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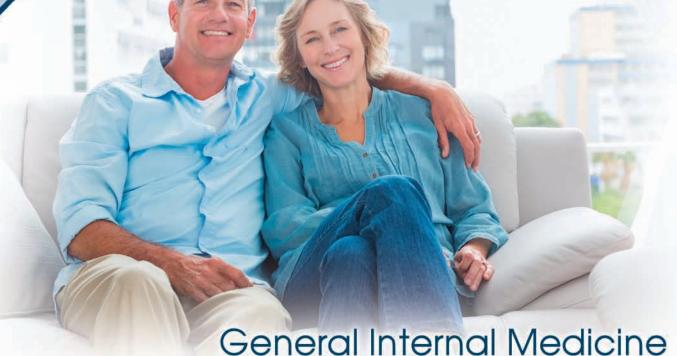


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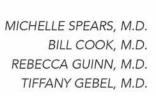

The scene is a daily event moms and dads dropping off children at the Corsicana YMCA Child Watch room, a convenience for parents while they are working out at the Y. Increasingly, it's dads who are very capably balancing a child, backpack and diaper bag, while opening doors and holding an older child's hand. Many of these fathers are full-time dads or share parenting duties with moms. Eric Singleton and Travis Updegraff are two such dads. They enjoy working out together at the Y, while using the Child Watch service and bonding together in an informal dads' network. Eric co-parents 3-year-old, Paislee, with his wife, Kasey. 'It's fun spending time with Paislee. I don't miss seeing her grow up. Every week there are changes," Eric remarked.

As a firefighter/paramedic with Grand Prairie Fire Department, Eric is on the job for days at a time, but is also off for days in a row. Kasey is a dental hygienist with Restore Dental in Corsicana. Raising their child without daily child care presents challenges, but this couple's

work schedules allow them to coordinate Paislee's care. "Communication is the biggest factor in making this arrangement successful. We failed at that a couple of times, and it didn't work out well," Kasey said. "It's hard being a working mom, so having Eric taking care of Paislee makes me feel better."

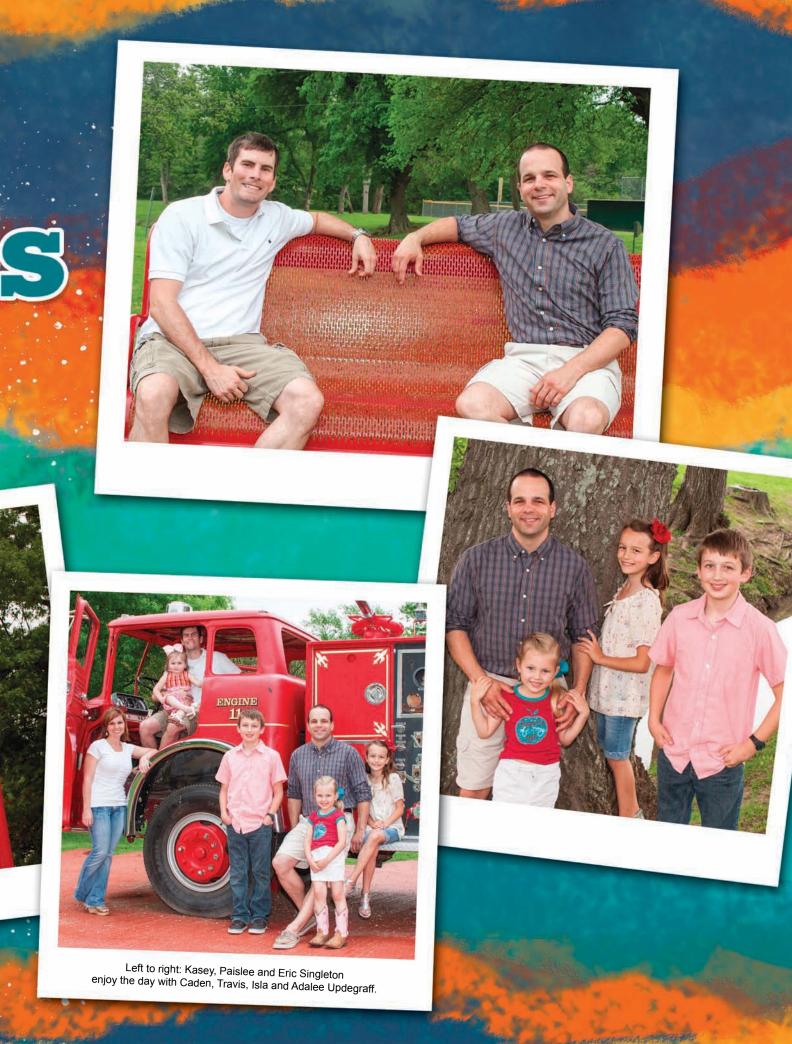
Communication is essential for delivering doses of medicine and scheduling naptimes.

"Naptimes and bedtimes are the hardest to keep on schedule," Kasey admitted. Weather and traffic conditions can delay Eric's arrival to take over his dad duties. "Occasionally, Paislee has had to go to work with me, and she just sits there quietly," Kasey said proudly.

