
As I close my eyes, I can almost see him from his place in heaven. Along with so many other beloved fathers who were



One event is all it takes to change someone's path in life. Tochi Nlemchi never dreamed she would discover a hidden athletic talent that would land her a full-ride scholarship to Southern Methodist University's track team. It all began during a physical education lesson in junior high where Tochi was encouraged to give throwing a shot put and discus a try. What happened next surprised Tochi and set her on an exciting path. 'I didn't consider myself to be an athletic star," Tochi said. 'When I threw, it was like nothing else I had ever done. The feeling of throwing farther and farther was incredible. This was a blessing from God I didn't know I had."

Tochi grew up in Katy, Texas, and competed at Cinco Ranch High School her freshman and sophomore years. After the sudden passing of her mom, Henrietta Nlemchi, Tochi transferred to Waxahachie High School (WHS) to live with her dad, Kevin Nlemchi. Before long, Tochi found her place on the WHS track team in shot put and discus. During the 2012 season, she brought home first place in shot put at district, a third place in discus and second place in shot put at regionals and a sixth place in shot put at state.

"Going to state was a dream come true," Tochi admitted. "Even though I didn't come home with a first place win, it was an eye-opening event. I learned I would have to work a lot harder if I am going to win state this year. It has inspired me to push — By Sydni Thomas

myself further and further each practice and competition."

Shot put and discus training begins in the spring semester. During that time, Tochi focuses on weight lifting, stretching and a little bit of running. The coaches keep it fun, but also expect a lot from her. She throws both shot put and discus every day in a field. Before each competition, Tochi focuses on what she is about to do and prays for safety and strength. To date, her longest shot put throw has been 43 feet 5 inches and her longest discus throw has been 132 feet. Her goal is always to break her previous records, so that is something she has worked on throughout her senior year.

"Tochi is a very hard worker," said WHS track coach, Dana Scott. "Transferring to a new school in the middle of high school is not easy for anyone, but Tochi has done it all while excelling in track. She has been fun to watch and coach. I can't wait to see what she does next."

Shot put and discus competitions have been a part of the summer Olympic Games since the first one in 1896. Like many athletes, Tochi dreams of making it to the Olympics to compete in these classic games. The idea of going to the Olympics is a small seed of a thought in her mind that is with her at each competition. She competes as if each contest will take her there. Having an Olympian down the road in Red Oak has been

Wollman, to the Olympics. "Making it to the Olympics is one of my biggest dreams," Tochi said. "It is all in God's hands whether I get there or not. He is the one who has given me this ability, and I will keep working very hard to get there."

Before the Olympics take place, Tochi will have the opportunity to compete at the collegiate level. In December of 2012, Tochi visited SMU's campus and athletic facilities. She had the opportunity to meet with Coach Wollman. One morning during her visit, Coach Wollman broke the news to Tochi that SMU wanted her to join their track team and would be giving her a full-ride scholarship. Tochi remained calm regarding the news and said she needed time to talk to her family about it and pray. "By going to SMU I knew that I would work with one of the greatest throwing coaches in the nation," Tochi said. "I would

also receive a great education, which is really important to me. With both of those opportunities I knew that SMU was where I needed to go."





Music has always been Corey Thedford's passion. He grew up in a musical family, and no one was surprised when he picked up a guitar and started plucking at the strings — eventually teaching himself to play. "Our main goal is to spread the Gospel, to spread God's Word, and whatever happens next, happens."

"Not only did my father play the guitar, but my grandparents played," he explained, regarding the foundation of his passion. "My grandfather played the guitar, and my grandmother played the piano." It would be fair to say this is where his musical influence originated. There just happened to be a piano in the home where he grew up. With a sharp ear and a lot of determination, Corey also taught himself to play the piano.

As Corey got older, music remained his passion. In high school, he enjoyed playing sports, but he didn't allow it to compromise his dedication to his first love. He laughed as he said, "I grew up in Maypearl and played high school basketball and football. During halftime, I would rip off my shoulder pads and run back onto the field to play with the band. saxophone, and I also picked up the trumpet." As Corey continued learning to play instruments, he also started writing music.

Like music, Corey's faith had also been an important part of his young life. "When I was around 15 or 16, a friend and I would get together and go to local churches to play original songs we'd written, as well as singing hymns that were familiar to members of the congregation."

