling began around high school graduation. "I didn't really have a direction," Dana explained. "I knew what I wanted to do ... maybe," he grinned.

His late father, Norm Bowman, signed papers for Dana to join the military. Dana's uncle, Command Sergeant Major Donny Bowman, had served in World War II, Korea and Vietnam and gave Dana guidance. Dana joined the U.S. Army after graduating North Ridgeville High School in Ohio in 1981. "I had the opportunity to see the world. It changed my whole mindset."

Starting out as a heavy equipment operator engineer, Dana worked his way up constructing runways around the world. He took to the sky with the 82nd Airborne Division at Fort Bragg, North Carolina. "I was with the paratroopers, red beret," Dana stated. They parachuted Caterpillar bulldozers, graders and other large equipment out of different military aircraft to construct dirt runways around the world. Dana tried to consistently excel at everything he did in the military, often winning soldier of the









Out of 33 people, Dana was one of seven who made it through. He then attended SF school at Fort Bragg, graduated and returned to Panama in 1985. He served in the U.S. invasion of Panama in 1989 and traveled the world stopping drugs from entering the U.S.

The sky became Dana's playground again in 1993 when he joined the U.S. Army's parachuting team, the Golden Knights. Life changed abruptly for him the following year. Dana and his teammate, Sergeant Jose Aguillon, were involved in a training accident at an air show in Yuma, Arizona. Sgt. Aguillon died from his injuries. The midair collision took Dana's legs above the knee, changing his life forever. A lot of things came tumbling down for Dana because of the tragedy, but he never gave up.

Five months after the accident, Dana proved his drive and determination to move forward. He asked the doctors at Walter Reed National Military Medical Center for a weekend pass to parachute at Fort Bragg. According to Dana, they did not take him seriously but handed him the pass. "When I arrived at the drop zone, team members thought they saw a ghost. They did not think I would really show up, and I did," he shared. He asked a friend for a parachute, but his first request was turned down. Dana found a parachute, and with his prosthetic legs on, he made his first jump since the accident from 10,000 feet. He wasn't nervous, because he had a backup chute. He landed and couldn't wait to go again. He was one of about 20 Golden Knights who parachuted that weekend in a wedding jump. Dana made it into


the formation, while several others did not. When he returned to Walter Reed, the doctors didn't believe his story, so he showed them the wedding jump video and photos. "That changed everything right there." Nine months after the accident, Dana became the first double amputee to re-enlist in the Army. "I wasn't doing it to do a jump. It's to show people — disability is ability."

A positive and persistent attitude has opened many doors for Dana. After his accident, Dana began speaking to groups across the U.S. As a member of the National Speakers Association, Dana continues to share stories of his military experiences and of overcoming adversity. He also speaks to students at area schools. "This is what I do for these kids to give back." Dana's message is one of hope, courage and strength.

Dana brings that message to wounded warriors through his nonprofit 501(c)(3), HALO for Freedom Warrior Foundation, which he founded eight years ago. He raised \$7,000 for the foundation's first Weekend to Remember (WTR) event that entertained 12 veterans, including wounded warriors. They hunted hogs from a helicopter and shared stories around a camp fire.

The HALO events have grown over the years, and in 2015, the foundation hosted 30 wounded warriors, veterans and soldiers, and 20 distinguished guests including astronauts and prisoners of war. The attendees drove race cars in a NASCAR experience at Texas Motor Speedway, enjoyed evenings at Billy Bob's and Circle R Ranch and hunted hogs







from helicopters. "Everybody needs to hear what our heroes have done for our freedom and their experiences. Why not throw in a little fun?"

This year, Dana's HALO Foundation was scheduled to bus Weatherford students from Tyson and Hall Middle Schools to the Ninth Grade Center, where more than 4,000 were expected to attend. Dana and Team Fastrax planned to parachute onto the field, but the WTR event was cancelled due to inclement weather. With support from sponsors such as Able's Sporting of Huntsville, Autobahn Motor Group, Dr Pepper and Patterson Dealership of Bowie, the foundation and the WTR events will continue to grow. "We can handle it. Like what's it say in the Bible? God will give you everything you can handle," he said.