Travis is a full-time dad and co-parent of Caden, age 11; Adalee, age 8; and Isla, age 4. On the days he spends working as a fireman with Corsicana Fire Department, the kids are supervised at home by Travis' mom who lives in Rice or by their mother, Amber, who is taking classes at Texas A&M University in College Station or Amber's parents who live in Corsicana. "I don't have a lot of personal time, since I put the kids first. I coach their sports teams and like to fish and hunt with the kids. This year, Caden got his first deer," Travis remembered proudly.

Both Eric and Travis admit their professional training helps in perfecting









their full-time dad duties. They are in their element when changing diapers, providing day-to-day care and handling first-aid issues. "What I do on the job does away with empathy. Everything is a Band-Aid," Travis said laughingly.

Eric admitted, "I am able to handle stress better because of my training."

Paislee gave her dad an opportunity to prove his statement one night when she was sick and her fever spiked, causing a seizure. "Eric knew we needed to call an ambulance and knew everything that the paramedics needed to know when they arrived," Kasey remembered. "It's difficult when Paislee is sick and wants daddy instead of me, but I know I can trust Eric and focus on work. I know she is in good hands, and it's great to see their father-daughter bond growing."

The couple cherishes learning her the ABCs and numbers, how to ride values. Eric and Kasey spend time in Paislee's pastel, dollhouse-themed room playing and tucking her in for naps and at bedtime. "This is the best of all worlds!" Kasey exclaimed.

Some chores are done individually, however. Kasey packs Paislee's bag and picks out her outfits for the day "so cleaning, and the couple shares laundry duties. "I love that Eric does the cooking, all the outside stuff and picks up the





One day, she came home and found Eric painting Paislee's toenails. "You have to lower your macho standing, but I haven't let her paint *my* nails," Eric explained. "I've also had to learn to say, 'No." Kasey admits Eric is now the firmer disciplinarian.

Often it's "the look" that works best when Eric tells Paislee, "No." "It works for a while, and then it doesn't. But its effectiveness returns," Eric said. "Paislee will even put herself into time-out." As most parents find out, keeping a child busy solves discipline problems. "We go out to I.O.O.F. 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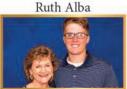
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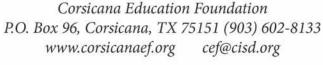


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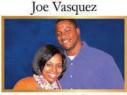


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Welcoming Loft -By Callie Revell

Even though Angel Schiffer moved to Corsicana only two years ago, she already feels right at home. Originally from a small town in Texas, she appreciates the closeness and community Corsicana provides combined with the promising economic opportunities. Angel owns Bittersweet Boutique, a cupcake shop downtown, and her business is what brought her to Corsicana in the first place. "Corsicana is growing," Angel said. "There's a lot of potential in Corsicana. That's really why I chose to come here." Angel chose an apartment downtown and lives there with her two Chihuahuas, Wynter and Rooby.





Her building, owned by Rick Guest, was built in the late 1800s and has had many functions over the years. It was previously a barber shop and men's clothing store. One clue remains by the stairs showing another previous purpose: an old sign painted on the wall that says, Corsicana Recreation Club — Air Conditioned. There are two apartments upstairs and one downstairs with a retail space on the street. "Rick bought the building, and he redid everything in it," Angel said. "Everything is brand new, and everything is his design. It's very modern and unique to Corsicana." The lofts feature high ceilings, customdesigned kitchens and hardwood floors.

Angel had her apartment picked out long before she actually moved in. "I







could see a lot of construction going on, so I got to watch the entire process as they were being built," Angel remembered. "I signed the papers before they even had walls up. I said, 'It's mine!' I knew it was going to be great." Angel checked in on the apartment periodically and enjoyed watching everything come together, from the floors to the paint on the walls. "I got to see every detail as it happened," she said.

When Angel moved into her apartment in February 2014, it still wasn't quite done. "The floors weren't finished yet," she said. "They

didn't have any stain on them. There was no trim. Everything was covered in plastic. Everything else was still under construction. I was the only one in the building. It was kind of creepy at first, but it was a cool experience." A couple of months later, Angel got neighbors, and everyone in the building gets along well. "I love my next door neighbors, and my landlord is so great," Angel shared.

Angel had to take a leap of faith when she signed her lease. "When I found out this was being built, there was nothing in here," she said. "I had

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no idea what it was going to look like." Although she had a few other options, nothing compared to this loft. "For me, it was exactly what I wanted," Angel said. "Being single, it's hard to find a onebedroom loft downtown. I have one of the only ones. The design also swayed my decision quite a bit. I'd previously lived in a little house in town, but you can't really beat this location. I don't think I can move after living here!"

Her favorite time of year to be downtown is Christmastime. "During the holidays, it's so fun to look out my window and see fireworks and the Christmas tree. It's really cool to be in the center of it." In fact, the Christmas festivities downtown helped her make the decision to move to Corsicana back in 2013. "When I first drove into Corsicana, the first thing I saw were all the Christmas decorations lighting up downtown," Angel remembered. "It was so beautiful, and that's what made me fall in love with Corsicana."

