

"I try to take as many trips as possible, and I'm still loving almost every minute of it."

Whether you address her by name or call her the "bird lady," Jean Heffernan gladly answers to both. The decor found at her front entrance easily distinguishes her home in Waxahachie as the "bird house." With the sculpted flying-bird, the detailed yard art and the bench with colorful birds perched on it, one definitely does not drive past Jean's house when coming to visit for the first time.

Jean and her late husband, John, were married in 1970. After the children grew up, moved out and began to rear their own families, Jean was left with a small dilemma. "John was an avid football fan," she remembered. "He'd watch football every Monday night. I wanted to get away from the football and the TV, so I decided to take a course in Dallas with a friend."

She attended a class on bird-watching every Monday night that first year. John saw how interesting the course was and how excited Jean had become, so he wasted no time in signing up and taking the course the following year. "We became a couple of birders," Jean said, referring to the name given

ani

to those who spend a great deal of time watching birds. "For 10 years, we were avid bird-watchers. Our travels were centered on bird-watching. Even on cruises, we bird-watched. We carried our binoculars with us everywhere we went."

During the final stages of John's illness, the bird-watching trips were put on hold, while Jean cared for her husband of 32 years. The massive amount of bird collectibles she had accumulated since her love of bird-watching began helped her tremendously during this time of heartache and great loss. The birds found throughout the home made



that most difficult time in her life bearable. "I have birds that are quilted, oil painted, carved from wood and needle pointed. They are etched in stained glass and drawn on brown paper bags with pencil," she said, pointing to one bird after another. Picking her favorite collectible came easy to Jean. "See this Andrea Collection

statuette," she said, as she gingerly set the redheaded woodpecker down on the living room table. "It was a Christmas gift from John. It's a very

It means the world to me."

Jean had made it her mission to bring something bird-related home from every trip she took with John, and she is still bringing at least one thing home from her travels. This fact caused her to laugh once again. "The T-shirt I'm wearing now came from



my trip to Trinidad in October of 2006. I went to see the scarlet ibis. The blue skies of Trinidad were filled with those red birds," she explained. "I also have china plates, posters, bird lists and commemorative magazines from other trips, but most of all, I have so many wonderful memories."

It is these memories of times with John and many newfound friends that have kept Jean moving forward in her journey through retirement. "I still consider myself to be an avid bird-watcher," she said. "I try to take as many trips as possible, and I'm still loving almost every minute of it."

This comment brought out the question of what her least favorite part of bird-watching would be if she were asked to pick just one thing. Her answer came swiftly and with great conviction. "The thing I like the least is the early morning hours," she said. "We never leave the hotel after 7 a.m." She added that it is a treat to see other parts of nature, but her main reason for getting up so early and traveling to places all over the world is for the birds. "As a birder, I do what all birders do," she said. "I stand very still in muted-colored clothing, crane my neck back almost as far as it will go and put the binoculars to my eyes."

Jean has found that through Elderhostel, a nonprofit organization that is dedicated to providing extraordinary learning adventures for



individuals 55 and over, she has been enabled to continue her travels to find birds she has yet to see. Whether she wants to remain close to home or travel afar, she finds programs through the organization that not only meet her interest in birds, but also conform to her activity level, budget, schedule and lifestyle. "Every state and every country have their own Elderhostel. It's an association, and all I have to do is pay my trip expenses to attend," Jean said. "Most Elderhostel trips I've gone on have lasted only a week. The trip to Costa Rica was a full two weeks."

Before retiring, Jean spent 25 years in the classroom at Rosemont Elementary School in Dallas. Teaching kindergarten allowed her many opportunities to share stories of her travels — both near and far — with her young charges. "My favorite bird is the painted bunting," Jean said. "When I described it to the children and showed them a picture postcard, they called it the 'rainbow bird' because of its many colors."

She went on to explain that the female bunting is a solid green, while the male is regal in many shades that blend perfectly together. "Most female birds are plain and drab," she said. "I think God marked them this way so they would be naturally camouflaged



to safely care for their young."

As a retired educator, Jean also enjoys speaking to others about birds. It is common to see her name on garden club programs, at civic organization meetings and as a guest speaker at The Greenery. "I always talk about birds and bird-watching," she said. "I still love to teach, so that's why I continue to speak. If it educates just one in the group, I'm happy!"

Jean is a member of the Ellis County Bird-Watchers Association, the American Birding Association and the National Wildlife Federation. Membership in these organizations does have its privileges. "I use the magazines, books and newsletters to reinforce my knowledge of birds," she said. "The information keeps me updated on ecology and what's going on in the world today. It's proven to be invaluable time and time again."

