

EDITOR'S NOTE


Flowers in bloom ...










table and rocking chair allow for relaxation and play. Adults can check out parenting and child development books. "We had a naming contest when we first received the Ozobots," Holly explained. Some of the names chosen are Eco, Sonny, Ozzy, Nick and Oscar. The Ozobot backpacks can be checked out with a parent's library card for one-week periods."



The backpacks contain everything needed, including charging cables. "The Ozobots become fussy and die after about two hours of use and must rest and be recharged," Holly explained. The backpacks are age appropriate. Children, ages 4-7, start with simple code patterns and markers, and age 8 through 12th grade can build codes with a coding app to upload to the Ozobot. (Backpacks are available in the children's library only.) "Even adults like the Ozobots!"

Kids can go to a website, log in and build code that programs



the Ozobots. "The program is Bluetooth compatible and will work on a computer screen or tablet," Holly explained. Kids can use home computers or the library's computers and tablets or both.

The Ozobot Backpack Program was made possible through a grant the library received from Ecolab, Incorporated's Corsicana location. "One of our parent patrons works there and let us know about their grant program for area nonprofits. We only had about a week to write the grant proposal, but we received full funding for this program," Holly said.

Mrs. Liset, Miss Erika and Mrs. Paige, all of whom work in the library's children's section, can help guide children and adults through the Ozobot program. "There are step-bystep instructions that are pretty easy to follow, and adult family members are supposed to be involved and help their children. However, anyone is welcome to stop in for extra help. There are also instructional videos available on YouTube," Holly said.

The library's active teen volunteer group will be available to help with coding instruction on Saturdays and during summer months. "We couldn't do this job and offer so many programs and materials without our teens and other volunteers," Holly



Other offerings to come in the Simspiration Program are materials targeting interest areas such as yoga. "These interest packets and backpacks of tools and materials are designed to let library patrons explore possible interests and ideas and get inspired, thus the name, Simspiration," Holly said.

A self-proclaimed U.S. Air Force brat, Miss Holly has lived in Ellis County for the past four years and is surrounded by family in the area, including her husband and kids. She attended Texas Woman's University, studying public relations and then transferred to Baylor University where she earned a bachelor's degree in museum studies and archaeology. Holly returned to TWU for a master's degree in library information science.

Previously, Holly was the curator of collections and interpretation for Historic Waco Foundation and was employed by the Lancaster Veterans Memorial Library. Since October 2014, she's called Sims Library home. "I'm surrounded by all-around happiness here," she said. "The 'littles' are so happy and excited to come to the library, and it's so much



fun to build that librarian and child relationship with each one of them."

Holly serves on the social media committee for the Texas Library Association and Historic Waxahachie's programs committee. She's also on the community engagement task force for TLA. "We encourage adults to make each library trip an inviting adventure for kids," she said. Holly also serves as a children's Sunday school teacher at Harvest Hill Church in Midlothian. She earned recognition as an Ellis County 40 Under 40 Business Professional in 2007. When not working, she enjoys reading children's literature, cooking and baking and spending time with family.



The Sims Library staff presents many opportunities for learning and exploring other than the Ozobot Backpack Program. "We have Reading to a Therapy Dog; activities for teens, preteens and children, including Storytime and our summer reading program; and we're not just books. There are DVDs and audio books available," Holly noted. "If you have a need, come in and communicate it to us. We're here to serve. If we can't help you, we'll find someone who can. Librarians are no longer 'shushers."

Since 1905, Sims Library has served Waxahachie residents as a fully-funded, nonprofit organization. Holly concluded, "The Ozobots are only our latest acquisition and offering. It's amazing the things that can be accomplished when this community comes together."

At Home With Dario and Sheila Gonzalez



A little yellow, Tudor house of about 1,200 square feet serves as the place Dario and Sheila Gonzalez call home. Every square foot of this space is utilized to serve as the base of a family who lives large and invests in others in so many ways.