After living on her own for a while, Angel was ready for a fresh start. "When I moved in here, I pretty much got rid of everything I owned, and I started new," Angel said. "That's why I love this place. You can walk in, and it's done. I liked that I didn't have to do anything to it. It was ready to go. It's nice to have something that requires no work or maintenance." Angel describes her decorating style as "minimalist." "One of my goals was to keep the place very clean, but warm," she said. "A lot of people feel very comfortable here. I've created it so anyone can walk in and feel welcome." Besides her 100-year-old hope chest, Angel doesn't have very many

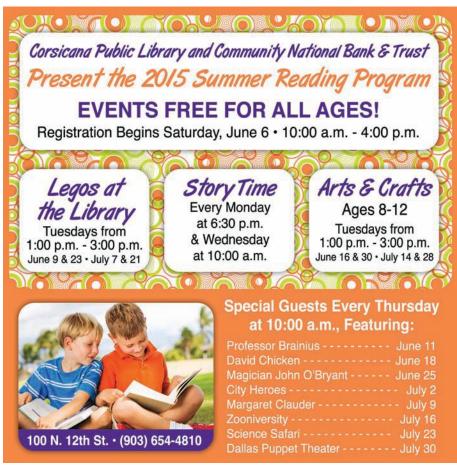
sentimental pieces in her apartment. She surrounds herself with motivational quotes and enjoys decorating with pieces from her travels. "I like items with a story," she said.

The walls are painted in soothing gray tones with white trim. There are three rooms: a bedroom, a bathroom and a great room that includes the living room and kitchen. Huge floor-to-ceiling windows offer a rooftop view outside and bathe the entire apartment in natural light. Transoms on the bedroom and bathroom walls make sure even interior rooms are well-lit. "I hardly ever have to turn the lights on during the day, because there's so much natural light," Angel said. Another bonus is an abundance of storage in what would otherwise be wasted space near the ceiling. "I can't reach it, but it's there!" Angel laughed. "I'm 5 feet 2 inches tall, and I have 12foot ceilings." The high ceilings make the small space seem much bigger than it really is. "The way they designed it with the storage and the height of the ceilings makes it feel very open," Angel said.

As a baker, Angel's favorite room is naturally her kitchen. "Whenever Rick designed the place, one of the big points for me was having my amazing kitchen," she said. The stainless steel appliances complement the gray walls well, and everything looks clean and polished. Angel specifically wanted a gas oven and stove, and she got her wish. The granite countertops complete the high-end look. Angel uses her kitchen to experiment with new recipes. "Every Friday, I cook a gourmet meal," she said. "I'll recreate a dish from my travels. It's nice to have a great kitchen to be able to do that. It's fulfilling for me. I find it relaxing."

There is, however, one thing her apartment doesn't have. "I miss having a backyard area for my dogs," she said. "We do go on walks every day, and it's fun to walk around downtown and see all the business owners. It works for us." For Angel, the advantages outweigh the disadvantages. "I love the downtown area," she said. "I love being in the middle of everything." Angel feels like living downtown helps her stay involved in her community and helps her meet people. 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Texans love their trucks and cars, which are needed since most of the state is still rural, necessitating miles of travel between small towns, the farm or ranch and major shopping and medical centers. As they anticipate getting a driver's license, teenagers understand that a license and vehicle represent *freedom*. But what if that freedom is not available anymore? A call to Community Transit Services will be answered by Katie, operations manager, or Arelette, the office manager, and a ride can quickly be scheduled. "There is no income requirement. We serve the general public," Arelette revealed. Their nonprofit service is part of Community Services, Inc., which receives additional funding

at the state and federal levels and through organizations such as United Way.

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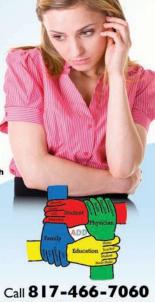
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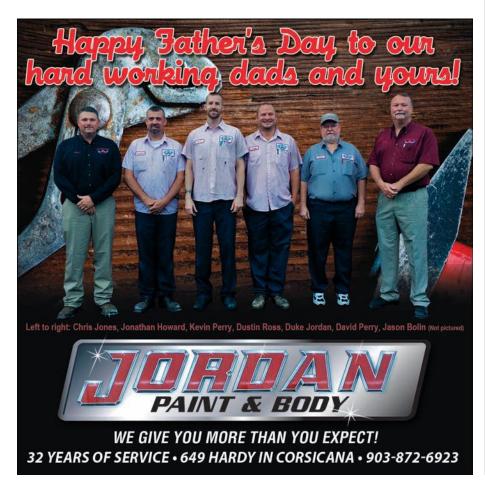


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passengers need further assistance, they must arrange for a personal care attendant (PCA) to ride with them, but there is no charge for the PCA.