Watching birds is something Jean will do until she is no longer physically able to walk long treks or navigate mountain trails. The people she has met along the way have been nice, as well as interesting. "They have stories to tell that quickly take the place of TV," she laughed. "Bird-watching is relaxing and rewarding. You do have to get up early, but you don't have to move too fast and it's amazing to see what's out there, if you just take the time to look and listen." NOW

At Home With SUSIE Braden

Susie Braden, longtime resident of Waxahachie and past Crape Myrtle Queen, has a style all her own when it comes to decorating the home she and her late husband, Hubert, a.k.a. Braden to Susie, purchased back in the early '50s. Everywhere you look there is something to intrigue the mind and peak the

senses. Knickknacks, collectibles and whimsical keepsakes are displayed alongside antiques dating back well over 100 years. "There are too many stories connected to all my stuff," Susie said, with a laugh. "Braden and I never went out hunting

for all this stuff. It just fell into our laps and our home."

The couple moved to Waxahachie from Tyler in 1946. They were not acquainted with the house Susie lovingly calls home until 1948 — at that time it was a duplex. "We rented one-half of the house," Susie remembered. "We didn't buy it until 1952. It's been home ever since."

Hubert and Susie came to Ellis County with aspirations of opening an automotive store. "It

would have been to our advantage to leave many times," she said, referring to the ups and downs that come with a family-owned and operated business. "We both just grew to love Waxahachie."

To look at the four-bedroom, three-bath home today, no one would guess it was ever a

two-family dwelling. Over the years, it has been remodeled three times with the last major construction project taking place in 1970. "It only had seven rooms when we



bought it," Susie explained. "We added the upstairs, the garden room and closed in the front porch."

The journey back to a simpler time begins as soon as you pull into the unique, brick-inlaid driveway toward the open, three-car garage. The trees nestle you in their shade, as the birds chirp and the bees buzz among flowers that are in full bloom. As a Master Gardener, if Susie could, she would spend all her time outdoors. It is where she goes to find the peace that only nature can supply. "I spend a great deal of time outdoors. I'd much rather be outside instead of inside," she said. "I just like to dig in the dirt."

Thankfully, Susie has a special friend, Alver Thomas, who lets her work in the yard alongside him. "Mr. Thomas is my yard man," she said. "He helps with all the outside maintenance. I'll be 85 on September 12, and I still do all the inside housework myself, but I couldn't keep the yard without Mr. Thomas." Susie also extends a debt of gratitude to Tim Byer and Peter Adamson for their handiwork in maintaining the house. "They can fix anything," she added.

Since she loves the outdoors, it is no surprise that Susie's favorite room in the house is the garden room. "I sit for hours and watch the birds and nature in my own backyard," she said. She admitted it might be time for her to begin filling the bird feeder again. Susie said she removed the feeder when a pesky squirrel showed up, chasing the birds away and reeking havoc in her attic.

As an avid collector of fine art, the garden room is home to several



one-of-a-kind lithographs, but the piece that causes Susie to pause and take a breath is the train that always meant so much to Hubert. "Braden was a Realtor at the time," Susie said. "He sold Bob Parsons, an artist friend of ours, a house over past the viaduct."

While the house was going through a major renovation process in preparation for the Gingerbread Trail Tour of Homes, Bob and Hubert came upon the train in the attic. Several years later when Bob decided to move, he called Hubert

once again. "He wanted Braden to list his house," Susie said. "When the house sold, the train was Braden's commission." The train, still the focal point of the garden room today, is made from "a little bit of everything."

Susie pointed to an airplane designed and constructed by the same unknown artist. "I bought the airplane for Braden long before he got the train," she said. "Found objects are what make up both pieces." The train's front grill is a shoe brush, while the plane boasts of wings made from two metal spatulas.

The antique mantle on the far wall in the garden room came by way of a fellow who had a booth at Peel's Antique Mall many, many years ago. This room is also home to a pair



of original Windsor chairs. Items, from a dollhouse to an antique student desk, also take their rightful place in this room. "So much of this stuff is for my grandchildren," Susie said. "I've never believed you should stick a child off in a room somewhere, so everything for the children is right here."

The dining room is also steeped in history. The dining room table with a dozen matching chairs was purchased at an estate sale. The table measures five feet across; with all seven leaves in place it extends to 12 feet. Susie said it can easily, and comfortably, seat up to 14 people. The way to the upstairs suite of rooms is also found in the dining area. "Braden wanted a circular staircase," Susie said. "He thought it would take up less room while still being functional."