One signature of the home is the way Sheila has maximized the space to make it feel large and be a sufficient refuge for a family of four. "IKEA has helped me get so much out of so little," she said. After intricately painting the interior of the home herself, she bought one BILLY bookcase and began there. It was just what the home needed. Now there are shelves, storage units, decor items and much more throughout the house, giving it a modern appeal.

The exterior of the house keeps with the historic home tradition of Waxahachie. Built in 1920, it is almost 100 years old. It has survived a fire and was refurbished by the former owner. The entry is the only place with flooring that is original to the house. Everything else was too damaged to preserve.

Sheila has saved her favorite childhood collections, which are showcased within glass units she purchased. Strawberry Shortcake and collections from Barbie look like new because





she has taken such good care of them over the years. "My brothers and I were very careful with our toys growing up and have all of the ones that were special to us," Sheila commented.

Dario and Sheila met while attending Harding University in Searcy, Arkansas. Dario is from Panama and won the Walton Scholarship, funded by Wal-Mart, to study at a university in the United States. They were in the same group of friends because she was a Spanish major. "While at the movies with a group one night, I ended up separated from them and saw him sitting by himself," Sheila recalled. "I knew him by sight. So, I asked him if I could sit with him. He agreed, and we watched the movie together. After the movie, he mentioned that he liked the movie and would like to come see it again the next day."





Sheila quickly replied that she was going to come back to the show with him. "Isn't it me who should be asking you out?" he questioned. The rest is history. They got married after his third year of college. The Walton Scholarship required the recipient to return home to Panama to live and work for at least two years. So, after college, they packed up, and she began her new marriage and life in a foreign land.

Dario's family lives on a group of islands off the Caribbean coast of Panama. There are 365 islands which are solely inhabited by his people, the Kuna. The islands are handed down






to the next generation and never sold. Dario and Sheila lived there part of the time and went back and forth to Panama City. His family owns a hotel on the islands, so when they were there, they worked as tour guides to the guests of the hotel. "We enjoyed this season of our lives and met people from everywhere," she said. "Some would come in by yacht and

cruise ships, and others would fly in."


Sheila is originally from DeSoto. When they returned from Panama, they moved in with her parents for a while. They finally landed in Waxahachie. This house became their home 13 years ago. "We really haven't done anything structural to the house except add a closet to the master bedroom. Otherwise, we have only



GINGERBREAD TRAIL TOUR OF HOMES





updated or created space by using furniture," she explained.

Upon entering the hallway, pictures of the family line the walls and shelves making it easy for visitors to see how important family is to those who reside in this home. They are very close, and Dario and Sheila spend much of their time getting their two daughters, Sofia and Isa, to tennis and swim events, singing competitions and traveling each day all the way up to Bishop Dunne, where their oldest daughter attends school. Both parents have served as teachers, administrators, coaches and all-around support for the schools in which they have been involved.



To the right of the entry is a room that could easily be set up as an additional bedroom, but instead, shelves line the walls, making this the perfect spot for the family's home library. "Once, a friend of my daughter came for a party and when she went back to school, she was telling her friends how cool the house was. The girl's friends asked what was so cool about the house," Sheila remembered. "The reply of our daughter's friend was that it was cool because we lived in a library!" Because of their love of learning and books, Sheila felt that was one of the greatest compliments she could have received about their home.

The house is painted relaxing shades of yellow and tan. The living area is large and open to the kitchen and dining area. A very modern, flat style of cabinetry lines the wall of the kitchen giving it a clean look.





Splashing Into Fun

The cool, inviting blue pool water is being readied this month for another summer at the Waxahachie Family YMCA. "Learning to swim is a major part in a child's life because it's a skill that one uses a lifetime for fun and recreation," Logan Houser, pool manager, said. "Knowing how to swim can also save lives."

Sara Calvillo, assistant pool manager, and Logan will be leading 26-30 part-time lifeguards. Training for lifeguards is offered at the YMCA during two sessions this month. Registration for those lifeguard training sessions and all group swim classes and private and semi-private swim classes that begin in June and go through August is open and available online at www.waxahachieymca.org.

