



can see you now, and you look wonderful!



The stage was set. An excited opening night crowd moved from the elegant lobby to their seats, as the production's cast and crew nervously made final preparations for the Ennis Public Theatre's first performances in its new home in downtown Ennis. A hush fell over the audience as the lights came up on 100 Years of Broadway, the first of this season's seven wonderful offerings. "Every night during the two-week run was a memorable night, since it was an opening night for each audience," Betty Glaspy, founding director of the theater, recalled. "It was a really exciting moment when everything came alive."

Having a community theater in Ennis was a dream that Betty and other interested citizens realized when nonprofit status was gained. However, the fledgling community theater located in a strip center's old converted garage, never could be as creative as it wanted to be with sets, lighting and sound. Betty and the nonprofit's board members were determined to "grow" the theater. "People really became involved when the theater became a nonprofit," Betty explained.

EPT's board of directors has been instrumental in the theater's purchase and remodeling of what was once home to Ennis State Bank on N. Dallas Street. Joining Betty on the board are Angie Juenemann, president; Jim Cooper, secretary; Sandy Anderson, treasurer; Michelle Beard; J'Layna Betik; Carol Blaha; Jo Ann Cody; Cathy Criner; Nancy Dodson; Brenda Haupt; Tom McAfee; Hanna McCleary; Steve Medina; Bettye Moore; Lynn Moore; Glenda Quinn; and Jennifer Wartsbaugh. "This is a very active, working board," Betty said.

Following Ennis' 2013 tornado that ripped apart several downtown businesses and closed streets in the historic business district, private investors partnered

with the Ennis Economic Development Corporation and, most recently, the Ennis Main Street Project, to bring life back to Ennis' downtown. The timing was right for the theater to relocate. "People love Ennis, so when they were asked, people gave willingly," Angie, who also serves as Ennis' mayor, said.

"People even gave without being asked," Betty added.

For a year, the board worked with Greg Ibeaz, a Fort Worth architect, to achieve the results audiences, cast, crew members and employees now enjoy. "We relied on Greg, since he had previously designed theaters. The whole building had to be gutted," Betty remembered. "Remodeling is a true surprise." Over one year of continuous rehab work followed before the building was ready for its opening night in February of this year.

The results are spectacular. The box office is conveniently located just inside the retro front doors and opens to an elegant lobby complete with a modern concession stand and kitchen. Framed posters of the 2017 season's productions line the original brick walls and are lit by restored chandeliers. Modern stainless steel tables are both functional and complement the red brick and gray and white wall colors. The famous EPT cookie, along with other treats and drinks, are available.

A soaring ceiling and walls of black create a staging opportunity never possible in the previous location. The theater seats 87 in comfortable tiered seating. "We wanted to keep an intimate, close relationship between the audience and cast," Betty explained. The new sound and lighting boards are state-ofthe-art and allow the creativity to flow. Sound and lighting crew members have a bird's eye view of the production from their second story perch that overlooks

the stage. The sound and light booth came at great expense, but the results are worth it. "I'm thrilled with the mics and this whole system," Betty said. During intermissions, audience members can take advantage of the newly installed restroom facilities.

Behind the scenes, on the first story, the expansive prop room allows for larger sets to be constructed. The original bank vault still stands in this room. Dressing rooms and cast and crew restrooms complete the first story. "We installed flat-screen televisions in the lobby and the dressing rooms," Betty said. "Theater goers won't miss any of the production, and the cast and crew don't miss their cues."

A second story allows for access to the sound and light booth, storage, a restroom complete with a shower and classroom space for the K.I.D.S. children's program. "We're lucky to have Jamey Pritchett as our K.I.D.S. director," Betty stated. Jamey teaches at Mildred ISD, directs Mildred Junior High's One-Act play and coaches Mildred High School's UIL speech and debate teams. "Seeing the children perform, some of whom have special needs, is phenomenal," Betty said.

Other staff members include Shelley Aubrey, artistic director, and Eliz Lofreddo, managing director. Shelley earned a degree in theater from West Texas State University (now West Texas A&M University) and has been involved in theater for over 40 years as cast and director. Her list of productions is extensive. Eliz began as a volunteer at EPT and joined the staff four years ago. She's the smiling face who handles the day-to-day operations.

