



He performed over 700 volunteer hours at the Cook Center, working with his mentor, Carole Davenport, the director of the center. Carole remembered Daniel walking into her office, volunteering to help at the many



community events held at the Cook Center. "I actually thought an angel had just walked in! He explained that he was working on his Congressional Award and needed volunteer hours, and he had chosen the Cook Center. From that day on, Daniel was at everything and did anything I needed. He was a dream of a volunteer and worker. I told him one day, 'If I had a son, I would want him to be you." Daniel has continued to volunteer at the center even though the award requirements have been completed. Lifetime service to the community is a primary goal of the Congressional Award program.

The program focuses on the young person intensively working at only one or two volunteer jobs during the six-year period it can take to earn the award. "The idea is to make an impact on the community," Daniel stated.

Development of self was a large part of what Daniel learned. "I was exposed to a wide variety of people and many different situations," he said. Now a senior with two majors, economics and distribution management technology at Baylor University, Daniel finds his personal development gained through the award advantageous. "Business people are going to expect me to work well with

people and be a problem solver," Daniel said.

"Daniel presented himself so well with the public," Carole added. "He was a quick thinker, self-motivated, loyal and always respectful."



The physical fitness requirement was met through running, weight lifting and performing crunches and push-ups. A country boy at heart, Daniel said, "I enjoy getting out on the lake, shooting and camping. While he is in Air Force ROTC at Baylor, the physical fitness component could not be satisfied through military training. "You can't merge activities; you have to keep voluntary and required activities separate and organized." Friends joined

Daniel for the expedition/exploration component. The group drove, staying often with friends along the way, to Washington, D.C., and onward to New York City for New Year's Eve 2010. Daniel remembered, "We nearly froze at the Lincoln Memorial. We walked on



frozen water at the Mall, and it snowed on our way to Times Square. We met people from all over the world during the six hours of countdown and the rest of the trip. I was just a small-town kid making a trip to the Big Apple."







This son of Danny Hux, who lives "right by the Trinity River," and nephew of Jimmy and Rita Hux of Gun Barrel City, has carried his sense of volunteerism forward in his life. Not only does Daniel still make it home to volunteer at the Cook Center on busy weekends, but he has worked with the Steppin' Out Program at Baylor where students volunteer days of service to the Waco community. All this plus carrying 18-19 college hours each semester as well as ROTC, which is eight or more clock hours per week, keeps Daniel focused on what is important in life. "I enjoy the



leadership aspect of ROTC," he said. He plans to continue his service to the Air Force upon graduation. "I want to finish my duty to my country that I started in the Marines," he added.

Daniel has earned a high GPA at Baylor. "I had no problems transferring to Baylor from Navarro since the college had given me a really good education and prepared me well for university studies," he said.

Daniel's advice to young people who might wish to follow his lead and pursue the Congressional Award applies to living a well-served life. "You really must love the joy you receive from volunteering. You can't be worried about receiving a paycheck. You have to really, thoroughly, enjoy giving to your community."

As his Baylor graduation approaches, Daniel does not know where his Air Force career will take him, but he does know that he will be serving the communities in which he will reside and will return home often to do the same, living by President Kennedy's words, "Ask not what your country can do for you - ask what you can do for your country." Elizabeth Pratt's drive and motivation, formed by years of playing softball as a young girl, has had a profound effect throughout her life. A recent graduate of Kerens High School, she was an overachiever in extracurricular activities. She excelled in multiple sports, volunteered in her community and was an active member of student council, Fellowship of Christian Athletes and Future Farmers of America. She managed all of these activities while maintaining good grades. In a delicate balance of time and energy, Elizabeth immersed herself in the world of high school sports. She embraced her ever-busy schedule of long practice hours, tennis matches, track meets and volleyball and softball games. 'It was very exhausting at times, but it was really worth it," Elizabeth shared. "I have a huge heart for playing sports!"



Elizabeth had her first competitive sports experience at age 6 when her parents signed her up to play softball at Nature Park in Corsicana. She remained active in softball — in the girls' league in Corsicana through eighth grade and at the high school varsity level. With her help as a full-time varsity team member the following year, the Kerens volleyball team made it to the playoffs yet again. very busy. Often Elizabeth had softball games, tennis meets and track meets all in one week — on top of practices, studying and finding time to sleep! "It can be very challenging to go back and forth between the different sports," Elizabeth stated, "especially with softball and tennis, because you hit the ball so differently! You eventually get the hang of it, though, so it all works out."