After graduating from high school, Corey joined the military, and this is where his journey began its unique evolution. "I joined the Air Force and started off building jet engines, then I cross-trained and went into computer security. I received top secret security clearance and worked in the intelligence field," Corey related. "I've traveled all over the world to places like Hawaii, Germany, Guam, England and Alaska. I met my future wife, Heidi in Maypearl, and we were married in 1997. Then we had our first child, Ty." At this point, life became really busy for Corey, and music slowly started to take a back seat. While he and his family were stationed in California, he would only strum his guitar occasionally. His family and career didn't leave much time for music, but that was going to change.

"When we left Travis Air Force Base, we were stationed at Barksdale AFB in Louisiana. While there, I ran into the same childhood friend that I had gone from church to church with playing music and singing songs," he explained. "We hadn't seen each other in years. We reunited and formed a band called Release." The pair sang all original songs, but there was one major difference, the music they sang wasn't Christian music — it was a rock band, and the trappings of the secular music scene grew proportionally with the success of the band. "We were so successful that we ended up being sponsored by Budweiser," Corey admitted. "I was still a Christian, but I wasn't living my faith, and I got sucked into that secular lifestyle.



The band was on the cusp of becoming successful when we all received orders to leave Barksdale."

In retrospect, this is where Corey first saw what he called "the hand of God," move in his life. "All of us received military orders, and we were scattered to different bases all over the world. It should have been a wake-up call for me," Corey stated, "but I wasn't listening."

Corey formed another successful secular band called Nebulous while stationed at Royal Air Force in Alconbury, England. After hearing their music, a local label put them in touch with a producer in London. And that's when Corey said God stepped into his plans again because,

as he stated, "I still wasn't listening." Both of his knees began to fail, and his military career ended, as did his relationship with the London producer.

The Thedford family retired from military life and relocated to Waxahachie. Corey's military intelligence career transferred easily into the civilian sector, where he now works in the information technology industry. "When we moved to Waxahachie, we found a church home



at Waxahachie Bible Church," he said. "I started assisting in leading the music worship portion of our services."

In 2010, Corey, along with Rick Whitley, Trigg Even, Conni Cossette and Amy Beth Prescott formed the band called Corey Thedford and Broken Souls. He credits their name to the fact that "God usually gets our attention, when souls are broken and lost." Although Corey and the other members of Broken Souls were not seeking success, it found them when their music caught the







## At Home With Bob MD Kristy Pennock

Three generations of children were reared in the small Craftsman home that the late Paul and Hattie Maxwell purchased in 1962. In 2011, after Hattie passed away, the home was transferred for safekeeping to its new caretakers, Bob and Kristy Pennock. As a tribute to the lives of her grandparents, Kristy and Bob began renovating the home with the intention of preserving their family story. "The one thing my grandmother worried about most was this house being sold," Kristy said. "People told me living here would be too difficult, and that I should sell it. This house is more than a house. Three generations of us were raised in it, and now it is our responsibility to care for it."







The Maxwells were not the first owners of the house, and Kristy decided to discover its beginnings as a side project. The house was moved to its current location from Monroe Street in the 1950s. A couple had paid to have it moved, and they lived there for a decade before selling it to the Maxwells. The structure of the house led Kristy to believe the front two rooms made up the original house and other rooms were added over the years. "From what I have found, it looks like the first part of the home was built in 1910," Kristy said. "I have gone through records, but since they are all handwritten and not on the computer it is hard to chase some of them down. It will take a lot more digging, but one day, we will know the home's story."

In 1962, the \$10,500 mortgage seemed so steep to Paul that he feared they would never be able to pay it off. He never imagined the house would one day provide a mortgage-free living for his granddaughter's family. As soon as Bob and Kristy moved into the home, renovations began. Kristy served as the general contractor, while Bob was in charge of the budget.



From start to finish the renovations took 13 months, and not a single room was left untouched. The couple felt it was important to keep the structure and character of the house as original as possible.

"The house was still in great shape when we got it," Bob said. "Luckily there weren't any major problems. We rewired everything and redid all of the plumbing. Kristy did a great job as general contractor and did not let anyone convince her to change what she didn't want changed."