With 4,000 jumps under his belt and motivational speaking engagements scheduled across the U.S., Dana will continue to inspire others. He has other plans, too. With a commercial aviation aeronautics degree from the University of North Dakota John D. Odegard School of Aerospace Sciences, Dana has flown everything from airplanes and helicopters to hot air balloons. As the first double-amputee helicopter instructor in the world, his dream is to own a helicopter. "I mean, who wouldn't want to fly?" he asked. "It's a beautiful feeling. It's freedom." NOW

Stewart and Leslie Chalmers first met at Jacksboro High School but lost touch when they headed to separate universities in Abilene. In spite of many opportunities, they never crossed paths. 'I always thought that was strange," Leslie said. 'But I guess it was God's timing." After graduating, she moved to Fort Worth. Stewart stayed in Abilene and pursued a career he saw as the job God wanted for him. He finished the police academy and joined the Abilene Police Department.

In 2000, Leslie headed west for a weekend and ran into Stewart. Sparks flew. After marrying, they lived in Abilene for five years. By 2006, they had a 2-year-old boy and a newborn daughter. Leslie wasn't working in order to stay home with small children, so Stewart worked 12-hour shifts. She needed help, so they moved closer to family.

In October 2012, the Chalmers wanted a larger home. The Phillips family was moving to Waco. They asked if Leslie and Stewart





were interested in their house. The Chalmers family loved it, but renters had first refusal rights. The renters went back and forth on buying, but in God's perfect timing, the Chalmers bought the house.

Nearby, horses add an earthy aroma to the air. Growing up in the country, the smell doesn't bother Leslie. "The kids love it," she said. "It keeps us grounded." Close to town, with over an acre of land adds to the rural feel. "We have great neighbors, yet we aren't on top of







over the fireplace, she mounted a Chuck DeHaan painting. Another picture in the room features a family moving west. She fell in love with the painting because it told a story and was a gift from Stewart's grandmother.

The formal dining room is one of Leslie's favorites,

them," Leslie said. The front wraparound porch and Texas star welcome visitors. The same Leuders stone on the outside appears in the entryway and on one living room wall, offering continuity.

Entering the house, an off-center fireplace shares space with a large entertainment center the Chalmers bought with the house. "It was too heavy to move," Stewart said with a smile. The piece fits perfectly with her color scheme of black, gold and rusts, and looks great with the copper-topped tables. Although she loves rustic, Leslie doesn't want western style. She loves horses though, so

even though they seldom use it. Still, the design enables them to see from the dining room, through the kitchen to the breakfast nook. The house features neutral colors and wide crown molding. Different ceilings in every room drew them to the house. A shabby chic chandelier mixes bling with deer

antlers and brings character to the room, somehow fitting the room's theme. The table belonged to her mother. An old trunk provides a place for storage. Throughout the house, trunks hold treasures — items from the past, filled with memories.

The kitchen has granite countertops and touches of copper. Custom cabinets provide an abundance of storage. A wraparound bar separates the kitchen from the living room and nook, yet allows interaction between the rooms. Visitors often congregate at the bar when the couple entertains. The table in the breakfast nook was the first piece of furniture Leslie and Stewart bought as a couple. Natural colors and touches of copper bring a beautiful continuity to the four rooms.

The master bedroom, another favorite, has natural colors. However, Leslie's love for peacocks comes alive in this room. Blues, greens and turquoise pop against browns and rusts. Above the bed, a waterfall picture fills the atmosphere with tranquility. Opposite the bed, two large crowns look down from a shelf. When













Leslie began working as the director of development at Weatherford Christian School, her perspective on life changed. "No matter how crazy the day may get, I want that to ground me when the day comes to a close and to remember why I'm here," she said. "As crazy hectic as our lives get some days, that's what it's all for — to glorify Him." Each night, lights glow behind the crowns, shining perspective.

The master bathroom also has special touches the builder included. The large garden tub, surrounded by tile and accented with chipped tile, is the perfect place to light candles, relax and ease away any tension.

