Art is beauty. When an artist puts a pencil to the canvas, he or she has a beautiful image in mind to convey to their audience. For Ariel Janousek, art is a way to show the beauty in people, even when the world may not see them as beautiful. And now, Ariel is taking her work to a broader audience.

Ariel has lived in Midlothian with her parents and brother most of her life. "I went to Baxter, Walnut Grove and then graduated last year from Midlothian High School," she detailed. Like most people, she drew and colored as a small child, and it was at an early age that she realized she really liked art. "I think I was in first grade when I started to think I could be an artist when I grew up," she recalled.

where some others do not and how living as someone whom others see as different has shaped her life.

Ariel was born with a rare condition called Vater syndrome. "With this syndrome, I had severe scoliosis that had shaped my spine to a 90-degree angle. It resulted in numerous surgeries," she said. Symptoms and severity vary with this syndrome. Ariel's heart is on the opposite side of her body, and her left leg did not form fully, resulting in her permanent use of a walker and needing an eventual amputation to that leg.

Rather than dwell on how this impacted her, Ariel focused on drawing. By the time she was in middle school, art had become a very important part of her life. "I was drawing consistently," she said. "Mainly a lot of fantasy, castles and superheroes that I admired from watching cartoons. And horses, because I admire horses."

When Ariel reached high school, though, a little direction helped take her skills to new levels. "My art teacher, Mr. Gentry, was the most influential person for my art," she recalled. "He encouraged me to use it to express myself. He suggested I draw people with disabilities to show that there is more to them."

Once she started focusing on the beauty of people who look different, Ariel's art took a new form, and



her passion exploded in her work. "Typically, I'll use some picture as a starting point when I draw. But then I add my own spin on them, so I can show their beauty in new ways," she explained.



Ariel's work intertwines traditional and non-traditional beauty. One of her favorite pieces is that of a young girl with a pretty, but sullen, face. At first glance, she appears to be sitting with her dress covering her legs. Upon closer examination, it becomes clear that her arms have been replaced by crutches, and she has no legs at all. "That drawing is kind of how I see myself, with how much I



rely on my arms for art and for just getting around," Ariel explained.

While none of her drawings look like her on the surface, many of them express how she feels about herself. One piece depicts a girl who is made up of little more than a head, crutches and long, flowing hair. "Even though she has crutches, she kind of uses her hair to stand, because that's the thing she finds supporting her and what makes her unique," Ariel said.

Ariel enjoys sharing her art with others, and this year had her biggest audience yet. "My art appreciation teacher wanted to show off some of my work," she said. "So, I had a collection on display in the college's main building for most of the first semester."

Ariel's passion extends beyond her art. "I'm studying art, but also mechanical engineering," she noted. "I want to make prosthetics with artistic designs." She also plans to become certified as a physical therapist in order to work with those with disabilities. "I also yearn to have my own art gallery for selling my art and to hold fundraisers to give to children's hospitals. Because everybody deserves a chance in life, no matter how different one looks," she said.

When not drawing, Ariel likes hanging out with friends, advancing in her studies, going shopping with her mom and friends and gardening. Still, she is always thinking of new art goals. "I drew a portrait of my brother for his birthday," she began. "But other than that, I've really only drawn girls. I want to start drawing men, young kids, cancer patients and even people with mental disorders, not just physical differences."

The short biography displayed with Ariel's college exhibit best summarizes her art's purpose. "I want people to understand how I feel," she said. "The girl with crutches doesn't care what people see. She knows she's beautiful." NOW








Like many people in the area, Mark and Kim Hensley moved to Midlothian for the schools, and stayed for the environment. After an extensive search of neighborhoods in 2003, the couple decided to build their current home in Westchester Estates. In 2004, they were one of the first families to settle there. "There were only three or four houses when we moved in. Now there are four streets and probably around 40 homes," Mark noted.

Large lots allowed for plenty of space between homes, however, and it wasn't unusual to see coyotes, donkeys and chickens wandering near their property. "Our sons were 12 and 14, coming from the city, and suddenly they were outside trying to catch goats," Mark recalled.

The boys weren't initially excited about the move from their home in Cedar Hill. "It was a hard sell on boys at that age," Mark said. "But they made great friends. Now they are 26 and 28 and still stay in touch with the friends they made here."






Kim had a plan all along for getting the boys acclimated. "I knew I'd have them ride the bus to school. It was a long day — from about 7:30 in the morning to 4:45 in the afternoon because our house is so far out," Kim said. "But I knew they would meet kids on the bus, and that's exactly what happened."

