



"It is hard to see in person how they live," he said, referring to the overwhelming living conditions of their makeshift housing and the children's need for shoes. "If I had stayed any longer, I would have sold my car so I could buy all the children

shoes." He sadly realized he could only do so much. "Going there makes you appreciate what we have," he added.






# ROUS Service

Russell and Nancy Thomas understand all about nurturing roots, tending young plants, observing the seasons and harvesting the fruit of their labors in due time. "In 2000, I got certified as a Master Gardener," Nancy said. "I just love gardening." Russell has been growing vegetables for 25 years. The principles they apply in their gardens have also served them well in life, as they have nurtured their three daughters into educated, ambitious young ladies. They have also tended their careers: Russell as an environmental engineer and Nancy as an occupational therapist.







They have observed the seasons of their family, honoring Russell's mother, a World War II veteran, with a charming home built on their property. They have also harvested the fruits of their labors in a community filled with friends and associates, who have been both a blessing to, and blessed by, the Thomases.

Their house in Ennis gives the impression of a place where people actually live. Yes, it is exceedingly













attractive and thoughtfully furnished, but there is a definable sense of "these are books people actually read, these are chairs people actually sit in and this is a view which is truly enjoyed." It is, in the best sense of the word, a home.

"We have lived in this house 14 years," Nancy shared. "When we moved here, Dana Cody helped us make it look more homey and comfortable, and that is what we like to be. "We also spend a lot of our time in the sunroom," Russell mentioned, "which has a long dining table with room for big family dinners."

"We entertain a lot," they both agreed, "so we want a table for 12." The large central living area of the home is in the planning phase of becoming a grand dining room, which will take advantage of the spectacular view of the brilliantly hued azaleas outside. Beyond the flowers, Russell fondly reveals his neat and well-tended beds of potatoes, onions and asparagus. "There is a new garden this year, full of tomatoes and peppers," he said. "We usually have a lot of bluebonnets in the back and the Kachina Prairie is right behind our







"We have pretty much got the downstairs where Nancy and I can live in it by ourselves. It is built for us now," Russell mentioned, since their three daughters are grown. "Katherine is in law school in San Antonio and doing very well. Anna will be working at the Center for the Study of Addiction and Recovery at Texas Tech in Lubbock and pursuing her masters in higher education administration in the fall."




"Becca is going to go to Texas A&M in College Station to study aerospace engineering," Nancy said. "She wants to get that degree, then get a law degree and then work for the CIA."

Recent changes to update the downstairs have given the kitchen and bathrooms new life. "When you go with decorators, they teach you things. 





# Pupet Designation of the Control of

Joyce Edgell has aspired to be a puppeteer since she was a child. "I was always interested in puppets," Joyce remembered. "When I was 8 years old, my dad bought me a ventriloquist figure. I used to watch Paul Winchell and the Nestlé's Quik commercials with the puppets, and I dreamed about learning how to do that." As an adult, she was able to order training materials and learn the art of puppetry. Now, she is the puppet director for the Baylor Baptist Church puppet ministry.

About five years ago, Joyce started a puppet ministry, called Puppets of Praise, with children ages 8 to 12. "Sometimes the kids do skits, but for the most part they do songs. The kids love it. They perform about once a month during church services." The children in Puppets of Praise have worked hard to learn how to put up the stage. They have learned the basics of puppetry and how to take care of puppets.

Before long, Joyce wanted to start an adult puppetry group. Each year, her church choir takes a Christmas program to prisons. "I thought, if we had puppets, it would be an extra ministry to the inmates," Joyce said. "We performed the Christmas music with puppets and it was a hit. The prison inmates just love it. That was really an awesome feeling to be able to get their attention like that."

The group plays recorded songs and the puppets come up and lip-synch. "The first year, we sang two songs. We had a barn prop set up and a farmer-guy puppet comes out and sings, then

animal puppets come out and sing with him. It was kind of hilarious. It was a song with a message, but with the puppets doing it, it was really funny."