Community theater, however, couldn't be representative of its community without the many volunteers. "We have about 50 behind-the-scenes volunteers," Betty explained. They include people who sew costumes and create the sets, mothers who drive children to rehearsals, the actors and board members and their spouses.

"We're good at reeling in our spouses when they are needed," Angie quipped.

Not only has the show season opening been celebrated, but the theater hosted its appreciation gala in February for those who donated to the capital campaign. "We had valet parking, the red carpet, beautiful floral arrangements, strawberries and a champagne dinner and gave tours of the building," Betty said. EPT's grand opening was celebrated on April 1 with tours of the building, in conjunction with the opening of Farmers Market in Ennis.

Future plans include not only the continued offering of seven plays and musicals each year but also hosting movie nights, other live guest performances and open mic nights. "There's a central synergy of lights and activities in downtown Ennis now. People can go to several restaurants before an EPT production and then walk somewhere for dessert afterwards," Betty said. "We're a part of the Margaret Mitchell Arts District and the Minnie McDowell Park and would love to see more galleries come to downtown." Betty owns Interior Ideas and volunteers with the Ennis EDC and Main Street Project.

Memberships and tickets for upcoming EPT productions are available online. "We are passionate about this theater and want to see it continue to grow as we learn how to include the community more," Betty said. "It works best to let everyone's talents shine." **NOW**





for seven years now, they have made many changes. "We only looked at five houses, and when Nathan walked into this one, he just knew it was the one," Eva recalled.

"I liked the corner yard, all the room for kids and the patio," Nathan explained. The couple has, with occasional help from friends and family, screened-in the patio, put in new hardwood floors, put up exterior shutters, remodeled the bathrooms and utility room and painted the exterior and interior of the home. Nathan built Annie's backyard doghouse, which will soon be joined by a swimming pool with a deck this summer. An old-fashioned tire swing is hung near a handy shed. The screened-in porch holds many of the kids' "big" toys, provides comfortable seating and is cooled by ceiling fans, so the family will enjoy summertime at home this year.

The gray cottage with white trim and black shutters is sheltered under mature trees with shrubs and roses encircling it. Near the front door is a cross and sitting area. "Nathan is OCD about a yard," Eva stated.

The living room's comfortable seating, with its leather coffee table, accommodates the family and all guests easily. A fireplace and Eva's collection of crosses serve as focal points. A *Live, Love, Laugh* plaque well represents this family's life together.

The "Kids' Wing" consists of three bedrooms and a shared bath. Next-day needs and backpacks are stored on hooks in the hallway above which the kids' artwork is proudly displayed. Ethan's room, with its new futon bed, displays his baseball medals and photos of himself, friends and Nathan. "He loves to collect photos," Eva explained.



Miranda's room is a preteenager's delight, decorated in blues and white with white lights lit around the ceiling and her bedstead. Hearts hang above her bed, and the word, *Dream*, is her room's theme. A black chest-of-drawers is dressed up with classic glass door knobs for pulls. When Miranda



expressed a desire to have a Husky for a pet, Nathan and Eva took her to Build-A-Bear to build a Husky. It now sits stately in her room.

Pink and "tons of toys" decorate Mila's room. Nathan crafted her toddler bed and her three-tiered baby doll bed. A corner Minnie Mouse card table and chairs and the words, *Let me be the princess!* appearing above her bed complete this royal little girl's room.

The eat-in kitchen cabinets have been newly painted in ivory, which matches the vintage six-burner stove perfectly. Practical hardwood floors and a colorful table cloth make meals easy and fun. Nathan's office/utility room are just beyond, as is the master bath with its claw-footed tub. "I'd always wanted a claw-footed tub, but I don't have much time to relax and enjoy it," Eva said. The master bedroom is still a work in progress, but with its wall of storage, it's a very appreciated and needed room for this family.

"Our son was 4 months old when we purchased this home," Eva recalled. "We wanted to raise our kids in a friendly neighborhood, and that's what we have today."

Nathan concluded, "We're making memories every day with these kids."





MAKE SURE YOUR Car is ready

• Have the tires rotated and inspected. Tires should be rotated every 6,000-8,000 miles. While this is a simple enough job for you to do on your own, it might be worth giving the tire shop a turn, so they can thoroughly check for depth and even wear patterns before you trust your car's shoes for hundreds of miles. It is relatively inexpensive, and some shops will rotate and balance free, after installation. Be sure also to inflate the tires to the car's recommended pressure, which keeps you safe and improves gas mileage.