Considering the miles traveled, the fares are made affordable to most customers. A \$10 bus pass allows the customer four stops within hub cities, but they can customize their options. The fare is \$4 without a pass per oneway stop within hub cities and \$5 per stop within a county. For customers wishing to travel between Navarro and Ellis counties, the charge is \$1 per mile. "The majority of our customers use the bus pass for our customized, concierge, curb-to-curb service when they need it," Arelette stated. When calling the service, customers must give accurate times of appointments, addresses and dates. All reservations are based on availability, so customers are encouraged to call a day in advance. Rides between counties must be reserved two weeks in advance. "We can handle some same-day calls, but it's all based on availability," Arelette said. Katie told of an instance where a mom got home and realized there was no food for the children that night. "That's when we will do whatever we can. We are a family here, and that includes our customers."

Katie has been an employee for 13 years, and Arelette has been with the service for seven years. Both ladies personally know the daily distances covered by the fleet of 2006-2016 Chevrolet and Ford cutaway models and their drivers. Since drivers start each day from the Corsicana location, Ellis County



routes average 300 miles per day, while Navarro County routes average about half that. Katie and Arelette arrange regular maintenance and repairs with different area vendors. "It's rough when a bus is out of commission. We do oil changes and rotate and align tires every 5,000 miles," Katie explained.

"We have to make sure the vehicles are safe," Arelette agreed. Drivers are responsible for taking care of cleaning bus interiors. "We provide masks, gloves, and Clorox, so they can keep it as germ-free as possible, since we transport people with compromised immune systems," Katie added.

Drivers must have a current Texas CDL license and the special temperament required of those who work with the public. "We have to be patient. We see people's good and bad days. Some of our customers are on dialysis. Others are cancer patients. Sometimes we don't know what that person is going through," Katie explained.

Customers are encouraged to be waiting at pick-up sites, since drivers do not wait more than five minutes. However, exceptions are made. "If a driver knows that person's routine, and they aren't answering their phone or door, we check on them or have an apartment manager or someone check. We know when something is happening that's out of character for that customer," Arelette said.

Likewise, regular customers get to know their drivers. "They have their favorites and may request a certain











driver," Katie remarked laughingly. Longtime customers who know Katie and Arelette call to check up on them. "One lady just calls to talk. She always tells us, 'I love ya'll," Katie said.

However, there are challenges. Time slots and routes are built daily, and having sick drivers or equipment failure can make the original schedule impossible to keep. Texas weather is especially challenging. "It's very hard to keep the buses clean when the weather is bad," Katie said. The drivers run the buses through car washes or outsource the job. If the roads get too bad, the service has to shut down. "That causes us double duty, since we have already scheduled everyone, and then have to call to cancel and reschedule," Katie explained.

Currently, the service runs
Monday-Friday from 5:00 a.m.-5:00
p.m., which requires drivers going to
Midlothian from Corsicana to leave as
early as 4:15 a.m., but Community Transit
Services is not daunted. Future possible
changes include expanding service to
Saturdays and transporting veterans to
and from the Dallas VA hospital.

Both Katie and Arelette enjoy their jobs so much, they find it hard to leave after clocking out some days. Both ladies are Corsicana natives and graduates of Corsicana High School. They can easily recall why they do this challenging job. "I have been able to meet so many new people," Katie said.

"It's the joy of seeing a 90-year-old lady who's tickled that she can get where she wants to go, and as a driver, I was able to see new places in neighborhoods and rural areas I had never gone to," Arelette revealed. "I can say I have been to Italy and Venus all in one day!" NOW

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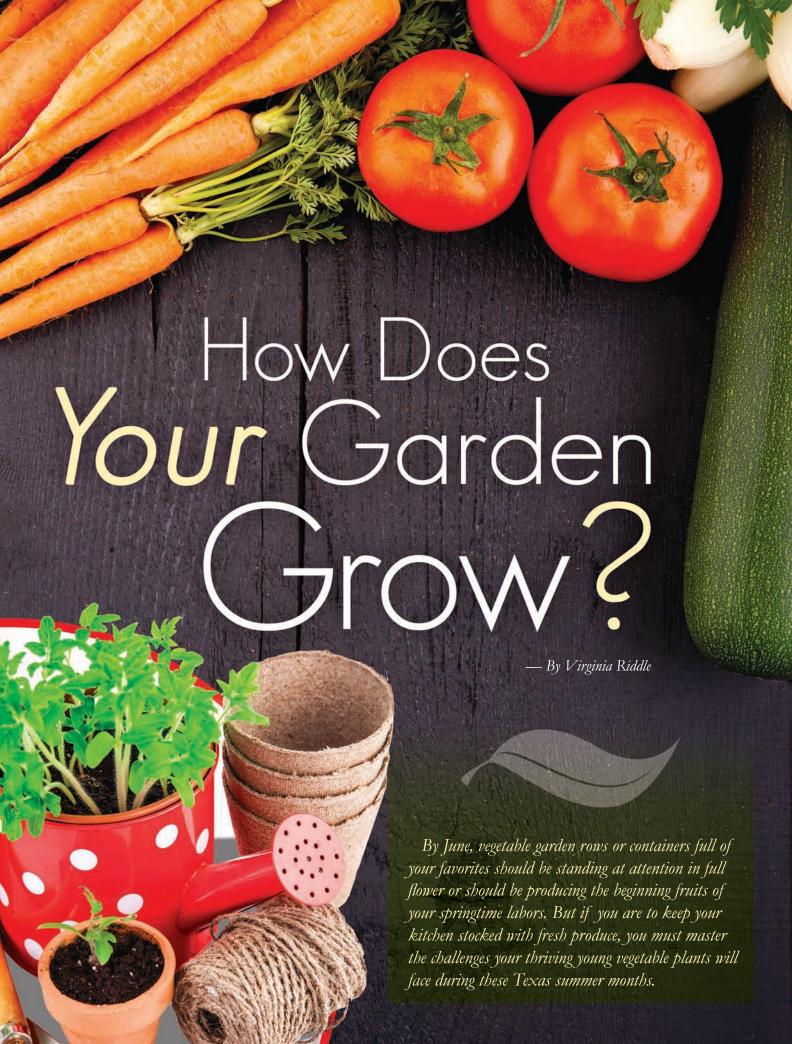