Picking tennis back up for the first time in several years was no big deal for Elizabeth. She placed first as an individual in a recent tournament, and she and her doubles partner, who also happens to be her lifelong best friend, placed third at another meet. Although Elizabeth enjoyed everything she was involved in during high school, her real passion was softball. "That was definitely my main sport!" she exclaimed.

"I love the action, and I always like to beat the other team to win a game means a lot!" Elizabeth shared. Her favorite part of the game is making an out. "I love fielding the ball and throwing it to first base to get a runner out, especially when they're fast!"

Elizabeth has many great memories of her high school softball career. The first team she ever played on, The Bratz, placed second in their local championship, setting the trend for success in the years to follow. As Elizabeth and the remainder of her team grew older and moved through the leagues at Nature Park, the majority of them stayed together. "It was so much fun to play out there," Elizabeth shared. "I got to make a lot of new friends, and



They subsequently held that title every year following until Elizabeth began playing high school softball. "No one could beat us," she remembered excitedly. Elizabeth treasures the involvement and exposure she had to the game at such an early age. "It taught us so much about working together," she said. "That's where we learned how to play the game."


Her experiences in the Corsicana leagues versus playing at the high school level have been very different. "It's a lot more competitive in high school than it is in the leagues," Elizabeth said. "In high school, our main goal was always to win, but in the leagues, you were just there to have fun most of the time."

When she began playing at the varsity level as a freshman, Elizabeth was a second baseman. Her vast experience, however, allowed for flexibility in changing positions to whatever the team most needed. "The first time I met Elizabeth, she walked up to me and said, 'Hi! I'm Elizabeth, and I'm your second











baseman," shared Coach Haley Harrell, Elizabeth's coach at KHS during her sophomore and junior years. "She is one of the most hardworking kids I have ever coached. She gives 110 percent in everything she does, and she is extremely coachable."

Through the years, Elizabeth happily adapted to whichever position she was playing at any given time. As a senior, she played catcher. "It's all for the team," she said.

Elizabeth's favorite memory from high school involved softball. She helped propel the KHS softball team into the playoffs for the first time in Kerens history. It was the last inning of the game, and the score was tied, four to four. Elizabeth stepped up to the plate with two runners on base and with two outs on the board. She slammed the ball on a clutch hit, knocked in two runs and stole third base and home plate for the win. "I was so happy that day," she remembered. "The coach even gave me the game ball everyone had signed. I'll never forget that!"

With a Go Texan Scholarship and a \$500 scholarship for her involvement in the College Achievement Program in Kerens, Elizabeth plans to attend Navarro College. Her plan is to complete basic courses before transferring into the nursing program at Tarleton State University. She also intends to try out for the Navarro College softball team.

Although Elizabeth remained constantly busy during her four years in high school, she enjoyed every moment and somehow still found time for one of her favorite hobbies — fishing at Richland Chambers Lake with her father. Looking back over her time at KHS, she remembers it fondly. "Overall, it was just a great experience." NOW






















a *Waltons*-type, multigenerational lifestyle at Lake Richland Chambers, after moving in with her mother and stepfather, Ken and Helen Griffiths.

While her parents were building their home in 2000, Kirstin was busy rearing David and his older sister, Kara, and working as a bookkeeper, auditor and motel front desk clerk in Fort Worth. Kirstin remembers visiting to help clear the land before any of the structures that now occupy the lot were built. "David was a toddler. We would camp out, and I didn't have to worry about the kids playing outside." Ken and Helen designed the home and nearby office/studio to accommodate their needs, so it could remain the center of life for their family.

Kirstin, a single mom, suffered a stroke nearly four years ago, and went to that family home "seeking health." Even though she has survived six strokes in all, she has, through medical, physical and occupational therapies, found more than a restoration of health. She has found a community that has embraced her and enabled her to return to her original passion — creating beautiful and authentic-to-the-period costumes for plays and musicals performed at The Warehouse Living Arts Center.

Ken is a scientist and engineer, and he influenced the development of Kirstin's scientific mind that pays attention to detail. But thanks to Helen, her passion







is theater arts, and her first movie memory in the United States was the film, Blazing Saddles. Kirstin attended Lon Morris College as a theater arts and religion major. "I had excellent teachers. Every one of them had to have been on or off Broadway. My dance teacher had been Tommy Tune's teacher," said Kirstin, who had the honor of having been the first female student director at the college. However, Kirstin's life took a turn away from the theater. Marriage, kids and other jobs all came Kirstin's way after her college days.

