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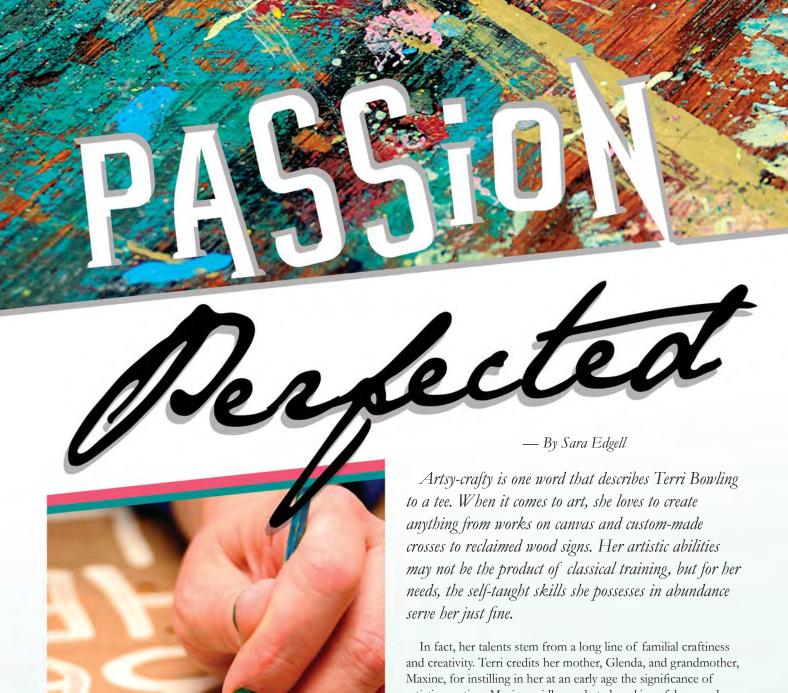

"The first house we bought 13 years ago was a big inspiration for me," she recalled. "I just like to take old things and make them pretty again. I've always been good at being able to see hidden beauty."

Over the years, Terri reared her family and renovated her home, enjoying both to the hilt. She made special paintings on canvas for her children's rooms and repurposed old, junk furniture to fill other rooms of the house. She discovered the joy of constructing and decorating for

herself, but also for others. Friends and family would admire the furniture and accessories she made for her own home and ask Terri to make similar pieces for them. Six years ago, Terri decided to take a more serious approach to her work and turned her hobby into a small business. The childhood spark had ignited a creative fire. 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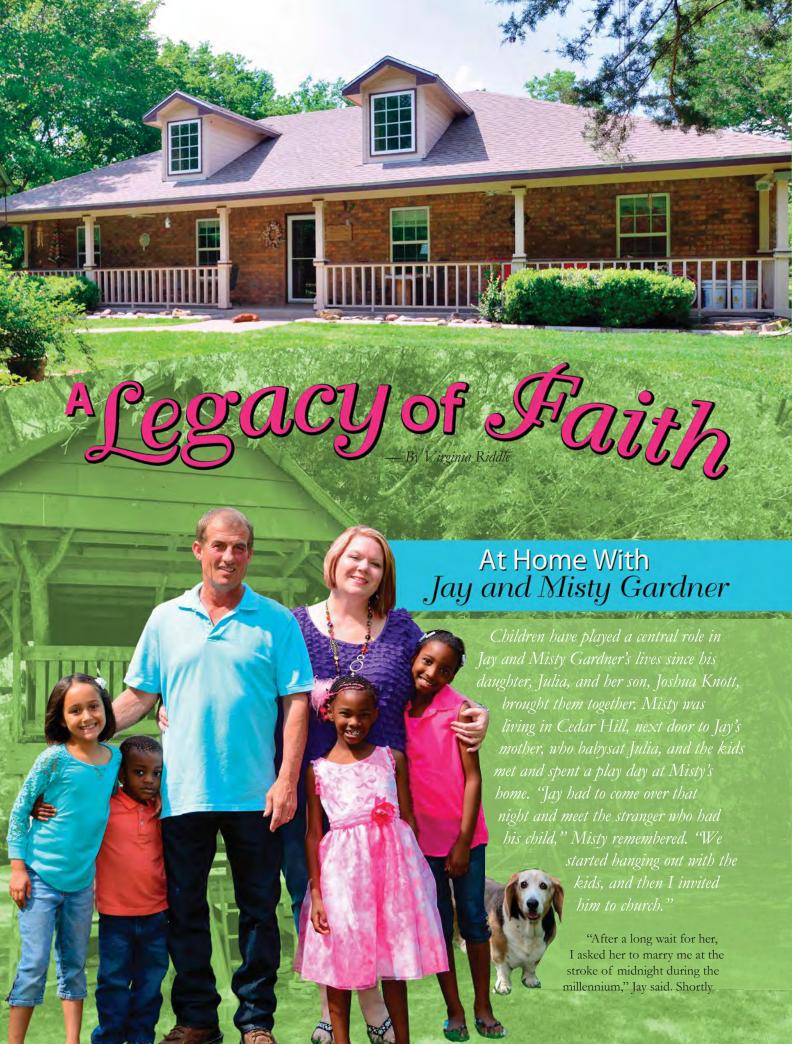


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afterward, the couple married, and the family of four began their future together.