"We lived here throughout the entire renovation process," Kristy said. "At times, we had no heat, running water or electricity. In the beginning we tried to stay with gracious friends and family, but this is our home, so we roughed it out. We both tried to stay at work as late as we could each night so we could be warm." From the single-paned windows to the solid oak floors hidden underneath a layer of vintage green carpet, a lot of the original features stayed intact. The kitchen cabinets were updated with a fresh coat of paint, and a new backsplash was installed to modernize the room. One of Kristy's favorite features of the house is the 1930s built-in china cabinet in the dining room. When planning the renovations, removing the china cabinet to create an open floor plan was



discussed, but Kristy did not want to lose the charm it added to the dining room. The cabinet contains pieces of family history, from Hattie's journal, written



during her teens, to photographs of Kristy's daughter's wedding. "I treasure the items that were left behind and what they mean," Kristy said. "Mamaw's diary from 1938 is my favorite possession of hers. I love reading it and seeing what she was going through at that time in her life."

The dining room is a symbol of family for Kristy. When the rest of the family gathered, it would be in the dining room around the table. When Kristy and her brother, John Rodgers, began having children, Hattie would care for them at the house while the parents worked.

"Mamaw raised my mom, Paula Justice, here, then me and my brother and then her great-grandchildren," Kristy said. "When we all get together, we start out in the dining room, but there are so many of us that we spill into the living room. The renovations were our way of preparing for the raising of generations to come in this house. I'm ready for the fourth generation to get here."

The biggest renovations took place in the bathrooms. New plumbing was installed throughout the house, a shower was installed in the back of the house to serve as a future pool room, and the master bathroom was completely remodeled. A new, grey claw-foot tub was installed to complete the makeover.

With the renovations recently completed, Bob and Kristy are still discovering the parts they enjoy the most. The outdoor sitting area is a big contender due to its large outdoor kitchen and grill, installed in the 1950s, which only took a good cleaning and coat of paint to freshen it up. They enjoy spending time outside and have future





plans to do more work there. "We still want to add a paved driveway," Kristy admitted. "And one day, we will add a large deck in the courtyard with a hot tub for the grandchildren."

Selling the home was never an option for Bob and Kristy. While family members and friends told them it would be the best thing for them to do, neither could let a big part of the family story go that easily. The long, rough 13 months spent on renovating their piece of family history won't be forgotten anytime soon and will be added to the story of the house. Surrounded by memories and ready to create new ones, Bob and Kristy finally feel at home.

"I am thankful that Papaw and Mamaw paved the way for this family," Bob said. "Kristy and I lived the big house life, but those days are over. She told me this is where I am going to live until I die, and I am happy with that."

"It's important to know where you came from," Kristy said. "Papaw and Mamaw would be surprised at how it has turned out and wouldn't believe me if I told them there is a sprinkler system now. Jeanee Smiles may have come to the Waxahachie Senior Activity Center because of an immediate need, but she stayed out of a strong desire to make a difference. "I came on as the interim administrator in 2010," she admitted, "and was in love after just two weeks." Her passion for the facility and its members prompted her to apply for the job, and she feels quite blessed to have landed it. 




mosaics and woodworking projects.

MAYPEARL

Maypearl owes its existence to the railroad whose tracks once laced through the small town. Trains don't stop there anymore, but locals of the older generation still remember Maypearl as a bustling center of commerce at a time when railroads were a daily lifeline connecting people from all over the country. Younger residents have heard their stories, but have been left to wonder what life was like a half century or more ago. That is, until last year when Heritage Hall was opened in the city's former depot, completely restored through the efforts of volunteers and fundraisers. Now, young and old can gather on the historic site to reminisce and learn about Maypearl's past.



"What we have is a hall of photographic history," explained Larry Burns, president of the Cowboy Bank of Texas, on the grounds where the resurrected depot now stands. "We have photos of the town on display dating from the early 1900s to the '50s. It's not a museum, but it is a place where our history lives, and we are very proud of it." In 2006, Larry initiated the project to move and restore the 110-year-old depot, originally situated a block away where it had fallen into disrepair. "It's been great to see all the work over these six years that's made Heritage Hall something we can all enjoy."

But Larry takes no credit for the extensive labor and organizational skills that have gone into the effort. He insists it's the volunteers who deserve praise for making Heritage Hall what it is today a center of civic culture.

Foremost among those who contributed to the rebirth of the depot is Eldredge Eubank of Eubank Construction who supervised its virtual rebuilding. "Eldredge took a tremendous interest in the project from the start," Larry said. "He gave all his time, and it shows. He is the man most responsible for Heritage Hall." Eldredge scoured mills for products that would match surviving period materials and mined information from other historic depots to ensure authenticity. The master builder also used bricks from structures in town to layout the walkway and entrance steps to the depot.

