
the mountains. One of the rules is we leave the cell phones in the car. We're there as a crew. We are together spending time and building trust."

The name, Hachie Crew 32, is derived from several sources. Hachie, of course, comes from Waxahachie High School. Crew because, as Philip said, they are a crew, and 32 is the district number for the Boy Scouts. "We wanted a name that would make people stop and ask a question," Philip explained. "When people hear our name, they go, 'What's Hachie?' And that opens up the door for us to explain to them who we are and what we do."

When a young man turns 18, his time in Boy Scouts is over. However, the Crew does allow them to continue in scouting activities — and it's co-ed. Mid-year, the Crew had four boys and four girls. They were working on bringing another student into the fold, a female. "Our former district commissioner, Chris Overbey, told me we have a crew that needs help in Midlothian," Philip recalled. "He said we could either join that one or start a new one in Waxahachie. I said I'd like to start one in Waxahachie. We started with five members, and now we are at eight, working on nine."

That was in March 2016. Not only has the crew almost doubled in size, they have entrenched themselves in the Waxahachie community. Among the numerous projects on which they've helped are cleaning up the city sidewalks, cleaning up at the end of the day in the farmers' market, manning a water station for a Southwestern Assemblies of God University 5K run and collecting food for a local food bank in the national Scouting for Food event. "We're taught to leave it better than we found it," Philip said. "We want to be out in the community, to be the first ones they call on for help."

The Crew does more than adventure outings. Sometimes they will get together





for a movie night, enjoy some pizza, swim, fish, play Frisbee, etc. "They do a big variety of activities," said Tamara Vroman, Philip's mother and an assistant advisor to the group, "but they do all the planning. They put it all together. They make the overall decisions."

Philip joined Cub Scouts at the age of 9, just to see if he'd like it. He did, and two years later, he joined Boy Scouts. "I saw a poster that said, 'Come join Cub Scouts," Philip recalled. "My mom signed me up. After I got my Arrow of Light [the highest award in the Cub Scouts], I joined Boy Scout Troop 1880."

He spent the next five years working toward his Eagle Scout Award, which he received in 2016. However, he knew his time in the Boy Scouts was running out, and he wanted to remain active. It was then that he was contacted by his friend. "Philip has done a great job with Hachie Crew 32. Membership has increased, and the members of the crew are having a great time," Chris said. "In scouting, Philip has a hard time saying no, so he stays really busy. He is now the president of the Southern Star District Venturing Officers Association that I have recently started, so we are looking for great things from Philip's leadership at the district level."







When Lindsey Brister was wheeled back to her hospital room after a double mastectomy, she found streamers, balloons and gift baskets waiting for her — a surprise from her nurse navigator and several members on the medical staff at Baylor Scott & White Charles A. Sammons Cancer Center Waxahachie. "The decorations let me know I mattered to them as a person," she explains. "So did the way they explained things and put my mind at ease." Philip said, though the venture program is more laid-back than Scouts, when it comes to awards, participants can still receive them. For example, he has already received the Venturing Award, is pursuing the Discovery Award, with the Pathfinder Award ahead, and his goal is to get the Summit Award, venturing's equivalent to an Eagle Scout honor. "If you focus, you can basically get the entire award (the main four) in two years," he said, noting there are additional, specialized awards, such as the Quest Award (sports), Trust Award (religion and culture) and the Ranger Award (outdoors).

When he's not involved in venturing, Philip is active at WHS. He sings bass in the choir, earning district honors as a freshman and sophomore, and he's on the choir council to help organize events. However, despite his many accomplishments in scouting and venturing, Philip has refrained from participating in sports. He said he's not coordinated enough. "I do these things, but I still trip," he said with a laugh. "I always keep track of myself, or I'd get hurt."

Philip has experienced no major injury. That's all a part of the trust the Crew builds with each other. After all, participation in many of their activities relies on knowing that someone is going to be there with a helping hand.

He has two older sisters, Victoria and Treasa, who live in San Antonio and Waxahachie, respectively. Victoria was

a Daisy Scout when she was younger. His father was also in Cub Scouts and the ROTC. Philip wants to get his Emergency Medical Technician and firefighting certification after high school. He also wants to study history in college.