Swim lessons are offered to children as young as 6 months of age, with a parent. Ages 3-12 are taught water acclimation, movement and stamina, and more advanced 5- to 12-year-olds are taught strokes. Lessons are offered

to adults of any age. "We've seen a steady increase in adults wanting to learn to swim in recent years. This year, we will also teach swim lessons and safety around water classes in cooperation with the city of Waxahachie and Lee Penn Park pool," Jon McLaughlin, Waxahachie YMCA executive director, explained.

Once children complete stroke mechanics, they may inquire about joining the YMCA-sponsored swim team, Ellis County Swim, which competes in a Dallas league with other area YMCA swim teams and at state competitions. An additional swim team, the Angel League Stingrays, is offered for ages 6-19 for children with mental or physical challenges. "The Stingrays are part of the Special Olympics competition. It's amazing to see these kids when the light bulb comes on. They are pretty remarkable," Jon said.

"It's exciting to move kids to the next swim level and telling the parents the news," Sara added. "I get to experience their joy and excitement!"

Payments vary with the different lessons, programs and whether the person registering is a YMCA member or nonmember. Financial assistance and income-based memberships are available.

For members looking for a workout, there are options. Water aerobics classes are free with membership and are open to ages 10-14 with a parent or guardian and to ages 15 and over unaccompanied. Morning and evening times are reserved for lap swimming.

With varying time and day offerings, the YMCA makes the pool available to fit most folks' schedules, expertise and fitness goals. Open swim times, when everyone can enjoy the pool, are scheduled daily, too. Pool schedules can be accessed on the YMCA's website, and copies are available at the YMCA during the swim season, which lasts from Memorial Day to Labor Day.

Logan learned to swim at age 8 and was a member of Ellis County Swim while in high school when they were the 2013-2014 district champions. "My biggest mentor in swimming would definitely be Mrs. Pruitt, the swim team coach. She let me be on the team and made me so much better than I ever thought I could be," Logan recalled. He's currently a biology major at Stephen F. Austin State University, where he participates on the track and field team. "I love to swim and do so regularly, but my true passion is track and field," he said.

Sara's a product of the YMCA swim lesson program. "I remember when I learned to swim at age 5, the lifeguard told me if I would come back, they would hire me," she recalled. "I came back." Logan and lifeguard, Billy Luco, have encouraged her. She's attending Navarro College, both on the Waxahachie and Corsicana campuses, working toward a bachelor's degree in sports management. I 16-oz. bag coleslaw (to include both red and green cabbage and carrots)

2. Mix cubed or sliced breasts with other ingredients if serving immediately.

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 Tbsp. salt
- 1/2 pkg. frozen spinach, chopped
- I cup ricotta cheese
- 4 oz. cream cheese
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 1/2 box jumbo pasta shells
- 3 cups pasta sauce
- 2 cups Alfredo sauce
- **I.** In a large skillet, sauté the onions in oil until translucent; add garlic and cook for I minute.
- **2.** Add ground beef; cook until crumbly texture. Season with salt; set aside.
- **3.** Combine spinach and cheeses; mix well. Add eggs; set aside for later use.
- **4.** Parboil the pasta shells; drain and allow to cool before filling shells.
- **5.** Add spinach, cheeses and egg mixture to the ground beef mixture.
- **6.** Use cookie scoop to fill the pasta shells. Cover with pasta sauce and Alfredo sauce; allow the red sauce to be visible, as well.
- **7.** Bake at 350 F for 35 minutes. Allow to cool; serve.

Mandarin Orange and Pineapple Cake

Cake:

- 1 11-oz. can mandarin oranges, plus juice
- 1 8-oz. can crushed pineapple, drained
- I yellow cake mix
- 3/4 cups vegetable oil
- 4 eggs
- 1 tsp. vanilla

Icing:

- 1 16-oz. tub Cool Whip
- 1 8-oz. tub Cool Whip
- 1 15.25-oz. can crushed pineapple, with juices
- 1 3.4-oz. pkg. vanilla instant pudding Coconut (optional)
- **I.** For cake: Mix all ingredients; divide into two 8-inch cake pans. Bake at 350 F for 30 minutes, or until done.
- **2.** For icing: Mix all ingredients together; spread between layers and on cake. Keep refrigerated and take out 1 hour prior to serving.