Another important player in the formation of Heritage Hall is JoAnn Mathers who orchestrated the work of










collecting the rare photos and documents lining the beautiful interior walls. "She did an excellent job correlating all that you see when you visit the depot," Larry pointed out, "and Maypearl is indebted to her for it." Others who were essential to the project are Tiffany Provins and Jane Wilemon who combined their artistic talents to assemble the photos and mementos on view at the depot.



Although Larry is too modest to accept recognition, the fundraising arm of the organization he founded in 2000, the Texas Roundup, enabled much of the restoration work on the depot to be completed. Through the Texas Roundup, high school basketball players from small communities are able to meet with college coaches, an opportunity generally reserved for players in large cities.

Donated by the family of Peary



Wilemon, a longtime local resident who became a leader in the cotton industry, the revitalized depot is now owned by the city of Maypearl. During the Wilemon family's ownership, the depot was a scale house for one of their gins. Operated by the Chamber of Commerce in conjunction with the Maypearl Heritage Association, the latter body oversees the current exhibition of photographs



and will be responsible for future displays of historical memorabilia.

Larry sees Heritage Hall's process from dream to reality as an example of a unified community. By coming together to save and preserve an important part of local culture, neighbors have formed bonds of friendship, and the generations have melded in a common goal to ensure their city's history is not forgotten. That history is a fascinating one. In fact,

it all started with the depot, built in 1903, before Maypearl was even incorporated as a town. At that time there were only 19 residents in the area. But the International and Great Northern (IGN) Railroad had plans to extend its line and bought 57 acres from landowners. "In those days, railroads would come in and

bought 57 acres from landowners. "In those days, railroads would come in and help build up a town along their route," Larry said. "And that's how this city came to be." The first plat for what would

become Maypearl was filed that April, the first residential lots were sold at auction the following month and in December the depot's construction was completed.

It wasn't until 1914 that Maypearl became a town, possibly named after May Pearl Trammel, wife of the IGN's chief engineer, J. H. Trammel. A competing account claims the town was named in honor of another engineer's two daughters, May and Pearl. Whatever the origins of the town's name, Maypearl prospered over the next 30 years. In the 1920s, at the height of Ellis County's reign as the top cotton producer in the nation, Maypearl thrived. In addition to several grocery stores, there were four dry goods stores operating downtown, five gas stations, three gins, two banks, a school, a newspaper, five barbers and three doctors. There was also a movie theatre, a café, a hotel, and as Larry said when he unveiled Heritage Hall last October, "at least one bootlegger."

The old building witnessed affecting scenes over the years: residents greeted friends and family arriving for visits or bid tearful farewells to other loved ones leaving on long trips. Perhaps the most romantic story connected to the old depot took place during World

War II. A train carrying troops to Kelly Air Force Base in San Antonio passed through the station one day, and crowds gathered to wave and cheer the men on. As the train lumbered past the depot, a soldier tossed an apple from his window. "On the apple," Larry smiled, "the soldier had attached a note with his name and address." A teenager, Iva Barlow, a student at Maypearl High, caught the apple and wrote to the mysterious hero. His name, she discovered, was George Dennis Richards. The pair corresponded, fell in love and married the following year. The couple remained married for 63 years until Iva's death in 2009. Their descendants attended last year's dedication of Heritage Hall.

There are likely many more stories of love, heartbreak, fun and adventure that remain to be told about the old depot now serving as a tribute to Maypearl's past. The last train passed through the city in 1968, but the lore of the golden period of rail travel can still be glimpsed at Heritage Hall. **NOW**

### Keeping an Adult Child on Your Health Insurance



Your days of soothing a child's cold with chicken soup may be over, but a provision under the Affordable Care Act could help you to continue caring for your adult child's health. Under the Affordable Care Act, children up to age 26 may be able to stay on, or join, a parent's health plan that offers dependent coverage. This coverage is available even if the child is:

- Married
- · Living away from your home
- Not a student
- · Financially independent
- Eligible for insurance through an employer\*

#### **Ensuring Coverage**

If you want to keep your adult child on your health plan or add them to it, start with these steps:

• Wait for open enrollment. Your insurance provider should notify you of a 30-day enrollment period that begins on or before the first day of your plan or policy year. During this time, your child will have an opportunity to enroll for coverage under your plan.

• Sign up and pay for continued enrollment. This allows your adult child to remain on your plan until they no longer qualify.