The Hachie Crew 32 is planning a trip to Washington, D.C., in mid-August. They are in the process of doing all of their own fundraising, with events such as a coffee-selling promotion, selling discount cards to area businesses, selling goods at the farmers market, garage sales and a pancake breakfast. "We are all history buffs," he said. "I've never actually seen it up close. My dad's a truck driver, and I could see the White House as we were driving over a bridge at just the right angle. I was 6."

The Crew is also preparing for the second Hachie Crew 32 Barbecue. It's an awareness event to promote themselves to prospective new members, set for the end of July. Last year's event was held at Waxahachie Lake's Cedar Park, with the location for this year still being decided. "We have canoes, horseshoes — a lot of fun activities," Philip said. "Me and our new president, Ben Rice, take people across the lake in a canoe."

For Philip, it's more than recruiting. It's making new friends. "The friends I've made through scouting and Crew will always be there," he said. "They're like family, and family is always there for each other." NOW






Why would a college-bound student leave his roots, which were sunk deep in the Boston suburb of Framingham, Massachusetts, and travel to Texas for his university experience? For Pete Havel, Waxahachie Chamber of Commerce's president and CEO, Baylor University in Waco was an easy choice. 'I was 18, had no grand plan, was looking forward to seeing a new part of the country and loved the idea of no snow," Pete explained.

Pete earned his bachelor's degree in business administration from Baylor, but his career led him back to Massachusetts and the snow when he became the deputy chief of staff to that state's house minority whip. "Following my graduation, I was very active in politics and the legislative process. I found that I enjoyed working with successful people and liked hanging out with them," Pete said. "Years later, that eventually led me into Chamber work."

Following getting his feet wet in politics, Pete worked as a television producer at WABU-Boston University, regional political manager and legislative director at the Associated Builders



and Contractors and the National Federation of Independent Business, respectively. Both these positions brought Pete back to Dallas, where he eventually formed Havel and Associates as a government relations and political consultant. Pete experienced Chamber work at the national level during his role as the regional executive director for congressional and public affairs for the U.S. Chamber of Commerce.

By 2010, Pete had joined Burson-Marsteller, a global public relations and communications firm, as the director of public affairs practice. Pete then became the senior vice president of government relations and marketing for The Wolf Group, another public relations and communications firm. Just prior to becoming Waxahachie Chamber of Commerce president and CEO, Pete was director of legislative affairs for the North Dallas Tollway Authority. With a résumé that involves public relations, communications, working with leaders of business and organizations, as well as becoming a favored speaker and consultant, Pete is uniquely qualified to help guide Waxahachie well into the coming years.

"Over the years, I've developed a very wise group of friends spread over 15 states in which I've worked. I've been blessed to know some amazing people, and I've worked this side of the Chamber world for the last 20





years." Pete continued his education by graduating from the Institute for Organizational Management.

Since his tenure began with the Waxahachie Chamber last June, Pete has been busy getting to know the community, area, businesses and residents. With approximately 700 members, that's a tall order. "I have over 700 different bosses, each with different needs, so I have to understand our members, learn what their needs are and fill those needs," he explained.

"Our leadership and our staff are focused on making the Chamber stronger and more effective — a place where business owners feel they can get involved and get help with whatever problems they might have. We have the satisfaction of helping folks start-up businesses locally, but we also get to help businesses relocate into this area."

Pete describes himself as a jackof-all-trades and master-of-none. "I'm also a recovering lobbyist," he quipped. "Because of that, I know how to listen, persuade and work with all different kinds of people to bring about coalitions."

Known as the Crossroads of Texas, Movie Capital of Texas, The Gingerbread City and the Crepe Myrtle Capital of Texas, Waxahachie has been, for a number of years, rapidly growing in the number of businesses and industries and resulting population. "Waxahachie has so much going for it — the great schools, the friendliness of the community and the strong community ties," Pete said. "Waxahachie's close proximity to Dallas via Interstate 35, and the openness of city and county officials to work together to get problems solved quickly, makes for a good foundation and partnership to attract business and industry to this city."

With so many Chamber events to coordinate and attend, Pete finds some time to get involved in volunteer efforts. He and his family, which includes his wife, Janie, and their 13-year-old daughter, Reagan, help

their church's homeless ministry. "That is very rewarding," Pete said. Pete is involved in his daughter's many activities. He also maintains memberships in several Chamber-related professional organizations at the local, state and national levels.



