# Ennis PROUD



When it comes to school pride, the Ludwig family has it in spades. From the late Herbert Ludwig and his daughter, Pat, to his granddaughter, Joanna, three generations have cheered for the Ennis Lions. Herbert, who passed away last year, left behind many grieving hearts that cherish his legacy as a devoted husband, family man and friend. Herbert is best remembered locally as a witty, fun-loving yard clerk for the Southern Pacific Railroad, which he served for over 40 years. He's also known for his long, happy marriage to the former Mary Comiskey, with whom he and a circle of friends regularly vied in games of dominoes, particularly "42" and "Amtrak." Shortly before Herbert passed away at age 91, he and Mary celebrated their 65th anniversary.














What many may not know about the funny, high-spirited railroad veteran is that he was a cheerleader for Ennis High School (EHS) during his senior year in 1939. That stint paved the way for a tradition in his family. His daughter, Pat Ludwig Webster, followed in his cheerleading footsteps her junior and senior years in the mid-1960s. And Herbert's granddaughter, Joanna Webster Cunningham, picked up the pompoms and shook them for all four years of her time at EHS, in the 1990s.

"Herbert was very proud of his time in school," Mary recalled. "He loved cheerleading at the football games, and was so proud his daughter and granddaughter carried that on."

Pat, a registered nurse, also remembered the interest her father took in her education and cheerleading. "He was a great role model," she said. "He was the kind of daddy who was always there. You would call him, and there he was. He was our security."

Joanna, a counselor, shared a memory that illustrates how much love her grandfather felt for his family — and how much pride he still invested in the Ennis Lions. "I brought him some old furniture once that had been discarded when an elementary school was being refurbished," she said. "Well, he very lovingly took it and sanded it down for me, repainted it and made it look brand new."

For Herbert the old furniture must have rekindled memories of the days he cheered for his hometown, joining the girls and one other boy who comprised the cheerleading squad at Ennis High in 1939. When he wasn't supporting the Lions at games, Herbert was making the most of his education. After he moved with his family to Ennis from Corsicana,

the credits for a course he had completed didn't transfer to EHS, delaying his graduation. But Herbert took it in his stride and dedicated himself to finishing his senior year, enrolling in trigonometry, calculus and other difficult courses. He was also active in the Spanish Club and the Glee Club.

Following graduation, Herbert joined Southern Pacific as a clerk, but after the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor in 1941, he and a friend signed up with the Navy. He was in the service for the duration of World War II, returning home to Ennis and his railroad job in 1945. He didn't meet Mary until the following



year. Several years younger, Mary was a telephone operator for Southern Pacific, working the night shift, and while putting calls through to and from Herbert, the pair became friends. "My office was where the Railroad Museum is now," Mary reflected. "So Herbert and I got to know each other over the phone, but we didn't start going together until later." It was at a company party that their romance was born. Herbert asked her to dance, and she accepted. They fell in love and were married in February 1947. Over the next decade the couple reared five children: Michael, Rosemary, Jo Ellen, Sylvia and Pat. Mary still lives in the same house she moved into as a young wife 65 years ago, and where her 14 grandchildren now visit her.

Pat was the one who first took a page from her dad's life by becoming an EHS cheerleader in 1966-1967. "It was fun," she remembered. "We had just six cheerleaders, made up of two sophomores, two juniors and two seniors. That's how it was done then. And we painted all our own victory and booster signs." She also has fond memories

of camp where the squad learned new cheers for the coming year. "It wasn't nearly as sophisticated as it is now," Pat observed. "It was pretty toned-down, and we just had two or three cheers. But it's a fun time to look back on." Along with cheering for the Lions, Pat was active in basketball, a member of the student council and served on the yearbook staff.

Her daughter, Joanna, took on the family mantle next, although at first she was unaware the tradition hailed from Herbert. "I didn't know until later my grandfather had been a cheerleader too," she laughed. "I thought that was so cool!" Joanna cheered for the Lions from 1994 to 1997 and enjoyed it as much as her mom and grandfather had before her. But Joanna's athleticism sometimes frightened her doting grandmother.

"I used to watch her," Mary said. "Joanna was so little she was often chosen to be on top when the girls did their pyramid routine. Well, I was always afraid she would fall!" In addition to cheerleading, Joanna was on the student council, worked on the yearbook and was a member of the National Honor Society.

Pat and Joanna are glad they shared the experience of cheerleading with Herbert. Joanna has even kept some of her uniforms, which Mary's greatgranddaughters all like to play dress up in now.

"Cheerleading wasn't a major thing for me personally," Joanna clarified. "But it's a way to remember my grandfather. He was proud of us, and we are proud of him."

When Mary, Pat and Joanna look through EHS memorabilia, it's not their own achievements they discuss. It's their memories of Herbert and what he meant to them. "He was a good daddy," his wife pointed out, adding with a laugh: "And a good fisherman!"