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Weather and Watering

Summer high temperatures for our Blackland Prairie Region average around 95 F, with the possibility of 100-plus F successive days. Nights rarely cool below 75 F, and typically, the prairie gets about 30-35 inches of moisture a year, mostly in the spring and fall seasons. Additionally, the soils are generally shallow. We love our cold drinks, and our plants need to drink also. Compare a tomato that is about 95-percent water to a human body that is about 75-percent water, and you will appreciate your plants' summer watering needs.



Some helpful watering hints include:

- 1. Watering too much or too little is a problem. When soil is dry to the touch, water to a depth of 1-2 inches at least once a week. Remember, leaves can wilt from being too wet or too dry.
- 2. Use drip or trickle irrigation to avoid waste. Run hoses slowly in furrows so every costly drop soaks in, and use overhead irrigation only as a last resort, since watering in this fashion allows water to evaporate rather than soak in and promotes disease on leaves and rot of fruit. Use wicking or refillable watering bottles available at your garden center for container plants.
- 3. Water early in the morning or early evening to avoid greater evaporation during the heat of the day.
- 4. Keep your garden weeded since weeds drink precious and expensive









water. Use a Cape Cod weeder, swan hoe and/or collinear hoe for weeding.

5. When plants are at least 4-6 inches tall, add more mulch around the stems. The best types of mulches are organic — bark, compost, pine needles or shredded leaves. However, if you use a black plastic liner, cover it with a thick layer of organic mulch, since it will soak up the summer sun's heat if left bare. Organic mulches lower or moderate soil temperatures.

6. Keep plastic buckets handy and use them to cover your smaller plants before occasional hailstorms occur.

Insects

By including cilantro and mint in your garden plantings, you will attract beneficial insects, which include: bees, lady bugs and green garden spiders. For grasshoppers, spider mites and other problem insects that eat what you love, purchase horticultural oils and soaps that are sold at garden centers and use them as directed. If you use heavily based chemical sprays, be sure to scrub your veggies well before eating them!



Animals

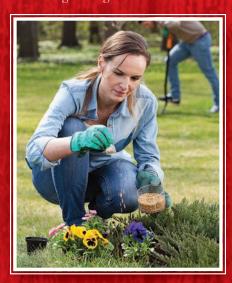
Bambi is cute until he consumes your nearly ready-to-eat corn. Deer, raccoons, skunks, wild hogs and/or rabbits can be discouraged by installing small-charge electric fencing that can be turned off and on. Additionally, a live animal trap can be used to capture, relocate and release small animal poachers into a more suitable habitat. Finally, mesh netting can be laid on the ground for about 10-15

feet surrounding the garden. Secure netting with ground staples. Deer and other four-footed hooved animals don't like poor footing. They are less likely to walk on something that might entangle them. Old CDs can be hung to scare away animals and birds.

Beneficial animals include: nonvenomous snakes, toads, frogs and earthworms. Be sure to know your snakes, and always stick your long-handled hoe under or into plants to check for their presence before you risk a snake or spider bite!

Fertilizing and Feeding

Feeding vegetables during this growth spurt season is important, especially if your plants are growing in containers. Choose an organic or nonorganic, soluble complete-and-balanced plant food or high nitrogen fertilizer that is



the right complement for your soil, based on its previous test. Your garden center expert or county extension agent can advise you. Follow the package directions for application and frequency. It's best to spray early in the morning, keeping the fertilizer off leaves, and water thoroughly right after feeding to avoid fertilizer burn from the hot sun. Organic compost tea or manure tea can be made by mixing a bushel of either with 20 gallons of water in a plastic garbage can. Let the tea brew for at least four days, agitating it once a day. Apply at plant roots with a spray bottle used only for this tea, then water thoroughly.