A rich and colorful painting by acclaimed artist and South Carolina Lowcountry native Jonathan Green depicts a vibrant sunrise spreading across a tidal creek and marsh grass that is Charleston's iconic landscape. Entitled *Awakening in Charleston*, the painting captures more than the fiery beauty of sunrise. It also evokes the spirit of awakening Charleston experiences as it tells its story to the world — not just the postcard-ready version of cobblestone streets and historic plantations, but also the realities of enslaved people whose skills and labor built Charleston. Once a sleepy coastal port, today Charleston draws visitors to discover a vibrant, modern city examining its roots and teeming with high-tech job growth, a vibrant arts and culture scene and an award-winning culinary destination.

Charleston boasts more than its share of award-winning "get-your-reservation-in-advance" dining experiences but

also entices with off-the-radar offerings. Felix, a hip and modern French café at the north end of the King Street Historic District, tempts visitors with small, savory plates of lobster deviled eggs and crab croquettes with crispy okra. For a quieter, more sophisticated dining experience, reserve your spot at the James Beard award-winning restaurant, FIG. Chef Mike Lata's cuisine is a simple, yet innovative, approach to Lowcountry food, such as baked golden tilefish with spring shallots. For something casual, yet no less mouthwatering, venture to the diverse North Central neighborhood. Strap on your appetite for James Beardnominated Chef Rodney Scott's legendary whole hog BBQ or sit outside at Leon's Oyster Shop and dine on charred oysters and spicy fried chicken.

After getting your fill, explore downtown Charleston by foot. Founded in 1670, Charleston offers unparalleled







The Beat Goes On

Erica Pointer-Wilcox, WHS Cherokee Charmer director, was living life to its fullest, when suddenly things began to change. While in her late 20s, she was diagnosed with congestive heart failure, which prompted the need for a pacemaker.

In December 2015, she underwent her first open-heart surgery. In January 2016, she began experiencing blackouts, which led to a stroke later that same year. Erica was put on the national heart transplant list in January 2017, and by May 2017, at the age of 32, she underwent a full heart transplant. "I never felt sorry for myself," she said, remembering back on all she went through to get where she is today. "I believe that everything happens for a reason."

Nothing, not even a bad heart, stopped Erica from doing what she loves to do — dance and teach, teach and dance. While waiting on a new heart, she wore an IV in her arm that gave her ailing heart the extra squeeze it needed to keep her out of the hospital and on the Waxahachie ISD campus. In fact, the time she missed away from the high school was minimal. "My health was not going to stop me from doing the job I was hired to do," she explained. "I

had very little down time. I came right back to work."

Work, for Erica, was by far the best medicine. It gave her the purpose she needed to keep moving in a forward direction. Just two short months after receiving her new heart, Erica showed up for Cherokee Charmer summer camp. "Working was and still is my coping mechanism," she confessed. "To stop would have meant giving in to my illness, and that's not going to happen. I refused to give up."

Before the transplant, Erica would put in a full day at work, return home to shower and collapse in her weariness. That is no longer the case. As she gets ready to celebrate her one-year transplant anniversary, she finds she has more energy than ever before. After many hours in the gym, her chest muscles are strong. Her quality of life is better than it's been in a very long time. "I have fewer restrictions now," she explained. "And I'm not nearly as tired as I used to be." She now goes to the gym following a full day "at the office." Then it's home to fix supper for her family. "And I even have energy to clean house and do some laundry without getting exhausted," she said.

Erica hopes to one day meet the donor family. She realizes that the beat goes on for her because of their selfless gift, and for that she will be forever grateful. "Because of that gift," she said, "I'm breathing easy." **NOW**