When Pete does get a free moment, it's usually spent traveling. "My family went to President Trump's inauguration. It was an experience watching the peaceful transition of power. Our country is blessed," he said. The Boston area is another favorite destination. "I have family scattered from there to all parts of the U.S.," Pete said. "We have been to Disney World — and then there are the Baylor games. We go whenever we can, depending on budget, school nights and break schedules."

And what does Pete envision as Waxahachie Chamber of Commerce goes into the future? "We have lots of opportunities to grow our membership, which will make us a stronger organization in public service, public policy, economic development and advocacy for business, networking and community involvement. The city has a great foundation of people who have called Waxahachie home for generations, but we also have newcomers who are adding a lot to the community. It's a great blend of long-time traditions and new ideas that will make Waxahachie even stronger." Pete and the staff, board, committees and members of the Waxahachie Chamber of Commerce are ready to be at the forefront of the continued growth and these everchanging times. NOW

# A Texas Prairie -By Debbie Durling




"Our house is a home because my best friend lives here," Robin said as she looked lovingly over at Larry. The Donaldsons were married in 2006. They went to church on Sunday morning. The pastor and his wife stayed after to marry them. They went home, raked leaves and went back to the Christmas party at the church that night. Robin remembered thinking to herself, Who does this? They have built a life together that exemplifies mutual respect and love. "We are so blessed," Robin shared. "We didn't know marriage could be so good."





A custom path made of red rock, inlaid with stepping stones and bordered with wooden posts, meets the driveway to welcome friends and family. Carefully landscaped, the front yard is like a miniature Texas prairie, complete with native plants, shrubs and a windmill. Beside the front door is an iron plaque with a cross in the center surrounded by the words, Trust in the Lord. It is just a small clue that inside abide people of joy and faith.






The hallway itself is a gallery of the couple's life. Pictures of children, grandchildren and accomplishments fill the walls. One area of special interest is the section of wall between the bedroom and bathroom. The display is sobering as it holds the reminders of Larry's service to his country. Larry served in the Vietnam War. He was a tank commander of three tanks and nine personnel carriers. With a lump in his throat and tears in his eyes, he told of an ambush he and his comrades drove into. "If the visiting sergeant had not asked to ride in my seat that day, I wouldn't be here," he said. He was wounded and several men were lost, as they maneuvered a fierce battle in the forest. Hanging on the wall are pictures of his tank and crew, as well as three medals he received — a Purple Heart for being injured in battle, a Bronze Star for heroism in ground combat and a U.S. Army Commendation Medal. In the center of the display, hangs a U.S. Army Cross in recognition of God's hand in bringing Larry home.

Larry also remembers a time when he was on foot with a troupe, wading across a body of water. "All of a sudden, my legs locked together, and I went down," he recalled. A boa constrictor had him in its grasp. Fortunately, he rose to the top to yell out for help, as he was in the back. Quickly, the men turned around and used their bayonets to break Larry free of what could have been a tragic situation.

Rounding the corner of the hallway leads to the living room. Rich leather couches accented with upholstery tacks provide seating for warm conversation. A large shelf that once served as shelving for Robin's daughter when she was a

little girl has been repurposed as an entertainment center for the living room. The workmanship is so well done that it looks as if it was always meant to serve in this way. On the back wall is a pair of sliding glass doors with four beautiful Shelties looking through the glass. Ozzy, Lady, Roby and Sky are the pride and joy of this couple.



Just off the living room is the kitchen. Marble-like Formica tops the mediumtoned, wooden cabinetry. An eating bar divides the rooms and completes the square kitchen that wraps around a most interesting island created by the couple. It is made of shutters for the sides, a matching countertop and shelving built down the middle. The slats in the shutters serve as places to hang magazines, ready to be read while relaxing with a snack or drink.

Nowadays, many homes have a man cave. However, Robin has her own "girl cave." Beyond the living room, a door opens to another den where she is able to get away and plan for things she needs to do, like leading worship at the First Baptist Church in Avalon.