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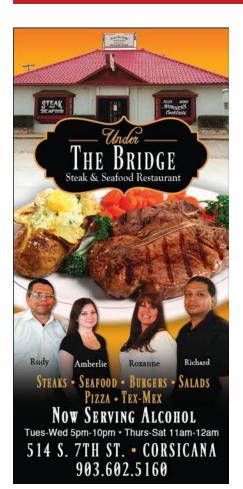
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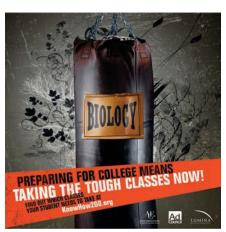
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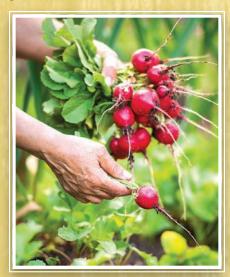


Pot-bound Container Grown Vegetables

If your tomato potted plants have branched out and are looking a little ragged, transplant them to larger pots, after trimming their roots slightly. If the pots have been used previously, be sure to clean them with a 10-percent solution of laundry bleach to kill any organisms or insect eggs before you refill the pot with new potting soil.

Harvesting

Pick your mature vegetables during mid-morning hours, just after dew has dried but before the sun causes the wilting of leaves or saps the flavors. Harvest herbs before the plants have gone to seed.



Plan Your Fall Garden

Our first freeze is normally about November 15. Count back the days from that date to establish a second summer planting early enough for the crops to mature before the first freeze. Favorite fall starters that go into the winter months include: lettuces, spinach, leeks, kale and collards. Start these from seeds and plant them in the garden or containers in October.

John and Susan relocated from Arizona where John was building boat

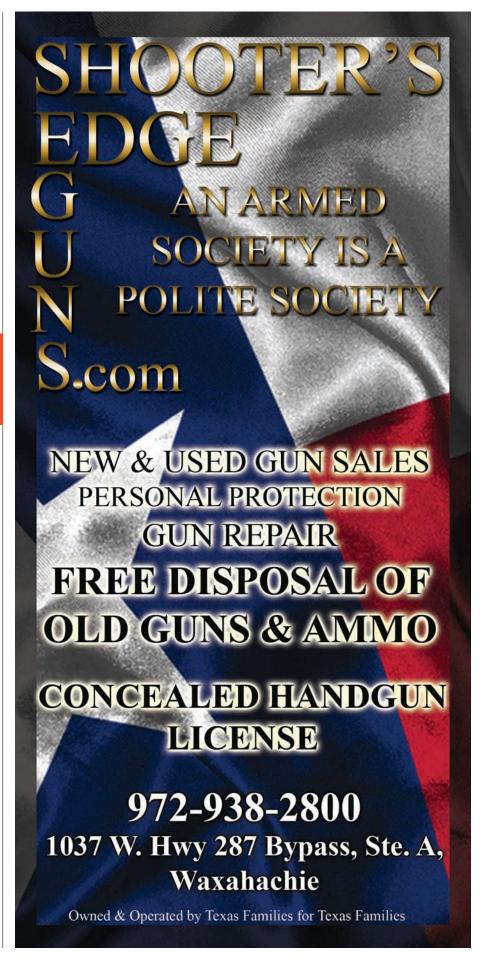

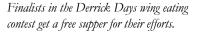

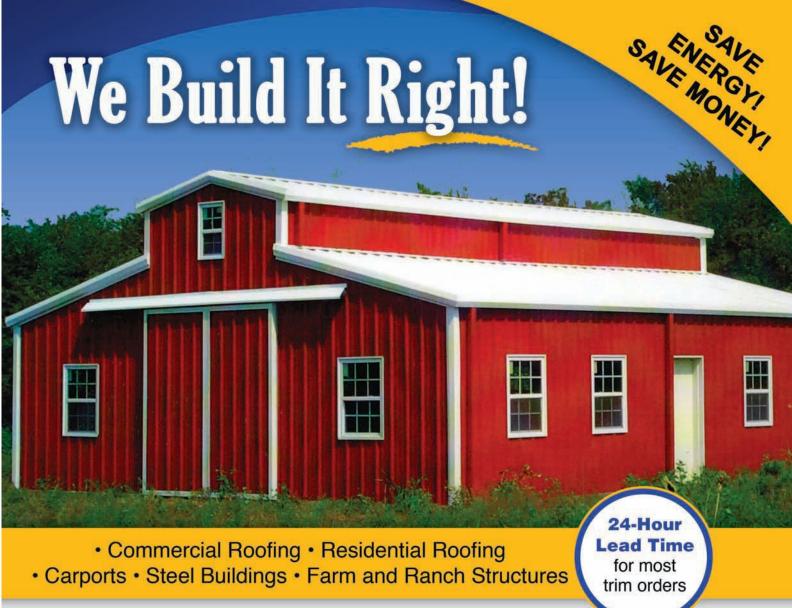

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Watch for These Credit Score Myths

Your credit score is complex, but your understanding doesn't have to be. Take note of these six common credit score myths, so you can work to improve your rating, not hurt it.