• *Oil changes are important.* While the old model of changing your oil every 3,000 miles or three months is often outdated, you do need to make sure to maintain your vehicle's standards. But before you run to an oil shop just before a trip, know that gaskets on oil pans and filters can be faulty, so you want to make the change at least a few days before your trip. That way, you will avoid getting stranded on the highway with a blown engine.

• A clean car is a happy car. Washing your car helps with more than just aesthetics. Regularly washing and waxing will protect your car's paint. And if your trip takes you to the sandy beaches of the Gulf or the red dirt near Oklahoma, you will want to make sure to give the car a thorough cleaning after your trip, as sand and grit can hurt both your car's exterior and its inner workings, if left over time.



PLAN FOR THE WORST

• A little preparation goes a long way. While no one wants to break down or be in a wreck, ending up stuck on the highway is sometimes an inevitability. While you cannot prepare for every situation, having an emergency kit is a simple step to take. You want to include things like foam tire sealant, jumper cables and duct tape that may allow you to fix minor problems until you can get into a proper shop. You should also have road flares or reflective triangles, as well as a fire extinguisher and flashlight to keep yourself safe and protected.

• *Have more than just tools.* In addition to roadside safety items, you should always travel with food and certain clothing items. It is smart to throw bottles of water and nonperishable snacks in the car for a long trip, in case you are stranded for a long period. Gloves will come in handy when changing a tire or lifting the hood to check for leaking fluids. And even though it is summer, you want to be sure you have blankets and a poncho, as changing a tire in the rain is no fun at all.

• Information is key. You should always have an up-to-date insurance card with you, but especially before embarking on a long trip. Additionally, know where your various roadside assistance numbers are located. All Texas driver's licenses have a number on the back, as do toll tags and insurance cards, if that is part of your coverage. And if you are a member of a group like AAA, you have ample options for getting help when your car is stranded.



DRIVE SAFELY

• Don't be distracted. Drivers sometimes think that long stretches of highways are less dangerous, but trying to text or otherwise letting yourself be distracted is dangerous. Playing road trip games or singing along is great, as long as the driver stays focused on the road.

• *Speed kills.* "Young drivers, especially, often think the open road

is an open invitation to see how fast they can go, but that is a huge mistake. Other than being distracted, the biggest problem is driving too fast and following too close," an officer with the DeSoto Police Department said. "Make sure you keep at least three car lengths between you and the next driver in town - more on the highway."



WORST CASE SCENARIOS

• Don't make it worse. If you end up having an accident, the first thing you need to do is get yourself in a safe place. "If the car can drive, slowly move it off the road," the officer continued. "If the car cannot drive, just leave it where it is and stand in safety away from the road." Before worrying about insurance, fault or repairs, you need to be in a safe place.

• Make the call. When you are in a wreck, the first call you make needs to be to the police. "If it's a teen driver, they should call the police first, then call their parents," the officer detailed. "Then, call your insurance company." If a tow truck is needed, you or your insurance should call it in. State troopers calling a wrecker often leads to higher costs.

• You should see the other guy. Only when both drivers are safe, exchange insurance and contact information. If you are hit and the other car flees the scene, do not try to track them down. "The best advice is to get the color, the plate and any description of the driver you can," the officer stated.

No one wants to break down or be in a car wreck. But, by being prepared and knowing how to handle the worst situations, your summer can be full of open roads and new destinations. NOW

Financial Gifts — and Tips — for New Graduates

A Body Heat Wave

As the sun heats up, the incidences of heat-related illnesses will rise. It's important to know what you are dealing with and what to do. Heat exhaustion and heat stroke are sometimes used synonymously, as if they are the same. That is understandable, considering they are heat illnesses with their genesis in very high temperatures, but they are different medical conditions. Both are serious and require immediate medical attention, but heat stroke can be fatal.