While Kirstin was recovering from a stroke, Kara and David encouraged their mother to get back into theater by volunteering with the show, *Guys and Dolls*. "A star was born," David said. Since that time, Kirstin has volunteered as a cast member and/or part

of the production crew in many of the theater's productions. "I am a perfectionist, so sometimes I have to learn to back off and get the outfits out. It all comes together at dress rehearsal. Sometimes, I have to make or adjust outfits overnight, but it is so much fun. We have lots of backstage stories," Kirstin said. For the recent production, *The King and I*, Kirstin created over 200 costumes at WLAC.

All this creating now happens in Kirstin's workshop, which is housed in the family's office/studio about 200 feet from the

main house, from which she runs her business, Kirstin's Kreations by Design. Additionally, Ken and Helen have offices in the barn. Kirstin's workshop provides floorto-ceiling storage for wigs, costumes and the many materials she uses. A stateof-the-art sewing machine, "my Rolls Royce," according to Kirstin, sits on a work table where a dress maker mannequin stands nearby. "There is a place for all of my 'stuff," she said.







create mounts that appear astoundingly lifelike, down to the last minute detail. "I got interested in taxidermy when I was 12 years old," Marcus said. "James did some special mounts for my family, and I would go to his shop and watch him as he worked. He's literally taught me everything there is to know about the process."

It's not unusual to drop by Marcus' shop, located several miles outside Corsicana city limits, to find both men working intently on their latest project, surrounded by completed pieces awaiting pick-up, such as several deer head and shoulder mounted on the wall, birds, fish













and a massive brown bear that's been mounted life-size amidst a setting that replicates its natural habitat.

Marcus learned very early that being able to create believable and realistic scenes in which to place his preserved works was almost as important as producing a quality mounting. "James showed me the importance of building the right kind of scene for the artifact being mounted," he said, pointing to the bear, one of his and James' recent accomplishments.

Taxidermy is really an art as well as a process, according to James, and the process itself almost always follows a set pattern. "The animal is brought or mailed to us, either freshly killed or frozen. We take measurements then remove all the red meat, which is called 'skinning' the carcass. Then it's soaked in a preservative, called the 'tanning' process. We wash it clean, sometimes even rolling it in sawdust to clean the fur. We find the right Styrofoam manikin and shape it to fit the hide. Then we stretch the hide over the manikin," James explained.

"Next, we set the glass eyes, then form the nostrils and the mouth, which is a very delicate procedure and extremely important to make it look alive. After it has dried, we come back and use touch-up paint on the eyes, nose, mouth and antlers to give it a lifelike appearance," James continued.

Putting the finished animal in a pose and realistic setting is the last and most important step. "You have to approach setting the scene by asking yourself how you'd find the animal if you actually walked up on it in the wild," James said.



Formulating that final image and having it built to specification before any of the work begins is vital to the ultimate success of the whole mounting process.


James said that from the point the animal is harvested to the finished mounted piece placed in a realistic setting can sometimes take up to 18 months. "Our goal is to achieve permanence and to depict each animal in its natural habitat," James said. "We recommend that the mounts be kept clean in a controlled environment at room temperature."

Marcus remembered his first finished mounting, done back in January 2012. "James helped me prepare a mallard, and I've been doing bigger and more complex pieces under his watchful eye ever since," Marcus said. To date, the smallest animal he's mounted is a chipmunk, and the largest, a bear.

As for James, he doesn't hesitate to praise Marcus' abilities. "I've had other students throughout my career, but he's the best one I've ever worked with," he shared.

Taxidermy is a centuries old practice that was popular in ancient Egypt, according to the taxidermy.com Web site. Today, it has developed into a full-fledged form of wildlife art, and successful taxidermists are considered fine artists in their own right. The first taxidermists were primitive hunter/gatherers who crudely formed animal skins over mud and rock for use in their hunting rituals. Over time, as methods to preserve these skins improved and the need for tanned skins increased, the tanner became one of the most important members of the tribe.

By the 1700s, almost every small town












had a prosperous tannery business, and the 1800s saw hunters bringing their trophies to upholstery shops, where the upholsterers would actually sew up the animal skins and stuff them with rags and cotton. In the early 20th century, taxidermy began to evolve into its modern form, using techniques for mounting that allowed them to portray animals with uncanny lifelike accuracy.