Myth #1: It's impossible to improve your credit score.

The truth: You can rebuild credit over time with patience and good debt management. As you consistently make prompt payments, lenders will notice the negative marks on your credit history less. Learn more from your financial advisor about improving your credit score.

Myth #2: Checking your credit can hurt your credit score.

The truth: Pulling your own credit report, also known as a "soft inquiry," doesn't affect your credit score. In fact, regularly checking your credit report is a responsible financial practice. You are entitled by law to one free report from each of the three reporting bureaus every 12 months. Keep in mind: If a lender pulls your score to approve a new line of credit, it is a "hard inquiry" and can lower your credit score. You typically have to authorize this process.

Myth #3: Closing old accounts can boost your credit score.

The truth: Closing an account lowers your available credit —

which can raise your debt-to-credit ratio and therefore lower your score, especially if you carry balances on other cards.

Myth #4: Closing old accounts can shorten your credit history. The truth: Accounts with no negative marks that are paid in full will remain on your report for 10 years after being closed.

Myth #5: Cosigning for a loan or credit card won't affect your credit score.

The truth: You are just as responsible if the borrower misses a payment or exceeds his or her limit — and your credit score will be penalized.

Myth #6: Paying cash is the best thing you can do for your credit score.

The truth: A good credit score means a solid credit history — which can't be built or maintained by paying for everything with cash.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration's center for human spaceflight activities has a big name to encompass a big mission — the study of space research and travel. Better known as NASA Space Center, the facility is located in Houston and is the official visitor center of the Lyndon B. Johnson Space Center.

For children who love all things outer space and adults interested in spaceflight, the Space Center Houston is a day of educational fun. Encompassing 1,620 acres of NASA efforts, the center includes exhibits and activities simulating astronauts' out-of-this-world experiences. Besides navigating miniature remote-controlled space equipment, patrons can land a shuttle and experience first-hand, anti-gravitational moon walking. In the Space Center Theater — the largest screen in Texas — viewers can watch the evolution of astronaut training and equipment, while a second theater simulates the sensation of a blast-off.

Among other presentations are the Stellar Science Show, Living in Space, the Gallery Wall (crew photos of every astronaut to have flown in space), as well as actual space suits and equipment exhibits. A popular attraction is the NASA Tram Tour, a guided ride around the center featuring recorded voices of astronauts telling their own stories of space exploration. Tour participants visit Historic Mission Control and Building 9, where astronauts train for the next trip to the International Space Station. The tour also includes a stop at the new Saturn V Complex at Rocket Park.

Perhaps most memorable is the tour's pause at the Space Center's Memorial Garden, where trees are planted to honor fallen astronauts, as well as researchers who have dedicated their careers to space exploration. Guests might also be interested in scheduling

Lunch With an Astronaut — a casual dining event with a NASA astronaut sharing firsthand stories over a "cosmic" catered lunch. The cost of lunch includes Space Center admission and a personalized lithograph from the guest astronaut.

For ages 5 and up, the 30-minute film Destination Station: The International Space Station offers a glimpse of the future of space research. The film explores the seemingly impossible partnership between the U.S. and Russia in forming a long-term outer space outpost and forecasts where the science of today will lead space exploration tomorrow. And if that topic seems a little weighty for younger viewers, you can recapture their attention in the Angry Birds area, where creatures from the popular app game experience space exploration in a variety of ways!

Space enthusiasts of all ages can wrap up their visit with a trip to the Space Center gift shop, where moon rocks, dried ice cream (like the astronauts eat) and replica space gear is available for purchase. For families visiting the area, Space Center Houston is a must-see attraction offering insight from the real space pioneers who made the dream a reality and perhaps inspiring the new frontiersmen and women of tomorrow.









Painful Crystals

Your big toe feels as if it is spouting red-hot flames. Red and swollen, it seems to be holding on to the cauldron of fire. You may have gout. A veteran at a VA hospital said this about gout, "I've been shot, beat up, stabbed and thrown out of a helicopter, but none of that compared to the gout." The good news is it's very treatable and even possible to lessen the risk of a recurrence of an outbreak, or at least to minimize the flare-ups.

Gout is the buildup of too much uric acid in the body, which causes it to solidify in joints. Uric acid deposits are crystals in a needle like formation, and they are very painful. Many times the big toe is the initial point of attack of the uric acid, but other joints can be affected, in addition to or even without involvement of the big toe. Feet, heels, ankles, knees, fingers, wrists and elbows are some, not all, of the joints that can be targeted. All of the joints affected are subject to swelling, inflammation and pain.

You can be predisposed to develop gout by some things you do and by who you are. Eating red meat, particularly large quantities of organ meats, such as liver, heart and kidneys, can raise the level of uric acid. Some seafood, such as anchovies, sardines and herring, can also raise the level of uric acid. Another consumption that can predispose one to gout is alcohol. Drinking more than two beers a day can raise your uric acid level. Men are more likely to develop

gout than women. However, after menopause, a woman's risk increases. Obesity poses a greater risk, because a greater amount of uric acid is produced, and people who are very overweight have the added burden of it developing at an earlier age. If you have a family history of gout, the chances are greater for you.