While Mark and Kim graduated from Duncanville High School





a few years apart, they met after school through mutual friends. They wanted their sons to grow up in an environment similar to what they experienced in their hometown. "They adapted quickly and loved growing up here," Kim said. "The boys were always here, and their friends didn't knock. They just came in. It was a neat neighborhood with those kinds of relationships."

Their home's split-bedroom design put the two boys' bedrooms on one

side, and the master bedroom on the other. A semi-open concept living room, eat-in kitchen and dining room anchored the center of the home. "I expanded the kitchen/dining area by 3 feet and made what is traditionally a formal dining room into a small sitting area," Kim recalled. "I love to cook, and everyone always gathers in this space, so I'm glad I enlarged it."

Over the years, the Hensleys replaced much of the original flooring with dark hardwoods,

changed paint colors and updated lighting, but Kim's original selection of tile and backsplash in timeless off-white shades allowed those items to remain. Gray and white furnishings with turquoise accent pieces update the living area.

Family favorites are sprinkled throughout the home, including an antique hutch in the breakfast nook that the Hensleys use as a coffee bar. Kim's grandfather received the piece as payment for plowing a field in



"We don't have grandkids, but we built the pool with them in mind," Kim admitted of the not-too-deep pool with a shallow sundeck just outside their patio door.

Mark is a business applications specialist for Oncor, and Kim continues to substitute teach in MISD, where she formerly subbed and served as a job coach at Midlothian High School. In their free time, Mark plays baseball on a senior men's league, and Kim volunteers for Bridges Training Foundation.

The couple continues to host meals for family and enjoys the home they built 14 years ago. "The boys still have rooms, and we still gather in the kitchen when everyone is here," Kim said. "I couldn't really choose a favorite thing about the house. I love everything — all of it." NOW



This was fun for her," Bre said. "I don't think she really understands how this was a big act of kindness. To her, it was just a natural thing."

While other tweens might prefer more traditional gettogethers and gifts, Sage instead committed to spending her birthday cleaning cages and cuddling animals at the Ellis County SPCA adoption center. "My friends were really excited. They talked about it all week before, and we even had matching shirts. They really had fun," Sage said of her guests' reaction to her unusual party plans. "Cleaning poop wasn't even that bad."

Further seeing things on the bright side, Sage didn't think of the unusual birthday as a loss of presents for herself, but as a gift to furry friends. With her mom's help, she took to Facebook to request animalappropriate donations for the SPCA. "There wasn't anything I needed for my birthday. The animals needed things more than me," Sage said. "It was fun to collect for the animals instead."

Several friends responded to the Facebook post, and Sage was able to fill her mom's van with more than 50 towels and blankets, pet food and treats, cat litter and several toys — around 200 donations in all. "With my family and friends, it was a lot! I was happy the animals would have new toys and special treats," Sage said.

After unloading donations at the SPCA, Sage and her friends put on their "Give me all the puppies" T-shirts and spent the afternoon cleaning kennels, bathing dogs and feeding them treats, as well as loving on the SPCA's pet residents. "I was happy to know they would have cleaner cages, and that they would feel loved," Sage noted.

While Sage doesn't yet know how she will top this idea on her next birthday — although she promises to give it some serious thought — her involvement with animals will undoubtedly continue. MABA. "Brady started playing when he was a 4U, but I didn't coach him at first," Blane explained. "It turns out I wasn't a very good sideline dad, so I started coaching him before he was 6."

Blane has coached Brady's teams in MABA for 10 seasons, and eventually, the board asked him to join its ranks. "I knew all the guys just from being involved with the association and from being at the fields so much for so many years. Last year, they talked me into joining the board as secretary — to get involved and help with organizational things. Then last April, they asked me to be president of the board. Against my wife's advice, I accepted," he said with a laugh.

As MABA president, Blane has a big job. "As a group, we are trying to make sure kids in Midlothian have



a high-quality association, so they can stay here to play," he explained. "Even with the growth and good work the MABA has been doing for years, there are a lot of families that feel like they need to go to Mansfield or Arlington to get a good playing experience, and we're trying to change that." They are seeing the fruit of their labor, and this season they had about 200 more players sign up than ever before.

Blane and the board are not satisfied just by good registration numbers. "From the actual baseball standpoint, we want to make sure, as an organization, that we are teaching sound fundamentals, basics and competitive sportsmanship," he specified. "We want to help kids develop a love for the game and help develop all-around baseball players."

These goals make for a busy schedule for Blane, the board and countless volunteers who make the league run season after season. "We get started well before the season with pre-registration. We're updating the website, answering lots of emails and getting ourselves ready," Blane explained. "Then, as registration starts, we are scheduling games, getting umpires coordinated, getting the fields ready and working with the city on any repairs that need to be done."