Now, they have an official adult group of puppeteers called Puppets of Praise AGU (Almost Grown Up), which includes Joyce, Judy Harrison, Eileen Eckeberger and Corrie Eckeberger. "We meet every Thursday to practice and talk about what we are going to do for our next program. We go over what places we have booked. If it is someplace we have already been, then we make up a new program so that they are not looking at the same stuff. We are just having a ball. Judy is our PR person, so she contacts the places and gets us dates to perform."

They have three stages. One is heavy, which they keep downstairs for use in the sanctuary. A more portable one can be disassembled and taken with them when they travel to performances. "The tricky part is tearing it down and setting up the set," Eileen explained.

Joyce also has a walk-around stage — a small one-puppeteer stage. "I bought that so we can have it for things like Halloween," Joyce said. "It straps on with suspenders to your belt."

When using the bigger stages, Eileen and Corrie use the bottom level,

while Joyce and Judy take the top level. "I used to love watching Sesame Street," Corrie reminisced, "and now I am in it. I call my favorite puppet Naomi Ruth, after my great-aunt."

Everything the group does is for the enjoyment of the people watching. They go to the nursing homes with the puppets. "I love to see the audience enjoying [them]," Judy shared. "You can see the change on their faces. Afterwards, we go and greet them and shake their hands with the puppets and it really makes you feel good."


"It is fun to talk to people," Eileen added. "They just get this childlike look in their eye. They get so excited, and I like that."

"At least once a month, we try to get as many [shows] in on one Saturday as we can," Joyce said. "It is a busy day. We have been to nursing homes in Waxahachie, Midlothian, Red Oak and Ennis."

When planning a puppet show, Joyce has dozens of puppets from which to select for the performance. "We choose puppets according to what the voices are and what we think the puppet for that voice should look like."

There are grannies, old men and children puppets. They also have animal puppets, including: a rat, an orangutan, frogs, a sheepdog and a cat. "My favorites are a girl puppet with blue hair and a pink baseball cap, and a boy puppet that looks like Elvis," Judy mentioned. "The songs all get to be favorites; you are humming them day and night."

"You have to make sure that your puppet's mouth opens with each syllable," Joyce explained. "It is hard to get used to at first. You keep your wrist bent, so your puppet is looking at the audience and not at the ceiling. You do exercises to strengthen your arms. Puppeteering is harder than it looks," Joyce said, "but it is so much fun and I love it." NOW

# Beginning a New Chanter

Weston Montgomery has been playing catch for most of his life. His parents, Danny and Rosemary Montgomery, remember back when he was only 3 years old. "Danny would throw to Weston from his easy chair," Rosemary laughed. "It didn't matter what he threw, Weston learned to catch it, and then he'd throw it back to his father." The game, which started inside, was soon carried outdoors. "If Weston missed throwing it straight to me," Danny said, "I'd make him chase after it himself." It was not long before the balls Weston threw began to hit their target perfectly. "Chasing the balls made him good," Danny added.

Weston remembers the story his parents retell, but he cannot help but recall the many ups and downs it took for him to get where he is today — making final preparations to take full advantage of a hard-earned baseball college scholarship.

"As a kid, I was smaller than the other guys," Weston said. "I had to work harder to get the same results." The work habits he learned early in life carried him through his final game as short stop at Ennis High School this past season. He knows they will also serve him well in college play. "The work habits forced me to get better," Weston said, explaining he feels his talent was not so much God-given, as earned through hours of practice, weight training and a positive attitude.






it." Needless to say, thanks to his first homerun, the Ennis Lions went on to play another game.



In Dr. Beverly Scott's classroom are crayons, construction paper, glue, scissors and brightly colored markers. Assignments regularly include essay writing. Singing plays an important part in the curriculum. Games are used to review material. Have you guessed? Precalculus is Dr. Scott's subject! If you thought math was dry or pedantic, think again. "Precalculus" is written on her board in purple with pink curlicues around it. "That is kind of my personality," Beverly explained.

"In precalculus, I teach everything from advanced algebra to trig [trigonometry], plus polar equations and vectors," Beverly said. "I introduce them to integrals and limits. They have to do projects for me, and that is when they are creative." Students illustrate equations and word problems on poster board. "Some of them are so linear, with sequential thinking and they need to learn to be creative so their brain will start crossing over between the right and left hemisphere. The more crossover, the more intelligent you become."