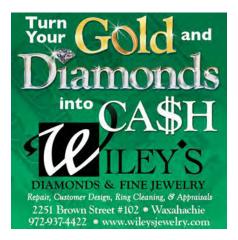
A tradition of musical talent is another connection the guys share. Nearly all

The Moravians have performed not only at Ennis' annual National

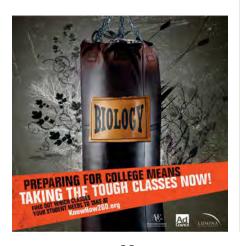
Polka Festival Parade, but also at Sokol Hall during that fun-filled weekend. They are also part of the annual Ennis Czech Music Festival and have performed at

Prepare for Health Care Costs During Retirement

As you save and invest for retirement, what are your ultimate goals? Do you plan on traveling the world? Purchasing a vacation home? Pursuing your hobbies? People often think aboout and plan for these costs. Yet, too often, many of us overlook what potentially could be a major expense during our retirement years — health care. Estimate your costs. Try to estimate what your out-of-pocket health care costs might be, based on your health, your age at retirement, whatever supplemental insurance you may carry and other factors.

Know the key dates. Things can change in your life, but try to identify, as closely as possible, the age at which you plan to retire. This will help you spot any coverage gaps before you become eligible for Medicare at age 65. Also, be aware of the seven-month window for enrolling in Medicare, beginning three months before your 65th birthday.

Review your insurance options. Medicare-approved

insurance companies offer some other parts to Medicare, including Part D, which covers prescription drugs; Medigap, which covers gaps in Parts A and B (in-hospital expenses, doctor services, outpatient care and some preventive services); and Part C (also known as Medicare Advantage, which is designed to replace Parts A, B, Medigap and, potentially, part D). You have several options for Part D, Medigap and Medicare Advantage, each with varying coverage and costs, so choose the plans that best fit your needs. (To learn more about Medicare and supplemental insurance, go to www.medicare.gov.)

Develop a long-term care strategy. To meet long-term care costs, you could self-insure or purchase insurance coverage. To learn about long-term care insurance solutions, contact your financial advisor.

Invest for growth and rising income. Health care costs typically rise as you move further into retirement, so make sure that a reasonable portion of your assets is allocated to investments with the potential for both growth and rising income.

Think about health care directives. If you were to become incapacitated, you might be unable to make health care decisions — and these decisions may affect not only your quality of life but also your financial situation, and that of your family. Talk to your legal advisor about establishing a health care directive, which allows you to name someone to make choices on your behalf.

Health care costs during your retirement may be unavoidable. But by anticipating these costs, you can put yourself in a position to deal with them — and that's a healthy place to be. **NOW**

Benefits of Stretching

Stretching before exercise is a no-brainer, but did you know stretching can improve your overall health? Incorporating stretching each day can make a significant impact in your everyday life.

According to the Mayo Clinic, here are some of the main benefits of stretching:

- Increased flexibility and joint movement: This means that you will be able to move easier and be less stiff in your everyday activities, such as lifting your kids or grandkids, carrying groceries and kneeling to do yard work.
- Better posture: Stretching can help keep your muscles relaxed, which will make it easier to maintain appropriate posture. Good posture can minimize discomfort and help prevent complications that happen over time such as increased risks of slipped disc, back aches and neck pain.
- Improved circulation: Stretching increases blood flow to your muscles.
 Blood flow not only brings oxygen and nutrients to your muscles but also removes waste and toxins in the muscle tissue.
- Stress relief: When we experience stress our muscles instinctively tighten up, stretching relaxes tight, tense muscles that often accompany stress.
- Enhanced coordination: Preserving full range-of-motion throughout all your joints keeps you in better balance. Coordination and balance will make you less prone to injury from falls, especially as you get older.

Tips on Stretching Properly

• Be gentle: We often want to get stretching over with as soon as possible, but aggressive and hasty stretching can lead to injury. Stretching exercises should be slow and smooth.

- **Don't bounce:** Bouncing as you stretch can lead to injury in the form of a muscle cramp (Charlie horse) or even micro tears (tiny tears) in the muscle, which leave scar tissue. The scar tissue makes muscles tight and less flexible, which can cause painful trigger points.
- Hold each stretch for at least 30 seconds: It takes time for your muscles to relax and lengthen safely. It is recommended to hold each stretch for 30 seconds. If you are just beginning a stretching regimen, start by holding a stretch for 10 seconds and repeating it three times. Gradually increase the time you hold each stretch, as you grow more accustomed to your stretching regimen.
- Listen to your body: If you feel pain, especially a sharp pain, you've gone too far. Back off and then hold the stretch.