Joanna agreed. "Some of my fondest memories as a kid are of PaPa teaching me how to fish," she admitted. "Those were some of the best times — being with Nonna and PaPa on vacation in their 5th wheel trailer." Pat and Joanna remembered trips with Herbert and Mary to Lake Whitney, as well as to state parks all over Texas.

"Dad's mind was very sharp, and he was happy until the end," Pat said. "And we are happy to pay tribute to him by remembering his pride in Ennis High and in us." NOW


Cory and Stephanie purchased their home in July 2007. A small farmhouse was in place at the time, but they tore it down.

bed and breakfasts and even cabins on a working cattle ranch are available to rest your head. The cuisine of the area will also tempt your palate at the many local restaurants, which are devoid of typical fast-food fare.

Warm and sunny days with little humidity give visitors an abundance of outdoor activities to pursue. Birders flock to the town that has been proclaimed the "Hummingbird Capital of Texas." Fort Davis serves as home to several varieties of the species including: Lucifer, Anna's, Black-chinned, Ruby-throated, Calliope and Broad-tailed hummingbirds. Hikers can take either an endurance test or a leisurely stroll when in the mile-high town. Trails run through several of the area attractions including the Madera Canyon Trail on the grounds of the Nature Conservancy. Hunting excursions and jeep tours are even available through area ranches that offer everything from elk and aoudad to deer and antelope.





Beautiful days turn into incredible, star-filled nights when the sun sets in the Davis Mountains. With no major populated city within a hundred miles, very little gets in the way of stargazing and seeing the reality of the lyrics "the stars at night are big and bright," especially in Fort Davis. The University of Texas chose this area for its McDonald Observatory, one of the major astronomical research facilities in the world. The Observatory Visitor's Center is open daily and has exhibits, a theater, a gift shop and cafe. Solar

viewings and tours of the facility are also offered on a daily basis, but for those truly wanting the celestial experience, on Tuesday, Friday and Saturday nights, the Observatory holds its famous Star Parties. This outdoor extravaganza gives visitors the opportunity to look through multiple telescopes, view video presentations on astronomy and speak with experts who work at the Observatory — all under some of the darkest night skies in the continental United States.

The Davis Mountains State Park, considered by many to be the crown jewel of the Texas State Park System, is located just about five minutes from downtown. The park contains abundant wildlife, camping, RV hookups, mountain biking and miles of hiking trails along with a pueblo-style hotel complete with restaurant and pool right on the property. The Indian Lodge hotel was built in 1933 by the Civilian Conservation Corps











and remains a visitor favorite among the many accommodations available in Fort Davis. The breathtaking views at the park offer photographers hundreds of opportunities to capture the essence of the area in print.


A visit to Fort Davis would not be complete without seeing the town's name sake, the Fort Davis National Historic Site (FDNHS). Established in 1854, the FDNHS remains one of the country's best examples of a restored frontier fort. Named after Secretary of War Jefferson Davis, the Fort played a major role in the protection of the Southwest along the San Antonio-El Paso section of the Southern Overland Trail. Buffalo Soldiers were stationed at Fort Davis from 1867-1885, and exhibits at the fort reflect the huge contribution they made in the settlement of western Texas and southeastern New Mexico. The self-guided tour takes you through the 474-acre site which offers hiking trails, a museum and visitor's center.

The flora and fauna of the area are highlighted at the Chihuahuan Desert Nature Center and Botanical Gardens located just four miles from downtown Fort Davis. The educational programs and tours available give visitors a true feel for what exactly grows and lives in this part of Texas. The greenhouse contains over 200 species of Chihuahuan Desert cacti, and the Leaping Lizard gift shop has plenty of items to take a little piece of your experience home.

The 75-mile Scenic Loop takes travelers through the entire range of the Davis Mountains. This ride, a favorite of both motorcyclists and endurance bicyclists, has been called one of the most spectacular rides in the state. The majestic views are plentiful with areas along the way to stop and picnic or take advantage of the unbelievable photo opportunities.


Fort Davis may not have a single traffic light, but artisans and merchants abound. have participated across the country in this special offer that lasts through September 1. Kids and their parents can register online at www.kidsbowlfree/ennisallstarbowl.com.





## Is Your Portfolio Truly Diversified?

Life is full of ups and downs — and the financial markets are no different. As an investor, you're no doubt happy to see the "ups," but the "downs" can seem like a real downer. Isn't there any way to help smooth out the volatility in your investment portfolio?

First of all, to cope with volatility, it's helpful to know what causes it — and there can be many causes. Computers that make trades in milliseconds, based on mathematical models, are sometimes blamed for intraday volatility, but large price swings can also occur following the release of government economic reports, such as those dealing with unemployment and housing starts. Global events, such as the European economic malaise, can also send the financial markets into a tizzy.

By being aware of the impact of these events, you can see that the workings of the markets — especially their volatility — may not be as mysterious as you thought. Still, while knowing the causes of volatility can help you prepare for market swings, it won't blunt their impact on your portfolio. To do that, you need to create a diversified mix of investments, because your portfolio can be more susceptible to negative price movements if you only own one type of asset.