Concrete aids, like hand tricks and singing, help students internalize math concepts. "I have songs for logarithms and derivatives — all kinds of silly stuff, but it works." Students investigate the use of math in the real world by interviewing a businessperson. "They learn we don't just do math for fun — there is really a purpose for it."

Students do scavenger hunts, working in pairs to solve equations found around the room. They play Matho, a math-oriented Bingo game. For a game called Thunder, Lightening, Storm, students brainstorm to solve problems. The Rotation game is similar to musical chairs, but involves solving math problems; Synergistics has students working in groups of four to learn topics. "They can get really tired of

sitting and focusing all day long and doing nothing. They are creatures of action, and so I just take what they like to do and put math in it."

Beverly has taught 17 years at Ennis High School, following eight years in Arlington. "I have always loved the idea of being a teacher. Sitting in an office all day is just not my personality. Arlington, as well as a doctorate in curriculum from the University of North Texas. Some



# Mother's Day Forever

Did you get one of those big, beautiful hydrangeas for Mother's Day? It does not have to be a one-time thing, if you are willing to give it a little help.

When it starts to droop inside, soak it overnight in a deep dish outside and find a good-sized spot near your back door for it. Get that spot ready by digging in lots of organic stuff like dead leaves or compost. Hydrangeas need lots of air and water and will grow large. Our clay/rock soil needs organic help in that area. Of course, we are talking about a shady spot since hydrangeas will not take hot sun without burning up. After the plant has soaked overnight, plant it in a wet hole in that shady spot you have ready. Planting it by the door where you walk in and out makes it easier to remember to water it!

The plants that are forced in a greenhouse will grow outdoors with a little extra care, but do not look for luscious blooms next Mother's Day. It will take a bit longer, but they will bloom if you have not cut them back. All hydrangeas bloom on old wood, so trimming is in line right after they bloom. If you wait until spring, you stand a chance of cutting off all the stems that would have bloomed! They can be shaped up after blooming and left to make lots of new blooms the following spring.

Nurseries sell several varieties, if you did not get one for

Mother's Day. Bluebird is a sturdy variety with oblong olive leaves and flat lacecap flowers. Annabella develops into a white hedge, whereas the newest variety, Endless Summer, produces large, showy flowers over several months.

Winter care requires heavy mulching to protect the plant from the cold. If you have yours in a large pot, a light place in the garage will do. Plant and protect for a lifetime of blooms to remind you of a special Mother's Day. WOW







### CHICKEN CORDON BLEU

High Point Inn, Winter Park, CO

6 chicken breast halves, skinless, boneless

- 6 thin slices Swiss cheese
- 6 thin slices Gruyere cheese
- 6 slices imported Danish ham, no water
- 3 Tbsp. all-purpose flour
- 1 tsp. paprika
- salt and white pepper, to taste
- 3 Tbsp. butter
- 3 Tbsp. olive oil
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 4 Tbsp. Panko (Japanese) bread crumbs
- 1/2 cup Pinot Grigio dry white wine
- 1 tsp. chicken bouillon granules
- 1/2 cup chicken broth
- 1 Tbsp. cornstarch

1 cup heavy whipping cream

Place chicken breasts between 2 pieces of Saran wrap; using the bottom of an 8-inch frying skillet, pound the breasts to at least 1/4-inch thickness. Place a slice of each cheese and ham on each breast within 1/2-inch of the edges. Fold edges of chicken over filling; roll and secure with pointed wooden toothpicks.

Mix flour and paprika in a small bowl. Season chicken with salt and white pepper. Heat butter and olive oil in a large skillet over medium heat. Dip each chicken roll in the following order: flour/paprika, beaten eggs and Panko bread crumbs. Sauté chicken in butter and olive oil, turning once, until chicken is 3/4 cooked and golden brown; about 3 - 4 minutes per side. Remove chicken and place in a buttered Pyrex baking dish with 3 tablespoons of chicken broth in bottom of dish. Remove toothpicks. Bake at 325 F until done, about 15 - 20 minutes. Be careful not to overcook or the chicken will become dry and all of the cheese will run out.