Once the season starts, Blane and the board work to answer emails from parents and coaches, handle their own teams and coordinate with



each leagues' commissioner. "Each age group has a commissioner, so they handle some of the day-to-day things," he said. "But as a whole, we are at the fields every single day between games and practices. If Brady has a Monday night game, I may serve as the MABA board member on duty, but that means I might have to leave his game to take care of something on another field."

With the abundance of duties and responsibilities the board has, it is sometimes a lost fact that it is comprised completely of parents and coaches who are giving their free time to make the organization great. "Our coaches are definitely the backbone of the organization, but our board is made up of volunteers who also coach. For those who aren't coaches, they are player parents who also invest in their team, as well as the board," Blane said.

"Of course, they are all dads or moms with full-time jobs. It takes a lot to keep things going, and we have more players registered this season than ever before," Blane said. The work he and the rest of the board do is paying off, as hundreds of players run on to Midlothian fields each season and every time an ump yells out, "Play Ball!" NOW





Homemade Sicilian Style Pizza

Dough for 4 10- to 14-inch pizzas:
2 1/4 tsp. (or 1 pkt.) active dry yeast
1/8 tsp. sugar
12 oz. warm water (110 F)
3 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
1 Tbsp. salt
1 Tbsp. extra-virgin olive oil

Semolina flour (for dusting pizza peel)

Simple Sauce:

24 to 28 oz. pureed tomatoes

I tsp. sugar

1 tsp. salt

3 cloves raw garlic (or 1 tsp. garlic powder)

Spicy Sausage:

1 lb. ground pork

I Tbsp. fennel seedI tsp. sea saltI Tbsp. red pepper flakesI tsp. garlic powder

Additional Toppings (optional):

Shredded mozzarella Pecorino Romano Fresh basil

1. For dough: Preheat pizza stone or pan in oven at 475 F (or higher, if stone can withstand higher temperatures). Preheat 1 hour if using stone or 1/2 hour if using a pan.

2. In a small bowl, dissolve yeast and sugar in warm water; set aside. In a large bowl, combine flour, salt and oil. Slowly add yeast mixture, stirring until dough is shaggy and doesn't stick to your hands.

3. Place dough on a lightly floured surface.

Knead until smooth (or let your stand mixer do the work). Divide dough into fourths, place each in a greased bowl. Cover and let rise at room temperature, at least 45 minutes.

4. For sauce: While the dough is rising, combine all ingredients for the sauce; stir well.

5. For sausage: Season pork with spices. Brown over medium heat; drain well.

6. To assemble pizza: Gently press out the dough on a lightly floured surface, stretching it into a 10- to 14-inch crust. Sprinkle semolina flour on pizza peel; transfer crust. Add desired toppings, keeping it light, so crust is not compromised. Transfer pizza to oven; bake around 6 to 10 minutes.

Lemon Poppy Seed Bundt Cake

Cake:

1 box lemon cake mix

I small box instant lemon pudding

1/4 cup poppy seeds

1/2 cup oil

I cup water

4 eggs

Frosting:

1/2 cup butter, softened

1 lb. powdered sugar

5 Tbsp. fresh squeezed lemon juice (2-3 lemons)

Lemon zest (optional)

- **1.** For cake: Preheat oven to 350 F. Grease and flour a Bundt pan.
- **2.** Mix all cake ingredients on low to medium speed until well combined.
- **3.** Pour cake batter into pan; bake about 45-50 minutes. Remove cake from pan after cooling 10 minutes; cool completely.
- **4.** For frosting: Mix butter and powdered sugar on medium speed until well blended. Gradually mix in lemon juice by the Tbsp., until you reach desired consistency. Stir in lemon zest, if desired.
- **5.** Spread cake with frosting or use pastry bag to pipe long, thick lines of frosting up and down over cake.

Strawberry Cake

Cake:

I box white cake mix

1 3-oz. box strawberry Jell-O

4 large eggs

1/2 cup sugar

1/4 cup all-purpose flour

1/2 cup fresh strawberries, chopped

I cup vegetable oil

1/2 cup milk

Frosting:

I cup unsalted butter, softened 2 lbs. powdered sugar

I cup fresh strawberries, chopped

- **I.** For cake: Preheat oven to 350 F. Grease and flour a Bundt pan.
- **2.** Mix all cake ingredients on low speed until just combined. Scrape the side of the bowl, increase mixer to medium and beat for 3 minutes.
- **3.** Pour cake batter into the pan; bake about 45-50 minutes. Remove cake from pan after cooking 10 minutes; cool completely.
- **4.** For frosting: Cream the butter; add powdered sugar and strawberries until well combined. Refrigerate about 5-10 minutes to firm it up slightly.
- **5.** Spread cake with frosting or use pastry bag to pipe long, thick lines of frosting up and down over cake; refrigerate.


we do, the crew realizes that even happy moves are stressful to the customer, so we try to lessen the stress."