Even though stretching is a healthy habit to incorporate into your daily routine, there are certain conditions in which it should be avoided, such as in an acute sprain/strain injury, fractured bones and after surgery. If you have any back, neck, bone or joint problems, consult your doctor before beginning a stretching program. No stretching routine should be very uncomfortable or painful. Pain means stretching is being done incorrectly, or there is a medical problem. If you are not certain about your stretching technique, ask a qualified health professional for help. 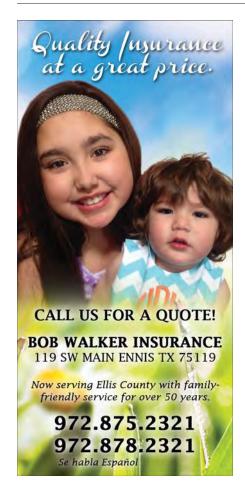

In the Kitchen With Carrie Hopkins

Originally from Midland, Carrie Hopkins, a fifth-grade math teacher at Lummus Intermediate, has brought the memories — and the recipes — of her youth with her to the Bluebonnet City. "My favorite recipes are those I remember being special to me when I was a kid," said Carrie, now a proud wife and mother of three. "My grandmother's banana pudding and my mother's squash dressing are some of them." But her Cowboy Cookies are the most popular of all. "I've made countless batches that seem to disappear as they come out of the oven!" she laughed

Carrie learned to cook by watching her mom. "We stayed in touch by spending time in the kitchen," she recalled. "I just learned by being there and talking over the stove."

Golden Baked Chicken

- 1/2 stick butter
- 2 cups water
- 2 cups instant rice
- 1 Tbsp. minced onion
- I can cream of mushroom soup
- I can cream of chicken soup
- 4 large, bone-in chicken breasts Salt, pepper and paprika, to taste
- **1.** Melt butter in a 9x13-inch casserole
- dish. Mix water, rice, onion and soups, until combined. **2.** Submerse chicken breasts into mixture
- with edges exposed. Sprinkle with seasonings. **3.** Cook in 375 F oven for 1 hour, or until chicken is golden brown.

Green Chili Enchilada Casserole

1 can cream of mushroom soup 1 can cream of chicken soup

- I cup chicken broth
- 4 oz. can green chilies, chopped
- 1/2 tsp. garlic salt
- 1 tsp. red chili powder
- 2 tsp. minced onion
- 3 chicken breasts or 1 lb. ground beef
- 4 cups Tostitos corn chips, crushed
- 8 oz. longhorn or cheddar cheese, grated
- **1.** Mix soups, broth, chilies and spices.
- **2.** In a 9x13-inch pan, layer half of chicken or beef, half of chips, soup mixture and cheese.
- **3.** Repeat and top with cheese.
- **4.** Bake in a preheated 350 F oven for 25-30 minutes. Cool 10 minutes before serving.

Squash Dressing

- 2 cups yellow squash, cooked (more if desired)
- I large onion, finely chopped
- 1/2 stick butter
- 2 heaping cups cooked cornbread

I can cream of chicken soup Salt, pepper and sage, to taste

- **1.** Cook squash and onion in a saucepan with butter until tender. Drain well.
- **2.** Crumble some of the cornbread in a 8x8-inch casserole dish; add squash and onions.
- **3.** Add soup and seasonings. Top with remaining cornbread crumbs.
- 4. Bake at 400 F for 30-40 minutes.

Cowboy Cookies

Makes 4 dozen.

- 1 cup shortening
- 1 cup sugar
- I cup brown sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 2 cups flour
- 1 tsp. soda
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. baking powder
- 2 cups oatmeal
- 6 oz. chocolate chips
- 1/2 cup pecans
- **I.** Mix shortening, sugars and eggs together until smooth.
- 2. Add vanilla. Set liquid mixture aside.
- **3.** In another bowl, mix flour, soda, salt and baking powder. Add to liquid mixture, a small amount at a time.
- **4.** Add oatmeal, chocolate chips and pecans. Roll dough into 1-inch balls.
- **5.** Bake at 350 F for 10-13 minutes, or until barely browned.

Mawmaw's Banana Pudding

- I can evaporated milk
- 3 cups whole milk
- 1 stick butter
- 3 eggs, room temperature
- 1 3/4 cups sugar
- Salt, to taste
- 1/4 cup flour
- I tsp. vanilla
- 1 box Nilla wafers
- 3 bananas, sliced
- **I.** Heat milks and butter in a saucepan. Add eggs, stirring constantly.
- **2.** Mix sugar, salt and flour together in a bowl; add to mixture until thick, stirring constantly.
- **3.** Once thickened, add vanilla; remove from heat. Layer wafers, bananas and pudding mixture twice. Cool.

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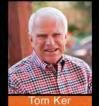