Treating gout is something your physician will discuss with you in order to prepare a plan that addresses your specific needs. Some of the medications used are nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs). Some of these, such as Aleve and Advil, may be conveniently purchased over the counter. Stronger ones are available by prescription. Colchicine is sometimes prescribed to help with the pain. Corticosteroids may be prescribed to help with the pain and inflammation.

If you experience any of the symptoms of gout, seek the care of a physician with the first flare-up. Ignoring it can lead to joint damage. There is help out there to lessen the symptoms and the recurrence of this condition.

Chicken Lazone

1/2 tsp. salt
1 1/2 tsp. chili powder
1 1/2 tsp. onion powder
2 tsp. garlic powder
1/4 tsp. cayenne pepper
2 lbs. skinless chicken breast, cubed
1/4 cup butter
2 cups heavy cream
1/3 cup sour cream
1 cup chives, chopped
Pasta, mashed potatoes or white rice

- **1.** Combine salt, chili powder, onion powder, garlic powder and cayenne pepper; dip chicken into the mix.
- **2.** In a large pan, melt butter; thoroughly cook chicken.
- **3.** Add cream and sour cream to chicken and butter; lower heat and simmer for 5-7 minutes until sauce thickens.
- **4.** Top mixture with chives. Serve over pasta, mashed potatoes or white rice.

Mexican Spaghetti

2 lbs. hamburger meat
2 cups flour
4 cups water
1/4 cup chili powder
2 cubes tomato bouillon
Salt and pepper, to taste
1/3 cup olive oil
2 lbs. fideo pasta
8 potatoes, peeled and cut into chunks
1/2 cup white onion, chopped
2 cups shredded Mexican cheese
Tortillas or corn chips

- **1.** Brown hamburger meat; drain and set aside.
- **2.** In another skillet, add flour, water, chili powder, tomato bouillon and salt and pepper; stir until mixture thickens.
- **3.** In a third skillet, heat olive oil on medium heat. Add fideo pasta; cook until pasta turns golden brown and drain.
- **4.** In a large soup pot, combine all three

skillet mixtures with potatoes and onion. Cover and simmer for 35-40 minutes or until pasta and potatoes are softened.

5. Add cheese to top of mixture; cover and simmer for an additional 10 minutes. Serve with tortillas or corn chips.

Stuffed Biscuits

1/3 cup brown sugar

1/3 cup sugar

1/4 cup butter

I family-size can biscuits (8-12 biscuits)

1 8-oz. can apples, pears, cherries or peaches

Vegetable oil, for frying Vanilla ice cream, to taste Chocolate or caramel syrup, to taste Whipped cream, to taste

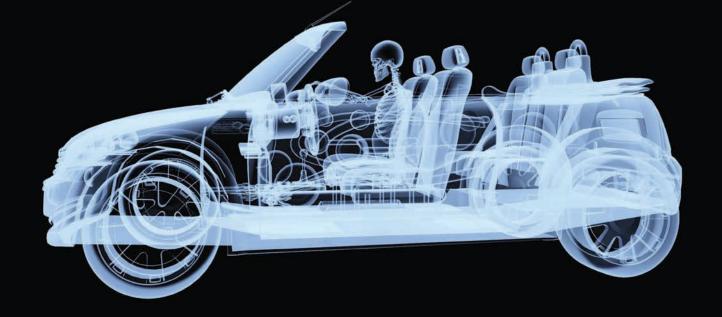
- **I.** Mix sugars in a bowl; melt butter in another bowl.
- **2.** Roll biscuits out flat; dip in butter then coat with sugar mixture.
- **3.** Add chosen fruit onto middle of flattened biscuits; fold over each biscuit and seal edges with a fork.
- **4.** Drop biscuits into hot oil in a deep fryer or skillet; cook until biscuits are golden and fluffv.
- **5.** Serve topped with vanilla ice cream, choice of syrup and whipped cream.

Grilled Banana Sandwich

Peanut butter
2 pieces of bread
1 banana
1/2 tsp. brown sugar
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
Pat of butter
1/3 cup caramel or chocolate sauce
1/2 tsp. powdered sugar

- **I.** Spread peanut butter on bread; slice banana in half lengthwise.
- **2.** Place banana between bread slices to make a sandwich; sprinkle with brown sugar and cinnamon.
- **3.** Melt butter on a hot griddle; add sandwich and cook until toasted on both sides.
- **4.** Serve topped with caramel or chocolate sauce and powdered sugar.

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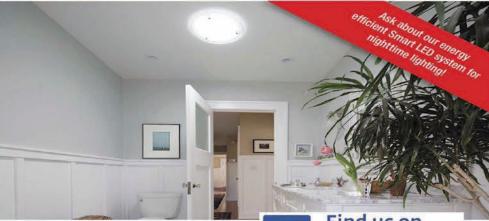
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