The garage houses a treasure of which they are both very fond — a 1970 1/2 Falcon. It is refinished with Calypso Coral Orange paint and black accents. Larry rebuilt the motor himself, changing six cylinders to eight. It is a sweet reminder of Larry's drag racing days and his love of cars.

Throughout this home, over 100 crosses adorn the walls. Unique, rustic, dainty and meaningful, they seem to quietly give testimony of the sweet presence of the Lord that brings such peace, rest and joy to this couple as they live, love and serve not only each other but those they see in need around them. Together, as best friends and true loves, they have created a Texas prairie paradise in the rural countryside.

and, at the same time, to see if there is long-term interest. Ask your friends what weeks they are signing up for, so your child will know some people when they arrive the first day.

• Be a good sport. Most high schools offer sports camps for youth up through middle school. These camps are a good way for high school coaches to meet future athletes, but they are also great for kids to learn fundamental skills,











technique and strategy. While seeing kids that may eventually play for them is a bonus, schools do not limit attendance to those in their zones, so you can get football speed training from recent state champion coaches, or technical work from some of the most esteemed soccer coaches in the state.

• Check dates. With the number of studios, schools and private entities offering camps for all different ages and skill levels, you will want to spend some time looking for the right fit. It is not difficult to schedule a different vacation Bible school every week for a few months, if you are so inclined. Ask friends which ones they have tried, and find out what types of activities each one offers. Some churches do simple activities in the park, and you can show up for just a few days. Others, though, will require registration ahead of time, as they have professional instructors in various fields come to make the activity portion as great as possible.









• Figure out the code. These days, different churches take different philosophies when it comes to VBS. VBX typically means the kids will have one specific activity that takes a lot of their time. Kids' Camp denotes more of a camp atmosphere, with varied activities mixed with the study portions. VBS in the Park is often an outreach seeking to bring in guests from nearby areas throughout the week. And traditional VBS normally blends Bible stories with songs, crafts and large group games.



# Free is a great thing.

- Movies in different places. While many movie theaters offer cheap summer showings once a week, usually for films that have been out for a year or longer, cities often run special movie days and nights throughout the summer, sometimes in local parks or at other outdoor venues. Most local libraries show movies as often as once a week in the afternoons. Because these city events are planned well in advance, they are advertised weeks before showings, so a quick check of your city's website will give you all the details you need.
- Libraries have more than just books. In addition to family-friendly movie showings, most public libraries ramp up a full slate of summer activities. From bringing in magicians and other performers, to presenting informational sessions on a variety of topics, your local library is probably a great spot for

# National Mental Health Awareness Month



Each year, nearly 44 million adults in America experience mental health concerns ranging from anxiety and depression to post-traumatic stress and suicidal thoughts. May is designated as National Mental Health Awareness Month, a call for helping those living with mental health conditions to get the resources and acceptance they need. Older Americans in particular are vulnerable to unrecognized and untreated forms of mental illness.

Depression is the most common mental health condition among America's seniors. Other prevalent cognitive and emotional health problems among the elderly include dementia, bipolar disorder, obsessive compulsive disorder and social phobia. More serious diagnoses, such as schizophrenia and personality disorders, persistently diminish the quality of life and daily functioning for seniors. Depressed seniors or those dealing with emotional concerns neglect eating well, getting regular exercise, maintaining the home and interacting socially.

Older adults often face a number of life stressors that heighten psychological distress. Many seniors experience chronic pain, restricted mobility, bereavement, loneliness and a loss of independence — all of which can impact mental and emotional health. Countless older military veterans carry post-war wounds

to their psychological health. In addition, medical conditions, such as diabetes and heart disease, can worsen depression and other mental health disabilities in seniors.

Warning signs of mental illness are not always easy to detect. The following behaviors are signals that something may be amiss with one's mental well-being:

- Ongoing sadness or feeling blue
- Extreme mood swings, including euphoric highs
- Intense worry or fear
- Uncontrolled, compulsive actions, such as overspending or excessive cleaning
- Heightened irritability or anger
- · Confusion or lack of concentration
- Sleep difficulties
- Trouble perceiving reality, such as having delusions or hallucinations
- Marked changes in eating habits
- Several physical illnesses without obvious causes (headaches, vague aches and pains)
- · Suicidal thoughts
- · Withdrawal from family and friends
- Overuse of alcohol or drugs

While only about 60 percent of individuals with a mental illness receive mental health care, effective treatments are available for the majority of mental health conditions. A first step is to meet with a physician or mental health practitioner. Treatment and disease management depend on the underlying condition, but common recovery measures combine medication and psychotherapy.