Some of heat exhaustion's symptoms are: heavy, drenching sweating; feeling weak; having a weak but rapid pulse; fainting; cold and clammy skin; experiencing nausea; headache; and muscle cramping. If any of these symptoms occur, the person should be removed from the heat to a preferably air-conditioned location. Give them non-caffeinated liquid to drink. Avoid sugar and alcoholic drinks while rehydrating. Loosen clothing and elevate legs above the heart. Use cool, wet cloths or shower to bring the body temperature down. If the person is not better within an hour, do not delay in seeking medical treatment. Forcing the body to continue an activity when it is in heat exhaustion can progress to heat stroke, if not treated. It is important to note that heat stroke can develop without the accompanying symptoms of heat exhaustion.

If experiencing heat stroke, the body loses the ability to regulate

its temperature. The heartbeat speeds up, as it tries to cool the body down. The skin feels hot and dry and is unable to sweat to bring down the temperature. One may experience nausea and vomiting. The temperature spikes to 104 degrees or higher. Confusion, delirium, dizziness, seizures, loss of consciousness and even coma can occur. If not treated quickly, organ failure and death can result.

In order to prevent these heat illnesses that can have such a devastating result on the body, it makes sense to try to prevent the problem from happening. If one has been indoors, acclimate yourself slowly to outdoor heat. Keep hydrated with water. Avoid outdoor activities during the intense heat of the day. When outside in the sun, protect your head with a wide-brimmed hat or cap. Wear sunglasses for eye protection. Wear sunscreen to prevent sunburn, which interferes with your body's mechanism for ridding itself of heat. When in a heated location, whether it's outside or in a non-air-conditioned gym, it's important for you to watch others for heat illness and for someone to watch out for you and respond appropriately. Call 911 immediately at the first sign of heat stroke, and you just might save a life. **NOW**

4 cups hot water 2 cups Minute Rice 4 beef bouillon cubes 1 medium yellow onion, chopped 1/2 lb. Velveeta Cheese, cubed 1/3 cup butter 1/4 cup vegetable oil 2 pickled jalapeños

 In a stock pot, combine all ingredients; bring to a boil.
 Reduce to low heat; simmer for 30 minutes, stirring occasionally without breaking open the jalapeños.

Cajun Pasta

- 2 Tbsp. olive oil2 lbs. chicken, deboned, skinned and chopped
- 4 Tbsp. Cajun seasoning 2 tsp. butter 1 red onion. sliced 1 red bell pepper, sliced I yellow bell pepper, sliced I orange bell pepper, sliced 1 10-oz. bag fresh spinach 1 pkg. fresh mushrooms 4 garlic cloves, minced Salt and pepper, to taste 1 cup white wine 4 cups chicken stock 1 8-oz. tub heavy whipping cream Cornstarch, as needed 1 16-oz. box penne pasta, cooked according to pkg. instructions

I. In a pan, pour olive oil. Coat chicken with Cajun seasoning. Pan fry chicken in oil; remove.

2. Add butter to pan. Add all vegetables, garlic, salt and pepper. Cook mixture on high heat for 10 minutes; remove vegetables from pan.

3. To deglaze the pan, add wine; reduce heat by half.

4. Add chicken stock; bring mixture to a boil. Whisk in heavy cream; reduce heat to simmer.

5. Thicken mixture to desired thickness with cornstarch.

6. Add reserved chicken and vegetables; combine with cooked penne pasta.

Polka Night Sweet and Sour Meatballs

- 1 32-oz. pkg. fully cooked meatballs
- 1 18-oz. jar grape jelly
- 1 24-oz. jar medium hot picante sauce

I. Place all ingredients in a Crock-Pot; cook on high for 2 hours, stirring often.

Buttermilk Pie

1 1/2 cups sugar
1/2 cup Bisquick
1 cup buttermilk
1/3 stick butter, melted
3 eggs

I. In a blender, combine all ingredients until smooth; pour mixture into a buttered pie plate.

2. Bake at 325 F for 45 minutes to 1 hour, or until pie does not jiggle.

Polka Night Banana Pudding

2 5.1-oz. boxes banana pudding mix

- 4 cups cold milk
- 1 8-oz. pkg. cream cheese
- 1 14-oz. can Eagle Brand Sweetened Condensed Milk
- 1 8-oz. tub Cool Whip
- 4 bananas
- 1 11-oz. box vanilla wafers

I. In a bowl, whisk together the pudding mix and cold milk until smooth.