James and Marcus find the kind of animals they get to work on fluctuates by season, but the exotic animals, like those from Africa, come in all year long. "In Africa, nothing is wasted. They skin them, let the skin dry, and then crate them up with horns and ship them to America where they are tanned. Then they are sent to us," Marcus said.

Marcus and his family moved to Corsicana from Arlington, Texas, when he was 4 years old. All through his life he had a real love of hunting and the outdoors, so discovering and developing a love of taxidermy seemed like a perfect fit. After his freshman year, he was homeschooled before attending college and police academy in Fairfield. When he's not busy creating lifelike mounts, he's also a reserve Freestone County policeman "when they need me," he said.

One wall of Marcus' shop is lined with framed certificates of membership in dozens of taxidermy affiliations, including the National Taxidermy Association, the Texas Taxidermy Association and SCI (Safari Club International). "So far, we've done about 30 animals from Africa, as well as the local game shot during hunting season," Marcus said. Not bad for a young and talented artisan who is fortunate to be doing something he clearly loves.

















Another scholarship offered through the same foundation is awarded to students who plan on attending Navarro College soon after their high school graduation. This smaller scholarship is the one that introduced Margaret to the Navarro campus. "Winning the Caston Scholarship represented a dream come true for me," Margaret recalled. "My parents always told us we were going to go to college, and I saw that as a sign that they were right."

The Opening Doors to Success Scholarship Margaret won is designed to provide financial assistance for high school graduates and first generation











college students. Both scholarships enabled her to attend the 2001 to 2003 school semesters at Navarro College. "Getting to attend Navarro College was such a great opportunity for me," Margaret said. She obtained her associate degree from Navarro College in arts and general studies in 2003.

Following graduation from Navarro College, Margaret moved to Huntsville where she attended Sam Houston State University and earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in 2006. Navarro College, however, had not forgotten Margaret, for in 2007, the opportunity to work as a recruiter presented itself. "I accepted their job offer immediately," she remembered. 

Why You Should Increase Your IRA Contribution

One way to have a larger retirement fund is to save more now. There are two limits on this. The first, of course, is how much money you are able to save. Some people have greater resources than others, but you may be able to find ways to save money by cutting back spending on unnecessary items.

The second limit is the amount of your retirement savings contribution that is deductible from your income taxes. The greater the deduction, the more value you get from your savings.


When the Individual Retirement Arrangement, also known as a traditional IRA, was set up by law in 1975, the maximum amount investors could deduct was \$1,500. It was raised to \$2,000 in 1981, and that limit stayed in place for 20 years. It was raised by Congress in 2002, 2005 and in 2008. The 2008 contribution limit was \$5,000. More importantly, the law allowed for automatic increases in the IRA contribution limit, without the need to pass additional legislation, to correspond to cost of living increases.

Because inflation has been very low in recent years, the 2012 contribution limit remains at \$5,000. But that's only if you are under age 50. If you've turned 50 since you last evaluated your IRA contributions, you may be in for a pleasant surprise. After you turn 50, you can contribute and deduct an additional \$1,000 per year, known under the law as a "catch-up" contribution.

The difference is significant. If you put \$2,000 away for 30 years, then your total contribution would be \$60,000 - and that's before earning any investment returns. Put away \$5,000 for 15 years and \$6,000 for another 15 years, and your total contribution would be \$165,000.

Assuming you earn an average annual investment return of 5 percent, the total value of your account may grow far beyond the amount you have contributed. At that rate, a \$2,000 annual contribution will compound to a \$139,522 nest egg

after 30 years. If you begin saving at age 35, make the \$5,000 contribution until age 50, then contribute the full \$6,000 starting at age 51, your nest egg would be \$371,461.



These numbers assume that contribution limits will remain where they are now, but they are expected to increase in future years with increases in the cost of living. Before you make your annual IRA contribution, check with your financial advisor or the IRS to determine your contribution limit. **NOW**

Sports Medicine: Not Just for Athletes

You don't have to be a competitive athlete to benefit from the care of a sports medicine doctor. Sports-related injuries such as a sprain, strain or broken bone that happens because of physical activity — can happen to anyone, regardless of age or fitness level.

Types of movement-related injuries

Acute injuries occur because of an incident, such as an impact or a fall. These injuries might include a deep cut or bruise, an ankle sprain, a muscle strain, a dislocation or bone fracture.

Chronic injuries — or "overuse injuries" — develop over a period of time, as a result of repetitive motion, such as running, overhead throwing or extending a limb (such as swinging a tennis racket). Overuse injuries can also occur when you increase the intensity, duration or frequency of an activity too quickly.