Cultural Attraction

For a slice of Americana, Cedar Rapids, Iowa, beckons Texans with family fun, outdoor adventure, live music, shopping, museums and history. Enriched culture, evergrowing culinary and brewery scenes, beautiful art and a variety of sports entertainment are all within visitors' reach. Driving northeast from Fort Worth will take almost 16 hours and about \$150 in fuel. Or, the Eastern Iowa Airport is 9 miles from Cedar Rapids, where cultural immersion is easy, thanks to a community proud of its heritage.

For many years, Czech was commonly spoken in Cedar Rapids, and today, more people of Czech ancestry live in Cedar Rapids than in any other city in the world, except for the Czech capital of Prague. It is a proud aspect of Cedar Rapids culture, and the history is expressed through extraordinary exhibitions and experiences at the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library.

The museum isn't the only representation of the Czech culture. Czech Village/New Bohemia Main Street District was voted Best Cultural Attraction by the *Corridor Business Journal* in 2017 and was a 2016 Great American Main Street Award semi-finalist. It is home not only to incredible artists and world-class museums, but also some of the best dining, shopping and entertainment in the area.

One fantastic shopping area in the district is NewBo City Market, a year-round indoor farmers market. Visitors can taste local cuisine and brews and support local artistry, all while experiencing a unique and fun atmosphere.

One of Cedar Rapids' most famous local artists, Grant

Wood, got his start here. Cedar Rapids Museum of Art holds the largest collection of his works. The classic art piece, *American Gothic*, was painted in his studio home in 1930. His studio is located near downtown Cedar Rapids and is available to visitors on weekends from April through December.

Another historic landmark is the Brucemore Estate, former home to several history makers who played a large role in Cedar Rapids' factory industries, including Quaker Oats. The estate was donated to the National Trust for Historic Preservation in 1981, and today 43,000 people are drawn to the site every year. Brucemore Estate hosts signature events for the public, like the poolside Tahitian Party, Balloon Glow in the summer, Brucemorchestra in the fall and A Modern Salon in the winter. The house and incredible gardens are open for tours throughout the year.

Hundreds of other parks allow for escape into nature. Indian Creek Nature Center's grounds and trails are explorable at no charge. Families can hike scenic trails, see a concert in the amphitheater, participate in a yoga class or let their children play in the outdoor classroom.

Throughout spring and summer, visitors can join residents cheering on their Cedar Rapids Kernels baseball team, the Minor League affiliate of the Minnesota Twins, playing at the single A level. Fans get to experience firsthand future MLB talent, as top prospects from all over the world play for and against the Kernels. There are also hockey, indoor football and soccer teams competing in the winter.

At the end of full days, calm and cozy lodgings abound. People who need the comfort of a hotel will find every national chain has a key just for them. And those towing an RV will rest securely at campsites nestled close to the Cedar River.

If the Car is More Than a Car







Taking a Vacation? Make It Easy on Your Feet.

Although rest and relaxation are the goals for most vacations, they usually involve a lot of walking, and a lot of walking usually involves sore feet. Walking is great exercise and one of the most reliable forms of transportation. But if your feet aren't in the best shape or you don't have the right shoes, too much walking can cause foot problems. Good foot care is essential if you plan to subject your feet to long periods of walking.

Some simple foot care tips include:

- Wear thick, absorbent socks (acrylic instead of cotton).
- Dry feet thoroughly after bathing, making sure to dry between toes. Use powder before putting on shoes.
- Nails should be cut regularly, straight across the toe.
- Bunions, hammertoes or any other serious foot problems should be evaluated by a foot and ankle surgeon.



The right shoe is also important for healthy walking. The ideal walking shoe should be stable from side to side and well-cushioned, and it should enable you to walk smoothly. Many running shoes will fit the bill. There are also shoes made especially for walking. Walking shoes tend to be slightly less cushioned, yet not as bulky, and lighter than running shoes. Whether a walking or running shoe, the shoes need to feel stable and comfortable.

Warming up exercises to help alleviate any muscle stiffness or pulled muscles are also advised before walking. Loosening up the heel cords (Achilles and calf) and thigh muscles before a walk is especially effective. If you're not accustomed to long walks, start slowly and rest if your feet start hurting. And above all, have fun. **NOW**