National Mental Health Awareness Month is a reminder to not let illness of any type define a person. Those living with mental health conditions, and their families as well, need to know they are not alone. ### In the Kitchen With the Ellis County 4-H Team

Ellis County 4-H members, Rhett Newton, 16; Blain Johnson, 10; and Drew Johnson, 9, have become competent cooks and have earned two blue ribbons and one fifth place showing in competitions over the past five months. Tonya Stricker, a retired restauranteur, is the team's volunteer coach and is all three boys' grandmother, otherwise known as Nanny.

Cooking competitions are challenging. "We memorize a four-minute speech," Blain explained. Meal ideas, cooking safety and food purchasing are also covered.

"We have to come up with at least two nutritional facts about the ingredients," Rhett added. "We are learning everything about cooking. I love it."

And then the final test comes that counts most — taste. Drew offered his granola bites recipe. "It's my favorite," he said, "because everyone likes to eat them."

#### Drew Johnson's Grab-and-Go Granola Bites

Nonstick cooking spray
3 Tbsp. butter
1/3 cup packed light brown sugar
1/4 cup honey
1 tsp. vanilla
3 cups quick-cooking rolled oats
1/4 cup sunflower seeds
72 milk chocolate chips

- **I.** Coat a 24-count mini muffin pan with nonstick cooking spray.
- **2.** In a large pot, melt butter over medium heat; add brown sugar, honey and vanilla; whisk until the sugar is dissolved; turn off heat.
- **3.** Add oats to the pot; stir well for 5 minutes; add the sunflower seeds; stir.

- **4.** Using a small scoop, divide the mixture into the muffin cups; use a spoon's back, sprayed with nonstick cooking spray, to pack mixture into the cups.
- **5.** Push 3 chocolate chips, point down, into each muffin cup's mixture.
- **6.** Refrigerate until chilled; put bites into baggies, 3 to a bag, for easy grab-and-go.

#### Blain Johnson's Crustless Pumpkin Pie

1 14-oz. can pumpkin 1/2 cup sugar 1/2 tsp. salt 1/2 tsp. ground ginger 1 tsp. ground cinnamon 1/4 tsp. ground nutmeg 1/4 tsp. ground cloves 2 eggs, slightly beaten

# 1 12-oz. can evaporated skim milk (shake before opening)

- **I.** Preheat the oven to 400 F. In a large bowl, mix the pumpkin, sugar, salt and spices.
- 2. Stir in the eggs; mix well.
- **3.** Add the evaporated skim milk; stir until mixture is smooth; pour into a lightly greased 9-inch glass pie plate.
- **4.** Bake for about 40 minutes, or until a knife inserted near the center of the pie comes out clean.

#### Rhett Newton's Confetti Chicken Wraps

- 1 Tbsp. canola oil
- I large orange bell pepper, diced or cut into thin, I-inch strips
- I lb. skinless, boneless chicken breast halves, sliced into thin strips
- 1/2 to 1 tsp. ground cumin
- 1/2 to 1 tsp. chili powder
- 1 15.5-oz. can pinto beans, drained and rinsed
- I cup frozen corn kernels, thawed
- I cup reduced-fat cheddar cheese, shredded
- 3/4 cup salsa
- 6-8 8-inch flour tortillas
- 1/2 cup reduced-fat sour cream (optional)
- **1.** In a large, nonstick skillet, heat the oil over medium-high heat; add the bell pepper; cook, stirring frequently, until tender.
- **2.** Add the chicken, cumin and chili powder; cook until the chicken is no longer pink.
- **3.** Stir in the beans, corn, cheese and salsa; cook until mixture is heated thoroughly and the cheese is melted.
- **4.** Stack the tortillas on a microwave-safe plate; heat uncovered in the microwave until warmed.
- **5.** Assemble the wraps by placing the chicken mixture down the center of each tortilla; wrap burrito-style; serve with sour cream, if desired.