Other factors that contribute to overuse injuries involve not warming up sufficiently before beginning the activity; improper technique; wrong equipment (lack of good running/walking shoes, for example); or specific anatomical issues such as weak knees, flat arches or an old injury that flares. Examples of these types of injuries might include stress fractures, tendonitis or shin splints.

What is a sports medicine specialist?

A sports medicine specialist is either a doctor trained in the prevention and non-operative management of injury, or an orthopedic surgeon with specialized sports medicine training. Non-orthopedic sports medicine specialists are usually board certified in family medicine, internal medicine, pediatrics or physical medicine, and have completed advanced training in sports medicine. Depending on your typical activity level (a daily walk or training for a marathon); the nature and severity of your

injury; and your treatment goals, your care team may include other specialty physicians and surgeons, athletic trainers and physical therapists.

A sports medicine doctor can offer a variety of non-surgical treatments, typically by partnering with physical and occupational therapists and other rehabilitation professionals. Your sports medicine specialist can recommend alternatives to surgery, involving less downtime, so you're able to resume your chosen activity more quickly — armed with new knowledge about how to prevent future injuries. Your doctor may also order X-rays and, occasionally, imaging tests such as a bone scan or MRI. Treatment depends on the nature and severity of the injury.

Conditions treated by a sports medicine specialist might include:

- Concussion and other head injuries
- Nutrition counseling
- Exercise regime for patients who want to increase their fitness
- Injury prevention
- · "Return-to-play" treatment of sick or injured athletes
- · Recommendations on safe strength training and conditioning exercises NOW

In The Kitchen With Dan and Patrick McLean

When this father/son team cooks, whether for a large gathering of family and friends or just for themselves, only the pepperoni becomes "frazzled." "I kind of learned how to cook on my own — a lot of trial and error," said Dan, a retired Army officer. Patrick (Paddy) has had the benefit of learning from his dad, as well as from other fantastic family cooks.

During the summer, this dynamic duo cooks over a grill several times a week. "We cook a lot of thin, red-hot rib eyes. It only takes a few minutes," Dan stated. "Another summer family favorite is spicy smoked sausage." Dan and Patrick agree that bacon cooking slowly is the best food they fix. "You have to pay attention," Dan advised. NOW

Dan's Poached Eggs

Salt, to taste

- I slice bread per person served
- I egg per person served
- I dollop butter or Country Crock spread per person served

Pepper, to taste

- **I.** Fill a medium saucepan with water; add a pinch of salt and bring to a boil.
- **2.** Toast bread in toaster; crack eggs separately into boiling water.
- **3.** With toaster set on 5, let each egg cook until toast pops up.
- **4.** Place toast on plate; add a dollop of butter in center of toast.

Shredded cheddar cheese, to taste
Salt, to taste

- **1.** In a frying pan, heat oil. Cook pepperoni over medium heat.
- **2.** Break eggs into bowl and mix well; heat butter in second frying pan.
- **3.** Pour egg mixture into pan; add cheese and salt; mix well.
- **4.** Check on pepperoni. It is "frazzled" when it is crispy but not burned.
- **5.** Drain pepperoni well. Serve with scrambled eggs as a side dish or mix pepperoni and eggs together.

Cheater Meatballs

- I large bag real meatballs, unbreaded2 10.75-oz. cans cream of mushroom soup OR 2 15-oz. cans spaghetti sauce
- **I.** Place meatballs and soup or spaghetti sauce in Crock-Pot.
- **2.** Cook on high until meatballs are thoroughly heated.
- 3. Turn to low heat.
- **4.** Meatballs can be served directly from Crock-Pot.

Turkey Spaghetti

- 1 lb. ground turkey
- 2 Tbsp. garlic powder
- 2 Tbsp. Italian salad dressing
- I Tbsp. red pepper flakes Black pepper, to taste

Salt, to taste

- 1 15-oz. can spaghetti sauce
- 1 lb. spaghetti

Garlic bread

Parmesan cheese

- **1.** In a skillet, brown ground turkey; drain.
- **2.** Add garlic powder, Italian salad dressing, red pepper flakes, black pepper, salt and spaghetti sauce.
- **3.** Cover; let turkey mixture simmer while pasta cooks according to package instructions; drain pasta.
- **4.** Place pasta in large bowl; pour turkey mixture over pasta.
- **5.** Serve with garlic bread and Parmesan cheese.