Personality is incorporated into 11-year-old Rylan's bedroom. He is intent on joining the military someday. His bedroom suite, which belonged to Stewart's grandfather and is the same suite Stewart's father used as a boy, is decked out in camouflage. The Chalmers preserve the furniture, treasuring its deeper value. The room also ties in Duck Commander and the theme of faith and family. A small display of medals and trophies accents his love of sports.

The hallway between the kids' rooms holds a display of crosses, collected from vacation destinations. One special cross made by Rylan and Stewart features Rylan's Bible verse: *I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me* (Philippians 4:13).

Rachael's room unmistakably belongs to a 9-year-old princess. Pink and green pastels fill the room, starting with a hand-painted bedroom suite. A trunk sits at the end of the bed, hand-painted with ladybugs and dragonflies — a baby shower gift from one of Leslie's former



co-workers. An avid reader, Rachael has a reading corner with a bookcase Stewart made. One wall holds her own cross collection. "I really love Jesus, and the one that says God is always with you, is the one I made with my dad," Rachael said.

The patio is a sanctuary for the family. In the evening, they sit with a glass of tea, watching sunsets and horses. Leslie loves mornings with a cup of coffee



and devotional time. Last year, Stewart and Leslie redid the patio and added a fire pit and swimming pool custom-designed by Pulliam Pools.

A separate building serves as Leslie's home office. She invoices for an oil and gas company as a part-time job. Complete with a bathroom and pullout sofa, the space can also be used for guests. During the summer, it makes a perfect spot for Stewart to catch some sleep after working late. A sergeant for the Weatherford Police Department, he sometimes needs the quiet. Leslie adores the solitude to complete her work.

The couple enjoys doing home improvement projects together. When they found the house, the shell was perfect. They've made it their own space, with small changes. "The only thing I'd change is putting the house 3 or 4 miles further from town in the middle of a ranch," Stewart said. Nevertheless, he loves the neighborhood. Together, they've achieved their desire of a home worthy of entertainment, yet completely comfortable for daily living.

"God's timing has always been everything for us," Leslie said. "This is just another thing on the list." NOW








He does this by crafting Native American flutes and sharing their spirit sound in various venues.

According to Native American folklore, the flute was birthed from a rich environment of sounds in nature such as animal noises and the rhythm of the springs. One such story explained that long ago a young hunter went out from his village to find meat. He tracked a wise, swift elk deep into the forest, but it stayed just out of range. Soon, it became too dark to find his way back to his village. As night fell, he heard all kinds of eerie cries of animals and groaning trees in the wind. One sound in particular he had never heard before was mournful, sad and ghostlike. While the sound made him afraid, at the same time, it sounded beautiful beyond comparison, full of love and hope. He dreamed of a redheaded woodpecker that led him away to a cedar tree and started pecking on a dead branch. The wind blew through the holes the woodpecker made creating the beautiful, eerie sound he heard before. After many days and hours, the hunter whittled a branch into the shape of a bird with a long neck and an open beak.







He prayed and smoked incense and blew into the very first siyotanka. He blew a beautiful, ghostlike song, and all the people in the village were astounded and joyful. The chief's daughter heard the song and fell in love with the young hunter. Other young men heard the songs and began



whittling cedar branches. The beautiful haunting sound of the flutes traveled from tribe to tribe until it filled the whole prairie. Thus, a single tree spread music around the world.

From generation to generation, woodworking was a predominate theme in Philip's life. "I grew up in the Pacific Northwest of Washington. My grandpa made me a toy rifle [out of wood], and I remember carving things with my cousins," Philip said. "I love working with and using my hands. It is a gift from God."

When Philip lived in Washington, he made cabinetry and some large carvings of animals such as owls and coyotes. One day while at the library in Washington researching his genealogy, Philip noticed a Native American flute maker giving a presentation to some children. The knowledge and the sound the flute maker shared piqued Philip's interest. "I could play several instruments, and my mom influenced my musical ability. So, I talked to the flute maker to gain knowledge about flutes," Philip said. "I began to research the history of the local Indians. The stories touched me, and the wood

was beautiful." Philip joined the Quilceda Carvers in Marysville, Washington, to hone his wood crafting skills.