To illustrate: If you owned mostly bonds, and interest rates rose sharply, the value of your bonds would likely drop, and your portfolio could take a big hit. But if you owned stocks, bonds, government securities, certificates of deposit (CDs) and other investment vehicles, the rise in interest rates would probably affect your portfolio less significantly.

Unfortunately, many investors think that if they own a few stocks and a bond, they're diversified. But you can actually extend your diversification through many levels — and you should. For the equity portion of your portfolio, try to own

stocks representing many market sectors and industries. Also, consider international stocks. And rather than just owning U.S. Treasury bonds, consider corporate bonds and municipal bonds, and diversify your fixed-income holdings further by purchasing short-term, intermediate-term and long-term bonds. Work with your financial advisor to determine the mix of asset classes and investments that are appropriate for your financial goals and objectives.

How you ultimately diversify your portfolio depends on your risk tolerance, time horizon and long-term goals — there's no one correct asset mix for everyone. And over time, your diversification needs may change. To cite one example, as you enter your retirement years, you may need to increase your percentage of income-producing investments while possibly reducing the amount of growth investments you own. These growth-oriented investments tend to be more volatile, and you may want less volatility during your retirement. However, even during retirement, you will need to own a certain percentage of growth investments to provide you with the growth potential you'll need to stay ahead of inflation.

Keep in mind that diversification can't guarantee a profit or protect against loss. Nonetheless, building a diversified portfolio may help take some of the volatility out of investing — so look for diversification opportunities whenever possible.

## Staying Stress-free

## Sweet and Tangy Grilled Pork Chops

1/4 cup maple syrup
2 Tbsp. ketchup
1/4 cup apple cider vinegar
2 Tbsp. Dijon mustard
Dash of Tabasco
1 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce
1 Tbsp. liquid smoke
4 bone-in pork loin chops

Salt and pepper, to taste

- **1.** Combine first 7 ingredients in a bowl.
- **2.** Season chops with salt and pepper.
- **3.** Brush chops with glaze; grill about 7 minutes per side on medium heat.

#### **Baked Lemon Chicken Breasts**

1/4 cup extra virgin olive oil 10 garlic cloves, minced

Pinch of crushed red pepper flakes 1/3 cup white wine, such as sauvignon blanc or pinot grigio
Grated zest of 2 lemons luice of 1 lemon

- 1 Tbsp. oregano, freshly chopped (about 5-7 sprigs)
- I Tbsp. thyme, freshly chopped (about 10 sprigs)

Kosher salt and fresh cracked pepper, to taste

- 4 boneless, skin-on chicken breast, cut in half
- I lemon, cut into 8 wedges
- **I.** Warm oil in a small sauce pan on medium low heat. Add the garlic and lightly brown until fragrant, 1-2 minutes.
- **2.** Remove from heat; add pepper flakes, wine, lemon zest and juice and herbs. Season with salt and pepper; stir well. Transfer to 13x9-inch baking dish.
- 3. Pat chicken dry; season with salt and

pepper; place in baking dish. Spoon sauce over chicken; nestle lemon wedges in with chicken.

**4.** Bake at 400 F for 35-45 minutes, spooning sauce over chicken once during cooking. Serve with pan juices.

## Seasoned Roasted Potato Wedge

3 Tbsp. extra virgin olive oil

1 tsp. smoked paprika

1/2 tsp. ground cumin

1 tsp. garlic powder

1 tsp. onion powder

1/2 tsp. sea salt

1/2 tsp. cracked pepper

- I tsp. each fresh rosemary and thyme, chopped (optional)
- 2 large russet potatoes, cleaned, each cut lengthwise into 8 wedges
- **I.** Combine and whisk all ingredients, except potatoes, in a large bowl.
- **2.** Add cut potato wedges, mixing well to coat each one.
- **3.** Place in a single layer on a sheet pan. Bake at 400 F for 30 minutes or until fork tender, flipping once halfway through.

#### Fried Mozzarella Sandwich

Makes 2 sandwiches

4 slices French bread, about 1/2-inch thick

Garlic butter spread

1/4 of an 8-oz. fresh mozzarella ball 15-20 fresh basil leaves

2 eggs

3 Tbsp. heavy cream (or milk)

2 Tbsp. parmesan cheese, grated Salt and pepper, to taste

1/2 Tbsp. butter

- **1.** Spread one side of each slice of bread with garlic butter.
- **2.** Slice mozzarella about 1/4-inch thick. Lay mozzarella on buttered side of 2 slices of bread; top with basil leaves. Top the sandwich with remaining bread, buttered side touching basil.
- **3.** Whisk the eggs with cream and parmesan in a shallow dish; with salt and pepper. Dip each assembled sandwich into the egg mixture, coating both sides.
- **4.** Preheat butter on non-stick griddle pan on medium high heat. Cook sandwiches about 2 minutes per side, until golden brown and cheese melts.