Another lithograph is found in the formal living room. It has the unique quality of being three photographs in one. "It all depends on where you're





Priceless Memories of Dad

Some people excel at sports. Others are gifted at singing and dancing. Jane Jacobs is one of those rare individuals whose natural, artistic talent is not limited to one specific medium. "My inspiration must have come from watching my dad," Jane said. "He was always working on something."

As she sat reminiscing about her childhood, Jane smiled before laughing aloud. "Our backyard in Chicago had a small area where the dirt was different. When it got wet it was great for molding and shaping things," she explained. "I started sculpting before I knew what sculpting really was." She remembered playing in the "special dirt" until her

mother bought her a package of modeling clay.

The laughter came again as she vividly recalled the first time she was able to carve alongside her dad, the late Byron Giller. "I was only 7 years old. I carved rubber band shooting guns and knives for the neighborhood boys," she said. "I guess you could say I started before I

even realized I had a knack for carving artistic pieces of art." Sitting beside Jane, now 84, it is impossible not to see the wonderfully detailed art pieces displayed throughout the cozy home she shares with her husband, Ken, and their dog, Cassie. Jane has been able to successfully mix and mingle her

artwork among pieces her friends have given her, making her own personal art gallery.

Jane has never limited herself to just one medium. Her

mood generally dictates what she works on from day to day. "I work on more than one thing at a time," she said. "It's just all about what I feel like doing."

There are several paintings in acrylic, her favorite mode of creating when it comes to using an easel and an assortment of brushes. There are carvings in wood,

as well as in basic rocks. Sculpted pieces of ceramic and clay are placed strategically throughout the home.

One of Jane's favorite carvings has its rightful place on the fireplace hearth. "He's an old dog I carved from the root of an oak tree," she said, as she gently placed the carving in her



lap. "The base is mahogany. The two pieces fit together like a perfect puzzle."

Another very special carving is displayed in her son's home today. It took Jane 10 years to complete it. "I carved a 64-piece chess set from bois



d'arc wood and black walnut," she said. "At times, it seemed as hard as iron. My dad handcrafted the playing table by cutting all the blocks." Jane added that 10 years may seem like a very long time for some, but while carving, she was also a wife and mother to her young family.

As Jane continued to look at the artwork that is commonplace to her, more memories of the special times she spent with her father seemed to flood her mind. There were times they collaborated on a piece and never left their respective homes. "We sent things back and forth in the mail," she said, once again smiling fondly at the recollections. "Dad came up with a slab of cherry wood almost two inches thick and about 14 feet long. I carved two deer and scenery on paper and sent the directions to him. He had a special machine for carving, so he followed my directions and the end result was a beautiful, 15-layer carving in about two feet of cherry wood."

This family heirloom has also found a home at another son's house, but no doubt, it is a sight to see. "It really did look great when it was finished," she said. "I loved my dad. The time spent with him was priceless!"



A Local Champion

What sport do you think of when you envision a ball and a racket? Most people would say tennis, not racquetball. According to Mike Jones, a local racquetball champion, racquetball is often ignored these days in the world of sports. "It's not even recognized as an Olympic sport because not enough countries participate in it," Mike said. "Racquetball gets no exposure on national television."

Mike has been interested in sports his entire life. "I've always been an athlete. When I was a kid, my parents said I'd be an athlete wherever there was a ball involved," he explained. "I wanted to be a professional baseball player."

After realizing he might not become the professional athlete he always wanted to be, he asked himself what would be the next best thing. The answer was to become a physical education coach. "Most of my family members are teachers," he noted. attain a degree in physical education and health.

"At North Texas University, I participated in intramural sports," he explained. "I played racquetball." He has played racquetball on and off for 25 years, but only competitively since 2000. He and his cousin started playing together at Oak Cliff Assembly. In September 2000, they decided to enter their first tournament at the Maverick Club in Arlington. "We won second place in the men's doubles. I got hooked," he added.

Mike is an advanced certified instructor of the American Professional Racquetball Association. He has participated in the USA Open twice. In November 2006, he won fifth place in Memphis, Tennessee, at one of the largest racquetball events. Two years ago, he went to nationals in Houston and won both silver and bronze medals. In 2007, he won the mixed doubles state championship in Arlington.

Mike has been teaching sixth grade



science at Amber Terrace Intermediate School in DeSoto, soon to become East Middle School. Prior to his current position, he obtained a master's degree in education, so he could try his hand as principal of Trinity Christian School, which he helped start in 1980. After a couple of years, he decided to return to teaching sixth grade.