Native American flutes can be crafted out of many kinds of wood. Each has its own characteristics that affect the look and sound of the flute. "Soft woods have a more mellow sound. Hard woods have a cleaner, more crisp, sound," Philip explained. "Even flutes made from the same wood will sound different." Philip makes flutes out of juniper, Eastern Red Cedar, walnut and Tiger Maple.

In a shop behind his house, Philip creates his wind talkers. After choosing the wood, Philip uses a table saw to cut the wood into a long square. He anchors the square into a wood turning tool called a lathe, and a bit fashions the wood into a round cylinder. He cuts the cylinder in half and uses a router to make two air chambers lengthwise. Philip carefully glues the pieces back together. Next, he drills the holes with a drill press. He has templates for different sized holes, depending on the length of the flute. "I used to make holes with a hand drill, but I could not make the holes straight," Philip explained. "I work by trial and error, and I learn from my mistakes." To get the dark, finished look for the holes, he drills them again with a hot drill bit to make them smooth.

Native American flutes have two separate air chambers. The first fills with air that is guided into the second chamber by a totem animal resting atop



the flute. The totem compresses the air into a thin stream that hits the holes to create the tone just like the wind hit the holes made by the woodpecker in the legend. The notes are made by opening and closing different combinations of holes with one's fingers. Philip enjoys

using pecan wood to create animal totems such as bears, bison, white tail deer and chaparrals that appear ready to run down the shaft. He uses his carving knife and Dremel brand tools to create these spiritual animals. Each animal has a spiritual legend of strength. The totems are tied over the air chambers with a leather strap. After some sanding and polishing, Philip plays the Irish tune "Danny Boy" to ensure the flute is tuned properly. Philip's wife, Karen, helps with the final color designs and creates bags for the flutes. "We are a good team," Philip said.

Flutes can be tuned to a certain key, but Philip likes to use a more traditional tuning, which uses no particular scale and is much like how the ancient flutes were made. "This is a spirit tuning. It comes from my heart," Philip said. "It



is an extension of myself." Philip shares his gift with others in several ways. He plays old, traditional church songs for his congregation, he gives presentations at Weatherford High School and the Rotary Club, and he has played at several nursing homes. "At the nursing homes, people relax, and it gives them hope. It is a healing ministry I can share."

Since the 1940s, a rebirth toward traditional ancient flute making has flourished. Native American flute players, as well as enthusiasts and researchers from outside Native American cultures, have spread their knowledge and craft to others. Philip continues to make flutes and admits he is constantly learning something new. He loves making the flutes, playing them and teaching others about their craftsmanship and history. He will allow the spirit to move through him and his flutes for many years to come.



She and her husband discussed opening a business and decided on an entertainment center. "My husband's a mover and a shaker. When he gets his mind on something, that's it," Jayme explained. "Next thing you know, we're at 20,000 square feet."

Hole-In-Fun Entertainment opened its doors in August 2014 and offers enjoyment for all ages. The venue features glow-in-the-dark paint and black lights throughout. Its 18-hole miniature golf course can be played in 3D. The course features

three themes: Route 66, underwater and jungle. "Every six holes, you are in another world," Jayme explained. In SpinZone, visitors get behind the wheel of a bumper car. If the car gets hit in a certain spot, the vehicle will go into an uncontrollable spin for three seconds. Game cards are available for the arcade. Guests can win tickets on most of the arcade games and use them to purchase items for the entire family. "The guys can win tents, deer stands and archery targets. We have electric wine bottle openers for the women and a Keurig." And, of course, there are plenty of prizes and candies for the kids. Tickets accumulate on the reloadable card, so players can save up until they have enough to buy what they want. Hole-In-Fun also offers batting cages, but the Haneys plan to replace the 5,000-square-foot room with a themed laser tag arena.