Add wine, chicken broth and bouillon to the large skillet, turn heat to low: reduce and simmer for a few minutes. Blend cornstarch with cream in a small bowl: whisk slowly into the skillet. Cook, stirring until thickened, for about 10 minutes; pour over chicken at serving. Serve warm. Serves six

### RADISH AND CUCUMBER COCKTAIL

Escadrille Restaurant, Harrisburg, PA

12 oz. large radishes 12 oz. peeled cucumber (net weight after removing seeds) 2 Tbsp. olive oil juice of a half of lemon pinch of salt pinch of sugar 1 medium onion, finely chopped

8 oz. tomatoes, skinned, seeds removed, chopped

1 clove of garlic, crushed

2 - 3 Tbsp. tomato ketchup

Cut the radishes (peel if desired) and cucumber in small strips; marinate for a few minutes only in olive oil, lemon juice, salt and a pinch of sugar. Mix onion, tomatoes, garlic and tomato ketchup to make a fairly thick sauce Mix together the marinated radishes and cucumber; place in champagne goblets or cocktail glasses and cover with the sauce. This is healthy and very delicious! Serves 6.





Sierra at Tahoe Ski Area, Twin Bridges, CA

(Cooking time 1 1/4 - 1 1/2 hours)



Singe and clean the geese well; draw them. Season with salt inside and outside; sprinkle with cumin. Place in roasting tin with a little water and roast 350 F until golden-brown. Pour off almost all the drippings, setting the rest aside; add the flour, cook for a few moments, blend in 7/8 pint water, stir well, scraping the sediment off the tin; simmer for about 30 minutes, then strain. DUMPLINGS: To make the dumplings, sieve the flour with the baking powder and salt; work into a smooth paste with the egg yolk and milk. Add the bread cubes. Working on a flowered table, shape the mixture into oblong rolls weighing about 1 lb. Poach in boiling salted water, remove, drain well, cut into 3/4-inch slices, arrange in a heated dish and coat with warm melted butter. CABBAGE: Place cabbage in a pan with chopped onions, salt, vinegar, a little cumin and water, cover and stew until cooked. Pour off the surplus water; prepare a blond roux with the fat and flour and mix with the cabbage. Season to taste with salt, vinegar and a pinch of sugar. Carve the geese and handle the dumplings, cabbage and sauce separately. Serves 5 to 8.



# Recognizing Stroke Symptoms

A cerebral vascular accident (CVA) is commonly referred to as a "stroke." Strokes are the third-leading cause of death and a leading cause of adult disability in the United States.


A stroke occurs when there is an interruption in normal blood supply to the brain. This interruption can occur when arteries supplying the brain with oxygen-rich blood become blocked by a blood clot or plaque (ischemic stroke) or as the result of a leaking or ruptured blood vessel in the brain (hemorrhagic stroke). Another condition that has been associated with a stroke is a transient ischemic attack (TIA), often described as a ministroke. Although many of the same symptoms occur in the event of all three conditions, there are signs and symptoms that tend to be more common to each. Recognizing the symptoms of a stroke or TIA and

seeking immediate medical care can greatly improve the chances of avoiding mental and physical disability or even death.

Those experiencing either type of stroke or a TIA may complain of:

- A severe headache.
- Weakness, numbness or paralysis of the face or extremities on one side of the body.
- Difficulty walking.
- Loss of balance or coordination.
- Dizziness.
- Vision problems, such as blurred or double vision.
- Trouble speaking clearly. including slurred speech.
- Confusion or trouble understanding communication.

Stroke symptoms may begin and progress suddenly, or gradually develop







over the course of days. Symptoms of an ischemic stroke are generally focused on one side of the body, whereas the symptoms of a hemorrhagic stroke may be accompanied by nausea, vomiting, confusion, neck stiffness, dizziness, seizures and/or unconsciousness. TIA symptoms closely mimic those symptoms of an ischemic stroke, but are usually short-lived and resolve within the matter of a day.

Recognizing the signs and symptoms of a stroke or TIA and seeking immediate medical treatment can minimize the effects of a stroke and greatly improve your chances of avoiding permanent physical and mental disability, or even death. WOW