Not only does Mike teach school,

but he also teaches racquetball at Navarro College. He also gives free lessons to new members of the YMCA here in Waxahachie. He plays racquetball with a team on Mondays and Thursdays, and is sponsored by Ektelon Sports.

"tough it out," which is not uncommon. He remembered that his father's side of the family had a history of heart attacks — his father, being the only one of nine brothers to have survived



one at the age of 46. Mike managed to make it to the nurse's station and have her call 9-1-1.

When he arrived at the hospital, the doctors confirmed that he had, in fact, suffered from a mild heart attack. An angiogram photographed the blockage, and his physician informed him that two of the four major arteries surrounding his heart were indeed blocked. "'The only thing that kept you alive was playing racquetball,'" he said, quoting his physician. 

According to the U.S. Academic Decathlon, theirs is "the premier scholastic competition" for high school students. Waxahachie High School Decathlon sponsor Karen Jenkins shares those same sentiments. "Our previous principal, John Auney helped get it started," Karen said. "When I became involved, the group of students came to me because we didn't have a sponsor. Wanda Cain was my assistant coach. Two coaches and a classroom, that's how we started. We've had Mark Colson on economics, Jo Bhore for the Super Quiz Infrastructure and my mother-in-law, Nancy Hightower, listens to kids' speeches."

One year, Waxahachie High School

(WHS) placed eleventh in the Decathlon for the entire state of Texas. "In the Decathlon at the state and national level, scholarships are provided for both the school team and individual student," Karen explained. "UIL [University Interscholastic League] also has lots of scholarships tied to the state level." Karen recalled a past student who received a \$12,000 scholarship.

According to Karen, the difference between the two competitions is that UIL students focus on one subject per competition, while her students learn 10 different subjects. The 10 Decathlon subjects are super quiz, language/literature, art, music, science, economics, mathematics, speech, interview and essay. Karen and WHS student Timothy Erickson are involved in both the Decathlon and

UIL competition. "I've sponsored UIL Literary Criticism for about

15 years" she humbly said. "Tim also advanced to regionals in UIL Social Studies."

As for Tim's preference between the Decathlon and UIL his response is, "I do both. It's easy to do," he said. "They don't conflict."

When speaking of the Decathlon requirements, Karen stated, "The biggest misconception is that only the top students can compete. That's just not true."



With A-, B- and C-students eligible, Karen feels the hardest student to find is the C level. Tim, who was in the B category explained, "The Academic Decathlon doesn't place more emphasis on AP classes."

"This is for students who love to learn," Karen said. "I would like to see more kids get involved. I like to have a

lot [of students] apply so there's already a feeling of competition. Even homeschooled students can participate."

"I was homeschooled fourth through ninth," Tim chimed in. "It was fun."

Each Decathlon team has nine students. This year, Waxahachie only had seven students due to illness. Referring to the Decathlon team, Karen further explained that it is usually a male-oriented competition. "This year we were evenly split," she said. "We have a standard uniform of black jackets provided by the school and khaki slacks. We feel we set a standard for the region."

Every school pays a registration fee. The Decathlon exposes the students to so much more than the curriculum offered in the classroom. "Two of the competitions are speech and interview," Tim said. "They help us with our communication skills."

While Tim said that reading through all of the material (a huge binder full) is his job, the dedicated teacher explained her strategy for the team. "The day before the actual competition, all the kids come to my house and we have an all-day study session, polish speeches and go over



material the kids still need to cover," she said. "We do have practice tests. That really helps!"

Karen continued saying that the Decathlon is always held in January, with both regional and state levels of



competition. "Even if your team doesn't win in your region, the team can advance to state based on point totals," she explained. "They like to have 25 teams in each section — small, medium (WHS' category) and large (5A) based on school population. This year the event will be at Lancaster High School." Schools host the Decathlon for two consecutive years, and the hosting school always travels to state whether they qualify to do so or not.

The list of weekend activities begins with essay writing and culminates on Saturday with the Super Quiz Relay, much like the TV show *Jeopardy*. The quiz topic on China last year proved to be a difficult one. The Civil War will be the topic for the upcoming year. Tim's favorite subjects are history and social science. "I decided last year was my experimental year," Tim said. "This year I want to win!"

"Tim has become my self-appointed captain for next year," Karen said. "He's working really hard to pull in student participants who are dedicated." Perhaps this is one reason it comes as no surprise that when asked what he likes best about competing, Tim enthusiastically proclaimed, "The competitions are fun! I like building the team this year!"