If visitors work up an appetite while enjoying a round of golf, they can fill up on fare at The 19th Hole Snack Bar. Pizza, wings, nachos, hot dogs, cotton candy and popcorn are offered at affordable prices. "Our pizza here is actually really, really good," Jayme shared. And for just under \$10, a pizza with no charge for extra toppings, it's a good deal, too. Nonalcoholic beverages are available for purchase.

With no admission fee, visitors pay for what they want to play. Arcade games range from \$.50-\$1.50, bumper car rides are \$5 each or \$20 for five rides, and mini-golf is \$8 for ages 12 and under and \$10 for 13 and over. Hole-In-Fun also offers package deals that can include food and drinks.





#### In the Kitchen With Jackie Potts

Every good chef has a few go-to meals. Jackie Potts' favorites are meatloaf, lemon-pepper pork chops and coconut cake. At the age of 12, Jackie's first cooking experience was an ambitious one — a soufflé. "It came out beautifully and was delicious," she said. #### Meat Loaf

- 1 lb. ground hamburger or deer meat
- 1/2 cup onions, chopped
- 1/2 cup bell peppers, chopped
- 1/2 cup celery, chopped
- 1/2 cup carrots, chopped
- 8 Ritz crackers, crushed
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 1/4 cup milk
- 1/2 cup ketchup
- 3 drops of Louisiana Hot Sauce
- 1 10-oz. can Ro-Tel Original Chopped Tomatoes and Chilies
- **1.** Preheat oven to 375 F. Mix together first 10 ingredients and put in a greased 8x8-inch casserole dish.
- 2. Pour Ro-Tel over meatloaf.
- **3.** Bake for 1 hour and 15 minutes. Serve with mashed potatoes and a green salad.

#### **Lemon-pepper Pork Chops**

- 4 center-cut, boneless pork chops 2 Tbsp. lemon pepper
- **I.** Preheat grill to 350 F. Season each side of pork chops with lemon pepper. Place onto grill, turning once until done. Cooking times vary, but it could take 30-40 minutes for thick chops. Serve with a side of spinach salad.

#### **Cold Tuna Salad**

1 12-oz. can of StarKist tuna in water, drained
3 eggs, hard-boiled and chopped
1/2 cup red or green bell peppers, chopped
1/2 cup celery, chopped
1/2 cup onion, chopped

1/2 cup of Miracle Whip, or to taste1/3 cup sweet pickle relish3 dashes of Louisiana Hot SauceSalt and pepper, to taste

**1.** Mix all ingredients in a bowl. Serve on bread or a bed of lettuce with sliced tomatoes. You can also make this recipe with chicken and add chopped grapes or apples.

#### Laura's Coconut Ice-box Cake

I box white cake mix

1 15-oz. can of Coco Lopez

1 12-oz. container Cool Whip

1/2 cup toasted coconut

**1.** Bake cake as directed in a 9x13-inch casserole dish. Once out of the oven, immediately punch holes in the cake with a wooden spoon handle. Pour the Coco Lopez all over the cake; put in the refrigerator to cool. **2.** When cooled, frost with Cool Whip;

sprinkle toasted coconut on top and serve cold. Keep refrigerated.

#### Doylene's Chicken Fried Steak and Gravy

Chicken Fried Steak:

1 lb. round steak

1/4 cup flour

5 Tbsp. Crisco vegetable shortening Salt and pepper, to taste

#### Gravy:

1 Tbsp. Flour

1/3 cup water

1/2 cup milk

- **1.** For Chicken Fried Steak: Tenderize steak by beating vigorously with the edge of a plate or mallet. Cut into several pieces; rinse in cold water and dust each side with flour.
- **2.** Heat Crisco on high in a skillet until it sizzles; reduce heat to medium.
- **3.** Place steak in skillet and brown on each side. Season with salt and pepper while in skillet. Remove from skillet.
- **4.** For Gravy: Stir flour and water into oil in the skillet to make a paste. Begin stirring in milk until the mixture reaches desired consistency. Serve gravy on the side with the chicken fried steak.