#### Extra Incentives

Besides providing access to health insurance, there are benefits to keeping an adult child on your health plan. Come tax time, you might be able to deduct the value of employer-provided health coverage from your income. You're also eligible for the same tax benefit when you purchase health coverage through a "cafeteria plan," a benefit plan that lets you choose the benefits that best suit your needs. Find more information about young adult coverage at the Affordable Care Act Web site. **NOW** 

\*Exceptions: "Grandfathered" plans — those in place before March 23, 2010 — are not required to offer coverage to adult children who have access to group coverage outside of their parents' plans until 2014. Talk with your health insurance carrier to make sure.





### Wisteria — Friend or Foe?

Did you notice the glorious purple hanging flowers this spring? I have one huge one and love it. It is one of the first blooms in our yard, and it is growing by leaps and bounds. Therein is the problem. Wisteria is very vigorous and will twine around almost anything. I've seen it grow up trees, porches, houses, etc. It makes a very heavy vine and has been known to topple fences, porch posts and small sheds. A clear space in a large yard is a great place to take advantage of this vigorous growth, and trimming it into an upright tree-like plant works well and is very attractive. I am training mine around a metal bridge railing anchored in concrete. I worry about the tree next to the bridge, but that's another story.

Honeysuckle is another invasive vine, which presents a glamorous face but can take over the world if given a chance. The few sprigs I had 10 years ago have grown into a forest! It's not that I haven't trimmed and pulled. It just got ahead of me. Since I've been down for a couple of years (no bending or twisting), it has really gotten ahead of all of us. To get honeysuckle out of areas where it is not wanted means

a lot of pulling and twisting, since it throws off runners in every direction.

It is important to carefully consider where these vines are planted. They are perennials that vine, and they seem unfazed by weather or water conditions. I learned a long time ago to put mint into pots rather than in the ground. I should have taken that lesson to heart with honeysuckle. That may be a way you can still enjoy these vigorous plants while controlling their growth. They are lovely and harbingers of spring, but a mess if running wild!

### How to Recover From a Back Injury

Back pain is something you don't want to repeat. Recovering properly from a back injury and taking preventive measures can help you reduce your risk of going through it again.

#### Note your symptoms

Minor back pain often resolves itself within a day or two. If your pain persists, however, talk to an orthopedic surgeon or your family doctor. He or she will examine you, note how your body moves, determine whether you have any pain down your legs and take a medical history.

Make sure you mention all your symptoms to your doctor, such as whether a fever or nausea accompanied your back pain. The pain may be secondary to another condition. Many back problems are caused by a muscle pull or strain. The usual treatment includes taking pain relievers and/or muscle relaxants and, perhaps, limiting certain activities until the muscle heals.

#### Consider your options

"For more serious back injuries, such as a herniated or ruptured disk or a pinched nerve, surgery may be necessary. But, surprisingly, most disk injuries heal themselves without surgery. The only reason to have emergency back surgery is when the pain is accompanied by severe or progressive motor weakness or involves bowel or bladder problems. In these cases, it's crucial to relieve pressure from the nerves in order to retain their function. If your pain is severe and persistent, your doctor may suggest diagnostic tests, such as an MRI or CT scan.

#### Recover carefully

If you have surgery, your recovery regimen begins with wound healing, which takes about two weeks. During that time, you need to be careful. After that, ask your doctor about beginning a progressive walking program to promote muscle strength.

Walk short distances initially and make sure you don't walk so far you can't get home safely if you get tired. As your strength increases, your physician or physical therapist will suggest you supplement your walks with gentle back exercises.

Talk to your doctor if intense pain recurs. When a disk is removed, pieces of it may remain in the back and cause problems. For the first couple of months after surgery, it's important not to lift, twist or bend, all of which could re-injure your back. **Back to exercise** 

### The best predictor for future back pain is

previous back pain, so once you're on the road to recovery, the best way to ensure a healthy back is to approach activity sensibly.

#### Gazpacho

- 6 ripe tomatoes
- I purple onion
- I cucumber
- 1 bell pepper, seeded
- 2 stalks celery
- I bunch fresh parsley
- 2 handfuls fresh chives
- 1 clove garlic
- 1/4 cup Bragg's apple cider vinegar
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- I whole organic lemon
- 2 tsp. raw honey
- Salt and fresh ground pepper, to taste 6 or more drops of Tabasco sauce,
- to taste
- I tsp. Bragg's amino acids
- 4 cups tomato juice
- 4 cups tomato juice

I. Chop first 8 ingredients just enough to