GRANDMA DADDATO'S ITALIAN COOKIES

5 3/4 cups flour 3 Tbsp. baking powder 1 1/4 cups sugar 3/4 cup shortening 4 eggs 1/2 tsp. vanilla 1/2 cup frozen orange juice concentrate 1/2 oz. anise flavoring 1 cup milk 1 cup chocolate chips

ICING: powdered sugar water

1/2 oz. anise flavoring colored sprinkles or sugar toppings

COOKIES: In a large bowl, mix flour, baking powder and sugar. Cut shortening into dry ingredients until it resembles corn meal. Make a well in the center of the flour mixture. In a separate bowl, beat together eggs, vanilla, orange juice and anise until well blended. Pour mixture into well and mix together. Add milk, mix and knead. If too wet, add more flour. Put flour on table or counter and knead dough while adding chocolate chips. Roll into approximately 2-inch wide rolls, the length of the cookie sheet, three rolls to a pan, tap them to flatten a little. Bake at 350 F for 12 to 15

minutes or until they look done. Do not under bake. Remove cookie loaves from pan when slightly cooled and place on wax paper or foil. ICING: Mix powdered sugar, water and anise to a thin consistency (not thick like cake icing). Brush or spread with hands on loaves. Immediately cover with colored sprinkles or sugar toppings. Don't let icing dry or the toppings will not stay on. Cut diagonally.

CHOCOLATE CHIP DATE NUT CAKE

1 1/2 cups water, boiled 1 cup dates, cut up 1 3/4 tsp. baking soda



Back Pain Safety

Dr. James Ellis, an orthopedic surgeon on the medical staff at Baylor Medical Center at Waxahachie, offers the following tips for dealing with back pain, a common and complex condition. On average, about 25 percent of Americans experience chronic or sporadic back pain. There are many different possible causes, the most common being accidents, muscle strain and sports injuries. While many back injuries are minor and temporary, more serious injuries can include a fractured vertebra, a slipped vertebra or vertabrae and damage to nerve function called cervical radiculopathy.

"The majority of back pain that I



see comes from people who have been injured," Dr. Ellis said.

Most back pain can be treated with a combination of therapies, including physical therapy, pain medication and/or anti-inflammatory medications. "In some cases, surgery may be required, but that all depends on the individual patient and their condition," Dr. Ellis said.

In most cases, back pain can be more annoying than debilitating. However, a trip to the doctor is advised should you feel numbness or tingling. Your doctor may use an X-ray, CT scan or MRI to further assist in pinpointing the area of concern.

To relieve common back pain:

Rest: If you have been doing strenuous activities such as moving or lifting heavy objects.

Heat: A heating pad can help to alleviate some of the pain and help increase your movement.





Strengthen: Working on your abdominal muscles can also help to internally support your spine.

Standing: While standing you should keep your head up and abdominal muscles pulled in. You should also avoid wearing high heels.

Sleeping: You may have to try out soft and hard mattresses in order to find one that will not give you back pain.

Sitting: When sitting in a chair it should be of an appropriate height for you and should give you adequate lumbar support.


Finally, the sun is shining

through the lush green canopy. It would be great if I had more holes in that canopy! The heavy roof of leaves gives us shade from the scorching sun, but is hard on flowerbeds where we want some color. There are several ferns which do well in our alkaline soil that can give you multiple shades of green, and a few multicolored bulbs that can still brighten your beds. Holly fern is fairly large, about three feet tall and wide, with large dark green fronds. Japanese painted fern has multicolored white and green leaves and is a bit smaller. Both do well in shady areas and compete well with large trees! Autumn ferns are about 12 - 15 inches tall and make a great low border, and the old standard wood ferns survive well growing to about three feet in height.

If you mix them in with bright white, pink or red caladiums, they can really brighten a dark, shady bed. It really is not too late to plant caladiums, if you can find them. The bulbs themselves have a blooming life of about three months, so there is still time for them to come up and look great until fall. I just learned this spring that you can hurry the time from planting until they come up by soaking the bulbs for 30 minutes in warm water before you plant them. We still have August, September and October before the nights get cold, so give them a try!

Purple oxalis is another bulb that will come up year after year and will do well in the shade. It takes awhile, but will reward you with a low-growing splash of bright purple in a not-so-bright flowerbed. The bulbs are usually very small, so be prepared to put a lot of them in the ground! Then enjoy the rest of your summer and rest up for fall plantings! **NOW**


